Thursday, May 4

THE UNITED NATIONS peace mission into Southern Lebanon has to date cost the lives of eight UN soldiers. But the UN Security Council still voted yesterday to send 2,000 more troops into the area to keep peace between the Israelis and Palestine guerrillas. UN Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim told the council that Palestine Liberation Organization chief Yasser Arafat had "assured me of his cooperation in preventing more killings of UN troops by Palestinian forces."

Friday, May 5

WHOLESALE PRICES took another steep climb in the month of April with a 1.3 percent rise, the largest gain in 41 months, the Labor Department reported yesterday. An increase in food cost coupled with a fluke hike for jewelry contributed to the price increase. Government analysts were unanimous in their appraisal that the new dose of inflationary pressure poses a serious problem. Higher wholesale prices are bad news for consumers since they eventually result in higher retail prices.

Saturday, May 6

THE UNEMPLOYMENT rate for April has dropped to its lowest level in three and a half years, the Labor Department reported yesterday. The April rate of six percent, surprised some government economists, who said the job situation has improved faster than they had expected from looking at other economic figures. In Michigan, unemployment fell to 6.6 percent, down sharply from the figures of a year ago. In April 1977, Michigan's rate was 7.3 percent.

Sunday, May 7

THE UNITED STATES has denied an export license to an Ann Arbor firm trying to sell \$2.8 million worth of earth scanning equipment to the People's Republic of China. Citing a possible breach of national security, the government said the sale may affect the future status of six Chinese scientists, who have been living in Ann Arbor since April 11, to learn how to use the equipment. The government, according to cables sent to the company, also is afraid the Chinese will convert the equipment to military use.

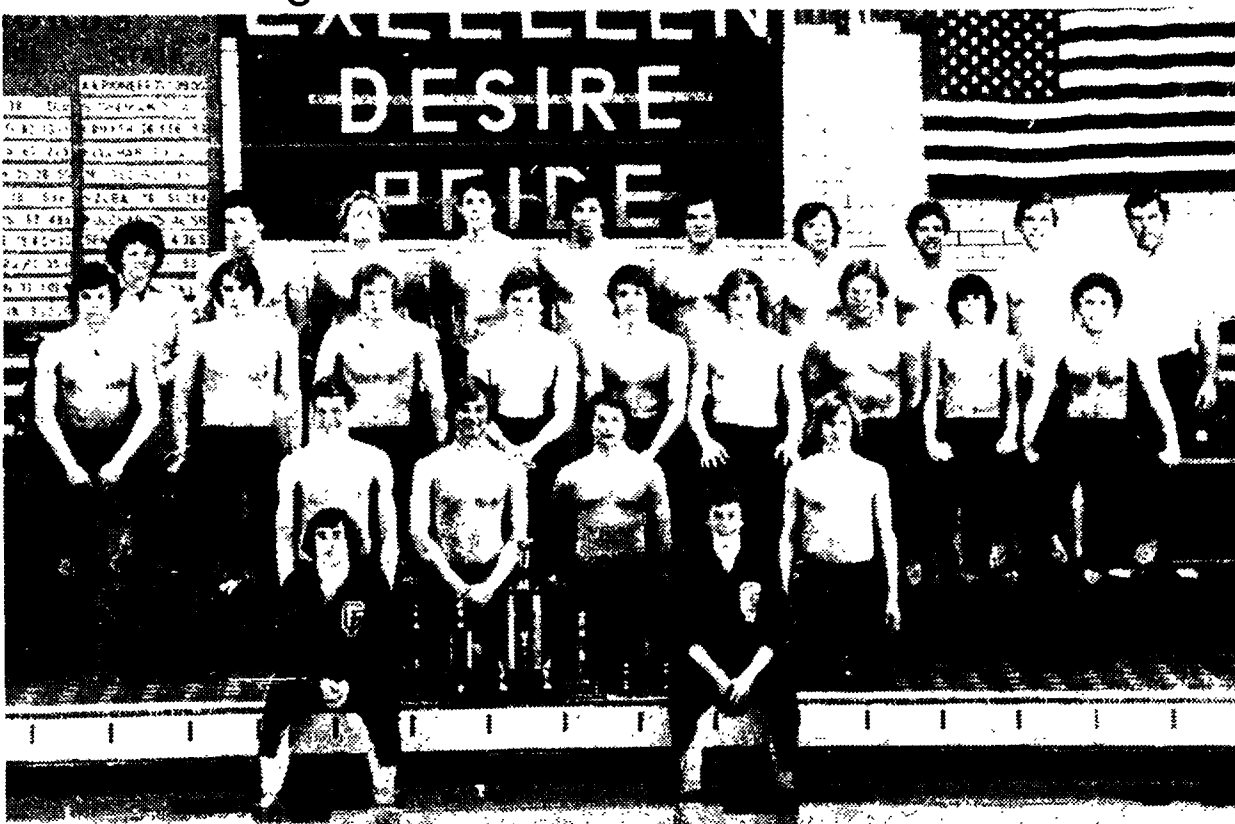
Monday, May 8

THE ORGANIZATION of Petroleum Exporting Countries, (OPEC), will freeze crude oil prices for the rest of 1978, reported OPEC Secretary General Ali Jaidat yesterday. After an informal two-day meeting of OPEC oil ministers in Taif, Saudi Arabia, Jaidat told reporters "an increase was not even discussed." OPEC sources said hardline members of the 13-nation cartel pressed for either a compensatory price hike or a switch in the pricing mechanism to compensate for recent declines in the dollar.

Tuesday, May 9

DAVID BERKOWITZ, 24, of Yonkers, N.Y., pleaded guilty yesterday to all six "Son of Sam" murders in a year long reign of terror with his .44 caliber revolver. The lonely postal worker, who said he was driven by "evil demons," appeared calm through the two hour and 28 minute proceedings as he entered pleas before three different judges. During the proceedings, it surfaced that Berkowitz also may have been responsible for over 2,000 fires in the city since 1974. Sentencing is set for May 22, at which time he faces a maximum of 25 years to life in prison for each murder.

Drive for C License Underway

Alex Bardy of Gabby's Circulates Petitions to Have Question Placed on Primary Ballot

The owner and operator of Gabby's Restaurant, 19299 Mack avenue, who expressed an interest in having a Class C liquor license for his establishment in the past, is currently conducting a petition drive for the issuance of one additional license in The Woods.

With the drive, Alex Bardy, who has owned and operated other restaurants in The Pointe, hopes to have this question placed on the August 8 primary ballot.

To do so, he must have a minimum of 1,500 signatures of registered voters submitted to city offices by the end of the month. Then, the signatures must be verified before the question is placed on the ballot.

Up to Council
If the question, which asks citizens if they favor the adoption of an ordinance amending the city code to provide that the council may approve or signify its approval of the issuance of one additional license within the community, passes, the ordinance is amended automatically, said City Attorney George Catlin.

