pointe, pointed out that the purchase of the property by the city, may cost a great deal less than by having legal battles in court and wanted to know how much the city would pay for

the disputed property. He was informed that a total of \$30,000 for all the desired land has been discussed by the city officials. Ken Brown of 663 Westchester, introduced himself as the president of the subdivision association and explained that his group is organized for the purpose of upholding the zoning restrictions as provided by the city charter.

He also explained that because of the closeness of the situation by the residents on Lakepointe and Pemberton and adjoining streets, it was felt that a payment of \$45,000 for the lots would be justified, but citizens in other parts of the city may not have the same feeling.

Hoffer stressed that it would be impossible for the city to reopen its fight to condemn the lots before another year has expired, but if the residents affected banded together, it would help to form a claim of necessity if the case is brought to court the second time.

Wants Action

Another resident, Oscar B. Marx, Jr., of 954 Lakepointe, said he would rather see the committee in operation, rather than just formed and consigned only on paper. "If a strong property owner association is formed," he pointed out, "it will spread rapidly. It is best to make the first move. That way, the property owners might hesitate to take the case to court."

Romig brought up the question of having the city-at-large voting to pay \$45,000 for the lots, and was informed that there will not be an election until 1955.

18 of 23 Say Yes

Brown asked that those present cooperate with Mr. Lane by voting whether or not they desire to have the property acquired by the city for park purposes, and 18 of the 23 persons voted for the park.

During the course of the meeting, John Paterson of 928 Pemberton, demanded to know why the city waited until the case was brought to court before the people were notified what had transpired.

Planning Commissioner George Goddard revealed that the Park had held two public meetings on the subject before the case was taken to court.

The meeting broke up after Oscar Marx, Jr., was nominated and unanimously elected temporary chairman of the committee of residents concerned most with the zoning restrictions.

on the sidewalk. The shooting occurred at 5:40 p.m. Dr. Abraham Koven, a long-time friend of Dr. Spalding, was one of the first persons to reach him.

"I rushed out and saw him lying on his back on the sidewalk. Someone had rolled him over. I said, 'Ed, Ed, hold on,'" quoted Dr. Koven. "He gave one gasp and died. If anything could have been done, I could have done it because I was right there."

Follows Killer

In the meantime, Weidner heard the shot and followed Sherback and a few blocks away he saw and told Patrolmen Darwin Davis and Donald Lapasky, who made the capture and arrest.

Wayne Prosecutor Gerald K. O'Brien lavished praise on Weidner for his part in the apprehension of the killer.

Police said Sherback used a 9 millimeter (.38 caliber) Italian Beretta automatic to kill the doctor. Five unspent bullets were still in the gun and nine more were in the killer's pocket.

At the Woodward police station, the killer sat slumped in a chair, his hands handcuffed to the back, muttering the last names of the persons who were to have been his intended victims, and stating the "dirty so-and so's" made him shoot the wrong man.

Hates All Doctors

He said he was mad at all doctors because they refused to give him a clean bill of health so that he could get married eight years ago, and then he screamed that they even swore him as a lunatic.

Among those marked for death by Sherback, was former Governor Harry F. Kelly, who the killer said once turned down a request for a favor.

Sherback's victim, Dr. Spalding, was one of the nation's six top experts in heart ailments, and was president of the Wayne County Medical Society last year.

Native of Neighborhood

Dr. Spalding died within four blocks of where he was born at Fourth and Peterboro, the son of Hinton E. Spalding, an attorney. He was graduated from the University of Michigan and studied medicine at Johns Hopkins Hospital. He was chief of medicine at Harper Hospital.

Surviving him are his wife, Melody, and three children by a previous marriage, Edward, Harriet and Mrs. Florence Sharp of Rockford, Ill.

Funeral services are being held at the Wm. R. Hamilton company's chapel this morning, December 3, at 11 a.m. Cremation will be at the Evergreen cemetery.

Sandley stated, if the Bay City paper had taken down the facts as they were written in a State Police report. As it was, he picked up the paper in the hospital and found out it reported him as a hunting fatality. And to top it off, he added, the paper had called his wife, wanting to know when the funeral would be held. Emotionally upset, she made a trip to the hospital, and was relieved to find him very much alive.

