Thursday, December 4

THE SENATE VOTED on Wednesday to increase the personal income-tax exemption to \$800 by 1971. The present exemption is \$600. The sponsor of the tax cut said it was intended to help "the man with a big mortgage on a little house filled with children." The plan, approved, by a vote of 58 to 37, was a substitute for reductions in tax rates supported by President Nixon and endorsed by the House and the Senate Finance Committee that would trim everyone's taxes by an average of 10.1 percent. The vote completely ignored the threat of a presidential veto.

Friday, December 5

THE NIXON ADMINISTRATION is drafting a sweeping pay-later program to clean up America's polluted rivers and lakes. The program is currently being prepared by Interior Secretary Walter J. Hickel, who will present it to Congress in January. The price tag of the program is \$10 to \$15 billion. It may be part of the President's State of the Union message.

Saturday, December 6

THE SENATE VOTED unexpectedly Friday to nearly double minimum Social Security benefits and increase all other payments by 15 percent. By a vote of 48 to 41, it adopted a rider to the tax reform bill proposed by Democratic leader, Mike Mansfield of Montana, and Senator Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia. The proposal would cost an estimated 6.2 billion and by 1973 would require an increase in the taxable wage base from the current 7,800 to \$12,000. Effective date for the increases would be January 1 with some 25 million beneficiaries getting their first enlarged checks for April.

Sunday, December 7

SIMEON BALDWIN, 37, and Mrs. Bessie Donald, 47, two Americans who were held in captivity in Communist China for over nine months were released today. They told reporters they spent most of their time in a place called the Happy People's Commune and kept healthy taking long walks. They said the communists made them sign several confessions admitting they entered Chinese waters illegally. Baldwin, a long-time resident of Hong Kong, originally made his home in Laguna Beach, Cal. Mrs. Donald is from Bristol, Va.

Monday, December 8

SENATOR EDWARD M. KENNEDY, D-Mass., said Sunday that Lockheed Aircraft Corp. and McDonnell-Douglas, Inc., will save millions of dollars in taxes under provisions inserted specifically for their benefit in the Senate's tax-reform bill. According to Kennedy, other special provisions "generally hidden from the public view" in the 585-page tax bill were designed specifically to help seven foundations, two universities, 19 oil pipeline companies, a Massachusetts power company, firms making barges used in offshore oil drilling operations, plus four other firms—Litton Industries, the Transamerica Corporation, Mobil Corporation and Uniroyal, Inc.

Tuesday, December 9

PRESIDENT NIXON SAID Monday night he would veto a pending tax-reform bill if the measure contains an \$800-a-year personal income tax exemption provision and a 15 percent Social Security increase. He also promised another announcement of troop withdrawals from Vietnam in the next two or three weeks and said the Vietnam war will come to an end regardless of what happens at the Paris peace talks.

A GREEK OLYMPIC airliner crashed in flames Monday night during a rainstorm while attempting to land at Athens. A government spokesman said all 81 persons aboard were killed. It was the worst crash in Greek aviation history.

Schools Set Program to Fight Drugs

Grade Five to Twelve Involved in Attempt to Curb Increasing Use of Narcotics

Superintendent of Schools Theos I. Anderson has announced an action program for grades five to twelve to combat the growing drug abuse problem among the youth in the community. The program was formulated last year by the Professional Study Committee in cooperation with the Department of Instruction and was instituted in several public schools including the two high schools. In the process of implementing these plans a number of important questions have been raised by parents and teachers in areas in which definitive answers are not presently available. Among these, according to Dr. Anderson are: What is the actual magnitude of the problem? How many children at each grade level have had experience with the misuse of drugs and other substances? What is the nature of this misuse? What implications do these data have for education? For instance, at what grade level should the program begin? What educational strategies are most effective in dealing with this problem? Dr. Anderson said in order

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Lone Woman Bandit Robs Gas Station in GP Farms; Escapes with \$230 in Cash

Robber Believed to Be Same Person Who Held Up Detroit Business Place A Few Hours Earlier the Same Morning

A lone woman bandit held up a Farms gas service station at Mack and Moross early in the morning of Saturday, December 6, and escaped with a large sum of money. She is believed to be the same person who held up a Detroit station approximately two hours earlier.

According to Farms Det. Sgt. George Van Tiem, it is the first time that a woman, alone and armed, committed a robbery in the Pointe, at least as far as he can remember.

Victim of the hold-up was Larry D. Kemp of 1621 Bournmouth, owner of Standard Service, 19100 Mack, who told police that he was in his place at 5:06 a.m., cleaning up, when a lone colored woman entered the station and asked for change for a five-dollar bill.

Wants Tire Fixed Kemp said he pulled out a roll of currency from his pocket and began to count out five singles. At this time, the woman did not display any weapon, but asked Kemp if he would fix a tire on her car, which she said was parked on Mack, just a few feet from the station.

He and the woman left the station, still talking, the owner said, the roll of money exposed in his hand. As they were walking between the building and the fuel pumps, the woman pulled out a black automatic pistol and demanded the money.

After taking the cash, about \$230, the female bandit ran

across Mack avenue to a waiting cab, got in and the cabbie drove off. The cab was in front of the business stores directly across the street, the hold up victim said.

Kemp ran back into the station and told an employe, C. C. Banks of 3407 Harding, Detroit, of the hold-up. Banks was unbelieving at first, but when he saw the cab pull away, he jumped into a pick-up truck on the station grounds, and gave chase. Kemp in the meantime phoned Farms police.

The officers detained the cab driver, John L. Usher, 41, of 3473 Rohms, Detroit, and took him to the Farms station. The "lady" bandit escaped in the Chester-Moross area.

Stupid Vandalism Adopted as Game By Teenage Group

Seventeen Arrested by Park Police as Participants in Malicious Destruction of James T. McMillan Mansion

Seventeen young people, eight of them juveniles, were arrested by Park police on Thursday, December 4, for investigation of trespassing and vandalism of the old James T. McMillan residence, 16006 Essex drive. The group included one girl, also a juvenile, and all are from Detroit.

According to information released by police, the teenagers had been at a high school football game earlier in the day, and decided after the game, to start a rampage at the McMillan residence, now owned by the Park. The gang apparently heard that the city had plans to raze the old landmark, and decided that it was all right to wreck the place.

Residents in the area, hearing the noise created by the group, called police, who arrived at the scene as the teens were smashing windows and damaging the interior on the second and third floors of the house. Among the things damaged was beautiful and expensive wall paneling, which could have brought a good price in the salvage market, according to a wrecking company official.

Broke Door to Enter Dets. Robert Saitford and Charles Petrie said that seven teenagers were arrested on the property itself, and the others were taken into custody in the immediate vicinity. Those who were in the building, broke a rear door to enter, it was said. The detectives spent several long hours the following day, questioning all the young people, who had been told to report at the station with their parents.

The officers said that the youths arrested in the house, admitted to being there and hearing the noise of breaking glass and ripping of the paneling from the walls, and the sounds of other vandalism, but each denied taking part in the destruction.

The matter is still under investigation, police said, and it will be determined what charges should be filed against whom. The eight juveniles, including the girl, are 16 years old and under, and the other nine are over 17 years of age, it was said.

It was not disclosed what school, or schools, those involved attend, nor was it disclosed what football game the youths had been when they decided on their rampage.

Robert M. Orr Twice Honored

Census Shows New Highs For Population, Students

By Phil Loranger As the total population of the Pointe soared to a record high this year, the number of children actually attending classes in the Grosse Pointe Public School system also hit record-setting levels, according to figures recently released by Dr. Theos I. Anderson, superintendent of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education.

The Pointe, as of May, 1969, had a total population of 61,795 persons, of which 11,653 were youngsters between the ages of five and 19, attending schools under the Grosse Pointe Public School System. The addition of the 1,526 Harper Woods youngsters attending schools under the system, brings the total count to 13,179.

The population of the Pointe, as shown by the May, 1960, school census, was 56,828. The only municipality to show a decrease in population since 1960 is the Farms.

Although there are currently 21,181 school-age youngsters residing within the Public School System's jurisdiction, more than 8,000 attend private or parochial schools.

Despite the fact that the May public school membership — those children actually attending schools in the Grosse Pointe Public School System — continued to climb, showing an increase of 415 over the 1968 figures, the actual school census of youngsters age five through 19 decreased by 105 and the total population of the families within the system decreased by 133. Carl Schweikart Succumbs At 67

Prominent Pointe attorney, Carl Schweikart, of 1018 Bedford road, died suddenly on Tuesday, December 9, in Jennings Memorial Hospital.