New Budget Approved in GP Park

Total Needed to Run City Placed at \$3,875,000, Which is \$425,000 Higher Than for Current Year

The Park Council at a public hearing Monday, May 8, gave its approval to the 1978-79 fiscal budget of \$3,875,000, as compared to \$3,450,000 for the 1977-78 year which ends on June 30. The tax levy of 19.50 mills, (\$19.50 per \$1,000 State Equalized Valuation, SEV), remains unchanged.

Although the tax levy remains the same, the Park's state equalized factor has increased from 1.15 in 1977 to 1.23 this year due to the increased selling price of property within the city. The rate needed to meet the levy is 18.70 mills, plus .80 of a mill for debt service, making the total 19.50 mills.

Under the Park City Charter, the tax limitation for operating millage is 20 mills, as compared to the 18.70 mills as reflected in the new budget.

Still Disputed
Allowance has been made for increased costs of wages, supplies, sewage disposal and insurance, which are as follows:

Wages, \$85,000; sewage disposal, \$158,000; pension costs, \$65,000; highway appropriations, \$16,000; insurance, \$37,000; contingency, \$30,000; and supplies and equipment, \$22,000.

The amount of \$43,200 is budgeted for debt service of the 1967 Recreation Improvement Bond Issue, which includes redemption of \$30,000 of outstanding bonds. With the payment to be made during the 1978-79 fiscal year, The Park will have redeemed \$225,000 of the \$570,000 bond issue.

In the new budget is the sum of \$13,000 in property taxes to be paid to Detroit for that portion of Windmill Pointe Park and adjacent parking lots located within that city's limits.

The assessed valuation of this property is still under dispute and in court litigation. The 1976 and 1977 taxes were paid to Detroit under protest. Depending on a Wayne County Circuit Court decision, which is yet to

Massive Capital Improvements Eyed by GPW

Along with Consideration of New Fiscal Year Budget, Which Includes Two Mills for Work Throughout City, Council to View Adoption of 'Decade of Progress'

As a part of its 1978-79 fiscal year budget proposal, the Woods Council will consider adopting a two mill capital improvement levy for the new fiscal year and also a proposed 10-year program, including the 1978-79 year, to be financed by a special tax levy.

The objective in adopting the total program, which will be viewed on Monday, May 15, is to put future councils on record regarding the plan with such councils reviewing the program each fiscal year and having the opportunity to shift listed priorities and the amount of money indicated for city-wide improvements, said City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, who calls the plan a "Decade of Progress."

In relation to the proposal, Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos said at a recent budget meeting that the city should indicate its commitment toward a tax effort in that direction prior to the 15th.

Variety of Work
"If we have an entire program, the people will be more receptive. We should have a commitment for a total program, not just a piece of the program. If a future council decides to throw it out, it will have to answer to the people," he said.

The proposal which runs through fiscal year 1987-88, would raise an estimated \$4,225,258 over 10 years, according to a report prepared by Mr. Petersen. The focus of planned improvements is in the area of relief sewer and water main work, the widening of streets and street repair and/or resurfacing.

It's projected over this period that an average of over \$400,000 will be needed for the improvements, with the proposed two mill levy for 1978-79 raising \$393,858.

For the new fiscal year, \$221,100 is listed for the second phase of northeast relief storm sewer work at Briarcliff drive from Morningside to Van K. Van K. from Perrien place to Blairmoor court and Morningside from Moorland to Woods lane.

(On the first phase of such work, the city is seeking \$200,000 in unencumbered

Schools Improve Ranking in Assessment Program

Statewide test scores compiled by the Michigan department of education show Pointe public schools moved up this year to a number four ranking in the Michigan Educational Assessment Program.

The tests were taken by Michigan's fourth and seventh graders at the beginning of this school year. They measure basic skills in math and reading.

The average scores of Pointe students place the district fourth in the state in all four categories. Last school year, Pointe seventh graders ranked 12th in the state in reading and 12th in math. Fourth graders had placed fourth in reading and

Schools to Boost Sum For Service

But Trustees Will Examine Cost Questions in Future; Board of Managers Meeting Slated Today

With time running out on local budget deadlines, the School Board agreed Monday, May 8, to increase its contribution to The Pointe's nationally acclaimed Youth Service Division, (YSD), to a full one-quarter of its total 1978-79 budget, thus totaly granting the division at least one more year of existence.

But the trustees made it clear Monday they intend to take more time to examine the service with an eye to possible cutbacks and economies before they agree to pay the 30 percent — the share that's proposed for the schools in 1979-80.

At least one of the five participating municipalities had threatened to pull out of the YSD if the Board had not agreed to increase its contribution from the current 20 to 25 percent of the budget.

Cites Concerns
The Shores had argued its contribution of \$13,200.82 was too high, because few Shores youths were actually processed for crimes through the YSD.

The Shores is expected to stay with the YSD, now that the schools have agreed to the 25 percent allocation, or \$40,743.20, next year.

Trustee William Huettelman said he was "concerned that The Shores would take such a narrow view of the situation."

"Juvenile crime finds its way to Lakeshore road, (in The Shores), sooner than some of our smaller, less pretentious neighborhoods," Mr. Huettelman said.

The trustees also expressed apprehension about the YSD's future financing.

"I hope we're not saying here that we're just giving the YSD one more year," Robert Warner said. He urged the division's board of managers, (composed of five city managers and one School Board representative), to de-

Center Drive Needs \$30,000

(Continued from Page 1) drain funds of the municipality from Wayne County for Briarcliff drive, Milk River-Morningside.)

Other Funds Eyed
 Meanwhile, \$172,758 is listed for street resurfacing and/or repair of Emory court, Clairview court, Berns court, Young lane and Ida lane.

In the overall 10-year proposal to be financed by a special tax levy, \$473,600 worth of work is viewed for 1979-80. This includes the replacement and lowering of sewers, Brys drive from Goethe to Marter, and Hawthorne from Marter to the east city limits.

Advantages Cited
 Meanwhile, in 1982-83, for example, a total of \$438,300 is proposed for the connection of water main dead-ends and for the replacement and lowering of sewers.

While officials are well aware that such cost estimates will change over the 10-year period, the advantages of a special tax levy as discussed during budget hearings were cited.

Mr. Petersen felt now was a good time to propose such a program because the city isn't near its 20 mill tax levy limit. (A total of 13.77 mills, including the two mill capital improvement levy, is proposed for 1978-79.)

Federal Revenue Sharing funds also are apt to increase on a fiscal year basis because the city's tax effort would be greater.

Other Improvements
 At the same time, Mr. Petersen noted if the city went the bond issue route for the 10-year program, the taxpayer would have an additional two mills in debt service for 25 years.

GPW GRANTS USE OF PARK
 The Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, May 1, unanimously granted the Grosse Pointe Co-operative Nursery School the use of the Lake Front Park for a picnic on June 2.