Sandley is "loaded down" with another slug, a .38 caliber one, received in 1923, when as a member of the Park police force, he shot it out with a gunman. The desperado was killed in the exchange of shots, while Sandley received a wound in the left side. The .38 slug was not removed, and he carries it to this day.

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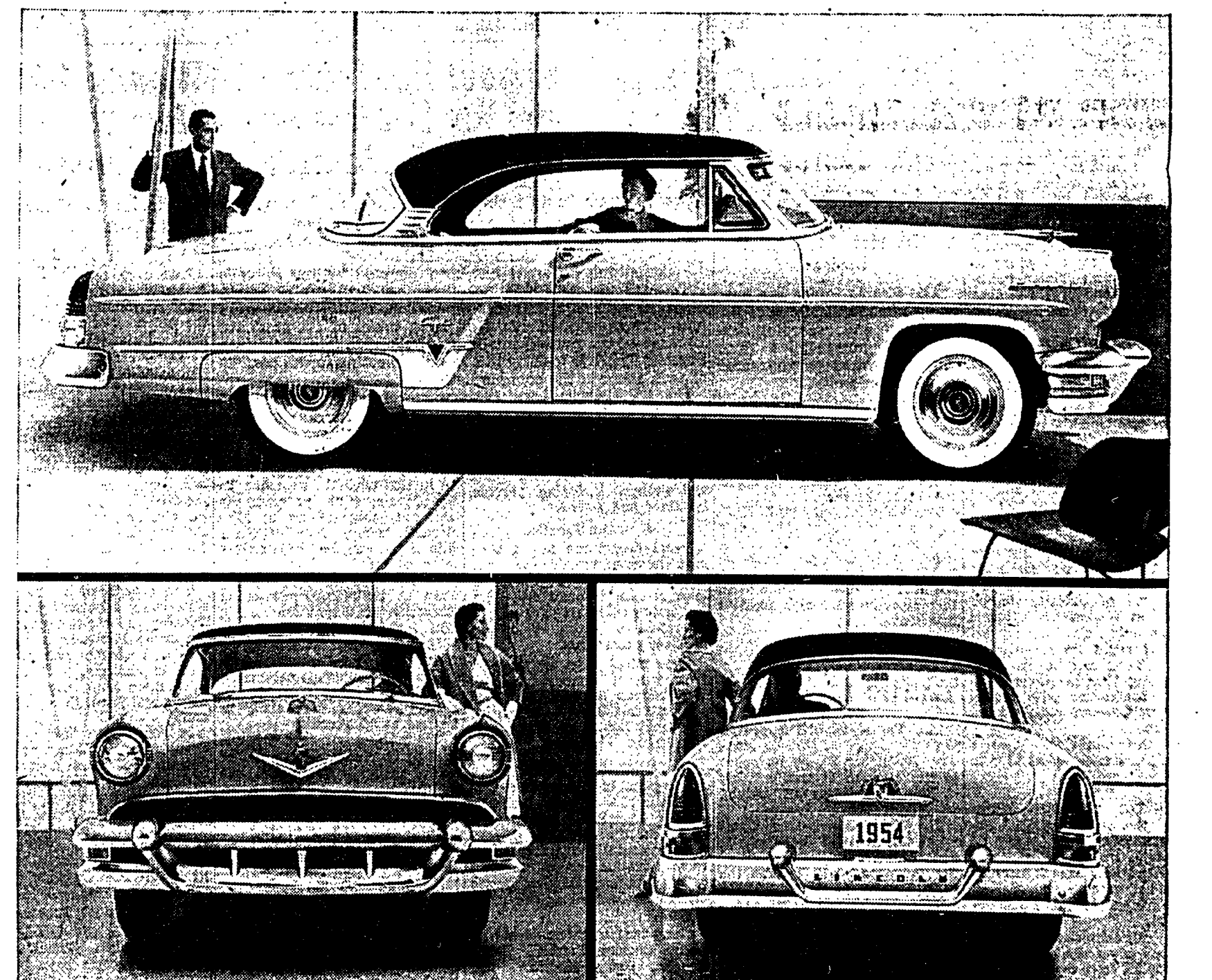
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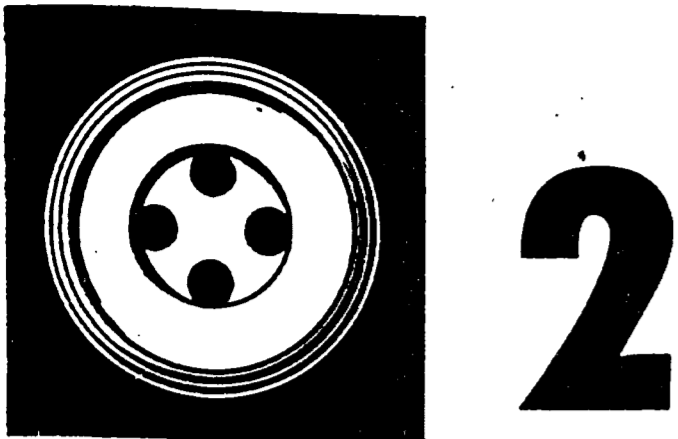

