Engineer Who Helped Korea Retires As He Approaches 80

SEOUL, Korea — Edwin B. Rall is retiring with the satisfaction of having made a significant contribution to the Korean people by sharing, over the past 13 years, in the U.S.-aided program to relieve the serious electric power shortage in their country. Mr. Rall, who began work at the age of 17 as a deckhand on a Great Lakes freighter, came to Korea first in June 1948 as a mechanical engineer.

The acute power shortage in the Republic of Korea, during the period of the Korean war, and afterward, arose largely from the fact that the Communists had cut off the power normally supplied to South Korea from the North.

One of his many significant accomplishments was at the Yongwol plant, 242 miles east of Seoul. The plant had become run down. The furnaces and boilers were in bad shape and needed replacement parts. The operators of the plant did the best they could, but Rall found malfunctioning generators, faulty electrical connections, leakage loss and made shift repairs.

Rall helped plan a \$2,500,000 rehabilitation program to be aided by the U. S. International Cooperation Administration, but the time for designing, manufacturing, and shipping special electric power equipment may run into several years. In the meantime, one of the two electric power barges which had carried a heavy share of the load during the emergency departed before some new power units were put on line and the remaining barge broke down, creating a power crisis. The one large hydroelectric plant left, at Hwachon, which was being rehabilitated, also dropped in production.

Rall threw all his skill and experience into building up the Yongwol output to meet the crisis. The Korean operative staff was strongly behind him. He dismantled one boiler and used the parts to repair the others. He got a second aerial tramway to supply fuel. He arranged to bring additional coal down a tortuous road by truck from the Hambaek coal fields. Weak connections were fixed, operative equipment was set running, the switchyard put in order. Several boilers were set running full blast and the large building shook with activity. Production ran up to 64,000 kilowatt capacity. Yongwol carried the country along in the crisis. Completion of new power units in other localities under the American aid program brought an additional 100,000 kilowatt capacity on line and the temporary crisis was over.

The government then took the plant out of service to survey thoroughly all the emergency repairs which had held the plant together and to take stock of the damage the emergency operation had caused. The transportation division and the ROK Ministry carried out construction of a railroad spur to Hambaek from Yongwol to bring in coal. With the excitement over, Rall went along on a program of improvement. Today the plant is operating at 50,000 kilowatt capacity and saving an extra 15,000 kilowatts for emergencies. Equipment is arriving for the originally planned complete rehabilitation of the plant.

Rall's experience in Korea covers 13 years. He was first brought here in June 1948 as a

member of a group appointed by the Under-Secretary of War after the Communists cut off power from the North. He reported to Washington on what could be done to rehabilitate the power system and was back at work on this for the Economic Cooperation Administration when the Communists invaded in June, 1950. He was evacuated to Nagasaki, Japan, where he became project engineer in the overhaul of the power barge, "Jacona," so it could be brought to Korea to augment the power supply. Use of power barges, anchored in Korean ports, was an emergency means of supplying electric power. He later helped rehabilitate the Pusan steam power plant and other installations.

Before his responsibilities in Korea, Rall had retired as assistant plant engineer of the Conner's Creek Plant of Detroit Edison after 32 years with the firm. He then lived at 1344 Yorkshire road. Long before all this he was chief engineer on successive ore vessels on the Great Lakes making Montreal, Duluth and other U. S. ore receiving ports.

In Seattle he will see his son, Edwin, in the advertising business and four of his grandchildren. When he and Mrs. Rall, the former Helen Virginia Peckingham, of Wooster, Ohio, are in Grosse Pointe they will see much of their daughter, Mrs. W. George Belanger, of Harvard road, and four more grandchildren.

An efficient mechanical engineer, today as always, and in good health, Rall enjoys his work and does it well, but he feels that he has done about enough of it.

Rall is almost 80 years old. "Perhaps it might be a good idea to stay home and write up my experiences in Korea," he suggests.

and adjacent to the pumping station. New fire and police stations would also be constructed adjacent to the pumping station and facing Chalfonte.

The new stations would be connected to the building housing the Department of Public Works, and by means of remodeling and additions, would utilize some of the public works building. No recreation space would be lost.

