Thursday, September 22

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT to permit voluntary prayers in public schools was rejected by the Senate. The vote was 49 in favor and 37 opposed (this was nine short of the two-thirds majority needed to pass such a measure).

Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Ill., chief sponsor of the proposed amendment, promised to keep fighting for its passage.

Mich. Republican Senator, Robert Griffin voted in favor of the amendment but Democratic Senator, Philip Hart opposed it. Even if this proposal had won its two-thirds margin in the Senate, it appeared to have no chance of being acted on by the House this year.

Friday, September 23

DEFENSE SECRETARY Robert S. McNamara announced a \$700 million increase in combat aircraft production for the Vietnam war. This amounts to a 30 per cent boost in production. Effective July 1, and for 12 months, production will be increased by about 280 fighter attack planes, primarily for the Navy. This was the first indication from a cabinet-level official, that the administration was planning to continue bombing North Vietnam into the summer of 1967.

Saturday, September 24

U. S. PROPOSALS for peace in Vietnam, as put forth by U. S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg at the United Nations, were rejected by North Vietnam. Hanoi's official Vietnam News Agency said in a monitored broadcast, that the new proposals were designed "to cover up the U. S. scheme to expand and prolong its aggression in South Vietnam and to cope with the world protest against the U. S. intention to stay and maintain American troops in South Vietnam."

They stated that Goldberg's proposals were made with an eye toward getting the United Nations to interfere in the Vietnam issue — thus allowing the U. S. to continue its aggression.

Sunday, September 25

MAYOR CAVANAGH, irritated by liberal Councilman Mel Ravitz' frequent criticism of city housing and anti-poverty programs, lashed out at Ravitz, who is currently chairman of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors. He said that Ravitz feels he is the only one who has any knowledge of social problems in the city and that he has become a "negative person, critical and attacking things all the time." The mayor suggested Ravitz, who is a member of the Common Council, use his leadership around the council getting things done... and making some of the things he speaks about come to pass.

Monday, September 26

JOE DON LOONEY, temperamental fullback for the Detroit Lions, walked out on the Lions in the middle of their game with the Atlanta Falcons. He said he refuses to play messenger boy for the head coach, Harry Gilmer. He was suspended indefinitely by Lions' general manager, Edwin J. Anderson. Indications point to his release from the team. Looney contends however, that he refused to re-enter the game because of a back injury.

Tuesday, September 27

THE WEST CENTRAL ORGANIZATION (WCO) along with more than 100 of Detroit's clergymen openly defied Mayor Cavanagh by taking over a vacant house claimed by the city for urban renewal. At the risk of being arrested, priests and ministers pried open the doors of two near-northwest houses, knocked boards off windows and called in cleanup crews. A spokesman for the WCO said the group planned to move in a displaced family immediately. These activities were part of WCO's planned campaign to protest against federal urban renewal regulations, which prohibits families from living in houses taken by the city for demolition.

Start Erection of Steel for New High School

Hearing on Bad Accident Is Postponed Indefinitely

A hearing in Farms municipal court in the matter of the August 27 accident in which two youths were injured, one critically, has been postponed indefinitely, pending recovery from injuries sustained by the victims, it was disclosed on Thursday, September 22.

Still on the critical list in Bon Secours Hospital, where he is reported in a semi-conscious state caused by a brain concussion resulting from the accident, is Douglas J. Palazzolo, 19, of 1149 Lakepointe. He was a passenger in the car.

Driver of the automobile was Richard Schulte, 20, of 30 Westwind, who suffered a broken right pelvis and leg, and a fractured spine vertebra, and is recuperating at home and will be in a cast for some time, according to Farms Det. Joseph Miller, who is keeping in touch with the case.

Confused Park Council's Voting Clouds Municipal Hall Renovation Program

Estimated Costs Accepted, Reconsidered, Rescinded, Approved, Reconsidered Again, And Finally Tabled For Further Study

Confusion reigned at the Park council meeting on Monday, September 26, when members of the council approved proposed estimates for alterations and remodeling in the Municipal Building, then reconsidered and turned it down, then voted to rescind the reconsideration because of an improper motion.

A fourth vote was taken which approved reconsideration, after it was properly motioned and seconded, and a fifth vote shelved the project for further study.

Land Mine Kills Vincent Murphy

Specialist Vincent F. Murphy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Basil B. Murphy of 2045 Hollywood Avenue was the third Grosse Pointe to be killed in Vietnam. He was 21-years old and a member of the 196th Infantry Division.

He was killed when he stepped on a land mine on Sunday, September 18. Mrs. Murphy said her most recent communication from her son was written on September 15 in which he sounded quite cheerful. She received the casualty notice via telegram on Monday, September 19.

Murphy was a graduate of Notre Dame High School in Harper Woods. He joined the Army in October of 1965.

Loaded Revolver Left in Car Ends Life of 3-Year-Old

Little Girl Fatally Wounded By Cousin Who Thought Weapon Was a Toy; Accident Occurs In Parking Lot At Mack And Moross

Gail Zingas, 3, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nick Zingas of 20530 St. Clair Shores, victim of an accidental shooting in the parking lot behind the Sears, Roebuck branch store, Mack and Moross, died in St. John Hospital on Sunday, September 25, at 1:45 p.m.

Specialists worked feverishly to remove a bullet that had entered the little girl's left eye and lodged in her brain, but they could not save her life.

Gail was accidentally shot by her 10-year-old cousin on Friday, September 23, with a .38 caliber revolver the cousin found under the floor mat of a car owned by the girl's father, his uncle.

Farms Det. Joseph Miller and Patrolmen Arnold Parsons and Vincent Peters were dispatched to the parking lot by Sgt. Alfred Martin, when a call was received that a little girl had been shot. They arrived at the lot and were informed that the girl had been taken to St. John Hospital by private car. The officers went to the hospital.

Three Witnesses
The information obtained was that the shooting was witnessed by Gail's two brothers and a sister. The officers were able to piece together the following details:

Gail's father had taken Gail, and his other children, Chris, 2, Peter, 5, and Helen, 9, and his nephews, Frank and Nicholas Theophanous, 14 and 10, respectively to the Sears store. Zingas took his oldest nephew with him and left the other children in the family station wagon. While he was gone, the children decided to clean the inside of the vehicle.

Nicholas discovered a loaded .38 caliber revolver under the floor mat and held it in his hand, and was warned by Helen to put the gun down, that it belonged to her father, and that it was real and not to play with it.

Insists It's Toy
Nicholas insisted that it was a toy, and pointed the gun at Peter, who was in the back seat. Peter insisted that it was not (Continued on Page 3)

Man Arrested on Second Charge of Child Molesting

A Detroit man, arrested by Woods police on Wednesday, September 14, and arraigned before Municipal Judge Don J. Goodrow on a charge of taking indecent liberties with a minor female child, was re-arrested on Monday, September 26, on a similar charge involving another female child.

Raymond K. Tempest, 28, of 9364 Shoemaker, appeared before the judge on the second charge and stood mute. He was represented by an attorney. Judge Goodrow entered a plea of innocent for the accused man, and set examination for October 12. Tempest was released on \$500 personal bond. Tempest is awaiting trial in Wayne County Circuit Court on the first charge, that of molesting a 13-year-old girl. He is free on \$2,500 bond in this case.

PTA Council Given Report By Selmeier

Detailed Analysis Of Current Figures Provided By Assistant Superintendent-Instruction

At Monday's evening meeting of the Grosse Pointe PTA Council, the first of the 1966-1967 school year, Dr. H. Leroy Selmeier, Assistant Superintendent-Instruction for the Grosse Pointe Public School System, provided a detailed analysis of current student enrollment figures and described the means used to estimate future enrollments.

