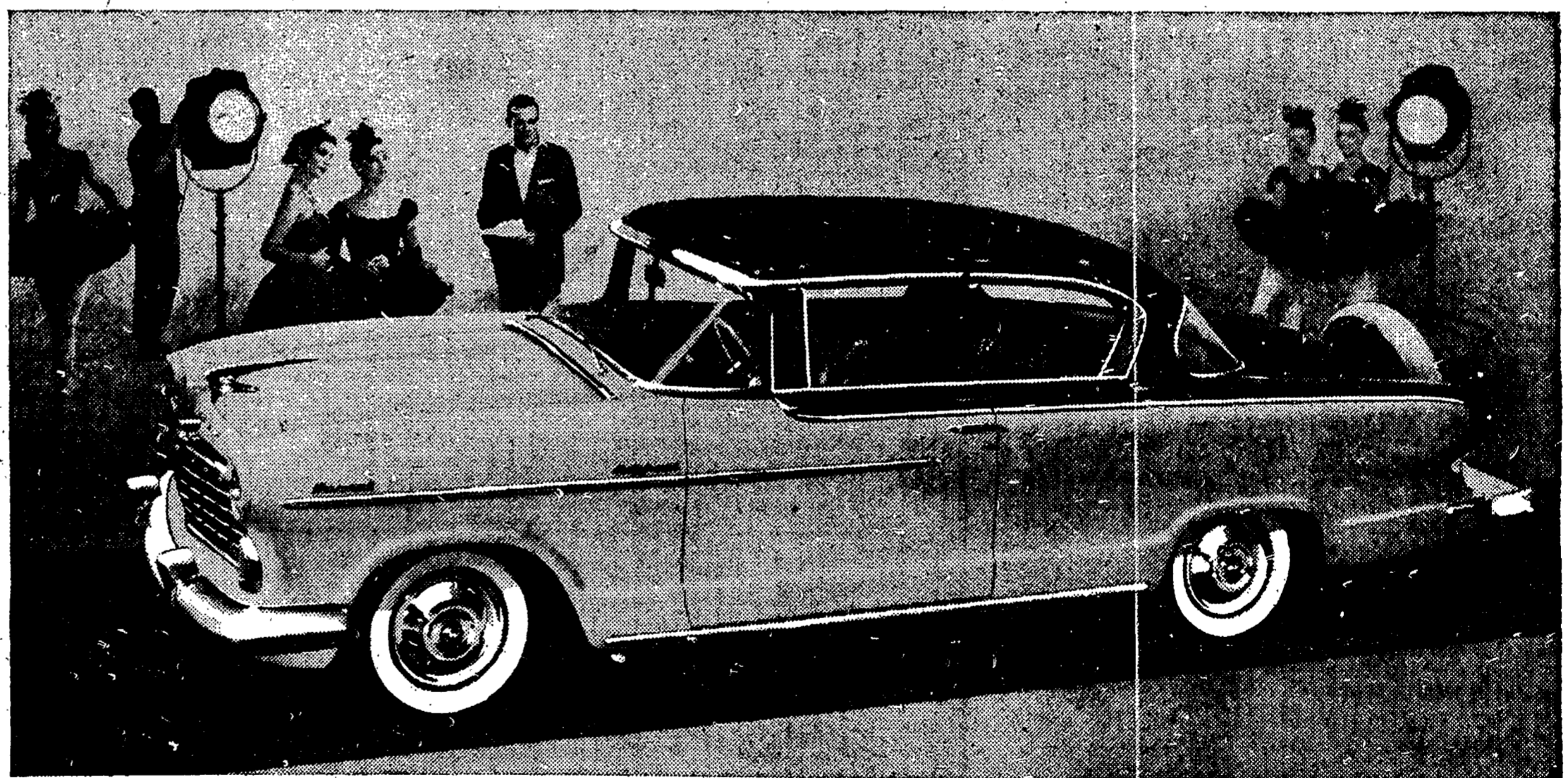

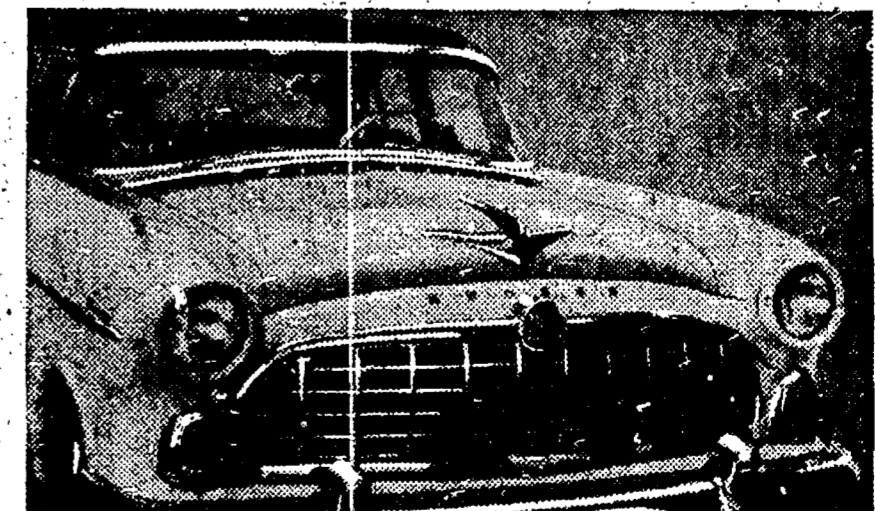

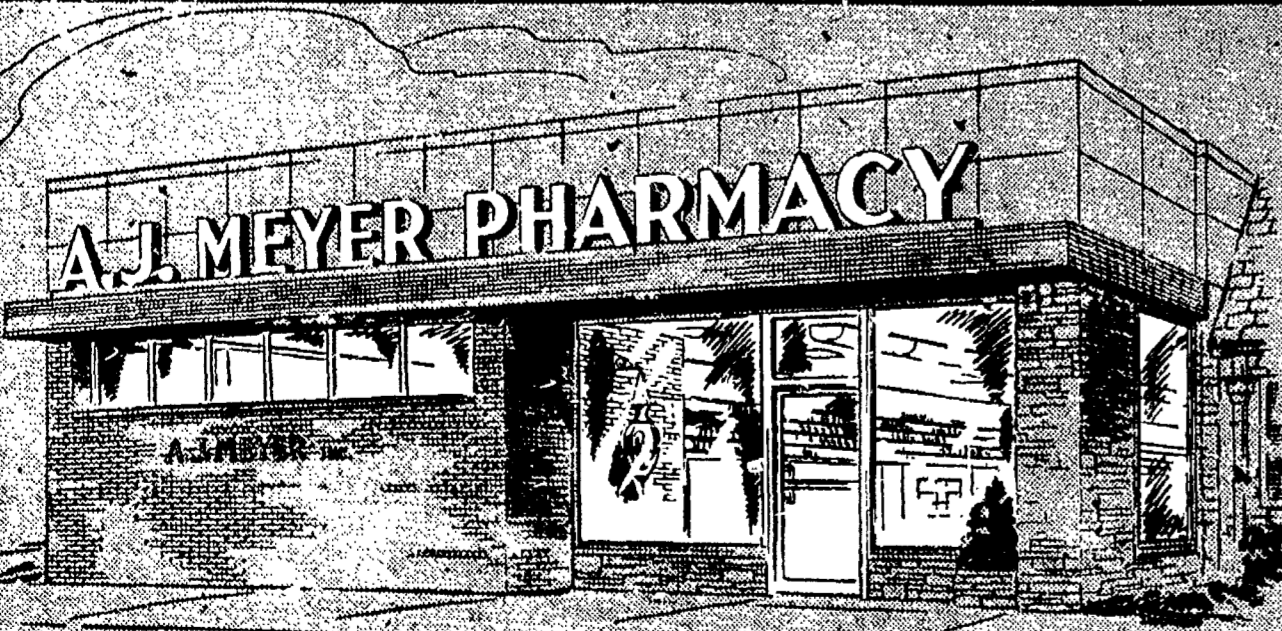

Theater to Cast For New Play

Having just finished a successful production of "Gramercy Ghost," the Grosse Pointe Community Theatre is already scheduling its fourth presentation of the 1954-55 season.