For 1978-79, the city also is planning \$633,640 in other capital improvements from other funds, (i.e., excluding the two-mill levy).

For example, officials hope for Community Development Block Grant monies for southwest relief storm sewer work in the area of the Seven-Mack parking lot and Raymond, Linville and Bournemouth, for the widening of Lochmoor boulevard, Mack to the west city limits, and for the ramping of sidewalks west of Mack, Bournemouth to Huntington.

Other funds scheduled to be tapped for projects in 1978-79 include the water-sewer enterprise fund, the municipal improvement fund and the highway fund.

(Continued from Page 1) develop a "reasonable level of support that will insure the division's long-term stability."

Administrator Chester E. Petersen and Det. Lt. Jack Patterson. The Woods is the managing municipality of the YSD.

Mr. Petersen told the Board the YSD has won national acclaim for its work with young criminals. He said the four officers, two of whom work out of each high school, spend about 41 percent of their time on school-related problems or supervising school functions. The remainder of their time is spent on regular, police duties.

Board President John Bruce agreed.

"We all share concern that our action does not sound the death knell of the YSD, but we all have a responsibility to our constituents to take a long hard look at the YSD, the service it provides, the needs it fills, and to do it when we have the time to examine these things, without budgets staring us in the face," Mr. Bruce said.

Meeting Called
 This year, the division's budget will jump to \$162,973, an eight percent increase over this year's expenditure of \$150,927.

A survey of school administrators conducted by Superintendent Dr. William Coats showed the YSD provides several "critical" services to high schools in The Pointe, such as investigation of complaints on campus, prevention and prosecution of student drug abuse and providing security for school functions.

The Board took its vote Monday, after hearing a presentation from Woods City

"However, it should be noted that much of the (YSD's) activity involves the type of routine police work which should be provided by the respective police department regardless of the degree of our financial support of the program," Dr. Coats said.

(Continued from Page 1) come. The Park may or may not be reimbursed for part or all of the taxes already paid.

Mr. Petersen called a meeting of the YSD board of managers for Thursday, May 11, in The Woods municipal offices, 20025 Mack avenue, at 10 a.m. at which time the School Board's action will be discussed.

CETA Plan Helps
 Reflected in the 1978-79 fiscal budget is the federally financed Comprehensive Employment Training Act, (CETA), adopted by The Park to relieve unemployment in the city.

Only residents of The Park are eligible to participate in this program, provided they can prove that they have been unemployed for a minimum of 15 weeks, as required by regulations set by the federal government.

The city has nine persons employed under Title VI and pays the employees from city coffers. The Park, in turn, is reimbursed through the CETA program. Reimbursement from this source for 1978-79 is estimated at \$60,000.

The SEV is determined each year by the State Board of Equalization, (SBE), and is based on market values obtained in each municipality.

The Park completed a re-assessment program which brought 1972 assessments up to the SEV, which gave a factor of 1.00. This factor was increased by four percent in 1975, five percent in 1976 and six percent in 1977. The increase for 1978 is seven percent, which raised the factor to 1.23, from last year's 1.15, for a total SEV of about \$103,000,000.

This hikes the tax levy to approximately \$2,000,000 or about \$114,000 more than the current year.

Help Pay Cost
 The following is a breakdown of the new fiscal year budget, which begins July 1:

Administration and General — \$427,300; Public Safety, (police and fire departments) — \$1,256,000; Parks and Recreation — \$167,000; Public Works — \$1,353,700; Employee Pension and Insurance — \$460,000; Contingency — \$30,000; Capital Improvement Appropriation — \$40,000; Highway Fund Appropriation — \$81,000; and CETA — \$60,000.

Revenues are expected to be raised from these sources: Property Tax — \$2,000,000; Miscellaneous Revenue — \$1,743,500; Appropriation of Surplus — \$73,500; and Federal Revenue Sharing — \$58,000.

The latter amount, it was pointed out, will be used to help partially pay the cost of street lighting. This \$58,000 is included in the Public Works budget.

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Juvenile Pair Arson Suspects

Two 15-year-old Park boys, reported to have been in the Charles Helin Mansion, in Windmill Pointe drive a day before the March 18 fire which destroyed the building and resulted in the death of a City firefighter, are possible arson suspects, according to information released by Park Police Chief Henry O. Coonce on Monday, May 8.

The chief said the pair are specifically charged with entering an occupied dwelling without permission and have been filed against with Wayne County Juvenile Court authorities. There is no definite proof that the teenagers are connected with setting the fire, but they are being questioned in the matter. Chief Coonce emphasized.

Park Fire Chief Phillip Costa said that the fire, which completely destroyed the building and its contents, was definitely established as arson by State Police of the Fire Marshal's Office in Lansing and by Lt. James Palmer of the Park Fire Department, who aided in the investigation.

City Firefighter Richard Tucker, 45, died of internal injuries in Bon Secours Hospital after a chimney collapsed and crashed through an open doorway, knocking down an exterior wall and showering him with building stones. He was the first firefighter in City history to die in the line of duty.

City and Farms firemen and equipment aided The Park department in battling the flames.

Park Firefighter Robert Nemens was overcome by smoke and fatigue and Park Police Officer Eugene Magnee suffered arm and chest injuries at the scene.

Loss of the building was said to be \$2.5 million, and to its contents, including many valuable antiques, cameras and works of art, \$1 million.

The mansion was owned by Mr. Helin, who made millions manufacturing fishing lures. He was visiting China at the time the fire destroyed his home.

The occasion was the 100th anniversary of University Liggett School, which drew alumni from across the country to a three-day celebration in The Pointe.

Highlight of the weekend was an "Evening with Julie

Harris" which included a private showing of the play at the Punch and Judy Theater Saturday, May 6, followed by a reception for the star.

The slightly-built actress was literally mobbed with greetings from old friends, former classmates and autograph seekers after her performance — all of which she shrugged off with an exhausted smile.

"It all goes so fast, there're so many old friends to see in such a short time," she said. "But I really do enjoy coming back. It was at this school that I was introduced to the theater. So many things began for me here."

Miss Harris was graduated in 1941 from Grosse Pointe Country Day, one of University Liggett's antecedent schools.

Her "beginning" was a part in Country Day's production of "The Juggler of Notre Dame," her stage debut at age 14. On Broadway she first appeared in 1945 as Atlanta in "It's a Gift."

National acclaim came first in 1950 when Miss Harris received both the New York Drama Critics Circle and Donaldson Awards for her portrayal of a lonely 12-year-

old in "The Member of The Wedding."

Since then, she's captured four Tony Awards and two Emmys for an amazing variety of roles on Broadway.

Miss Harris and her journalist husband Walter Carroll now live in Arlington, Va. Coming up for the actress is the role of Mrs. Howard Taft in "Upstairs at The White House" in June.

