Webbers Boost Hospital Fund

A \$75,000 contribution by the Eloise and Richard Webber Foundation to the Children's Hospital Building Fund was made public today by Russel A. Swaney, fund chairman.

The gift will create the central lounge for visitors as well as a coffee and gift shop on the first floor of the new six-story hospital. The gift shop will be operated by the Women's Auxiliary for the benefit of the hospital.

The new Children's, which is to be located in the Detroit Medical Center in the Woodward Corridor, will have 320 beds, 105 more than the present capacity. To help finance the \$8 million project, the Children's Hospital Building Fund is now seeking \$4 million by public subscription.

In announcing the gift, Swaney drew attention to "the great debt of gratitude Detroit owes to Mr. and Mrs. Webber and the Foundation that bears their name for all they have done, over the years, to better the community."

Activities of the Eloise and Richard Webber Foundation have included grants to colleges in the area, to social welfare agencies, and scientific research and hospital improvement programs.

Swaney pointed to the foundation's "special interest in our city's hospital system and its strong support of such vital programs as the Greater Detroit Hospital Fund and the Metropolitan Detroit Building Fund."

"That they should give such wholehearted endorsement to Children's plans for improving its services to the community, is gratifying indeed," Swaney added.

The Eloise and Richard Webber Foundation was established in 1940 to continue the philanthropic activities carried on by Mr. and Mrs. Webber as individuals for many years. Mr. and Mrs. Webber live at 437 Lake Shore road, Grosse Pointe Farms.

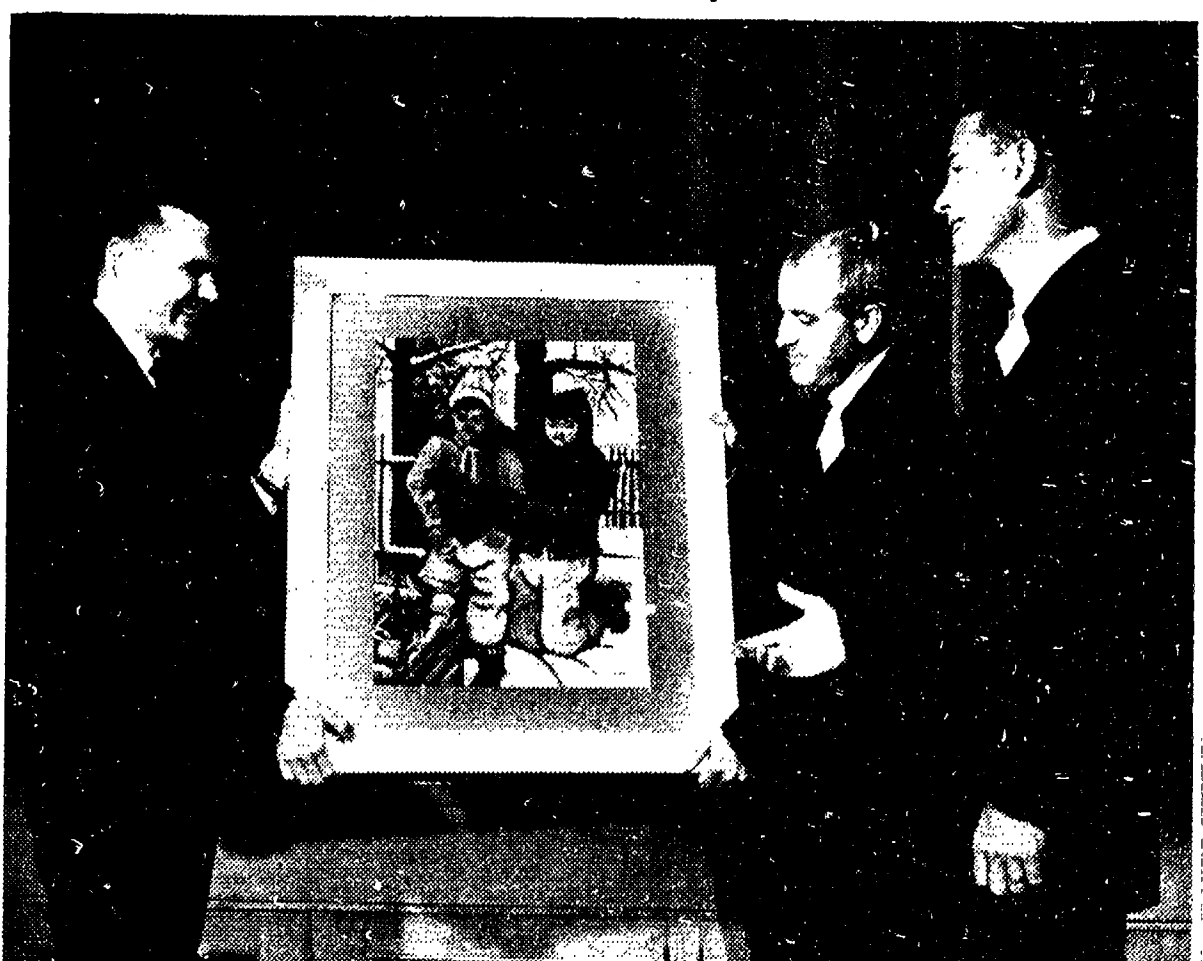
However, at Mack, Chojnacki was forced to stop because of heavy traffic. Besides, his escape was cut off by officers of the other departments.

School's Home Council Meets

The Home School Council of Our Lady Star of the Sea School held on Monday, November 18, its first meeting of the current school year.

Focal points of the program were two class demonstrations held on the stage. A group of 8th graders, under the direction of Sister Delecta, carried out an experiment based on the importance of listening skills, and a group of first graders, led by Sister Magdela Marie, exhibited the advanced comprehension of numbers and number processes made possible by the Modern Math.

