

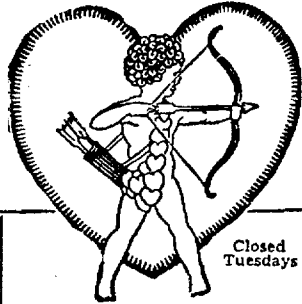

FIVE CASES OF POLIO developed in one Detroit family are now under treatment in the Henry Ford Hospital. Sixty-two cases in Detroit thus far this year against 52 cases all last year.

PRESIDENT TRUMAN issues an executive order recreating the World War II draft regulations and defining deferments, as follows:

- 1) Agricultural workers engaged in marketing substantial amounts of essential farm products, if they cannot be replaced.
- 2) Industrial workers whose jobs are considered essential to the Nation's health or safety.
- 3) Members of the armed forces and veterans who served more than 90 days in the Army, Navy, Marines or Coast Guard between Dec. 7, 1941 and Sept. 2, 1945.
- 4) Any sole surviving son of a family in which one or more sons or daughters were killed in action in line of duty while serving in the armed forces in World War II.
- 5) Ministers and Clergymen.
- 6) Conscientious objectors.
- 7) Such public officials as Governors of States and territories, members of Congress or state legislators and judges.
- 8) Those physically or mentally unfit.

RUSSIAN VICE CONSUL CHEPURNYKH in New York in answer to an enquiry when Lomakin, the Consul, was leaving the country, said "Oh, I think he is going to stay" . . . our State Department says he will leave, willingly if he pleases or by deportation if necessary.

THE GREEK GENERAL STAFF announces the last Guerilla (communist) forces in Greece have been wiped out following the greatest victory of the civil war.

MORE THAN 300 YOUNG COUPLES for the second Saturday in succession, line up in the County Clerk's office for marriage licenses . . . President's Truman's announcement of exemption from the draft for married men has given Cupid a tremendous send off in Wayne County.

CORN BROKE 6 to 13 cents per bushel on the Chicago Board of Trade yesterday following three straight days of decline. Traders say big crop prospects the cause.

## Farms Gets New Fire Fighting Equipment



Outstanding economy and adaptability are the chief attributes of this new emergency service and rescue unit recently placed in operation by the Grosse Pointe Farms fire department, according to CHIEF GEORGE F. DANSBURY, shown at the wheel. The vehicle is a series F-2 Ford truck with standard express body having capacity for 500 feet of hose, resuscitator apparatus, axes and other smaller fire fighting tools. Mounted on the running board on either side are foam spray fire extinguishers for combating automobile and grass fires and other small blazes. A carbon tetrachloride extinguisher is carried inside the cab. A rotary safety lights is mounted atop the cab and a siren on the left front fender. The unit is equipped with radio receiver by means of which it can be directed to the scene of any emergency. This is to be replaced soon with a two-way radio. Chief Dansbury has been connected with the Grosse Pointe Farms fire department for 32 years, and in October will observe 45 years in fire department service.

children are especially strongly urged to take advantage of this advance enrollment opportunity, according to Superintendent Barnes. "Failure to use this opportunity may result in considerable confusion and annoying waiting periods for both children and parents on the opening day of school, September 8," said Mr. Barnes.

Health Check-Up  
School and Health Department officials again urge parents to have their children given a careful physical examination prior to the opening of the school year. Past experience has proven that this check-up is highly desirable, since in many instances it reveals minor health problems which can be more intelligently dealt with by both parents and teachers if the facts are definitely known when school opens.

Hours of School Day  
The regular hours for the different grade levels of the school system are as follows:  
Elementary Schools — (Grades Kindergarten through Six):  
Morning Session—9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m.  
Afternoon Session — 1 p.m. to 3:45 p.m.  
Kindergarten children, of course, attend only one-half day of school.  
Pierce Junior High School — 9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 3:45 p.m.  
Senior High School and Brownell Junior High School — 8:30 a.m. to 3:20 p.m., with a rotating system of lunch periods so that the need period will be different for some pupils than it will be for others.

In another section of this paper the important days, vacations and holidays of the school calendar are listed. Parents are advised to clip this calendar and keep it for future reference so that they will know the definite holidays to anticipate.

### High Standard of Pointe's Health Disclosed in Annual Report of Dr. Thomas Davies

Children's Communicable Diseases Lead List, with Only Seven Cases of Polio and 27 of Tuberculosis

The annual report of the Grosse Pointe Township Health Department for the year from April 1947 through April 1948 has just appeared.