Casting auditions have been announced for Friday, March 4, at 7:30 and Sunday, March 6, at 7:30 and Sunday, March 6, at 2:30, both calls to be held at Cannon Memorial Recreation Center Auditorium, on Guilford, just north of E. Warren.

The new production, "Time Out for Ginger," by Roland Alexander, has just been released after a successful 1954 run on Broadway. Hailed as one of the most amusing family comedies to take place in New York since "Life With Father," "Ginger" tells the story of the father of three teen-age daughters who believes that no child should be forced to do anything

he or she doesn't want to; that it enhances their dignity as human beings to make their own decisions.

Putting this theory into practice, Ginger, youngest daughter of 14, tries out for the high school football team and what's more, makes it. Naturally, this creates many situations in the lives of the family, the girls' boy friends, the high school principal, even the boss, bank president Ed Hoffman. Miss Evelyn Greathouse, who will be remembered for her excellent job on "Harvey" last May, will direct. Miss Greathouse was a drama major in college and taught dramatics at the Beverly Hills, California high school.

Pointers Given PD Promotions

Parke, Davis & Company announced the promotions of Dr. A. R. Taylor and Dr. J. M. Vandenberg to laboratory directors in its research department.

Dr. Taylor was appointed laboratory director in virology, while Dr. Vandenberg assumed a similar position in physical chemistry.

Dr. Taylor, noted for his work on purification of animal viruses and, in particular, on the isolation of the poliomyelitis virus, joined Parke-Davis in 1947 as a research virologist. Three years later, he was named a leader in the virus research group, a post he held until his present promotion.

Dr. Taylor was born at Bolton Landing, N. Y., March 11, 1907, and attended elementary schools in West Haven, Conn. He was graduated from Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn., in 1930 with a B.S. degree in organic chemistry. In 1939, he obtained his Ph.D. in endocrine biology from Princeton University.

Between 1939 and 1947, Dr. Taylor served as research associate, School of Medicine, Dr. and Mrs. Taylor reside at 1416 Yorkshire, Grosse Pointe Park, with their three children, Robert T., 18, Jeanne White, 13, and William White, 10.

Born in Holland, Mich., Aug. 9, 1912, Dr. Vandenberg was graduated from Hope College in 1934 with an A.B. degree from Boston University in analytical chemistry and in 1940 was granted a Ph.D. degree in physical chemistry from Michigan State College. Dr. Vandenberg joined Parke-Davis in 1940 as a member of the research staff. Two years later, he began the development of a physical chemistry laboratory. From this laboratory, he has made many contributions to problems involving the structure and identity of organic compounds.

For four years, Dr. Vandenberg served as chairman of the physical chemistry committee of the A.D.M.A. research and member of the National Research Council - National Bureau of Standards committee on spectral absorption data and chairman of the ultraviolet section of the standard data committee of the American Society for Testing Materials.

Dr. and Mrs. Vandenberg live at 1330 Hampton road, Grosse Pointe Woods, with their two children, Marcia, 12, and William, 11.

