and ran to the rear of his car and raised the trunk.

Tussett said that the next thing he knew, the older man was on the curb side of the car and then more heated words followed. He said that as he stepped out of his car, he was struck on the left side of the head with the hammer.

Tussett claimed that he only raised his hands to protect himself. He said that he suggested, after he was hit, that Vandembrouche put down the hammer and fight like a man.

Both battlers then decided to call police.

When the authorities arrived, Tussett was taken to Bon Secours Hospital for his head injury. His assailant stated he did not know what made him hit his opponent with the hammer.

Conducting an investigation into the matter, Park Det. Lt. Arnold Hough went to the hospital to question the injured man, but on arrival was informed that the man had left, insisting that he wanted to be treated by his family physician.

Hospital officials informed the police officer that x-rays revealed that Tussett's skull had been fractured by the hammer blow.

Park Police Chief Arthur Louwers stated that a felonious assault warrant against Vandembrouche depends on whether Tussett wishes to prosecute, and at present this decision is pending.

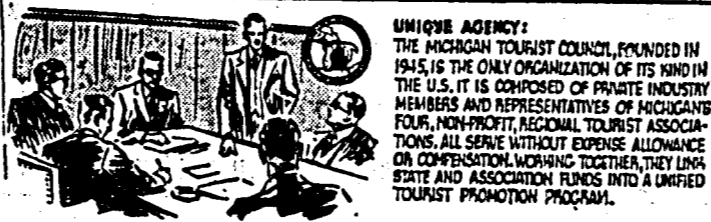

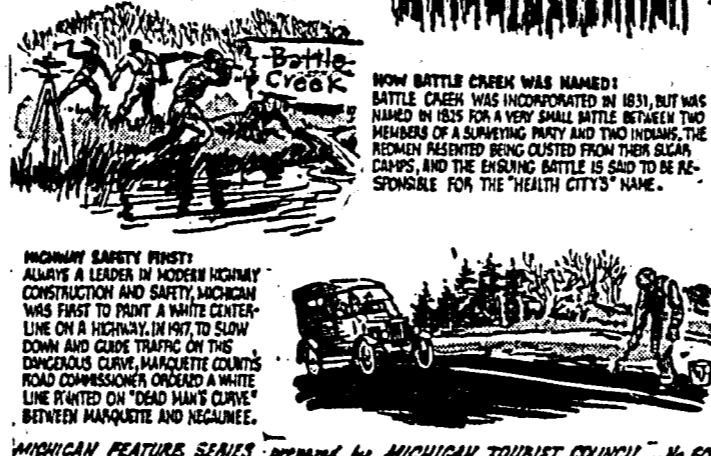

Drivers Warned By Police Chiefs

The Chiefs of Police of Grosse Pointe have made a second appeal to motorists to co-operate on the June-July program aimed at cutting down traffic accidents due to dangerous passing.

They warned motorists to be particularly careful not to exceed the speed limit when passing, "because one driver got up to too high a speed in trying to pass another. The result was that when an emergency developed he was going too fast to stop in time to avoid the accident."

The Chief also cautioned motorists about passing at intersections. "A common dangerous situation arises, they said, "when the car you are passing stops suddenly to let a car or a pedestrian on its right pass in front of it. You may not be able to see this coming because the car you are passing blocks your vision. Thus, you may have a car or pedestrian dropped right in your lap—when it's too late to stop."

In conclusion the Chief pointed out that this concerted drive against dangerous passing is not just a local affair. It is sponsored by chiefs of police throughout Michigan through the Association of Chiefs of Police. It has the cooperation of the Michigan Trucking Association and the Michigan State Safety Commission.