Mr. Schweikart was clerk of Grosse Pointe Township from April 5, 1937, until August 4, 1942, at which time he became Township Supervisor. He served in that capacity until December 13, 1950, when Grosse Pointe Park and Grosse Pointe Woods incorporated.

He was an assistant prosecutor for Wayne County and held a number of offices in the Republican Party. He was chairman of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors in 1948 and Chairman of the Supervisors Juvenile Detention Home Committee from 1943 through 1947.

He was a 1926 graduate of The Detroit College of Law, and a practicing attorney for over 35 years. His charitable endeavors included the chairmanship of the Grosse Pointe Lion's Goodfellows Sales.

He was the head of the local draft board for over 25 years. Mr. Schweikart was a member of the Detroit and Michigan Bar Association and former commodore of the Detroit Yacht Club.

Services will be held on Friday, December 12, at 11 o'clock, at the A. and H. Peters Funeral Home.

Mr. Schweikart is survived by his wife, Gertrude; two sons, Carl Jr. and Robert Walter, and a brother, Walter.

Interment will be in Woodlawn Cemetery.

known. They then left by the rear door, according to police. A neighbor questioned by police officers, said that she saw a gray Cadillac with a man and woman and two children in it, parked near the Carolan residence on Saturday, December 6. The driver pulled away from the curb and drove around the block about seven or eight times, and then stopped directly in front of the Carolan home, stayed a few minutes then drove away again.

of 165, and the Woods, with a loss of 52 persons, were the major loss factors. The City, Farms and Shores combined for a total gain of 124 persons. Harper Woods lost 40 persons.

Among other highlights of the census study were those population-school facts, which include Harper Woods figures:

There was a loss of 358 children (ages birth through 19 years). The greatest losses were in the 0-4 age group (253) and the 5-11 age group (313). The biggest gain was in the 15-17 year-old group (119).

Grosse Pointe Woods continued to lead all categories in comparison with the other municipalities: it had more residences under construction, more residences, more children in each age grouping, and more persons per residence.

Grosse Pointe Woods led all other municipalities with 21 residences under construction at census time.

Ferry had more pre-schoolers (476) than any other elementary district. Poupard was second with 427, followed by Defer with 423. In the 5-11, 12-14, and 15-17 age groups, Ferry led the other districts, while Montclair had the most 18-19 year olds. Ferry had the greatest total (3,297), and Trombly experienced the greatest gain with 28 more children than in the 1968 census.

The infant-through-four-year olds (0-4) has declined for the past seven censuses. This year, there are 233 less than in 1968.

The public school attendance increased to 70.2% as compared to 67.6% last year and 66.0% in 1967. The parochial school attendance dropped from 29.4% in 1967 and 27.7% last year, to 25.2% this year. The private school attendance was at 4.7% both in 1968 and 1969, as compared to 4.6% in 1967. Barnes (30.8%) and Defer (34.4%) had the highest percentages of children attending parochial school. Mason led with 81.2% attending public school, with Trombly following closely with 78.8%. The highest percentage (13.4%) attending private school appeared in the Kerby district.

Officers Bruce Marone and Donald Sabal were called to the establishment by Brian Chase, the manager, who reported that he was holding the youth in his office.

According to Chase, the young man was creating a disturbance in the rear of the restaurant and, when he was asked to leave, he refused and took a swing at Chase. Chase responded with a blow to the youth's cheek and took him to his office, at which time he called the police.

When the officers arrived, the youth was still talking in a loud and abusive manner and the officers were forced to take him to the station, where they issued the violation ticket.

to gain insight into these important issues and to evaluate aspects of the program, the Department of Instruction plans to administer a questionnaire to young people in grades five to twelve. The results of this questionnaire will be used by the system's teachers in educational planning and be widely disseminated to the public at large.

Students will not be permitted to sign these questionnaires. All responses will be anonymous, and privacy will be rigorously protected, Dr. Anderson said.

A stratified random sample of students in grades seven through twelve will be identified to take part in this project. All students in grades five and six will participate to guard against any child's feeling he has been selected in a non-random manner. The questionnaire itself will deal with possible areas of direct and indirect involvement with and knowledge of drug abuse, including the misuse of commercially available products. It will not inquire into aspects of home life or home relationships, Dr. Anderson emphasized.

This project has been in the planning stages for several weeks and is a natural outgrowth of last year's program. Dr. Anderson also noted that over 40 staff members are currently enrolled in an in-service workshop in drug abuse education sponsored by the Department of Instruction.

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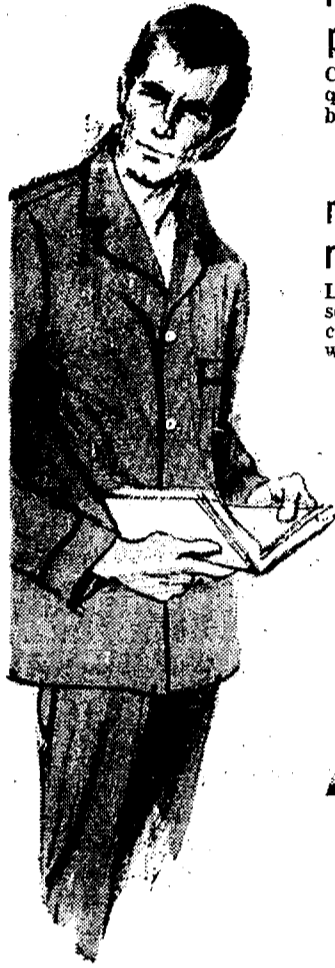
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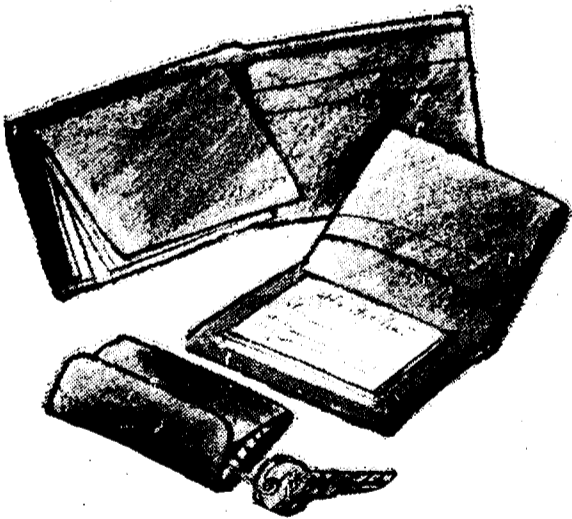


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Cooperation of Residents Solicited by Post Office

The usual Christmas rush for the United States Post Office is under way, but the postmen wish some residents were in more of a hurry to get their "out-of-town" letters and packages on the way to their destinations.

Year in and year out, the postal authorities are faced with last minute bundles of letters, placed in the mail slots by persons who failed to plan ahead. This results in a lot of headaches for the postmen and late-arriving letters and gifts for the recipients.

Postmaster Edward L. Baker, who heads the Detroit Post Office, which handles the outgoing and incoming mail for Pointe residents, thinks a little foresight and conscientious planning on the part of package and letter senders would save his workers and the mailers a great deal of frustration and curb tempers on the part of both groups.

He claims that the time to mail for Christmas is now. The big day is only two weeks away and that leaves little time for officials to sort and distribute the bundles, especially those marked for other cities and other states.

"Christmas traditionally has placed a greater workload on all our employees and, though we hire quite a bit of extra part-time help during the holiday season, most of them are inexperienced and handle the mails much slower than the veterans," claimed Baker. "We would like to be able to promise everybody that their letters and packages would arrive on time, but, if they are sent late, there is really very little that we can do."

Baker has a good point. The Christmas mail more than quadruples the normal amount of mail traffic each year and a natural backlog of letters and packages does accumulate. An early mailing would not only reduce the backlog, but would also guarantee the arrival of these items on time.

"This year, we are unofficially dubbing this week as Christmas Card Mailing Week," said Baker. "We are attempting to get everybody to strive to get all their cards, letters and packages mailed out by Sunday, December 14."

Baker said the biggest problem the Post Office faces each Christmas is getting the mails in an even flow. By using the Detroit office's new, modern sorting equipment and working a large number of regular employees on an overtime basis, the problem will not be as awesome this year.

"We used to hire as many as 10-12,000 part-time employees

each year," he pointed out. "Because we have been receiving excellent cooperation from the vast majority of the mailing public, we are forced to hire only about one-tenth of that number. Each Christmas we anticipate the mailing rush and the need for public cooperation is always there."

"We rely heavily on papers, like the Grosse Pointe NEWS, to carry our 'early-mailing' message to the people," he said. "I hope all who read this plea will help us out by meeting the December 14 deadline."

Since time immemorial, NIAGARA FALLS has never missed its aquatic spectacle. Except that night on March 29, 1849, when the falls suddenly went dry.