Mayor William Connolly said that plans for either the remodeling of the present city hall, or the construction of a new one, are not definite. The matter is merely being debated and will need much more study, he said. He pointed out that the present city hall was built in 1912.

if the plans go through, was discounted by City Comptroller John Cantwell, who informed the council that this would not be needed, since the city has \$250,000 in the budget already. This sum is in the Public Improvement Fund, and has accumulated over a period of seven years, he said.

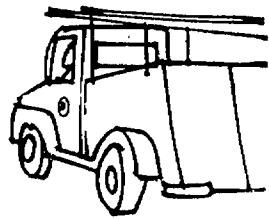

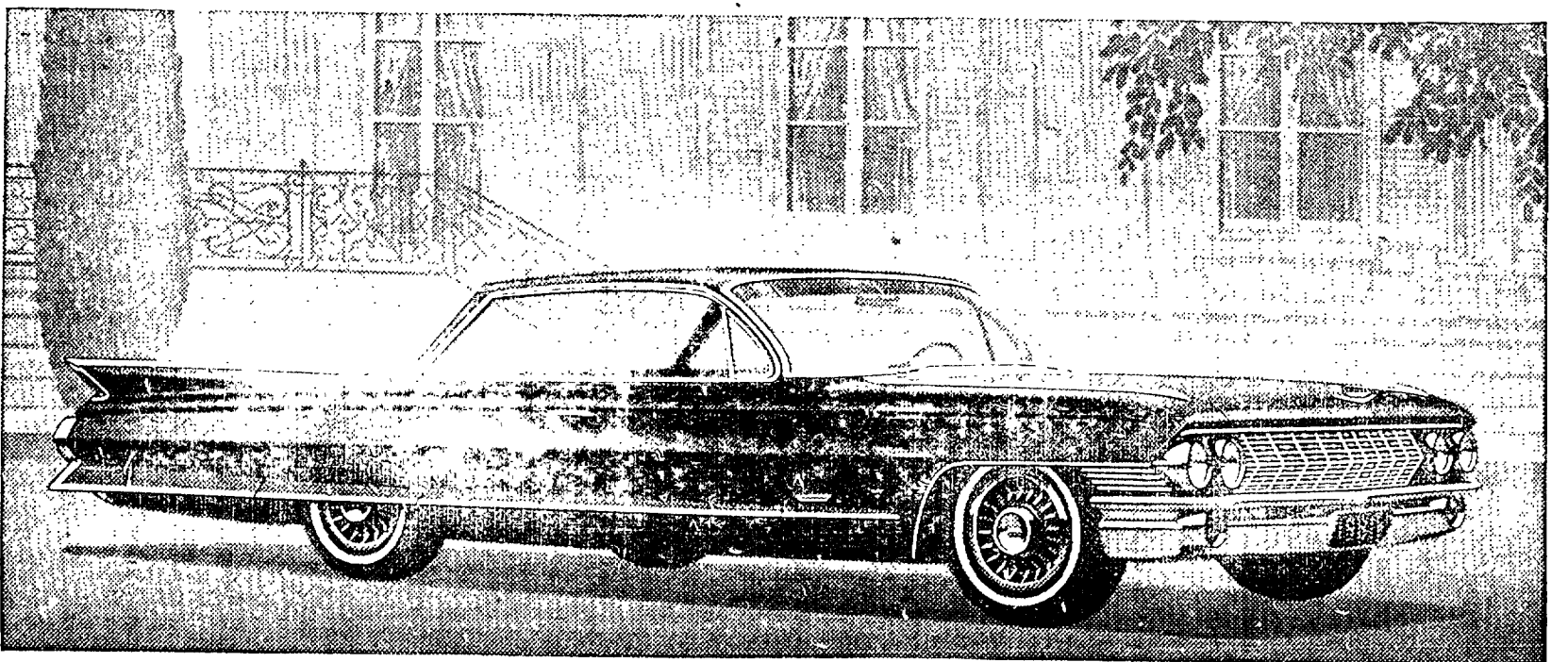

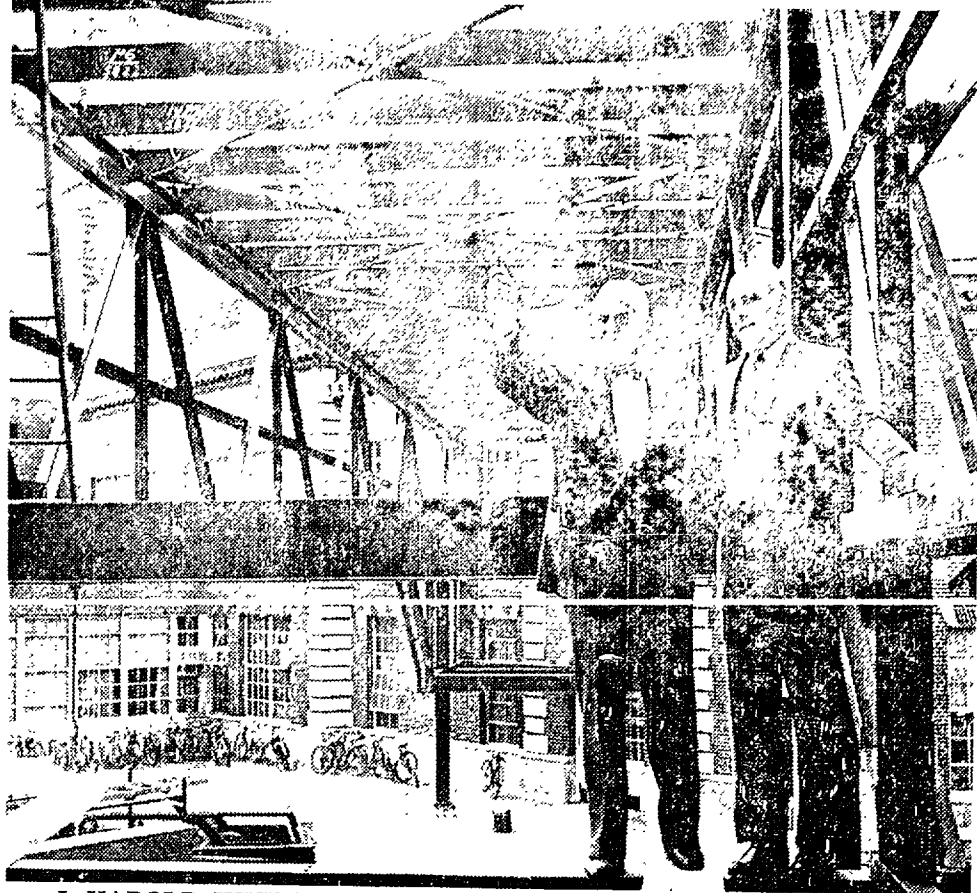

Park Wins Special Citation

A Special Citation in the American Automobile Association's (AAA) National Pedestrian Protection competition, for 1960, was presented to the Park on Monday, July 10, by GEORGE MEASEL (left) manager of the Pointe AAA branch, Jefferson and Somerset. The Park competed against 577 other U. S. cities in the 10,000 to 25,000 population class for top honors. The plaque, shown being presented to POLICE CHIEF ARTHUR LOUWERS (center) and MAYOR KENNETH CUNNINGHAM, represents the equivalent of third place in accepted standards for cities of the Park's size in six of seven phases of contest judging. The Park has gone through three years without a pedestrian death, although injuries have risen from 10 in 1959 to 13 in 1960. A letter from Gov. John Swainson congratulated the Park for its achievement.

Man Sought As Car Thief

Eric Schmidt, 29, no known address, was surprised in a home of a neighbor of his parents by his brother, after Eric broke into the house.

Park Det. Lt. Arnold Hough stated that Eric, who does not live with his parents, broke into the home of Dr. Alexander Peat, 1350 Devonshire, Friday night, July 14.

Dr. Peat and his family were away, and Eric's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Schmidt of 1342 Devonshire, good friends of the Peats, were watching the Peat house in their absence.

Eric's brother, Robert, 18, went to the Peat property about 1 a.m., to check the premises, and discovered that a basement window had been broken. Robert looked in the window of the house and saw his brother, who was talking on the telephone.

Robert ran home and told his father, who called police and then went to the Peat home to talk to Eric. While talking to his father, Eric turned and fled, jumped a rear fence and escaped before police arrived.