With these demonstrations as background, Sister Luane, head of the Math Department at Star of the Sea, gave a resume of the origins, reasons for and growth of this new approach to mathematics. "We are teaching thinking and discovery processes, not gimmicks and rules. We do not know what the problems of the future will be, so we cannot teach them, but we can teach children how to reason with numbers to the answers."

This program of Modern Math has been in progress in the Detroit Diocese parochial schools for five years, and now is employed on all grade levels.

Pages of math workbooks from successive grades were projected on a screen and the parents invited to help complete the problems. This clearly demonstrated the spiraling effect of the skills and comprehension gained through the program.

"Helping Children Discover Arithmetic," a workbook for parents published by the Encyclopedia Britannica Press, was available to all assembled, as was a book list for further reading on the subject.

Also demonstrated was the Craig Reader—a machine used in the school to improve speed and comprehension in reading, and to correct bad reading habits.

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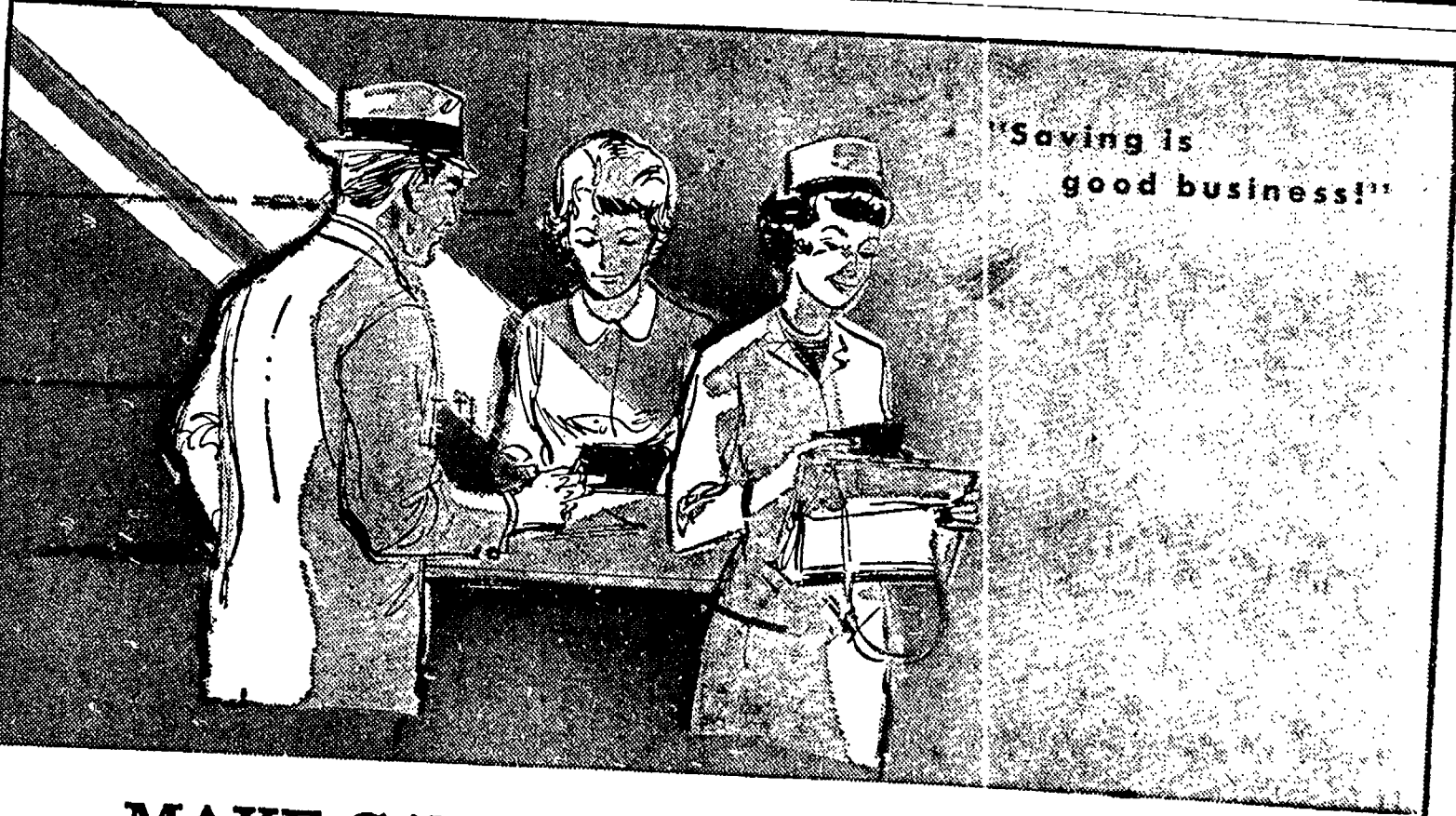
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Woods Officer Attends Traffic Safety Congress

