**Farms Submits  
Building Report**

Nine permits were approved by the Farms Building Inspection Department during the month of November, it was disclosed in a monthly report received from City Engineer Murray M. Smith.

One permit was for the construction of a \$26,000 residence at 187 Earl court; and eight were for miscellaneous construction, including a fallout shelter, valued at a total of \$24,000.

From January 1 through November 30, the total number of all types of building permits granted is 109, for buildings valued at \$2,301,250.

The Building Inspection Department approved 92 miscellaneous permits, valued at \$321,250; 11 for residential construction worth \$612,000; three for business places, valued at \$155,000; and three for nonassessable edifices valued at \$1,313,000.

**Mack to Head MDBF Division**

Donald F. Valley, general chairman of the Metropolitan Detroit Building Fund campaign, announced today the appointment of Wilber H. Mack, of 588 Lincoln road, as chairman of the Major Gifts, Group II, division.

Mack, who is executive vice-president of the Michigan Wisconsin Pipe Line Company and the American Louisiana Pipe Line Company, will be responsible for building an organization of volunteers to solicit funds from some 1,000 small and medium business firms in the Tri-County area.

In accepting the appointment, Mack explained that the Major Gifts, Group II, division was actually a continuation of the Building Fund drive which officially started last summer and had been interrupted in order that the annual Torch Drive could be conducted during its normal time period. He pointed out that a large portion of the 1961-65 objective of \$14,864,453 had already been subscribed through gifts from major corporations earlier this year.

"The rapid growth and redistribution of population during the last decade has made it extremely difficult, and in many cases impossible, for local health facilities to keep pace with increased needs and demands," Mack said.

"The MDBF will provide up to 40 per cent of the approximate \$36,000,000 cost of approved hospital projects, with the institutions themselves responsible for the remaining 60 per cent.

"Thus, the MDBF goal, together with the funds raised

by the hospitals from their own sources, will provide 784 new hospital beds, the relocation of 453 other beds in new facilities.

the replacement of 50 beds and the expansion and improvement of supporting services in seven existing hospitals and one new hospital. A portion of the fund also will be allocated toward the purchase of property for the proposed Medical Center."

Following his appointment, Mack plans to name eight co-chairmen to serve with him, each of whom will be in charge of soliciting teams which will begin solicitation early in January.

Mack noted that all contributors subscribing in accordance with fair-share formulae being developed by the MDBF will be given immunity for a period of five years from further requests for capital funds by the participating hospitals or agencies.

**An Open Letter**

An Open Letter to the Citizens of Grosse Pointe Woods from Woodrow W. Woody:

This vital message concerns our community future. On Monday, November 27, 1961, the City Council denied my rezoning petition by a 5 to 2 vote, thereby denying the construction of the beautiful million dollar "Hillcrest Co-operative Manor." The proposed site is adjacent to the N.E. corner of Vernier and Mack and has 563 foot frontage on Vernier with 312 feet deep.

The zoning law on this parcel is antiquated and inadequate. It detracts from the standard required in our city. This choice parcel is currently zoned for minimum single homes and minimum restrictions. It requires lots of 5000 square feet, homes of 720 square feet, with building materials such as clapboards, shakeshingle, asbestos siding and frame. This site could be platted into 27 homes which obviously would be mortgaged thru G.I. or F.H.A. financing.

I intend to again petition the Council for their serious re-consideration to elevate this parcel to its highest and best use. At the Council's request, I have produced "scale models," "designing plans" and "zoning laws" to permit the construction of the prestige "Hillcrest Manor." I seek your assistance in this matter. Please write or call your Councilman and tell him you want nothing but the best for our community.

Dean Fox, Bob Downen, Dick Halbert, Elliott Blank and John Randall represented Blue Hi-Y on the pre-Thanksgiving trip. Their sponsor, Mr. Erwin Richter, accompanied them on the study tour. Gold Hi-Y sent George Elling, Don Kolleth and Bill Harwell. Bill was the only junior among the group of seniors, who spent their first day, November 13, touring the UN buildings under the guidance of one of the 70 UN girl guides gathered from all corners of the globe.

United States, Russian and Danish missions were visited on the second day of the trip. While Kolleth and Downen toured the Russian mission, Elling and Harwell viewed American headquarters. The rest of the boys went to the Danish mission.

All were inundated with propaganda pamphlets. Students who talked with a Russian official report that he dodged some of their questions, making jokes instead of giving answers.

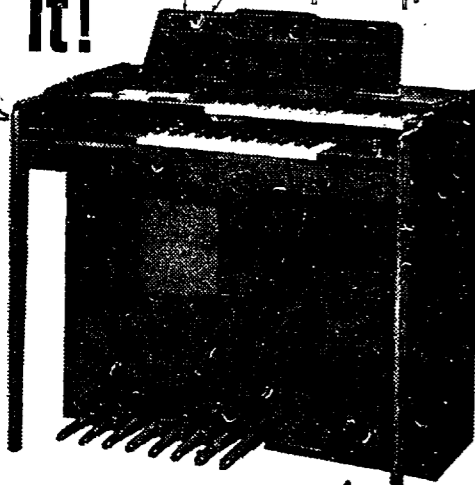

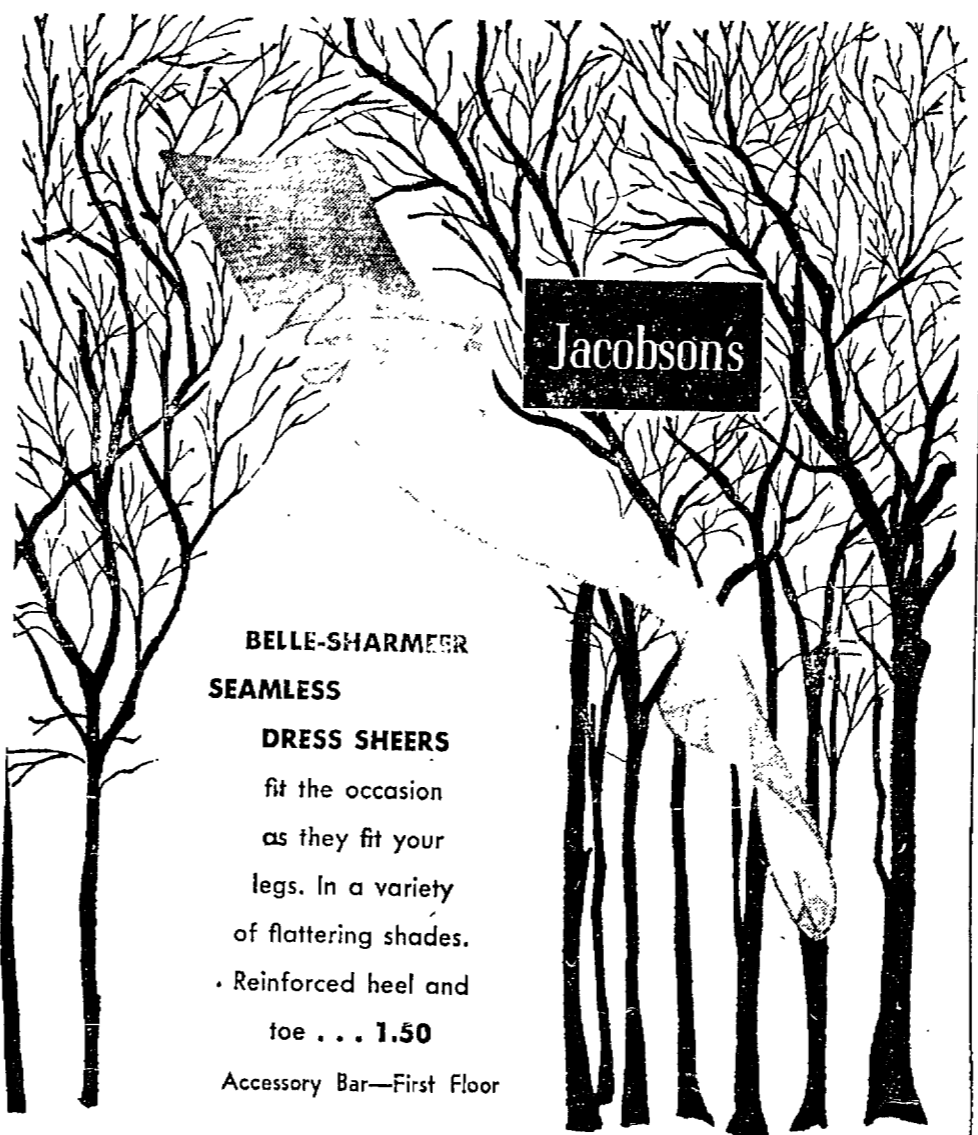
In addition, he is director and member of the Executive Committee, Associated Merchandising Corporation.

