

SCHOOL BELLS TO RING SEPT. 7

HEADLINES of the WEEK As Compiled by the Grosse Pointe News

Thursday, August 24
IN A NOTE to the United States, Britain and France, Russia protested against the use of air corridors to West Berlin for "subversive and revenge-seeking aims of West German militarists," the Soviet news agency Tass reported today. The first reaction of the Western powers was that the new Soviet note was a serious threat to their air route to the divided former German capital, 110 miles inside East Germany.

The note was delivered yesterday to the Western embassies in Moscow. It complained that the Western Powers are using the air corridors to fly spies and trouble-makers into West Berlin.

Friday, August 25
THE UNITED STATES Thursday warned the Soviet Union to keep its hands off the air corridors and land access routes to West Berlin. Reacting promptly to a Soviet note received Wednesday the White House said that "any interference by the Soviet Government or its East German regime with free access to West Berlin would be an aggressive act for the consequences of which the Soviet Government would bear full responsibility."

Saturday, August 26
MORE THAN 76,000 MEMBERS of the Army, Navy, and Air Force reserve forces were ordered by the Defense Department to active duty by October 1. The action was announced by Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara with the approval of President Kennedy.

Sunday, August 27
RUSSIA AND East Germany were sent seven separate protests and warnings from the Western allies Saturday over the Berlin situation. They included new warnings against Communist interference with Western air and land routes into West Berlin and a call for East Germany to reopen border points it has closed within the city. At the same time, Western officials reportedly were still encountering French reluctance against seeking East-West negotiations on Berlin.

Monday, August 28
THE TIGERS SWEEP a twin bill yesterday from the Washington Senators and once again are within two games of the league-leading New York Yankees. Rocky Colavito led the hitting attack with four home runs, three in the last game. The wins were the eighth and ninth in ten games for Detroit to keep the pressure on the Yankees. Also contributing to the Detroit assault (7-4 and 10-1) were Dick McAuliffe, Jake Wood, Norm Cash and Al Kaline.

Tuesday, August 29
GENERAL MOTORS CORP. will be the target of the United Auto Workers for setting the contract pattern for the Big Three. If GM does not come up with a better offer or if no real progress is made toward settling their disputes, the company will be struck at 12:01 a.m. Friday, when the Big Three contracts with the union expires.

Wednesday, August 30
BRAZIL'S TOP MILITARY chiefs issued a warning Monday to Joao Goulart not to return home to claim the presidency. The leftist Vice President's backers defied military leaders and sought to rally congressional and popular support behind him. Acting President Ranieri Mazzilli announced that the army, navy, and air force ministers had informed him that Goulart's return from Europe would be "absolutely inconvenient" and contrary to national security.

Board Asks Final Plans for Library Addition at GPHS

Proposal Made to Increase Facilities by Building Two Story Enlargement on Front of Present Quarters

General proposals for a two story addition to the present Grosse Pointe High School library, and construction of a Guidance Center at the High School were heard by the Board of Education on August 21 and the Board asked for finalized plans and concrete suggestions to be presented at the next meeting.

The proposed library addition is one of five suggestions which were made to increase space in the High School library.

Other suggestions which were considered included combining two rooms in the High School, constructing a second floor in the present library, converting the boys' gymnasium, and constructing a new library between the annex and the main building.

The Board will also receive plans for a Guidance Center to be constructed at a cost of \$25,000 at its next meeting.

10,500 Pupils Expected at 15 Buildings

Staff of 686 Teachers, Librarians, Specialists and Administrators to Be Ready

School days will resume in earnest next Thursday morning, September 7, for some 10,500 public school pupils. A full complement of 686 teachers, librarians, specialists, administrators, custodians and office workers, will be on hand to receive them in 15 bright and shining school houses located in the district.

A pre-school orientation program for teachers, new to the Grosse Pointe Public School system, gets underway today. Some 50 new teachers convened with Board Trustees and School Administrators to get a preview of what their jobs were, and what the School System had to offer them in the way of aids and advice.