Woods Police Sgt. Roland Symons recently attended the 1963 National Safety Congress and Exposition held in Chicago, Ill. Among the subjects discussed, which the sergeant said he found extremely interesting, were: What Price Traffic Safety; Police Traffic Responsibilities; Current Research in Traffic Safety; Traffic Court For Teenagers; and Federal Traffic programs. Symons said that many other subjects, too numerous to mention, were threshed out, and that it was his opinion that attendance at the Congress and Exposition was of great benefit to those who participated. Although nothing definite was decided as to the solution to the increasing accidents, injuries and deaths on the highways, Symons said, "great strides can be made, and have been made, through the efforts of traffic-problem experts. "Interest in traffic safety and the finding of a method to reduce traffic accidents, seems to be a nation-wide effort, from the Federal Government down to the smallest city and village. 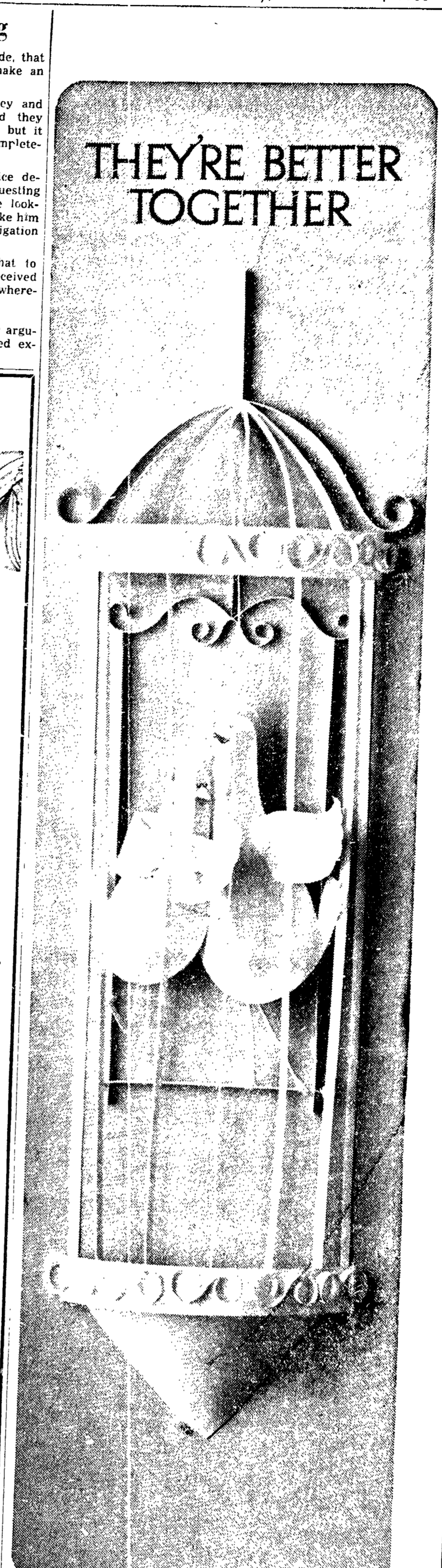

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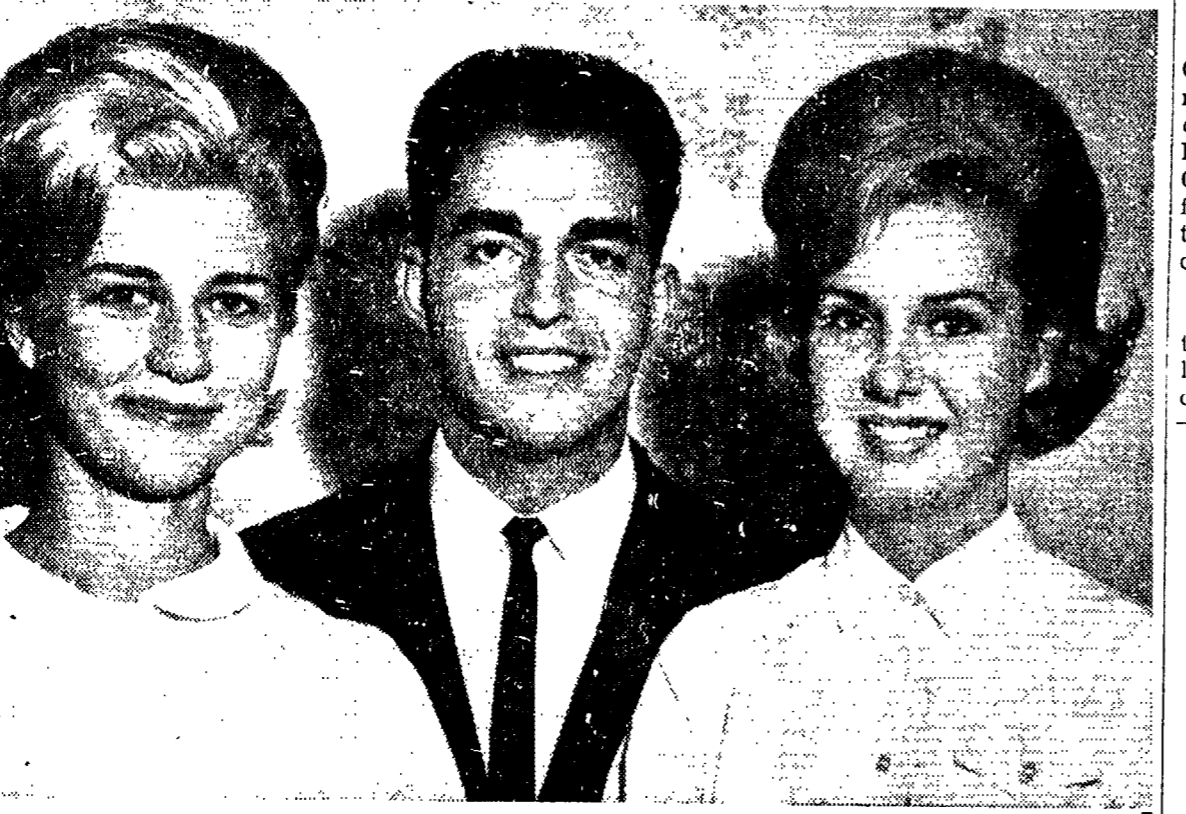