They sang a cowboy song in English which John had taught them. Some of the pen pals hope to come to the United States to see the local students someday.

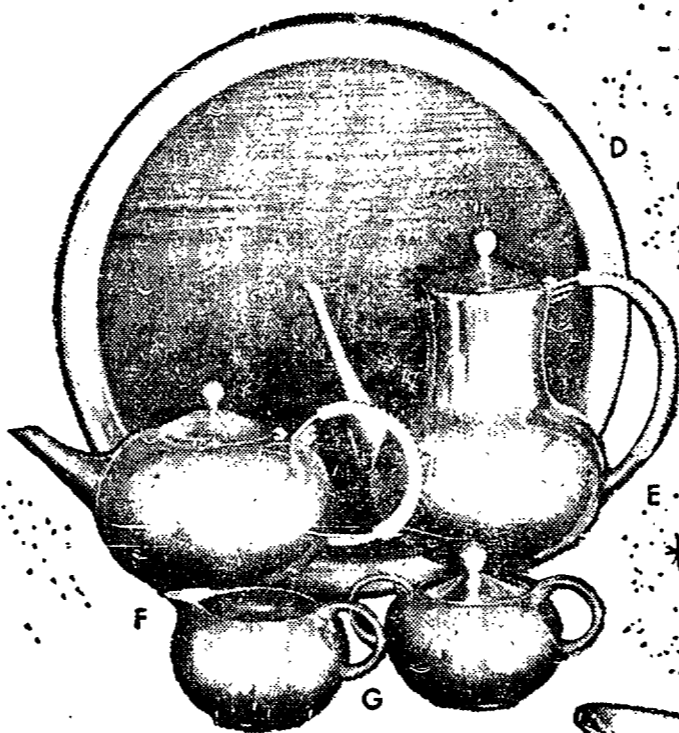

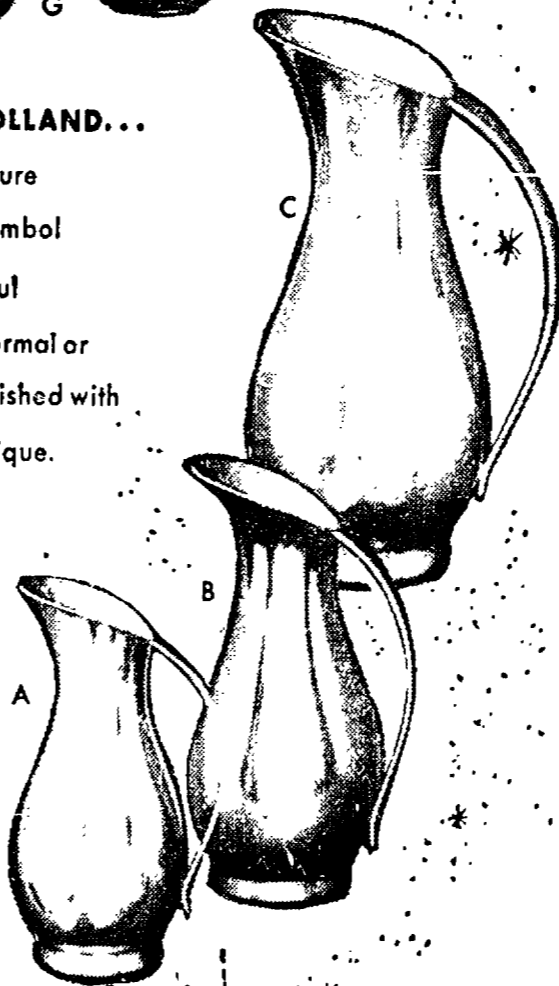

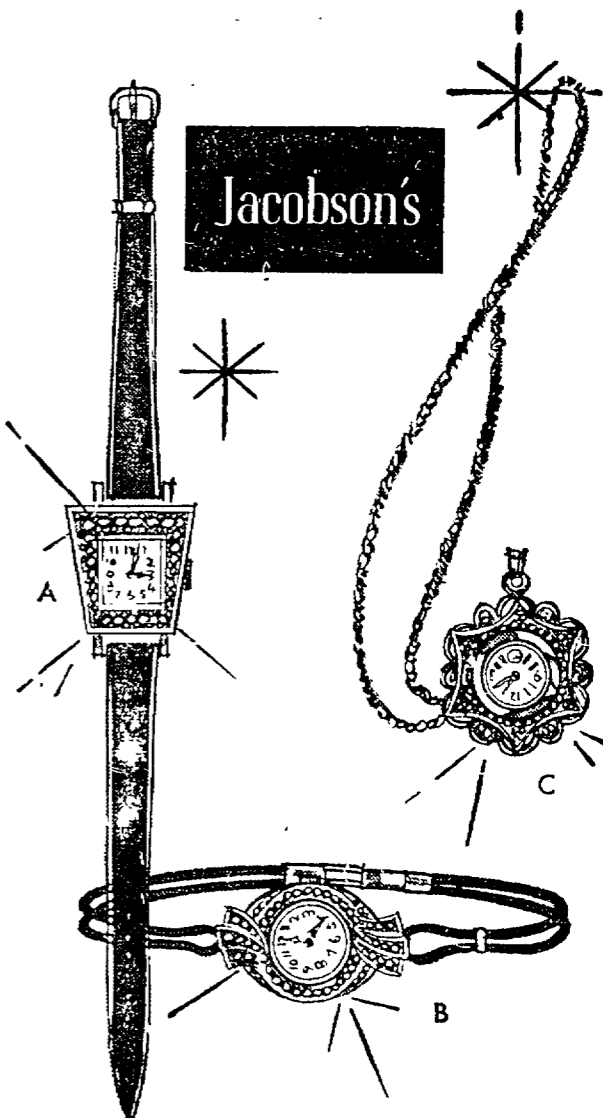

## Mervyn Gaskin Elected President of Auto Club

Mervyn G. Gaskin, a Grosse Pointe-area resident who has long been active in community affairs, has been elected president of Automobile Club of Michigan.

Directors re-elected for three-year terms were Baldwin, Bard, Diehl, Clarence E. Otter and Walters. There are also five other Grosse Pointe residents on the board. They are J. Gaskin has been an Auto Club member continuously since he purchased his first automobile in 1927, and has been a director for eight years. He is also a AAA national director.