The session, chaired by Charles Parcells, president, was held in the second floor Exhibition Room of the Grosse Pointe Central Library. Delegates from PTA organizations throughout the school district were in attendance.

With school officials anticipating the official membership count for the 1966-1967 school year, slated for September 30, the fourth Friday of the month, Dr. Selmeier's remarks provided background information on the growing student population of the Grosse Pointe Public School System.

The latest enrollment report prepared by the schools' Department of Pupil Personnel shows a total of 12,267 students in attendance on September 15. This is an increase of 314 over the last day of school in June and an increase of 408 over the same time a year ago.

More Art Than Science
By means of a series of overhead transparencies Dr. Selmeier illustrated his contention that variations in family patterns, movements of people within a school year, changes in kindergarten enrollments, as well as the increasing proportion of Grosse Pointe students attending the public schools, make the building of an enrollment estimate "even more of an art and much less of a science than we would desire."

Dr. Selmeier provided the PTA leaders with insight into the principles and practices used in planning the current enrollment forecast for the Grosse Pointe Public School System. He said that the schools have sought to employ the principles upon which computer-action is based.

While we believe that the use of computer techniques and the study of trends has put us on the road to sounder estimates of future enrollment, additional analysis of the current situation is very much in order. This fall the elementary enrollment has been 47 pupils above the estimate, due chiefly to unexpected increases at Month and Trombly.

Pierce Breaks Record
The junior high picture has been 71 pupils above the expected, due chiefly to a very large enrollment of new pupils at Pierce, where the school has the highest enrollment in its history. Likewise the senior high school is 72 pupils above the anticipated enrollment for that building," Dr. Selmeier said.

"I should like to inject a little of the thought of Dr. Allen Spivy, a professor of Business Administration at the University of Michigan and one of the individuals contacted as to the principles which were employed in the making of this forecast. Dr. Spivy noted that Grosse Pointe's past enrollment projections were well within the margin of error noted in business projections.

"In the last six years the Grosse Pointe projections have been short 90, short 159, short 157 for the official fourth Friday count. While this margin of error is always under 2.2 per cent every employe of this school system desires to have the estimate become more accurate," Dr. Selmeier said.

Time Boosts Hazards
He said that Dr. Spivy had indicated that the schools' estimates, like those in business, can be fairly successful for a year or 18 months ahead, but that the probabilities when lengthened up to 5 years become exceedingly hazardous. (Continued on Page 2)

The Michigan professor, like all of the others consulted, offered no assurances of an immediate solution to the school district's problems through the use of computers. However, he did encourage the school administration's efforts to find new approaches in the background of the enrollment story which may eventually go into a computer bank.

"The machine could only save on some mathematical calculations. The hard analysis of data would still have to be done by individuals," Dr. Selmeier added. Dr. Selmeier said that neither the Grosse Pointe Public Schools nor any other system can offer any guarantees on enrollments. "We can only approximate some figures and we can point out trends. We cannot be conclusively certain as to the number of children who will be on the school rolls at any particular moment in the future," the veteran educator stated.

Figures Contradictory
On one chart Dr. Selmeier showed that the school census figures indicated that the total number of children under 5 years of age living in the school district has gone down for every one of the last 10 years. "Yet except for the opening of school in 1958, the total enrollment has gone up each year," he said. "Apparently the people who move into this district at the present time have somewhat older families than those of previous years," he commented.

Dr. Selmeier revealed that in estimating the probable enrollment for the 1966-1967 year he made an analysis of all the forecasts of previous years for which data was available. He noted that most estimates were reasonably good for a single year but that the errors were compounded when projected too far into the future or when an attempt was made to pin down the size of any one grade in a single building.

On the basis of this analysis Dr. Selmeier has recommended

According to Farms authorities, Schulte was driving on Grosse Pointe boulevard at about 1:30 a.m. on August 27, on his motorcycle, when he met Peter Licavoli, Jr., of 1154 Balfour, who was driving a 1966 Corvette Stingray, registered to Grace Licavoli of 8906 Calle Pasto, Tucson, Ariz.

Both youths agreed to switch vehicles. Licavoli told police that he was not aware that Schulte's license had been taken from him. Licavoli was waiting for the return of Schulte and Palazzolo in front of St. Paul High School. He did not see the accident from this point.

Schulte had the car in gear, and shifted into fourth, and was headed west on the boulevard at top speed, said to have been more than 100 miles an hour, by some complaining residents.

As he approached the Boulevard-McKinley intersection, Schulte, police said, dropped the gear shift from fourth to second position. At the terrific speed, the action froze the rear wheels, and the car spun out of control. The Stingray skidded 298 feet, turned partly around, jumped the curb and the rear end smashed into a tree on the property of John Suargo, 44 Beverly, bounced off and smashed sideways into a stone pillar, shearing it from its base, and knocking down a section of wrought iron fence.

The vehicle, valued at \$6,400, was reported a total loss. Damage to the private property was estimated at \$400.

Schulte has been charged with driving while his license was revoked, and not having his car under control and causing an accident.

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Injured Policeman Still Taking Special Training

Farms Patrolman John Kraiza, who suffered a serious leg injury when struck by a car on Lake Shore road at Moross, on September 16, while assisting a motorist whose vehicle was disabled, may be down, but not out, it was revealed by Farms Police Chief Jack F. Roh.

The officer, who resides at 21407 Briarcliff, St. Clair Shores, is still in Bon Secours Hospital, where he had been operated on for a broken left thigh bone, and a crushed right ankle.

Kraiza was hurt when he was pinned between the bumper of his scout car and the bumper of a car driven by Harry D. Jesse, Jr., of 22636 Lakeland, St. Clair Shores, who has been charged with reckless driving.

The policeman is not worried about his job because he is still carried on the payroll. He is worried about his wife of course, but his pay checks will ease financial burdens.

What Kraiza was worried about, Chief Roh said, was that he might have to drop out of the Special Criminal Investigation Course, sponsored by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, with classes being held weekly at the Hamtramck Police Headquarters.

Chief Roh said he spoke to FBI officials conducting the course, and they have agreed to make an exception in Kraiza's case, and will allow him to finish the session, which still has about 11 weeks to go. Graduation is scheduled for December for those lucky enough to make the grade.

The school conducted in Hamtramck is not an ordinary one, and not any policeman can attend. Those who take part in these sessions, which have been a going thing for the past five years, are handpicked. Each class is set for no more than 20 policemen, so that instructors can give attention to special individual problems, according to FBI Special Agent Ross A. Brink.

This, said the Farms police chief, was the reason Kraiza was so concerned that he will be dropped from classes because of his injuries.

When Kraiza was given the okay to continue classes, his colleagues in the department bring him his lessons, plus notes taken on lectures given in the one-day, eight-hour weekly sessions.

When the session for the week is completed, the next day the injured policeman's hospital bed is piled high with books and notes. He reads and jots down his lessons in longhand, on reams of paper, and his wife, Jackie, who is his daily visitor, takes these home and neatly types out all his answers on clean sheets of paper, which are taken to the school by a fellow Farms officer.

Brink disclosed that when Kraiza is able to be moved, the officer will be attending classes in a wheelchair.

The special agent said that the school, coordinated by Special Agent in Charge Paul S. Stoddard, of the Detroit Office, and the Southeastern Michigan Chiefs of Police Association, requires each officer attending session, to write a thesis on some phase of law, to be designated by instructors. Each policeman is given a different subject to write about, and must submit his work if he wants to graduate.

In charge of the school are Hamtramck Police Lt. Peter Supina and Wallace Wilson.

