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WOODS PARK LAW ADOPTED

Thursday, September 11
THE SENATE UPHELD
President Ford's veto of a bill extending oil price controls for six months Wednesday, thus formally removing the price ceilings on about two out of every three barrels of oil produced in the United States. The action virtually assures higher prices for fuel, food and most manufactured goods in the coming months. Gasoline prices will rise an estimated three to seven cents a gallon. Oil companies are not expected to raise prices, however, pending an effort by the President to compromise with Congress on a gradual phase-in of higher prices over a 39-month period.

Friday, September 12
A DOW CHEMICAL
spokesman confirmed Thursday that a woman who described herself as a member of the Charles Manson "family" threatened a high Dow official in Michigan via a phone call placed shortly before the Friday, September 5, attempt on the life of President Gerald Ford. The spokesman declined to name the official, who lives in Midland. United Press International identified the executive as board chairman Carl A. Gerstacker. The FBI in Detroit confirmed Thursday that it is investigating the call.

Saturday, September 13
THE STATE HEALTH
DEPARTMENT recommended Friday that residents avoid mosquito bites because of the possibility that Michigan mosquitoes are carrying Saint Louis encephalitis. The recommendations came a day after Detroit's Hutzel Hospital reported that seven persons with suspected cases of the brain inflammation were admitted to the hospital between August 30 and September 5. Laboratory tests are under way to determine the exact nature of the illnesses. The federal center for disease control in Atlanta has received reports of 600 probable or confirmed cases and 50 deaths.

Sunday, September 14
U.S. OFFICIALS DIS-
CLOSED Saturday that two U.S. servicemen, along with six other persons, were abducted by an armed band of men that attacked an American communications base in northern Ethiopia Friday night. Officials said the identity of the attackers was unknown. But in Damascus, Syria, an Ethiopian rebel group claimed responsibility for the raid and warned of more attacks against American installations in Ethiopia. The raiders hit one station of the multi-compound Kagnew base eight miles southwest of Asmara, the capital of Eritrea province on the Red Sea.

Monday, September 15
AS THOUSANDS OF
AMERICANS KNELT on the cobblestones of Saint Peter's Square on Sunday, Pope Paul proclaimed Elizabeth Ann Seton, a convert to Roman Catholicism, as America's first native-born saint. The 30-minute canonization ceremony, inserted near the beginning of the Mass, departed from traditional ritual to stress women's contributions to society and to emphasize, in the Pope's own words, "the complete femininity of Mother Seton — wife and mother of five, widow and nun." Mother Seton founded the United States' first religious order of women, the Sisters of Charity, in 1808.

Tuesday, September 16
THIRTY-ONE EAST
Detroit city employees, including the city manager, were rushed to a hospital Monday after carbon monoxide fumes from a faulty furnace filled City Hall, officials said. Witnesses said at least one woman employee passed out from the fumes.

Take Steps To Increase Center Use

North High School's Performing Arts Auditorium Built for Whole Community

After several years of controversy and debate, the administration of the Performing Arts Center at North High School has been resolved by the Board of Education. Responsibility for the center was delegated to the Coordinator of Community Services by a unanimous vote at the Board's regular meeting Monday, September 8.

The move was made in order to "facilitate more equitable and expanded opportunities for all community groups," according to Superintendent of Schools Dr. James A. Adams. Since its completion the facility has been intended for use by the entire community as well as both high schools.

Increase Usage

Coordinator of Community Services, Carl A. Schoessel, said one of his main objectives during the school year will be to increase the facility's usage. "It cost a great deal to build and equip the center and it's being used very little," Mr. Schoessel said. The Board also ordered the hiring of a full-time technician to oversee the operation

Farms Council Approves Proposal to Seek Grant To Buy New Ambulance

Van Type Vehicle Would Cost \$17,360; Solons Act on Other Items Including Liquor License Transferal

With a little luck and some consideration from Federal sources, The Farms could have a shiny, new ambulance in the future as the council, meeting after a three-week layoff Monday, September 8, approved the adoption of a resolution authorizing the Fire Department to submit an application for a Highway Safety Grant for replacement of The Farms' ambulance.

The current ambulance is 12-years-old and would be replaced by an orange and white van type vehicle costing \$17,360.

If the grant is approved, local taxpayers would pay \$5,300 of the vehicle cost, with the difference being made up by the grant.

While the current ambulance is in good working order, Farms Fire Chief Warren Schultz urged the purchase of the new vehicle, saying, "parts are becoming difficult to find for our 1963 ambulance. With the purchase of the new ambulance, we can use the older model for a back-up, or loan it to other departments."

It was suggested that the older vehicle could be sold, but Chief Schultz pointed out that if it was, "the government would reduce the grant by that much."

The resolution was passed by a vote of 5-0.

Other action before the council was an application for liquor license transferal from the current owners of the Manor Bar, 18450 Mack

19 Pointers Attend MML Conference

Annual Parlay Views Arbitration Act, 'Four E's'

Nineteen city officials and councilmen from four Grosse Pointe municipalities recently attended the Michigan Municipal League's (MML) conference to lend their support and criticism to the League's formation of policy statements for the upcoming year.

The League, a lobbying and legal assistance resource for the State's municipalities, held its three-day meeting from September 4-6 on Mackinac Island with headquarters at the Grand Hotel.

Among 18 resolutions passed at the three-hour general meeting was a call for a repeal of the compulsory arbitration act (#312 or 1969) that mandates an outside arbitrator to settle city labor disputes. According to the League's statement, compulsory arbitration has been a costly process. It cited the average 10 percent pay increases that have been awarded throughout the State since the bill's enactment.

In the Pointes, six police or fire departments are still unsettled or heading into arbitration: The City Police and Fire, The Park Police and Fire and The Farms Police and Fire Departments.

Other matters discussed at the meeting, entitled "The Four E's: Economy, Ethics, Ecology and Energy," included management of solid waste programs, revenue sharing, transportation and housing laws.

Conference delegates had a choice of workshops to attend concerning a variety of subjects and were also treated to a keynote address by Governor William G. Milliken.

Each municipality was allowed to send two delegates to the meeting. Other members who wished to attend were sponsored by the city itself. Transportation, room and the \$30 registration fee were paid for by the city.

The City Manager, Thomas Kressbach, who was on the Board of Trustees this year, said that "the workshops and discussion were very beneficial." The City sent seven administrators, including four councilmen to the meeting. The Farms sent three people to the meeting. The Shores didn't send any delegates.