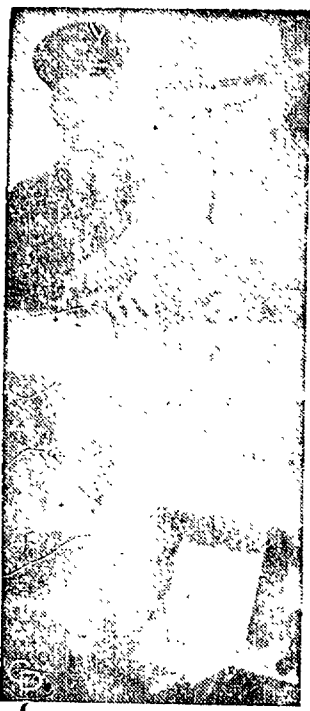

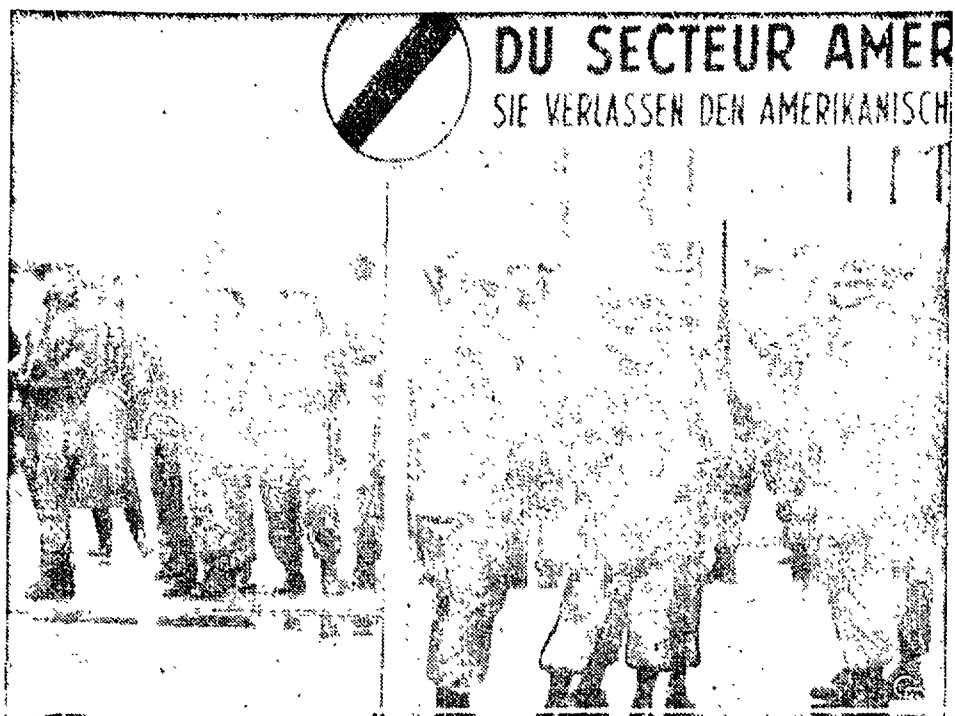

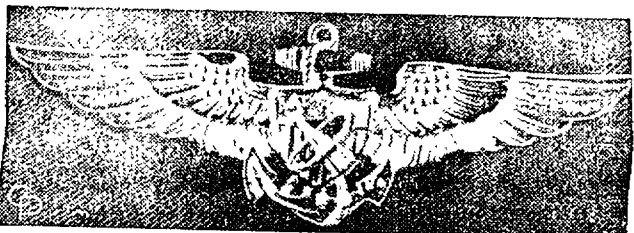

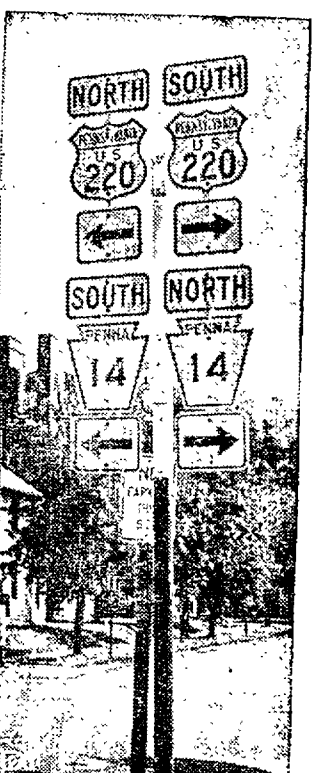

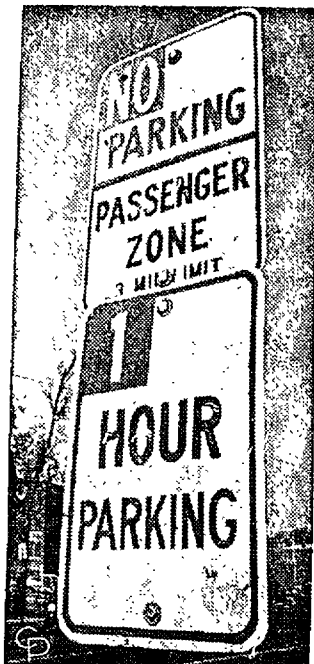

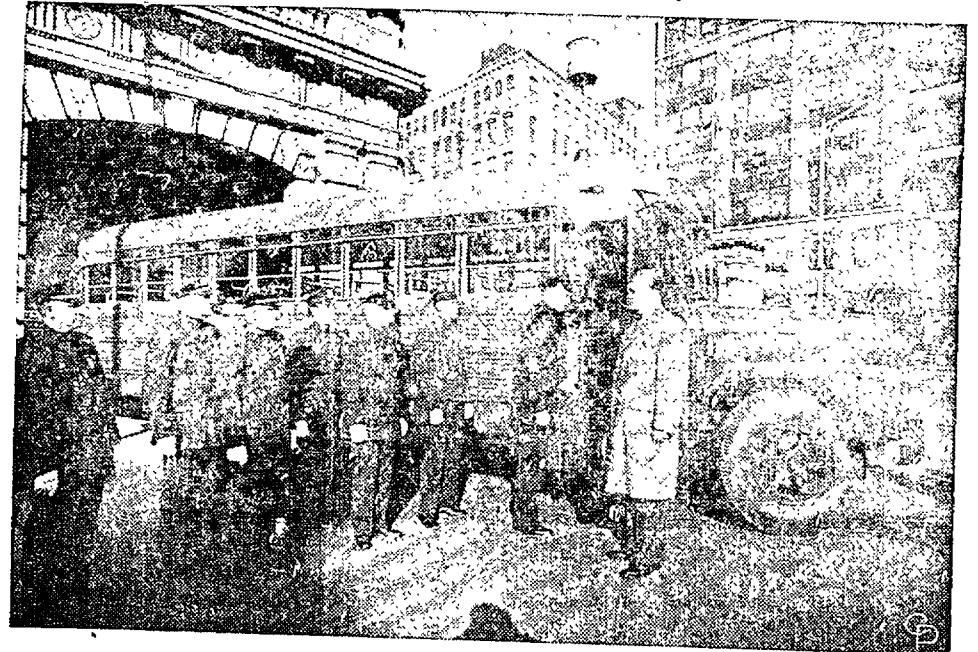

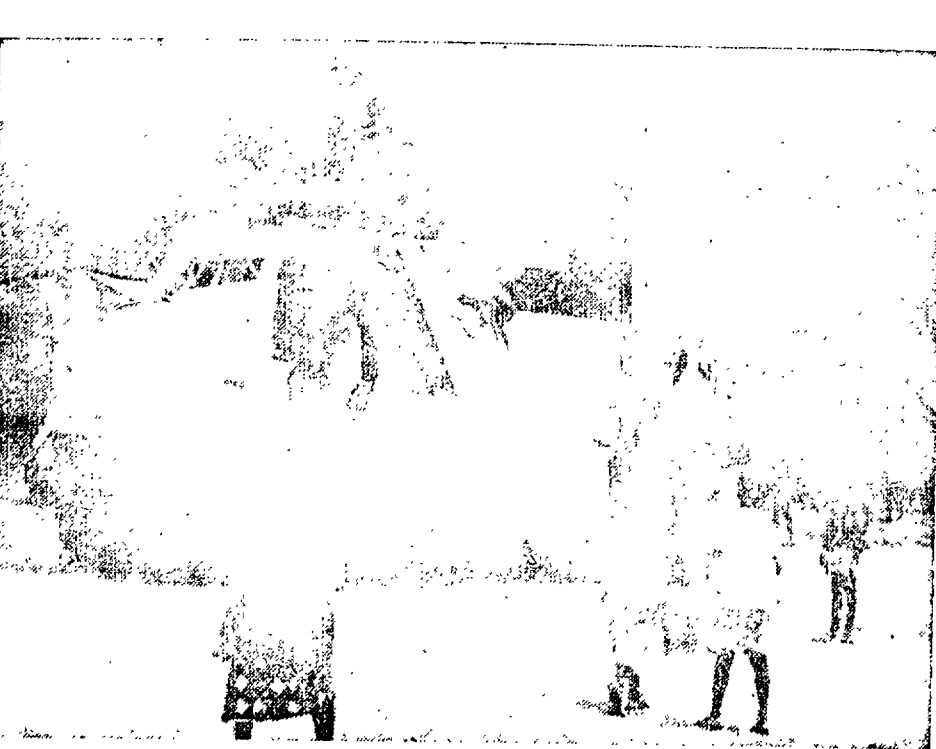

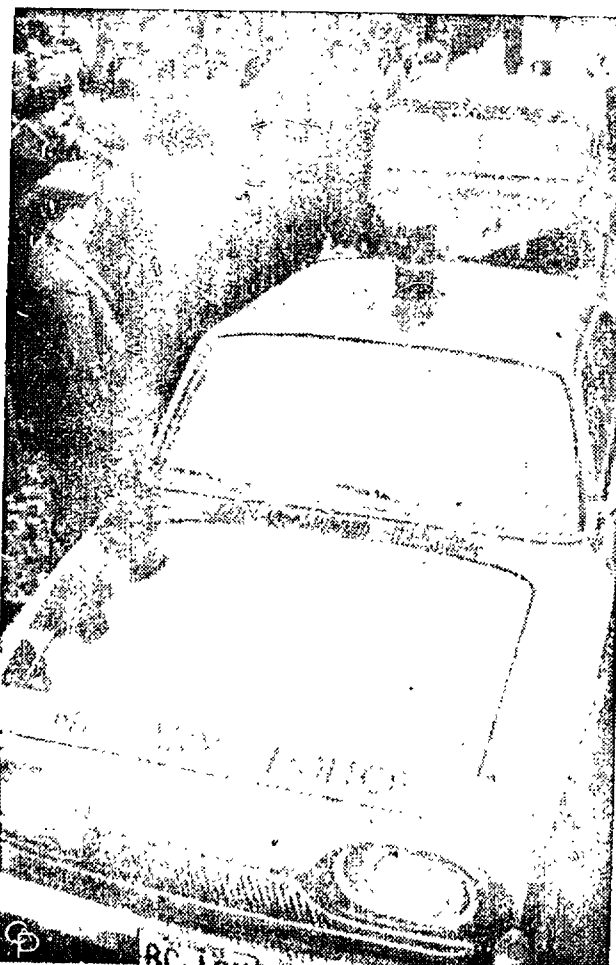

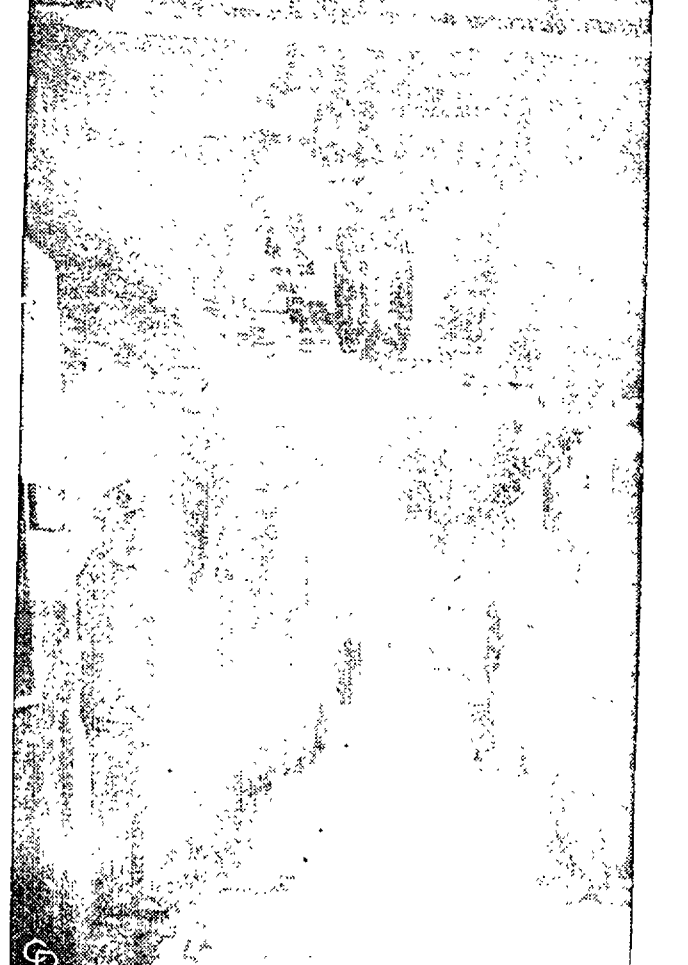

When the war ended he organized the Air National Guard in Arizona and now holds a commission as Brigadier General in the Air Force Reserve.

Goldwater was initiated into politics as a boy by his uncle who helped found the Democratic Party in the Arizona Territory. This influenced the boy . . . but not enough to make him a Democrat (although his brother succumbed). He registered as a Republican in 1929 and in 1949 was elected to the first of two terms in the Phoenix City Council.

In 1952 he ran for U. S. Senate and defeated Ernest McFarland, who was then Senate Majority Leader. In 1958 he again faced McFarland and despite an admitted Democratic trend, Senator Goldwater beat him by an amazing margin of more than 35,000 votes.

He is a member of the Senate's Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, Chairman of the Senate Republican Campaign Committee and a member of the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee. He has been a consistent advocate of meaningful labor legislation. He is probably best known for his membership on the Senate Select Committee on Improper Activities in the Labor or Management Field . . . McClellan Committee . . . where he has incurred the enmity of many labor bosses despite his constant opposition to monopolistic labor practices. This opposition extends to business and government as well as labor.