There are several such special schools in the Detroit area, Brink disclosed, all of which are formed upon request only,

Broken Lights Trip Motorist

Alan G. Kraljev, 18, of 13938 East Warren, Detroit, stopped on Wednesday, September 21, for having no tail lights on his car, was ticketed by Woods police for driving while his license was suspended.

Kraljev was arrested by Patrolman Thomas A. Podeszwick, who disclosed that while he was patrolling south on Mack avenue, he saw Kraljev's car sans its rear lights, both of which were broken.

After stopping the motorist, the officer said he informed the youth of the violation and asked for his operator's license and car registration. Kraljev told the policeman that his license had been suspended by the Secretary of State's Office in Lansing, for reckless driving.

Podeszwick conveyed Kraljev to the station, where he issued him a violation ticket for driving while his license was suspended. Court date was set for October 8, and Kraljev was released after posting \$100 to guarantee his appearance in court.

James M. Smith Off City Council

The Grosse Pointe City Council accepted the resignation of Councilman James Morgan Smith on September 25.

Mr. Smith was appointed to the Council, succeeding William M. Day on May 24, 1965. In November of 1965 he was elected for a four year term.

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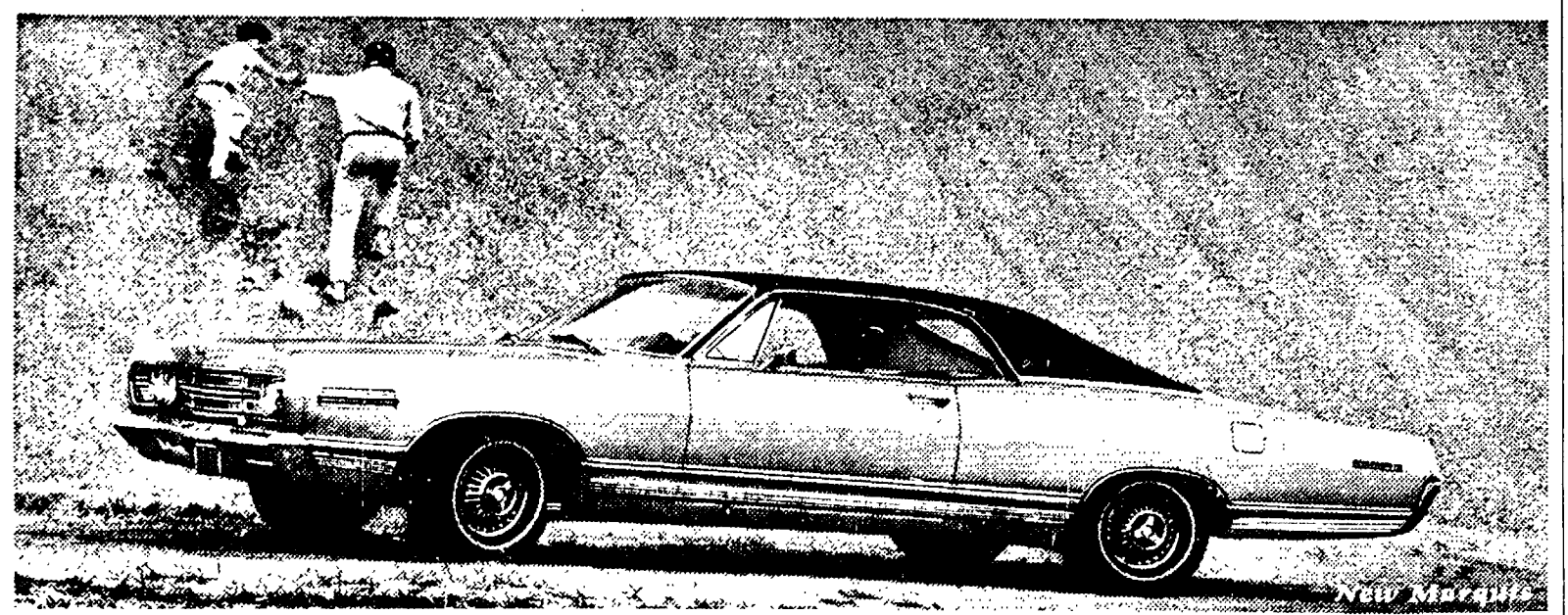

Ancient Residence Suffers Harrowing Experience Again

Would you believe a 200-year-old house would become involved in an automobile accident. Would you believe a 150-year-old house?

Shortly after noon on Tuesday, September 20, a 1964 Imperial struck a hydrant at Lakeview road and Kercheval avenue, continued across the lawn of this historic and attractive residence at 376 Kercheval, belonging to Mrs. Albert H. Trowbridge, and came to rest at the solidly-built steps of the front porch — the result of a two-car collision.

A young St. Clair Shores boy, driving south on Lakeview, stopped at the stop sign on the corner of Kercheval. As he then edged forward, his view of oncoming traffic was blocked by trucks parked on Kercheval to his left. His auto collided with the Imperial, sending it careening to the left across the Trowbridge property.

No one was hurt, although both cars had to be towed away, and a builder is working — again — on this white Colonial Early American home with its pillared front porch and lovely old floor-to-ceiling windows, which the Trowbridge family has been restoring ever since they bought it in 1954 from Miss Mary LaBelle.

"We bought it because I love old houses," said Mrs. Trowbridge. "It has taken a long time to remodel because we did a lot of the work ourselves and because we wanted to be sure the restoration would be authentic."

That the work was well done is proved by the fact that the heavy automobile was stopped on Tuesday at the brick foundations of the front porch, instead of continuing into the living room. Pieces of the chrome trim of the car were lying among the scattered bricks and splintered boards of the porch. One of the pillars was knocked askew and the force of the impact has caused damage to the interior walls that has yet to be determined, Mrs. Trowbridge admitted.

Captain Raymond Snavy, of the Farms fire station, said there was no flooding from the hydrant that was knocked down but failed to halt the car. "It was just a fluke that the pin (which releases the flow of water) wasn't broken; however, it would only have caused minor damage before we could have controlled it."

In 1962 the house was threatened by a fire which destroyed the valet service and hardware store, known as Sydney's and Skippy's respectively, which used to stand next door. The danger of explosion from gasoline in the two filling-station pumps in front of the building prompted firemen to ask the Trowbridge family and others in nearby residences to vacate their homes.

The fire was brought under control by the Farms fire department, but the building was so badly burned that it was razed.

Again, one year and a few days later builders were within two weeks of completing major reconstruction of the house at 376 Kercheval when fire broke out again. This time it was caused by a plumber's torch in the basement.

"The fire burned for four hours before it was brought under control," said Mrs. Trowbridge. "The weather was so cold that spray from the hoses froze to the walls," added her son, Charles, now a senior at the Grosse Pointe High School.

Original Roof Lost
Lost in the fire was the original roof of hand-hewn shingles. The polished wood floor had to

be rebuilt and the plaster on the walls refinished. The sunny, cheerful rooms show no signs of the damage now. Fortunately the house was uninhabited at the time, and the authentic pieces with which the house is furnished were not harmed.

Rebuilding a flagstone terrace on the east side, crushed by the equipment used to put out the fire is one of the next family projects.

No one knows exactly how old the building is, but records show that it was standing in 1819 on the corner of what is now Lake Shore and Provençal roads when it was bought by Pierre Provençal and his wife. At that time it was used by the couple who lived in a large house nearby as a nursery for the 23 children they adopted and raised before bearing an only daughter, Katherine. She eventually married Judge Weir and they used the house as a summer cottage. In "Know Your Grosse Pointe," it is mentioned as the Weir House.