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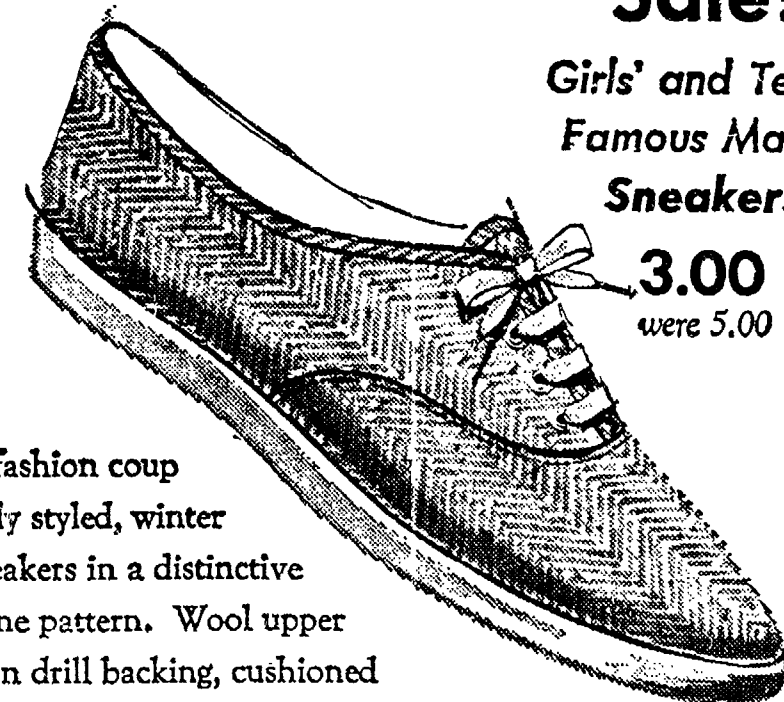

How to Brew Excellent Coffee for a Crowd



Chances are that sometime during the holiday months ahead, you'll be called upon to serve coffee to a large group. Happily, coffee in any quantity is one of the easiest refreshment assignments you can draw. Once you know a few rules, you can make excellent coffee for any number of people.

Let's assume you'll be making forty average servings. Allow one pound of ground coffee to two gallons of water. Some simple arithmetic will enable you to adapt the recipe to a larger or smaller group. Even easier: employing any standard measuring device, use one part coffee to six parts water for perfect results.

If you use a coffee urn, use the suggested coffee-to-water proportions—drip grind coffee, of course—then follow the brewing instructions given by the manufacturer of the urn.

Coffee in a Kettle

Excellent coffee can be made in an open kettle, too. First, measure freshly-drawn cold water into a spotlessly clean kettle and heat it to boiling point. In the meantime, measure regular grind coffee into a clean cloth sack which has been soaked and rinsed thoroughly. The sack must be large enough so that it is not more than half-full when the ground coffee is placed in it. This allows for expansion of the coffee and free circulation of the water. Tie the top of the sack tightly, allowing enough cord for fastening to the kettle handle.

When the water comes to a full, rolling boil, reduce heat to hold just below the boiling point. Fasten the sack to pot handle, then submerge the sack into the water. Keep the kettle on low heat and push the sack up and down frequently to get the proper extraction. Brew 6 to 8 minutes. Do not let the coffee boil. When the coffee is ready, remove the sack, permitting all the beverage to drain into the kettle. Then, serve your delicious coffee as soon as possible.

New Idea for Holiday Teen Parties



Looking for a new way to entertain the high-school set? Try a Holiday Box Social, and share the fun of hostessing with your guests!

Have each young lady prepare a lunch or late-evening snack for two, wrapped in fancy Christmas dress with her name identified on the package top. Have the guests, on arriving at the Christmas tree until refreshment time.

In the meantime, write the name of each girl on a small piece of paper; roll up the paper with name inside and fasten roll with a bit of transparent tape. Insert each name in a balloon.

At serving time, each young man can choose a balloon and blow it up until it pops, revealing the name of his lunch partner. Lunch boxes may be made from old cereal, shoe or candy boxes. Gummed lace paper edgings and decorative designs pasted on the boxes give them a handsome appearance. Paste-on letters can be used for the girls' names. Ribbon, sequins, small glass "jewels" and tiny Christmas ornaments are other package trims that can be used.

To make a wreath on the party box, wrap cookies in saran and fasten them to box securely with double-edged transparent tape. Flower spray decorations can be made by individually wrapping cookies and candy tightly in saran and fastening them together with wire. Use ribbon and artificial leaves to transform the "flowers" into a corsage.

And here's a hint to the girls who are preparing the lunches—wrap the party foods in transparent saran film to keep foods at their freshest and to display your handiwork with a real holiday sparkle.

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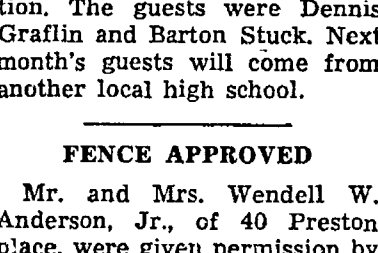

Treat Turkeys Very Tenderly

Since the first Thanksgiving Day in 1621, turkey has become the American family's symbol of thankfulness for a bountiful harvest.

The following rules for proper care of your turkey will assure quality and flavor.

1. Thaw a frozen bird in the refrigerator for 2 to 4 days, or under cold running water for 2 to 6 hours. Don't thaw a bird at room temperature.
2. If you stuff the turkey, do so just before roasting. Never stuff the bird and partially cook the day before eating. Warm stuffing is an ideal place for food spoilage bacteria to grow.
3. Don't freeze a stuffed bird, either before or after cooking. This process is done commercially but is not recommended for home use.
4. Be sure to put the turkey, stuffing and gravy in the refrigerator within one hour after Thanksgiving dinner.

