parking, he brought out that the Neighborhood Club has consented to permit parking on its property north of Kercheval, bounded by Neff and St. Clair and Kercheval and Waterloo, and this will probably terminate when the Christmas rush has passed.

He also stated that 48 meters will be installed in the parking lot north of the public alley, adjacent to the Mair School, which was formerly used by employes and employees. The lot is too valuable to be used for all day parking, he said, by other than customers of Kercheval business.

To Ban All-Day Parking

No all-day parking will be permitted north of Kercheval, between Notre Dame and Cadieux north of and adjacent to the alley. However, through the courtesy of the Silloway company, a vacant lot east of Cadieux, will be used for temporary parking, and will have space enough for 40 or 50 cars.

Capt. Graul, who will receive \$5,316 a year, is married and the father of five children. He lives at 1365 Lakepointe and has been with the fire department for 25 years.

Mr. DeClerk, who lives at 1334 Beaconsfield, will receive \$5,064 a year. He is married, but has no children. He is a veteran of 25 years in the department.

Dental Education Program Launched by Health Council

Under the direction of Mrs. J. Cullen Kennedy of St. Clair avenue, the Mothers' Health Education Council, Inc., is again conducting a community-wide dental health education program in the elementary and junior high schools. This includes all public, private and parochial schools of the Grosse Pointe communities.

The program is being conducted under the supervision of local dentists and meets with the full approval of the Detroit District Dental Society, the Eastern Dental Club of Detroit, the local and state health departments and the Grosse Pointe Board of Education.

As a part of this program the sodium fluoride treatment for the prevention of tooth decay will be administered to any child enrolled in grades two, five and eight, whose parents desire such treatment, for a small fee.

The treatments are given in the schools and consist of cleaning the teeth and making four applications of sodium fluoride. It is generally agreed that it does not prevent all tooth decay, but studies show that when properly applied, as much as 40 percent at Maire schools. It is to date 47 percent have been treated at Mason, 45 percent at Vernier, 52 percent at Defer, 60 percent at Christian Day, and 34 percent at Maire schools. It is the goal of this group to make it closer to 100 percent in all schools.

Gift Book Honors John D. Snowday

Grosse Pointe High School's Library has been presented with a book that is in the limelight, with all the publicity concerning brain-washing. The author, Edward Hunter, had more than 14-years experience as a roving correspondent in the Far East and Southeast Asia, before he wrote, "Brain-Washing in Red China".

Hunter was in the Pointe last Armistice Night, November 11, and at that time spoke before the Frederick M. Alger Post of the American Legion. It was then that Terry Snowday, commander of the post met Hunter.

The author learned of the death of Snowday's son, John D., who was killed April 13, 1945, at the Sieg river in Germany. John was a combat engineer with the U.S. Army. He was graduated from Grosse Pointe High School.

Following his talk to the Legionnaires, Hunter presented an autographed copy of his book to Snowday, and another copy to the library in memory of his son.

Leaves \$50,000 To Loyal Helper

He said that for the present, the smaller rink calls for use only by the younger children of the City.

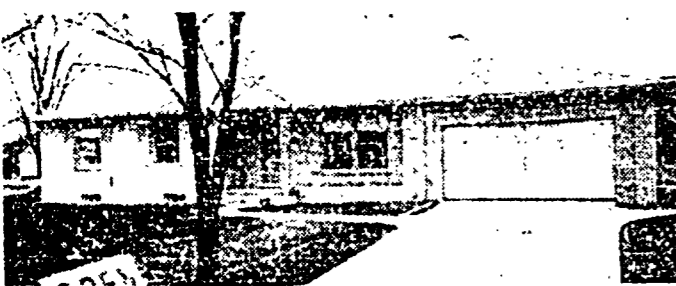
Fuller details will be given out later, when everything has been completed, Mr. Neff said.