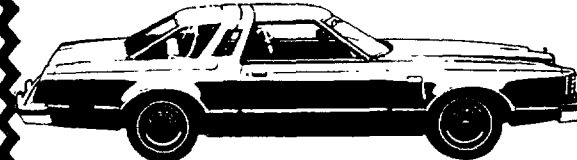
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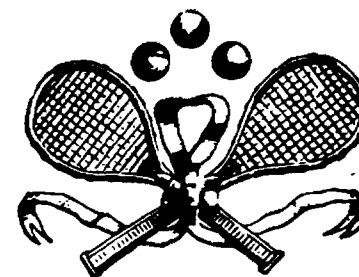

(Continued from Page 1) mastered 75 percent or more of the objectives in reading this year. In the previous year, only 79.8 percent mastered the reading.

In the fourth grade math category, this year's 94 percent mastery level represents a slight decline from last year's 95.6 level. Mr. McCaig said this was probably due to the fact that the state test includes questions on metrics, which were not introduced in The Pointe elementary curriculum until after the tests were taken this year.

Seventh graders showed improvements in both math and reading. Mastery of reading jumped significantly, from 75 percent to 88.4 this year and math increased from 72.7 to 76.6 over the two-year span.

Mr. McCaig said the state assessment test "is a good one," developed mostly by state educators and designed to test basic life skills.

"But it's not a full-range test. It cannot be used to evaluate the quality of the school system because it says nothing about social science, art and music, etc. It doesn't come close to touching on

everything we cover in the elementary schools," Mr. McCaig said.

With the exception of three to five question dealing with metrics, he said all test areas are included in the school system's curriculum.

The students were not prepared or coached for the state tests as they were for the more recent Metropolitan Achievement Tests administered in elementary schools this spring, Mr. McCaig noted.

Prior to taking the Metropolitan tests, students were given sample test questions to practice on.

But the schools did try out an experimental preparation program of a slightly different nature at one school — Brownell — before the state tests were administered last fall. Mr. McCaig reports there was a more marked increase in the scores at that school.

"Principals were urged to examine the test data from last year and compare them to the overall school system and state levels to determine probable areas of weakness," Mr. McCaig explained. "Early reviews were to be concentrated on those weak areas, but they did not use sample questions from the actual tests."

The administration hopes to see more schools adopt a similar preparation program next year, Mr. McCaig said.

The administrator noted that The Pointe's ranking had improved at a time when achievement levels across the state are improving.

"We have not only kept up with the trend, but increased our relative standing as well," he said.

"We've got good students, parents who value the importance of education, excellent teachers and sound support systems — everything you need to have a good school system."

"We're moving ahead with more coordination and focus on the basics and the teachers have cooperated extremely well," he said.

In order to sustain life, their blood must be artificially "cleansed" of impurities a minimum of three times a week. Nothing short of a kidney transplant can prevent the necessity of such dialysis.

In Saint John's service area, approximately 70 percent of patients suffering from renal failure select chronic and self-dialysis, both done only in a health facility.

A net increase of 25-30 renal dialysis patients is expected annually in the service area due to population changes. Currently, only one out of 10 hospitals in this area offers any type of chronic dialysis service, Saint John reports.

The hospital is planning a major chronic maintenance and home dialysis training facility for out-patient treatment which will be located in the new Clinical Office Building.

With this new program, Saint John will become the northeastern metropolitan area center for kidney dialysis, furthering its development as a Regional Health Care Facility, officials add.

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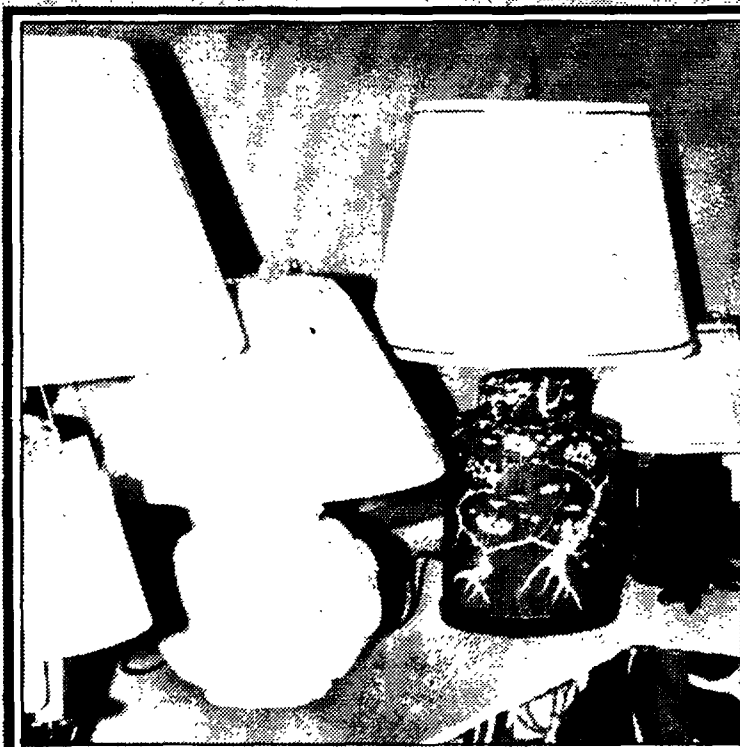

Gabby's Seeks Class C License

(Continued from Page 1) issue one additional document, and, if so, to whom. It's possible, pending further developments, that a hearing, similar to the one held this January when the council approved the issuance of a C license to Grosse Pointe Woods Recreation, could be held.

If the council issues one additional license, which would make five Class C licenses in the community, (the city could have up to 15 pending council approval), the state Liquor Control Commission also would have to give its okay.

Mr. Bardy, who's been at the restaurant for three years including some time as a consultant when the establishment was known as Landmark, bought the business in May 1976.

Faced with a "tremendous overhead," Mr. Bardy cited the rising cost of utilities "which have been monumental in the last two to three years."

Change in Quality
At the same time, Mr. Bardy noted that the new minimum wage "has been a real burden," increasing his payroll by some \$450 per week and well over \$20,000 per year. He indicated he employs around 60 people.

With the growing costs of operating the establishment, Mr. Bardy feels a Class C license will help him toward

maintaining the same "high standards of quality and service," along with making additional improvements to the property without considering major increases in food prices.

When asked if he foresees any problems if his establishment is granted a license, e.g., citizen complaints when the restaurant was known as Blazo's, Mr. Bardy cited the change in the quality of the customers over the last three years.

"This place is no longer a hangout for teenage kids," he said. Rather, since the Blazo days, an attempt has been made to alter the overall picture by setting the business up as a family-oriented restaurant.

Will Redecorate
"The dinner business is the key to the operation. People want to have a cocktail with their meals," stated Mr. Bardy.

"Gabby's will continue to be a family-oriented restaurant. There will be no cocktail lounge, (plans call for a service bar), and it will be a well lit restaurant, (as against the dim atmosphere of most cocktail lounges), catering to the family trade."