Lt. Hough said that Dr. Peat revealed that \$10 was missing from a bureau drawer in the house, and that Eric apparently consumed some food, and all the beer in the kitchen refrigerator. However, Dr. Peat said he would not sign a complaint.

Nevertheless, Lt. Hough said, Eric is being sought on a warrant charging him with unlawfully driving away an automobile that belongs to his former employer.

The employer, Lowell Lindquist of 1098 Beaconsfield, called police on June 25, and informed them that Eric had taken his car without permission. Lindquist stated that the car was used by him, and his former employe, during working hours, but Eric took the car in the evening. The keys to the vehicle were in the owner's house, and it is believed that Schmidt took them.

The car was recovered on June 27, when Eric went to his parents' home for some money. His mother took the car keys away from him, after which the son fled.

Mrs. Schmidt called Lindquist, who took possession of the keys and the car, and notified Park authorities that he wanted to sign a complaint against Eric.

Eric's whereabouts is still unknown, Lt. Hough said.

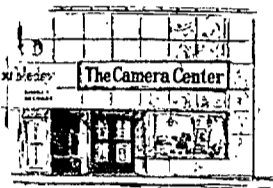

Subdivisions in Woods Get Council's Attention

The Woods council approved the plat for the Woods Estate Subdivision No. 2 at their meeting Monday night. The approval will be final when the surveyors, Warner and Warner, pay the incidental plat and inspection fees.

In other action the council directed City Engineer Laurence H. Pate and City Attorney Julius Berns, to prepare

specifications and take care of legal matters for the proposed relief sewer down Sunningdale to the Hidden lane sewer.

The Woods would like to get an easement from the Lochmoor Club so that the sewer could run along the south line of the club and east to the Hidden lane sewer.

A spokesman for the club has indicated that it would probably approve the Woods plans provided that the club could use the sewer without paying for the services and that its construction would not interfere with the club's golf activities.

This is acceptable to the Woods. Relief is necessary for the sewer system in the Vernier road area before any further plats can be approved. If the Sunningdale sewer is approved, then the council can go ahead and approve the Yacht Club Subdivision No. 5 which has been held up since November, 1959. Council approval of the plat is expected at its next meeting, August 7.

Toddler Drowns In Pool at NYC

William Knight, two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Garland M. Knight, Jr., of Fairford road, was drowned July 12 in the swimming pool of the Detroit Yacht Club on Belle Isle.

His body was discovered in the deep end of the pool by Rickie Appel, 9, of Harper Woods. His friend, Robert Roach, 9, of 3445 Audubon, recovered the body.

Mrs. Knight told police that she, William's 6-year-old sister, Deborah, and William had been swimming together and she thought both children were following her as she left the pool.

When she missed her son in the locker room, Mrs. Knight ran back to the pool where she found Dr. Michael Zelenock trying to revive William with artificial respiration. The boy was dead on arrival at Alexander Blain Hospital.

Patrolman Robert Miller, of the Harbor Master Bureau, said he was told that there were between 30 and 50 persons in the pool at the time of the accident.

Funeral services were held Saturday followed by burial in White Chapel Memorial Cemetery.

Neither Beats Changing Light

Two motorists blamed a changing traffic light for a collision at Mack and Moross on Wednesday, July 12, for which both received violation tickets from Farms police.

Edmond Pots, 19, of 16096 Fairmont, Detroit, told police that he was making a left turn onto east bound Mack, from Moross, and observed the traffic light changing to amber. He said he did not see any traffic approaching and continued the turn.

Fire Protection Progress

Considerable progress has been reported on the setting up of a Mutual Aid Program for better fire protection in the City of Grosse Pointe, the Park and Farms. Representatives of the three municipalities have met to discuss the plan and official action on an agreement can be expected soon, it was learned.

John Mazer, present Commissioner of Public Safety of the City of Grosse Pointe, has initiated the present discussions which promise to bear fruit. An executive session of the City Council was held on May 24 last to hear Mr. Mazer's annual report, in which he argued strongly for a joint set-up which would be more efficient than the existing informal "assistance agreements," under which one municipality sends help to another when officially requested to during a serious fire.