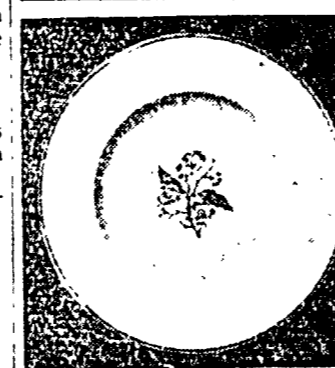

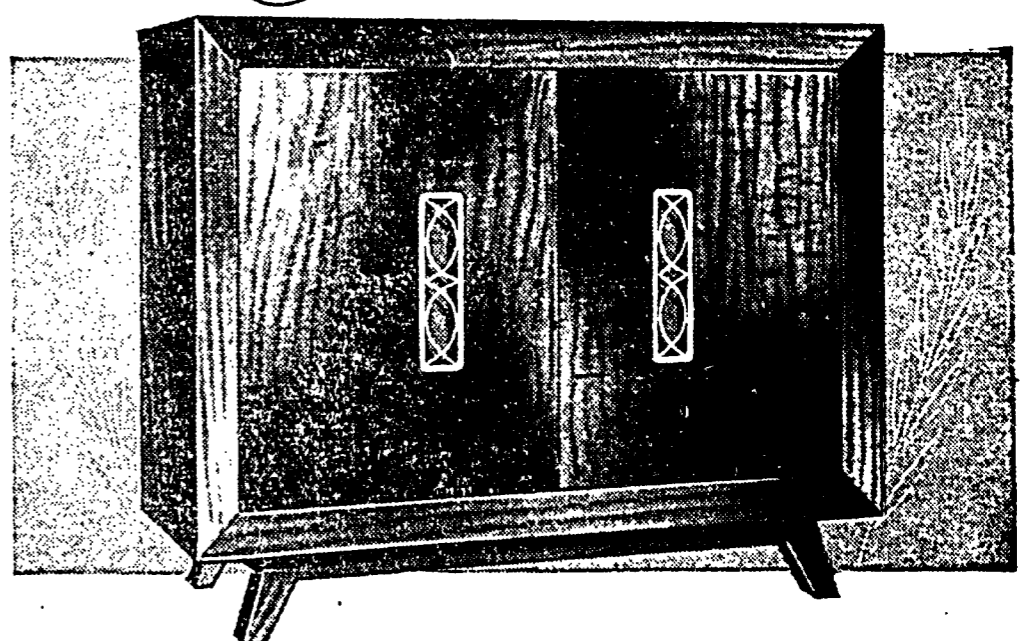

William J. Barbour Honored at Banquet

Over Hundred Staff Members and Trustees of Grace Hospital Attend Testimonial Banquet at D.A.C. Honoring Pointer For 50 Years Service to Organization

William T. Barbour, of Old Brook lane, president of the Board of Trustees of the Grace Hospital, was honored for his 50 years of service to that institution at a banquet at the Detroit Athletic Club on Nov. 17.

More than 100 hospital staff members and trustees attended the dinner for the man who has been active in the development of the Grace Hospital founded in 1888 on what was then the outskirts of Detroit.

Mr. Barbour became a trustee in 1903 and has been president since 1918. During his time of service, the hospital was enlarged in 1910, 1920 and 1930, and there was the realization of a Northwestern branch in 1942 and further 1952 expansion, all capacity from 100 to 514 beds.

At the appreciation banquet, Dr. Milton A. Darling, chief of staff, presented Mr. Barbour with a gold key, symbolical of his service, and a book with the signatures of the trustees, staff members and all the employees of the hospital.

In response, Mr. Barbour traced something of the Grace Hospital's history.

One of his first concerns, as shown in the 1903 board minutes, was the selection of a good horse to draw the ambulance.

At that time, it was common practice for spectators at the scene of accidents to call ambulances from both Grace and Harper Hospitals for the sake of seeing the "horse race" between the rival vehicles.

In 1910, Mr. Barbour made a motion that a telephone be installed in the hospital for a three-month trial period.

Also, during the First World War, he devoted time each day to helping Dr. Edmund Collins, acting superintendent, with managerial duties.

Dr. Warren E. Babcock, the superintendent, was in service at the time.

Proudest Grace Hospital achievement, Mr. Barbour believes, has been the training of 5,000 interns, residents, nurses, anesthetists, laboratory and X-ray technicians.

Dr. Charles S. Kennedy was master of ceremonies at the appreciation banquet which was given by Grace Hospital's attending medical staff.

Dr. Kenneth B. Babcock, director of the hospital, expressed the thanks of the staff and employees.

Edgar A. Guest read a poem he had written especially for the occasion.

Dr. Howard T. Howlett was chairman of the banquet committee.

The Shores police with "Radar" are directing their activity to Lake Shore Drive where above limit speed has been the direct cause of several fatal accidents.

The Woods police attribute a general reduction in speed to the use of the electrical speed controls in their city.