Shores to Vote On Purchase of Lighting System

Trustees Vote to Place Question on Ballot and Hold Special Election November 4; Public Hearing Scheduled

Shores voters will consider a street lighting bonding proposition at a special election Tuesday, November 4, as around five months of negotiations between the Village and Detroit Edison for the purchase of the entire system reached a climax when the council unanimously approved a resolution to place this question on the ballot.

This action was taken at a special council meeting Thursday morning, September 4. Now, the Village is planning, via its newsletter, to inform residents of the complete scope of the proposal, said Village President Gerald Schroeder at the regular council meeting Tuesday morning, September 16. Citizens should be receiving the letter within the next two weeks.

A public hearing will be held Tuesday, October 21, on the proposal at 8 p.m. in the council chambers, 795 Lakeshore road. The regular council meeting also will take place on the 21st, beginning at 7 p.m.

Letter Viewed
A letter of intent between the Village and Edison, which had been developed as a result of a meeting Tuesday, September 2, was read to the council by President Pro-Tem C. F. Ogden at the meeting on the 4th.

The letter says that Edison, subject to the approval of its board of directors, agrees to sell and the Village, subject to the approval of its council and its electorate, agrees to buy all of the street lighting equipment consisting of the overhead system and the underground system for the total fixed sum of \$178,732, payable at the time of transfer of title. "It is understood that the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores must secure voter approval by referendum and subsequent sale of municipal bonds to fund said purchase," says the letter.

The communication continues by stating it is contemplated that the said legal requirement will take approximately four months with the hoped-for target date of February 1, 1976.

Offers Resolution

Councilman Robert Palmer then offered the resolution which says the council "deems it necessary for the public health, safety and welfare of the Village" to acquire the existing street lighting system now owned by the Detroit Edison Co., and to construct additions to the existing system.

Estimating the cost to be \$200,000, the council deems it advisable to borrow this sum and issue general obligation bonds of the Village for the purpose of acquiring the existing system, and for the construction of additions.

S. C. Shores Acceptance Adds Teeth

Ordinance Regulating in Recreation Area Contains Total of 35 Sections

Rules and regulations governing the use of The Woods' Lake Front Park have a new set of "teeth" as The St. Clair Shores Council approved an ordinance regulating conduct in privately owned parks, i.e., The Woods', on Tuesday, September 2.

An ordinance on this subject was unanimously submitted by The Woods Council to St. Clair Shores officials this February in an attempt to reach a solution to a nagging problem regarding the enforcement of rules and regulations governing the park.

A prominent aspect of this problem is the fact that the city's park is located in St. Clair Shores, and flowing from this were ensuing jurisdictional complications. However, with the approval of this measure by St. Clair Shores officials, this overall situation appears alleviated.

Approval Means

What approval of this law means to The Woods was explored by City Attorney George Catlin and Parks and Recreation Director Donald J. Hallmann.

"This means that people who violate park rules as contained in the ordinance can be given a violation ticket or be arrested at our request by St. Clair Shores authorities," said Mr. Catlin, who noted there were no extensive changes in the measure from the proposal submitted by The Woods. He said changes were made mainly in the area of refinements of language and definitions.

"Approval means if we have any violation of the ordinance, St. Clair Shores authorities can come in and enforce the violation," noted Mr. Hallmann. "In the past, they had no authority to come in on private property and enforce the rules and regulations."

As a result, a load has now been removed from parks and recreation department personnel.

Hospital Opens Family Center

Bon Secours Hospital, 488 Cadioux road, has recently opened a new family practice center, designed to aid persons unable to find a family doctor.

The center, now operating from a temporary quarters within Bon Secours, offers a comprehensive form of health care involving all aspects of internal medicine — pediatrics, gynecology, obstetrics and minor surgery. Family practice differs from general practice in that it stresses preventative health care.

The center also offers a training program for family practice residents under the direction of Dr. Archie W. Bedell and associate director Dr. Dwight J. Dutcher. There are now three residents participating in the program.

A new family practice unit, now under construction, will be completed in 1977. It will include a dental suite and provide medical care to about 10,000 patients a year.

The Village has around 316 street lights and there are plans for the installation of at least 10 lights in two new subdivisions, the Glancy Estate and the Baker subdivision.

The measure notes that the council determines the period of usefulness of improvements to be not less than 30 years, and calls for the special election on the proposition between 7 a.m.-8 p.m.

Question Asked
The proposal asks this question:

Shall the Village borrow the principal sum of not to exceed \$200,000, and issue general obligation unlimited tax bonds of the Village for the purpose of acquiring the existing system now owned by Edison and to construct additions to the system?

The resolution also specifies that notices of registration and notices of special election will be published "in a newspaper of general circulation in the Village," i.e., the NEWS.

Finally, it says the bonds will mature over a period not to exceed 10 years and will bear interest at a rate or rates to be determined on the public sale, and not to exceed 10 percent.

The resolution took effect one week after its passage, i.e., Thursday, September 11.

If the voters approve the proposition, Village officials say, to their knowledge, the municipality will be the first community in the State to have complete control of its own system, including all fixtures and cables.

Will Save Money
Officials emphasize the Vil-

lage will save its taxpayers money if the community controls its own system.

For example, costs for street lighting have been budgeted at around \$56,000 for this fiscal year and have been steadily on the rise over the past few years.

The Shores would still pay around \$13,000 to Edison for electricity and around \$5,000 for necessary maintenance. While this estimated \$18,000 figure would still be paid to Edison on an annual basis, the "meat" of the budgeted figure, i.e., around \$38,000 in the case of this fiscal year, for the use of poles and wiring wouldn't be a factor.

At the same time, if the

Village ultimately takes over maintenance responsibilities of the poles and cleaning the bulbs, further savings would result, officials say.

On the cost front, the effect of potential rate increases over a period of time, which would hike the Village's annual budgeted amount for street lighting, also played a role in the council's minds regarding the purchase of the system.

Officials feel even if the Village pays principal and interest on a bond issue, if the proposition is approved by the voters, the municipality would come out ahead in the long run on the cost front.

"In the past, we explained why we had the rules and regulations and told citizens why they shouldn't violate them so everyone could enjoy the park to its fullest," he said, with personnel mainly resting on the cooperation and good will of residents and their guests.

Mr. Hallmann emphasized approval of the ordinance "will help our people immensely," and keep the majority of residents in the park happy, while not having a small minority potentially disrupt the enjoyment of others.

The bulk of the content of the measure as approved remains the same from the earlier proposal submitted by The Woods. However, three sections were eliminated from the original proposal which lowered the total of sections from 38 to 35.

These sections included ones on vehicle and traffic laws, on camping and on gambling, along with part of a section on water skiing. Both the proposal and the final measure contain eight parts.

