This event is sponsored by the American Red Cross and all net fees will be turned over to that organization. Certificates will be presented from the United States Lawn Tennis Association.

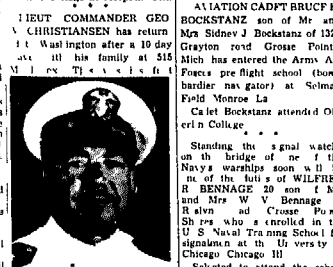