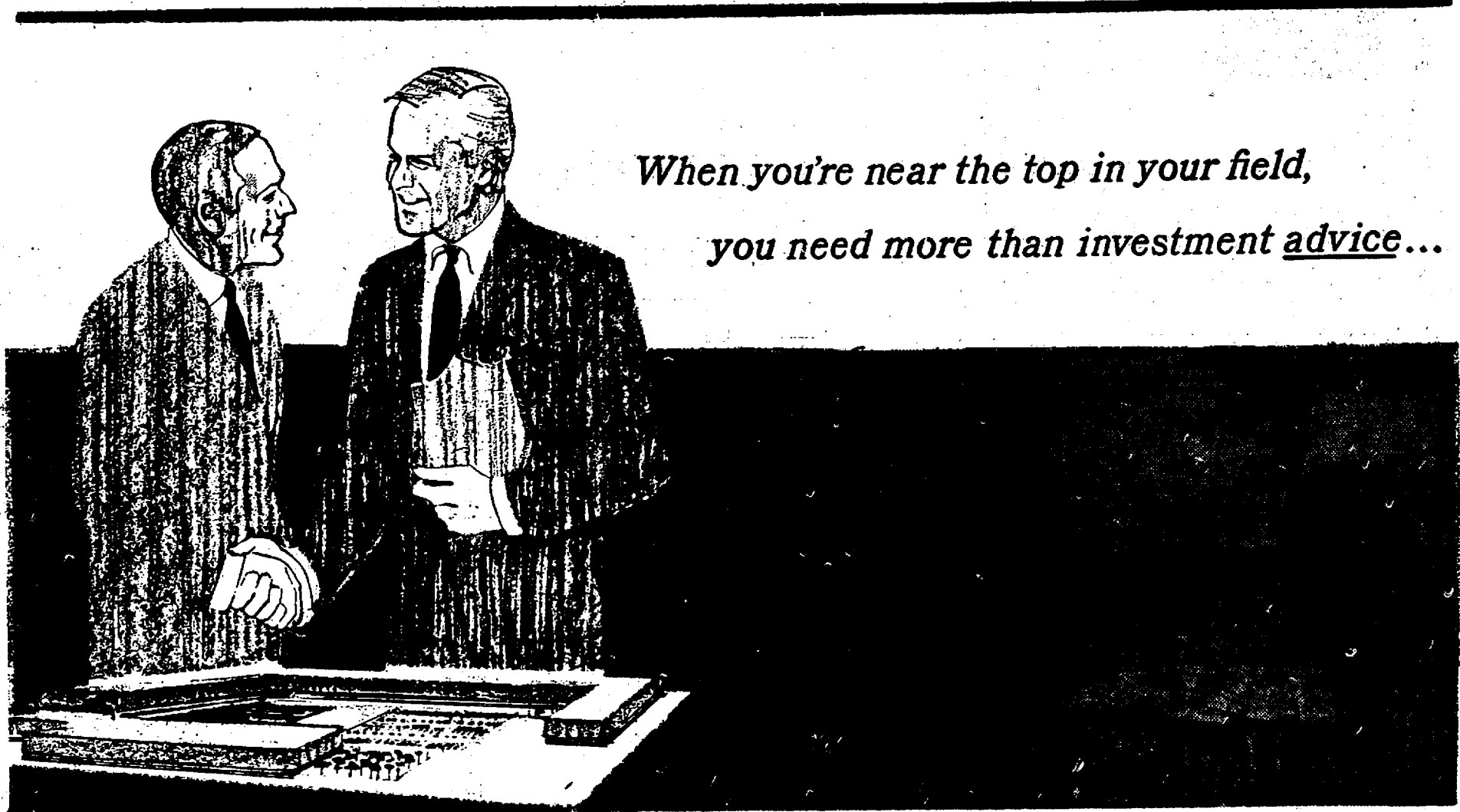
As the familiar roar of the cascade was silenced, crowds gathered. There was talk the world was coming to an end. The 30 hours that followed were filled with apprehension.

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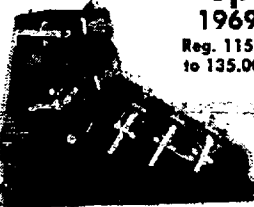
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Neighborhood Club Hires New Assistant Director

The Neighborhood Club, which has been serving the youth and adults of the community since about the time Pontiac and his warriors made their last retreat through the forests of The Pointe, has been revitalized through the addition of some new blood, imported all the way from the Upper Peninsula hamlet of Negaunee.

Glenn Stevens, a 1969 graduate of Northern Michigan University, where he received his bachelor's degree in social work, has joined the Club's staff as assistant teen center director, working under the guidance of Pauline Masak, recreation director, and Edgar Kratth, teen center director.

"We are really delighted that Glenn decided to join our organization," said Pauline, who has headed the Club's recreation programs for the past 36 years. "He has a genuine interest in young men and women and his background has not only prepared him for this field but it also has taught him how to reach the youngsters."

Stevens was teaching youngsters at the West Oakland YMCA Camp, when he first heard about the Neighborhood Club. After some investigation, he decided that it was the place to put his talents to use. An accomplished equestrian with a fine background in

teaching horsemanship to the younger generation, Stevens has supplied the impetus for a horsemanship class at the Club and has also helped to organize the Judo Club and a class in karate, both of which have been highly successful ventures.

"I find that most of the kids are really avid students," he said. "Our Judo Club started out slowly, but it has become one of the best in the area. Our instructor, Walt Conlan, was a former judo instructor with the U.S. Air Force and he is currently serving as president of the Michigan Judo Association."

The club is chartered with the AAU and is a certified member of the Michigan Judo Association. The 12-member group has already claimed a first place and two second place finishes in its initial meets this year. Conlan claims he may have some Olympic performers in the not too distant future.

"I like the university philosophy for recreation activities," claimed Stevens. "They place emphasis on those activities, such as golf, bowling, tennis and skiing, which can become life-long pursuits."

Stevens is also attempting to help junior and senior high school youngsters gain a greater insight into their future careers. He organized a Career Club, which is divided into a

Law Club and a Public Relations Club.

At each meeting, youngsters discuss various facets of the two fields with professional persons actively engaged in such areas.

"This is a new concept for the Neighborhood Club in that we are now offering an opportunity for both boys and girls to explore in depth those professions which many are considering," said Stevens. "Each club is under the adult supervision of local residents, selected to advise either club on the basis of their personal professional interests and experiences."

Currently, Charles Kinnaird, of 104 Meadow Lane, and Joseph A. Murphy, Jr., of 59 Hall Road, both attorneys, are serving as advisors to the Law Club. Stevens has talked with Public relations experts from both Chrysler Corporation and American Motors Corporation and he expects soon to name representatives of those firms to the advisor staff of the Public Relations Club.

Yuletide Events Will Come Alive

Christmas is alive and well at Greenfield Village. Beginning tomorrow, two Yuletide events designed to delight the senses of holiday visitors revive the unique joys of Christmas as lived by Americans in earlier times.

In the annual "Christmas at the Village" celebration several of the historic homes in Greenfield Village are authentically decorated just as their original owners might have done them. Roping and garlands of green, sprigs of holly, yule logs and candles re-create Christmas decorations from colonial times to the early 20th century.

The decorations range from the extreme simplicity of the early 17th century Cotswold Cottage, with its boxwood garland and yule log at the door, to the Victorian Wright brothers homestead with its full length Christmas tree, Christmas cards, cedar rapping, and holly sprigs.

Along the tour route the visitors encounter many other traditions of bygone holidays. The spicy aromas of mince pie cooking in the fireplace and the sweet taste of taffy boiling on the stove at the Edison home recall the days when such Christmas preparations were commonplace. A warming cup of hot spiced cider in the Tap Room of the Clinton Inn signals the conclusion of the trip through the past just before visitors board a stage or carriage to ride back to the gate house.

Other colorful aspects of Christmas past are presented in the Henry Ford Museum special exhibit, "Crafts of Christmas." Fourteen artisans demonstrate early crafts as they have been practiced in America for generations. Candle making, spinning, weaving, quilt making and cookie baking are among the home crafts visitors will see showing how work was prepared for the holidays in the home. Other craftsmen such as the glassblower, the pewterer, the tinsmith and the potter demonstrate how their counterparts made gifts to be exchanged in earlier times.

To complete the Yuletide picture, traditional Christmas music fills the air and greens, plants and Christmas trees decorate the area. The "Crafts at Christmas" truly makes this a season for remembering for the whole family.