Teachers Report First
Next Tuesday, all teachers, veteran and new-comer, will report to their respective buildings for further preparation and orientation. They will spend both Tuesday and Wednesday readying their rooms and their materials for the beginning of classes Thursday.

All Staff Members will come together in Parcels Auditorium at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, September 5, for a general meeting and kick-off of the new year. The featured speaker will be Dr. J. Ned Bryan of the United States Office of Education. His topic, a very timely one, will be "Meeting the Challenge of Able Youth." Mr. Weber and Superintendent Bushong will share the platform with the speaker, as will Kenneth Cook, President of the Teachers' Association and Chairman of the meeting.

In a report to the Board of Education, last week, Superintendent Bushong referred to the excellent condition of all buildings and facilities. An extensive refurbishing and renovating program has been underway all summer and the rooms and equipment are all in tip-top shape, he said.

New Math Center

A newly constructed mathematics center will also be ready for use with the opening of school. Officials state that the center, which takes up all of the new third floor of the Industrial Arts Building and part of the second, should be complete and fully equipped in time for the first classes. A connecting overhead corridor between the main building and the Industrial Arts building will still need a few finishing touches, but should be ready for use soon after school opens.

An addition to Ferry School will not be ready the opening day. The six room addition is expected to be completed in several weeks. Several rooms of pupils will double up until the new rooms are available.

The Experience Workshop, now being conducted for the New Teachers, was innovative last year and was very successful. It replaces orientation procedures held some weeks after the opening of school in former years when newcomers would be released from their classroom duties to confer with specialists and administrators over common problems. It is felt that the pre-school familiarization procedures will enable the new teacher to adjust to the local situation sooner and easier, and with less interruption to the normal program.

Care for Newcomers
School officials report that orientation processes will continue to consist of more than these meetings and conferences. A practice of long standing in Grosse Pointe has been for each new-comer to be assigned to the care of a veteran associate in their building for guidance and necessary help. These latter persons lend every possible assistance, as do other members of the staff, on a day-to-day basis, and stand ready to assist as long as any need is evident.

Complaint Dept. Report

Jangled rudely out of the luxurious peace of a solitary work session in the office the other night, we picked up the phone to be challenged by a strident female voice. "I want to talk to the owner of this paper," she fairly snarled. Having been informed she was talking to one of the owners, she hissed hysterically that she was going to sue the sheet for every cent it has, then slammed up the receiver after delivering the sage, all-encompassing warning: "You better be careful what you print in that rag!"

We wouldn't know whether or not the lady (?) was plastered. We could be certain that she was plenty mad, and probably because one of our current issues had contained some item that struck uncomfortably home. This is not too rare an event in our lives. There aren't too long lapses between the threats we receive, usually having to do with lawsuits over the printed word. We are thankful to be able to report that so far, after nearly 21 years in business at the same stand, we have not been haled into court. This doesn't mean that we never make mistakes. Like everyone else, we are prone to commit our fair share. We hope we are quick to admit them and make amends in any way we can, usually by printing a correction and apology. In the great majority of cases the persons complaining are intelligent, understanding and indulgent.

The belligerent type assails us frequently enough, and in most cases the gripes concern our printing some story that doesn't paint a flattering picture of the character of a young son. The griper attempts to convey the impression that he is an adored, angelic character, completely incapable of doing any such thing as the news story relates. The facts show that he is more often the victim of the parents' neglect and his actions are the result of a lack of much-needed guidance and affection. The irate mother or father in these cases is much more upset about the tilting of their social apperant then they are about whatever consequences the child may suffer.