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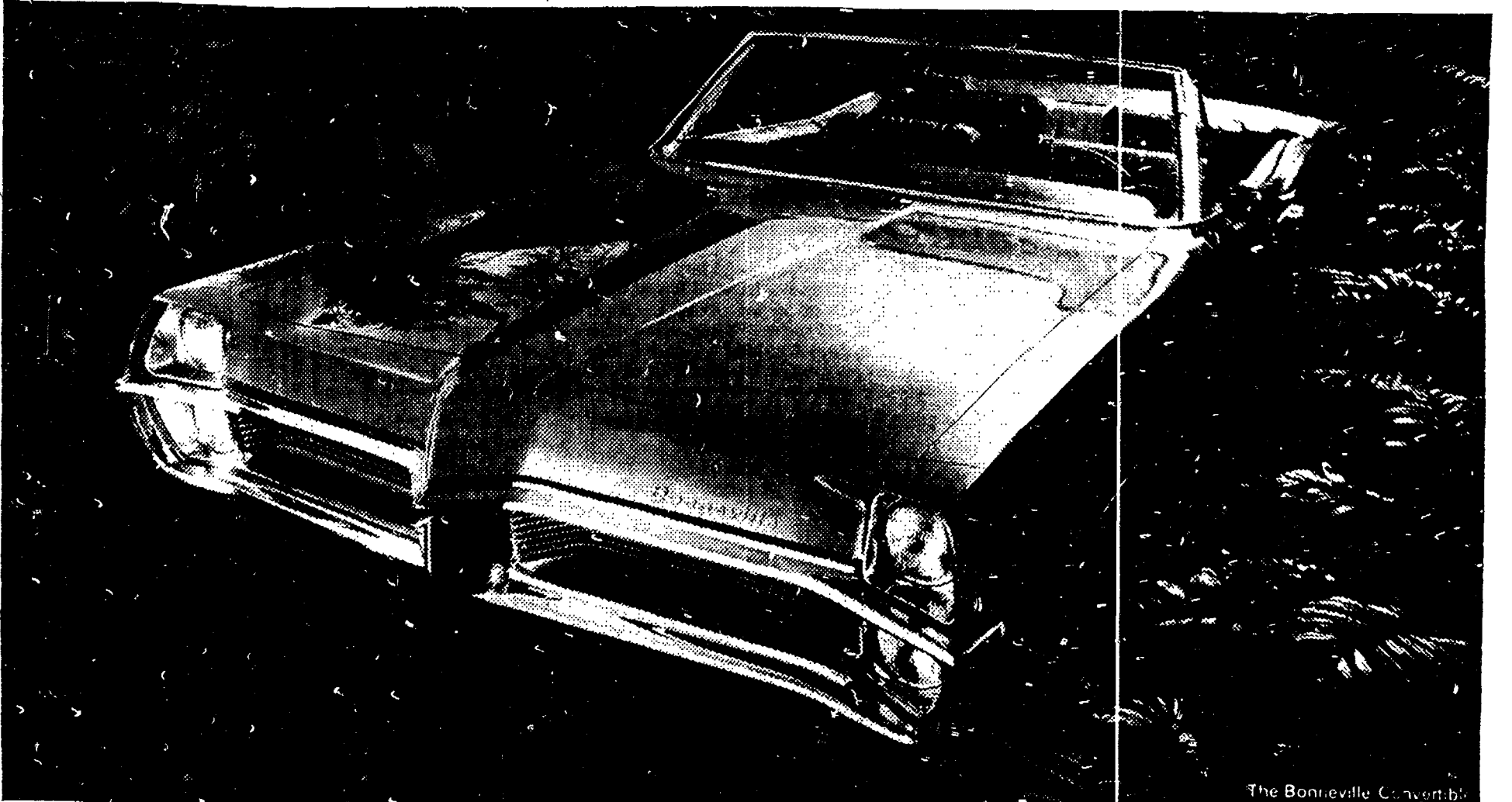

State Educators Holding Planning Conference Here

The first of a series of planning conferences devoted to the development of innovative and exemplary curricula in foreign language humanities and area studies is being held in Grosse Pointe today in cooperation with The Grosse Pointe Public School System.

Some 40 representatives of school systems and institutions of higher learning from throughout the state are meeting from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. in the second floor Exhibition Room of the Grosse Pointe Central Library.

Founded under Title III of Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act), the program comprises state-wide projects in foreign language curriculum development and is administered by the Ann Arbor Public School System in cooperation with the Center for Research on Language and Language Behavior of the University of Michigan.

Dr. Jean Carduner, professor of French in the Department of Romance Languages of the University of Michigan, is keynote speaker at the meeting. Today's session is chaired by George T. Edgington, Assistant to the Superintendent of The Grosse Pointe Public School System and Director of the Humanities Program in the Foreign Language Innovative Curricula Study.

J. Harold Husband, Acting Superintendent of Schools, welcomed the guests on arrival. Mrs. Barbara Ort, State Consultant in Foreign Language, addressed the group on "The Look Ahead in Foreign Language Education in Michigan." James McClafferty, Director of the Foreign Language Curriculum Study, provided an overview of the total program and Dr. George Geis, Director of the Staff Training, discussed methods of innovation.

Harry Regenstreif, Coordinator of Foreign Languages for the Ann Arbor Public Schools and Director of the Learning Laboratory Program in the Foreign Language Innovative Curricula Study, described new approaches to instruction. "Problems of Curriculum Innovation in the Secondary School" was the topic of Robert Welch, Assistant Principal of Grosse Pointe High School.

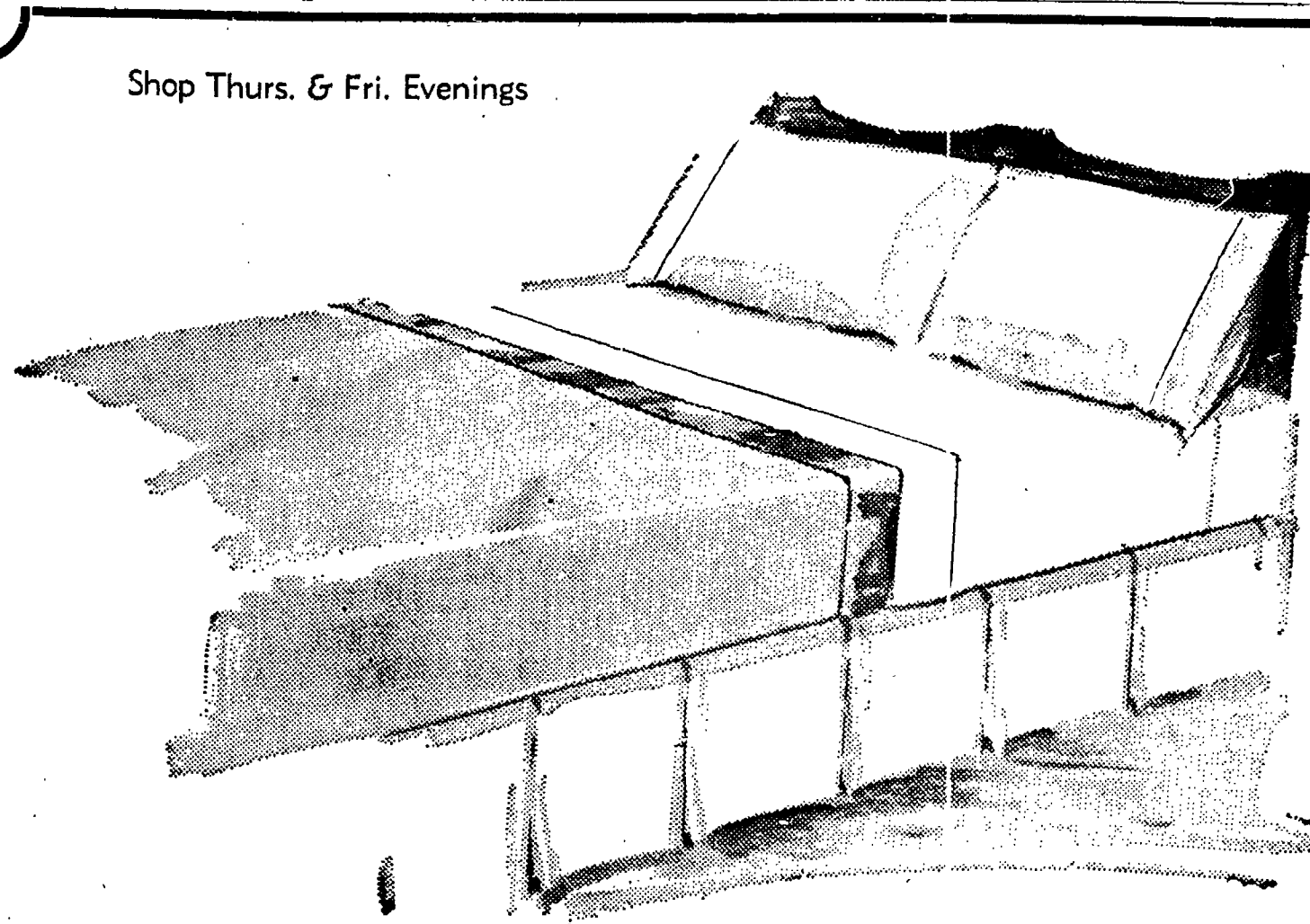
The chief said that he received information from Russell Harrison of the Commission's Traffic Engineering Division, that the matter is in the Planning Division Department for study.