The festivities in both the Village and the Museum continue through December 31 with the exception of Christmas Day when they are closed. Visitors may enjoy the special exhibits at no additional charge beyond the regular admission—\$2 for adults and \$1 for children six to fourteen. A separate admission is charged for Village and Museum.

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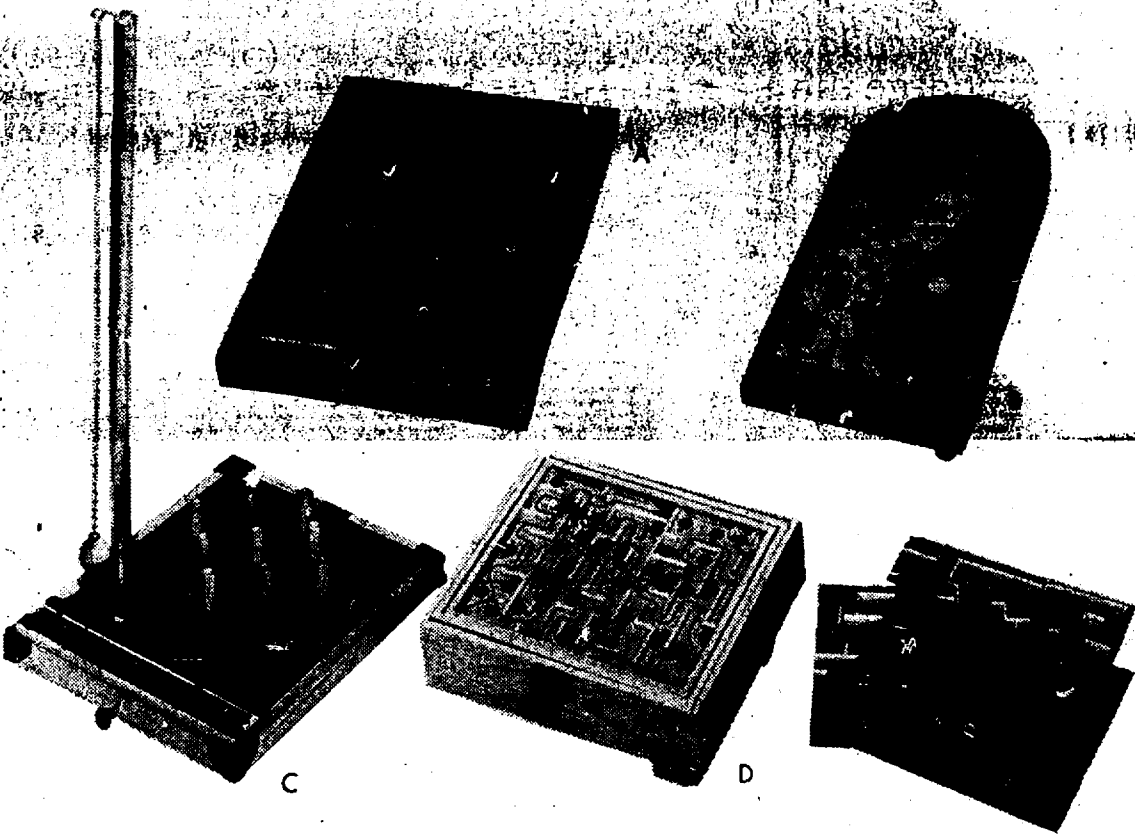
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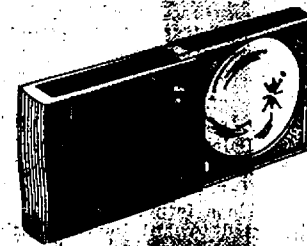


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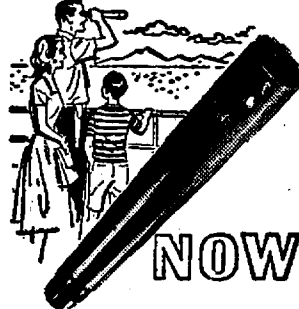


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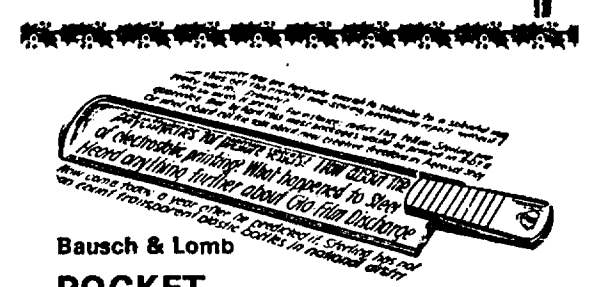


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**Events Calendar Reveals

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County Supervisor Bryant Outlines Drug Fight Plan

William R. Bryant, Jr., member of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors and Pointer, has been working diligently to see that Wayne County takes some constructive steps toward combating drug abuse.

Recently he initiated an idea for a comprehensive drug education program for the County. He submitted his suggestions to Dr. George Pickett, City-County Health Commissioner, who has given Mr. Bryant assurance that there will be some kind of comprehensive program for the youth of the county no later than the beginning of the 1970-71 school year.

With that accomplished, Mr. Bryant then directed his activities to the Wayne County Policy Committee on Crime Control and Prevention. In a letter to them dated December 5, Mr. Bryant outlined some of the areas of concern in the drug abuse epidemic. He pointed out that because the nature of the drug crisis is so complex it must be attacked on a number of fronts.

Mr. Bryant pointed out some of the basic areas of concern which include:

1. Drug abuse education
 - a. Children generally
 - b. Youth offenders
 - c. Adult offenders
 - d. Parents
 - e. School administrations and teachers
2. Out-patient treatment and rehabilitation
3. In-patient treatment and rehabilitation
4. Specific programs for heroin addicts
 - a. Enlarged program with

Bureau of Prisons and National Institute of Health for counseling

- b. In-patient, out-patient center (Marine Hospital)
- c. Methadone maintenance and rehabilitation program on a practical, non-research level

d. Support of private program such as Synanon

5. Administrative information and coordination
 - a. To coordinate studies
 - b. To coordinate projects
 - c. Public information to generate public demand for action

6. Attacks on the sources and temptations

- a. Better criminal intelligence and resultant enforcement against illegal manufacture and sale
- b. Control over legal manufacture and distribution
- c. Control over improper advertising of non-prescription drugs and chemicals
- d. Control over sale of drug paraphernalia, such as hypodermic syringes
- e. Aid for the schools to keep drugs out of school premises

7. Changes in state laws

- a. Make the laws specific, and reasonable for each drug
- b. Distinguish between degrees of possession based on amount possessed
- c. Make giving and selling drugs separate offenses
- d. Allow wider use of pre-trial voluntary probation programs
- e. Make Act 54 monies clearly available for drug counseling and rehabilitation
- f. Distinguish between juveniles or minors and adults
8. Youth programs for youth
 - a. High School age children should be encouraged to devel-

op programs to help their peer groups

- b. Rehabilitated youthful offenders should be used in education and rehabilitation programs.
- c. Counseling and discussion groups

9. Research

- a. Study of the effects of each drug
- b. Study of the actual composition of illegal drugs in traffic
- c. Statistical study on drug use

Beyond these there are many more specific areas for possible programs. And beyond the specific programs there are, of course, broader considerations of why people use drugs, the problem of generally uplifting attitudes, goals and opportunities for youth, the general, service problems of proper levels of probation, casework and counseling activities, and many other areas. Even the broadest, perhaps unanswerable question of what must our society become in order to remove the desire of substantial numbers to chemically escape the reality of life in that society.

Most of all, though, is the compelling need to realize what is happening to us and to our children and to demand and cause, immediate action. Mr. Bryant also requested that the committee change its stated philosophy and goals list of eight items, to add one item as number two on that list, "Prevent and Control Illegal Drug Activity." He pointed out that the problem is vast and complex and inextricably involved with and related to other criminal justice problems. He suggested that many of these areas of attack could be made projects, partial funding

for which could be sought from Omnibus Crime monies through the committee.

He added that some projects, especially in the areas of drug education, administrative information and coordination, criminal intelligence and statistical information on drug use could conceivably be ready in time for submission in the January, 1970 round of grant applications. He suggested that the staff immediately contact prospective applicants and initiate the generation of applications.

Mr. Bryant closed with a challenge and demand that the committee take strong initiative in this area and offered whatever assistance he may be able to give.