Chalfonte Traffic Survey Report Submitted by Police

A second traffic report, made by the Farms Police Department, governing traffic on Chalfonte avenue, between Moross and Cook roads, was received by the Farms council on Monday, November 23, and tabled for the next regular council meeting on December 21.

The report was prepared at the request of the council, made last September 21, following a petition presented by residents of Chalfonte, who complained of the speeding and traffic volume on the street, and that there were not enough stop signs or lights in that area.

Surveyed Various Areas
The traffic survey was made by the police department in various areas because of their similarity to the area in question, by virtue of the fact they were residential districts and were long non-stop areas. An automatic counting device was used.

One section, part of that included in the petition, was disclosed to have a public right-of-way of 80 feet; the pavement is offset and located entirely in the west 40 feet which accentuates a present unbalanced front yard setback; has only one side sidewalk, and has restrictions against commercial vehicles.

Must Move Traffic
One of the observations, according to the survey, brought out that the installation of stop signs, traffic lights or other control devices should be made to facilitate the flow of traffic, depending on the problems of the area.

It was stated further, that traffic volume is not considered serious until it reaches 750 cars an hour for at least eight hours, which is equivalent to 6,000 cars a day and 25 percent of the volume, 1,500, must be on a secondary street.

No Need for Controls
The survey, it was opined, indicated there is no need for any control device in the area of the petition. However, it was recommended that in view of this, a roof light be removed from a police patrol car to eliminate its identity and use the car for traffic patrol (this has already been done), and to consider the advisability of buying either a radar or electrical speeding timing device.

It was pointed out that a radar timer would cost approximately \$1,400, and would require two men in a patrol car to operate it and some technical knowledge is required for a set up, whereas, an electrical would only cost about \$500, and needs only one man to operate it and requires no technical training.

The electric timer was recommended if a purchase is to be contemplated.

Doctors Study Cancer on TV

Using the new medium of color television, Detroit area doctors are "going to school" to study the war against cancer in a series of 30 one-hour closed-circuit broadcasts sponsored by the American Cancer Society.

The Teleclinic classes for local physicians are held at the Ford Motor Company Rotunda, 3000 Schaefer road, Dearborn, and at the Masonic Temple auditorium, Detroit. Large-size screens have been installed at both locations to receive the broadcasts direct from New York hospitals. The series began October 21 and successive programs will be held every other week until December 2 and weekly thereafter until early June.

Through the facilities of the Columbia Broadcasting System TV network the programs also are reaching medical groups in New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Boston and Toledo. Technicians from Ford Motor Company and station WJBK-TV studied the new medium in New York before reception equipment was installed here. The large screens are the first to be utilized in an intensive series of closed-circuit broadcasts.

The programs have been scheduled, from 5-6 p.m. Wednesdays, a time it is hoped will provide a minimum of interference with doctors' duties. The American Cancer Society believes it has arranged sessions that will be useful for every general practitioner.

The audience at the first Teleclinic was enthusiastic over the use of color television as a means of presenting professional post-graduate education. It is believed this medium will go far beyond the success of journals, films or exhibits in bringing doctors up-to-date on methods of diagnosing and treating cancer.

Physicians, hospital technicians and nurses are urged by the American Cancer Society to attend the Teleclinic sessions. In addition, Dr. L. W. Hull, Michigan State Medical Society president, said:

"The presentation as a whole should be viewed by every doctor who can be present. This program is of inestimable value and will have a beneficial effect on the health of our community."

