Car-Bus Crash Injures Motorist

Richard Huvaere, 25, of 17148 St. Paul, was conveyed to St. John Hospital by Farms Fire Department ambulance on Sunday, September 13, suffering from severe lacerations about the face and a deep gash across the knee, caused when he crashed into the side of a Lake Shore Coach Line bus.

Shores Cpl. William Marshall in a report given to Farms police, stated that he was on routine patrol north on Lake Shore road, and approaching Provencal, when he saw the bus, driven by Wally Darwin Robinson, 21, of 1254 Hart, Detroit, in the crossover at the Lake Shore-Provencal intersec tion, attempting to make a turn to north on Lake Shore.

At this point, the corporal said, he noticed that the bus rocked and a cloud of smoke. or steam, emit from the rear of the coach. He passed the bus, and found that a 1970 Camaro, driven by Huvaere, had rammed into the rear section of the larger vehicle. Huvaere was pinned inside his auto.

Marshall radioed his station to call the Farms for help and to send its ambulance, since the accident occurred in the Farms' jurisdiction. When help arrived, Marshall assisted Farms firemen in prying Hu-vaere out of his wrecked car and putting him in the ambulance.

Farms Patrolman Vincent Peters, who took the report on the smashup, said that the Camaro, valued at \$3,000, was totally demolished. Damage to the ous was estimated at about \$200.

The officer said that no tickets were issued at the time, but the matter is still being investigated to determine who was at fault.

Peters said that Robinson. and two passengers in the bus were shaken up by the impact, but were not injured, at any rate, they refused medical attention.



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With Our Blessings

This is the time of year when we say goodbye to you young men and women who are leaving for college. Some of you who attend institutions close by will be back with us often; others will not return until the Thanksgiving or Christmas vacation periods.

If your powers of perception were abnormally keen, you could find, tucked away in that outrageous assort-ment of luggage and duffle which is always affected by the college crowd, things other than the equally absurd collection of personal items which go everywhere with you: You would see a million tiny, unuttered thoughts, bits of advice which we never quite got around to passing on to you. There would be a trunk full of fervent wishes and bright hopes, a generous sprinkling of prayers, and those myriad stains would be the remnants of tears, dropped mostly by the mothers of the youngsters who are leaving home for the first time.

So much of us goes with you; it is just as well you do not know. Accepted with the seriousness with which it is sent, it would constitute a burden that young people should not be called upon to carry.

Our interests turn inward and focus sharper with every passing year on the events which make up the lives of our children and we would have it no other way.

Advice is easy, and there are so many things we think we could and should have told you, to make things easier. Looking back, we are so prone to think of these years through which you are now passing, a painless period of enchantment and frivolity. Time is a great eraser and most of us have forgotten that all things are relative; that the troubles of youth, though they may seem negligible to us, may be just as bitter to swallow as our own most devastating trials. If we are lacking in understanding, we ask your forgiveness.

The shyness of youth, if such a thing still exists, is surely equalled by the shyness of a parent who is afraid to bare his soul to his own children lest he appear weak, or in fear that he may embarrass the youngster with a display of maudlin sentiment. In removed repose, it appears to us that a great deal more of this interchange of inner feeling would be a healthy and highly satisfying experience.

We wish we had not hesitated to tell you how proud of you we are, and what tremendous boons you have granted us through your accomplishments. We are sorry about the beratings we felt at the time were merited, and we wonder fearfully whether they were harmful or helpful.

We are so mindful of our own first days in college, and of little incidents and soul-shaking experiences, which followed in quick succession through all those wonderful years. We are going through them again with

Proposed Ordinance

An ordinance to amend ordinance No. 126 entitled "An ordinance to regulate the use of steam, gasoline, and/or motor driven or powered, excavating, grading, construction and/or erection equipment during certain specified hours on Sundays and legal holidays in the City of Grosse Pointe Woods, Michigan" adopted on March 7, 1955.