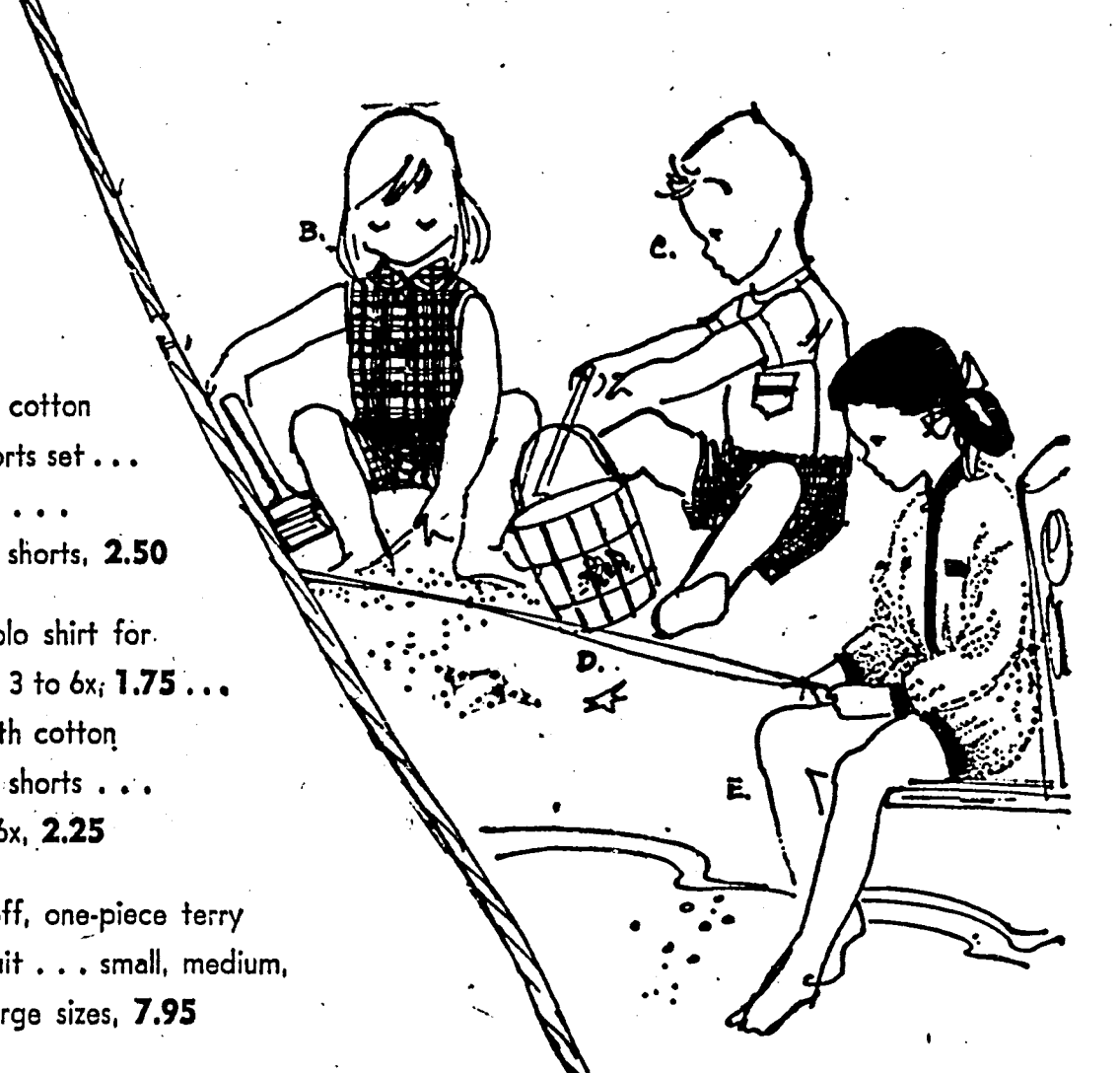
She carried a bouquet of pink sweetheart roses with stephanotis and ivy.