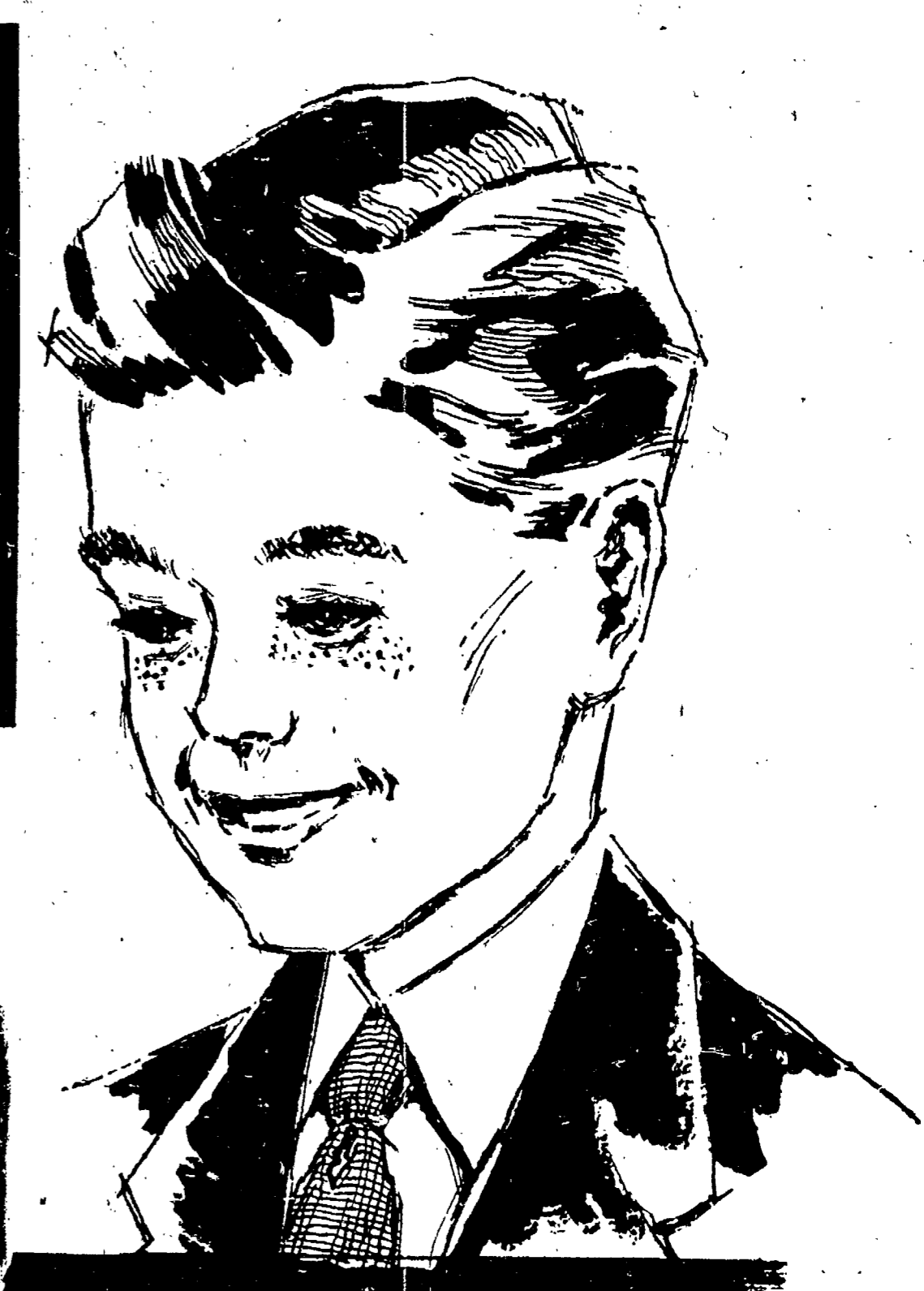


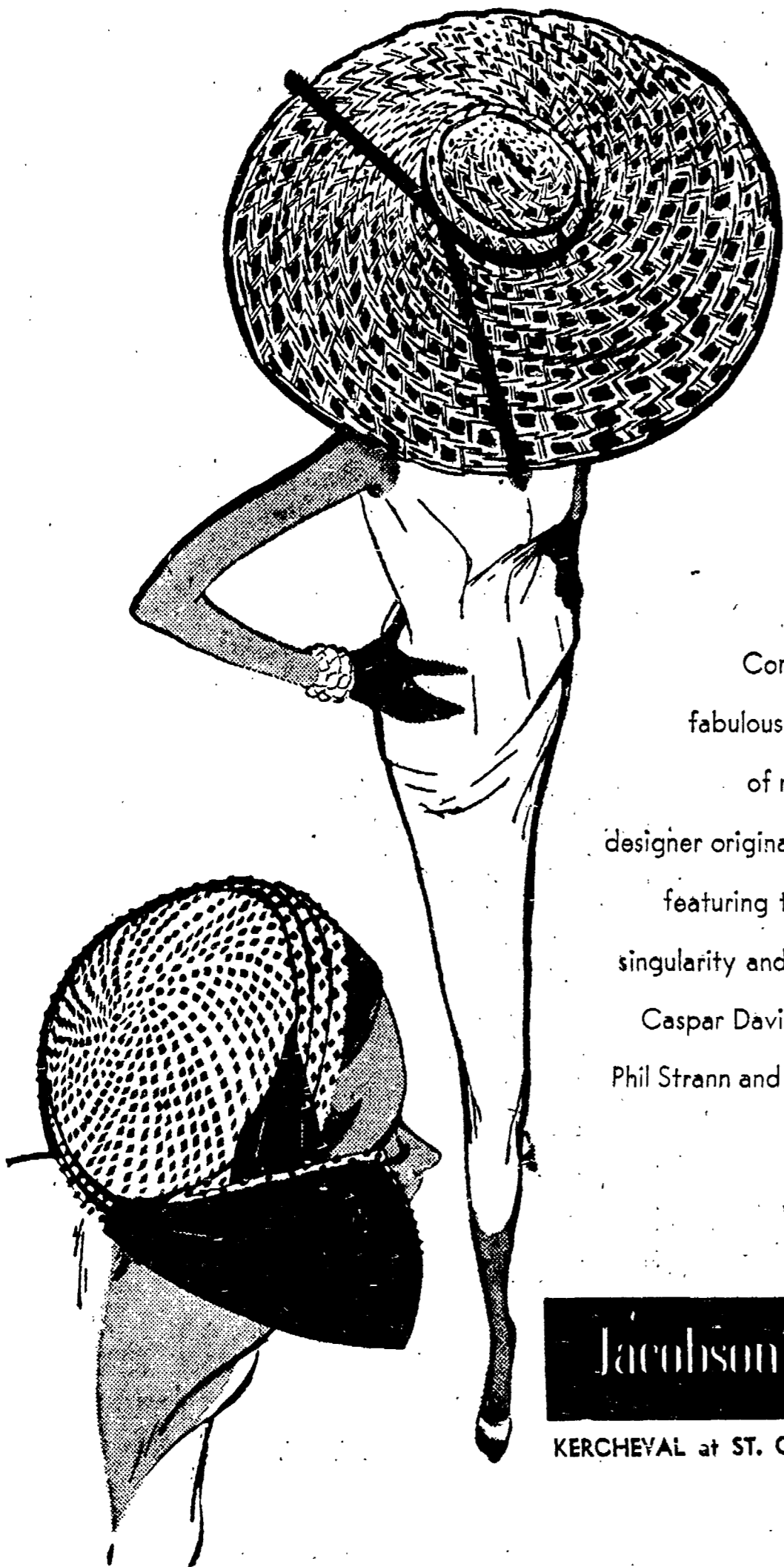

President of Manhattanville College to Speak Here March 5

The Manhattanville Club of Detroit announces that Mother E. M. O'Byrne, President of Manhattanville College, Purchase, New York, will address the members of the Brownson Guild at the Convent of the Sacred Heart, Lawrence and Wilson Avenues, on Friday evening, March 4, at 8 o'clock. Her subject will be "The Mid-twentieth Century Educational Challenge."