Center to Show Movies of Japan

"Japan at Cherry Blossom Time" a color film extravaganza by Dr. Richard E. Pear will inaugurate Grosse Pointe War Memorial's "Meet the Travelers" series Friday evening, October 7, at 8 o'clock. The Grosse Pointe public and their guests are cordially invited free of charge.

The film opens with a galaxy of colorful cherry blossoms in the ancient Japanese city of Kyoto. Guests will pass through the largest Torii gate in the world outside the vermilion painted Heian Shrine in Kyoto. The Heian Shrine is a reduced scale model of the first Imperial Palace built some 10 centuries ago.

Throughout the city of Kyoto viewers will see the colorful cloth flying from poles of all the houses where there are boys children. This is the annual boys day celebration.

Visits are made to the Gold and Silver Pavilions which were built as summer palaces by ancient Shoguns or Warlords. Kyoto is the arts and crafts center of Japan. Guests will see the Japanese craftsmen making Cloisonne, Damascene, Lacquer ware, and Wood block prints.

A Suki-yaki dinner and entertainment are enjoyed at a Geisha party and the beautiful Cherry Blossom dance show is filmed at the famous Gion Corner.

An exciting boat trip is made down the Hozu Rapids with a river in a state of flood after a heavy rain.

The city of Nare in Japan is famous for its 800 tiny tame deer and the Kesuga Shrine. This Shrine has an enchanting setting with some 3,000 stone and bronze lanterns. The audience will stop for a look at the largest wooden structure in the world at the Todaiji Temple which houses the biggest bronze statue in the world. The colossal Daibutsu is an image of Buddha.

Many farm scenes are shown including tea cultures, strawberries, rice and wheat.

The Wedded Rocks are viewed near the Mikimoto Pearl Island. All phases of pearl culture are carried through a complete cycle from oyster harvest to finished pearl necklaces. The hard working Japanese fishermen are seen making ropes, nets, and the blown glass floats for their fishing nets in the little town of Ajaro.

Reel 2 of Dr. Pear's movie on Japan starts out at the Kawana resort hotel located on the Japanese Riviera. The hotel has a beautiful golf course with all girl caddies.

A Japanese house is shown step by step in construction complete with the making of Tatami mats.

A pioneer resort hotel in

Japan is the Hotel Fujiya at Miyanosita. This hotel has fabulous gardens complete with a waterwheel and azaleas in all colors in full bloom.

On the way to Nikko there is a stop at the seaside resort of the festival of the Toshogu Shrine. Twice a year there is a procession of 1,000 marchers wearing the ancient Samurai clothing. The Toshogu Shrine is covered with some six acres of gold leaf. The sacred stables have the wood carvings of the three monkeys, see, hear, and say no evil. The wood carvings on the Yomeimon and Karamon gates of this shrine are a sight never to be forgotten.

Tokyo has its parks, Olympic swimming pool, Imperial Hotel and Asakusa amusement center. Ganga Street in Tokyo at night is a throbbing, pulsing center of neon lights. One can see everything from Sumo wrestling to the Atomic girls of the Kokusai theater in this movie.

Leaving Japan viewers will say goodby with Mount Fuji in the early morning background.

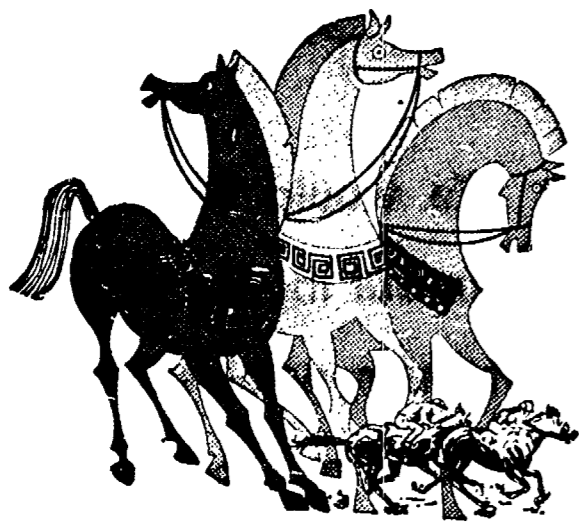

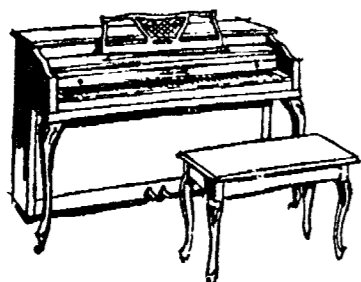

Trio Takes Cash, Coat from Man

While the man with the knife, and one other kept him at bay, they took his wallet, Gordemann said, removed \$20, and returned the wallet. Then, Gordemann added, the third fellow took the topcoat from the rear of his car, after searching the vehicle. The trio fled to a waiting car and escaped, Gordemann said. He did not get a good look at a fourth man, who was at the wheel, he told police. After the robbery, the victim said, he went home, took a shower, then informed his parents of the incident, they advised him to call police. When queried why he did not make a report sooner, Gordemann said that he was too upset and too frightened at the time.

Fall's Pageant of Color Great Mystery of Nature

One of the great mysteries of nature is unfolding in Michigan's woods and forests as the greens of summer give way to the flamboyant colors of autumn.

The reason why some trees turn and others do not and why some turn faster than others is somewhat obscure, but scientists admit, but it all adds up to scenic delight for vacationers and sightseers.

Those who look at the change of the season through scientific eyes have observed that both the matter of the turning of colors and the falling of

the leaves coincide with a definite timetable of nature, related to the shortening of the daylight hours. It is the same kind of timetable that triggers the southern migration of birds and the spawning run of certain species of fish—a mystery which scientists have never been able to unravel.

tour enthusiasts find Michigan's fall season is replete with a nature's most magnificent finery.

From the rocky crags of the Upper Peninsula to the gentle, rolling hills of the southern counties, Michigan in autumn is one gigantic color tour.

Many Trails Posted
Many communities and regional groups have established posted color trails where motorists follow marked signs which take them through the more outstanding color areas.

