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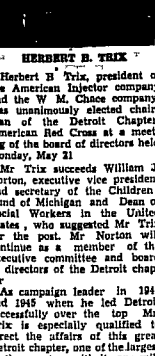
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Judge Fines Six Drivers

Victor DeBaeke Raps Saint Clair Shores Spender and Citrus Police Accident

Judge Victor H. DeBaeke in Park police court Wednesday morning disposed of traffic cases as follows:

John B. Hodgson 315 Beaupre lane Grosse Pointe Farms, for speeding on Kercheval on May 19 paid \$10 fine and \$5 costs. 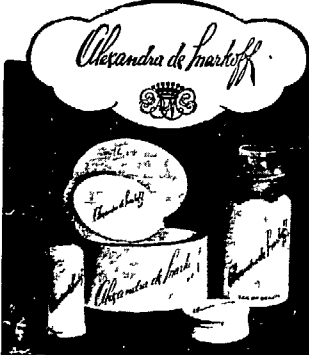

Operating with a reconnaissance patrol in the mountains of Luzon, Sallie's specialty was to lead his patrol to the enemy's traps. Here the patrol was fired on from two sides by machine guns.

The left rear fire of one jeep was so close that the hood and front of the second jeep were riddled. Not a man was injured. The entire group dove under the trees and tall grass.

A Filipino guide made the trip to the mine areas. He fell on the mine on which the patrol was landed as he crawled from his jeep. The mine

burst and exploded.

Sallie said "Somebody upstairs is really pulling strings for our reconnaissance patrol."

He added—Everyone of us seems to have a horseshoe around his neck for our job is to explore enemy territory into which no American troops have entered.

Not one of us has been injured in spite of the fact we have probed the mountains and plains of New Britain, Luzon, Pannay and Negros.

During the late April engagement when the two jeeps were hit Sallie and his buddies changed a fire on their vehicle while under fire in order to withdraw. It was necessary for them to crawl backward in ditches along rice paddies.

Pilot Returns to His Base



That guy in the Chinese guerrilla outfit is none other than 1ST LIEUT. WALTER KRYWY, son of Mrs. Eugenia Krywy, of 2203 Edgemont Grosse Pointe Woods. Shot down over China while on a fighter sweep with his Mustang group, Lieutenant Krywy was missing for nine weeks before he worked his way back to his base. With him is the communications officer of the base, Captain Smith.

"We regret to inform you that your son has been missing in action since January 2, 1945. That is the news the parents of 1st Lt. Walter Krywy received from the War Department the early part of March. Things are looking much brighter now because Walter has been found and is back at his base somewhere in China. Walter climbed home as soon as he was brought in by a band of Chinese guerrillas who were his boon companions for the nine weeks needed to make the 250 mile hike back to the base. Walter writes the Chinese people are great. They treated me like a God and my slightest wish was granted if it were at all possible for them to do it.

Walter was drafted into the Air Corps January 30, 1943 and received his initial training at the Waco Army Air Field in San Antonio, Texas. He was shipped overseas April 20, 1944 by the way of the east coast and made eight different stops enroute to his base at Kungming, China where he arrived about the first of July, 1944. He was reported missing in action January 2, 1945 almost two years to the day after his mission to Suchoa, China. The fighter group encountered heavy ground fire and his plane was so badly damaged that he was seen to bail out.

His flying buddies saw him land safely, pick up his chute and start walking. It was they who got Walter's parents all pelted with hope during those dark days last March. When the fighter group returned to base after the mission, Walter's buddy found a letter Walter had written the night before telling

of the mission the following day. But he didn't get the chance to mail it as the group was on the flight line at 3:30 a. m. the following morning.

Mrs. Krywy has quite a collection of souvenirs which Walter sent including a Japanese sword and a map and the Chinese guerrilla clothing he wore during his trek back to his base.

to hold the line against future increases in traffic mishaps.

Victory Garden News

A common error in planning a Victory Garden is to plant too much of one of the early varieties of cabbage and as a result there is much waste at harvest. The gardener should plant several varieties having different times of maturity and thereby have cabbage available for use for a longer harvest period and for late storage.

Early Jersey Wakefield Gold on Acre and Copenhagen Market mature in 62 to 66 days and have their best quality at this time and should be consumed when they are most palatable. These varieties should be planted early and in amounts needed to take care of the family needs for a period of two to three weeks during the harvest period. Also by planting early some of the trouble from cabbage yellows disease which is prevalent in not weather will be avoided.

Cauliflower and brussels sprouts—the royalty among cabbages—are easier to grow than most people seem to believe. They mature best in late fall and brussels sprouts will stand severe freezing without injury. Cauliflower plants must be kept growing without a setback

from the time the seeds germinate, until harvest time. Other wise they have small heads or none at all. As soon as the white heads are two inches in diameter the leaves should be tied together above the head to shield it from the sun. They develop fast at this stage and should be used before they get very large.

Brussels sprouts seldom make heads until late in the fall. The lower ones mature first and should be used as soon as the lower leaves show signs of yellowing. A few of the best heads should be removed at each picking to ensure continued high quality.

The plants can be cut or pulled and stored in a cool place when freezing is about to take place. As brussels sprouts require from 110 to 120 days to mature from the first week old plants the plants must be set in the garden by June 15.

Aphids—lice—are the most serious pest and should be destroyed when the first ones appear to be effective.

GLASS SPREADERS BOUGHT

Many complaints have come into the City and Park police stations recently of boys maliciously breaking glass bottles on the streets. Drivers about the Pointe have had occasion to note this latest trend of mischief and are exasperated. The police have been instructed to exercise special watch for such offenders and promise severe punishment for any one caught.