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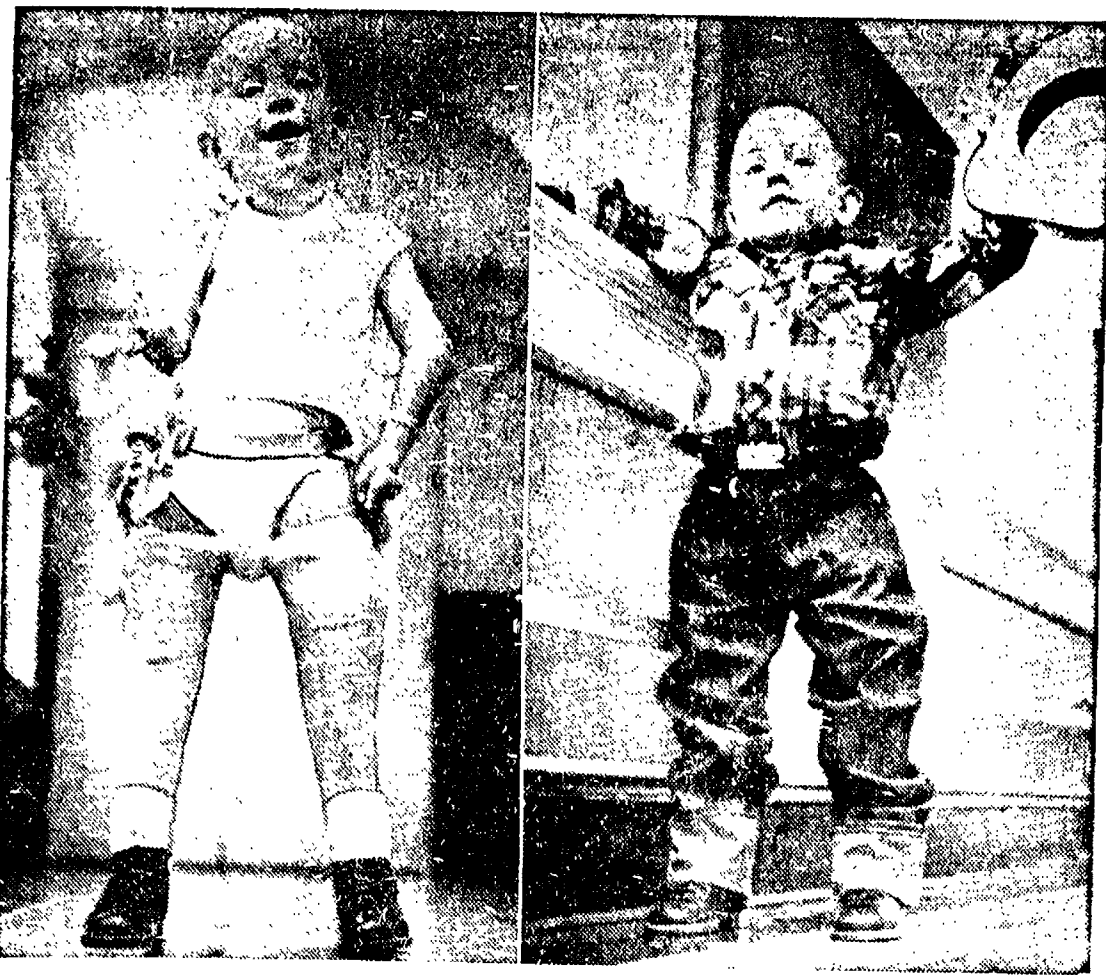
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