Michigan is well supplied with a variety of trees making it the fall showplace of the nation. With 85 kinds of soft and hardwood species it has a greater offering than any other state. It has more types of trees than all of Europe.

Flaming scarlet and crimson mingle with chromes and ambers over a background of greens supplied by spruce, pine and other firs. Low growing sumac, berry bushes and scrub oak add to the riot of color that is Michigan in autumn.

Tour Guides Available
Rambling through Michigan's wooded countryside on a fall weekend can prove a rewarding experience for those who find enjoyment in traveling where their fancy may take them. For the many others who prefer planned color trips, the Michigan Tourist Council offers the newly-revised Michigan Autumn Color Tour Guide containing 24 suggested routed color tours through various sections of the entire state.

Dull Show in Europe
Added to this mystery is the fact that the turning of leaves in autumn is characteristic, to a greater extent, of American rather than European trees. Plants imported to Michigan soil will turn bright colors or remain green, according to the timetable of their native region. This factor is a dead giveaway as to their origin.

Climate is not necessarily a factor and neither is the relationship of one tree to another, for many unrelated trees turn identical colors while others of the same family will turn different colors.

Scott to Direct New Art Council

E. Ray Scott, until recently a Grosse Pointe resident, has been named executive director of the new Michigan State Council for the Arts. His appointment was announced by Karl Haas, chairman of the 15-member council, which began operation July 1 with funds appropriated by the legislature at its 1966 session. Scott has been serving since April on an interim appointment by Gov. Romney prior to the establishment of the Council as a statutory agency.

The Council began in 1960 when former Gov. G. Mennen Williams created a 68-member Michigan Cultural Commission. This body grew to 120 and then was streamlined and reconstituted in 1962 when Gov. Romney assumed office.

The Council's purpose is to stimulate and encourage throughout the state the study and presentation of the performing and creative arts.

Scott, a native of Arkansas, was a public relations representative for the Michigan State Medical Society's Detroit office for six years prior to joining the Arts Council.

He has a B.A. and M.A. from the University of Southern California in Communications Arts. He was with NBC-TV from 1950 to 1952 as a production coordinator. From 1953 to 1959, he served as Director of Entertainment for the United States Armed Forces in Europe. During this period, he developed a program of musical and dramatic shows, including radio and TV programs. They were produced at Seventh Army Headquarters in Germany and performed for U. S. military and civilian audiences throughout Europe.

Scott now lives at 20 W. Bethune. He is a member of the Aircraft Club and The Players.

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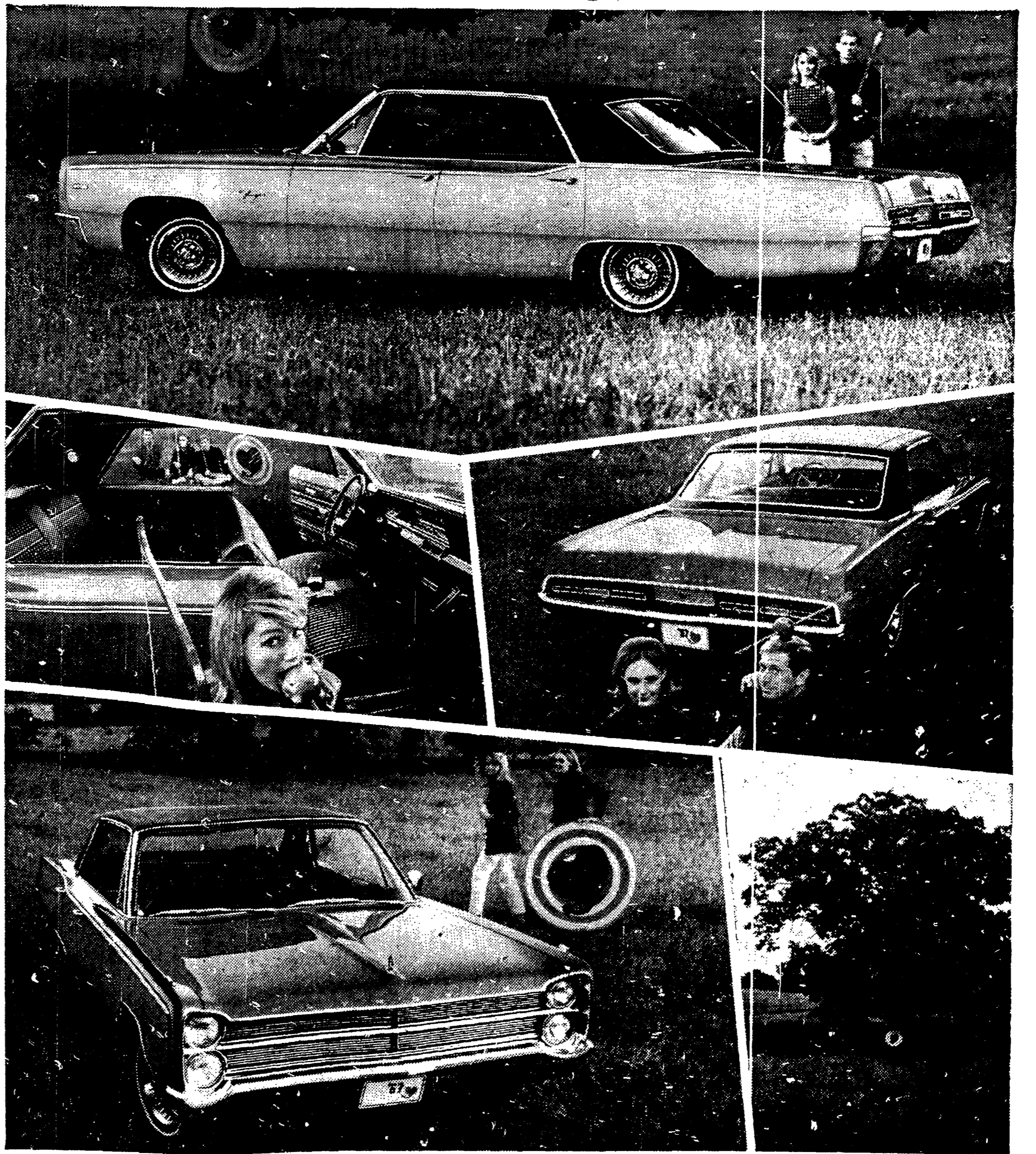

4,000 Miles on Bicycle Built for Two



Nothing's changed about ANNE MAYO HARTZELL except her name and address. She's now MRS. W. HOWIE MUIR and they live in Simsbury, Conn. Their parents, Dr. and Mrs. John B. Hartzell and Mr. and Mrs. William K. Muir, live but a block apart in Ridge road.

Ever since Annie learned to toddle and talk, all of life has been a challenge that had to be met... head on! We watched her as a blue-eyed, freckle-faced imp of three, teetering on the end of a diving board for nearly an hour, screwing up the courage to take her first dive. When the initial plunge was finally accomplished she became a perpetual motion machine. Into the pool, out of it, back on the board... as fast as her little legs and flailing arms could manage the maneuvers. She must have taken 50 dives before she exhausted her audience and had to be turned off by her doting daddy.

Swimming, bowling, golf, tennis, skiing... you name it. Annie's mastered it and came out on top against the toughest competition she could dig up. She's a most accomplished artist... in any media... a fine sculptress, a musician of professional calibre. She has cut records and performed before many a delighted audience with her guitar and a voice made-to-order for swinging hill-billy and folk songs.

You get the picture. Annie is beautiful, talented... and very gutsy. She'll try anything and has done just that to 'most anything you could name. And now she has come up with... and conquered... what should be the peak of all the challenges of her crammed-full career.