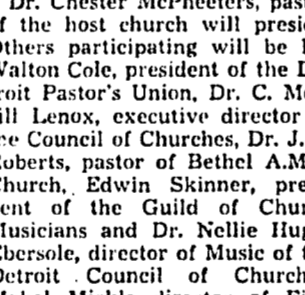

Attends Parley At West Point

WEST POINT, N. Y.—Bruce Terris, senior at Harvard, is one of approximately 125 students from 50 leading colleges and universities who will participate in the fifth annual Student Conference on United States Affairs now

being held at the United States Military Academy, West Point, N. Y.

Mr. Terris is a resident of 900 Lincoln road, Grosse Pointe, Mich.

At this conference, Terris will take part in round table discussions on "The National Security Policy of the United States." Besides the round table discussions, he will attend plenary sessions at which such notables as Admiral Arthur Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; John J. McCloy, former U. S. High Commissioner for Germany; and W. Averell Harriman, former Director for Mutual Security, will speak.

The purpose of this conference is threefold: the first being to provide an orderly informative examination and discussion of a broad and important subject in the field of United States Foreign Policy; the second is to test at undergraduate level the instructional values and possibilities of a conference program similar to that used in conferences at the faculty level; and the final objective is to broaden students' contact with their collegiate contemporaries in an academic endeavor.

The conference subject will be broken into four sub-topics in order to provide better coverage. These sub-topics are: Internal United States, Non-Communist World Outside the United States, the Far East, and the Soviet Orbit. Each of these will be discussed by two round table groups, each composed of students and a panel advisor.

The ninth largest institution of higher education in the United States is Michigan State College with an enrollment of 15,000.

Woods Holding Special Election

The City of Grosse Pointe Woods has called a special election on Tuesday, December 8, to vote on two amendments to the City Charter. The first amendment would change the mayor's term of office from one to two years and would extend council tenures from two to four years.

The second amendment concerns the salary scale for elected officials. The present \$15 per meeting would be paid councilmen and mayor, but would eliminate the present \$400 maximum amount in any one year. The mayor would continue to receive an extra \$200 per annum.

limits of the Village area. Their store is a symbol of the growing city. The name Kopp's long ago became synonymous with the Pointe.

Accident Fatal To Aged Woman

A Detroit woman, believed to have died of a heart attack after

her son's car in which she was a passenger, had collided with a truck, on Saturday, November 28, at Nottingham and Vernor Highway, was found to have died of a crushed chest, information from Park Police Chief Arthur Louwers disclosed.

According to the chief, Mrs. Christina Costa, 84, of 1214 Seyburn, was in the front seat of a car, driven by her son, Marcellus 63, same address, when the car, going east on Vernor at a speed between 28 to 30 miles an hour, collided with a stake truck driven by Morris C. Jacoby, 36, of 1416 Lakepointe, who was traveling south on Nottingham. The traffic signal was in operation.

Following the accident, Mrs. Costa, emerged from the wrecked car, without any assistance, but within seconds, collapsed. She was rushed to Bon Secour Hospital, by Police ambulance, where she died a few hours later.

At first it was believed that she had collapsed because of a heart ailment, for which she had been receiving treatment, but when a report of her death was received by police, they insisted that an autopsy be performed.

Chief Louwers assigned the fact-gathering details to Police Lt. Stanley Enders, who was also handling the cause of the accident. He returned the findings of the autopsy, which disclosed that Mrs. Costa had not died of a heart attack, as first supposed, but of a crushed chest, a direct result of the accident.

The woman's son was given a violations ticket at the time of the accident, but when the results of the autopsy showed the actual cause of his mother's death, police requested a negligent homicide warrant against him from the Prosecutor's office.

The warrant is being taken under advisement.