Protect Rights

The purpose of the ordinance, as stated in its content, is to "regulate the use

of the center and recommended the appointment of an advisory committee to make contact with non-school groups who may use the facility.

During the school year an effort will also be made to identify areas of cost which may be reduced to offset the employment of the technician and to review the fee schedule, according to Dr. Adams' recommendation.

Since the opening of North High School the operation and supervision of the 800-capacity center has never been clearly resolved. Scheduling has been handled by the school's staff and the department of administrative services.

A Performing Arts Commission, appointed in 1972, studied the situation and recommended it be put under the direction of Community Services. A PTA subcommittee supported that recommendation in May 1975, saying that Community Services could help expand the use of the center throughout the community.

and Joanne Brady, treasurer. Officers of the dramatic honorary National Thespian Society are Jennifer Peters and Dave Corbett.

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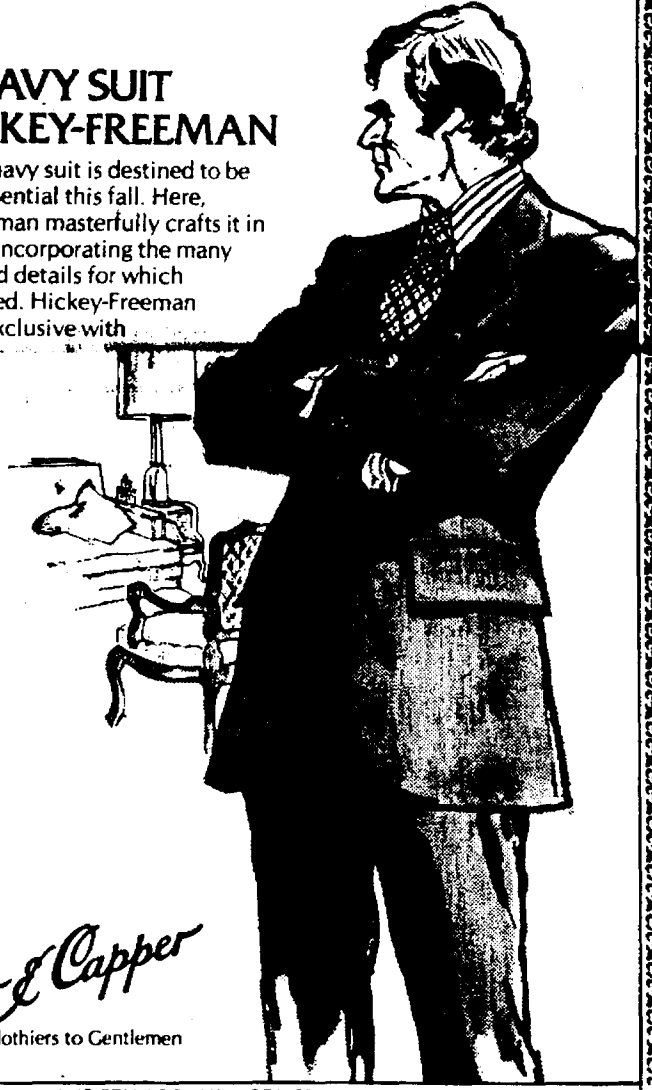

Farms Police Nab Youth in Bike Theft Incident

A 16-year-old Detroit boy, who along with another 16-year-old Detroit youth admitted involvement in an estimated 50-100 bicycle larcenies in several communities, was arrested by Farms

police Sunday, August 31, for allegedly taking a bicycle from a residence. This case was turned over to Youth Service Division, (YSD), Det. Patrick Fagan, who said a petition will be

filed on the youth with Wayne County Circuit Court charging him with intent without breaking with intent to commit larceny. Police said a citizen observed the juvenile wheeling her son's bicycle through the back yard. To her knowledge, the cycle had previously been in the garage.

Through a painstaking investigation last month, Det. Fagan learned of the pair's involvement in stealing bicycles through their admissions. The youths said they took a total of 50-100 bikes in all the Pointes, St. Clair Shores, Harper Woods, Macomb County and Clinton Township.

Hospital Adds Parking Space

The largest piece of land in Muir road yet acquired by Cottage Hospital toward fulfilling an agreement made with the Grosse Pointe Farms Council in March, 1974, was purchased Friday, September 12, from Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Johnston.

The property comprises three lots — numbers 79, 80 and 81 — on the south side of Muir between Kercheval and Ridge. These lots, together with five others already owned by the hospital, enable the hospital to have parking space for approximately 100 automobiles.

Agree on Plea In Jewel Case

At a pre-trial conference for Anthony Young, who was originally charged with larceny from a building, a felony, it was agreed by all parties that justice would be served if the defendant would be allowed to plead guilty of conspiracy to commit a misdemeanor, to wit, larceny under \$100, which carries a maximum of one year in prison, reported Woods police.

Last year's agreement between Cottage Hospital and the Grosse Pointe Farms City Council was made for the purpose of obtaining a building permit for renovation of the old part of the hospital complex. The Council granted the permit when the hospital agreed to purchase land on Muir to use for parking, this use of the land being in accordance with long-term goals for development of the Farms community as recommended by planning consultants retained by the city council.

Upon yelling, the youth dropped the bike and walked away from the area. However, he didn't get very far as police were notified of his description and he was arrested a short time later.

However, the detective has been able to confirm only 20 such thefts so far. After checking with local police departments, these larcenies have been verified: six each in The Woods and Shores, three apiece in The Park and City and one each in Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores.

Woods Park Regulation Criticized by Citizen

(Continued from Page 1) Parks and Recreation Committee, told Mr. Cairns, "There was a great deal of discussion when the new courts were built and an effort was made to establish standards for behavior and dress for use on the new courts."

He said both the Parks and Recreation Department and the Citizens Recreation Commission tried to establish such standards for proper tennis attire. "A line had to be drawn at some point because of abuses in the past," stated Mr. Kefgen.

For example, if there was no minimum dress code citizens might end up playing in wet shoes and bathing suits, he continued.

The rules were an effort towards upgrading the facilities, which are brand new. In noting that such rules will be given a tryout to see if they're workable, Mr. Kefgen added most citizens have expressed satisfaction with this regulation although some have nixed it.

As a result, the council unanimously received and placed on file Mr. Cairns' letter and referred it to the attention of the Citizens Recreation Commission.

Parks and Recreation Director Donald J. Hallmann in a lengthy memo to City Administrator Chester E. Petersen regarding Mr. Cairns' letter said this regulation was suggested to the department by many residents who took an interest in the development and construction of the new courts.

