## Open Occupancy Forum Offered By Voters League

### Representative Waldron And Orville Sherwood Taking Opposite Sides On Controversial Issue At Event In Pierce Junior High School

The Grosse Pointe League of Women Voters, believing that democratic government depends upon the informed and active participation of its citizens, will present a Forum on Open Occupancy at Pierce Junior High School on Wednesday, December 6 at 8 p.m. to which the community is cordially invited.

Speaking in support of the Fair Housing Bill No. 2035, which is currently in the House of Representatives, is Representative Robert E. Waldron, of University place, who was elected to the State House of Representatives in 1954, served as the Majority Floor Leader in the 1963-64 session, was the Minority Leader in the 1965-66 session, and is currently Speaker of the House.

### Served in War

Mr. Waldron, 47, is a graduate of Grosse Pointe High School, Dartmouth College, and the University of Michigan Law School. His undergraduate work was interrupted for four years by military service in World War II in which he enlisted as a private and was discharged as a captain. Mr. and Mrs. Waldron have three children in the Grosse Pointe Public School System.

The speaker opposed to the Open Occupancy legislation will be Orville F. Sherwood, the Executive Secretary and General Counsel of the Grosse Pointe Property Owners Association. Mr. Sherwood, 51, was graduated from Detroit Eastern High School, Wayne State University, and the Wayne State University Law School and is presently an attorney in private general practice.

During World War II, Mr. Sherwood served as a captain and is now a Lt. Colonel in the Active Reserve. Mr. and Mrs. Sherwood have two sons; Richard, who is at the Grosse Pointe High School and Robert, who is attending Michigan State Graduate Business School.

### In Public Service

The Grosse Pointe League of Women Voters, which has not taken a position on Open Occupancy, is presenting this Forum as a public service. Mrs. Carl J. Fischer, the League president, will open the Forum, which has been programmed by the Voters Service Chairman, Mrs. H. Justin Davidson, and the evening then will be presided over by a Moderator. Mr. Sherwood and Representative Waldron will make 10-minute presentations of their views on the Fair Housing Bill, and will then respond to written questions from the audience, which will be received by the League hostesses.

## Appeals Court Case Won By Bon Secours Hospital

The Court of Appeals of the State of Michigan rendered a decision that invalidated a section of the City's Zoning Ordinance which sought to prohibit Bon Secours Hospital from developing a strip of land for off-street parking. The ruling was rendered on Monday, November 27.

The latest decision climaxed a long, legal battle which began in 1963, when the hospital sought a permit to develop an 82 by 783-foot strip on its property as an extension to its present parking lot. The City denied the permit, and the matter was taken before the Wayne County Circuit Court by hospital officials.

The court ruled the ordinance, which was amended January 21, 1963, was invalid, and the City appealed the decision.

## PTA Council Supporting Bond Issue

### Proposed Election to Obtain Approval for Financing of Future School Needs Endorsed

Delegates to the Grosse Pointe PTA Council endorsed in principle a proposed bond and millage election to be held in late winter. The group's second meeting of the 1967-1968 year, held at the Central Library, was chaired by Vice-President Thomas Candler in the absence of President Charles A. Parcells, Jr.

Monday night's action followed presentations on future financing needs of the community's public schools and libraries by Dr. Theos I. Anderson, Superintendent of Schools, Mrs. Paul G. Hykes, President of the Board of Education, and Lawrence F. Kennedy, Assistant Superintendent-Professional Personnel.

The delegates faced a packed informational agenda that ranged from long-range building needs for the public schools and libraries to millage for future operation.

### Would Raise \$3,300,000

Dr. Anderson, who elaborated upon his preliminary capitalization recommendation to the Board of Education on October 23, indicated that the proposed one-mill building and site levy would run from 1969 to 1979 and would raise \$3,300,000. Features of the capitalization program are:

1. Acquisition of a fourth middle school site to be used to construct a building if population trends dictate the necessity. Estimated cost is \$700,000.
2. Additions to Barnes, Kerby and Maire elementary schools. Expansion of these buildings would provide a "safety valve" for future growth of the school system.
3. The development of facilities for vocal and instrumental music at Grosse Pointe South High School.
4. Facility development for the middle school buildings pegged at \$450,000.
5. A contingency fund of \$300,000.
6. An expenditure of \$110,000 to replace the heating plant at Trombley Elementary School.

The Superintendent added that he envisioned further expansion.

## New Package Approved by Both Teams

### Teachers' Ratification Ends Months of Study and Negotiation; Adjustment to Cost \$220,000

The trustees of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education authorized an improved salary package for 630 teachers in the public schools for the 1967-1968 year at a special meeting held Tuesday night.

Teachers ratified the package earlier in the day by a vote of 333 for the salary improvement, to 15 against. More than 400 teachers were eligible to vote on the proposal by virtue of membership in the Grosse Pointe Education Association.

Tuesday's action climaxed months of study and negotiation by representatives of the Grosse Pointe Education Association and the Grosse Pointe Board of Education.

### Agreement Fulfilled

The new 1967-68 salary schedule fulfills the clause of the readjustment agreement—"the Board agrees to immediately make such adjustments, as meet the approval of the Association . . . as will achieve for The Grosse Pointe Public School System such a rank of fifth (5th) place among the eligible school districts under comparison."

The re-examination arrangement agreed to in June made it possible for the schools to open on schedule this fall without the turmoil and uncertainty that marked the return to classes in many school districts throughout the metropolitan area and the state of Michigan.

An exhaustive comparative study of salary and fringe benefits this fall revealed that the local public school system's salary structure for teachers ranked 11th out of 19 with fringe benefits and 15th out of 19 if fringe benefits were excluded from the comparison.

### To Cost \$220,000

With Tuesday's ratification Grosse Pointe teachers will be in 7th place without fringe benefits and "around 4th" with fringe benefits among 20 area systems. The cost of the salary adjustment will amount to \$220,000 over last May.

School officials stressed that the successful conclusion of negotiations for 1967-1968 does not mean that teams representing the teachers and the trustees will be inactive until next spring. On the contrary, negotiations are expected to begin for 1968-1969 almost immediately.

Negotiations for the 1968-1969 year are uppermost in the minds of all concerned as the trustees and the administration make plans for the later winter millage election in connection with a bond issue for improvement of school and public library facilities.

### Recent Developments

Undoubtedly the local picture will be affected seriously by recent salary developments in the metropolitan area.

For example, three school systems that already have firm agreements with their teachers are Detroit, Bloomfield Hills, and Warren.

Detroit: BA \$7,500 to \$11,200; MA \$8,000 to \$11,700.

Bloomfield Hills: BA \$6,850 to \$10,850; MA \$7,500 to \$12,400.

Warren: BA \$7,000 to \$11,620; MA \$7,420 to \$12,320.

It was reported that Birmingham teachers recently rejected a proposal for the 1968-1969 year for a BA range from \$6,850 to \$10,850 and an MA range from \$7,500 to \$12,400. Birmingham has not yet settled for the 1967-1968 year.

### NAB YOUNG SHOPLIFTER

The manager of the Kresge store, 17101 Kercheval, reported to City Police on Saturday, November 18, that he was holding a 14-year-old boy for shoplifting. The boy, who had taken a \$3.88 toy gun, was taken to the station. He gave officers his name and address and then fled. Police found him at Neff and St. Paul. ## HEADLINES of the WEEK

Thursday, November 23

SENATE PASSED, 78 to 20, a Social Security bill carrying largest cash outlay ever for beneficiaries. The bill goes to a House-Senate conference committee, where amendments are expected to be made. The final product is expected to reflect the economy-conservative views of conservative conferees headed by Rep. D. Mills, D-Ark. The bill approved by the Senate is estimated to cost \$7.2 billion increased benefits for first full year of the new operation.

GUBERNOR ROMNEY met legislative leaders on Tuesday to work out a compromise on open housing bill. After a one-half hour meeting announced that the bill would pass with "substantial unanimity" and that the compromise was acceptable. Legislative leaders predict the bill will pass when the Legislature reconvenes December 11. The two major changes in compromise bill are: that there be no levy fines, and that open housing violators would be exempt from the courts, and the elimination of the exemption for residential institutions.

Friday, November 24

HEADQUARTERS in Saigon reported 280 U.S. soldiers and nearly 1,400 Communists were killed on Hill 875 and in battle areas around the Highlands. This is the heaviest and bloodiest campaign in Vietnam war.

NATIONALIST CHINA said that its guerrilla forces destroyed eight MIG 19 aircraft against a Chinese Communist mainland airbase. This marks the first time Nationalist Chinese officials have had specific results by operations on the mainland.

DETERMINATION settlement can be reached through direct negotiations. The Arabs are strengthening today when President Abdel Nasser warned Egypt will fight if necessary to get its territories back. Nasser's spokesman said Nasser hopes raised by Egypt's stance of the UN Security Council resolution in the Middle East "puts us back at par."