At that meeting Mayor Frederick Parker, Jr. of the City appointed a special Public Safety Committee to work with the commissioner towards the end of getting the Farms and Park into a closer working agreement for fire protection. Mr. Mazer was instructed to act immediately and he arranged a meeting with City Manager Everitt B. Lane of the Park and City Manager Harry Furton of the Farms. This meeting was held on June 1 in the Park.

Mr. Mazer proposed that all three municipalities establish a plan under which four firemen and one piece of equipment from the other two cities would be dispatched to the immediate assistance of any of the three departments called to a fire. All agreed that this idea merited further study, and that the Shores, Woods and Harper Woods should also be contacted and consulted for advice.

Maden, executive secretary of the association, in a personal interview with Public Safety Commissioner John Mazer of the City of Grosse Pointe, stated that the members of his organization were endorsing this plan because it is a practical and positive approach towards solving one of the most serious problems that confront the citizens and taxpayers of this entire area.

Better Fire Protection Spearheaded by City Commissioner John Mazer; Six Area Communities Hope to Have Agreement Soon

Plans for mutual fire aid between the five Pointe communities and Harper Woods are nearing completion according to information disclosed by City Commissioner of Public Safety John Mazer, who is spearheading the movement.

Mr. Mazer said that the six communities are in the process of studying and working out a mutual aid plan for fire protection, and that already several meetings have been held on the subject.

The first meeting held on June 1, in the Park, was between Commissioner Mazer, Park City Manager Everitt B. Lane and Farms City Manager Harry Furton.

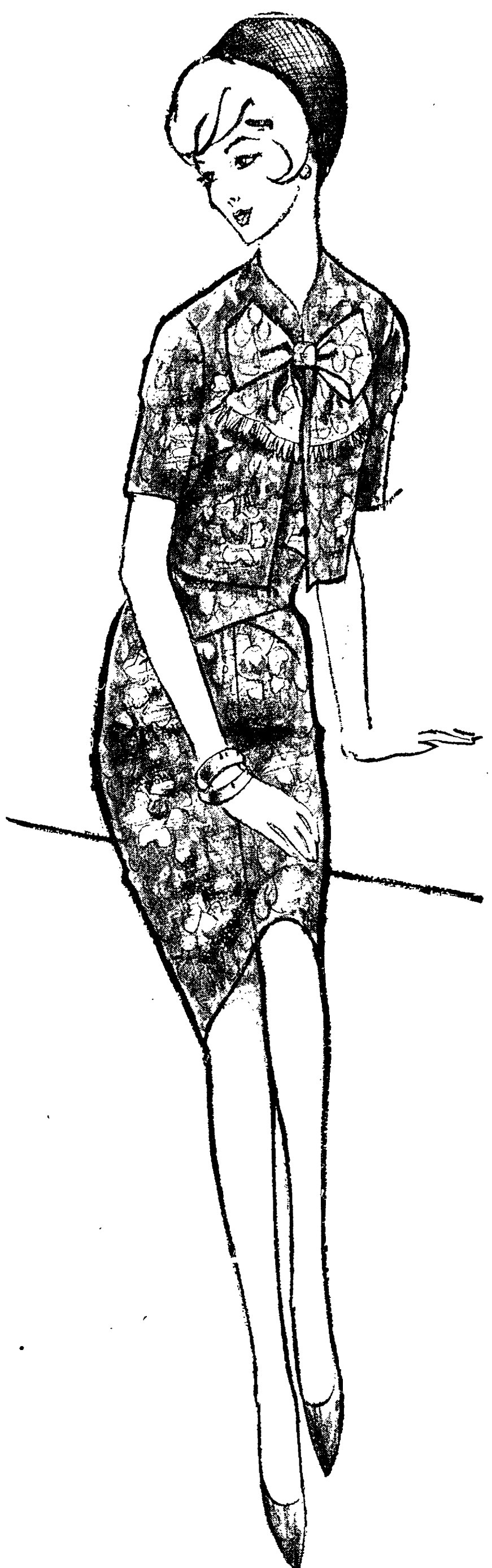

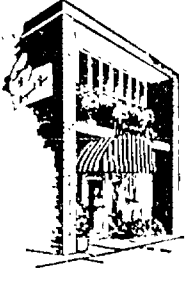