"We contacted several adjacent cities and found that the 10 courts operated by Grosse Pointe City, across from the Neighborhood Club, which serves all the residents of all the Grosse Pointes, does require the use of shirts while the other Grosse Pointe areas do not,"

he stated. While acknowledging at the time the regulation was considered it would be somewhat controversial, it was the feeling on the parts of Recreation Commission members that a standard should be established for the following:

- Many residents requested specifically that players be required to wear proper tennis attire, including the wearing of shirts by the men.
- Proper tennis attire is an important part of tennis etiquette which net enthusiasts told the department included the wearing of shirts.
- The absence of any standard lends itself to a disregard for the rights and feelings of others.

"When it comes right down to it this becomes a matter of the desirability of establishing or not establishing a standard for the use of our tennis facilities, and if you draw a standard is that

standard reflective of the values of the community.

"It is my opinion, based on the comments made by the members of our Recreation Commission at the last meeting of August 12 . . . when this matter was again discussed, and the comments received as of this date. (Tuesday, August 19), which by far have been favorable and supportive, that the City of Grosse Pointe Woods maintain and support this particular regulation," said Mr. Hallmann.

(The Recreation Commission in the minutes of its August 12 meeting were of the opinion that residents and their guests should continue to wear proper tennis attire while using the courts).

However, Mr. Hallmann added, "I would like to strongly emphasize that this is not to be taken to be indicative that the Department of Parks and Recreation is opposed to the possibility of

changing this particular rule or any of the others that presently govern the use of our courts."

But until Mr. Cairns and other of our fine citizens can demonstrate that the present existing regulations are unwarranted, or need change to benefit the majority of our citizens using the tennis facilities, I feel that we should maintain what we have with an open mind fully receptive to those who are able to offer constructive ideas, he said.

Changes, he felt, should be made after careful consideration of the desires of the majority of citizens and not be made if changes represent the view and desires of "a small but very vocal minority."

Municipalities and Elections, the House Committee on Elections and surrounding Wayne County communities.

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
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
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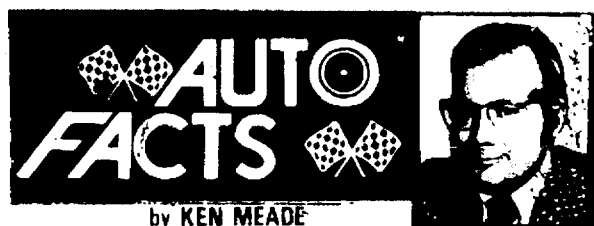

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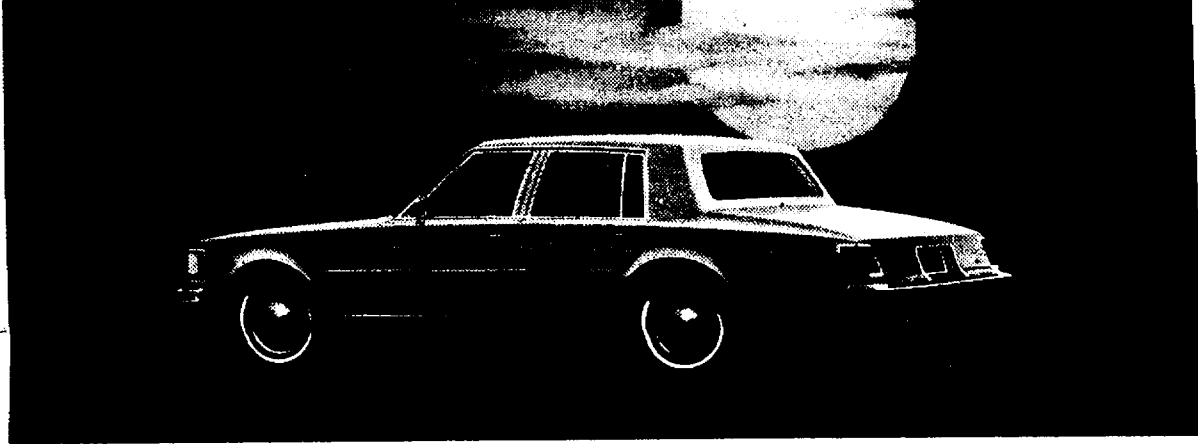
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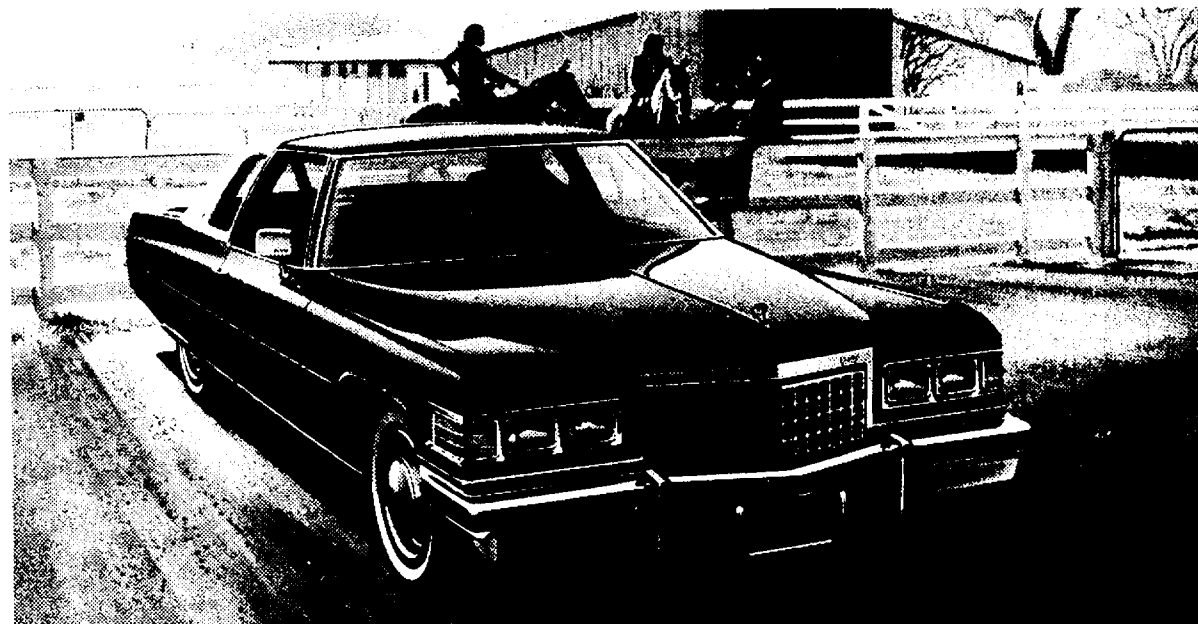
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Austin Duffers Looking Ahead