Saturday, November 25

AN EMERGENCY session of the UN Security Council, United States and Britain. U.N. Secretary-General U Thant last night in appealing to Greece and Cyprus to cooperate in efforts to head off the meeting was called by the request of Ambassador Prossides of Cyprus who said his island nation faced an imminent threat of attack and was being threatened by Turkey. Turkey's Ambassador Orfan Evlarp at the tension to Greek Cypriots and two Turkish Cypriots and said that without the government's firm stance "the same fate would befall on other villages."

## Woods Designated to Test Accused Drinking Drivers

bushel baskets for distribution. Those lucky enough to drive the family cars, helped make the deliveries.

Mounds of Edibles There were mounds and mounds of food of every variety piled in the high school auditorium, and the students spent a good part of the day packing the edibles.

After they completed packing there were many, many piles of perishables left over, and these the students took to the St. Bonaventure Monastery in Mt. Elliott avenue, Detroit, to be used by the Capuchin Fathers in preparing meals in their famous Soup Kitchen, to feed the hungry, who daily crowd the monastery hall. And the hungry, too, had a nice Thanksgiving.

Where did the money come from for this program? The students raised every cent themselves.

## White Xmas Ball Affair Of the Heart

### Fontbonne Auxiliary Hopes Event Will Pay for Coronary Unit at St. John Hospital

Bedside electronic monitoring devices keep split-second records of the damaged hearts of coronary victims. And if these victims are transported to a modern hospital Coronary Care Unit, their chances of survival increase 30 to 50 percent.

Such an eight-bed \$50,000 unit is planned at St. John Hospital.

The achievement of this plan may well depend in large measure on the success of this year's 14th Annual White Christmas Ball, sponsored by the hospital's Fontbonne Auxiliary. The ball will be held Saturday evening, December 9, at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club.

Life-Saving Invasion The language of the medical world is strange enough to the layman, and yet its mystery has been heightened even more by the sudden, life-saving invasion of almost bizarre looking electronic equipment.

Oscilloscopes . . . pace makers . . . defibrillators . . . even portable electrocardiographs. But the key to modern coronary care seems to be found in monitoring. A single nurse at a central and strategic station in the Coronary Care Unit can watch a bank of "consoles," each of which is literally wired into the heart victim. She is trained to detect irregularities and to make split-second comparisons and decisions.


Help Is Available If it is necessary and no cardiologist is present, the specially trained nursing team applies respirating equipment to help patient breathe easier, or, if necessary, to apply electric shock to a heart that is beating erratically or wildly.

Doctors are now inserting tiny "pacemakers" to help keep the heart beating regularly. The tiny device is threaded to the right ventricle of the heart through an IV catheter, or slim tube, inserted into a vein.

It is called a "pacemaker" because, operated as it is by batteries, it paces the patient's heart until it can launch off again on its own.

For those patients able to be up and around there is the portable EKG unit, or electrocardiograph. About the size of a small portable transistor radio, it can

pansion and renovation at Grosse Pointe South High School beyond the funds earmarked for the music facility. "We foresee an extensive program to renovate and modify the existing plant. It will take considerable work to update the present facilities," he said.

Dr. Anderson indicated that the funds earmarked for plant improvement at the middle school level will not include any building additions. He added that none of the three buildings would contain more than 800 students in the fall in an attempt to provide as good a program as possible under the new organizational plan.

Mrs. Hykes, in her remarks about the proposed public library improvement program, provided the Council delegates with background to the present system. "Since 1953 there has been no expansion of public library facilities in Grosse Pointe," she said, "in spite of a 31 percent population increase from 53,518 to 70,014 today. During that same period the schools have had to add 200 classrooms to meet the "in enrollment," she said.

**Three-Part Package**  
The President of the Board outlined the proposed three-part package designed to meet the total community's library needs. This includes:

1. Enlargement of the present Central Library at Fisher Road and Kercheval at a cost of \$1,385,000.

2. A new building on the site of Parcels Junior High School to house the Woods Branch at a cost of \$399,000.

3. A new building to house the Park Branch, possibly at the southwest corner of Pemberton and Jefferson, and estimated to cost \$309,000, exclusive of site purchase.

The total of \$2,493,000 for library expansion also includes \$70,000 for site development and landscaping at the three sites.

President Hykes said that the project could be financed by an assessment of .75 mills over a 15-year period. In terms of local property tax, this would mean an additional .75 cents for each thousand dollars of State Equalized Valuation.

**Kennedy Gives Details**  
Mr. Kennedy concluded the program with a detailed address "Problems of Staffing the System, the Current State Teachers Negotiations and Implications for the Millage Campaign."

Mr. Kennedy said that with the expected student population of North High set at 1700 and South at 2600 for the year beginning in September, 1968, staff assignments for the two buildings have been made as follows: 94 teachers for North and 13 for South.

He reported that North High has been 83 percent staffed by present members of the faculty of the school system. Of the total of 78 teachers already identified for North High, 62 are presently teaching at Grosse Pointe High School and 16 are in the junior high schools. At the moment 66 percent of the proposed staff members for the new building are veteran senior high teachers from within the system.

**See Few Newcomers**  
Mr. Kennedy said that 110 teachers have been tentatively assigned to South High School. Of this number 96, or 89 percent are currently on the high school staff and the additional 14 are presently teaching in the junior high schools. South High is currently 80 percent staffed. Another 10 to 15 vacancies will probably be filled from within the system. Therefore, relatively few newcomers to the system will be utilized to staff the two senior high schools.

Commenting on the problem of staffing at the middle school level, Mr. Kennedy said that 40 or 50 teachers appear to be scheduled to accompany the 9th graders to the senior high schools in September. Assistant Superintendent Kennedy reported that the schools

are slated to enter the third phase of solving the current problem of staffing as plans are made to house 20 to 22 sixth grade groups in the three middle schools.

**Provides Comparisons**  
Mr. Kennedy provided exhaustive comparative statistical data gathered during the recent re-examination of the teachers' contract to highlight the necessity for increased millage.

He indicated that without fringe benefits, the best of the local teachers ranked was 8th place at the master's degree maximum out of the 19 school districts reporting.

Mr. Kennedy said that as a result of the proposed improved salary package, Grosse Pointe teachers advanced from 15th to 7th place in the composite ranking without fringe benefits. Local teachers' ranking with fringes is perhaps somewhat better than the 5th place agreed upon by both sides.

Prior to the proposed adjustment presented to the teachers for approval on Tuesday, the local public schools were out-ranked at the minimum bachelor's degree salary by Ecorse, Dearborn, Van Dyke, Highland Park, Centerline, Warren, Taylor, Fitzgerald, South Lake, Lake Shore, Utica, Bloomfield Hills, Roseville, and River Rouge. Grosse Pointe's beginning salary for the 1967-68 year was \$6,100 with an additional \$385 for fringes.

**Other Comparisons**  
In a comparison of the tenth step of existing BA salary schedules, the Grosse Pointe teacher ranked 15th. At the maximum level the Pointe teacher ranked 12th in comparison to the other districts on the list.

Discussions are scheduled to open between the school trustees and the Grosse Pointe Education Association prior to beginning negotiations for salaries for the 1968-1969 year. The amount of millage to be requested at a late winter election will be determined as a result of the forthcoming talks.

safety and morals, or the general welfare of the community," the judge stated.

"There is certainly no showing in the record—in fact, the testimony would seem to indicate to the contrary—that not only is there no relation to the public health, safety, morals or general welfare of this community served by the passage of the ordinance in question, but that in effect the enforcement of this ordinance might have a serious effect on the public health of the defendant city and its neighboring communities," the ruling continued.

The hospital contended that because the City allowed a church (Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church) to be built in the district, while denying its (the hospital) request to expand, the ordinance was being discriminatorily applied to deny it the equal protection of the law.

In summation, the court determined, the "use" ordinance prohibiting hospitals south of Kercheval is invalid.

The City's appeal was heard by District Appeals Judge John H. Gillis, presiding; and Appeals Judges Louis M. McGregor and James S. Thornburn. Officials of Bon Secours Hos-

be wired so as to send beating messages back to a central station as the patient walks the halls of the hospital.

**Totes Tape Recorder**  
There is even a similarly small, portable tape recorder that contains its own eight-hour tape. To test patient's reactions to strain, changes in pace, or work load, such a device is literally slung over the heart victim's shoulder, recording on tape a sound picture of the heart's beats. At the end of the day, the patient returns to the hospital, and the tape is transcribed to a master tape which is then studied by a cardiologist and his technicians.

What seems like science fiction is today scientific treatment in the field of heart disease. With the latest equipment, trained personnel, greater knowledge and even more refined techniques, the number one cause of deaths in the United States bids fair to losing its devastating distinction.