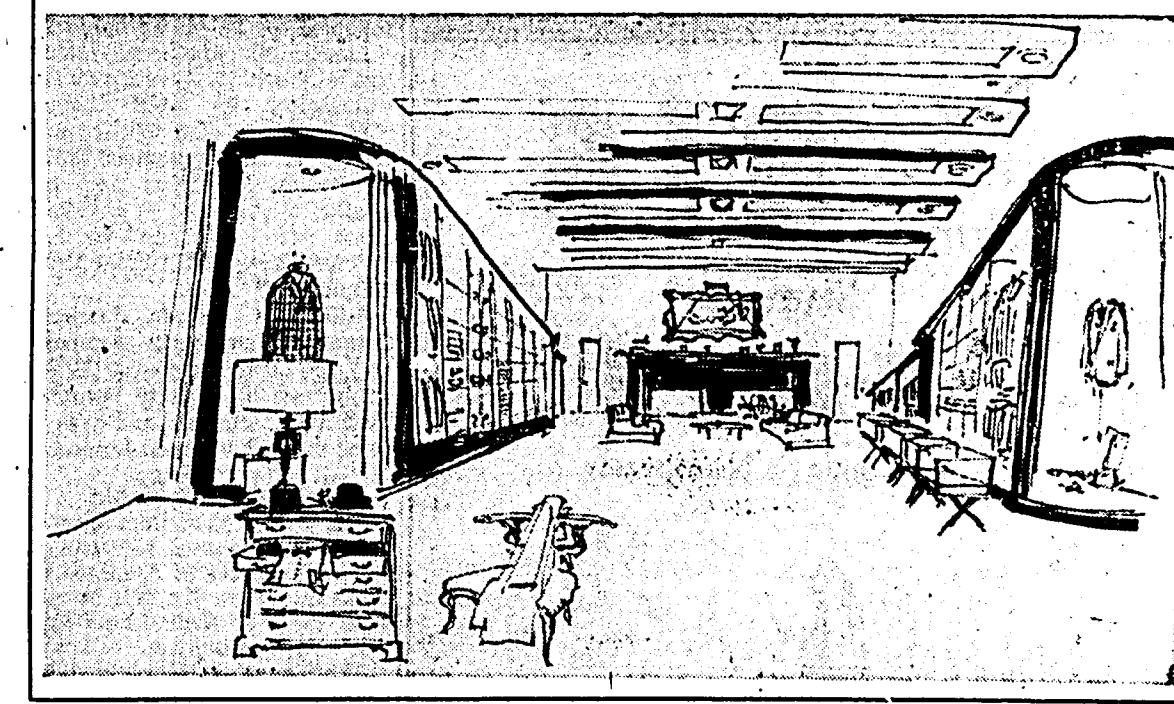

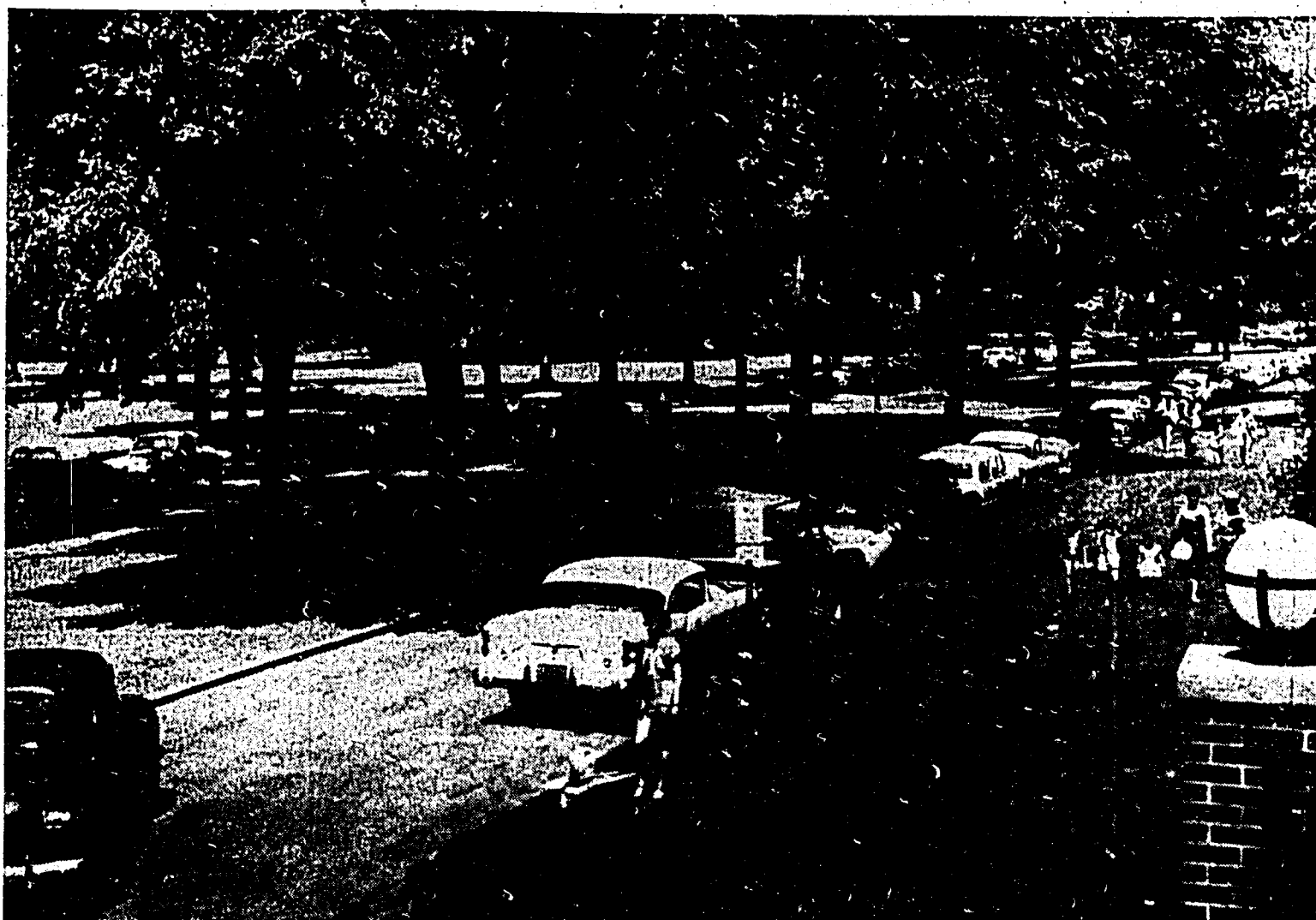
During the past year Mr. Whitney has served as Vicar and Mr. Doersam and Mr. Wittlinger as Curates on the Staff at Christ Church.