We have always tried to remain alert to harm which might be done a youngster by the printing of a story about some misdemeanor he may have committed. The number of reports about such activities which are available to use and which we do not print, far outnumber those which appear in this paper. We are largely guided in this by professional advice from the police and other authorities who have had far more experience than we have in such matters. Some youngsters, we are told, fear nothing quite as much as adverse publicity, and the publication of a comparatively mild wrongdoing will cause them to mend their ways before it is too late. The chronic law-flaunter, the committer of malicious vandalism and senseless destruction will always be given space in this paper. And very often it is just such publicity which will cause the outraged parent to take restrictive action which would not have been necessary had he or she performed their duties to their children in the first place.

One of the most common beefs against this and most other newspapers, is that they always print the bad things about youngsters, but pass up the good ones. In our case, we are happy to say that this just isn't true. If anyone wants to argue, we'll be glad to bet, on a two-to-one basis with us giving the odds. For every item about a boy who has done wrong, there are dozens of names of youngsters who have earned honors in scouting, for scholastic achievements, in sports, school and church activities, ad infinitum.

We are great believers in youth, and we have the utmost admiration for, and the greatest confidence in, our future leaders. The rotten apple in the barrel gets top billing and the Dillingers and Baby Face Nelsons command plenty of ink. But remember that a lot of this is spread to convey the message that a sorry end awaits him who fails to conform to the edicts of decency and follow the rules laid down by a civilized and orderly society.

What Goes On at Your Library

by Jean Taylor

Between two and a half and three million young Americans will be in college this September. A fair percentage of these are freshmen, who may or may not find themselves with a diploma four years from now. For them this year is a period of adjustment which some will take easily in their stride, through which some will flounder before finally triumphing, and with which some never will come to terms.

Books covering various angles of college life should be of help to those who look forward to a college career. Knowing in advance some of the pitfalls to be faced as well as the delights to be garnered from these four years, should make the sledding easier. The final choice of a school may have to be delayed until shortly before High School graduation, but much of the groundwork may be laid at least a year ahead of time.

"How to Plan for College and What to Do When You Get There" by John W. Reynolds, is a general introduction to colleges and campus life. This discusses choice of schools, entrance requirements, loans, scholarships, fraternities, sororities, college clothes and general conduct on the campus. An informal guide, it stresses the educational rather than the social opportunities of a college career.

"The Adventure of Learning in College" by Roger H. Garrison, with subtitle "An Undergraduate Guide to Productive Study," aims to aid the freshman in making the transition from his high school and home environment to the more independent maturity of college life.

For the student who is thinking ahead to college, Eugene S. Wilson and Charles A. Bucher have written "College Ahead: A Guide for High School Students and Their Parents." This tells how to discover your strengths and weaknesses, how to match your qualifications to colleges and how to apply. Benjamin Fine's book "How to be Accepted by the College of Your Choice" covers something of the same ground in much greater detail. An edition of this book is now on order.

Another book of solid guidance for High School students and their parents is "Four Big Years." Here you will find advice on selecting a college according to the interests, capabilities and finances of the applicant.

Jack Engeman's "College — the Life of a Student" offers a cursory survey of campus activities which makes enjoyable browsing for the prospective freshman. The text is brief and is accompanied by some 250 captioned photographs describing various aspects of student affairs.

A different approach to the academic life is evidenced in A. C. Spector's "The College Years." A compilation of essays and short stories by such authors as Thomas Wolfe, Henry Adams, J. P. Marquand and James Thurber, this has a nostalgic appeal for those who have been rather than those who are going to college.

If there are a few hurdles to be considered in the transition from high school to college, there are also new and different problems confronting the teenager just entering high school.

"So You're in High School" by Mary Elizabeth Dejen and Erwin W. Dejen is a clearly written, well organized account of high school life, its programs, relationships with classmates and teachers, study habits and the advisability of part-time jobs.

For these students too, Harold E. Brown has written a book, "This is the Way to Study," which should help these young people to develop good learning habits.

More than 1,000 persons have received certificates in real estate from The University of Michigan during the past 13 years.

August 21, 1961

Meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M.

Present on roll call: Mayor William F. Connolly, Jr., Councilmen Henry E. Bodman II, William G. Butler, Thomas K. Fisher, William G. Kirby and Edward C. Roney Jr.