The voluminous report broken down into many tables, is divided into two main divisions, one having to do with the general health supervision and the other devoted to the elaborate system of inspection and services in connection with the administration of the schools' health service.

The table of contagious diseases reported for the year, shows that there were 525 cases of chicken pox heading the list, with 275 cases of mumps and 124 of measles. There were 35 cases of scarlet fever, 34 of whooping cough and only 7 polio cases. There were 93 cases of dog bites, four cat bites and two squirrel bites.

There were 1028 attendants at the Infant Welfare Clinic, divided into 193 new cases and 835 returned patients.

The nurses report shows there were 5591 visits made during the year.

The total number of new venereal disease cases reported was 20, 15 of syphilis and 5 of gonorrhea.

There were 25 new cases of tuberculosis reported with two old cases moved back into the

### Park to Repair Broken Walks

The Commissioners of Grosse Pointe Park gave approval on August 23 to the recommendation of Manager Lane that the village go ahead with its rather extensive program of sidewalk repair for that area south of Jefferson which has been much discussed of late.

The sidewalks are all in Windmill Pointe, Dennee and McAllister, Yorkshire Highway and Lakepointe subdivisions.

The work will start soon and all of the sidewalks are expected to be restored to first class condition before winter.

### Church Picnic Raises Question

The Grosse Pointe Congregational Church made application to the Woods Council on August 17 for permission to hold a church picnic in the Woods' beach front park on Saturday, September 11.

The council debated the matter at some length and finally decided to grant the permission without prejudice to its right to withhold permission from similar applicants in the future. At the same time they requested the Park Commission to examine into the use of the park by non-residents of the village and report back to the Council.

The problem that confronts the Woods, which is similar to that which confronts all of the Pointe villages during the summer season, is that a church or club or organization of varied character which may have only a few members who are actually residents of the village will make request for the use of the beach park.

They then bring into the park on the day of their picnic or outing many more persons who are not bona fide residents of the village.

This results in crowding out many persons who are village residents, as such affairs are usually held on Sunday or Saturday when the park is normally attended by the largest number of its own residents.

### Informs Police Of Stolen Pistol

George Young, of 4231 Ashland, an employee of the Sunoco station at 15301 E. Jefferson, reported to the Park police on August 18 that he had had a pistol stolen from the glove compartment of his car nearly six months ago.

He had his car parked at the time at the rear of the gas station. He made efforts to locate the purloiner of the gun for some time without avail and finally reported it to the police. The police, both state and local, are mightily interested in the matter of gun thefts as these incidents often lead to the apprehension of criminals.

The Park police have reported the incident to the State police headquarters at Lansing where the records are kept.

The annual Children's Field Day sponsored by the Metropolitan Club will be held on Saturday, August 28, from 10 to 4 at the Grosse Pointe High School. A dance will be held at the Eagle Club at 8 Mile and Gratiot for the adults that evening following the day's activities.

All kinds of contests and baseball games are on the program for the kids with plenty of free pop and ice cream and prizes to be given away. Children from 5 to 17 will be admitted. Passes to the Pointe's lakefront parks will be all that are needed.

The Metropolitan Club is composed of members of the Pointe police and fire departments and federal employees.

In case of rain on Saturday, the festivities will take place on Sunday from 1 to 5.

### Building Spurt Reported in City

Building activity in Grosse Pointe City has taken a late summer spurt. In the days between August 12 and 17 six permits for construction were issued to the aggregate value of \$80,000.

On August 24 application was made at the City Building inspector's office for a permit to start erection of the new clinic at Little Kercheval and Cadieux. The permit was issued to Dr. Nelson W. Diebel. The building will be of brick and concrete extending 107 feet on Cadieux and 90 feet on Kercheval place.

The estimated cost of the building is \$123,000. Dr. Diebel and two or three other physicians will have their offices there. The architects are Odel, Hewlett and Luckenbach. The builder is the Trowel Construction company.

### PARKED CAR FLEW

Harold Meinke of 4701 Three Mile drive, reported to the Farms police on August 7 that someone had rifled the glove compartment of his car while it was parked in front of 289 Mt. Vernon the night before. Missing were some flashlight batteries, a tire gauge and a hand mirror.

### Decide to Split Cost of Sewer

The Park village will go along with Howard Grant on the cost of providing sewer service to his two lots Nos. 52 and 54 on Harvard road.

