Thursday, December 7 DETROIT MAYOR - ELECT Jerome Cavanagh has offered the job of Detroit police commissioner to Supreme Court Justice George Edwards. Edwards, who had told Cavanagh that he wants the job, has not yet officially accepted his new position. He thinks "the office of police commissioner of Detroit is one of the most important in the State of Michigan and a tremendously challenging one", but loves his work as Supreme Court Justice and considers that "it, too, is tremendously important". The liberal ex-labor organizer has promised his final decision on the offer within the week.

PRESIDENT KENNEDY, speaking Wednesday before a conference of the National Association of Manufacturers in New York, called for a "new and bold" program of tariff reductions between the United States and the European Common Market. Kennedy said tariff reductions are necessary if the North Atlantic Treaty Organization nations are to maintain their economic lead over the nations of the Communist

The industrialist audience listened to the President's speech with little apparent hostility and, although none of the businessmen was completely in favor of all of Kennedy's proposals, most were at least re ceptive to weighing the new program on its merits. The President wishes to scrap the Reciprocal Trade Act when it expires next year.

An Open Letter to the Citizens of Grosse Pointe Woods from Woodrow W. Woody:

This vital message concerns our community future. On Monday, November 27, 1961, the City Council denied my rezoning petition by a 5 to 2 vote, thereby denying the construction of the beautiful million dollar "Hillcrest Co-operative Manor." The proposed site is adjacent to the N.E. corner of Vernier and Mack and has 563 fuot frontage on Vernier with 312 feet deep.

The zoning law on this parcel is antiquated and inadequate. It detracts from the standard required in our city. This choice parcel is currently zoned for minimum single homes and minimum restrictions. It requires lots of 5000 square feet, homes of 720 square feet, with building materials such as clapboards, shakeshingle, asbestos siding and frame. This site could be platted into 27 homes which obviously would be mortgaged thru G.I. or F.H.A. financing.

I intend to again petition the Council for their serious re-consideration to elevate this parcel to its highest and best use. At the Council's request, I have produced "scale models," "designing plans" and "zoning laws" to permit the construction of the prestige "Hillcrest Manor." I seek your assistance in this matter. ance in this matter. Please write or call your Councilman and tell him you want nothing but the best for our community.

The judges' program again this year will be supported by an educational campaign spearheaded by the Traffic Safety Association. More than 2,400 posters with the message "Drunk Drivers Go To Jail" have been erected on streetside standards throughout the metropolitan Detroit area and the state. And 12,000 TSAdistributed by Detroit Police Department precinct traffic officers for placement in bars and other liquor-dispensing establishments.

A special 25-minute radio program on the drunken driving problem, produced by the Traffic Safety Association, will dren, be heard over Station WKMH Ser on Monday, December 18, from 7:05 to 7:30 p.m.

In a statement, Judges Mur-phy and Watts said that during December the greatest traffic menace of all is the intoxicated driver.

"Drunken driving is a greater offense during December than at any other time because of the high accident potential that exists during this particular month," the judges said. "Unfortunately and Ironieally, the consumption of alcoholic beverages in Detroit as elsewhere reaches a peak with the approach of Christmas and the New Year.

"We have been gratified by the steady decerase in pre-Christmas office drinking parties in this city during the last several years-parties which all too often led to drunk driving accidents. But we suspect that liquor will flow rather freely during the next few weeks in Detroit homes, clubs and wherever people assemble in festive spirit," the judges said.

They pointed out that convicted drunken drivers, in addition to receiving straight jail sentences, would also lose their licenses to drive for at least 90 days, under State law.











### **Experts Expect** More Flu Cases

Michigan residents can probably expect an increase in flu eases this fall and winter warned State Health Commissioner, Dr. Albert E. Heustis, who urged people considered poor health risks to consult with their physician about flu shots.

He recommended immediate vaccination of persons with heart or pulmonary disease, diabetes and other chronic illness; persons over 65; and pregnant women. Those who have not had previous influenza shots should have a second injection

People in these categories were the primary victims among the 657 deaths attributed to the flu during the past four years in Michigan, the commissioner explained. In a great many other deaths, the onset of influenza was a significant contributory factor.

"Many of these deaths could have been prevented by vac-cination," Dr. Heustis said. But once influenza appears in the community, it is too late to protect high risk groups. "The various strains of in-

fluenza usually strike in fairly consistent cycles, but we are overdue for Type B flu outbreaks, which come in four to six year cycles, and we may be in for a major assault from Asian flu, which usually strikes every two to three years."