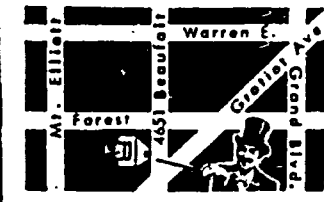

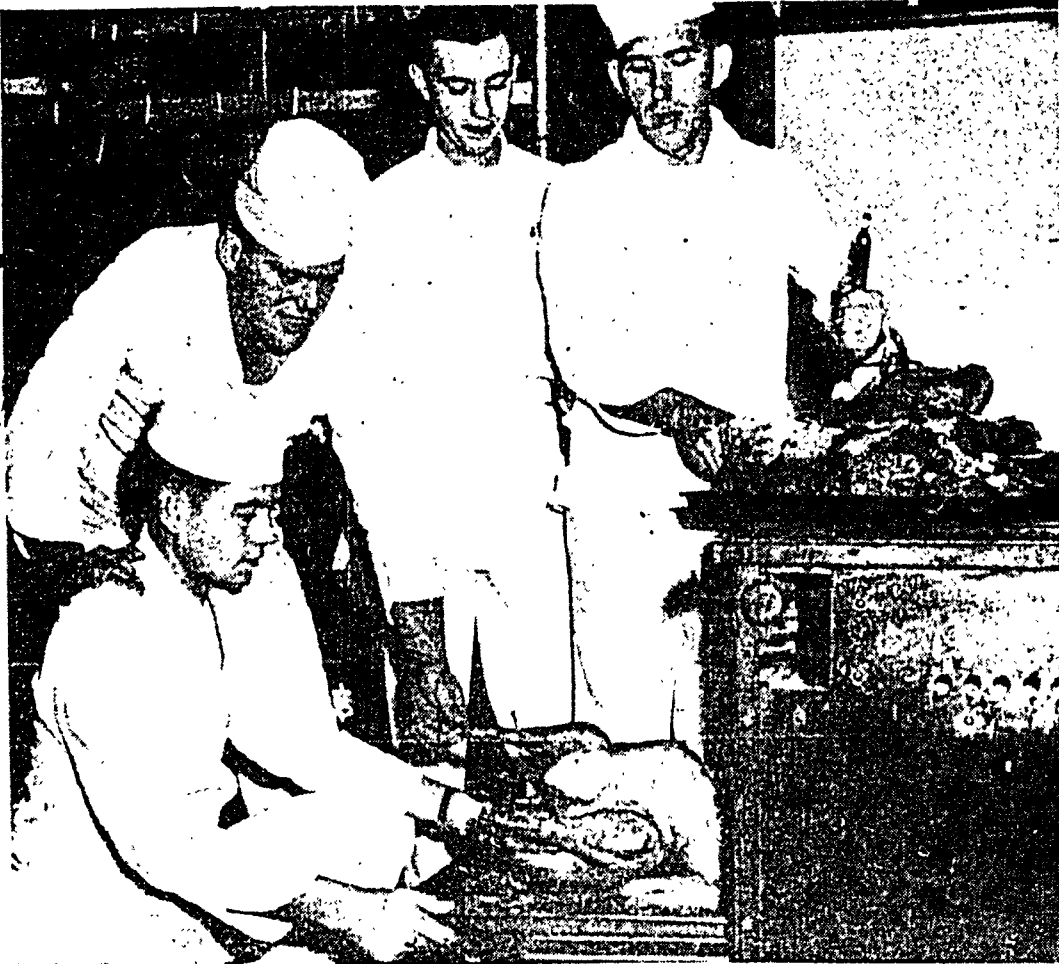

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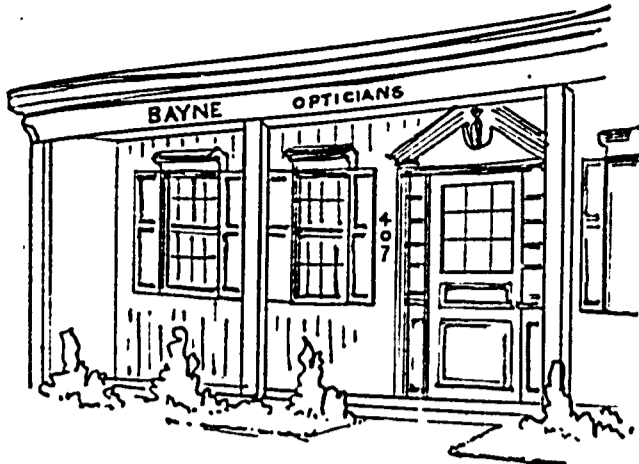

Museum Holds Toy-Doll Show

The Henry Ford Museum's third annual toy and doll show opened Saturday November 21, with "Christmas in Many Lands" as its theme.