On Saturday, March 5, she will speak to a gathering of Manhattanville Alumnae, parents, and their friends, at the Convent of the Sacred Heart, Grosse Pointe, where her subject will be "The Manhattanville Story." The talk is scheduled for 3 p.m.

As president of the 114-year old Manhattanville, Mother O'Byrne has wide contacts with many factors in the educational field. She took her degrees at Manhattanville and at Fordham and Oxford Universities. She is an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters of New York University.

In addition to her membership in professional societies like the AAUW, and honorary membership in the Kappa Delta Gamma, she gives active service as Director of Catholic Scholarships for Negroes, Inc., as Director and member of the Study Committee of the Greater New York Council for Foreign Students.

She is a member of the Educational Planning Committee of New York State, a liaison committee between the Association of Colleges and Universities of New York and the State Educational Department. She is a member of the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and a member of the Commission on the Education of Women of the

American Council on Education. In December, 1954, she accepted the call to serve on the committee of 21 members appointed by Governor Dewey to confer for New York State, on the White House Conference on Education. In January, 1955, Mother O'Byrne addressed the convention members of the Association of American Colleges at the 41st annual meeting, in a paper entitled "Liberating the Liberal Arts Student." She was the only woman speaker scheduled at the convention.

In her talk at Grosse Pointe on Saturday, Mother O'Byrne will comment especially on the moving of the Manhattanville campus from the upper west-side Manhattan to Westchester. Important features of the talk will deal with the work and development which are now underway at Manhattanville.

The institution was founded in New York City in 1841. Since 1917, it has been empowered to give bachelor degrees, and courses are currently offered in curricula leading to the A.B., Mus. B., and B.F.A. degrees. The student body is drawn from 28 states and from 23 foreign countries. The Faculty represents 80 American and European universities.

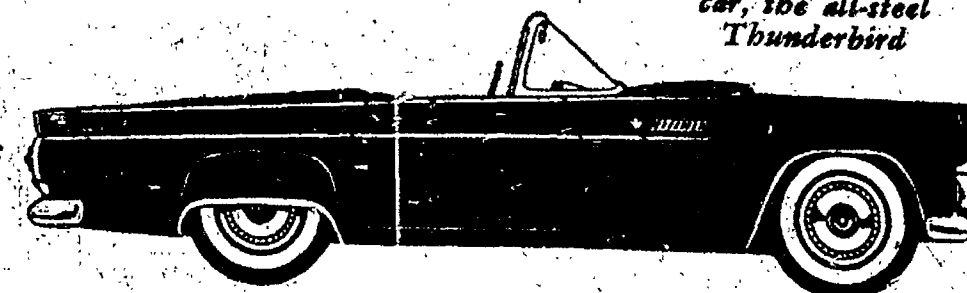

Clean-Up Should Commence Inside Home, Experts State

"I'm all for the community in a certain-campaign," we heard a certain Grosse Pointe say, "But right now what can I do to be part of the activity? In this weather I certainly can't be expected to paint the porch or plant a new shrub."

Take it from the experts, clean-up begins INSIDE the home. For the sake of the family's health and safety, as well as the preservation of property, the interior of the house deserves just as much attention as the outside. Now's a fine time for inside jobs.

"A clean house seldom burns," says Fire Chief George L. deCausin of the Park. "Closets, attics and basements are the main starting places of home fires. These items will burn fast: old linens and clothing, mattresses, wooden furniture, curtains, draperies, lampshades, magazines, papers, linoleum and rags, particularly dirty rags that have been used for painting and polishing. This is the rubbish—the fuel—that too often means the difference between a small, controllable fire and a fire-gutted home."

"An accident in the home hurts where it hurts the most," says Dr. Thomas S. Davies, commissioner of health. "Make righting wrongs in the home part of the clean-up drive."