Saying he has personally received favorable word of mouth on the drive, Mr. Bardy indicated if he's successful in obtaining a C license, he plans to redecorate the interior of the building including new carpeting and furniture.

He also cited his banquet facilities.

While born in Detroit, Mr. Bardy has been a part of The Pointe area for most of his life. A graduate of South High School in 1948, he operated the Plantation Restaurant in Mack avenue in The Woods, the Hawthorne House in Kercheval avenue in The Farms and the Jacobson's St. Clair Room in Kercheval avenue in The City.

"One think I've found in talking to people is that they remember the Hawthorne House," said Mr. Bardy, who

owned it from 1956 to 1962. In his prepared material for presentation to the council this January during the special hearing, Mr. Bardy said that Gabby's is a one purpose building.

"In the past 10 years there have been several unsuccessful operations which resulted in failure and bankruptcy, and Gabby's has been able to operate presently at a break-even point but with the increased cost of operation in the immediate future, the Class C license is desperately needed," he said.

Noting that Gabby's has been "so much a part of the community, (e.g., involved in the co-op program with the high schools in the area) that its continued operation is a necessity," Mr. Eardy indicated that the fixed operating cost for Gabby's fiscal year ending this April 30 shows rent, \$54,624, taxes, \$16,562.95, and insurance, \$13,969.

Totaling \$85,155.95, he said an additional cost of approximately \$15,000 a year is needed "to maintain the award-winning appearance of Gabby's and its landscaping."

He also stated that the anticipated value of the building and property is over \$518,000.

Board Fires Gym Teacher

The School Board voted unanimously, May 1, to terminate the employment of an 18-year veteran of its teaching staff, Elmer L. Lepp, a physical education instructor at Poupard Elementary School.

The tenure charges were filed against Mr. Lepp on February 28 by Assistant Superintendent for Instruction Dr. Joseph Spagnoli and Poupard Principal Peter Wharton.

The school trustees heard several hours of public testimony from school administrators, a parent and Mr. Lepp before deciding the case. Representing the school administration in the proceedings was attorney Douglas West, while Michigan Education Ass'n. staff members Richard Lang and Patrick Laughlin represented Mr. Lepp.

The association has not yet determined whether or not it will appeal the Board's ruling to the Michigan Tenure Commission, Mr. Laughlin said.

The charges included gross inefficiency in performance of classroom duties and insubordination.

After the vote was taken Monday, Board President John Bruce noted that "it was a very hard decision for us to make."

"It was one of the most difficult things the Board of Education has had to face. We certainly have some respect for the time Mr. Lepp has spent in our school system," Mr. Bruce said.

Trustee Robert Warner was absent from the meeting and did not vote on the tenure charge.

The first step is having the council place the question on the August 8 primary ballot. Then the question is will the voters answer in the affirmative?

If the question receives approval, many other hurdles will have to be met including the formation of a building authority, necessary feasibility studies, public hearings, et al.

During the discussion, it was agreed that the proposition should make it clear the proposed complex would be on land furnished by the city and funded by revenue bonds operated by the building authority, i.e., the city.

Could Tie Hands

It would be an asset of the city, it was said, owned by the city through a building authority, formed by the council, which could have a controlling interest.

A six-story, 125- to 150-unit operation was briefly eyed at this time but this is far from a fixed factor as yet.

Mr. Cueter, the council representative to the Senior Citizens Commission, in viewing the overall matter of taxes indicated that such a project could be a liability. However, Mr. Petersen noted this depended on whether the full faith of the city is pledged on the revenue bonds or if the issue stands alone.

Mr. Catlin also cited the difference in interest rates if the issue is on its own or if the city guarantees it.

Concerned over emphasizing there will be no additional taxes to residents if the plan becomes a reality, one citizen asked if the ballot proposition can indicate this.

Mr. Catlin said it cannot, while noting such a stipulation could tie the hands of the building authority. He suggested, however, the intention should be made clear it would not cost additional tax dollars.

Plan Campaign

On costs such as police-fire protection, trash pickup, et al., Mr. Catlin said these could be services offered by the city to the citizens with the building authority reimbursing the city for costs and passing such costs into the

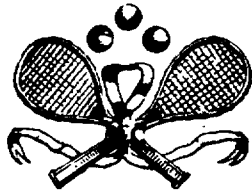

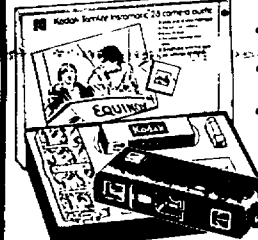

GPW Approves Hike in Rates

An ordinance amending the city code to provide a new schedule of fees for rates to be charged for water service was unanimously approved by the Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, May 1.

Effective July 1, an increase of \$2.40 per thousand cubic feet of sewer and water consumption will transpire, raising the present rate from \$7.50 per thousand cubic feet to \$9.90.

This will increase the minimum bill, (1,500 cubic feet), from \$11.25 to \$14.85 over a three-month period, or a \$1.20 per month hike.

A main reason for the hike include increases by the Wayne County Board of Public Works, operator of the Northeast District System, which raised its sewer rate for sewage disposal and its rate for excess flow, effective July 1.

The Wayne County Board of Public Works also increased the operations and maintenance rate on January 1.