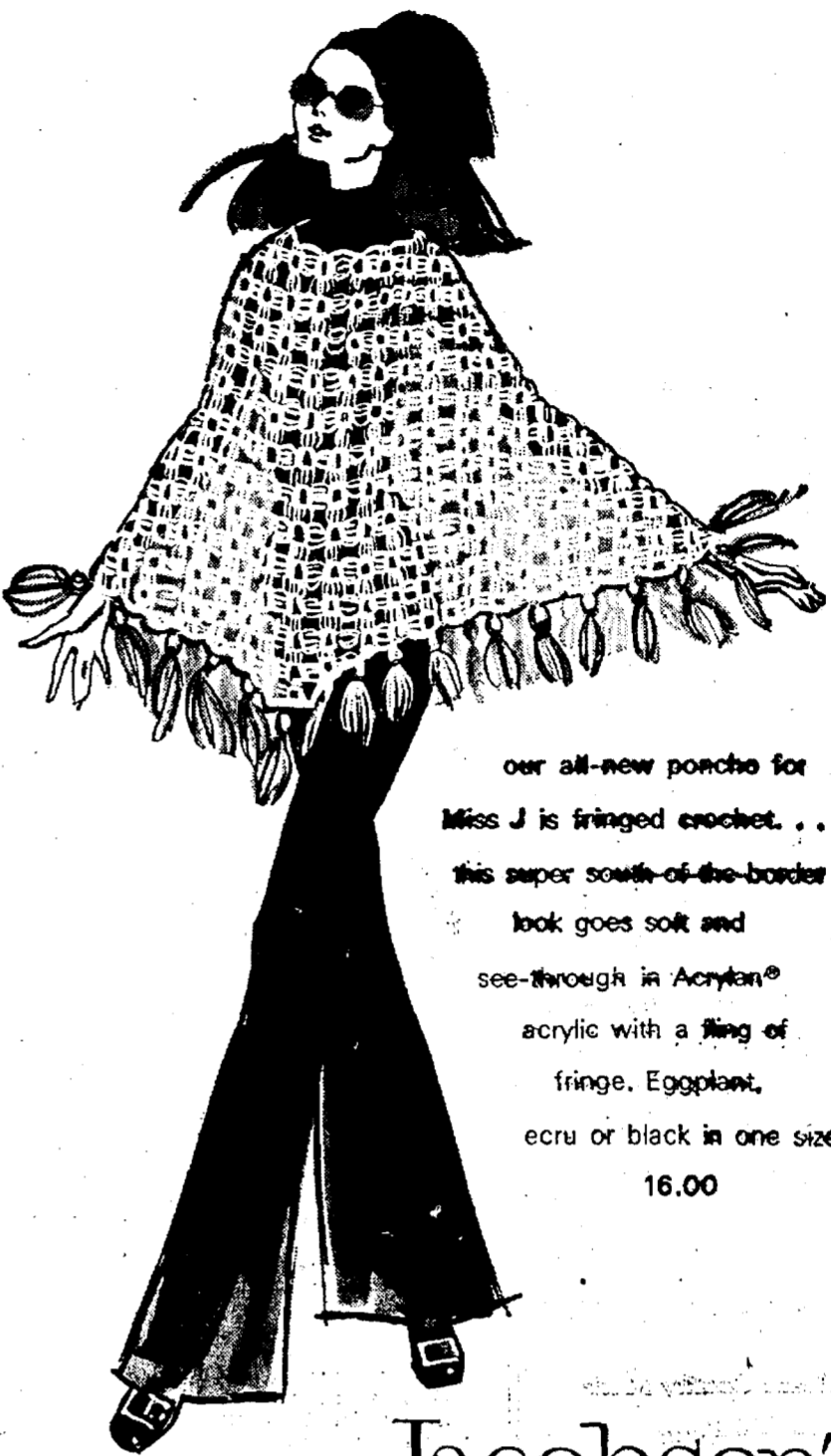

The Courses in Continuing Medical Education are supported financially by the James and Lynelle Holden Fund.

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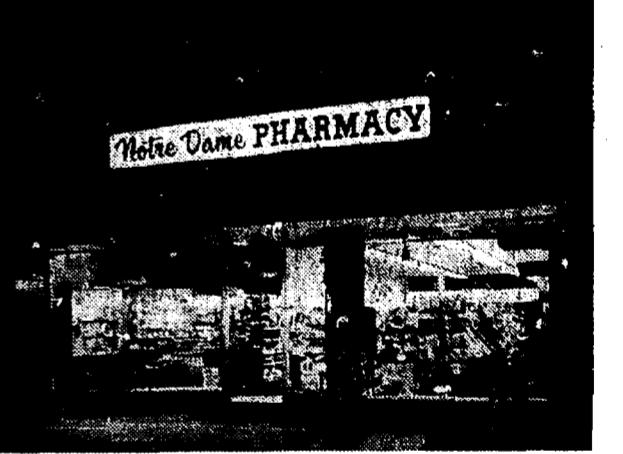

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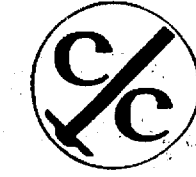
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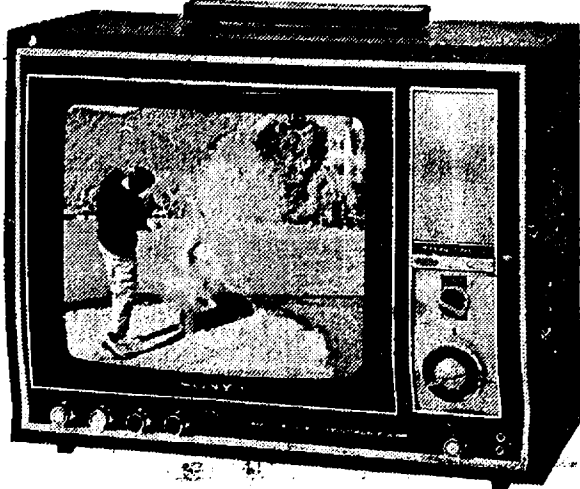
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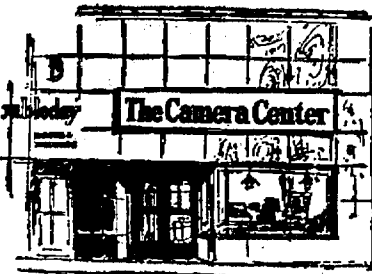
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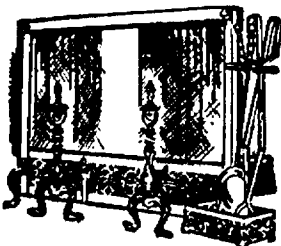
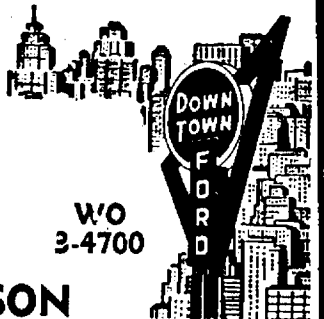
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Make Certain Your Car Is Prepared for Winter

Nearly 60,000 Michigan motorists will be unable to start their cars the first day the temperature drops to the five above zero (F) mark, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

When thermometers hit below that mark last January, approximately 58,000 drivers called for assistance in getting their vehicles started. Two-thirds of the calls were from individuals who couldn't spin their engines because of either battery or starter failure, states the Auto Club.

Since the key to successful winter driving is a strong battery, any motorist who begins the winter with a weak battery has two strikes against him even before he turns the ignition switch.

Yet, not only do many motorists attempt to get through Michigan's coldest months with a weak battery, but they do not take the proper steps to safeguard against winter driving troubles, the Auto Club states.

To help drivers get their cars started and keep them moving even under the worst conditions, Auto Club has devised "The 10 Commandments to Cold Weather Car Care":

1. Make sure your car battery

is strong enough to meet the demands of winter.

2. Change to a light-weight oil.

3. Install snow tires.

4. Have antifreeze tested.

5. Check the ignition system.

6. Check the exhaust system.

7. Have your car lubricated.

8. Park the car in garage or carport.

9. Check heater, windshield wipers and other accessories.

10. Get a safety check.

When temperatures fall near the zero mark, the power output of the battery is greatly reduced. Since more power is needed in colder weather to spin the engine, a strong battery is a must.

Proper battery care includes keeping the battery cells filled with fluid and checking the terminals and cable clamps for dirt corrosion and proper contact.

A light-weight oil reduces engine friction and makes the engine easier to turn over on cold mornings. The thermostat, radiator and heater hoses also should be examined.

A check of the ignition system and an engine tune up may be necessary. The alternator and carburetor should be examined, and points and the condenser should be replaced if needed. The automatic choke should be cleaned and adjusted for winter driving.

A faulty exhaust system can be dangerous since it is no secret that carbon monoxide kills, Auto Club says. A good lubrication prevents dust, dirt and moisture from moving parts.

Accessories such as windshield wipers, defrosters, turn signals, lights and the horn all should be working properly. A final inspection by a qualified service station attendant or mechanic can locate other possible trouble spots.