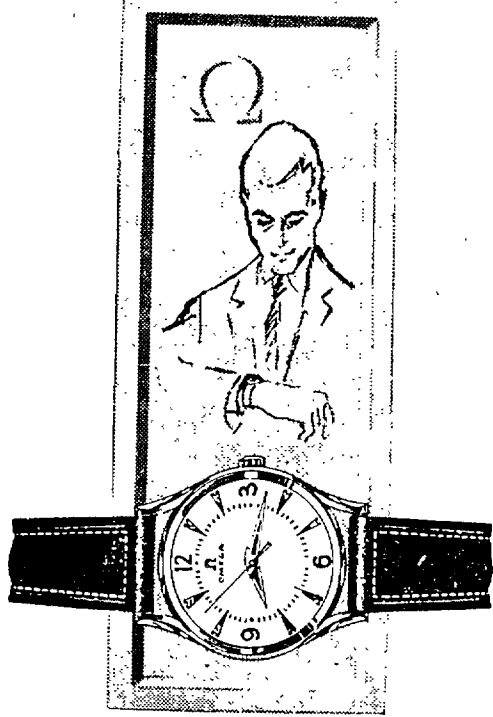

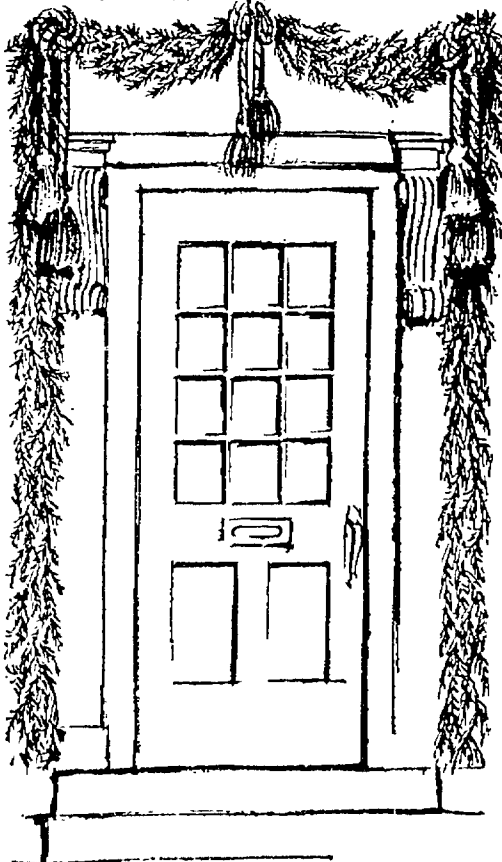

## League Shop Plans To Close Dec. 30

Detroit League for the Handicapped Shop in Birmingham to Shut Doors; Handicraft Now to Be Sold Through Local Shops

On the last shopping day of 1961, December 30, the League Shop in Birmingham, outlet for the work of the Detroit League for the Handicapped, will close its doors.

Founded in 1921 by the Junior League this shop is the last of several in the community to bow to the broader concepts of marketing the work of the home-bound handicapped. The articles will now be sold through local stores and shops.

The Junior League inaugurated the Detroit League for the Handicapped and sponsored its work for 10 years, when the League's retail sales enabled it to survive on its own merits.

Mrs. Stephen Stackpole was Junior League president when the need was felt "to provide the handicapped of Detroit with the means of earning a living wage and selling their products—or—to help the handicapped help themselves."

For 12 years the late Mrs. Henry B. Joy generously contributed space for this venture

in Newberry House on East Jefferson. Some of the volunteers who worked for the League in those days included Mrs. John Owen, III, Mrs. Sidney Miller, Jr., Mrs. Herbert Micou, Mrs. Ford Ballantyne, Mrs. Phelps Newberry, Mrs. J. Dwyer Kinnucan, Mrs. Lawrence Buhl and Mrs. Allen Sheldon.

There were sales at Easter and Christmas of bedspreads, blanket covers, baby articles, travel storage and toilet kits, toy animals, kitchen accessories and other beautiful household linens.

Volume of sales was increased at churches, clubs and then at special retail stores in downtown locations and in the suburbs. There was a League shop in Grosse Pointe as well as Birmingham. In 1945 the Junior League turned over to a community board the man-

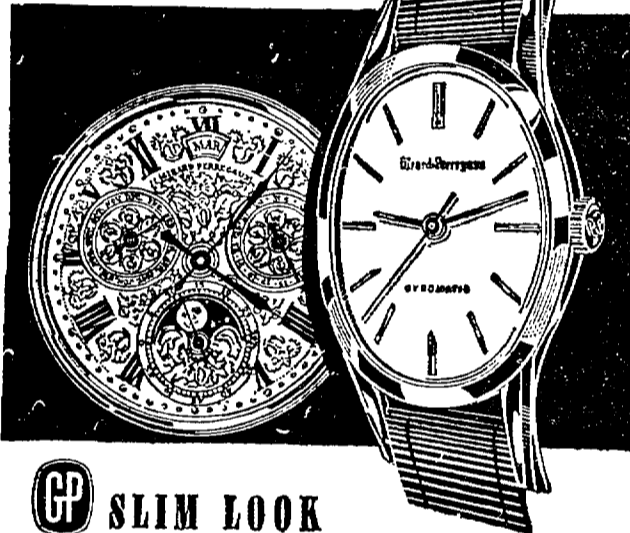

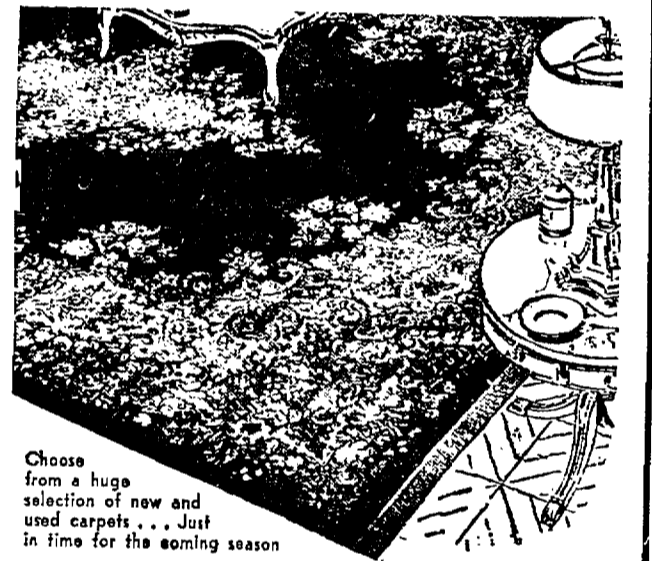

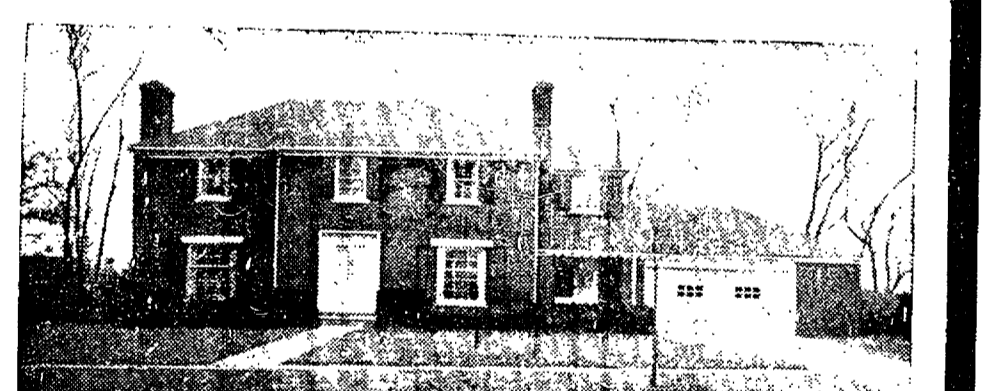

## Castor Beans Can Be Fatal

If you have castor beans in your yard or garden, the fruit should be picked and destroyed as soon as it appears, says a pediatrician at The University of Michigan Medical Center.

The beans, which begin to appear this time of year, can cause serious or even fatal poisoning if eaten by children. Dr. George H. Lowrey, associate professor of Pediatrics and director of the Hospital's Poison Control Center, declares that while no serious cases of castor bean poisoning have ever been treated at the center, the plant's bean-like seed can cause fatal poisoning if thoroughly chewed.

If swallowed whole, however, poisoning is unlikely because the hard seed coat prevents rapid absorption.

Symptoms of castor bean poisoning appear within one to three days after the bean is eaten and consist of vomiting, stomach pain, drowsiness and stupor. Death may occur within 12 days.