### Farms Submits Building Report

In a monthly report from the Farms Building Department, submitted by Public Service Director John A. DeFoe, it was disclosed that during October, permits for a residence, commercial building and 17 miscellaneous construction were granted in the city.

The number of permits exceeded those approved during October 1966, when only one permit was granted for a residence, none for commercial, and 10 for miscellaneous building.

According to the report, from January 1, through October 31 of this year, eight permits were approved for home construction, one for a store, and 87 for miscellaneous.

During the same period in 1966, the Department approved 19 home permits, one for commercial, and 85 for miscellaneous constructions.

The new residence permit last month was for a \$150,000 home under construction at 248 Grosse Pointe boulevard; and the commercial permit is for a \$30,000 new business building at 19230 Mack avenue. The miscellaneous permits were for construction totaling \$54,000.

For the same month in 1966, the total value of home construction amounted to \$79,000; and the miscellaneous, \$41,500.

The total value of residential buildings so far this year is set at \$507,000, as compared to \$1,076,500 for 1966; commercial building valuations came to \$30,000, (the only one approved so far in 1967), as compared to the one for \$325,000 in 1966; and miscellaneous building values were set at \$486,300 to date of this year; as compared to \$32,600 for last year.

As of the October 31 date of this year, no non-assessable construction permits were applied for, whereas, in 1966, three were granted for buildings valued at a total of \$278,000.

Plans were slated by the court's ruling.

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

### Woods Gives Drunk Tests

(Continued from Page 1) this type of training, and three more are attending sessions learning how to operate it, he added.

When the three latest trainees have completed the learning process, this will give the department six men, two on each shift, for "around-the-clock" service, he said.

The director said in the two weeks ending November 22, since the service was instituted, four drivers have been tested, and at least two others have refused to take the test — subjecting themselves to revocation of their drivers' licenses under the provisions of the Implied Consent Law which became effective on November 2.

Director Andrews said that a test on November 13, on a Woods arrested driver, showed that the motorist had 0.27 percent blood alcohol content. A November 14 Woods arrest tested at 0.16 percent. A test for a City arrest on November 18 showed 0.22 percent; and a test on November 22 for the Farms police showed the driver had 0.19 percent.

State law established a presumption that a defendant is under the influence of intoxicating liquor if the test shows 0.15 percent or more blood alcohol content.

The six Pointe and Harper Woods police chiefs determined on a single testing location for the six communities because of the training and experience required. It was felt that such a location would concentrate the experience and reduce the cost of training the operators and the operating of the equipment.

The director said that the Woods charges back its actual costs to the city which requests the breathalyzer test.

It was pointed out that police have long asked for the Implied Consent Law, and feel that the new program will be effective in identifying the driver with a drinking problem, and, therefore, provide a basis for effective licensing and control action by the State.

The past practice of habitually reducing the charge of drunk driving to reckless driving, protects the driver with a drinking problem by concealing that alcohol was a factor in the charge, thus depriving the public of protection against a serious hazard, Director Andrews opined.

He said that heads of police departments throughout Michigan expect that the breathalyzer will greatly reduce the number of drunk driving cases, in which charges are reduced to reckless driving.

Any driver, suspected of driving while under the influence of liquor and taken into custody, who refuses to take a test, can have his license suspended for not less than 90 days, nor more than two years.

The arrested motorist is notified of his rights under the new law, and informed that he need not take the test if he does not want to, BUT his refusal means he will lose his driving privileges.

During their stay, the students listened to many other talks given by journalism yearbook and newspaper editors from various states.

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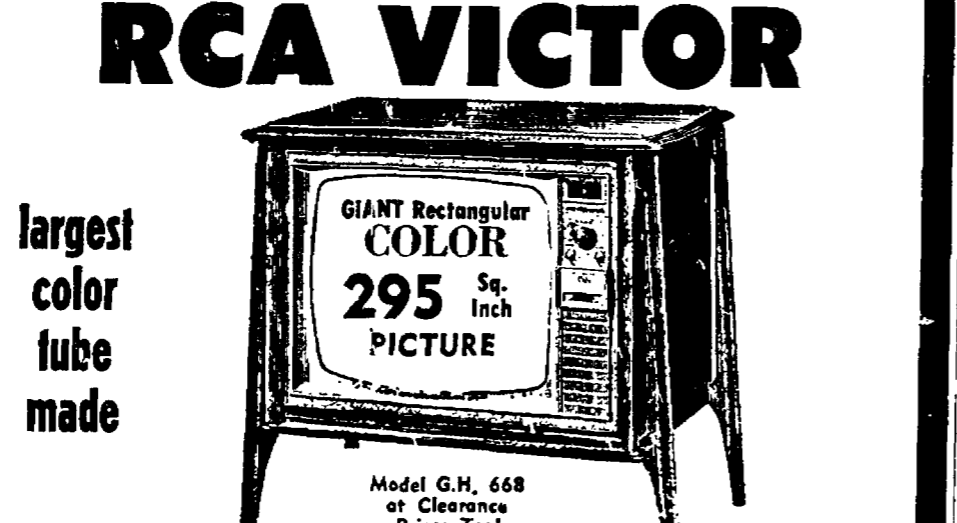

How are you on Indian signs? Did you know that the sign for "much" is a large rock or heap? Or that to illustrate a kill, you show an animal on his back? Or to show a man who has just eaten, you put a spot on his stomach?

Well, 67 third graders at Mason School know these Indian signs and more! In fact, the students in the classes of Elaine Anderson, Beatrice Simansky and Patricia Whelan know these and "heap lots more" about Indians.

They have just completed a month-long unit on the American Indians. Each class selected a tribe to study and took it from there.

The classes "did" as well as "read" about Indians. They had sessions of jewelry making, patterning their pieces after authentic Indian jewelry, making them out of buttons, beads, noodles, string and thread.

They made Indian headbands complete with Indian signs, (which they understood), Indian costumes and weapons.

They even learned some Indian dances and songs. They

saw films and learned what kinds of homes the Indians lived in and made facimiles of them . . . they learned about Indian boats and made models of them . . . they saw how

babies were toted by the squaws and made papoose carriers.

Some of the children compiled notebooks which included just where their particular tribe lived and in what kind of homes, what materials they used to make their homes, what kind of crops they raised, if they hunted, how their clothes were made, plus lots of information on tribal customs, dances and songs.

Then they held a big Pow Wow on Friday, November 17. Indians from all three classes met in the Segala Library in front of a roaring fire (in the fireplace . . . after all, they couldn't have an authentic bonfire on the FLOOR of the library!), and ate Indian food, including turkey, rice, cornbread, (prepared by mother

squaws), cranberries and brown beans. It goes without saying that they sat Indian fashion on the floor for the entire meal.

The children's sentiments on the unit? . . . "Heap um Fun!"

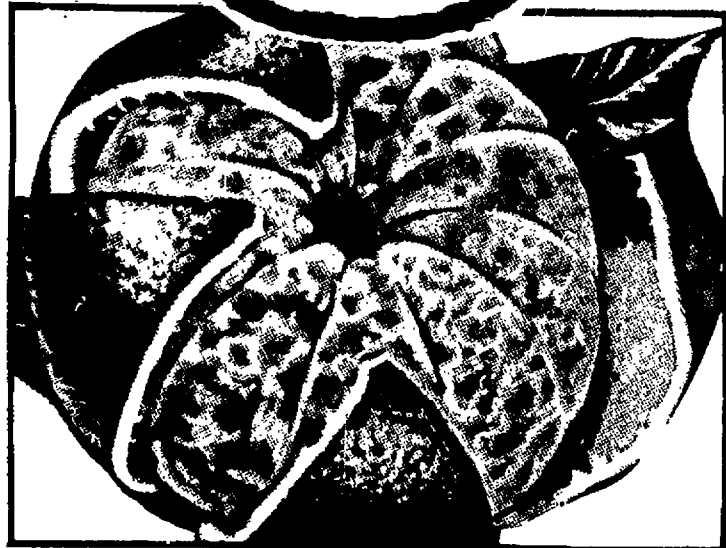

His '65 Buick convertible hit a southbound '63 Chevrolet driven by Charles Gleason, Jr. Both parties were rushed to St. John Hospital, where Piche later died. Gleason is still in critical condition.

Piche is survived by his mother and father Mr. and Mrs. David Piche; four brothers, Donald, Edward, Thomas, Robert; three sisters, Sister Rose David O P., Mrs. Carol Young and Jane Piche.

Funeral services will be held on Thursday, November 30, at St. Paul's-on-the-Lakeshore and the Verheyden Funeral Home. Interment will be in Mount Olivet Cemetery.

### Struck by Car In Parking Lot

Gary C. Schubert, 15044 Fordham, Det., was issued a court notice to appear for car not under control resulting in an accident on Wednesday, November 22.