The chiefs of the police departments impress collectively this thought "The motorist must realize that our cities are primarily residential—that speeding automobiles do not contribute to the longevity of a child's life. We request your cooperation—don't speed. Remember the police and the courts do not want your money. Save that speed—Save your money and maybe your life or that of a little child."

**League of Women Voters Hears
Probation Officer for Juveniles**

"Children with a problem, not problem children are the ones we deal with," said Arthur M. Ruhl, probation officer for the juvenile division of the Probate Court, in an address to the Grosse Pointe League of Women Voters last Friday. In the newly created Intake Department of the Juvenile Division, Mr. Ruhl deals with the "causal and curative" aspects of juvenile delinquency. The idea of therapy for the child in detention is in opposition to the old theory that detention in itself was the cure. "The single causative factor in juvenile delinquency is the home," according to Mr. Ruhl. However, he believes that outside environment and associations also contribute to the development of the individual, and therefore must share the responsibility. Ending on a hopeful note, Mr. Ruhl quoted three factors which can prevent delinquency: a religious faith, a mission in life, and self respect. Members of the League of Women Voters will continue study of juvenile court procedures when they visit Probate Court in March. Mrs. Clarence Koebbe, of Pemberton road, is in charge of this study program.

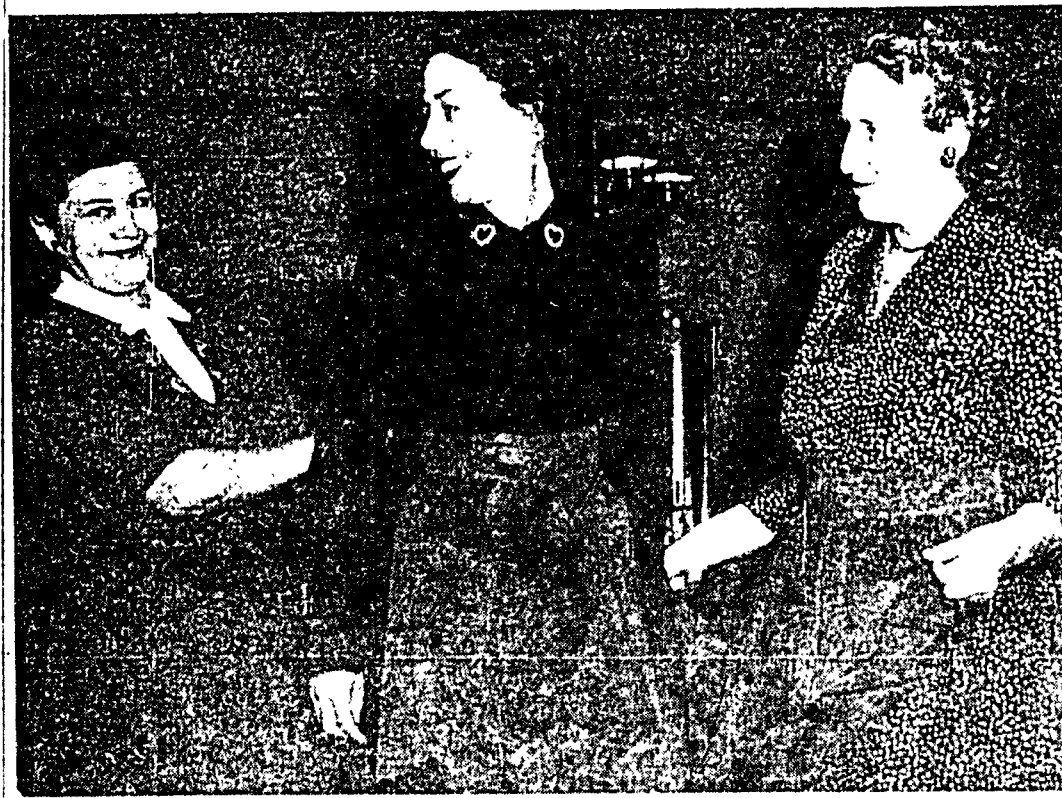

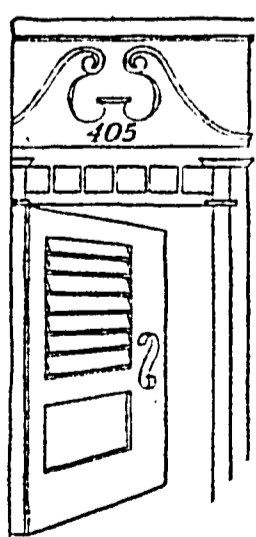

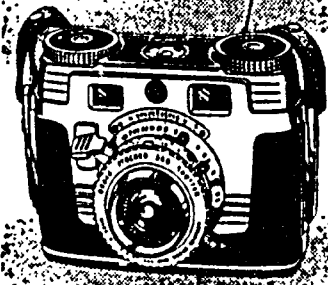

Jenny Lind Club Members Set For Annual Christmas Party

The annual Christmas party of the Jenny Lind Club of Detroit will be held as usual at the Stockholm Restaurant on December 12, at 6:30 p.m. The second floor will be converted into an authentic Swedish festival scene.

At Christmastime in Sweden one will find the orchestra at dances, playing gay music from a gaily colored bandstand ("dansbana"). This year the club members and their guests will think they are really in the Old Country, for at the party they will see the musicians playing on a Swedish-designed bandstand.