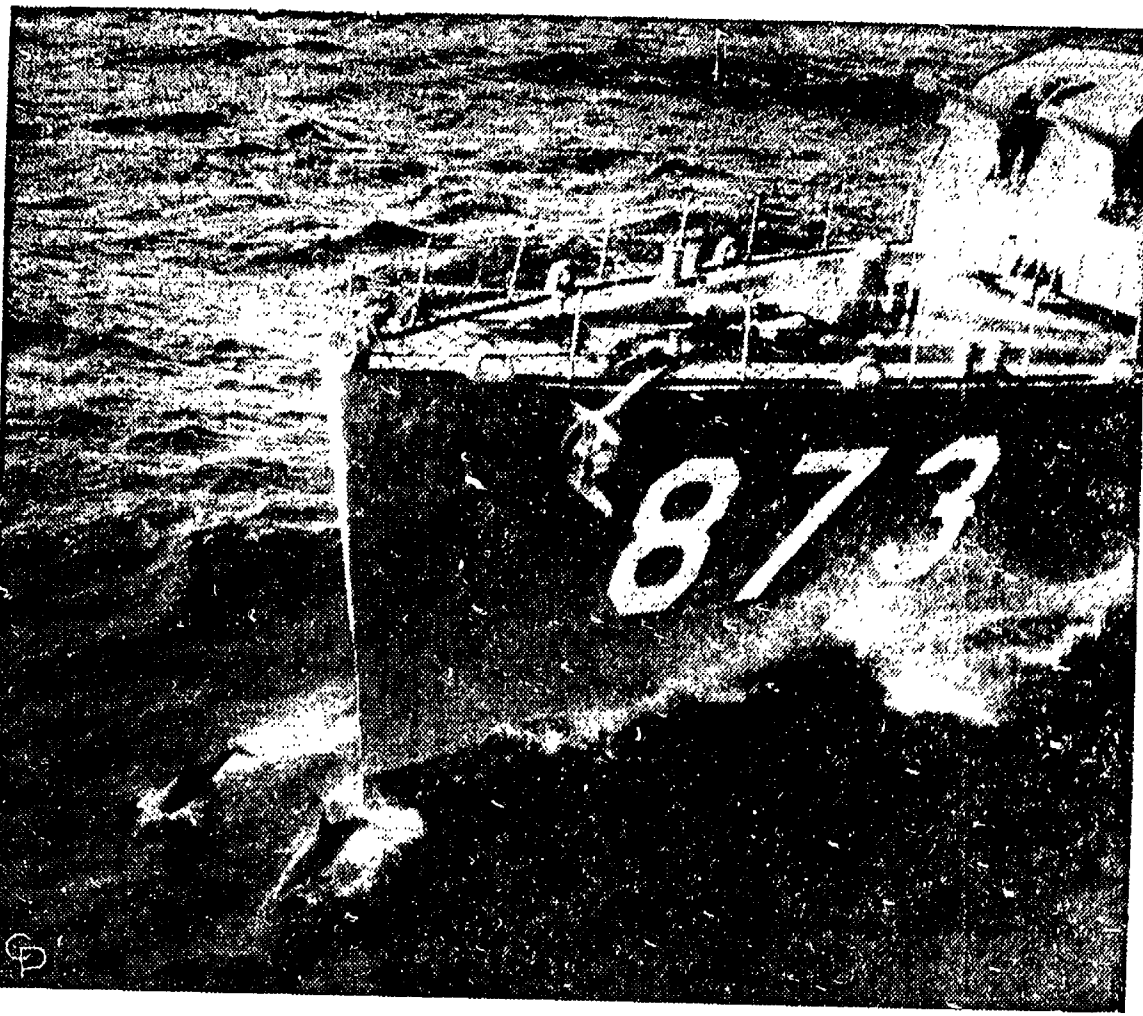
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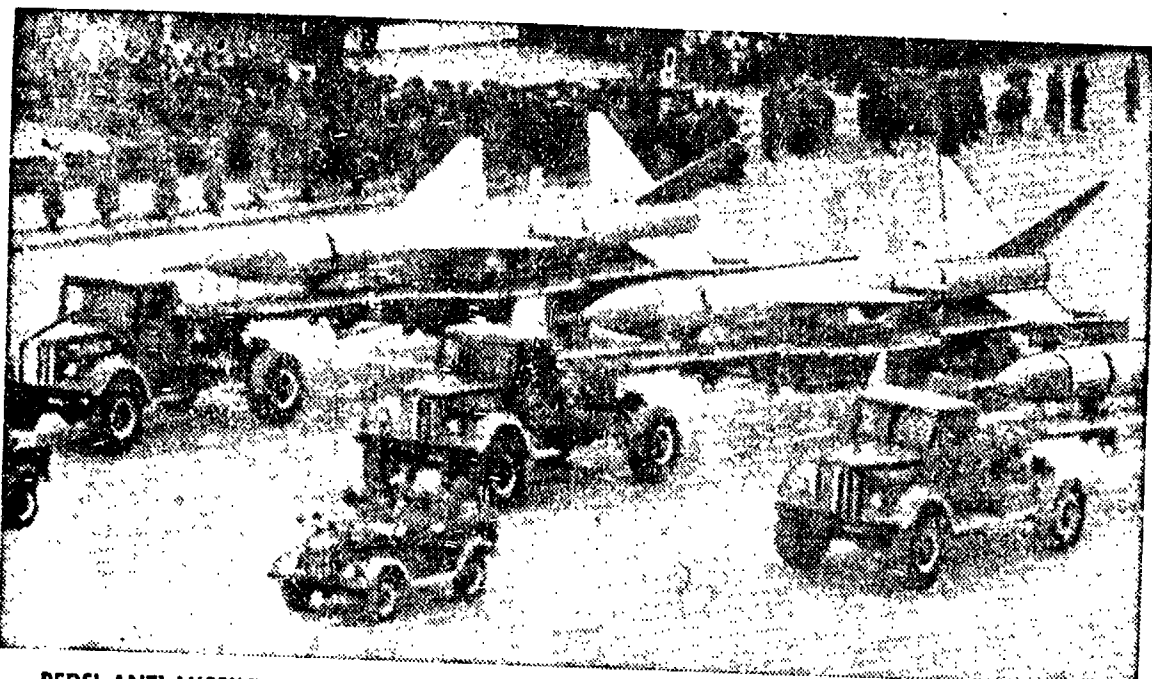