On that day Schubert pulled out of a parking space at the rear of 17141 Kercheval, and was heading east through the lot when he made a left turn and failed to see Josephine Marie Batchelor, 342 Touraine crossing the exit roadway. He hit her with his right front fender.

Miss Batchelor was treated for minor injuries at Bon Secours Hospital and released.

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### Stolen Car Crashes Pole During Chase; Two Caught

Two Detroit youths were apprehended, and another escaped, following a high speed chase through Farms and City streets, which ended when the car the youths were in crashed into a utility pole at St. Clair and Waterloo on Monday, November 27. It was later discovered that the smashed vehicle had been stolen in Detroit.

The initial chase began at Kercheval and Kerby, when Farms Patrolman Donald Dewey observed a 1965 Ford Mustang speeding west on Kercheval, and took up pursuit.

Dewey said he signaled the driver to pull over to the curb at the Muir road intersection, and the youth behind the wheel complied. However, as he approached the car on foot, the officer said, the young motorist stepped on the pedal and sped away.

The patrolman said he got into his scout car and after radioing for assistance, gave chase west on Kercheval. City police responded to the call at 2:07 p.m., and sped to the business area in The Village. A minute later, another radio call was received in which the City dispatcher said that the fleeing car and occupants had crashed into a Detroit Edison pole, shearing it from its base. The car was a total loss.

Two of the vehicle's occupants, one the driver, jumped out of the automobile and fled the scene on foot. The third youth was found unconscious in the car, by City Police Chief Andrew Teetaert, City Cpl. George Brackx and City Patrolman Donald Steckman, and Dewey.

The unconscious youth, identified as Lawrence Yepp, Jr., 17, of 1696 LaBelle, Detroit, was conveyed to Bon Secours Hospital for treatment. He suffered no injuries except perhaps a blow to the head.

A second youth, James Smith, 17, of 2627 Burlingame, Detroit, was taken into custody in an alley behind Kercheval, just west of Notre Dame, where he was stopped by an agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who saw the youth running from the scene of the accident. The agent released Smith to Brackx, and told the policeman that he had seen the third boy running behind houses on Notre Dame, when he first detained the lad he had caught.

Smith, according to police, complained of an injury, but did not specify the type, and

was taken to the hospital for a checkup. Both Yopp and Smith were treated and released, and taken to the City station for questioning.

In the beginning, it was said, both teenagers denied knowing each other, then finally admitted they were friends, and disclosed that the third lad, known to them as "Fruit Trail", had been the driver of the car.

Yopp was released to his father at 5:30 p.m., pending further investigation by Detroit police, and Smith's parents were contacted and told to pick up their son.

At 10 p.m., a return teletype from the Secretary of State's Office in Lansing, disclosed that the car in which the trio were riding had been stolen from an Avis Car Rental Agency in Grand River, Detroit, at 9:05 a.m. that morning.

City Police Sgt. Foster Mauck contacted the Detroit Police Department, and the Detroit authorities requested that a hold be placed on Smith for them.

Chief Teetaert said that he also contacted officers of the Detroit Auto Recovery Squad, and said that the matter will be turned over to them for further investigation and possible prosecution.

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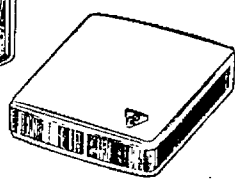
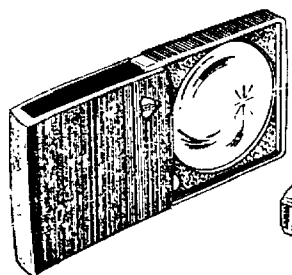


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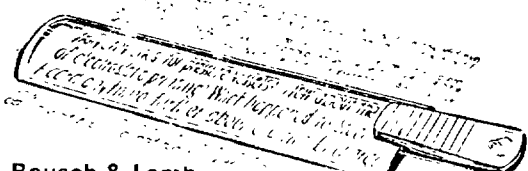

## MREA Launches Attack On Open Housing

A spokesman for the Michigan Real Estate Association has challenged the proponents of open housing to devote their energies to helping get better housing instead of to a futile pursuit of a meaningless law.

Pontiac Realtor, Bruce Annett, a past president and spokesman of the association, testifying before a public hearing of the House Civil Rights Committee in Lansing Monday, November 27, disputed both the need and fairness of the proposed law. "The pre-occupation of civil rights' proponents and politicians with laws of this type has diverted attention from other means and methods which offer no affront to the majority, do no damage to the freedom of contract respecting private property, and offer what the Negro needs most, more and better housing."

"Surely the ingenuity of government and private capital will be adequate to the task if the objective is agreed upon and implemented," he stated.

Criticizing the Governor's open housing bill, Annett pointed out that exempting private owner sales, and rentals in "Mrs. Murphy's boarding house," give lie to the lofty purposes of the bill, i.e. to prevent discrimination. "Proponents of the bill blithely say that discrimination is bad only for some, not for all," he said. "Such a housing law is misleading in its import and devoid of practical benefit to those for whom it is intended."

Annett also was critical of the new Civil Rights Commission, which would enforce the proposed law as "complainant, prosecutor, judge and administering agency." Noting a legal doubt as to the exact jurisdiction of the Constitutionally mandated Commission, the realtors' association is asking the Legislature to defer action on open housing measures.

The MREA represents the 2,350 realtors in Michigan as well as their 10,000 salesmen. The association consistently has opposed open housing laws as infringements on common law freedoms of contract in real estate transactions.

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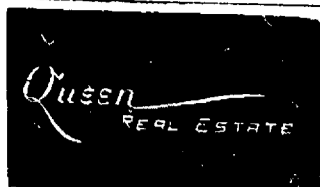

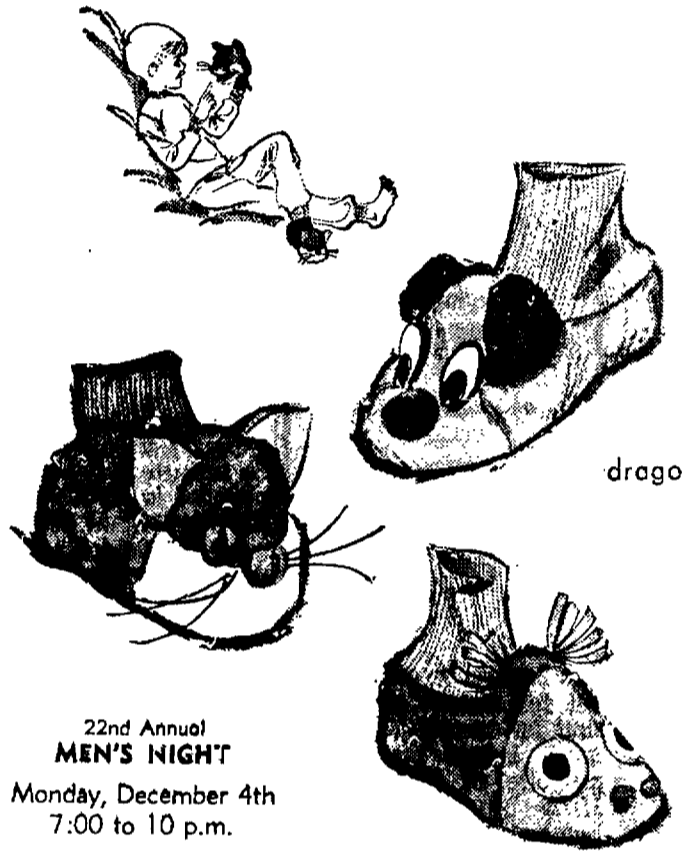

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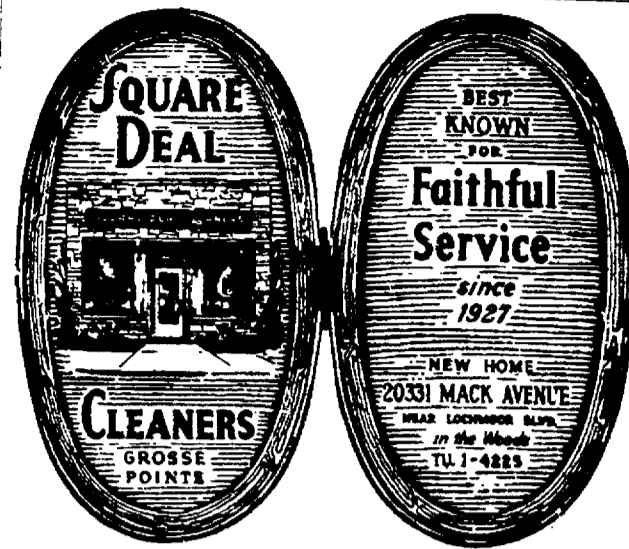

Cramer said the woman suffered bruises and contusions and was taken to St. John Hospital for treatment.