The raised stand is painted a gay Christmas red. There are six poles around the stand which are looped with streamers in green and red. Greens are laid around the stand and cover the poles.

It is the custom of the Swedish to then form a circle by joining hands and dance around the stand. This is called the "Longdancers" at Christmastime. A Swedish flag will be used as a background.

More interesting decorations will be in store for the evening. Sweden's emblem of "Three Crowns" will be featured. Each table will have two authentic replicas of the national emblem. The crowns are gold upon a royal blue background, with a gold stripe encircling the crowns.

In 1397, Sweden negotiated a famous treaty by which Sweden joined. Denmark and Norway in a formal union. They had the "Three Crowns" as their national insignia, one crown standing for

each country. But, as various rebellions and wars followed during the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries, Sweden eventually emerged as a national state and she kept the three crowns as the national emblem.

Then, of course, there will be the appearance of "Lucia", who ushers in the "Little Christmas" or "Luciafest" which begins on December 13. She is also the symbol of light, heralding the coming light to the North. She is traditionally dressed in a long white robe with a crown of burning candles and greens on her head.

She carries a tray of coffee, Christmas ginger snaps and spritz (a shortbread) which she serves to everyone. This year she will be accompanied by two attendants—the "Star Girls" who carry wands with stars on the ends. For the Swedish people Christmas is not really Christmas unless Lucia appears.

This year Lucia is represented by Mimi Baer and the Star Girls will be Karen Rahm and Kiki Baer.

The colorful decorations have been entirely in the hands of Mrs. Henry Klein, Jr., chairman of the party, who is responsible not only for the ideas but also for their execution. She has been assisted by Mrs. Charles Koebel and Mrs. Ralph Lagerfeldt.

The other male school crossing guard is Carl Buchbinder of 1436 Lakepointe.