Many gardeners grow the castor bean plant because of its decorative appearance and large leaves. Because it is a quick growing plant, it is often used as a substitute for shrubs before more permanent bushes can be established around new homes.

Tree Buying Time Is Here

The Christmas trees have been arriving on the lots ready for sale to you. There is a good supply this year. For best selection purchase your tree early then store it out of doors in a pall of water.

There are several varieties of trees on the market, some kinds are noted for longer keeping quality and greater beauty.

The most popular and readily available Christmas tree is the Scotch Pine. You can identify this tree by its needles which are 1-3 inches long and grow two in a cluster. The needles are sharp and branches grow in definite whorls.

These are grown on plantations in northern Michigan and most of them have been pruned and shaped for several years. The needles will not drop off the tree and the color will stay bright green if it receives water while in the house. Select a tree with a straight trunk and with branches starting high enough so you can insert it in a tree stand without moving lots of branches. Limbs become brittle in cold weather, avoid broken limbs. Trees flattened from hauling usually recover their shapes.

Scotch pines often yellow if not harvested at the right time. They should be cut in late October or early November.

Other common varieties are the Balsam Fir and the Spruces. The Balsam Fir tree has a good color, pleasant odor, and good needle-holding ability. These grow wild in northern Michigan. They may be cut from the tops of large forest and swamp trees. The boughs of this variety are excellent for decorations. To identify a Balsam Fir examine the needles—they will be 1 1/2 inches long, one-in-a-cluster. The twigs and branches often appear flat. When crushed the needles have a distinctive Christmas tree odor.

The Spruces are the old traditional Christmas trees. Spruces have a short 1 1/2 inch long needle, one-in-a-cluster. The crushed needles give off an unpleasant odor. The tree branches or twigs are covered with needles. The Spruces drop needles very readily, so they must be cut fresh.

If you desire a Scotch Pine or Balsam Fir Christmas tree it may be purchased now, stored in water out-of-doors before Christmas.

Woods Police Inspect Bars

At their regular meeting on Monday, December 11, the Grosse Pointe Woods City Council received the report of Director of Public Safety Vern C. Bailey on his inspection of licensed liquor establishments in the Woods.

Director Bailey conducted an inspection of all licensed liquor establishments that dispense beer and liquor by the glass, and found conditions in each of them to be very satisfactory. His survey included the Grosse Pointe Hunt Club bar, the Lochmoor Golf Club and bar, the Woods Lounge and the Nightingale Lounge.

The Nightingale Lounge, which remains open until 2:30 a.m. daily, was recently cited by Michigan Liquor Control Commission inspectors for serving a minor, age 20, but the \$150 fine was suspended as the minor appeared to be older than his 20 years, 50 weeks actual age.

The licensees of Nightingale Lounge were assessed \$7.50 costs and warned against the serving of alcoholic beverages to minors.

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Pills May Dull Driving Ability

A distinguished group of physicians warned drivers that habituates tranquilizers, anti-histamines and other drugs taken commonly today can seriously impair their driving ability.

The doctors appeared on "Traffic Safety Report" over Station WYMH a program presented by the station in cooperation with the Michigan Safety Association and written and produced by Howard Cox, director of PSA staff.

Appearing on the program were Dr. John M. Sheffler, assistant at the University of Michigan Medical Center, Dr. Norman Hoffman, assistant physician, Detroit Edward Scott Clinic, Dr. Edward S. Zawadzki, Wayne County Medical Examiner, and Dr. Paul J. Jolly, deputy chief, Accident Prevention Division of the Michigan State Public Health Service.

They discussed the use of tranquilizers, anti-histamines, sedatives and other drugs, barbiturates, mooder drugs, pop pills and cold pills.

These were some of the conclusions of the study. The drugs could give a false sense of control.

Many who take such medication should not drive for at least four hours thereafter. Some can produce a lack of coordination and also in some cases, as well as a loss of depth perception.

They can make the task easier and also in some cases cause dangerous personality changes.

Metro Airport Expansion Starts

The Wayne County Road Commission announced today that it has begun work on a \$21-million expansion program at the Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport with the selection of the firm James H. Hinchman and Grylls Associates, Inc. to do the architectural work on a new terminal building and an addition to the existing terminal.

James M. Tacey, Airport Manager and Managing Director of the Wayne County Road Commission, said the expansion program will provide adequate space and facilities for the six airlines now using Willow Run Airport that have announced they will move their operations to the Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport.

The entire expansion program is scheduled for completion in 1964, when the airlines plan to move.

Included in the expansion program are the new terminal building, the addition to the present terminal building, and the new parking garage to serve the new terminal, field improvements and purchase of new land for future runway extensions.

The new terminal building and the expansion of the existing terminal will cost approximately \$11,000,000. The new building is expected to take \$9.5-million of this sum.

The new two-story terminal building will be located north of the present terminal with an air conditioned concourse connecting the two. The new building will be 400 feet long and 150 feet wide.

Two general hangars are located on the site of the new building. Dacey said they will be moved to the west side of the field. Other hangars are located.

Ford Homestead Interchange Site

The \$14 million interchange on Ford's 40-acre homestead carries a four-lane highway over a six-lane divided highway. The modern interchange, linking Ford and Greenfield roads, was opened to traffic at noon today.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said it will eliminate one of the worst traffic bottlenecks in the Dearborn area.

Honey Ford's parents, William and Mary, built a two-story frame home in 1903 and the interchange 100 years ago.

Ford was born two years later in 1905 and spent his childhood days on the farm and the dirt road in front of his home.

As Ford's cars came into being, the family home was moved 200 feet to make room for a new country road which is the site of today's Greenfield Road.

Later, as Ford gained fame and fortune from mass production of automobiles, the family home was moved again, this time to Greenfield Village, where it was restored.

The farm was turned over to the Ford Motor Co.

Ford was a consistent promoter of better highways to carry the wheels of progress he produced.

As a member of the first Wayne County Road Commission he was instrumental in plans in helping to build the first mile of concrete road in America.

Later, during development and expansion of highways in the Detroit area, Ford often made gifts of money to promote motor highways.

Today, millions of automobiles and a safe highway interchange to carry them are modern concepts of his life's work.

All persons who shall commit the crime of larceny by signaling from or in any dwelling house, boarding house, rooming house, tenement, office, store, business place, factory, service station, shop, warehouse, mill, factory, hotel, school, hospital, club, tavern, or any other place of worship, locker room or any building used by the person committing the crime of larceny as defined in Section 1 of the Ordinance.

Subsection Q. All persons who shall have in their possession, in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, any tool or instrument used for the commission of burglary, larceny, or for picking locks or pockets, or any articles used for gambling, or any property under false pretenses and who cannot give a good account for the possession of the same.

Section 2. All other Sections and Subsections of said Ordinance No. 11 shall remain in full force and effect and any person convicted of violating Subsections O, P, and Q set forth above shall be subject to the penalties set forth under Section 2 of said Ordinance No. 11.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its enactment or publication, whichever is later.