The officers, Cramer and Marone, searched the neighborhood, and said they found the hit-run car in a garage driveway at Hawthorne and Mack. The description of the vehicle and license number checked, they said.

The garage owner said he did not see the car pull into the driveway, nor did he see the driver.

Cramer and Marone said the front end of the car was badly damaged. They said they searched the inside of the automobile and found a gasoline credit card made out to Shawe. Marone said he could identify the owner because he had arrested him on a previous occasion.

When the policemen entered the lounge, Marone spotted Shawe standing at the end of the bar, and approached him and asked for his identification. Shawe refused at first, to comply with the request, but finally did so, and when told he was under arrest, he began to resist and was subdued. He was taken to the station.

Shawe was placed in a lineup with four volunteer policemen in plainclothes, and was promptly identified as the hit-run driver by the witness who stopped Cramer.

Director of Public Safety Allen Andrews said that Shawe had been arrested by Marone on October 22, 1966, on a drunk driving charge, and that Shawe was operating a motor vehicle on a limited license under the

Financial Responsibility Law. The director said that Shawe refused to take a breathalyzer test and in all probability will lose his driving privileges permanently.

Shawe was released after posting bond of \$150. He is scheduled to appear in the Woods Municipal Court on Saturday, December 2.

**400 Take Free Diabetes Tests**

Over 400 people received free diabetes tests at St. John Hospital, 22101 Moross Road, Detroit, during Diabetes Detection Week (Nov. 12-18).

The tests were performed without charge as a community service in cooperation with the Michigan Diabetes Association and the American Diabetes Association. This is part of an intensified program to find the estimated 1,600,000 undetected diabetics in this country.

James J. Humes, M.D., Director of Laboratories at St. John, said, "A significant number of the persons tested showed results which indicated the possibility of diabetes."

He emphasized that these positive results do not necessarily mean that the testee has diabetes, but indicate the possibility of the disease.

All persons showing these results are referred directly to their own personal physicians by the Michigan Diabetes Association. Their physicians will be notified of the test results.

Hospitals all over the state participated in the annual diabetes testing program. According to Henry D. Kaine, M.D., chairman of the Diabetes Detection Week, Michigan tests more patients for diabetes each year than any other state in the nation.

Michigan also has one of the vice-resident for six years and terms of seeing that the patient and his private physician are aware of the testing results, according to the Michigan Diabetes Association.

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**Steel Pilings in Lake Iak Residents of Trombley Road**

Two Park city officials were appointed to negotiate with Windmill Pointe drive resident in an attempt to force the resident to remove eight steel boat well pilings he had placed off the shoreline in Lake St. Clair, at the foot of Trombley road.

At a regular meeting held on Monday, November 27, Mayor Matthew Patterson, with the approval of the council, appointed City Manager Robert Slone and City Attorney Richard Rohr to meet with Earl R. Milner of 15650 Windmill Pointe drive, to discuss the removal of the pilings, which he had installed more than a year ago for his private boat well.

A number of residents living in Trombley road petitioned the council Monday night, to take whatever action is necessary to force Milner to remove the pilings, which extend approximately 40 feet out into the lake from the shoreline.

Slone said he has tried to arrange talks with Milner since early summer concerning the matter, but as yet Milner has done nothing about the situation.

The city manager said that Milner's property, which is pie-

shaped, intersects diagonally across the foot of Trombley road, and when he installed the pilings, he encroached about 30 feet onto the riparian rights of the city, which owns the road.

Slone said that if necessary, the city can start a court suit to force Milner to remove the pilings. He held the council that it would be cheaper to have the pilings cut by gas torch, than having them pulled. The cutting will have to start from the bottom land of the lake, to prevent any hazards to boats he said.

In their petition, the Trombley road residents said that since Milner put in the pilings, the property owners of the road, have discussed their removal with city officials, but nothing has been done by the city.

They suggested that since the city was legally within its rights to demand the removal, Milner should be forced to take the pilings out, as they are unsightly and detract from the view of the lake and are not in keeping with the neighborhood.

The residents asked that the matter be given immediate consideration, and suggested that the city institute a suit against Milner to have the pilings removed, or that the city remove them and charge the expense against Milner's property.

They said that they are in hopes that the situation can be corrected before the start of freezing weather.

Slone and Rohr said that they will arrange a meeting with Milner to discuss the matter, and will report to the council at a later date.

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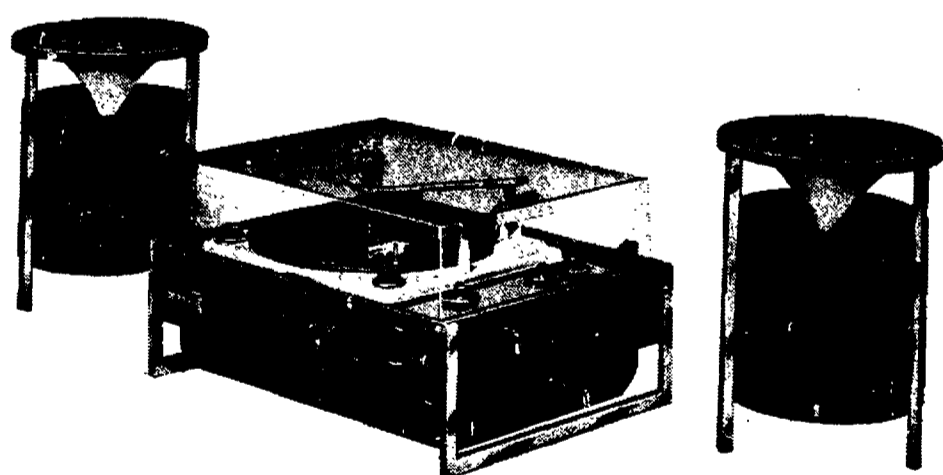


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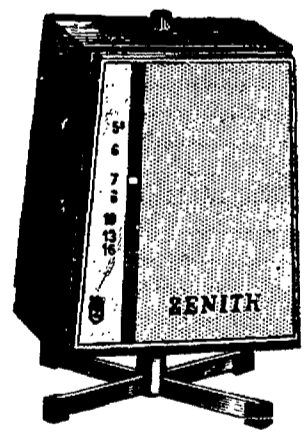
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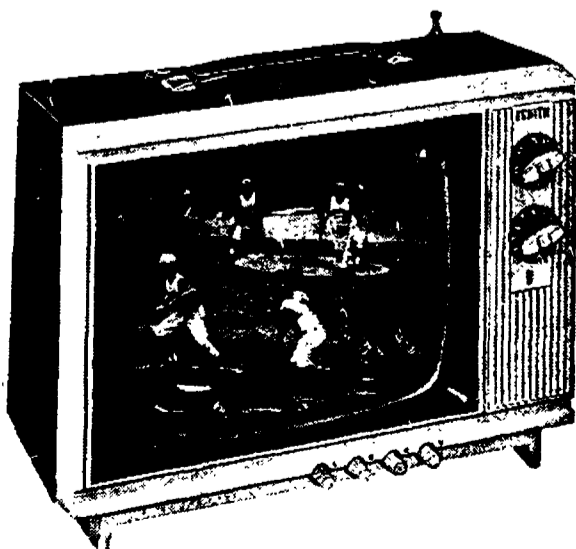

Sergeant Striker was cited for meritorious service from September 1966 to September 1967 while assigned to the 131st Surveillance Aviation Company in Vietnam. There he served as an electrical equipment maintenance supervisor.

Sergeant Striker was assigned to the Military Academy last month and presently serves as an instructor in the Department of Ordnance. The son of the late Francis H. Striker, Sr. and Mrs. Janet M. Striker of 829 Les Parre Dr., St. Louis, Sergeant Striker was graduated in 1955 from Grosse Pointe High School. He and his wife, Barbara Ann, reside at West Point, N.Y., with their three children.

**Detroit Braced For Snow Fight**

Detroit has yet to have its first big snowfall this year. Braced for that eventually, the Department of Public Works (DPW) is manning its winter control center at the Sanitation Division Headquarters, 1550 Erskine. It opened for the season the first of November.

Last year on November 2 Detroit was covered by 4.8 inches of snow, the first installment of 50.7 inches to fall on Detroit during the winter. A total of 69,512 tons of salt, which cost \$454,863, were spread over city streets.

Robert E. Toohy, DPW commissioner, said salt trucks will be dispatched as soon as snow accumulates to a depth of one inch, or if icy conditions exist. Ninety-three radio-dispatched mechanical salt spreaders at nine locations await the word from the 24-hour control center, according to Toohy.

"Additional equipment can be diverted from other DPW projects," Toohy said. "If conditions warrant it, still more equipment can be borrowed from other City departments." The first streets to be salted will be the main downtown arteries: Fort, Michigan, Grand River, Jefferson, Gratiot and Woodward.

