The people of the Ukraine developed a very unique method of egg decorating with a stylus, a cone shaped piece of metal wired to a handle, bees wax (it dries immediately and eggs can be handled freely without damaging the design) and commercial powder dye dissolved and cooled. Each succesive dye which is applied must be strong enough to cover he previous color. Raw white eggs are used since the dyes adhere better to the shell of a

raw egg. It is the custom of village maidens of the Ukraine to begin decorating Easter Eggs (called Pysanka from the verb "Pysaty" meaning "to write") long before Easter. In fact, they begin almost immediately after the Christmas holidays. The

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND PARAGRAPH 1.12 OF "SECTION I-DEFINITIONS" OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POLITE FARMS, BEING: AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND RESTRICT THE LOCATION OF TRADES AND INDUSTRIES AND THE LOCATION OF BUILDINGS DESIGNED FOR SPECIFIED USES, TO REGULATE AND LIMIT THE HEIGHT AND BULK OF BUILDINGS HEREAFTER ERECTED, TO REGULATE AND DETERMINE THE AREA OF YARDS, COURTS, AND OTHER OPEN SPACES, TO LIMIT AND RESTRICT THE MAXIMUM NUMBER OF FAMILIES WHICH MAY BE HOUSED IN DWELLINGS HEREAFTER ERECTED OR ALTERED AND FOR SAID PURPOSES DIVIDE THE VILLAGE INTO DISTRICTS, TO PROVIDE A METHOD OF ADMINISTRATION, AND TO PRESCRIBE THE PENALTIZS FOR THE VIOLATION OF ITS PRO-VISIONS, AND TO REPEAL ORDINANCE NO. 34 AS AMENDED:

The Ctiy of Grosse Pointe Farms Ordains:

Section 1. Paragraph 1.12 of "Section I - Definitions" of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 80 adopted October 25, 1948, as since amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"1.12 FRONT LOT LINE. In the case of a lot abutting upon only one street, the front lot line is the line separating such lot from such street except those lots with frontage on Lake St. Clair upon which the front lot line is a line separating such lots from the Lake. In the case of any other lot one such line shall be elected to be the front lot line for the purposes of this ordinance, and shall be so designated on the application for a Certificate of Compliance."

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after its enactment or upon its publication, whichever is later.



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Let's All Be Happy

Parking lot woes of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Center finally seem to be banished, and clearance has been given for proceeding with the construction of the auditorium on the property. The Farms council voted Monday night to change the zoning laws to enable the Center to create a new parking area on the westerly side of the property towards Lake Shore road. This will tie into the very large parking space of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, which in turn is adjacent to the Grosse Pointe Club, with more off-street parking facilities.


It has been a long argument, with considerable bitterness on both sides, with the city in the middle. The Center, sorely pressed for more parking spaces, tried to enlarge its present lot on the easterly side of the property. Neighbors objected and the battle was generally resolved around the question of which was the front and which was the back of the former Alger mansion. It faced the lake, but the entrance looked towards Lake Shore road. Where additional parking space could be developed in the rear of the property, it could not be added on the front, according to the Farms zoning laws. The decision of Monday night virtually reverses the previously held conception. What was considered to be the front yard of the Center property now becomes the back yard.

The situation has been a delicate one and there were arguments for both sides. No parking space in the already established area for this purpose, naturally meant more traffic and more disturbances for the residents living on that side. Inability to obtain more parking space meant more on-street parking and more con-gestion of traffic in Lake Shore road and in the side streets.

The Memorial Association had been left a bequest from the William Fries estate to build an auditorium on the property. Such a project definitely called for additional off-street parking facilities. During the argu-ments it had been suggested that the Center use its lake-front lawn for this extra parking space. This seemed like a thoroughly distasteful solution. The lawn has been used frequently and advantageously for symphony concerts and outdoor entertainments of all sorts, and has been one of the most esthetically valuable assets of the entire property. To obliterate this lovely expanse of lawn and clutter up the view to the lake from the mansion seemed like utter nonsense.

The solution reached appears to be a happy one and we hope it will be accepted as such by all concerned. It should be completely possible to convert a relatively unimportant piece of this magnificent property in parking site, tied in with those of the church and the Little Club, in an unobtrusive manner, concealed from the street and from neighbors by a suitable green barrier. 





"Let's Eat Right to Keep Fit" is recommended reading to teach housewives proper food preparation and utilization.

The late Henry Ford bought 161 acres of land in Grosse Pointe and had plans to build his "Fairlane" here but when he attended a property owners association meeting he changed his mind.

The land on Gaulkler Point which is now Mrs. Edsel Ford's home was bought by the late Mr. Ford, her father-in-law, before World War I. The isolated site appealed to him and he was interested in enlarging and changing the Milk River which ilowed through the property.

According to his biographer, Allan Nevins, he changed his mind about a Pointe home because he felt his privacy would be invaded and he would be impelled to take a great part in community affairs. He always took a dim view of the Pointe as the home of the well born and aristocratic and the property owners' meeting did nothing to change his mind.

However, his son, Edsel, who had attended Detroit University school had many friends among the Chapin Macauley and Caulkins families here, wanted to build on Gaulkler Point. His father had torn down Matt Kramer's roadhouse which was on the land and changed the route of the Shore line cars, building a new road. More land was bought from the John estate, the Hurley estate and from Mrs. J. M. Brady.

Work on the lavish English stone mansion began in 1926. The Edsel Fords had been living in Indian Village after their wedding in 1916. Albert Kahn was the architect and the house featured a two story gallery in which the Fords hung their collection of fine paintings. There is a gate house, recreation house, power house, boat house, greenhouse and a 40 by 132 foot swimming pool.

While Ford was visiting the estate during the building he narrowly escaped death from a fire which started in a speedboat just as he stepped from the craft.

After Mr. Ford's death in 1943 the house was sought lish, which she learned as a for several organizations. A veterans' hospital, an airport, a lakeside park, these were some of the suggested uses. The estate was on the market in 1944 for \$500,000 but there were no buyers although this represented a fraction of the original cost.

Forty-six of the acres of the Ford estate were included in Lake Township, which lay within the boun-daries of Macomb and Wayne County. There were 13 registered voters in the township and the board of review was headed by Mrs. Ford for some years,

The property was withdrawn from sale in 1947 and today Mrs. Edsel Ford lives in the home that she and her husband built together.