One View from the Capitol
 By William Bryant
 The Detroit Art Institute is now receiving money for the State to try to keep it operating at a decent level. In the new State budget there was good and bad news for the Institute.
 The good news was a large increase in appropriation in light of a severe cutback by the City of Detroit in its funding for the museum and its programs.
 The bad news came in the form of some inappropriate and unwise language thrown in the budget bill at the last moment by Rep. Frank Wierzbicki, conservative Detroit Democrat. The language says it's the intent of the legislature for the city to charge at least a \$1 admission fee to the Art Institute.
 This language was added at the last minute in a conference report resolving the differences on that budget between the House and Senate versions.
 Because of the lateness of all the budgets and because these reports cannot be amended, but rather, must be accepted or rejected in total, we did not wish to cause a need for a new conference and report.
 Instead, I talked with Rep. Bill Ryan, the former speaker, and we agreed that was not the legislative intent and that I should vote "no" on the report and place my explanation in writing in the House Journal.
 So, I did, and explained that it was only to expedite the budget and not because of actual feeling that the legislature was adopting the conference report with that erroneous legislative intent language.
 Further, I said and believe that such expression of intent is not binding on the city anyway and not a condition the Institute would have to meet before it could get the State money.
 We can clear the matter up with a clear resolution of intent when we reconvene in October, or the Attorney General may be able to help by ruling that the language cannot force the city to charge a \$1 entrance fee.
 The matter points up a more general problem. I have worked hard over the past few years to get more State money for the arts but all arts organizations which seek State monies must realize they are taking a risk—the risk of funds having strings attached or someday being cut off — when they take such money.
 For this reason alone, please, don't anyone stop or reduce their private support for an arts group you hear is now getting public support. They need your private support more than ever, and they dare not rely heavily on public, tax support.

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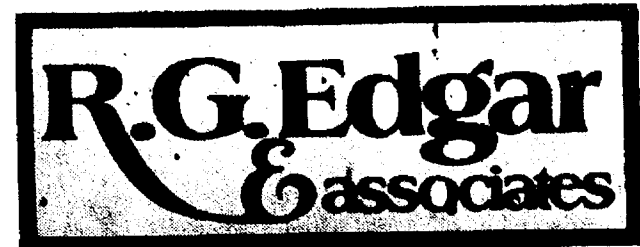

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Know Your Schools

School has been underway now for two weeks. Therefore, it is time for an informal assessment of the beginning of the 1975-76 year. From my vantage point, it was the smoothest opening of school that I have ever experienced. Apparently, the consensus is widespread. Principal John Hammel of Monteith indicated that a half-hour after the children arrived it was as if they had been there for months!

This is not meant to imply that the opening of school is ever without problems. It never is and probably never will be. And without the weeks of careful planning in which our staff engages, this September's smooth opening would not have been a reality. I wish to thank everyone who played a part in getting us off to a good start.

Although our student accounting process does not become official until the state's mandated Fourth Friday Count when we expect to reach an enrollment of approximately 11,200, initial enrollment data indicate that our class size situation will be improved for 1975-76 at all levels as planned.

The most significant improvement is noted at the elementary school level where an average will be under 26 pupils per class compared to an average of about 28 during 1974-75. Our overall staffing ratio will approximate 56.3 professionals per 1,000 pupils as compared to 53.2 per 1,000 last year. Our commitment to the community was to reach at least a ratio of 54 per 1,000 in 1975-76. We are pleased to report that we have more than achieved this important goal.

I am also pleased to report that we have achieved the best overall elementary class size we have ever had in the district—and among the best secondary teacher-pupil ratios we have ever had. We are confident that our instructional program will benefit from smaller classes. Certain enrollment problem areas which emerged with the opening of school have been solved. For example:

Barnes—a split section in grades 4, 5 and 6 will help alleviate oversized 6th grade classes.
Defer and Kerby—Since both kindergartens average 30 pupils in size, we explored the possibility of having pupils attend neighboring elementary schools where the kindergartens are much smaller. Since few parents opted for this alternative, we have added a teacher at each building to handle one section.
Defer—A teacher has also been added in the grade 5-6 cycle where classes average

32, since no other reasonable alternative appeared available.

Maire—Large classes in the 1st and 2nd grades necessitated the addition of a teacher.

Richard—Similarly, oversized 5th and 6th grades at Richard have resulted in the hiring of an additional teacher.

A final word—had our proposed budget for 1975-76 not included provisions for additional staffing necessitated by unexpected enrollment imbalances, we would not have been able to accommodate the situations listed above as expeditiously as we have been able to.

Park Firemen Aided by Truck

Quick work by Park firefighters on the Seagrave aerial ladder truck, plus the extremely wet weather the area has received the past few weeks, played important roles in preventing a fire on the roof of a Trombley road home from spreading.

The incident occurred on Tuesday, September 9.

Fire Chief Phillip Costa said a citizen across the street from the residence spotted the fire, which was caused by a hole in the incinerator screen. As the result of an updraft, some burning debris landed on the wood shingled roof.

However, firefighters utilizing the 100-foot ladder were able to douse the blaze, (which only burned an area of around two feet), to prevent it from engulfing much of the roof.

"Our aerial ladder truck, (which cost \$83,400), has proved valuable," said Chief Costa, who noted the ladder extended from the street to the roof enabling the firefighters to put the fire out swiftly. "There was no interior damage," he said, "as the fire didn't burn through the roof."

He cited this incident as a good reason why The Park needed such an apparatus. "While we have no buildings this high, (i.e., at 100 feet), there are many homes away from the curb," he said. As a result, the truck has proved a boon to firefighters.

The city received delivery of the apparatus last August.

What Goes On at Your Library

Through the generous gift of one of our local residents, we have added the new American Maritime Library series to our collection at the Central Library.

Published by Wesleyan University Press for the Marine Historical Association of Mystic Seaport, Connecticut, this cooperative venture makes a significant contribution to the field of American maritime history. It presents—in accurate, non-technical texts, with suitable illustrations and documentation—books that add meaningfully to our knowledge and understanding of the nation's nautical heritage: books not only for scholars and historians, but for all who are drawn to the sea, to ships, and to the men who built and sailed them.

