

Apology Extended to Park Police

 was found in the backyard, lying face down, a shotgun clutched in his hands.
 Kent asserted that if the Park detective bureau had followed procedures outlined "in my booklet on how to investigate a homicide," the case would have been handled properly. Later,

the assistant prosecutor said he had not intended to criticize the police, but feared that "we might wind up with a murder and not much evidence to prove it."
Lie Test Cancelled
 It was disclosed that plans to take Hollerbach, who was kept overnight and throughout

Wednesday in the Park jail, to the Redford State Police Post for a lie-detector test, was cancelled by Loutsell, with apologies, after declaring there had been a misunderstanding.
 The attorney stated that he thought at once would free his client and drop their request for a warrant if Hollerbach passed the test. However, when the officers said they would take the matter before the prosecutor, regardless, Loutsell called off the test, terming it a waste of time.

According to Park Police Department officials, Kent made a personal apology to the investigating officers, Wednesday, June 28. Nevertheless, because of possible first impressions created in the minds of the public as a result of Kent's criticisms, Lt. Enders, and Police Lt. Gerard Kesteloot, in charge of the department in the absence of Police Chief Arthur Louwers, released the following statement, printed verbatim:
 "With respect to the criticism by Asst. Prosecutor George D. Kent as published in the Detroit newspapers yesterday (Wednesday, June 28) in regard to the actions taken by the Grosse Pointe Park police officers who initially responded to the scene of the fatal shotgun shooting of Gilbert E. Miller of 1343 Three Mile drive by Gerald Hollerbach at 1360 Whittier, in the home of Hollerbach, in the A.M. of June 27, 1961, the Grosse Pointe Park Police Department makes the following corrections.
 "With all due respect to the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office, and in this particular instance, Mr. Kent, this department submits that Mr. Kent was in error and obviously totally unfamiliar with the facts at the time of his alleged statement to the press.
 "The first officers to reach the scene observed a man, later identified as Gilbert E. Miller, lying on a couch located directly in front of a broken window. Miller appeared critically wounded. The officers immediately established that all doors and windows were locked. The officers then unlocked the broken window and entered the house via that window. The officers then established that some life was present in the person of Miller.
 "The officers, under the direction of Cpl. Thomas Martin, then conveyed the wounded man to Bon Secours Hospital where he was declared dead on arrival.
 "It must be recognized that the Police Department operates under two (2) rules of procedure; procedure under law and operational procedures. Although operational procedures must never conflict with the law, the law does not in all cases direct the actions of a


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LOSES GOLD WATCH

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
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Reports Crash After Leaving

Maj. Thomas B. Tyree At Command College

FORT LEAVENWORTH, KAN. (AHTNC)—Army Maj. Thomas B. Tyree, son of Mrs. Harold B. Tyree, 28 Provincial road, Grosse Pointe Farms, Mich., completed the regular course at the U. S. Army Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth, Kan., June 16.

The class of 666 U. S. officers and 84 officers from 43 allied nations were addressed by General Lyman L. Lemnitzer, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, who was introduced by Maj. Gen. Harold K. Johnson, school commandant and commanding general, Fort Leavenworth. Following the address the graduates received their diplomas from Brig. Gen. William A. Cunningham, assistant commandant.

The college, the Army's senior tactical school, was established in 1881 as the School of Application of Infantry and Cavalry. The regular course is designed to prepare selected officers for duty as commanders and general staff officers at division, corps and field army levels. During the 38-week course Major Tyree received training in command and staff operations, nuclear weapons employment, conventional and unconventional warfare and recent significant combat developments.

Major Tyree is one of 128 graduates who will remain at Fort Leavenworth to attend a five week nuclear weapons employment course. The course of instruction will end July 15.

He is a 1948 graduate of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, N. Y.

Job Hunters Find Trouble

Two men who were going from house to house in Shores, looking for window washing jobs on Tuesday, June 27, ended up in jail in Detroit because of outstanding traffic warrants.

Shores Police Chief Fred Duemling said that his department received a complaint about three men on Greenbrier who appeared to be acting in a suspicious manner. These men, the complainant said, were ringing doorbells of homes, and walk to the rear of the houses, look around and then go on to the next house.

At 68 Greenbrier, officers found Charles Baker, 46, of 288 Kensington, Ferndale; and Eddie Locklear, 38, of 423 East Jefferson, Detroit, and a third man, name not given, washing windows.

All three were taken to the station when Baker could not produce a registration for the car he was driving, which had one 1961 license tag missing. Baker said the vehicle belonged to a friend of his. At the station, he remembered that his friend did not have a telephone.

Shores police checked with police departments in the surrounding area, and it was found that Detroit authorities had three traffic warrants against Baker and one against Locklear. The third man was released without charge, but Baker and Locklear were held for Detroit Police, who picked them up.

The Detroit officers said that the car the three men were in belonged to Louis Deese of 4755 Elmwood, Detroit, but cautioned their Shores colleagues not to release the car to him because his driver's license had been suspended for one year. Shores police impounded the car.

There will be a special showing each Sunday for adults at 10:30 in the church basement. All visitors are welcome.



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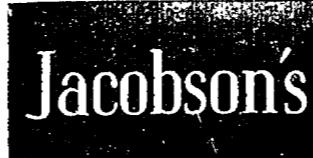

Woods Woman Dies of Burns


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Pointer Heads Committee For New Episcopal Home

When Antoine de Lamothe Cadillac stepped ashore on Grosse Ile from his canoe on July 23, 1701 he was well protected from the bands of hostile Iroquois Indians by a strong platoon of soldiers.

Cadillac had great hopes for this new French colony and hoped many Frenchmen would follow him to find new homes. When several of the soldiers in his train decided to remain in the new land he gave them property, retaining a great deal for himself.

Farmers like the Marsacs were discouraged by the legal state of affairs which were not straightened out for over 20 years. In 1734 the Royal Notary, Robert Navarre, arrived and his coming gave new life to the settlement.

Navarre received a grant of land on the Cote du Sud-Ouest, which journals and maps of the day delineate as Grosse Pointe. He married Marie Barrois and they were the parents of nine children.

Other Navarre children made advantageous marriages. (There were few families to choose from in those early Fort days). Marie Navarre married Alexander Macomb; her brother, Jean, married Archange Marantette; another sister Marie Francoise married Capt. George McDougall and secondly, Jacques Campau.

When the English arrived to claim the fort in 1760 these great French families were augmented by English names such as Askin, Brush and Hunt.

By 1879 Marsacs and Navarres no longer owned huge tracts of Pointe farmland. There is no listing on the Pointe map of that date of any Marsac land. Today Frank W. Marsack lives in Muir road where there have been Marsacs for sixty years.

Navarres, too, are still in the Pointe, Marietta B. deNavarre, daughter of the Maison G. de Navarres, of Lothrop road, is studying at Newton College.

But the great land holdings owned by these families over two hundred and fifty years ago have been divided by marriage and the demands of three governments since the days of Louis XIV when these Frenchmen first arrived in the new colony.