The DPW takes care of surface streets, while the Wayne County Road Commission handles county roads and the freeways.

If the snow reaches a depth of two inches, snowplows will be dispatched. Snow from the downtown area is dumped into the Detroit River behind Veterans Memorial.

The Detroit Police Department assists by expediting traffic flow through main intersections in the downtown area and on main arteries.

To keep prepared for inclement weather, the DPW maintains a direct teletype line with the U.S. Weather Bureau. Forewarned of an approaching storm, snow control center can hold DPW workers over their shifts or alert them to stay close to their phones in case they are needed.

The biggest snowfall of last season came on Dec. 19 when Detroit was blanketed with 5.5 inches, necessitating the spreading of 2,287 tons of salt. However, the largest amount of salt used last season came on Feb. 5, to take care of 3.0 inches of snow and accompanying icy conditions.

There is \$825,000 budgeted for snow and ice removal for the 1967-68 season.

In 1965-66 Detroit received 13.3 inches of snow, the least amount in recent years. Detroit's heaviest snow came in 1951-52 with 58.2 inches. The greatest amount of salt spread was in 1964-65 with 80,419 tons to clean 49.2 inches of snow plus icy conditions.

**ZONING MAP AMENDMENT No. 4**  
**CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS**  
**WAYNE COUNTY MICHIGAN**

CODE NO. 12-03  
 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 2.9 OF ARTICLE 2, ARTICLE 8 SECTION 10.1 AND SECTION 10.3 B OF ARTICLE 10 OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS, BEING: AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH DISTRICTS IN THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS WITHIN WHICH TO REGULATE THE USE OF LAND AND STRUCTURES THEREIN; TO REGULATE AND LIMIT THE HEIGHT, THE AREA, THE BULK AND LOCATION OF BUILDINGS; TO REGULATE AND RESTRICT THE LOCATION OF TRADES AND INDUSTRIES AND THE LOCATION OF BUILDINGS DESIGNED FOR SPECIFIED USES; TO REGULATE AND DETERMINE THE AREA OF YARDS AND OTHER OPEN SPACES; TO REGULATE THE DENSITY OF POPULATION; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THIS ORDINANCE; TO PROVIDE FOR A BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS, AND ITS POWER AND DUTIES; TO PROVIDE A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE TERMS THEREOF; AND TO REPEAL ORDINANCE NO. 34 AND 80, AS AMENDED.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS ORDAINS:  
 Paragraph 1. Section 2.9 of Article 2 of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 158, enacted November 18, 1963, as heretofore amended, is hereby amended to provide as follows:

SECTION 2.9 DEFINITIONS PERTAINING TO OFF-STREET PARKING:  
 SEAT: When used in the determination of off-street parking requirements for places of assembly in which patrons or spectators occupy benches, pews, or other similar seating facilities the term "seat" shall mean each twenty (20) inches of seating facilities.

Paragraph 2. Article 7—(Schedule of Regulations) of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 158, enacted November 18, 1963, as heretofore amended, is hereby amended to provide as follows:

SEE SCHEDULE OF REGULATIONS

Paragraph 3. Article 8—(Zoning Map) of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 158, enacted November 18, 1963, as heretofore amended, is hereby amended to rezone certain lands from R1 (one family residential district) to CS (Community Service) which lands are described as:

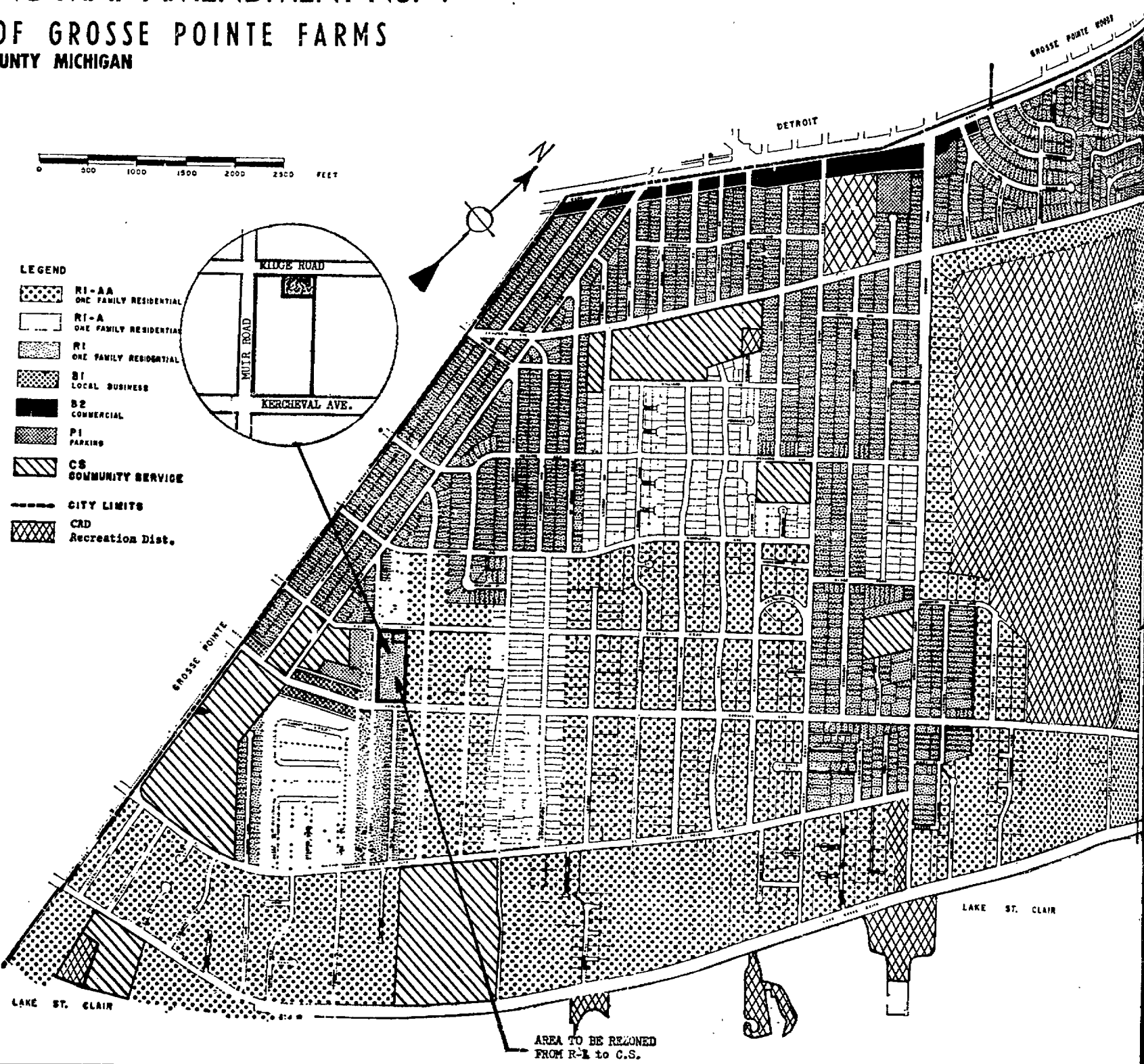
Lots 19 and 20 of Muir Subdivision and lots 1 to 18A incl. of George Engels Subdivision and Out Lot A of The Memorial Subdivision except the Northern 155 feet of the Westerly 120 feet of said Out Lot A. All part of Private Claim 258 City of Grosse Pointe Farms, Wayne County, Michigan.

Such rezoning is specifically designated on Zoning Amendment Map No. 4 of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, which map is hereto attached and made a part of this Ordinance. All notations, references and other information shown on said map are by this reference made a part of this Ordinance as if the matter and information set forth on said map were in total fully described herein.

Paragraph 4. Section 10.1 of Article 10 of the zoning Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 158, enacted November 18, 1963 is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 10.1 General Regulations for Required Off-Street Parking: Off-street parking facilities for the parking of self-propelled motor vehicles to be used by the occupants, employees and patrons of buildings erected, altered, extended, maintained, and occupied in the City shall be provided and maintained as hereinafter provided in Article 10 including the following:

- A. The minimum number of off-street parking spaces shall be determined in accordance with the table in Section 10.2 below. In the case of a use not specifically mentioned, the requirements for off-street parking facilities for a use which is mentioned and to which said use is the most similar, shall apply.
- B. Any area once designated as required off-street parking shall not be charged to any other use unless and until equally required facilities are provided elsewhere. Also, the use of any building shall not be changed until the required parking facilities for the proposed new use are satisfied.
- C. Two or more uses may collectively provide off street parking in which case the required number of parking spaces shall not be less than the total of the requirements for the several individual uses computed separately. Provided, however, that if the operating hours do not overlap, the City Engineer may reduce the total requirement to the peak hour demanded. Further, if such uses are not under common ownership a written agreement for joint use between parties concerned will also be required.
- D. Off-street parking facilities required for residences, mortuaries, funeral homes and hospitals shall be on the same lot or parcel of land as the building they intend to serve. For all other uses, such facilities shall be located within 300 feet of the building they are intended to serve to be measured from the nearest point of the building to the nearest point

**Worth Passing On**

Lack of enthusiasm for displaying the flag on national holidays has long puzzled us. A very small percentage of the residents, here or anywhere, take time to put out the Stars and Stripes on these special occasions. Very few homes own a flag.