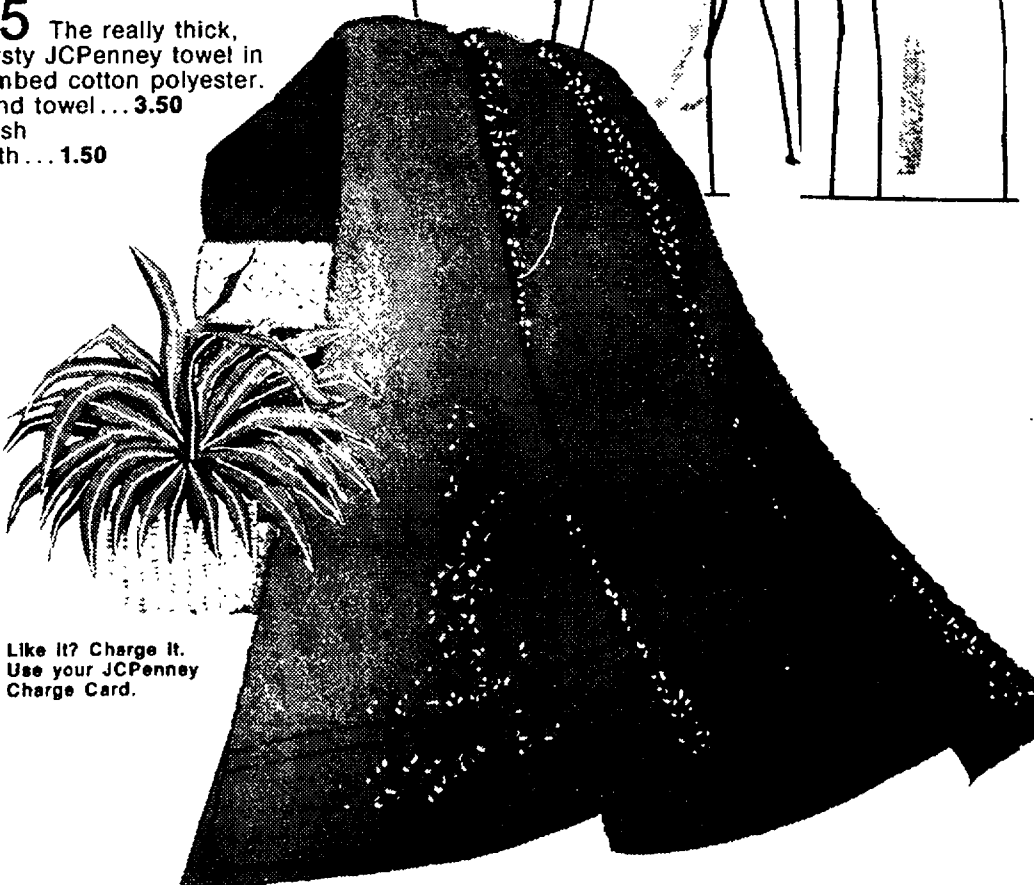

Each community, meanwhile, will be responsible for transportation and other meals. However, these costs are reimbursable from community development administration funds.

The council had difficulty in selecting members to attend because of other conflicts so attendance was left wide open, although Administrative Aide Gerard E. McNamara, because of his involvement with the block grant program, was given a nod by the solons.

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Hospitals Approve Pact Toward Containing Costs

The presidents and chief executive officers of Saint John Hospital, Detroit, and Saint Joseph Hospital, Mount Clemens, announced last week that their institutions have reached a formal agreement which they believe will have a major impact on the development of health services for northeastern Wayne, Macomb and St. Clair Counties.

This announcement was made by James T. Farley, head of Saint John, and Sister Anna Suttman, head of Saint Joseph.

This agreement shall lead to a planned cost effective development of the health services provided by both health care facilities today and in the future.

The pact was promoted by the members of the religious communities of both hospitals and approved by both boards of trustees.

The Sisters of Saint Joseph, who sponsor Saint John Hospital, and the Sisters of Charity of Cincinnati, who sponsor Saint Joseph Hospital, have a history of encouraging cooperative planning wherever their Sisters are located.

This "Memorandum of Understanding" pledges both hospitals to coordinate hospital services, maintain and increase their efficiency, ensure economical health care

for their patients and be agents for study and responsible representation regarding medical and moral problems as they affect the delivery of health care.

Saint John is a 550-bed hospital located on Detroit's eastside. Saint Joseph Hospital-East is a 168-bed facility located in Mount Clemens, and Saint Joseph Hospital-West is a 300-bed facility located in Clinton Township.

This agreement is in keeping with recent guidelines proposed for health care planning by the Greater Detroit Area Hospital Council, Inc.

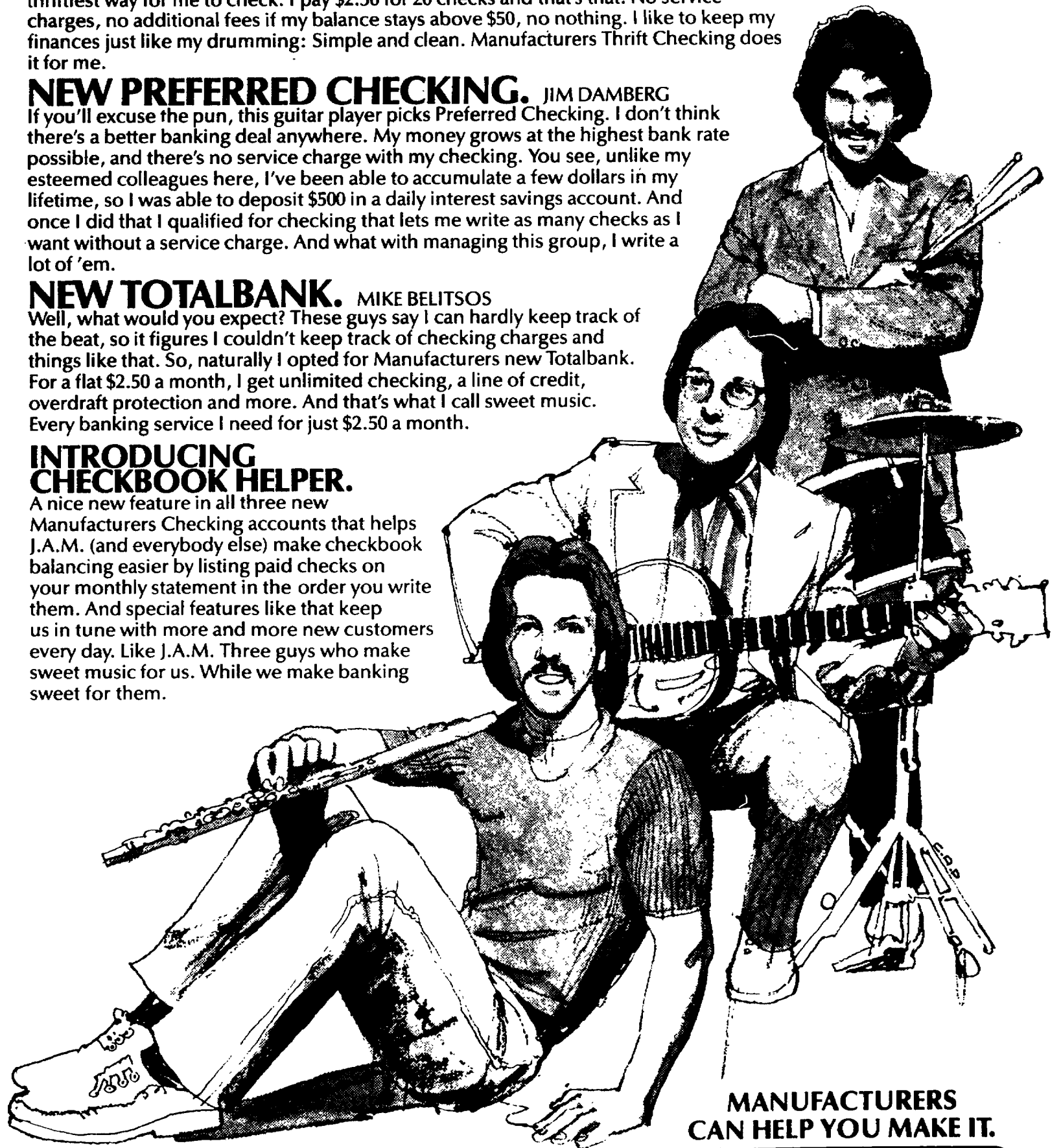
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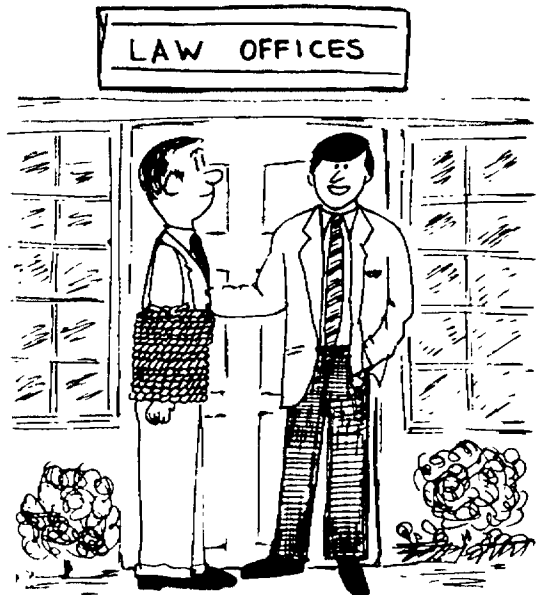
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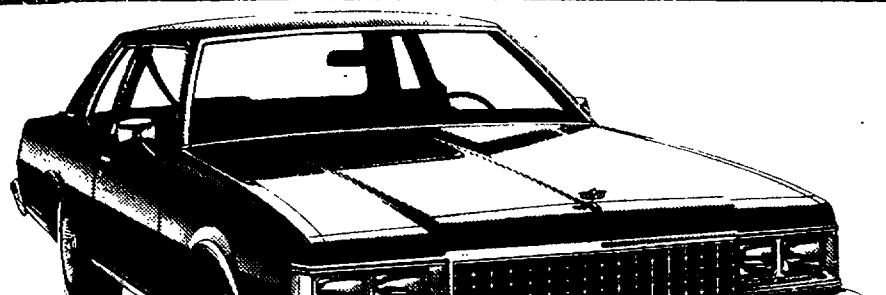
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Pair Arrested with Weapons