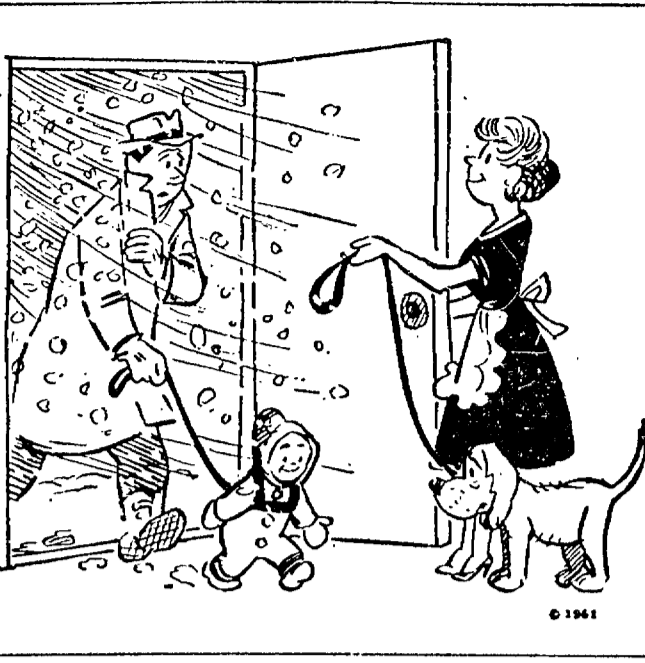

ized following the riot in which students threw stones, attacked two trucks and burned two cars. They shouted "Down With Kennedy" and "Long Live Castro." At least two newspaper columnists denounced the impending visit as "inadvisable" and one expressed doubt over the government's ability to protect the safety of President Kennedy.

**Saturday, December 9**  
THE HARTFORD HOSPITAL, Hartford, Conn., caught fire Friday; 15 persons were killed before the blaze could be extinguished. Flames, possibly caused by a cigarette butt tossed down a trash chute, flashed through the upper floors, causing the evacuation of nearly 500 patients from Connecticut's largest hospital. Rescue workers were still searching for the dead and injured an hour after the fire was reported under control. Dense smoke billowed through the 10th, 11th and 12th floors of the hospital as the fire itself flashed through the medical-surgical section on the ninth floor; some patients were removed from the burning building while receiving plasma. Heavy steel doors confined the blaze, but trapped many patients and personnel on the upper floors.

**THE UNITED STATES** yesterday asked Allied and non-communist help to reinforce South Viet Nam against communist assault. Economic and military aid was requested by Secretary of State Dean Rusk, who told a news conference that the American Government hopes other nations will join in strengthening Viet Nam. The State Department published a white paper, stating the "clear and present danger" of Communist domination in South Viet Nam.

According to this white paper, the balance of power in Asia may be "tipped perilously" against non-communist nations if Southeast Asia turn communist. Secretary of State Rusk underscored the formal report's conclusion that Viet Nam will need more assistance in view of the growing assistance Russia and Red China are tendering the communist rebels fighting inside South Viet Nam.

**ADOLF EICHMANN** yesterday

**DETROIT'S NEW MEDICAL CENTER** area, bounded by Woodward and the Chrysler Expressway and by Warren and Mack, will be the scene of a new six-story 320-bed Children's Hospital. Plans for the eight-million dollar structure were revealed at a hospital staff family dinner Monday night in the Statler-Hilton Hotel, and a four-million-dollar fund-raising campaign will begin January 1.

The Metropolitan Detroit Building Fund has already allocated \$1,840,000 toward the project. According to Dr. Hugo V. Hulleman, the hospital's executive vice-president, the remainder of the money will come from the sale of the present Children's Hospital and from Federal aid through the Hill-Burton Act.

**JOAQUIN BALAGUER** will resign as president of the Dominican Republic about January 1, according to the Dominican Government radio's Saturday announcement. A non-party junta is to be created to rule in Balaguer's stead. The broadcast outlined an agreement between the incumbent government and the opposition, calling for a seven-man joint legislative and executive council and an opposition-controlled cabinet.

With announcement of the agreement, the 11-day-old general strike against the Government was cancelled, and the coalition of business leaders, professional men and unionists who had sponsored the strike urged all Dominicans to return to work.

**UNITED NATIONS** soldiers in Elisabethville are under attack from Katangese troops, who launched a mass "victory or die" assault yesterday. Unconfirmed reports received at UN headquarters in Leopoldville indicate that UN positions in the Katanga capital are under heavy fire. A UN spokesman said that the Katangese rebels were harangued into attacking by their commander, General M. Moke, and that the UN immediately sent its Indian Canberra bombers to repel the invaders, although these planes were reported to be using only their cannon. A Swedish jet fighter is thought to have destroyed the Katanga radio station in Elisabethville with cannon and rocket fire.

**DETROIT MAYOR-ELECT** Jerome P. Cavanagh yesterday named Robert Reese and Thomas H. Gallagher to the two top legal jobs in his new City administration. Reese will replace Nathaniel H. Goldstick as corporation counsel, and Gallagher, a former assistant Wayne County prosecutor, will be Reese's chief deputy. Both men are in their 40s, and will replace men in their 60s.

**SOVIET RUSSIA**, under the leadership of "revisionist" Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, has severed diplomatic relations with the tiny Communist Balkan state of Albania. The Albanians, whose rulers claim to be pure "Stalinist," disclosed the rupture Sunday. Peiping has announced publicly that it will

support Erver Hoxha, head of the Albanian Communist Party, and Albanian Premier General Mehmet Shehu, while Moscow has yet to officially confirm its drastic action against the Tirana government. This is the first time in history that the USSR has broken off diplomatic relations with another Communist state.

**THE TEAMSTERS UNION** will not agree to President Kennedy's wage restraint policy, according to Teamster President James R. Hoffa. Hoffa stated Sunday in Bal Harbour, Fla., that the Teamsters intend to ignore Kennedy's plea that organized labor restrain its demands in collective bargaining in order to maintain the balance of the nation's economy.

Both the President and Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg have appealed in speeches to the AFL-CIO Florida convention that wage gains be kept within the over-all increase in productivity to avoid inflation. Stating that the Teamsters negotiated area contracts in 1961 calling for an additional 10 cents per hour added wage costs a year, Hoffa said that he intends to us these contracts as a pattern in thousands of other Teamster negotiations.

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day was convicted by an Israeli court of crimes against the Jewish people, crimes against humanity, war crimes and membership in an illegal organization. The former Nazi official seemed to expect the verdict, and betrayed no trace of emotion behind the bulletproof glass of his defendant's box. It appears that Eichmann will not hear sentence pronounced until Thursday or Friday, as the judges are expected to take approximately two more days to read the judgment explaining the verdict. The court which convicted Eichmann of crimes for which he may pay the death penalty declared its hope that his trial may provide a cure for "this ancient disease, the group hatred which is known as anti-Semitism."

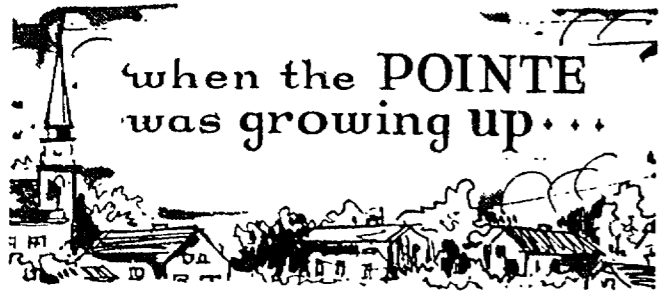

When the POINTE was growing up...

His statue dominates Washington boulevard and a state county is named for him, but General Alexander Macomb seems a shadowy historical figure.

The first graduate of West Point, a friend of Alexander Hamilton, a veteran of frontier Indian fighting at 18, he became General in Chief of the Army of the United States.

Gen. Macomb was born in Detroit in 1782 in an old log house near the stockade walls. His mother was Catherine Navarre, of the French royal notary's family, and his father, Alexander Macomb, a Scotch fur trader.

He grew up in New York state and at 16 volunteered in the company of New York Rangers, then through the good offices of Alexander Hamilton, first Secretary of the Treasury and former aide de camp to George Washington, he joined the Light Dragoons. He was the first alumnus of the new Military Academy at West Point.

In 1803 he returned to Detroit and married his cousin, Catherine Macomb, daughter of William Macomb, who owned vast property on Grosse Ile and Belle Isle. The couple had 12 children, and the General, who loved all things Russian, named his dozen offspring for the royal Romanoffs.