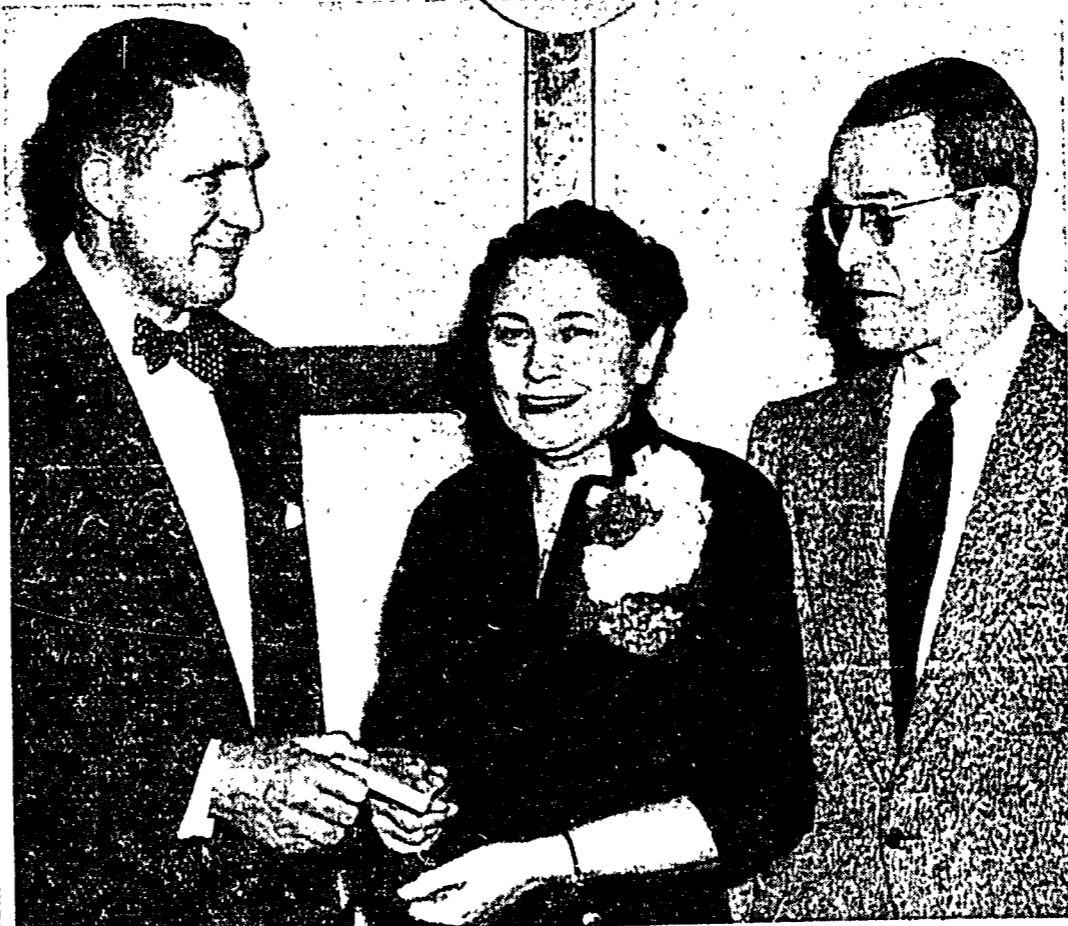





The members of the service organization have always received the complete cooperation of all the Pointe policemen and firemen. Again this year, they will be standing on the street corners, asking all passers-by to help them carry out their humanitarian program.

Derive great satisfaction from the knowledge that every penny you give will be used to keep smiles on the faces of children who might otherwise be disillusioned without your help, or to provide some necessity for someone less fortunate than are we.

Share Your Christmas Joy

Pointers are responding to the suggestion that they avail themselves of the opportunity to share in making Christmas Day a happy one for the soldiers stationed in the two Anti-Aircraft Artillery camps in the Pointe, and for the underprivileged children who will be their dinner guests.

It was learned last week that the soldiers had invited 30 youngsters from the Detroit Emergency Shelter on Scotten to share their Christmas dinner with them. The soldiers plan to dig into their own pockets to supplement the standard GI rations supplied by the government, to insure a merry party for the kids.

When Col. Walter Allard, head of the Veterans' Committee of the War Memorial Center, and a director of Alger Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, heard of these plans, he conceived the idea of helping the soldiers make the party a success. He thought Pointe residents might want to participate to the extent of donating gifts which the servicemen could pass on to the youngsters.

The NEWS supplemented Colonel Allard's idea editorially last week by suggesting that it would be even better if the residents donated enough to insure that both kids and soldiers received gifts from the community.

Colonel Allard is acting as a clearing agent for any gifts received. He can be contacted at Monday Cleaners, 375 Fisher road, TUxedo 5-4800. He reports that he is turning over the cash received to Lieut. Donald Ellis, commander of B Battery, located at the foot of Three Mile drive.

Lieutenant Ellis and Lieut. Harold Dodge, commander of B Battery, located in Chalfonte road near Lothrop, will see that the money received is divided between the two camps and spent for things which the children and soldiers would most want.

A pool taken among the soldiers to determine what they would like to receive, discloses their wants are very modest. They list such items as sewing kits, pen and pencil sets, stationery, shaving kits, playing cards, cigars, handkerchiefs and civilian ties and socks. (They are allowed to get out of uniform when they leave their posts.)

Colonel Allard reports that all of the local service clubs, Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions and Optimists, have indicated they will make cash contributions to the party. The women's auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Alger Post, is also participating.

Women's church groups are taking up the idea and many women have called in, indicating their wish to both give presents and help out in any other way, such as going to the camps to decorate the mess halls and day rooms for the party.

Ages of the children to be entertained range from 8 to 12 years.

The soldiers, through their officers, have expressed their gratitude for the thoughts in their behalf. To develop the idea into a successful reality will require the enthusiastic cooperation of the residents.

