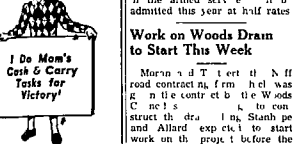

Woods Wants Returns for Cash on Hand

Will Invite Tenders From Holders of Village's Refunding Issue of 1940

At the Woods Council meeting Tuesday night Village Attorney Berns called attention to the fact that the village had nearly \$100,000 in its sinking fund (\$89,000 to be exact) on which it was getting no interest from the banks and it looked like a promising field for some prudent municipal financing.

After some general discussion it was decided to invite tenders from the holders of the village's refunding issue of 1940 for sale to the sinking fund to the extent of \$23,000. These bonds carry interest rates running from 2 1/2 to 4 1/2 and are of course very desirable securities in the present bond market.

Of the total issue outstanding amounting to \$4,700,000 about \$90,000 is now callable. If the holding for tenders does not produce results it is highly probable the village will soon start to buy in these callable bonds.

The discussion Tuesday evening recalled the very able financing in recent years which lifted the village out of a morass of delinquent taxes and defaulted public credit to a position where now its credit is high and it is able to face a new issue of \$255,000 with every confidence it will be placed at a satisfactory premium.

As recently as 1933 the Woods village was in a position of obligations in a blanket issue of \$1,000,000.

Meanwhile of course, there was a somewhat lively business done by the prudent citizens of the community in buying in the village bonds at the then depressed price and using them as a part of the payment of their delinquent taxes. The village being glad to see the operation discontinued only on the circumstance that they were only receivable for delinquent taxes if and when all current taxes were paid in full at the time of the transaction.

The calling in of the bonds is expected to improve the village's credit in the sale of the coming year issue.

Army And Navy To Give Tests

The second qualifying Test for the Army Specialized Training Program and the Navy College Program will be given throughout the country on Tuesday, November 9 will be administered at the Detroit University School Mr. Lambert F. Whistone announced today.

A pamphlet of general information which contains an admission identification form may be obtained at Detroit University School. This form provides the test subjects between the ages of 17 and 21 inclusive who are regular school graduates or who will be graduated by March 1, 1944 in order to take the test. Should be in contact with Mr. G. M. Garrick in order that the necessary test supplies may be ordered.

The same examination will be taken by both Army and Navy designees. The aptitude and general knowledge required for the program of college entrance will be all of the same. It is urged to take the test at a time of the day when each candidate will be in the best state of preference but taking the test does not obligate the candidate to enlist in the service.

The Army Specialized Training Program and the Navy College Program are similar to common academic training at government expense following in direction into the armed services. Successful completion of the prescribed courses may follow further offer of training lead to a commission in the Army or the Navy.

Those selected for the Army will, after further screening and basic military training, be sent to college. Students chosen for the Navy Program will be stationed by the Office of Naval Officer Procurement and if selected to college. Students who attend college under either of the programs will be under military discipline, on active duty in uniform and will be exempt from taxation on food housing books and uniforms which will be paid by the Army or the Navy.

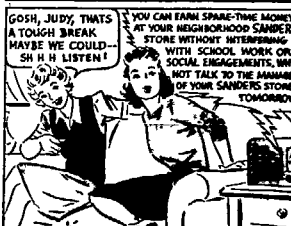
