It would be easy for him to win by taking a good number of points in the honor.

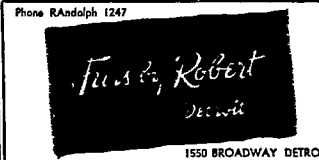

Thaw quick frozen broiling chicken enough to separate halves. Remove giblets. Preheat broiler in 10 minutes. Grease hot broiling rack. Cut chicken in halves, brush with soft butter of oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place skin side down on the hot broiling rack. If a stove broiler is used have chicken 2 or 3 inches below flame and leave door open slightly. Broil at high heat about 12 minutes, turn and broil other side about 8 minutes.

For above chicken skinned down, broil one rack and broil at moderate heat about 12 minutes, turn and broil other side about 8 to 10 minutes, increase to high heat and broil each side 2 minutes longer or until well broiled.

To oven broil cut chicken in halves place on shallow pan brush with soft butter or oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Bake in hot oven (400 F.) about 45 minutes, turning once on fly to brown both sides. Serve with chowder average from 1 pound to 1 pound 8 oz. in weight.