In the midst of our rushing to prepare for a merry Christmas in our homes with our own families, let's give a thought to these soldiers and underprivileged kids who will spend the holiday in an army camp. We can do much to brighten the occasion for them, and bring added joy to ourselves through such an expression of the Christmas spirit.

What Goes On at Your Library

If you would keep abreast of business trends, George F. Jones of the Central Library staff suggests various books, periodicals and services available at your library.

Andrew Carnegie, a notable saver if ever there was one, is often quoted as saying "It is not what you earn but what you save that counts." To make this saving truly count, and thus reach fulfillment of the maxim that "It is better to have a hen tomorrow than an egg today," poses the question of how to employ the consumption deferred.

The problem facing the present day saver is not solely that of how to try for an egg-producing machine. The prudent investor must also try to guard against today's egg being something less than a whole egg come the time of future consumption. The handling of savings so as to yield not only an annual return but also to grow with America, requires both skill and knowledge. The means of acquiring some of the necessary knowledge is provided by the business services to which the library subscribes.

The most comprehensive of these are the Moody Reports, of which a complete series is available for reference use in the Central Library. Moody's annual volumes, supplemented by semi-weekly reports, cover the entire range of investment fields—Industrial, Transportation, Banks and Finance, Public Utilities, and Governments.

The annual volumes give for each company listed a short history of the firm, a description of the nature of its business, names of its officers, and as much financial information as is publicly available. Sales and earnings figures for some years back are generally given, thus permitting a study of the sales and profit trend of the company.

The semi-weekly supplements serve to bring the materials in the annual volumes up to date by publishing notes of significant developments as they occur. A check of the annual volume plus the semi-weekly supplements can thus give a reasonably complete picture of any contemplated investment.

Each annual volume also contains in a special insert statistics of value to anyone studying market changes. In compact form are given the annual high and low prices over a ten year period for the marketed securities of the principal American corporations. By using this summary, the investor can save much time otherwise consumed in the compilation of such price range figures for himself.

Also included in the special insert are summaries of the major industries of the country over a ten year period; by a comparison of the all-industry trend with the performance of a specific corporate unit of the industry, it is possible for the investor to form his own assessment of the extent to which the particular unit has maintained its place in the industry.

Moody's Governments, being concerned with the securities of non-profit agencies, emphasizes safety rather than profit possibilities. To assist the investor, many of the government bonds described therein are rated—from a gilt-edged A to a C signalling Caveat emptor. In its analysis of the structure behind each issue, a good deal of valuable information on the finances of cities, states, and municipalities is given.

Readers who would like to inform themselves on any investments—present or contemplated—are invited to consult Moody's and the other business information materials which the library offers.

**Christmas Tree
Centuries Old**

The origin of the use of the tree is quite obscure, due to the fact it dates back to antiquity. The Egyptians used branches of palms, bearing 12 leaves representing the completion of the year, during their Solstice festivals, falling of course about December 22.

The Romans during their Saturnalian celebrations used evergreen boughs.

The custom of the fir for Christmas is of Teutonic origin. According to an old German legend, a wood cutter and his family one bleak winter night were sitting close to their fireplace when a knock came upon the door. Answering the door, the wood cutter was surprised to find a child, shivering with the cold, tired and hungry.

The cutter received him and decided to lodge him for the night. The wife gave the boy warm milk and food. The peasant's son gave up his bed for the visitor to rest himself, and he in turn slept on the floor.

At day break, celestial music and singing enveloped the tiny cottage. The woodsman arose and in amazement looked upon his visitor, his face dazzling with brightness. It was the Christ Child Himself.

Leaving the peasants home, he broke a bough from a nearby fir tree and planted it in the soil, telling the peasant that for his kindness the tree would bring him abundance in the depths of winter.

In Germany, the fir is usually illuminated and placed in the window, tinsel and the like are sometimes added. Trees are usually erected in the streets and squares, much as is the custom borrowed by our country.

The beautiful custom of the use of cut evergreen trees, boughs and holly is so full of lovely tradition and religious significance, it is no wonder that its use has endured through the ages.

Give Self Gift, Police Advice

The Chiefs of Police of Grosse Pointe have come up with an idea for late Christmas shoppers. "While you're at it," they said, "buy yourself a present. And the best present you can buy yourself, your family, and the police department, is a thorough winter safety job for your automobile."