The belief that your car won't start because it is too cold is a myth because on the same day your car won't budge, you will find many autos of the same make and age being driven.

The evening's program will begin with visitation of five classrooms. This will give guests the opportunity to view the special equipment and learning materials used at the Academy. Teachers will be on hand to answer questions.

Mrs. Ernest Rothschild will speak at 8 o'clock on the psychology and philosophy of Montessori Education. She studied under Dr. Maria Montessori in Paris and has her Masters degree in special education from Syracuse University. She has both her American and International Montessori teaching certificate. She has been teaching young children for 35 years.

Mrs. Rothschild is a full-time assistant professor of Education and Supervisor of Montessori Interns at Xavier University in Cincinnati. She is on the Board of Directors of the American Montessori Society and has also established the first pre-school for physically handicapped children in Cincinnati.

Jon Bullard Wins High Honor

Jonathan Bullard, a senior at Grosse Pointe North High School, has been cited as one of the outstanding high school students of English in the country by The National Council of Teachers of English. Jonathan was named a 1969 national winner in its annual Achievement Awards competition.

Last spring a committee of English teachers from North nominated him to represent North High School in the competition. One entry was allotted from the junior class for every 500 students in the total school enrollment, according to Patricia W. Fox, the English department chairman.

After nomination, each student submitted samples of his best writing, including a autobiographical sketch; completed two standardized examinations on general English knowledge and skills and on literary awareness; and wrote a one-hour impromptu essay. These materials were evaluated and scored by state judging teams of highly qualified college and high school teachers directed by state chairmen.

The nation's school participating nominated almost 8,000 juniors for the NCTE citation. Of that number, only 872 finalists were chosen. They represented over 600 schools and 50 states, the District of Columbia and American Preparatory Schools abroad.

In announcing the winners, Robert F. Hogan, executive secretary of the National Council of Teachers of English, said "The Council recommends these students, now seniors, for college scholarships in 1970, should they need such assistance. The names of these students are sent to every college and university admissions officer and English department chairman in the country. In previous years 99 percent of the Awards winners entered the college of their choice. Approximately 80 percent of those applying for scholarships received them."

The NCTE sends to all winners and runners-up scrolls of recognition and honors their high school English departments with certificates of merit.

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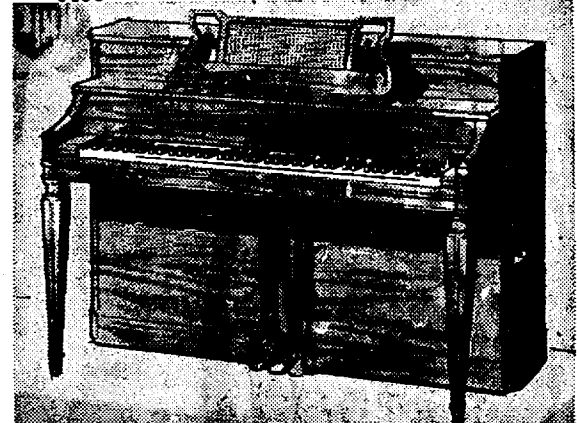
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Yuletide Trees Bear Inspection

The days of gathering the family in the old buggy and heading out to the countryside to chop down the Yuletide tree are gone for most of us, having been replaced by the chore of stomping through a corner Christmas lot and a sea of mud, looking for the perfect tree and probably taking anything that looks good.

With the fast pace of progress once again robbing us of one more of those things which now become just memories, picking out an attractive and safe tree — the emphasis is on safe — becomes a real challenge.

A Christmas tree bought in November quite naturally had to have been cut in the same month or maybe even earlier. An early-cut tree will pose more of a fire hazard than one chopped down just before Christmas. Of course, unless you cut it yourself, there is really no way of knowing for sure when the tree you choose was felled.

An easy way to check the age and safety of a tree is to give the butt a good blow on the ground.

Some of the older, brown needles, which can be found on any tree, will usually fall off, but if an unusually large number of needles, especially those that are not brown in color, come tumbling to the ground, look somewhere else for your tree. If the needles break, rather than bend, when you apply a little pressure to them, that is another good clue that the tree has been around for a while.

An old Indian trick will help keep your tree green and safe once you have made your selection and brought it home. Cut off about two inches from the butt of the tree with a saw, not an ax, and stand the tree in a pail of water or on the north side of the house. That is the usual shady side of any home.

When you are ready to bring the tree inside and start decorating it, always keep the butt wet, by using a stand that can hold a couple of inches of water. Adding sugar or molasses doesn't really do anything to prolong the life of the tree, but add water to the stand, even if you must do it daily.

Despite your best efforts to keep a tree green, the longer it stands in a warm home the drier it becomes and the more inflammable it grows. The early disposal of a tree not only serves as a better safety measure, but it also makes it a lot easier to clean up around the tree because the needles get less chance to fall off onto the rug.

Celestial Show Staged for Yule

"For Christmas decorations, the eastern horizon is host to some of the most striking and colorful constellations of the whole year," says University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh.

"Auriga, the large five-sided figure ruled by the bright yellow star Capella, rises in the northeast around sunset," she notes. "The Pleiades, followed by the rest of the constellation Taurus, rises at about the same hour as Capella."

The winter constellations, according to Prof. Losh, center mostly around Orion with his two Hunting Dogs—Canis Major and Canis Minor—and the Hare, or Lepus, below him.

The three stars in Orion's belt point downward to Sirius, which has been "watched, admired, and revered from time immemorial, rising as it does in the early evenings around Christmas. It was the 'Star of the East' pointed to by 'Three Wise Men of Orion.'"

Canis Major, Prof. Losh explains, resembles "a wooden sawhorse, so one can see how the ancients depicted a dog in this figure."

Canis Minor contains only two naked-eye stars of any importance, the U-M astronomer says.

"In ancient times, the Little Dog was thought to be a water dog. It stood on the border of the Milky Way which was thought to be a river in the sky."

An imaginary line drawn from Rigel to Betelgeuse in Orion points to the two bright stars, Castor and Pollux, in Gemini, marking the heads of the Twins, Prof. Losh says. Pollux is now the brighter of the two, but it is believed that in earlier times Castor was the brighter.

"Fittingly, the Northern Cross (Cygnus) has steadily moved toward the west, and may be seen to splendid advantage on Christmas Eve, standing upright against the western sky,"

Petitioners Ask Cadieux Cottage Be Saved

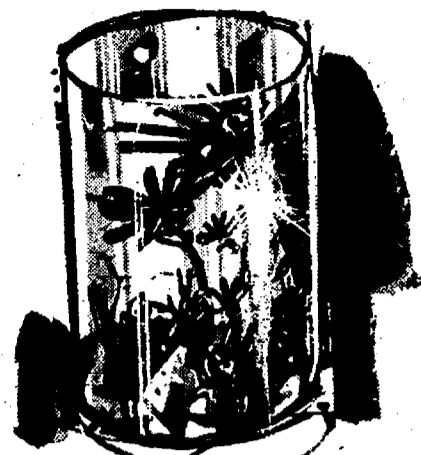

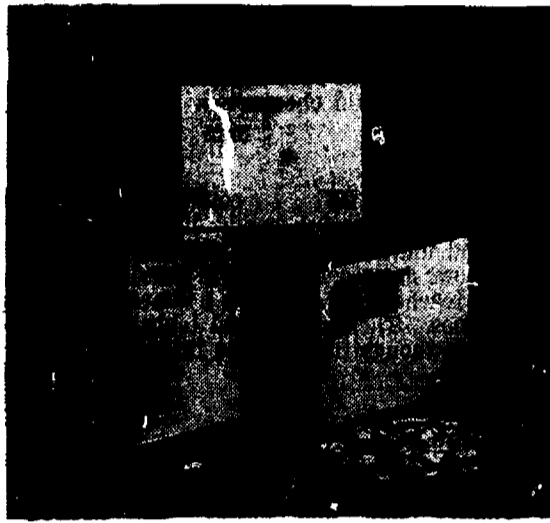

The brief Evensong preceding the Cantatas will be sung by the Choir of Men and Boys of Christ Church and will include carols appropriate to the Advent season.