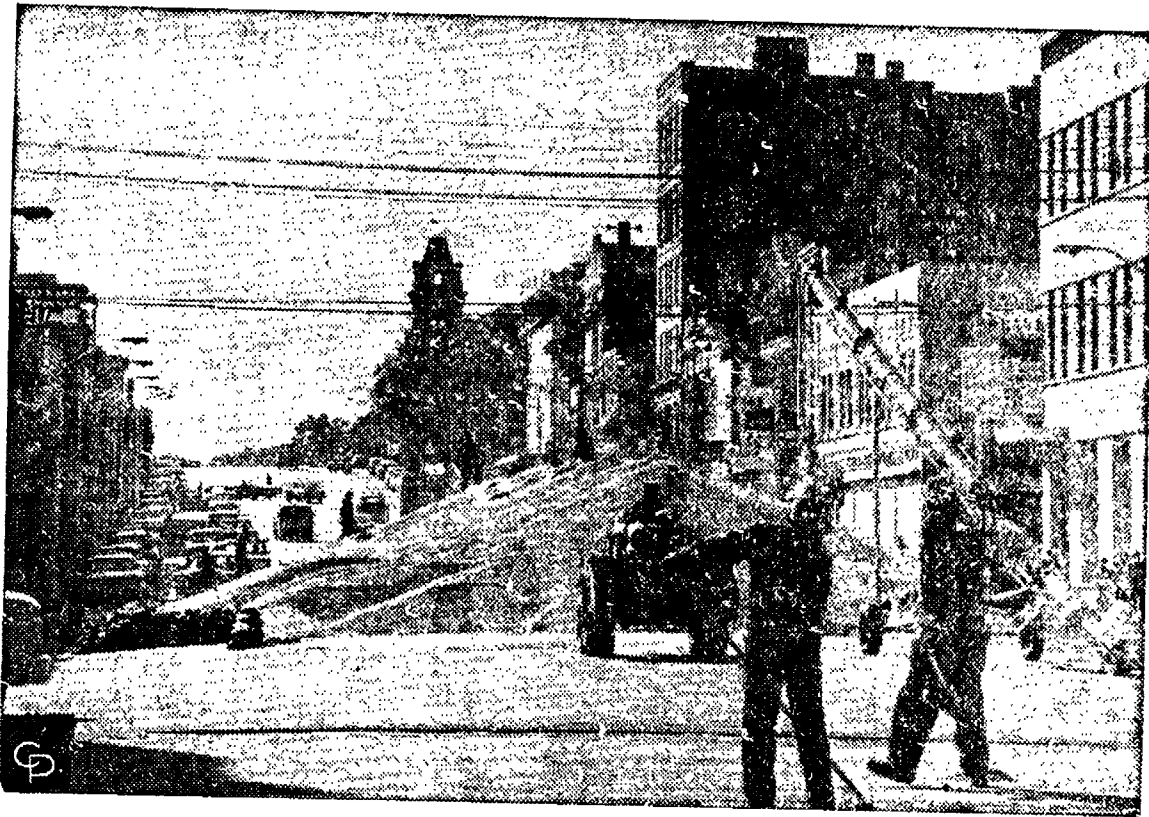

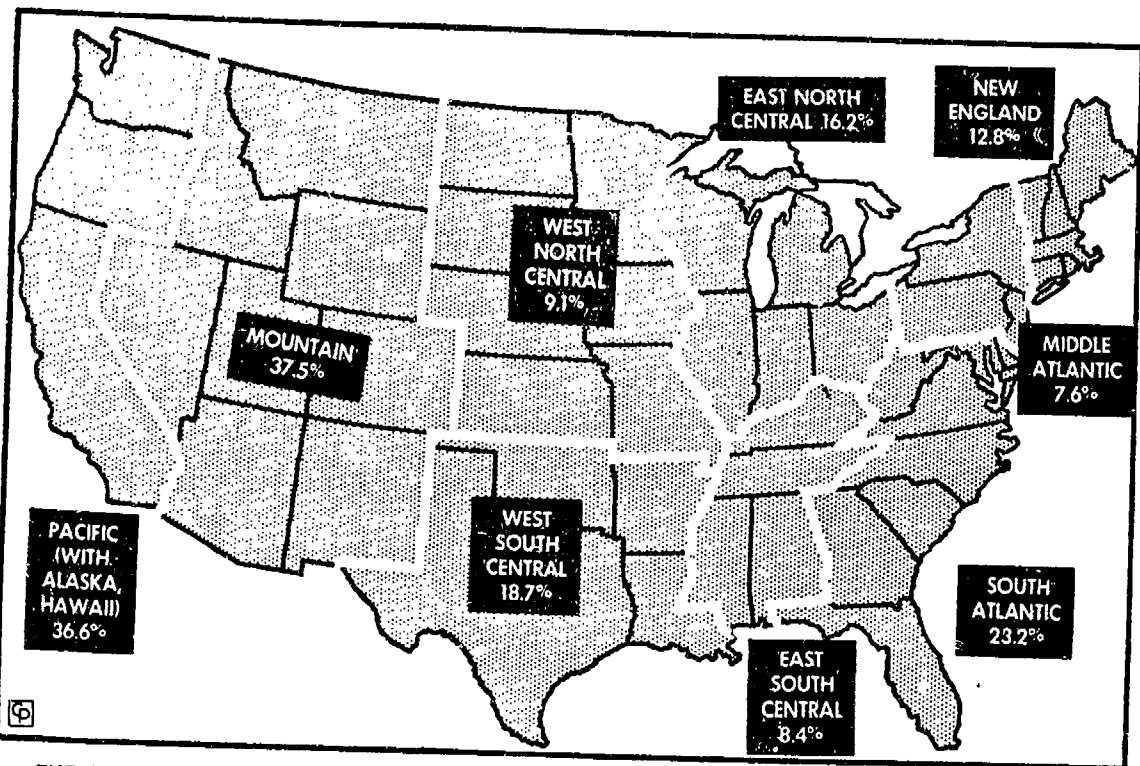