We have been especially perplexed by the practical total absence of any such display on Thanksgiving Day. Certainly this is one of our most important national holidays. How strange it is, then, that hardly anyone thinks to link flying the flag with this annual observance.

The Kercheval-on-the-Hill business district has acquired quite a reputation in recent years for its lavish and beautiful presentation of emblems, attached to every parking meter standard, on almost every occasion — even including local election days. But not a single flag was unfurled there on Thanksgiving Day.

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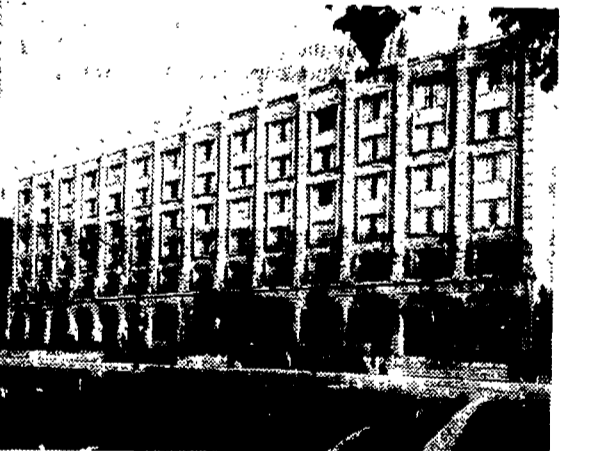

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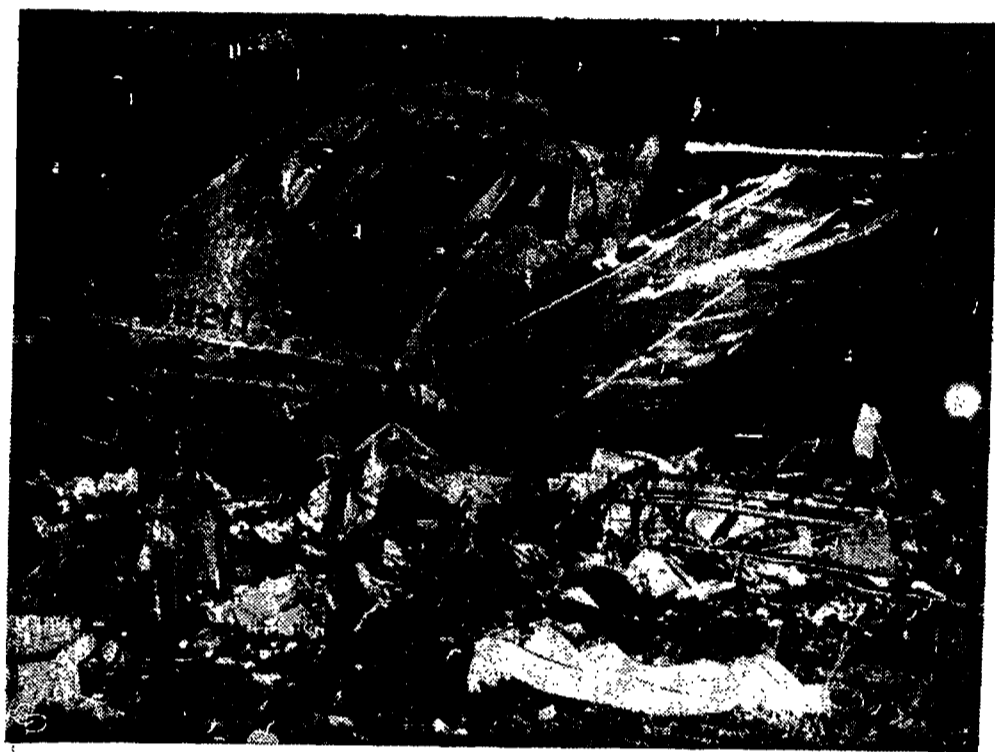

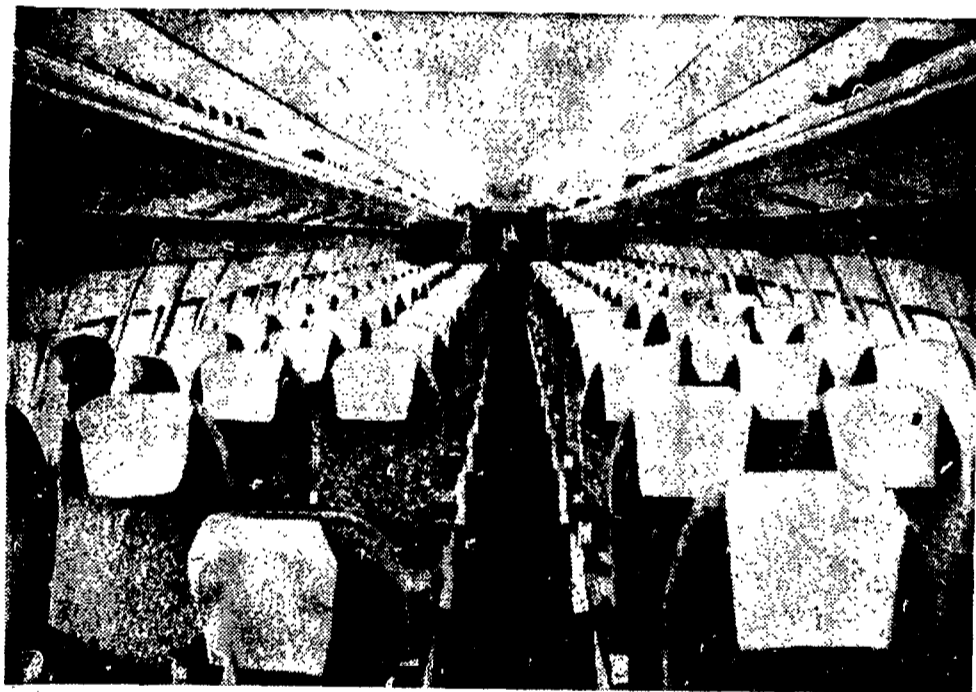

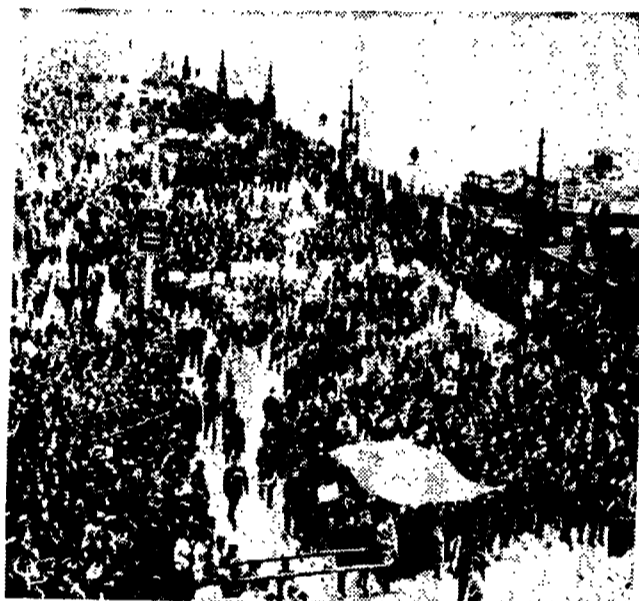

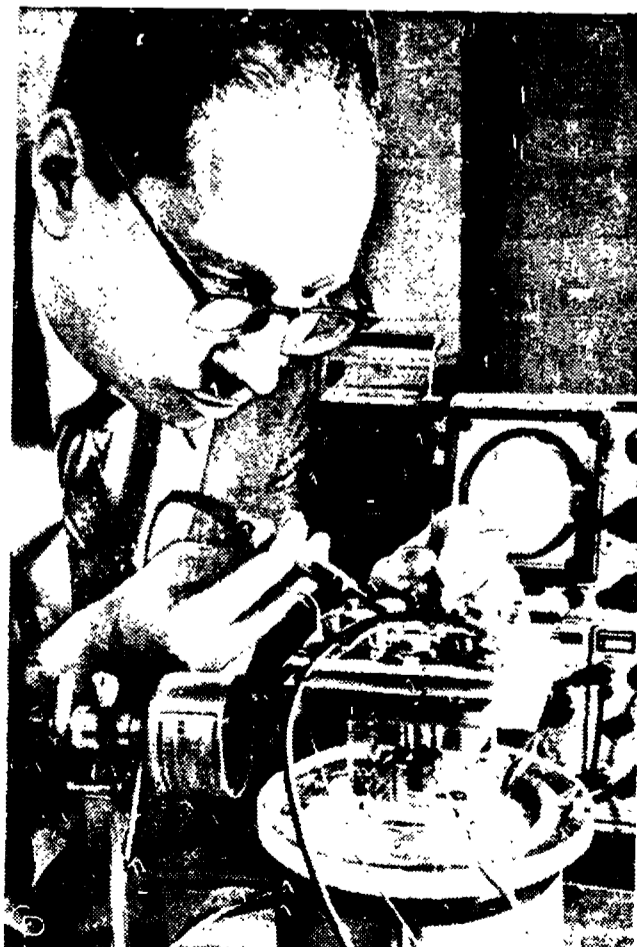

Moving Day . . . for the Neighborhood Thrift Shop is tomorrow. The Thrift Shop, located at 17121 Waterloo since 1937, will go "across the street," to brand-new headquarters at 17154 Waterloo. It's a momentous occasion . . .