Divided into seven sections, the exhibition illustrates the playthings of children, mainly with dolls, in the United States, Germany, France, Italy, England, the Scandinavian countries, and the Orient.

Largest section is the American which has as its focal point a miniature Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, authentically created by Jean LeRoy, former circus clown and now a miniature set-builder for the Jam Handy Organization. The diminutive circus is being shown in its entirety to the public for the first time.

Every circus wagon, cook and side show tent, "big top", and even the tepees which went with Buffalo Bill's original show have been reconstructed in miniature by LeRoy. The circus covers 335 square feet of table space.

Flanking the Wild West Show are more than 100 American Indian dolls representing typical chiefs and squaws of 50 tribes.

Also included in the American section are many products of the famous nineteenth century American

toymaker, Milton Bradley, from Springfield, Mass.; one of the first American china-headed dolls; a rare, century-old rubber doll; and early folk toys carved by fathers for their sons.

Because of its reputation as the manufacturer of the world's most out-standing toys and dolls, Germany is the next largest section represented. Included are specimens of wood-carved toys from the Black Forest region and Oberammergau, portrait dolls with porcelain heads copied after Dolly Madison and Jenny Lind, and one doll copied from a Currier & Ives print. One of the most unusual dolls is a Kathie Kruse baby doll with a "worried look" on its face. It was made during World War II and an over-sensitive Nazi government closed the Kruse factories be-

cause of the expressions on the dolls' faces.

Several French fashion dolls of the nineteenth century were not used as playthings, but demonstrated fashions in dress and hairstyles before the use of engravings. Two Juneau mechanical dolls have built-in music boxes and perform such simple mechanical actions as dancing and pouring tea.

In the Italian section, there are rare eighteenth century wooden handcarved creche figures, a number of modern Lenci dolls made of compressed felt, and several carved toys and pieces of hand-decorated miniature furniture.

One of the outstanding dolls in the English case is an exact copy of Queen Elizabeth II, made in limited editions, complete in coronation robe and crown and holding the traditional scepter and orb.

Another rare object is an

eighteenth century Queen Anne doll which won first prize at the 1952 National Doll Convention in Chicago. Miniature Staffordshire tea sets from the first half of the nineteenth century and cabinet makers' model furniture in Sheraton, Hepplewhite

and Chippendale style complete the English section.

The Oriental display includes modern Japanese Festival dolls, a handcarved wooden temple, miniature lacquered furniture and a wooden rickshaw from the Chinese National Museum.