Man to Stand Trial for B-E

Nathan Moore of Dike street, Detroit, was bound over for trial in Wayne County Circuit Court, scheduled for Thursday, May 18, following an examination before Park Municipal Judge Beverly Grobbel on Friday, May 5.

Moore's bond of \$20,000, two sureties, was continued and he was remanded to the custody of the Wayne County Sheriff's Department until trial date.

Moore is accused in two warrants, the burglary of a Park residence on Thursday, April 27, and the commission of a felony with a gun. The latter charge, on conviction of the felony, carries an automatic two years in prison, no parole, plus whatever sentence is imposed by the trial judge.

The accused man was ar-

rested by Park police after a woman, whose name was not given, called authorities and stated that a burglar confronted her in her house a few minutes after she had returned from driving her children to school.

She said she entered her home and heard a noise on the second floor and called out to find out who was there. The burglar, later identified as Moore, appeared at the top of the stairs and pointed a gun at her, telling her to remain where she was and not to scream.

The woman fled to the front door and called police from a neighbor's house. All units were dispatched to the 1200 block of Balfour, and a search was made of the area. Several police officers spotted the suspect about a block away.

Officer Barry Oleksyk gave chase on foot and pursued the suspect across a front yard on Buckingham and over a fence and apprehended him in the rear yard. The policeman approached him with his service revolver drawn and the man dropped a shopping bag he was carrying and surrendered.

At The Park station, a search of the bag brought out the gun belonging to the suspect. The bag also contained several items of jewelry, a small sum of cash and a wallet, all taken from the woman's house.

The woman told Park police that she observed the same man walking on Balfour near her house as she was taking her children to school. Moore is believed to have committed a holdup in Detroit a short time before The Park burglary and is wanted by Detroit police for investigation and questioning in this matter.

Mayor James H. Dingeman presided at the meeting. Councilwoman Waugaman was excused from attending the meeting.

The Minutes of the Regular Meeting which was held on April 17, 1978 were accepted as submitted. The Minutes of the Budget Study Meeting which was held on April 24, 1978, were accepted as submitted.

The Council granted the appeal of Mr. Edward Nowicki of LaBelle Road, from the determination of the Inspector regarding the portion of the inspection of his property pursuant to the provisions of the City's Property Maintenance Code pertaining to the paved driveway, thereby waiving the requirement that certain designated driveway slabs be replaced.

The Council approved the low bid of the Paul G. Thoen Company in the total amount of \$6,496.27, for the construction of a "T" turn-around at Belanger Avenue and the Mack Avenue alley.

The Council approved the low bid of the S & L Landscaping Company in the total amount of \$1,897.40 for the necessary landscape repairs at the sites of water main repairs throughout the City. The Council approved the low bid of the Vanopdenbosch Construction Company in the total amount of \$3,372.75, for the necessary cement repairs at the sites of water main repairs throughout the City.

The Council acknowledged the 25th Anniversary of the Grosse Pointe Farms City Babe Ruth League and offered its congratulations and commendations to the League for its fine service to the youth of the two communities.

The Council discussed the 1978-79 General Fund Budget and announced that the Public Hearing will be held to consider a Budget based on 17.95 mills.

Therefore, I would like to use this column to "add my congratulations to a sampling of our students whose excellence in many activities has recently been recognized. Some examples follow.

The issue of homeowner and automobile insurance availability is continuing to be a hot issue.

A former bill, HB 5196, as amended, drew such fire that the sponsor, Rep. George Cushingberry of Detroit, put in a new bill with the same basic provisions as the previous amended one.

The new bill is HB 6322 and within minutes of its introduction it was reported out of committee.

The bill does at least two things which make me oppose it. It requires companies to accept nearly all applicants, then allowing companies to "cede" policies to a pool mechanism called an insurance facility.

And it makes all companies write at the same rate for a given classification throughout all of Wayne County.

Liggett Sets Summer Camp

University Liggett School, (ULS), 1045 Cook road, will again open a day camp to all area residents Monday through Friday June 19 through July 28. Three week sessions, June 19 through July 7 and July 10 through July 28, also are available.

University Liggett day camp is held on the 43-acre Main Campus. Facilities include two gymnasiums, eight tennis courts, several baseball diamonds, track facilities, two heated outdoor swimming pools and a modern bath house.

Full-day campers may register for a minimum three-week program or the full six-week camp season. The full-day camp counselor/camper ratio is one to 10.

Activities offered include swimming, tennis, archery, gymnastics, trampoline, arts and crafts, golf, individual and team activities, nature studies, canoeing, sailing, campcraft, field trips and overnight camping.

Cinema League To View Egypt

The Grosse Pointe Cinema League will present "Let's Go to Egypt!" a super-8mm movie by Pierre and Elfrida Palminteri, when it meets in the War Memorial's Fries Auditorium, 32 Lakeshore road, on Monday, May 15, at 8 p.m. The film was photographed in November and covers a 1,000 mile journey with an Egyptologist, up the River Nile.