High School Summer Session Gets Under Way on June 21

The six weeks' summer school session offered by the Grosse Pointe Public Schools will begin June 21 and close July 30.

Registration will be held in the High School auditorium from 10 to 12 o'clock and 1 to 4 o'clock on Friday, June 18. Registration will also take place on Monday, June 21, from 8 to 12 o'clock in room 114 at the High School.

Classes begin at 8 and 10:10 o'clock for junior and senior high students.

For the elementary pupils the morning is divided into four periods.

Summer school offers to students the opportunity to take special subjects for which they do not have time during the school year.

Those wishing to improve a grade or review a course may also find the opportunity to do so in summer school.

The fee for Grosse Pointe students in grades seven to twelve is \$8.00 a course. For non-resident students a course is \$18.00. The fee for students in grades 3B to 6A for either arithmetic or reading-language is \$5.00 per course or a total of \$9.00 if both are taken by a student. Music is \$8.00.

The total fee is required upon registration. There is a partial refund for those who withdraw during the first two weeks of summer school. All checks should be made payable to the Grosse Pointe Board of Education.

Instruction is offered in elementary, junior and senior high work.

Teaching third and fourth grades in the Grosse Pointe High School building will be Miss Elsemia Nault. Mr. Kenneth Git-

tins will teach grades five and six at the High School.

At Macon, Miss Marian Newcomb will teach the third and fourth grades, and in fifth and sixth grades, students will be taught by Mr. Frederik Stegath.

Typing I-IV will be offered for those who have completed the eighth grade. Miss Frances French and Mr. Humphrey Jackson will be the teachers.

Mr. Andrew Balas will teach eighth grade general reading. Mr. John Fox, Mr. Stanley Cook, and Miss Helen Mutton will teach English II-VIII.

Mr. Glenn Bray will teach geometry I and II and refresher math.

Seventh and eighth grade math will also be offered, with Mrs. Belle Prom instructing.

Mr. James Kaloger, Mr. Arthur Dowell and Mr. Howard Case will teach history II-IV, civics III, and economics.

Mr. William Ferry will teach both high school and elementary instrumental music.

Providing there are enough students enrolled, and teachers can be secured, French II and IV, Latin II and IV, Spanish II and IV, music literature, and effective living will also be included in the summer school curriculum.

Three More Contribute To Woods Memorial

Three more citizens have made contributions towards the Chimes Memorial which will be erected in memory of all the service men of the Woods, both living and dead.

Residents Want Speed Limit Cut

A petition bearing 76 signatures of residents living in Jackson avenue asking that the Woods council take action to alleviate traffic hazards in that area, has been presented to the council.

The property owners of the avenue, from Van Antwerp on the north, to Kenmore on the south, stated that they are objecting to having their street turned into another Mack avenue. They claimed that the increased traffic and speed have become a hazard to the children of the neighborhood.

Attempts Suicide; Saved by Police

Two alert Shores police officers have been commended and will probably receive citations for their work in rescuing a young woman who attempted to kill herself at 5:10 a. m. on Wednesday, June 9, by jumping into Lake St. Clair.

According to Shore Police Chief Fred Duemling, Patrolmen Charles Wenrich and Edward Benthuis were cruising through the

Shores Municipal Park when they spotted Evelyn S. Grothe, 22, of 956 Glynn court, Detroit, standing on the dock, about 900 feet out in the lake.

Both officers approached to investigate, and when they were only 10 feet away from the woman, the woman dropped her purse on the dock and jumped into 15 feet of water.

Patrolman Wenrich, not wasting any time to discard his side-arm or any of his clothing, leaped in after the woman, and in spite of her struggles, brought her along side of the dock, where Patrolman Benthuis and a watchman at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club helped pull her out.