. . . The Neighborhood Thrift Shop . . . originated from a rummage sale, held in the gym of the Neighborhood Club, in 1927. The sale was held in order to raise furnishing money for the then-new Neighborhood Club. It was so successful that the doors had to be closed at intervals to maintain order and take care of the crowds . . .

. . . A year later . . . plans were made to organize a permanent rummage sale, and the Board Room at the Neighborhood Club was transformed into a sales room. In 1932, a building located in Maumee avenue, across from the City of Grosse Pointe Police Station, was secured as headquarters for the Thrift Shop in order to relieve overcrowded facilities at the Clubhouse . . .

. . . That same year . . . Dexter Ferry, who had given the eight acres of property on which the Neighborhood Club had been built, offered to the Wayne County Library the use of a cottage at 17121 Waterloo. Remodeling funds were donated by Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Whitcomb. Necessary renovations included shelving, painting, decorating and removal of partitions . . .

. . . This was the first . . . separate Branch building in the entire Wayne County Library System. Records indicate that the library was moved to Cadieux road in 1937 . . .

. . . At this time . . . the Thrift Shop decided to use the former Branch library as its permanent location. The Shop has been there ever since—but times and needs change, and Thrift Shop volunteers are thrilled with the thought of all the extra space available in the new Shop across the street . . .

. . . This new Shop . . . is somewhat larger than the old, and decorated in a shade of blue-green, with a carpet to match. Facilities include three offices, changing rooms, and ample parking in the Neighborhood Club's own lot . . .

. . . The old Shop building . . . will be torn down . . . Two years ago, Henry B. Joy, Jr., president of the Helen Newberry Joy Foundation, bought the Neighborhood Club property and gave it to the Grosse Pointe Board of Education and "the people of all the Grosse Pointes" . . .

. . . The old Clubhouse . . . was condemned in 1963 and subsequently demolished because of an unsafe foundation. Hence, the reason for the new Neighborhood Club building, in which the Thrift Shop will be located . . .

. . . Moving Day . . . begins at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning. Mrs. David Haddon, director of the Shop, has everything well planned and organized . . .

. . . A Moving Company . . . will transfer heavy equipment from the cottage to the Thrift Shop's new location in the rear of the new Neighborhood Club building. A staff of volunteers and Thrift Shop Board members, under the direction of Mrs. Haddon's "Moving Day Lieutenants," Mrs. Randolph Sides and Mrs. Frederick Whitney, will transfer the "stock" across the road . . .

. . . Among Board members . . . lending a helping hand will be Mrs. Theodore Foster, president; Mrs. W. Bruce Krag, Mrs. Sidney Hall, Mrs. John R. O'Dell, Mrs. J. V. Jenks, Mrs. Paul P. Fischer and Mrs. Eric W. Stroh . . .

. . . ### EMILY MARTIN, OF HAWTHORNE ROAD

One thing that really "bugs" Emily Martin is not being given a menu in a restaurant. When the Martin family goes out to dinner, Emily, seated in her booster chair, will very often lean over before the waiter comes to their table, give her mother a poke in the ribs and whisper, "Make sure I get a menu!"

Thirteen is, after all, an age, not a size.

Emily, 13, is the third child, second daughter of William and Elinor Martin. She's an eighth grader at Parcels Junior High School, taking the standard Parcels eighth grade courses: English, Social Studies, Math, Art and Science.

She also has one Study Hall period per day.

In her spare time, Emily likes to read and to make mosaics. She also likes to travel; the Martins, as a family, have visited Washington, D.C., Williamsburg, Jamestown and Yorktown, and Emily loved every minute in every city.

Can't Do Everything

There are some things she can't do, and wishes she could. "I would like to have taken more piano lessons," she admits, "and I'd like to be able to do more cooking . . ."

Two Very Simple Things . . . but the simplest things can be surprisingly difficult for a Little Girl in a Big World . . .

Emily, who weighs approximately 45 pounds and is approximately as tall as a jackrabbit, has Osteochondrodysplasia, a disturbance of the bone growth.

She is, the doctors think, about as big as she is going to get. Which means, of course, that Emily has a problem: Stated simply, she's out-of-scale with the World-As-It-Is.

Take a piano: It's made to be played by certain-size hands, and if one's hands don't fall within the piano's certain-size range, one reaches a point in piano lessons beyond which one cannot go.

Take a stove: If one has to keep climbing up on a chair to reach the burners, down again to reach the oven, run across the kitchen and climb up on another chair to reach the mixing bowl on the table—well, one simply doesn't do very much cooking.

She's Very Ingenious

Sometimes, Emily hits on her own perfect solution to a specific situation. She loves movies, she obviously couldn't see the screen if someone sat down in front of her, so she's devised her own Movie System, making her as tall as anyone in the theater: "I just fold up the seat and sit on top of it!"

Sometimes, a solution to a specific situation is so obvious it's unnoticed—for a while!

The Martins have lived in Grosse Pointe for five years and up until a year ago, all four of their children attended Grosse Pointe Public Schools.

This year, they do again. Emily's little sister, Lynne, 10, is at Ferry. Her older sister, Elizabeth, 15, and her big brother, Bill, 17, are at Grosse Pointe High School. And Emily is where she wants to be, at Parcels.

Commuting Is Tough

Emily, who attended public school through the sixth grade, studied last year at the Leland Orthopaedic School in Detroit. It is, she admits, a good school . . . but there were certain disadvantages to being a seventh grader at Leland, not the least of which was Travel Time: To get to Leland, Emily had to take one cab to the City Limits, wait at the taxi office for a second cab to pick her up and take her on to the School . . .

She'd leave her house around 7:30 in the morning, not get back until around 4:30 in the afternoon . . .

There must, thought Emily, be a Better Way . . . And Mrs.

much better than just fooling around by yourself . . .

The Course, on a one-to-one instructor-to-pupil basis, uses high school volunteers, under supervision, as teachers. Emily's brother, Bill, was so impressed by the program that he's serving now as a Swimming for the Handicapped volunteer instructor.

Emily likes to ride her bike, too—she just wishes she could get the training wheels off ("Maybe," says her mother, "next year . . .")

### WHITE BREAD

Contributed by Mary Kotcher

6 C. all-purpose flour (sifting is not necessary)  
2½ C. WARM (not hot, not cold) water  
2 pkg. dry yeast  
4 T. SOLID shortening  
4 T. sugar  
4 tsp. salt

Mix warm water and yeast in large bowl until dissolved. Add 3 C. flour and remaining ingredients. Beat 2 minutes with electric mixer at medium speed. Add remaining 3 C. flour and stir with spoon until absorbed. Cover with towel and let rise until double in bulk (about ½ hour). Stir down with spoon to let out air (about 20 strokes). Pour into 2 well-greased loaf pans and pat down with well-floured hands to shape. Let rise until ¾" from top of pan (about 45 minutes). Bake in 375° oven for about 45 minutes, or until done. Turn out on rack until cool.

Clue: Bread is done if it sounds hollow when tapped with a fingernail.

### Hear Australian at ESU Dinner

Sir Reginald Sholl, Australian Consul-General in New York since February, 1966, was guest-of-honor and speaker at the Detroit Branch English-Speaking Union's dinner meeting on Tuesday evening, November 28, at the University Club.

Former Federal President of the English-Speaking Union in Australia, Sir Reginald was educated at the University of Melbourne and at New College, Oxford, as a Rhodes Scholar in the School of Jurisprudence.

He was called to the London at the Middle Temple, later returned to Australia as University lecturer and became King's Counsel in 1947 and Justice of the Court of Victoria in 1950. He retired from active service in 1962 to accept appointment as Consul-General in New York with consular jurisdiction over 36 states of the East and West.