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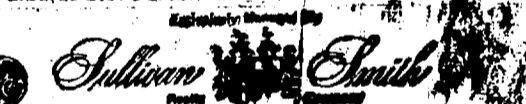
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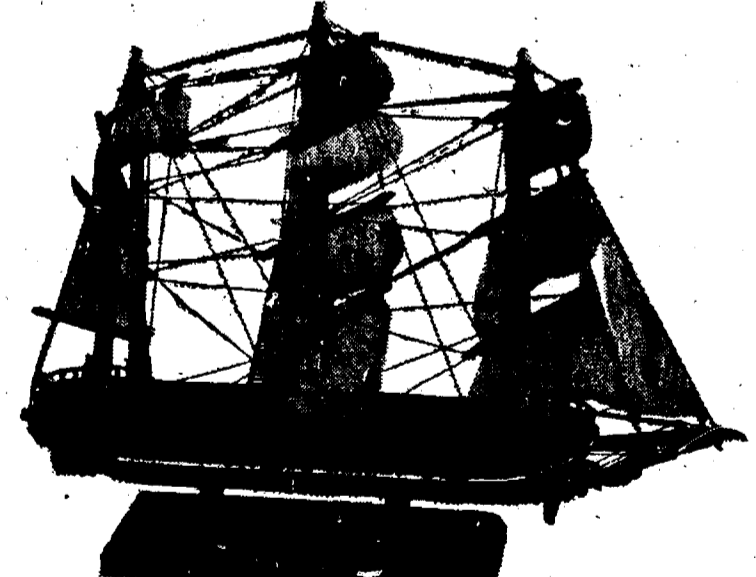

It has taken centuries to combine the pagan celebration of the winter solstice—the anticipation of the return of light to northern countries—and the Christmas legend of the martyred virgin of Syracuse, St. Lucia, whose festival will be celebrated this weekend.

Pictured as a lovely young girl in flowing white and crowned with a diadem of Christmas greens and lighted tapers, her story relates how she succored her people in time of famine by appearing on a ship laden with food for the hungry.

In every Swedish home today Lucia, represented by the prettiest young girl of the household, appears on December 13 bearing a tray of coffee, "julpepparkakor," spritz and Christmas braid bread for the family breakfast, thereby formally initiating the Christmas season.

According to Swedish legend the bringer of Christmas gifts rides on Thor's boat.

This "Julbock" of straw is a favorite decoration in homes throughout Sweden and in many Swedish homes in Grosse Pointe.

As church bells begin to "ring in" the Christmas, families read the Nativity story, sing

well-loved carols and open presents left by the Yule goat, Sweden's gift-bearer. An appropriate rhyme accompanies each gift and must be read aloud, to the amusement of all, before the gift may be opened.

Figures of straw—angels, animals, and birds—are hung on the Christmas tree and it is lighted with real candles and trimmed with garlands of flags and gay ornaments of various kinds.

This year, St. Lucia will be present at the Jenny Lind party in the person of Nina McCabe, of Deming lane, with Star Boys Geoffrey Nelson and Hikey Herrington.

They will make their entrance to the accompaniment of Santa Lucia sung in Swedish and English by everyone as dessert is served.

Wending her way through the glowing tables Nina will serve coffee and Lucia cookies to her parents and friends. Each table will be aglow with a large replica of Lucia's crown—seven white candles rising from a green wreath of boxwood—created by Mrs. Fred Cowan, of Union Lake.

Turn-of-Century Cookbooks Also Interested in Beauty

The secrets of beauty have always been of interest to women. Women today are no different in that respect from the ladies of the early 1900's. At that time, as now, magazines, periodicals and newspapers were filled with beauty tips. One switch however is that in that period, beauty hints could also be found in cookbooks.

"Mother's Cookbook," published in 1902, suggested to the ladies of that period—

"There is as much a fashion in complexion as there is in bonnets or boots. Sometimes nature is the mode, sometimes art. Just now the latter is the ascendant, though, as a rule, only in that inferior phase which has not reached the 'concealment of art' . . . the point where extremes meet and the perfection of artifice presents all the appearances of artlessness.

"No one of an observant turn of mind, who is accustomed to the sight of English maids and matrons, can deny that making-up, as at present practiced, partakes of the amateurish element.

"Impossible reds and whites grow still more impossibly red and white from week to week under the unskilled hands of the wearer of false colors," who does not like to ask for advice on so delicate a subject, for, even were she willing to confess to the practice, the impetuosity of experience conveyed in the asking for counsel might be badly received, and would scarcely be in good taste.

"The prevalent and increasing short-sightedness of our times is, perhaps, partly the cause of the excessive use of rouge and powder. The wielder of the powder puff see herself afar off, as it were. She knows that she cannot judge of the effect of her complexion with her face almost touching its reflection in the glass, and, standing about a yard off, she naturally accentuates her roses and lilies in a way that looks very pleasing to her, but is rather startling to anyone with longer sight. Nor can she tone down her rouge with the powdered hair that softened the artificial coloring of her grandmother when she had her day. Powder is only occasionally worn with evening dress? And it is by daylight that those dreadful bluish reds and whites look their worst.

"On the other hand, there are some women so clever at making up their faces that one almost feels inclined to condone the practice in admiration of the result. These are the small minority, and are likely to remain so, for their secret is of a kind unlikely to be shared. The closest inspection of these cleverly managed complexions reveals no trace of art.

"Notwithstanding the reticence of these skilled artists, an occasional burst of confidence has revealed a few of their means of accomplishing the great end of looking pretty. Do you often do that? said one of those clever ones, a matron of 37, who looks like a girl of 19, to a friend who was

vigorously rubbing her cheeks with a coarse towel after a plentiful application of cold water.

Yes, every time I come in from a walk, ride, or drive. Why?

"Well, no wonder you look older than you are. You are simply wearing your face out! But, I must wash!"

"Certainly, but not like that. Take a leaf out of my book; never wash your face just before going into the fresh air, or just after coming in. Nothing is more injurious to the skin. Do you notice a drawn look about your eyes and a general streakiness in the cheeks? That is the result of your violent assault upon your complexion. You look at this moment 10 years older than you did twenty minutes ago."

"Well, I really do. I look old enough to be your mother; but then you are wonderful. You always look so young and fresh!"

"Because I never treat my poor face so badly as you do yours. I use rain-water and if I cannot get that, I have the water filtered. When I dress for dinner I always wash my face with milk adding just enough hot water to make it pleasant to use. A very soft sponge and a very fine towel take the place of your terrible huckaback arrangement!" End scene.

However, the beauty tips continue.

"In addition to the disagreeable sensation of making-up, it must be remembered that the use of some of the white powders eventually destroys the texture of the skin, rendering it rough and coarse. Rimmel, the celebrated perfumer, in his Book of Perfumes, says rouge, being composed of cochineal and saffron, is harmless, but white cosmetics consist essentially of 'deleterious substances which may injure the health. He advises actors and actresses to choose cosmetics, especially the white, with the greatest care, and women of the world, who wish to preserve the freshness of their complexion, to observe the following recipe: Open air, rest, exercise and cold water. In another part of the book he says that sponada, a cosmetic used among the Arabs, is quite innocuous and at the same time effectual.

"This cream, which consists of sublimated benzoin, acts upon the skin as a slight stimulant, and imparts perfectly natural colors during some hours without occasioning the inconveniences with which European cosmetics may justly be reproached. It is a well-known fact that bismuth, a white powder containing sugar of lead, injures the nerve centers when constantly employed, and occasionally induces paralysis itself.

"In getting up the eyes, nothing is injurious that is not dropped into them. The use of kohl or kohl is quite harmless, and it must be confessed, very effective when applied, as the famous recipe for salad dressing, by the hand of a miser. Modern Egyptian ladies make their kohl of the smoke

without some sort of a hot cheese tidbit. Mrs. Thomas J. Little, III and Mrs. Charles Delbridge, Jr. suggest **HOT CHEESE CANAPES.**

2 pie tins
1/4 inch melted butter in one tin
1/4 inch grated parmesan cheese in other tin
lightly greased cookie sheet

While rings are the most glamorous, and have more appeal, these may be done in many shapes of sandwich bread ("ingers, circles, squares, etc.). A cookie size ring is handsomest of all, with a proportionate size cutter for the center, but that means only one to a slice of bread with much waste. Of course, maybe you like bread pudding and you can always pile caviar or something on the rounds you cut out of the center.) Both ladies said they use a wine glass for the outside circle and a large thimble to cut out the center, thus squeezing two to a slice.

Dip the bread shapes first in the butter on one side only, and then in the cheese. Place undipped side down on very lightly greased cookie sheet and bake at 350 degrees for about 10 minutes or until toasted a golden brown. May be served hot or allowed to cool. These can be prepared hours ahead, refrigerated and baked at serving time.

Difficult Child Needs Help Now

Parents should seek professional help for the child who destroys for the sake of destroying or enjoys disrupting the play of other children says Kathleen Bufton, Extension Home Economist for Wayne and Oakland counties.

"Something has gone wrong in this child's growing-up," she says, "and unless handled with skill and deep understanding his attitude can settle into a persistent defiance and destructiveness."