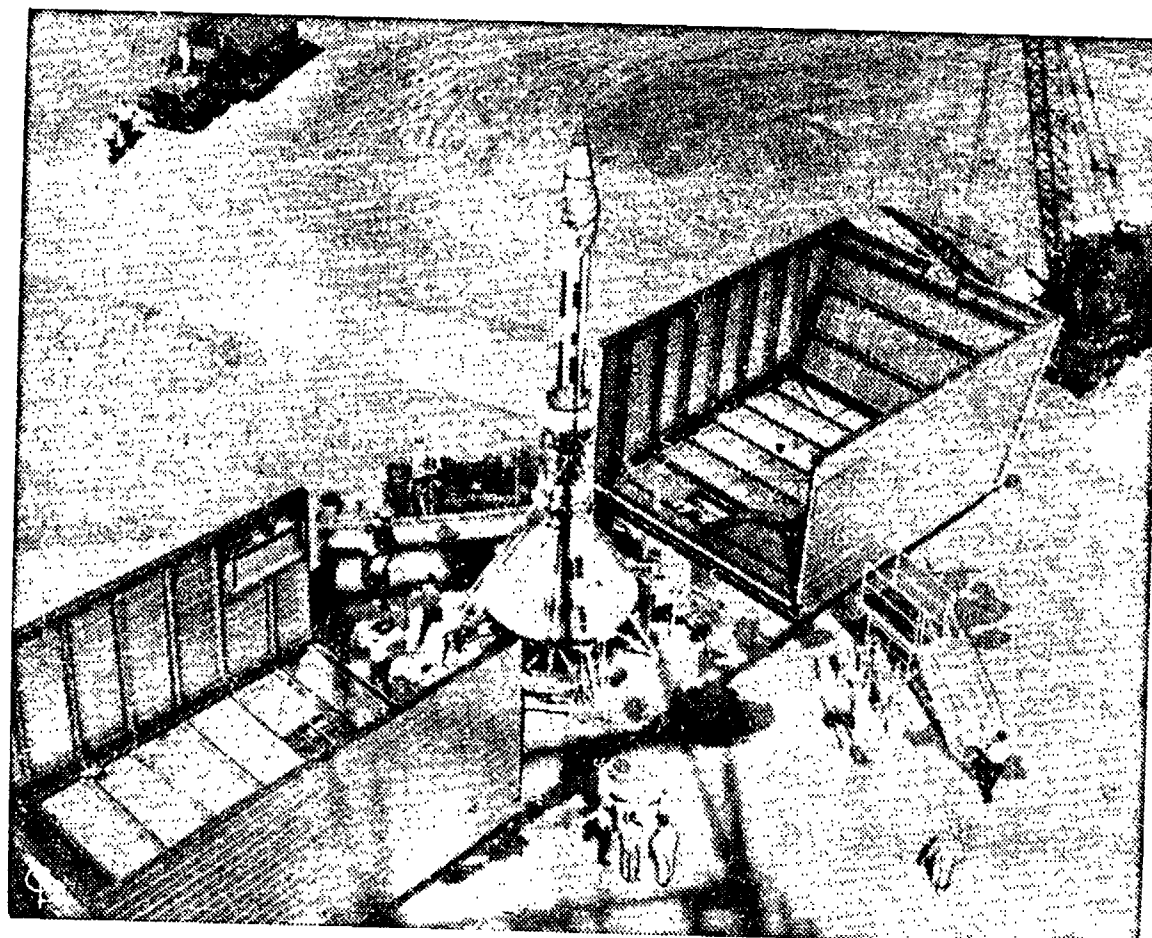

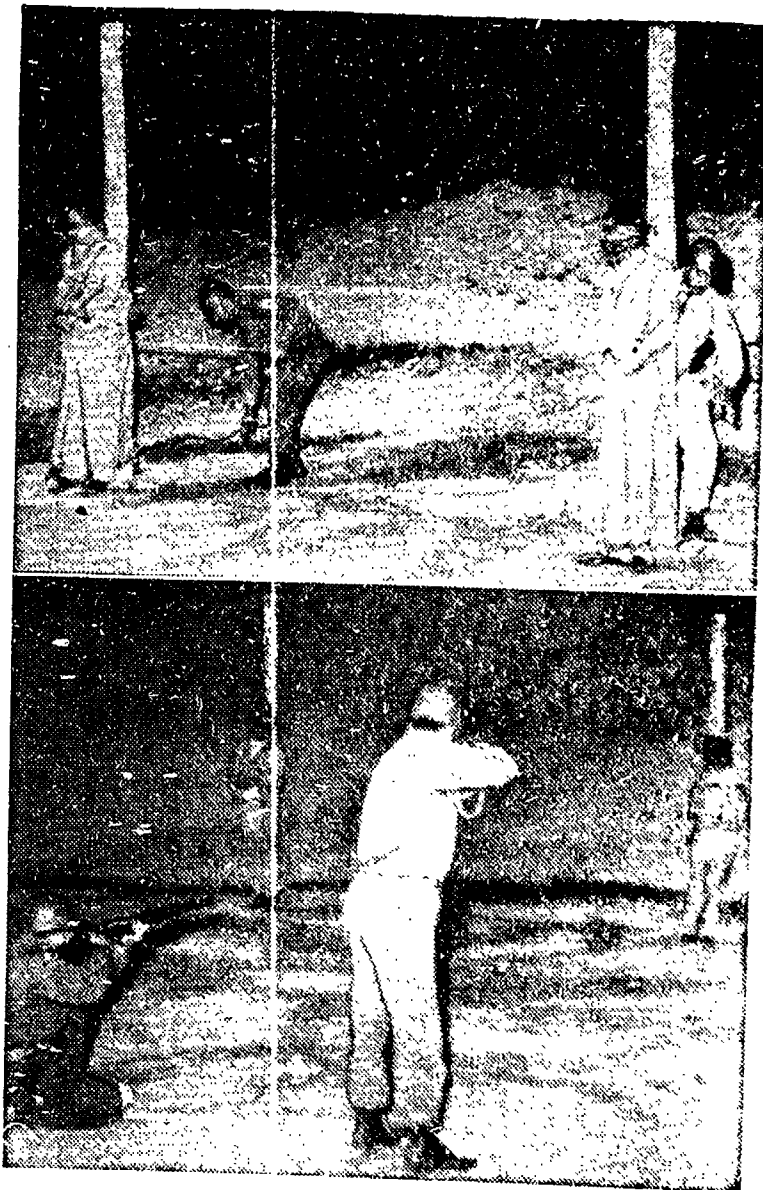

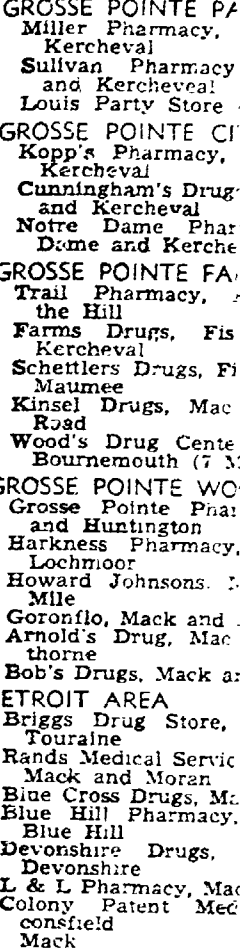