Absent: Councilman Ledyard Mitchell, Jr. Mayor William F. Connolly, Jr., presided. Councilman Mitchell was excused from attending the meeting.

Minutes of the regular meeting of August 7, 1961, were approved as submitted.

Reports of the Building Department, Police Department and Fire Department for the month of July, 1961, were received and ordered filed.

The final plat of the Richard M. Kimbrough Subdivision No. 3 was approved, and a surety bond required to guarantee the subdivision improvements was set at \$13,553.00 and the related inspection fee set at \$271.06.

An amendment to the Traffic Ordinance was enacted.

Acting on the complaint from Richard T. Hasse, of 251 Kenwood Court, relative to the vibration of his residence, claimed to be caused by the condition of the pavement on Charlevoix Avenue, the Council ordered that any voids found to be under the pavement be filled, and that the curb in front of 249 Kenwood Court be replaced.

A proposal received from Ernst & Ernst for making a study of the Public Works Department was not accepted by the Council in that it did not conform with the Council's understanding, and they were requested to resubmit their proposal.

Approval was given to install two street lights at the curve on Radnor Circle.

A report relative to the feasibility of obtaining competitive bids on gasoline, and the feasibility of installing an underground gasoline storage tank with a capacity of approximately 10,000 gallons, was received, and the City Manager was requested to make a further study of the matter and to submit his report to the Council at the next meeting.

Amendment to Traffic Ordinance

ORDINANCE NO. 148

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3 (a) AND (b) OF THE TRAFFIC ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS, BEING: AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE OPERATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES AND BICYCLES, AND TO REGULATE VEHICULAR TRAFFIC AND RELATED MATTERS AND TO REPEAL ORDINANCES NO. 52, 58, 67 AND 78.

The City of Grosse Pointe Farms Ordains:

Section 1. Section 3 (a) of the Traffic Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 101, adopted February 16, 1953, as since amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 3 (a) The following streets shall be designated through streets, and stop signs shall be placed and maintained on each street intersecting such through streets:

"Lake Shore Road from (and including) Fisher Road to northerly city limits.

"Grosse Pointe Boulevard from (and including) Fisher Road to Moross Road.

"Kercheval Avenue from (and including) Fisher Road to northerly city limits, except for stop intersection at Moross Road.

"Ridge Road from (and including) Fisher Road to Moross Road, except for stop intersections at Kerby Road.

"Charlevoix Avenue from (and including) Fisher Road to Kerby Road.

"Beaupre Road from (and including) Fisher Road to Moross Road, except for stop intersections at Moran Road and Kerby Road.

"Chalfonte Avenue from (and including) Fisher Road to northerly city limits, except for stop intersections at Fisher Road and Moross Road.

"Mack Avenue from (and including) Fisher Road to northerly city limits.

"Kerby Road from Lake Shore Road to Mack Avenue, except for stop intersections at Grosse Pointe Boulevard, Kercheval Avenue and Chalfonte Avenue.

"Moross Road from Lake Shore Road to Mack Avenue, except for stop intersection at Kercheval Avenue."

Section 2. Section 3 (b) of the Traffic Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 101, adopted February 16, 1953, as since amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 3 (b) In addition to the above, the following intersections shall be designated stop intersections and stop signs shall be placed and maintained at such stop intersections:

"Kercheval Avenue and Moross Road—stop when entering from either street.

"Ridge Road and Kerby Road—stop when entering from Ridge Road.

"Ridge Road and Moross Road—stop when entering from Ridge Road.

"Charlevoix Avenue and Kerby Road—stop when entering from Charlevoix Avenue.

"Beaupre Road and Moran Road—stop when entering from Beaupre Road.

"Beaupre Road and Kerby Road—stop when entering from Beaupre Road.

"Chalfonte Avenue and Fisher Road—stop when entering from either street.

"Chalfonte Avenue and Moross Road—stop when entering from Chalfonte Avenue.