The latest accomplishment required not only the whole-hearted cooperation, but also the great physical stamina of her husband. Howie, the director of admissions at Trinity College in Hartford, Conn., is a great looking guy as his wife is a gal. About six feet four, he has the build of a Greek god and he'll probably never be in better condition than he was at the end of this amazing episode they endured this summer.

4,000 Miles, 75 Days
This most unusual couple pedaled a tandem bicycle 4,000 miles in 75 days... from their Connecticut home to San Francisco. As far as is known they are the only ones who have ever undertaken such a grueling adventure. The idea of the trip, (Annie's we're sure), was born two years ago, and details of the planning and training which went into the preparation are not only interesting but almost incredible. Experts of all kinds, on bicycles, equipment required, packing, tricks to conserve strength, special accessories, etc., were consulted and tests made, procedures practiced.

The bicycle they selected was a French 'Gitane' weighing 50 pounds and their pay load of camping gear, 65. Howie pulled all this at the end of a nylon strap over five California mountain passes, with Annie balancing the burden. Their meticulously kept log tells that they walked and towed a total of only 35 miles out of 4,000.

California Toughest
California was by far the toughest state. Their route, after months of study, took them over "the least primary of the secondary roads," to avoid heavy truck and auto traffic. They averaged about 62 miles per day and their best distance in a single day was 125 miles, from Salt Lake City to Wendover, Utah. When they stopped at the end of that day, their rear axle broke right in two. They carried two spare tires and patching equipment. They had between 30 and 40 flats... three in one day, even with extra heavy-duty wheels and rubber. Going down Monitor Pass to Lake Tahoe it was so hot they blew a tire simply by braking.

The worst day of the whole trip came around Lapeer, Mich. They were pedaling through a blinding rain and hit a chuck hole. "It bent both our rims," they reported, "and we limped into a terrible motel and spent most of the night hammering them back in shape."

Their sleeping bags were used three or four nights in a row, depending on the terrain... then they'd go push for a night in a motel to get really cleaned up and relax. Most of their laundry and bathing were done in lakes and streams. They carried a jar of peanut butter and one of jelly, with a few crackers, in case the eating stops were too far apart. It

seems they had to rely on these far more often than they'd anticipated.

Magnificent Pictures

The intrepid Muirs brought back one of the finest collections of colored slides it has been our privilege to see. The magnificent pictures have been expertly edited by themselves... about 200 out of some 600 taken. Many of them were shot by Annie from her rear seat as they were in transit. They tell a dramatic story of the actual physical hardships which one must endure on such an excursion, but they also reveal the great sense of humor which is a prime requisite for anyone considering such a challenge.

They are eloquent in their explanation of why the trip was necessary... to see from the greatest vantage point what this country is all about. They have caught the breath-taking grandeur of the magnificent mountains, the frightening aspects of fighting desert heat for unendurable stretches, the splendor of lakes and rivers and tumbling streams, fertile valleys and barren miles of rocks and scrub growth, shadows cast by two cyclists flashing by a golden cliff, morning mists arising from a swamp.

This is a tremendous saga and if George Pierrot doesn't try to latch onto this panorama of America he ought to have his head examined. Well done, Annie and Howie. We admire your intestinal fortitude and envy you the immeasurable rewards earned by your acceptance of a great challenge.

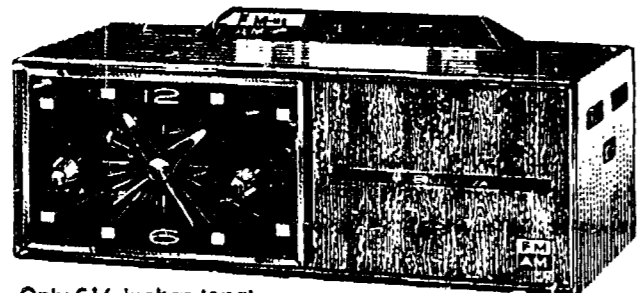
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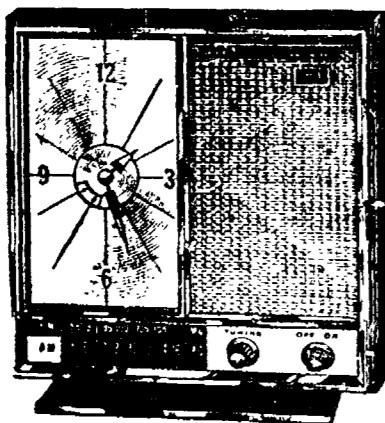
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Blue Devil Eleven Beats Port Huron by 53-0 Score

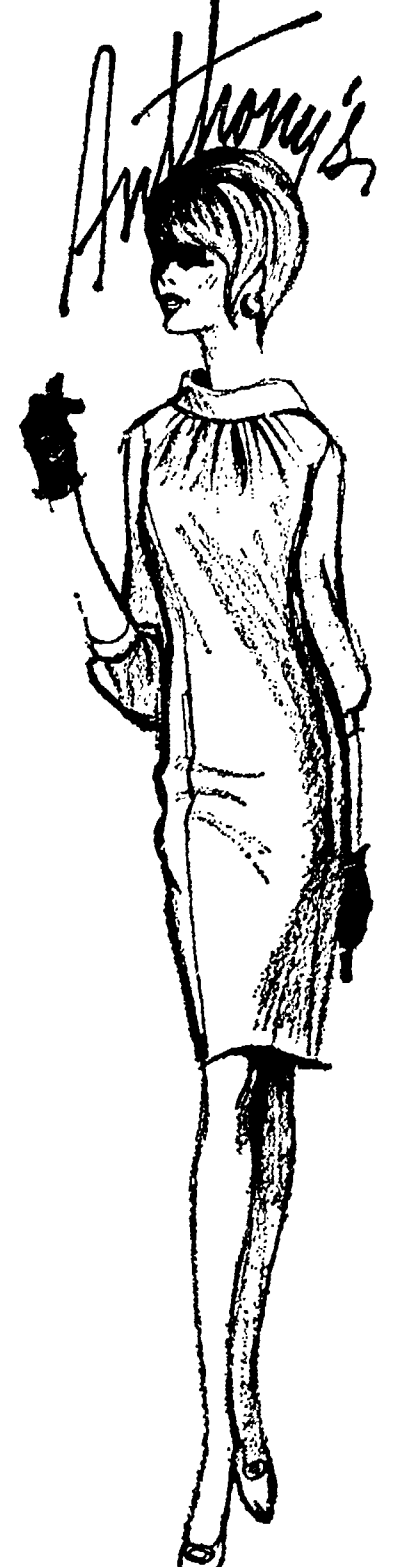

Pointer of Interest

George Bender has been a detective for 20 years. It's not his "formal" work; officially, he's director of institutional advertising, (national advertising), for Parke Davis and Company. But detecting is much more than Mr. Bender's hobby. It's his art, his passion . . . and his private life as a detective is inextricably interwoven with his public life as a Parke, Davis executive.

The results of Mr. Bender's double-decade Double Life, (actually, it's more an overlapping than a Double Life; the detective and the business executive were always one and the same person), have been collected and published this year, by Northwood Institute Press, in two volumes: "Great Moments in Pharmacy" and "Great Moments in Medicine." Much of the material in the books is familiar to the general reader. The paintings, by artist Robert A. Thom, of Birmingham, and the stories, by George Bender, appeared individually in national magazines during George's "detective" years, as a Parke, Davis advertising series.

Conceived by Bender

The "Great Moments" series is one of the oldest continuous advertising projects in America. Conceived by George Bender, the series was enthusiastically sponsored by Parke, Davis. Artist Thom, commissioned to do the first paintings, and writer Bender formed a Perfect Team, "detecting" and creating together until the pictorial histories of Pharmacy and Medicine were completed.