Checks yourself on these important points:
Do you regularly dispose of trash and rubbish?
Are oily rags stored in safe metal containers?
Do you keep home tools, machinery, motors and appliances serviced and clean?
Are your fuse boxes clean and do they have the proper size fuses in them? Never put a fuse

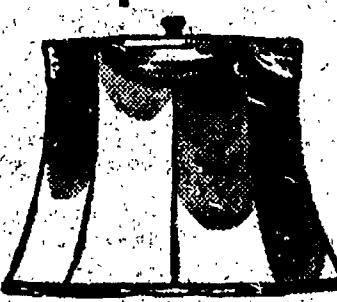

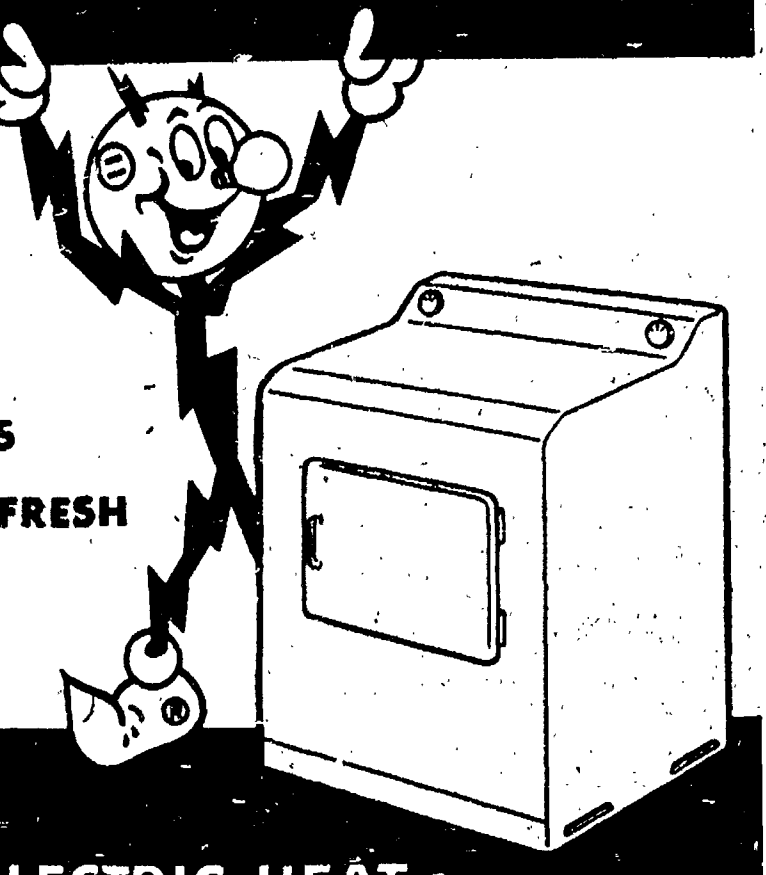

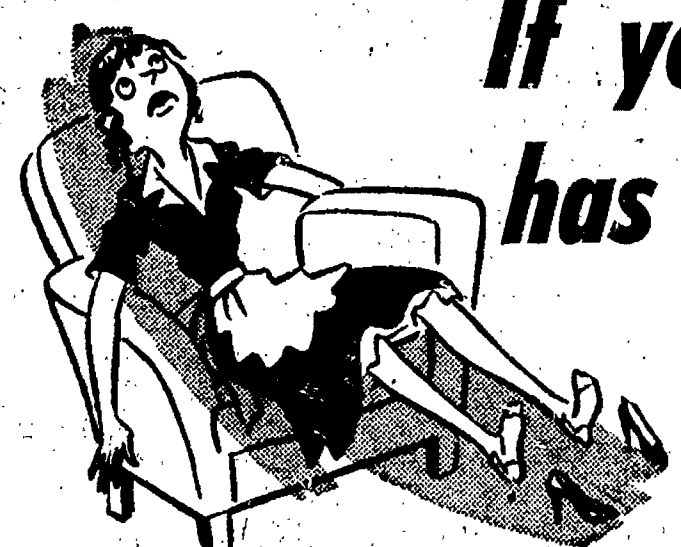