Works for inclusion in this series were selected after careful examination by an editorial advisory board of authorities including: Marion V. Brewington, Director, Kendall Whaling Museum, Sharon, Massachusetts; Robert E. Farlow, Senior Vice-President, W. W. Norton & Company; Benjamin W. Labaree, Professor of History, Williams College; and Willard W. Wallace, Professor of History, Wesleyan University.

The first volume in the American Maritime Library is *GLORY OF THE SEAS* by Michael J. Mjelde. This is the story of a great clipper ship and the men who built and sailed her. Constructed in 1869, "Glory of the Seas" was the last of Donald McKay's many masterpieces. For 40 years she roamed the world's oceans, carrying the world's cargoes, finding her share of adventure and triumph, earning her keep for her owners. In the end, like the bulk of windships, she fell on evil days and in 1923, reduced to a hulk, she was fed to the flames. The biography of this ship is the story of an era.

WAKE OF THE COASTERS by John F. Leavitt, is an informed history of New England's coasting vessels—and to some extent, a warm and vivid personal memoir as well. In 1919 the author, aged 14, shipped aboard his first coaster, and for the next seven years he was a hand on a succession of Maine and Connecticut schooners. This book consists largely of his very lively recollections of the men, the ships, and the northeastern ports at which they called. But it is more than that, for Mr. Leavitt is concerned that this aspect of our maritime history be recorded accurately and in full—here he succeeds admirably.

THE MALLORYS OF MYSTIC by James P. Baughman is a study of seafaring in perhaps its last-known aspect: not the time-worn fare of perils at sea and exotic adventures, but the varied, risky, and ever-changing matter of shipping as a business. In this finely researched history, Baughman introduces the reader to a great American shipping family whose two centuries of activity reflect the full range of the country's maritime past.

Robert Albion's contribution to this series is an excellent history titled *NEW ENGLAND AND THE SEA*. Along with the clipper and the whalers, we read of the Yankee privateers and the coasting schooners, the trawl and the ocean liners, the graceful passenger vessels

that have served the coastal cities—the commerce, the navigation aids, the gales and shipwrecks that have made a rich folklore and an even richer history.

Horace Beck's *FOLK-LORE AND THE SEA* is maritime history from a somewhat different point of view. Here are the stories, the legends, the tales which, in the oral tradition, form the lore of the sea by which people live and have lived for generations—the lore still current among the folk of the English-speaking world.

To many devotees, there is no better eating than a fresh oyster on the half-shell. Yet very few people know of the busy, prosperous days of the oyster industry. At the turn of the century, for example, oyster-ling was a multimillion dollar business.

In *OYSTERING FROM NEW YORK TO BOSTON*, author John M. Kochiss records the development, from the colonial period to the present day, of one of the world's great oyster-producing areas. The vessels, the equipment, the shipping procedures all are here in an informally written and delightfully illustrated book.

This then is a part of the American Maritime Library series. In these readable studies the importance and excitement of our country's seafaring past is authoritatively recounted.

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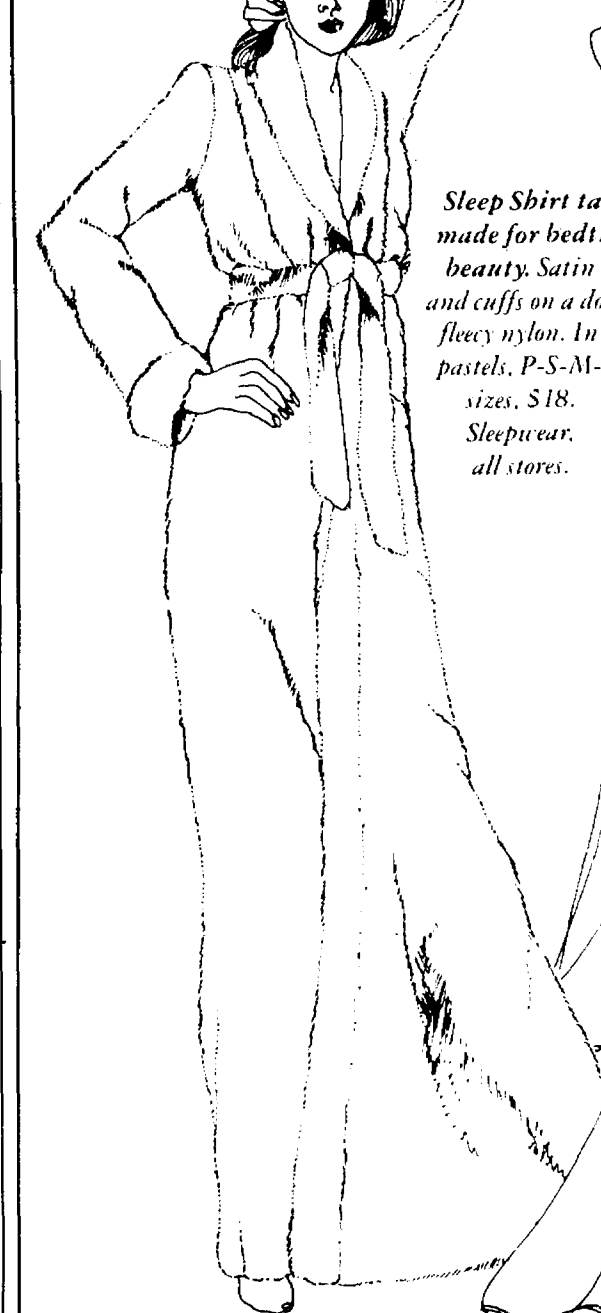

A New Twist Is Created in Decoupage

Louise Hoyt, first president of the National Guild of Decoupeurs, has, working with Marie Mitchell, devised a fascinating new form of decoupage based on the old-world art of marquetry, or inlaid wood.

In Louise's system, however, the wood is not laid IN, but laid ON. Suitable designs cut from very thin sheets of wood veneer are glued to boxes, trays, tabletops, et al., then covered with coats of varnish.

The amount of varnish used determines whether the finished piece will have a wood overlay or inlay effect. The wood veneers, such as rosewood, bird's-eye maple, teak, walnut, cherry and birch, come in a variety of color tones, ranging from almost white to almost black. Because of their thinness, they can be cut as easily as paper with a decoupage scissors.

Designs can be Oriental, Provincial, modern — anything that lends itself to the work-at-hand. Several veneers can be incorporated to create one composite design.

"This is the first time anybody has ever done anything like this," says Louise, who dropped into the NEWS office recently with several examples of her marquetry work. They're on display this week, September 15 through 19, at the Parcels Library.