Famous as the victor of Plattsburg in the War of 1812, he was briefly commandant of Detroit, and then General in Chief of the U.S. Army until his death in 1842. Aside from his military laurels the general was a cultured, well educated man. He wrote verse and painted in oils.

Among the General's descendants were the late Alexander Macomb Campau and the late Mrs. John S. Newberry. Mrs. Theodore Parsons Hall, the chateleine of Tonnancour, was another of his direct descendants. Born Alexandrine Louise Godfroy, she was also descended from Henry IV of France. The Godfroys came to Detroit before the American Revolution and were as well established as the Macombs by the late 18th century.

The future Mrs. Hall attended Miss Scott's fashionable seminary for young ladies in Detroit before going on to the Convent of the Sacred Heart and then traveling to Visitation Convent in Washington. Mr. Hall, a native New Yorker, was the grandson of Maj. Gen. Samuel Holden Parsons, chief judge of the Northwest Territory, was educated at Yale and began his career on Wall street.

He moved to Detroit in 1859 and a year later married Miss Godfroy in Bishop LeFevre's home. The young couple boarded at the famous Russell House, then lived on Congress before buying their Grosse Pointe estate in 1871 from William Moran, who had in his turn secured much of the property of Commodore Alexander Grant.

Tonnancour, a replica of a French chateau, was surrounded by an orchard of 500 apple trees and a lane of arbor vitae 1,200 feet from the lakeshore. The Halls were parents of many daughters, including the late Mrs. Edmund C. Delbos, but their only son, Godefroi Macomb died from a fall at Tonnancour in 1885 when he was 8 years old.

Descendants of the Halls and Gen. Macomb still live in Grosse Pointe although not on Tonnancour place, now subdivided from the vast lands left by Mrs. Hall to her three daughters.

A Bach fugue or a Rogers and Hart ballad, both command the respect of Allen Chase, who frequently plays either as first trombonist with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra or string bass with Jack Qualey's dance band.

The only native Pointer in the Symphony Mr. Chase is not strictly long hair, financed his music education by playing one night stands with jazz bands throughout the mid-west, and still enjoys his evenings playing for parties.

A tall, lean man with a whimsical smile Mr. Chase has no musical favorites. "A professional hears music rather differently than the average listener. I concentrate on the trombone parts. Tschalkovsky is great for trombones and so is Brahms."

Mr. Chase began his musical studies well beyond the prodigy stage. Although he learned the piano from his mother, who recently retired from teaching at Grosse Pointe University School, he began his studies in earnest in the eleventh grade at the High School.

Was A Drummer  
Dewey Kalembor, now at Bownell, was his teacher and Mr. Chase first became a drummer then turned to the trombone. He now can play and teach all brass instruments. When he went to the U of M during the war there was no drum teacher available so he fell back on the trombone which he played in the university band. After college he taught school in Cincinnati, where he met his wife, who doesn't play

a note of music. For two years he played one night stands in dance bands and at summer fairs, traveling about 200 miles a night, through the rugged prairies of Nebraska and Kansas.

Then it was back to Ann Arbor with his wife to work toward his masters in music education. He again played jazz to finance his education and even formed his own combo. After another year in Cincinnati he joined the Detroit Symphony.

Joined With Paray  
"Paul Paray and I came the same year. We are both in our tenth season," reminisces Mr. Chase. Until the past several years he had an equal record, playing string bass with Jack Qualey's band on the week-ends. Now the symphony schedule is so full he hasn't the time for the dance band work, although he manages to fit eight promising students into his busy life. There is a symphony rehearsal or concert six days out of seven, and currently there are even night rehearsals.

This allows little time for Mr. Chase's hobby, which is re-decorating on a professional

scale. Until he remodeled the kitchen in their home all he had ever made was model airplanes. For this culinary project he knocked out walls, moved and installed new plumbing and built cabinets. The result is a masterpiece and the delight of Mrs. C's life although the family had to eat in the basement for five months while the job was progressing between rehearsals, concerts and teaching.

Music Studio  
Now the Chases are rebuilding the basement for Peggy, 2½, Amy, 7, and Sally, 10½. The three girls have allowed their father space for a music room in the renovated cellar where he can give lessons, keep his piano, string bass, trombone, trumpet, music stand and bound volumes of symphony programs.

The Chases rarely take vacations. Mr. C. travels with the symphony tours which satisfies his desire to see the world, although his wife would like more of a change. In the summer he plays with the Symphony, directed by Valter Poole, at the Fairgrounds. He spends his off hours painting and riding around the Pointe with his wife on their tandem bicycle. They have built a rumble seat on the bike for daughter, Peggy.

NESSELRODE PIE

Contributed by Mrs. Arthur L. Evely

- 1 envelope plain unflavored gelatin
- 1¼ cups milk
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- ½ tsp. salt
- ½ cup light cream
- 1 tsp. rum flavoring
- 1 tsp. finely chopped maraschino cherries
- ½ cup chopped almonds
- baked pie shell or crumb crust

Soften gelatin in ¼ cup cold milk. Scald remainder of milk and add slowly beaten egg yolks. Add ½ cup sugar and salt combined. Cook in top of double boiler until of custard consistency, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, add gelatin, and stir until dissolved. Cool and add cream and rum flavoring. Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites to which remaining ½ cup sugar has been added, and chopped cherries. Pour into baked pie shell or crumb crust and chill until firm. Sprinkle top of pie with almonds just before serving. Serves six.

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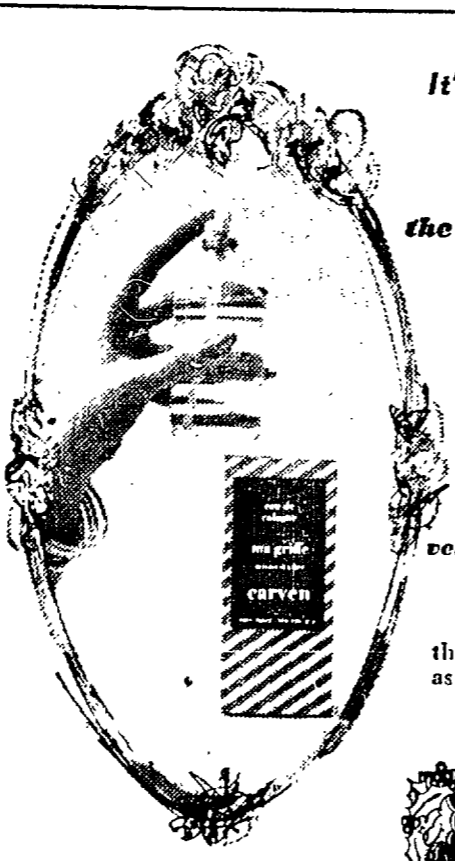
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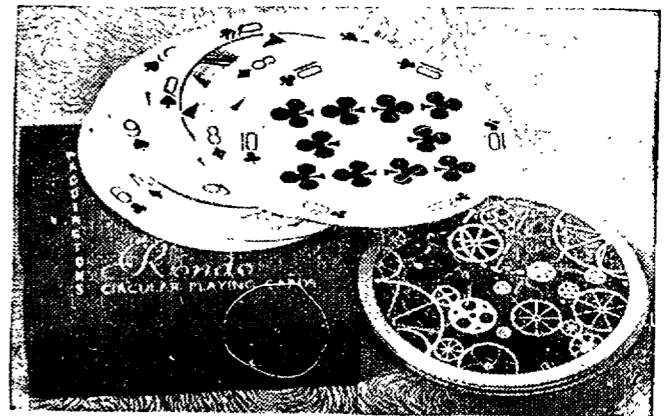
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