"In the case of gang misdeeds commonly committed by 10- to 15-year-olds the reasons for this behavior are not hard to find. The child doesn't want to be considered a sissy. He wants to be accepted by the others so he joins them in activities he would never dream of doing on his own."

Mrs. Bufton suggests that lessons in property value, the rights of other people and sharing the cost of damages (out of his allowance) will help cut down on this kind of destructiveness.

"When there is an undue amount of this trouble in a neighborhood parents would do well to examine the situation regarding their children's spare time," she adds. "Talking it over with a recreation leader, scoutmaster or church leader helps."

"Destructive gangs can become constructive groups with proper guidance."

Consider Pets As Xmas Gifts

If you're searching for a Christmas present that's soft, cuddly and guaranteed to live up the holidays you're probably looking for a pet.

But the puppy or cat that looks so appealing in the window may also bring holiday headaches unless you plan before giving.

So says Frank Andrews, executive director of the Michigan Humane Society, a Torch Drive service.

"A pet can be a heck of a nice surprise," said Andrews, "but sometimes we have mixed feelings about pets as gifts."

Puppies are the top Christmas gift choices, Andrews said, but it's important to be sure the recipient not only wants but can handle a dog.

"You're not always doing a good thing when you give a puppy to someone else," he explained. "It's something like giving a car with just a down payment."

"You're giving responsibility to someone else, along with pleasure. The pup needs to have more shots, which run about \$20. Then it has to be taken care of."

This taken-care-of part can easily take all of the joy out of a pet's first few days. Once the pup messes on the carpet or the new cat sharpens her claws on the Christmas tree and topples it it's easy to forget how appealing it looks while sleeping.

The most important thing in care of a new pet is to keep

Johnny and Susie from playing with it took much the first days, Andrews said. The animal is confused enough by the transition to a scene of excitement. He's likely to get grouchy and snap, or else tired and sick.

"I think if he finds his own speed, this is fine," Andrews said. "A lot of toy dogs, for example, are nervous and high strung because they're over-handled when they're young. They try to hide under the couch and the kids fish them out by the tail."

Some problems caused by new pups, Andrews said, stem from the false notion that they need regular milk. Milk is a laxative, and the pups will act accordingly.

Instead Andrews recommends an all-purpose puppy chow.

A good accompanying gift—from both the pup's and the master's view—is a large holding cage. The dog can retreat there for peace and quiet; or he can be put there when no one can watch him.

Keeping the pet in a regular place also gives him a sense of security, Andrews said. And it refines housebreaking because "a pet won't mess where he sleeps."

As for giving cats at Christmas, Andrews points out that kittens are very hard to find unless reservations are in early. He recommends a holding cage and a scratching pole for cats. Again, not too much playing the first days. And if the cat—or dog—should develop diarrhea, rush him to a veterinarian. Diarrhea is a warning signal for a number of serious diseases.

Less common pets, such as birds or small mammals (gerbils or hamsters) may also find their way under the Christmas tree. Andrews warns against buying mammals in pairs, lest you wind up in business.

The same holds for rabbits, which Andrews says make unsatisfactory pets anyway: they grow up, they don't do anything and they're almost impossible to wind second homes for.

Andrews also warns against purchasing exotic pets like monkeys or cheetahs.

"Cheetahs may be cute and docile when they're young," he said, "but when they're old they get aggressive."

"As for monkeys, they're impossible to housebreak and they catch and carry all kinds of human diseases."

"In both cases you can't get rid of them. No one will take them, not the zoo, not anyone else. And people who buy these pets are contributing to a cruel business. Somewhere along the line, the mother has been shot to harvest the baby."

Whatever pet you choose, Andrews cautions against waiting till the last minute. By then the selection is nil. A better plan would be to buy the pet and stash it with a friend until the holiday arrives.

With these simple guidelines, he said, a pet can be the best

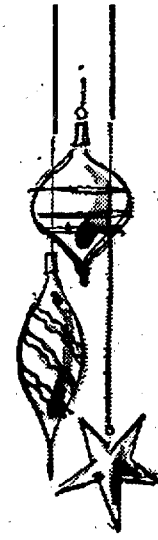

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

Dome Builders Eye Satellites

Orbiting weather satellites are playing an important role in the construction of the dome portion of Chrysler Corporation's Styling and Product Planning Building in Highland Park.

Information from the weather satellites is aiding the general contractors of the project determine when to place the estimated 700 cubic yards of concrete to form the dome roof structure.

Once the placement of the concrete has started, the work will continue around the clock until finished. Estimates of the time needed to complete the 140 feet diameter dome roof structure range from 40 to 60 hours.

The general contractor will meet with officials of the U.S. Weather Bureau today to get a reading of the weather picture for Dec. 8-12.

The contractor said a favorable five-day weather forecast is vital to the construction of the building's dome. Rain, snow or extreme changes in temperature during the period the concrete is being placed could adversely affect the quality of the structure.

The use of lightweight concrete necessitates that it be poured rather than blown into place.

Once the pouring begins, approximately 30 men will work in 12-hour shifts until it is finished. The men will be divided into two groups, each group working with a crane to lift the concrete into position. The pouring will be started at two opposite points beginning at the base of the column supported dome, some 20 feet above the ground.

Men and machines will then work in a circular path around the structure, laying down ribbons of concrete three to five feet wide until the entire dome area is covered. Once poured, the entire surface will be covered with tarps to protect it from the elements.

The dome topped structure is divided into 16 pie-shaped segments with highly complex surfaces. The roof of the domed structure will resemble a giant parasol under which the Chrysler Corporation cars of the future will be evaluated before production and introduction to the public.

The domed structure on Oakland Avenue in Highland Park will be part of Chrysler's worldwide headquarters complex. Completion is scheduled for early 1971.

who, where and whatnot

Just before Christmas last year . . . we ran the following information and we figure it saved our readers, (and ourselves), approximately 128 hours of telephone—"My daughter's getting married; what do I do?"—Instruction sessions. Now the calls are beginning again . . . so we thought we'd run the information again . . . and ask you PLEASE, if you're planning a wedding in the next few months, CLIP and SAVE this column:

Moving into The Winter Bridal Season . . . we've begun to get our usual quota of calls on "How do I announce my engagement? . . . wedding? . . . Should I submit a picture? . . . How far in advance must I submit the information?"—so we decided it might be time and energy-saving all around if we gave our readers a brief resume of the NEWS policy on engagement and wedding announcements.

Engagement announcements . . . are printed as soon after they are received as possible, on a first-come, first-serve basis. They may be submitted in advance of the actual announcement date, marked "Hold until such and such a time" or "Do not release until such and such a time."

Wedding announcements . . . should be submitted at least one week in advance of the actual Wedding date. Like engagement announcements, they are printed as soon after they are received as possible, on a first-come first-serve basis—but they take space precedence over engagement announcements, (in other words, some weeks our space is limited, but brides ALWAYS come first . . . if it's a choice between running two engagement announcements or one wedding announcement, the wedding announcement goes in; the engagements are "held" until space becomes available).

Wedding "forms" . . . are available at the NEWS office. We have no engagement forms; we advise our readers to use engagement announcements that have appeared in last week's paper as their "form," (there's really only one way to announce an engagement).

ALWAYS . . . include a telephone number, where information can be checked during the day, when submitting ANY item to ANY newspaper!!!

It's not necessary . . . to write up your own engagement or wedding announcement. You supply the facts, we'll supply the sentence structure, (of course, if you find it easier to submit your announcement in "story" form, by all means do so; sometimes you make a far better job of it than we do . . .).

But, PLEASE . . . type your information or, if you're filling out a form, PRINT proper names. Americans are not noted for their legible handwriting, and we have no resident cryptograph decoder on the NEWS staff.

Photographs submitted . . . should be "glossies," (shiny surface), 5x7 or 8x10. We're sorry, but because our space is limited, we can only print pictures of local girls, girls whose families are living in Grosse Pointe AT THE TIME of the wedding. This is a right-down-the-line rule with only three exceptions. We print engagement and wedding pictures for teachers who work in the Pointe School System and nurses who work in Pointe hospitals, and wedding pictures for girls whose families have recently (within six months), moved from The Pointe but who return, with their families, to celebrate their weddings here.

What about Pointe boys who marry . . . out-of-Pointe girls, or ex-Pointers who want their former neighbors to know of their son's or daughter's engagement/wedding? We print their complete stories, as submitted, WITHOUT photographs, (the reason for this, as explained in the above paragraph, is limited space—not, as one irate mother-of-the-bridegroom once charged "because you hate men").

And what about . . . returning submitted pictures? We're sorry but we haven't the staff to handle that . . . We do hold all submitted pictures at the office for three months, however, and we'll be happy to give them back—if somebody comes in to pick them up.
