# PARK FIGHTS FOR PARKING SITE

Thursday, February 24 WINSTON CHURCHILL. Prime Minister of England, informed the House of Commons that Britain will not become involved in the defense of China's coastal islands. He said there is no question of Britain becoming involved militarily or being

needed for defense. He cautioned that the country must be careful about advising the United States on the possible evacuation of Quemoy and Matsu Island. Churchill stressed that the nation will not be dragged into a war with Red China because of United States policy on the defense of the islands.

Friday, February 25

NATIONALIST CHINA abandoned another island to the Red Chinese, unofficial sources disclosed. The Nationalists pulled out a garrison of 5,000 from the Nanchisan Island, just 23 miles off the Chinese mainland.

It was not disclosed whether the United States assisted with the evacuation as it did in the Tachen Islands early this month. It appeared that the Nationalists attempted to have the United States assure support 101 Nanchisan, should the Reds invade it, but Washington gave a

Saturday, February 26

A LAST-MAN defense of Quemoy and Matsu Islands was ordered by Nationalist China's Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek. according to military sources. These sources said Chiang also expects the United States to aid in the defense of the islands.

The order went out after Red China occupied evacuated Nanchisan Island without opposition. After the occupation, Red China swung her attention to Matsu, 63 miles to the south. Red troops were reported to be massing on the mainland and islands near

Sunday, February 27

OVERWHELMING approval was given by the Lower House of Parliament for the rearming of West Germany, This move was followed by an agreement with France, passed by 264 to 204 votes, to Europeanize the coalrich Saar Valley.

Monday, February 28

QUEMOY, the biggest and most heavily defended of the Nationalist outposts, is no longer shellproof, according to military sources. The island is under added threat of the Communisis, who have set up Russian-made artillery in new positions capable of blasting all of Quemoy with a devastating fire.

Previously, the Red guns were only able to reach about half of the defenses, with the island's only air strip outside of enemy range. The island is reported to be defended by 40,000 to 50,000 crack Nationalist troops.

Tuesday, March 1

THE STATE OF MICHIGAN sought warrants charging fraud in the affairs of the Consolidated Oil Company, it was revealed through sources today. Circuit Judge Chester P. O'Hara, vice president of the company, said that the warrant was prompted by a \$250,000 deficiency somewhere in the company structure. "Somebody clipped scmebody else for \$250,000 or more," O'Hara stated. He expressed desire to get to the bottom of the affair and "get the mess cleaned up." Another spokesman for the company said to the press that O'Hara was never aware of the financial juggling that brought ruin to the company the judge helped or-

# Council Votes To Condemn **Desired Lot**

See Vital Need For Space Near Lakefront; Fill-In Problem Also Discussed

The Park City Council came a step closer to acquiring the necessary land for the Municipal Pier Parking lot

Monday, February 28. A unanimous vote by the council set the wheels turning to start condemnation proceedings for acquisition of lot 78, the only outlying piece of land parcel set aside at Windmill Pointe drive and Alter road for the off-street

parking project. Last Ditch Effort





He dispelled the claims of certain critics who maintain that the lowering of trade barriers would dissipate our economic strength through his statement: "This does not represent a giveaway of American strength; rather it is an acceptance of the fact that we do not want to live alone in this world, that in truth we cannot, and our trade policies must take this in account."

# Patience Will Be Rewarded

By the time this appears in print, actual construction may well have been started on the new sewer project which will bring relief to the Vendome road area, a 140 acre section bounded by Moross road, Ridge road, Grosse Pointe boulevard and Lothrop road.

This is part of the big sewer relief job for which a bond issue was approved by the voters of the Farms. It is expected to take about four months to complete the work.

We had a call from the contractor who is doing the work on this project, asking if we would call the attention of the residents of this area to the fact that they will be subjected to some slight inconveniences during the progress of the construction. Driveways will be blocked off for a short period as the ditches are dug and the pipe laid.

The contractor says such inconveniences will be terminated as quickly as possible, and that probably no one driveway would be cut off for more than half an hour. As soon asthe pipe can be hooked up, the ditch will be filled, so ingress and egress will again be possible.

It seemed to us a nice gesture on the part of the contractor, to want to acquaint the residents with the facts, and to assure them that everything would be done to make the inconveniences as minute as possible.

# Let's Take a Vote

For a number of weeks this paper has been making a considerable amount of space available to whoever wished to speak a piece on the question of adding fluorine to water. Both proponents and opponents of the issue have had more than a little to say. Because all of the residents of the Farms, City, and a portion of the Shores, have been drinking water with fluorine added for a number of years now, we have felt it was our duty to publicize the disputes which have arisen over the subject of fluoridation.

The small group which has spearheaded the attack months ago and asked that fluoridation be stopped. When the request was turned down, the Farms council voluntarily advised the opponents that if they wished to carry on their fight, they could get the issue on a referendum if they could obtain 1,300 signatures requesting that it be put to a vote. The Farms charter provides that in any such argument,

if there is enough opposition or support, either side can bring the matter to a vote by a petition carrying the names of a sufficient percentage of the qualified electors (under present registrations about 1,300). However, the council has the power to decide that a

referendum is called for, even if the petitioners do not have

In this case a comparatively small group of energetic workers against fluoridation has been out campaigning for signatures. The last we heard, they had obtained more than 800 and hoped to reach their goal of 1,300.

In view of the interest which has been generated in this particular argument during the last few months, we feel that the Farms council should not be overly strict in demanding he playfully toyed with the ear of his Great Dane." There has certainly been sufficient manifestation of public interest in the fluorine issue to warrant bringing it to a vote.

The new agreement just officially signed, tieing the Farms and City together in a water supply contract for at least the next 20 years, makes this the more important. Let's put the issue to the vote and have done with it.