Mrs. Hoyt will incorporate marquetry in her schedule of classes when she resumes instruction under auspices of the Grosse Pointe Public Schools' Department of Community Services Monday,

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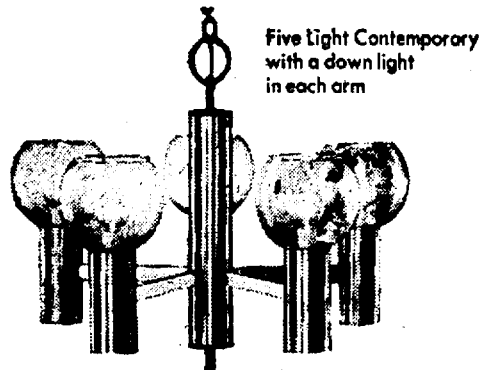

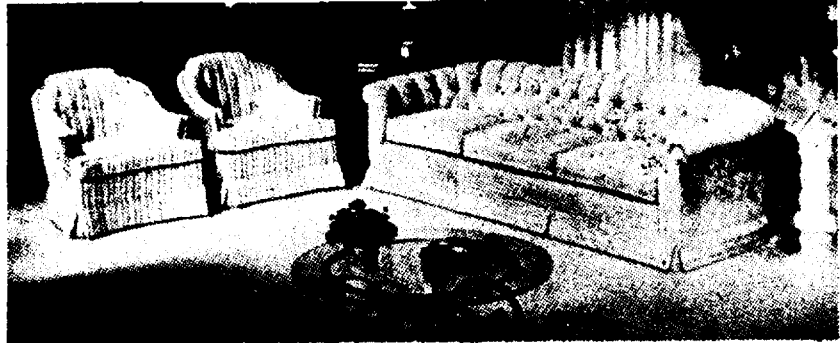

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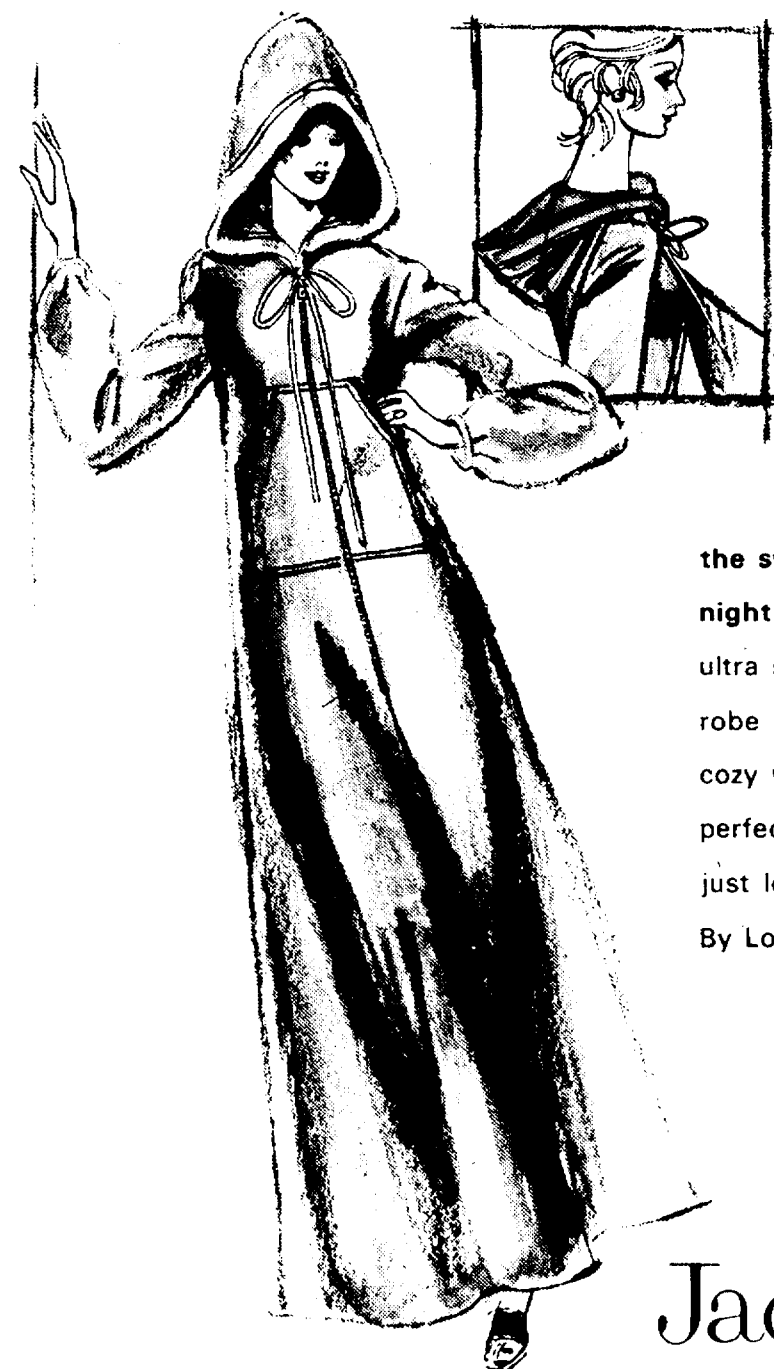

THE PAUL R. HENRY FAMILY OF HOLLYWOOD AVENUE

That's Strong Bow, Straight Arrow, Broken Arrow, Bent Arrow and Feathered Arrow up there leaning against the fence. The lady's name is Iris. In mufti, (which is, unless you're an Indian Guide, Indian Maiden, Indian Princess or Trail Blazer, how you're most likely to meet them), the "braves" answer to the names of Paul R. Henry and sons Mark, 12, Robert, 11, Paul, 10, and Daniel, seven.

The lady answers consistently to the name of Iris. If one had to pick an Indian name for her, She-Woman-Began-It-All might be appropriate.

Seven years ago, Paul R. Henry had no idea there lurked, beneath the facade of a typical suburban father, the spirit of Strong Bow.

Typical Suburban Dad He was very much a typical suburban father: a man who left the house early every weekday morning, worked all day at Ford's, on the West Side, came home at night and said, "Hey kids! How did it go today . . . ?"

Iris thought he wasn't spending enough time with the boys.

Iris heard about the Indian Guides father-son program sponsored by the South Macomb Branch of the YMCA. "She actually pushed me out the door." So off went Paul and five-year-old Mark, to their first Indian Guides meeting, and Mark loved it right from the start, and Paul looked around at all the big braves and little braves, in feathers and buckskins, and listened to them tell how they'd earned their wampum for the week, and thought, "This really does seem a little silly!"