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Freeway Speed Limits Raised

New speed limits will take effect September 8 on more than 500 miles of Michigan freeway. The new maximum limits will be 70 miles an hour during the day and 60 at night. They will replace existing maximum speed limits of 65 and 55. State Highway Department Traffic Division Director Harold H. Cooper said today the new limits will apply only on freeways — divided highways which can be reached only at interchanges.

"Non-freeways, such as divided US-27 north of Lansing, will qualify only when they are brought up to freeway standards," Cooper said. "Existing speed limits will remain in effect on freeways in major cities such as Detroit."

More than 200 freeway speed limits will be replaced or revised before the new limits take effect next month. Of these, about 80 existing signs, measuring 24 by 30 inches, will be replaced by new signs measuring four by five feet while overlays showing the new speed limits will be placed on more than 120 existing four by five-foot signs.

Cooper said the cost of the changeover will be an estimated \$7,500. Daytime and nighttime limits will be on a single sign and motorists will only see the higher limit during the day and only the lower limit at night.

"This is done through the use of three materials," Cooper said. "First, we have a reflective material that appears black during the day and white at night. We also use a plain white paint that looks white during the day and appears black at night."

"Then there is another material that appears white during the day and white at night. This combination gives us a sign with the daytime and nighttime limits overlapping," Cooper said.

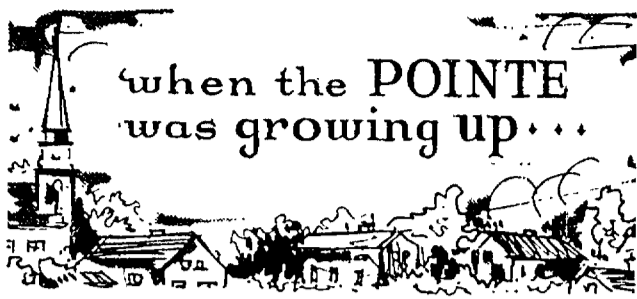
The change in freeway speed limits was approved three months ago by the Michigan Legislature.

Two thousand three hundred students at the Grosse Pointe High School, the present enrollment, would seem an unbelievable number to Pointers in the 1920's.

One of the reasons against the present location of the school, on the old Country Club golf course, was that all that land wasn't necessary.

The Grosse Pointe Country Day school, a private institution which began in Mrs. Paul Deming's attic, had grown by leaps and bounds and branched into the ivy twined brick building which is now the public high school annex, in 1922.

Some of the trio's reasons against the Country Club land seem laughable today. They said the site did not represent the center of the population, that there were not enough students who needed the school and the noise of the students when they did attend would depreciate neighboring property.

Dwyer's father, a farmer's son and factory apprentice, had come to Detroit in the 1850's and founded a stove company with fellow Country Club members, DuCharme and Barbour.

His cousin, Mary Dwyer, was married to Dan Crowley, member of the great merchant family and also a stove company officer.

The 22 acres of land finally decided upon after John Kerby's successful fight to bring the Pointe school consolidation was part of the Fisher farm which extended back to Mack avenue.

The school was planned to accommodate 1,500 (the present Conant report stresses this number as the smallest possible for a successful modern high school).

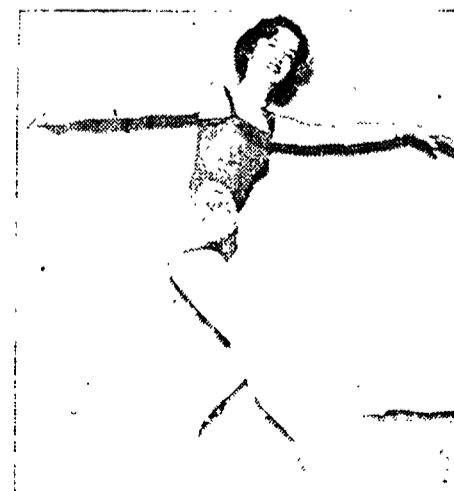
