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## Meaning of the \$3,000,000

Persons not yet old can recall the glee that used to pervade the ranks of the underfitted at every little trifle that this rich man or that powerful corporation had made or was about to make a contribution to the Republican war chest.

Of course nine times out of ten such contributions were motivated by the frankly avowed purpose of maintaining a protective tariff on the particular manufactured products or commodities with which the donors dealt incidentally it was the process under which this country had built up its national wealth from sixteen billions in 1860 to two hundred billions in 1900 through the tariff. It looked to continue to make money and at the same time maintain their organizations intact and give work to their employees at decent wages a position impossible of attainment if American industry had been left naked against the competition of cheap European labor.

Today the situation is the same only with reverse English. Now labor is to make the big money contribution. Mr. Sines Hillman of the Political Action Committee has set out to raise a tidy \$3,000,000 to dump into the coffers of the Democratic party and for the candidate who they have reckoned will best serve their interests. They are entirely frank about it though the procedure is in complete violation of the law. They have had the nod from on high. They are not looking for contributions from rich men. They regard with scorn this fast-dividing group and anticipate with deep satisfaction the day when there will be no such animals left in this country.

Of course there may be a few rich ex labor leaders here and there but why worry over that disturbing detail. Besides it might set some people thinking even some of their own club.

No one should be so naive as to think this 'practical' entry of the CIO in the coming presidential campaign is in the interest of all labor. It is only for that still relatively small segment which exists in the CIO ranks or which its leaders hope can be coerced into joining its ranks.

It is a make-ready for the same performance that was staged before the country in 1933 and carried on quite successfully into the present moment.

Back in the early years 1833 34 and 35 when the only real issue before the country was to get 15,000,000 idle people back into useful work union labor laid down the dictum that none could ever be 'bought'. With the advent of the National Administration that was more political than patriotic they got away with it. True it was only by reason of a subsidy from public funds to the extent of twenty billions paid via all the phony alphabetical relief agencies that the processors could lay in the lap of the sugar papa in the White House to try it once that they were able to put it across.

But these maneuvers of the Political Action Committee have deeper aims than to win the coming November election. They are aiming at the White House. It is no idle program. It deserves the closest attention of every thinking American. Their program will not be retarded if it should develop within the next few months or weeks that we have won this war chiefly if not solely, by reason of the Russian participation.

And so Mr. Roosevelt who has already joined the ranks of the tired old men who were anathema to him when he was trying to overthrow the Supreme Court appreciatively accepts the aid of his natural political heirs so that when he decides to step out gracefully they will be set to pick up the reins.

The strange bedfellows that politics makes of its professional practitioners are a blood brotherhood of harmony and amity compared to the agglomeration of political economic and cultural inconsistencies that one first rate world war makes of the chief nations of the world.

America and Britain the only two real democracies among the great states are fighting valiantly to make the world safe for free men. It looks now as if they might do it with the not inconsiderable help of Russia and China two of the world's greatest despots. This association has held together rather well the face of a common peril. This has been the easier part. The great test awaits the coming of peace and the lifting of the immediate danger of defeat.

And now we are about to take another foreign traveler to our bosom. Turkey comes a knocking on the door. This gentleman with the simtar who has slit more throats in southeastern Europe in the past 300 years than all the other blood letters in Europe put together, craves our company.

But they have always been great fighters. Mr. Churchill no doubt recalls Gallipoli. And the Turk is making a bid to catch the Bosphorus when the post war talk fest starts. This ambition will not be discouraged at Dowry's request. It is only a matter of months since Mr. Churchill told Mr. Stalin that if you are a land people we are a sea people remain a land people.

For the moment we will all throw our hats in the air and hail the Turk!