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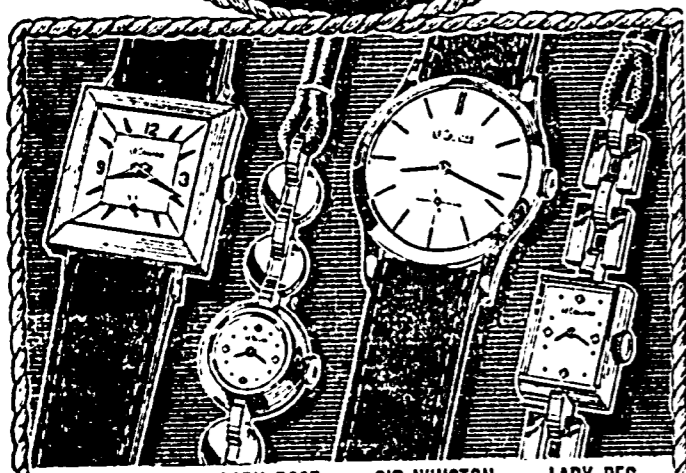
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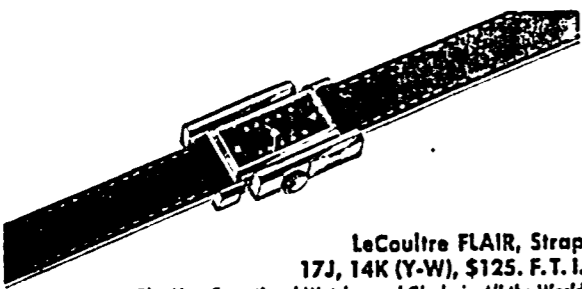
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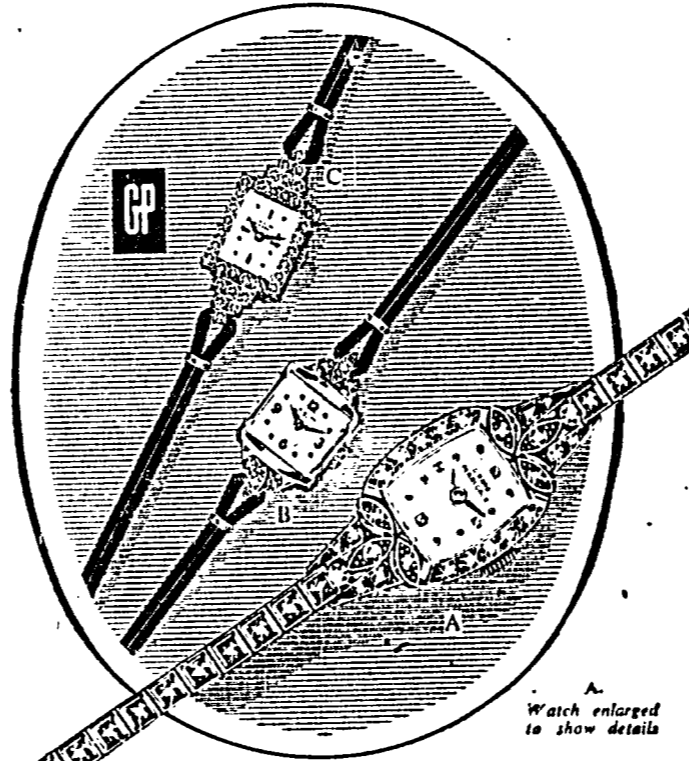
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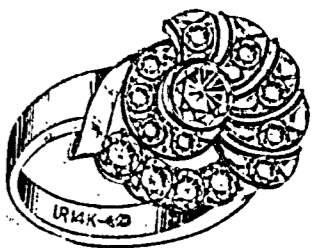
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Obituaries

Drinking Drivers Warned by Police

The Chiefs of Police have announced that the police departments of Grosse Pointe are cooperating with the Michigan Liquor Control Commission and the State Safety Commission on the December state-wide emphasis program aimed at reducing accidents due to drunk driving.

According to the Police the drunk driver is one of the worst menaces to traffic safety. Not only does he cause many accidents and injure and kill numerous people but his intoxicated condition places him beyond any public sympathy. The Legislature felt so strong about the motorist who gets drunk and drives that it passed a law providing for a mandatory suspension of the driver's license for 90 days. Many judges believe the crime of drunk driving so serious that they impose jail sentences.

To acquaint the public with this program 15,000 posters and 300,000 table tents will be used. The posters read, "Drunk Drivers Go To Jail" and the table tents read, "If you are driving TAKE IT EASY—Don't lose

Your driver's license." The seriousness of the drunk driving problem is shown by the following figures from the National Safety Council: "In 23 out of 100 fatal accidents a driver or a pedestrian had been drinking."

—among drivers involved in fatal accidents for whom condition was reported 18 out of 100 had been drinking. —among adult pedestrians involved in fatal accidents, 26 out of 100 had been drinking."

In conclusion the Police called upon all motorists to co-operate on the December traffic safety program. "As the holiday season approaches it is a good time to remember that driving an automobile safely requires the best mental and physical resources of the driver. 

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News Gathered from the Pointe's Elementary Schools

MASON SCHOOL
Last week was American Education Week throughout the country. Thousands of parents observed in the nation's classrooms and saw, perhaps, a small part of the intricate process by which the strange black symbols on paper begin to have a meaning for the six-year-old as he learns to read.

Other parents watched boys and girls as they became acquainted with strange and interesting customs and people from all over the world, only to find that these people are our world neighbors, or are even Americans.

At Mason about 350 parents attended classrooms. Some teachers taught parents for reading, spelling or arithmetic classes. Other teachers informed parents of the schedule and parents were able to select the lessons they wished to see.

Some parents attended music, physical education classes taught by the counselors and social teachers in these fields. Some class parents joined the spectators of an exciting basketball game in the gym.

During the week Miss Ethel M. Tucker, principal, held separate meetings with parents from each of the four kindergartens. The purpose of this meeting was to explain the method of reporting parents the progress of kindergarten children and to answer parents' questions.