Iris pushed him out to Meeting Number Two. Enter Strong Bow. Dad Gets Promoted

Once upon a time, before Strong Bow, it used to be "Mommy, can I do this? Mommy, what do you think about that?" around the Henry house.

Now it's "Daddy, how about this? Daddy, will you help me with that?" Mommy's still very much in the picture, of course. But Daddy's moved out of the background.

The Indian Programs — father/son Guides, mother/daughter Maidens, father/daughter Princesses and father/older son Trail Blazers—are designed to enrich and strengthen the family as a whole.

There are 23 Tribes in the SOMAC (South Macomb Y) Federation. Each Tribe, (there are normally six to eight dads per Tribe), has its own Chief.

Must Go Together Tribal meetings are usually scheduled every other

week, in members' homes . . . and it's a cardinal rule that no son can attend without a father, no father without a son.

"The purpose of the program is to have fathers spend time with their sons," Strong Bow, whose term as Chief of the entire Federation expires this month, explains. No boy is denied membership if he is fatherless. Any adult male family member or friend may sponsor a son in the Tribe, and Most Y's maintain a list of adult Big Brother substitutes for boys who are unable to find their own, although a relative/close friend is preferred, for legal and psychological reasons.

Activities are scheduled, too, for the whole family, ranging from a mid-winter Family Freezeout to a mid-summer Family Picnic. Iris especially likes the picnic. "That's always fun."

The Federation also sponsors campouts, canoe and field trips. It all sounds a lot like the Boy Scouts—and it all IS a lot like the Boy Scouts, with one major difference, according to Paul Henry, who loves the Boy Scouts, who attained Eagle Scout rank himself, who recognized, growing up at the end of The Depression, that his father couldn't spend time with him . . . and who missed the father/son closeness he is determined to have with his own sons.

They're Close Family The Paul Henrys do spend time together. They're a camping family, whose vacations have taken them into Canada and all through Michigan, along the East Coast and, this summer, down to Florida, where they had a ball at Disney World.

The three older boys attend Saint Joan of Arc School, where Mark and Bob are on the Chargers football team. Daniel is a Ferry student, too young for football and up to now, for Little League baseball. His three brothers have all played for the Orioles.

Mr. Henry's personal hobbies include photography. Recently, he's taken up whittling. Iris likes to crochet. "She made us all our beer hats." She's just finishing the

last of four comforters; one for each of the boys.

Once in the Indian Guides, Strong Bow rose through the ranks to become Tribal Chief. When the Federation needed a Wampum Bearer, (treasurer), he was available. Then came a year's term as Assistant Federation Chief before he received the ceremonial headdress as Federation Chief.

In the South Macomb Y, the Indian Guides Federation Chief is automatically a member of the Branch board of management. "That," sighs Iris, "is ANOTHER meeting!"

Headed Y's Drive As Paul Henry, he served last year as chairman of the South Macomb Y's '75 Invest in Youth Campaign, which raises funds supplementing those received from the United Foundation and from Y-sponsored class and activity fees to make up the deficit in the Branch's well over \$100,000 per year budget.

As Strong Bow, Chief of the SOMAC Federation, he was a member of the Tri-County Council of Y Indian Programs, involving 17 different YMCA Federations.

He journeyed in the spring to St. Louis, Mo., to attend the 38th National Longhouse celebrating the 50th anniversary of the founding of Indian Guides by H. S. Keltner, who was present at this year's meeting.

Mr. Keltner organized the Guides in St. Louis, bringing Joe Friday, an Ojibway Indian, from Canada to act as advisor.

Today's Guides, (as of April, 6,229 Tribes were registered nationally), remain much as Mr. Keltner and Joe Friday envisioned them: an organization of fathers and sons who spend time together.

Agrees with Indians In the White Man's Nation, the Indian told the secretary of the St. Louis South Side Young Men's Christian Association, the woman raises the son.

In the Indian Nation, the man raises the son. Just maybe, H. S. Keltner thought, the Indians HAD something . . .

Paul and Daniel still belong to the Guides, the youngest of the Y Indian Programs' groups. Their Tribal meetings are limited strictly to one hour. "Any more, and you lose the kids' attention timespan."

Each meeting opens with a ceremony, during which fathers and sons make a vow

to each other and tell how they've earned "wampum," (usually a quarter), for the week.

The "wampum" is collected for use by the Tribe, to purchase craft materials or special treats.

Fathers Give Advice Fathers and sons work on crafts together, the father always in an advisory capacity. Each little Indian makes his own costume. "We emphasize, 'Dad, don't do it FOR your son; if you do, you haven't gained a thing,'" Strong Bow explains.

What counts is not how pretty the costume looks, but how good the making of it was.

Mark and Bob are Trail Blazers now. There comes a time when boys want to get out of costume, get into running things themselves. In the Trail Blazers the tables are turned, sons running the meetings and serving as officers.

Trail Blazers are organized according to the special interests of the group, and those special interests may range from Space Science to Pioneering Skills.

Still Count on Indians The Indian Guide Program still has Indians as advisors. "The white man spends his time building cities, but the Indian spends his time building men," Joe Friday told Harold Keltner as he led him through the Canadian bush more than 50 years ago.

Today, Indians are still instructing YMCA fathers in how to build men of their sons, and the Y Indian Guides acknowledge their debt to the red man by earmarking part of their "wampum" for donations to Indian activities and charities, such as the

Library Hosts Flag Display

The exhibit of interesting and unusual miniature flags, currently on display in the wall cabinet at the Grosse Pointe Main Library, Kercheval avenue at Fisher road, is a project of Elizabeth Cass Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution: the Chapter's salute to the United States Constitution's 188th birthday.

"Flags That Have Flown Over America" is another in the outstanding sets researched, designed and stitched in miniature by Mrs. Lowell Orebough, former Pointer who now resides in Traverse City.

Mrs. Orebough, once an active member and former regent of Elizabeth Cass, retains an associate membership in the group.

Beginning with the Viking Flag, a raven on a field of white relating to the year 1,000, when Leif Ericson planted it in the soil of the Western Hemisphere, the display ranges from the Royal Standard of Spain, (lions and castles), carried by Columbus in 1492 through Dutch, French, British and Swedish ensigns.

Included, too, is the flag of the Old Russian Empire, which once flew over Alaska and a portion of California. Other flags, such as the Bear Flag of the California Republic and the Pathfinder Flag carried by John Fremont in his explorations beyond the Mississippi, add fragments of purely American history to the exhibit.

Mrs. Marvin Putnam, Elizabeth Cass' Constitution Week chairman, has added family heirlooms and a string of "leather britches," (dried wax beans), to the display case, to show the early preserving method used by the pioneers.