Authenticity was their first consideration. They traveled over a half-million miles in their search for accurate data on their subjects, checked and re-checked their findings with historians and medical experts. "Whenever there was anything left of the site where an actual Great Moment had taken place, we tried to see it for ourselves," George explains.

The Bender home is a mirror of George's travels, with paintings of places he has been, hung on every wall. Quite a few of the paintings are mountain scenes; George, who grew up in Webster, South Dakota, his wife, Lois, and their two sons, Ted, 16, a senior, and Bill, 14, a sophomore at Grosse Pointe High School, like to do a bit of mountain climbing whenever they get the chance.

Also Has Grandchildren

George has a "grown" family, too, four children and 15 grandchildren (some older than Ted and Bill—"I have grandchildren in college, and children in high school," he chuckles) scattered from Toronto to La Jolla, Calif.

His oldest son, Frank C. Bender, M.D., lives in Plainfield, Ill. Bob G. Bender, an engineer with an aircraft company, makes his home in Garden Grove, a suburb of Los Angeles.

George's twin daughters both married Ph.D.'s: Dorothy (Mrs. David) Hampton resides in La Jolla, and Donna (Mrs. Daniel) Hill lives in Don Mills, Ont., just outside Toronto.

Involvement with the Great Moments series left George Bender little time for hobbies, but lately he's been branching out a bit, does some home carpentry and shares Ted's interest in skeet and trap-shooting. As a traveler, albeit a "working" traveler, he developed an interest in photography. He's quite a collector, and has a complete series of Parke, Davis products covering the past 50 years, plus samples of products that go much farther back.

Even Has Horse Syrup

Among the more fascinating (frankly, they're ALL fascinating; one could spend several days in the Bender basement, just reading labels) items is a bottle of Equine Horse Syrup. Then there are "Lady Webster's Dinner Pills," marketed in 1893, and all the items in a group of Parke, Davis canisters (we were especially intrigued by "Pressed Pansy," advertised as being good for

colds, slightly laxative and helpful in controlling eczema and minor skin disorders!)

And there's Extract of Mistletoe, popular in 1885. George even has one bottle bearing an 1869 Parke, Jennings label. The company is 100 years old this year, but Mr. Davis was a "late-comer"; he didn't become associated with the firm until 1871.

Books are another of Mr. Bender's interests. He has every edition of the United States Pharmacopoeia and National Formulary, plus an 1808 first edition of the Massachusetts Medical Society Pharmacopoeia, first pharmacopoeia ever published in the United States, plus all sorts of other medical and pharmaceutical texts (one should plan on spending an extra week in the Bender home, reading books, when one is through marveling over labels).

Fabulous Collection
His miscellaneous collection of pharmaceutical memorabilia includes old-fashioned doctors' bags, with special pillbox cases, an "almost perfect"—eight cans are empty—wooden chest, holding 288 hinged-lid tin boxes for individual herbs and extracts, a 1905 formaldehyde generator . . . (maybe one should just move in WITH the Benders for several months, to fully explore George's collections).

"Of course, I picked up quite a few things accidentally," he says. "I've only WORKED at collecting for the past five years."

The shelves holding Mr. Bender's drug collection are concealed behind wooden doors; the insides of the doors are literally papered with his registration certificates, degrees and membership scrolls, ranging from his original South Dakota registration as a pharmacist through his appointment as an "Admiral" in the Nebraska Navy.

He's a life member of both the American Pharmaceutical Association and the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association, holds membership in several State and Provincial pharmaceutical associations, is registered as a pharmacist in eight States, is a member of the American Association of the History of Medicine and has served as president of the American Institute of the History of Pharmacy, the Michigan Branch of the American Pharmaceutical Association and the Michigan Academy of Pharmacy.

Has Honorary Degrees

He received the honorary degree of Master of Pharmacy from Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science in 1945, and his alma mater, South Dakota State College (he was graduated from South Dakota's Division of Pharmacy in 1923), conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Science in 1958.

George Bender spent several years in retail pharmacy before entering the field of pharmaceutical journalism, in 1929. He had always enjoyed writing; he had always been fascinated by pharmacy; He was delighted to be able to pursue his two major interests as a pharmaceutical writer.

He served in an editorial capacity on pharmaceutical magazines in the mid-West and New York before joining Parke, Davis and taking over duties as editor of "Modern Pharmacy" in 1947.

"At least 16 years before I became associated with Parke, Davis, I formed the idea that something ought to be done about pharmacy, pictorially," he

recalls. But the Great Moments series was no more than an idea until the company provided George with the opportunity—and the money—to go ahead on his project.

Just Grew and Grew

The series began as an editorial feature in "Modern Pharmacy," then grew and grew. Individually and in groups, the paintings and stories were "naturals" for retail sales promotions, displays, teaching aids on all levels.

"A few years ago, we counted up and found about 35 different ways in which the Medicine and Pharmacy series" were being used," George says. "Prints from both series can be found in countries all around the world today."

"The original paintings, as a single display, have traveled back and forth across the United States, and into Canada, many times."

The series as a whole have been translated into Spanish and French, and George has run across individual copies translated into Arabic, Afrikaans, Japanese, even Thai (Siamese).

As advertising, Great Moments has won numerous awards; as historical writing, it has withstood the test of time. When the Medicine and Pharmacy series were collected in preparation for publication as a two-volume set, it was found that very little re-writing was necessary. Occasional chapters had to be revised, brought up to date because new information had been discovered between the period when the article first appeared and the books' publication date, but Artist Thom's and Author Bender's original "detective" work, so solid, thorough, painstaking, proved unassailable.

Took Joint Safaris

On their Information Safaris through Europe and across North America, Thom and Bender usually traveled together. It was George's job to find and explore sources of information, Thom's to make sure every physical detail in every picture was as authentic as possible.

They never considered a painting finished when it came off the easel, a story finished when it came out of the typewriter. Everything was checked and re-checked with experts, paintings and stories were re-done, re-checked, re-done and re-checked again and again.

Costumes, jewelry, bric-a-brac in every painting had to be authentic—but in the matter of "crowd scene" faces and figures, Thom sometimes allowed himself a little artistic leeway, using his friends as models. George was pressed into service twice: He appears as the basket-toting Shaker on Page 113 of the Great Moments in Pharmacy volume, as the kneeling pharmacist receiving the first European edict completely separating pharmacists' responsibilities from those of Medicine on Page 61 of the same volume (Thom himself is one of the attendants in the background).

Was Two-Man Job

Every word in the Medicine and Pharmacy series was written by George Bender (he has a 10-volume collection of his original manuscripts, interim and final drafts); every stroke in every picture was painted by Robert Thom.

Neither artist nor writer had any idea the Great Moments series would assume such monumental proportions, continue to absorb his interest and draw upon his talent for a full 20 years. Neither artist nor writer would have backed away from the project if he had known.

"You have to keep a question mark in your mind at all times," George Bender says, explaining the method by which an historical detective operates. And question marks, by their very nature, are fascinating things.

 - 1/2 C. chopped walnuts
 - 2 Tbsps. flour
 - 1/4 C. melted butter
 - 1 C. brown sugar
 - 3/8 C. cooked pumpkin (canned)
 - 1 tsp. vanilla
 - 2 eggs
 - 1/2 C. sifted flour
 - 1/2 tsp. baking powder
 - 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
 - 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
 - 1/4 tsp. ginger
 - 1/4 tsp. baking soda
- Mix dates, nuts and 2 Tbsp. flour (set aside).
- Blend brown sugar in melted butter. Stir in pumpkin and vanilla. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Sift together dry ingredients, add to pumpkin mixture, mixing thoroughly.