Mr. Grant is building a new home on these lots and when he was ready to make a sewer connection he found there were no sewers where the subdivider's map indicated they were.

Village Attorney Pierre V. Butler had given an opinion that the village was under no legal liability in the case. If the subdivider's map were in fault it was an issue between the property owner and the subdivider. He felt, however, there was a certain moral obligation which could not be sidestepped.

This was also the feeling of Manager Lane on the matter and he recommended that the village put in the missing sewers to the lot lines of lots 52 and 54 at its expense if the owner would put in the two needed manholes. The sewer lines would cost about \$510 and fit manholes something over \$400.

After some discussion in Council it was decided the village should put in both, provided Mr. Grant would go half the cost.

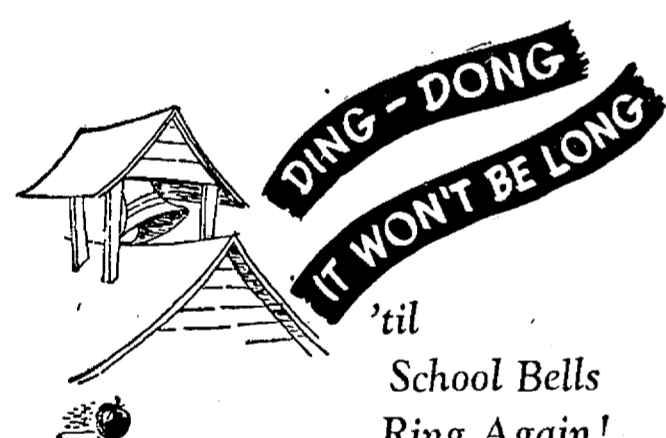

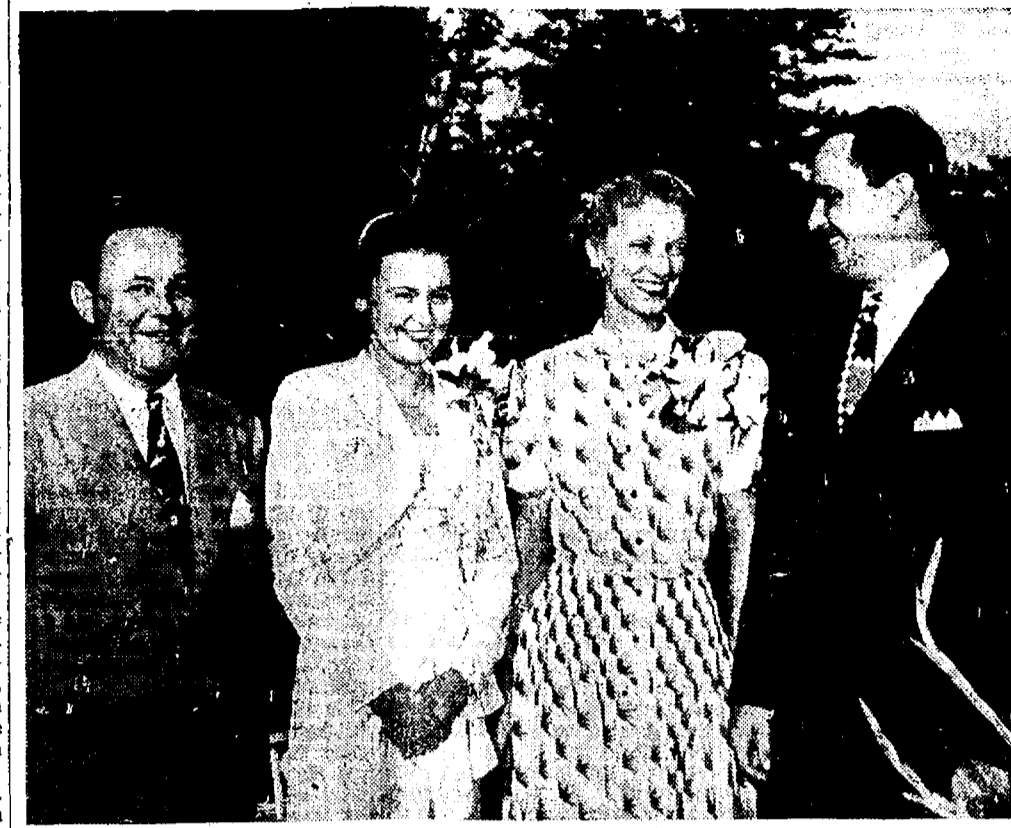