Following the meeting with Tucker, parents went to the kindergarten rooms where the teacher discussed with parents in which closer cooperation might be achieved between kindergarten and the home.

Recently the results of the P.T.A. membership drive at Mason School were announced. Two classes having the highest percentage of P.T.A. members were Miss Clara Gustafson's class and Miss Jane E. Gullett's class.

One afternoon the boys and girls of these two classes received a treat of orange soda and potato chips for winning the contest. Miss Eugene Most is the mem-

bership chairman of Mason P.T.A. and the membership for 1953-54 totals 717. This exceeds the membership for any other year.

POUPARD SCHOOL
November 16-20 the Poupard School observed Book Week. It has been 37 years since Book Week was established.

During the year 1915 the late Franklin K. Mathews, then Chief Librarian for the Boy Scouts of America, initiated the idea which was to become the first of many special weeks which are scheduled on our calendar today. Mr. Mathews traveled about to discover what children were reading and where they obtained their reading materials. He found that both quantity and quality of reading materials for children were very limited and meager. He was determined to do his best to improve all reading materials for children.

Many outstanding people in the field of children's literature and many groups of people interested in the writing of children's books and their distribution quickly joined Mr. Mathews in his enthusiasm. Consequently, as the years have passed, many groups have worked to improve all books for children. Book Week therefore is a symbol to the world that this work is progressing.

The Poupard School library is a very important part of the whole school program. Many children develop a desire for reading through the stimulation of library books. Some children will gain an insight into new areas of thinking and some will be able to satisfy their individual tastes and preferences. Mrs. Elizabeth Kenny, our school librarian, has about 600 books in circulation within the school and new books are added each year.

There are two outstanding awards given to children's books. The Newbery Medal is awarded to the person residing in the United States who has made the most outstanding contribution to children's literature. The Caldecott Medal is awarded to the most distinguished American pic-

ture book for children. We are happy to tell you that we have most of these books on our shelves and when our present order is completed we will have all of the award winning books.

The current award books are: Newbery Medal 1953, Secret of the Andes by Ann Clark, Caldecott Medal 1953, The Biggest Bear by Lynn Ward. Annual Children's Book Award of the Child Study Association of America 1953, Twenty and Ten by Claire Huchet Bishop.

We have many new library books which have been selected from suggested book lists. During Book Week these books will be taken to each room so that the children may have a chance to become acquainted with them. Teachers are making special efforts to read new and good stories to children and acquaint them with old familiar friends in this book world.

Class periods have been set aside for the children to read library books and make reports to their classmates. Some of our children will be asked to visit other classes and read stories to smaller children. They will also be asked to help with the distribution of books among the rooms.

Plans have been made to have story dolls in our show cases. The dolls were loaned to us by Janet Soderstrom, second grade pupil. These showcases will help to acquaint the children with characters they have met previously in stories.

Also, films, film-strips, and recordings are being used during Book Week at Poupard School to stimulate interest in books and to give information as to the correct care of books. We urge you as parents to enjoy good books with your children. Read together, visit our many libraries, and help your child to build a library of his own by buying him books for gifts.

Within the last month the third grades at Poupard School have visited the Detroit Historical Museum and the main Public Library and the sixth grade attended a concert at the Masonic Temple. These are just two examples of the trips that are taken during the year to extend the school experience of the children, enhance the learning processes, and to take advantage of the many resources of the metropolitan area.

Careful plans are always made of the supervision of children whether it be a short walking excursion to the public library or one that takes most of the day. For trips that require transportation, buses are chartered and the Board of Education pays the major cost. Room parents very frequently assist the teachers on the trips. Prior to the trip children are prepared to get as much as possible from their observation. This may involve discussion, showing of a film or filmstrip related to the place they are going to visit, reading, and developing a list of questions they would like to have answered.

After the trip group discussion and evaluation of their visit takes place. One of the third graders, Barbara Driscoll, wrote this description of the trip the third grade took to the Historical Museum.

"The Museum—I liked the old fashioned house with the old stove and also the old fashioned store of clothes. I liked the old fire engine with the big wheels I liked the cars and especially the two wheeled car. I liked the house with the washing machine and the old bed. I also liked the general store with the music box."