The chiefs said they meant particularly that the car should be checked for vision and traction. That means windshield wipers—blades and motors; defrosters; all lights, and rear view mirrors. "You can't possibly drive safely unless you can see," they added logically.

As for traction, cars lose traction dangerously on snow and ice. He noted that tire chains are recommended by the National Safety Council for ice and snow conditions, because Council tests have shown that at a speed of 20 miles an hour on hard packed snow, reinforced tire chains will stop a car in about 40 feet, compared with about 70 feet for conventional synthetic rubber tires, and 82 feet if you have natural rubber. On glare ice, the need for reinforced type of tire chains is even greater because average skidding distances are reduced from about 200 feet to about 77 feet.

Russia agreeing to a Big Four ministers' conference in Berlin. Premier Laniel, in Bernada for their meeting, discussed a surprise note sent by Russia, accepting a repeated western proposal.

for a meeting of the four big powers.

The western powers were in accord in their agreement that if they presented a united front and stood firm on the plans to build Europe's defenses, Russia would be powerless to interfere.

Sunday, December 6
DEATH AND DESTRUCTION followed in the wake of tornadoes which cut a wide swath through Mississippi, Louisiana and Arkansas, the worst reported to have struck downtown Vicksburg, Miss.

In that community, a theater was demolished with 73 persons inside, 34 of whom were children. A downtown hardware store which held 12 persons, was flattened. Six people were killed in that area.

Another tornado struck at Montrose, Ark.; a third blasted the communities of Ouachita City, Rock Branch and Spencer

in Northern Louisiana. No deaths were reported.

Monday, December 7
PRESIDENT EISENHOWER, after conferring with Prime Minister Churchill of England and French Premier Laniel in Bernada, announced he will make a long awaited report to the UN Assembly, regarding what the Russian development of the hydrogen and atomic bombs can mean to the West.

He decided to inform the closing session of the Assembly "Of the perils confronting the world in this atomic age." He was invited to make the speech by UN Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold. The speech, which is considered to be one of his most important, took on an added significance as the Big Three agreed to meet with Russia in Berlin, soon.

THE TORNADO DEATH TOLL in Vicksburg, Miss., rose to 28, with 230 persons reported in-

jured. Damage created by the twister was estimated to be about \$25,000,000. Red Cross workers stated 937 buildings were destroyed or damaged and 1,500 persons were left homeless. President Eisenhower, answering the pleas of Gov. Hugh White of Mississippi, and Harry E. Brown of Atlanta, Regional Administrator of the Federal Civil Defense Administration, declared Vicksburg a major disaster area, thereby clearing the way for Federal assistance.

Tuesday, December 8
A HIGH DIPLOMATIC SOURCE stated that President Eisenhower's speech to the United Nations Assembly, was the most important pronouncement on the atomic problem to be made to the UN in years. In a manner of speaking, President Eisenhower's acceptance of an invitation from UN Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold was considered unprecedented. Usually when a chief of a nation is asked to speak, it is after the opening of a session or under arrangements made far in advance. The President presented his address at the 11th hour, just as the Assembly prepared to wind up its eighth session.

Wednesday, December 9
ATT. GEN. MILLARD accused Wayne Prosecutor O'Brien of hampering the State's investigation of Hamtramck's affairs. He tossed a monkey-wrench into O'Brien's plan for a grand jury to probe gambling and vice in the county, by handing Executive Judge Ira W. Jayne a letter criticizing O'Brien's action.

The letter stated that because he had prematurely released publicity for a petition, O'Brien hampered the investigation which was to have been conducted by the State office.

A YOUNG GERMAN MOTHER was found guilty of spying for Communist Czechoslovakia and was sentenced to four years in prison by an American court in Nuenberg, Germany. She told the court she was forced to spy because the Czechs threatened to take her baby away.

The verdict was announced by Judge Carl A. Turmo of Stoughton, Wis., who said the woman devoted much energy and time to lure American soldiers into her net.

A WEEPING, masked witness told the House Investigating

Committee how Red soldiers massacred 500 Lithuanian men, women and children in a prison camp in June 1941. He said that four of the people killed were naturalized American citizens.

The massacre took place at the prison camp of Pravieniskis. Lithuania had been overrun by Russians some months earlier. The Reds struck without warning, by pouring machine gun bullets into the prison camp from a nearby woods.