Chief Duemling stated that the woman had become unconscious while still in the water. She was rushed to Cottage Hospital for treatment and observation, receiving resuscitator oxygen on the way.

She remained unidentified for several hours, refusing to speak even after regaining consciousness.

Chief Duemling disclosed that this was the sixth attempt by the woman to do away with herself. She is estranged from her husband who is in the Armed Forces. He said that both officers have received commendations for their work, and that he will recommend to the Village council that they be given citations.

March of Dimes Sets New Record

The 1954 Wayne March of Dimes was the most successful ever held since the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis was founded 18 years ago. It was announced today by William R. Bernard, campaign chairman, and Charles L. Gehring, assistant chairman. The audited total reached \$737,284.54 and of this amount \$356,523.77 was raised during the one hour of the Mothers' March on Polio.

Expressing gratitude to "every man, woman and child in Wayne County," Bernard described the 1954 March of Dimes as a demonstration of true neighborliness and good will. More volunteers worked harder than ever before, newspapers, radio and TV stations gave generous cooperation and the public response was heartwarming.

"Through the years while the National Foundation had fought epidemics, provided the best medical care available for polio victims and struggled to meet the emergencies of the moment, each of us had in his heart and mind the vision of polio prevention and a world free of paralytic polio. Thanks to the people of Wayne County and to Americans everywhere, that vision now has substance. We can hold it in a bottle. We can say, 'This is a polio vaccine'—even though its effectiveness must be proved. We know this is the beginning of the final conquest of polio—not a dream but a reality," Bernard said. "Every contribution to the March of Dimes has helped to make it real."

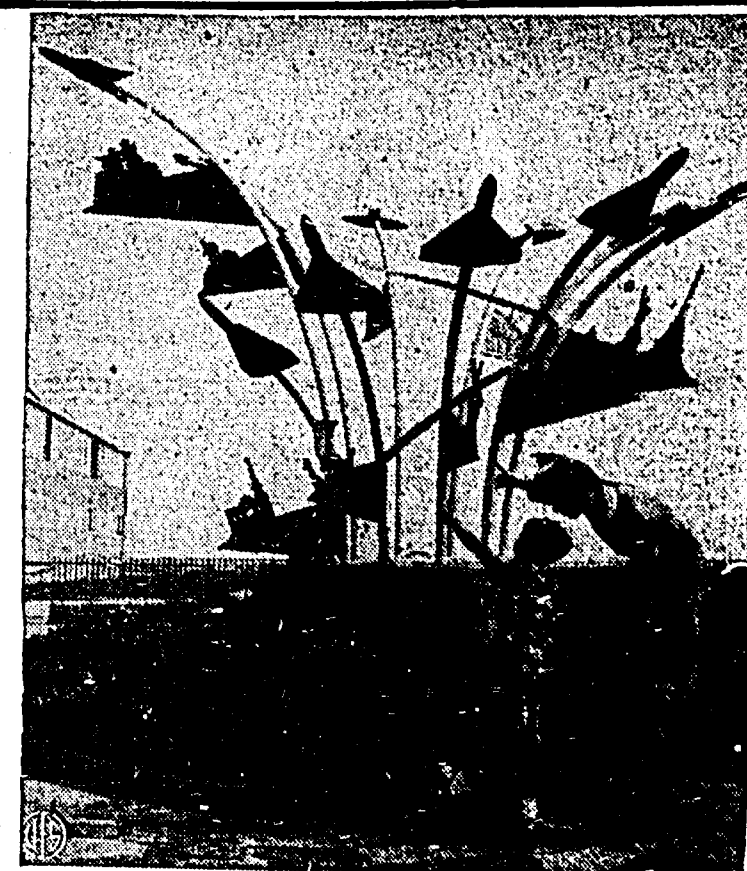

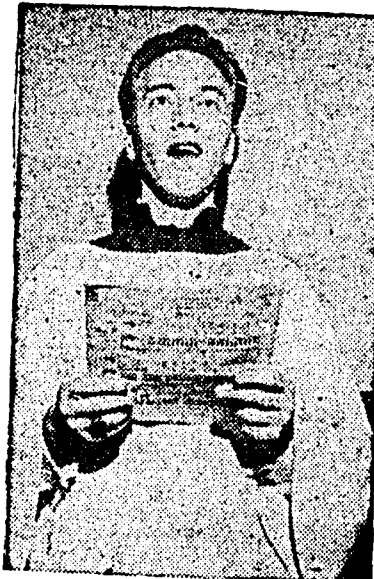