The commissioner recommended routine annual' immunization against influenza for high risk groups, as well as infants, those responsible for the care of the sick, and those providing essential public services.

Dr. Heustis extended one word of caution concerning flu shots, however. He advised persons sensitive to eggs, chickens, or feathers to inform their physician of this fact and be guided by his advice as to whether or not they should receive the vaccine.

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
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
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## Merry, Merry Madness

Mc-Clellan Committee . . . where he has incurred the enmity of nany labor bosses despite his constant opposition to monopolistic labor practices. This opposition extends to business and government as well as labor.

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## Tree Buying At Marquette U. Time Is Here

The Christmas trees have been arriving on the lots ready for sale to you. There is a good selection purchase your tree early then store it out of doors

There are several varieties of trees on the market, some kinds are noted for longer keeping quality and greater beauty. The most popular and readily

available Christmas tree is the Scotch Pine. You can identify this tree by its needles which are 1-3 inches long and grow two in a cluster. The needles are sharp and branches grow in definite whorls. These are grown on planta-

tions in northern Michigan and most of them have been pruned and shaped for several years. The needles will not drop off the tree and the color will stay bright green if it receives water while in the house. Select Mary L. Bruton of 280 Stephens a tree with a straight trunk and with branches starting high berton; and Glenn A. Karle of enough so you can insert it in a tree stand without moving lots of branches. Limbs become brittle in cold weather, avoid broken limbs. Trees flattened from hauling usually recover their shapes.

Scotch pines often yellow is not harvested at the right time. They should be cut in late October or early November. Other common varieties are

the Balsam Fir and the Spruces. The Balsam Fir tree has a good color, pleasant odor, and needle-holding ability. These grow wild in northern Michigan. They may be cut from the tops of large forest and swamp trees. The boughs of this variety are excellent for decorations. To identify a Balsam Fir examine the needlesthey will be 11/2 inches long, one-in-a-cluster. The twigs and branches often appear flat. When crushed the needles have odor.

The Spruces are the old traditional Christmas trees. Spruces have a short 11/2 inch long needle, one-in-a-cluster. The crushed needles give off an unpleasant odor. The tree branches or twigs are covered with needles. The Spruces drop needles very readily, so they must be cut fresh.

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



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

His statue dominates Washington boulevard and a state county is named for him, but General Alexander Macomb seems a shadowy historical figure.

The first graduate of West Pointe, a friend of Alexander Hamilton, a veteran of frontier Indian fighting at 18, he became General in Chief of the Army of the

Gen. Macomb was born in Detroit in 1782 in an old log house near the stockade walls. His mother was Catherine Navarre, of the French royal notary's family, and his father, Alexander Macomb, a Scotch fur trader.

He grew up in New York state and at 16 volunteered in the company of New York Rangers, then through the good offices of Alexander Hamilton, first Secretary of the Treasury and former aide de camp to George Washington, he joined the Light Dragoons. He was the first alumnus of the new Military Academy at West Point.

In 1803 he returned to Detroit and married his cousin, Catherine Macomb, daughter of William Macomb, who owned vast property on Grosse Ile and Belle Isle. The couple had 12 children, and the General, who loved all things Russian, named his dozen offspring for the royal Romanoffs.

Famous as the victor of Plattsburg in the War of 1812, he was briefly commandant of Detroit, and then General in Chief of the U.S. Army until his death in 1842. Aside from his military laurels the general was a cultured, well educated man. He wrote verse and

- Mrs. Arthur L. Evely
- 1 envelope plain unflavored gelatin
- 1¼ cups milk
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- ½ tsp. salt
- ½ cup light cream 1 tsp. rum flavoring
- 1 tsp. finely chopped maraschino cherries
- ½ cup chopped almonds baked pie shell or crumb crust

Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup cold milk. Scald remainder of milk ind add slowly beaten egg yolks. Add 1/2 cup sugar and salt combined. Cook in top of double boiler until of custard consistency, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, add gelatin, and stir until dissolved. Cool and add cream and rum flavoring. Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites to which remaining ½ cup sugar has been added, and chopped cherries. Pour into baked pie shell or crumb crust and chill until firm. Sprinkle top of pie with almonds just before serving.

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
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
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
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