Featured are some of Egypt's greatest temples, such as Kom Ombo, where crocodiles were worshiped and adorned with jewels, and the temple of Khnum, partly buried under the city of Esna, which saw the worship of fish.

There are scenes of colossal beauty in the Temple of Karnak, with its impressive avenue of rams, which in ancient times extended to Luxor, and dramatic closeups of wall carvings at the temple of the cow-goddess Hathor at Dendera, built during the Ptolemy period of Queen Cleopatra and the Romans.

The site of Egypt's 5,000-year-old former capital city of Memphis, with its alabaster sphinx, and the world's oldest stone monument, King Djoser's step pyramid at Sakkara, are visited.

Of special interest are scenes photographed in the Valley of Queens and the Valley of Kings, where the celebrated tomb of Egypt's boy king Tutankhamun is located.

The Cairo portion of the movie features a visit to the lovely mosques of Mohammed Ali and Sultan Hassan, and to the famous Egyptian Museum, which still contains almost 3,000 items discovered in King Tutankhamun's tomb, which are not on tour currently in the United States.

The camera focuses on the city of Aswan and the great monuments at Abus Simbel, rescued from the waters of the Nile when Lake Nasser was created.

There also are delightful sailings on ancient feluccas past the strange rock forms of Elephantine Island and the lovely botanical gardens at Kitchener Island.

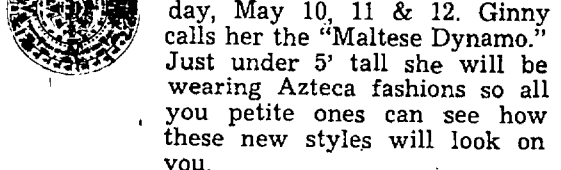

(Editor's Note: The following letter, a copy of which was sent to the NEWS, was sent to all the Pointe mayors with copies to city managers, and also to School Board President John Bruce and Superintendent of Schools Dr. William Coats. It is dated Thursday, May 4.)

The members of the League of Women Voters of Grosse Pointe urge the city administrators of the Grosse Pointes to continue to support the Youth Service Division, (YSD).

We hope that the number of YSD officers will not be reduced. The loss of personnel will only delay the handling of problems—not solve any problems.

We think the early peaking and early tapering off of the drug problem in Grosse Pointe was largely due to education. The YSD helped not only the schools, but also the adult community to combat the drug problems that were created.

While the drug problem is better, we do have "B & E's" and vandalism. These know no city boundaries, from one Pointe to another.

The YSD has helped the young people in the communities to have a better understanding of the police. They have taught the young about their rights and where their rights end, about their responsibilities to the community, and about the varieties of ways to seek help to solve their own problems.

For instance, we do have child abuse. We do have alcoholic parents. The youngsters know they can't successfully "run away" to Detroit—they will be found. So they seek help instead.

We are aware of the ever increasing budgets within city government. However, the League of Women Voters of Grosse Pointe feels the YSD is the responsibility of the entire community, not just the school system. We believe any cut in the YSD budget would be false economizing that the community will regret in the years to come.

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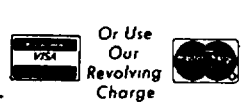

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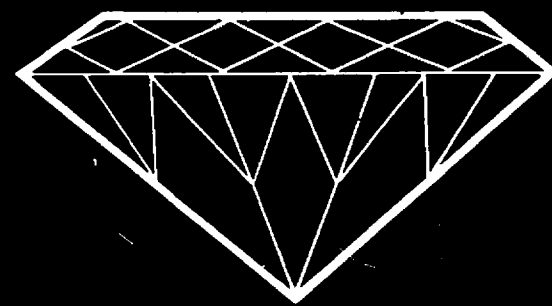
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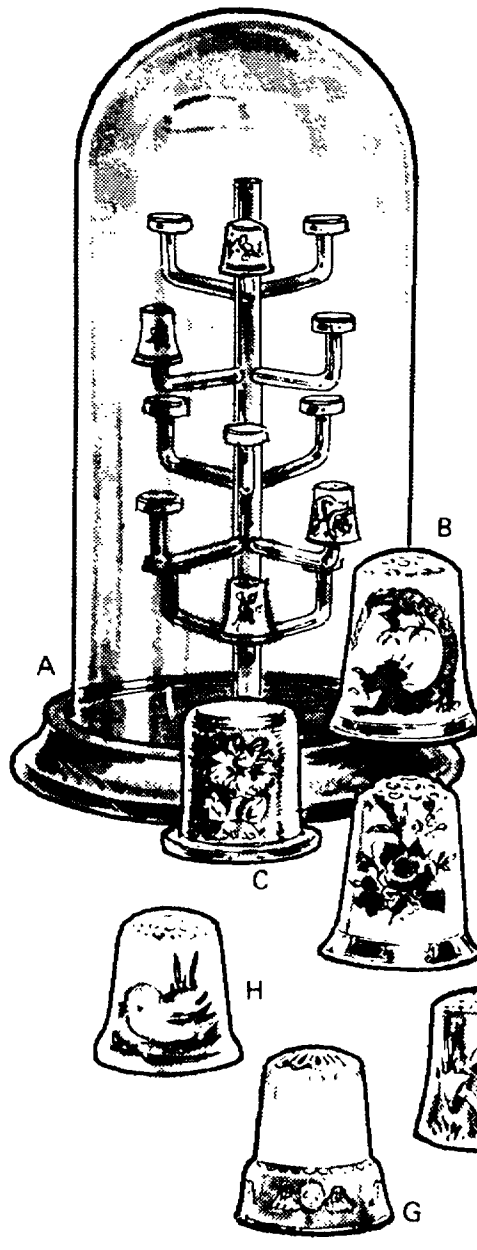

If you haven't been using the recommended last date of sale marked on many food packages, you may be overlooking a valuable shopping tool. In the past, shoppers had no choice but to gamble on the freshness of prepackaged perishable products.

Now, however, the odds that these foods will be fresh are in the consumer's favor. A new Michigan regulation requires that prepackaged meat, fish, seafood, poultry, eggs, bakery products and other perishable foods not be sold without a recommended last date of sale marked clearly and conspicuously on the package.

Certain perishable products are exempt from the new regulation. These include fresh fruits and vegetables, frozen foods and smoked fish.

How does this recommended last date of sale help food shoppers? According to Michigan State University food marketing specialist Mary Zehner, the date is to help shoppers determine the freshness of products.

"But these dates are a guide, not an assurance of freshness," she says. "If products are not properly handled through the marketing channels or by the consumer, they may lose quality and even spoil before the date on the package."

Zehner warns that a product will remain fresh until the last day of sale only if the package is unopened.

"Once a perishable product is opened, it will not stay fresh any longer than usual. If a package of luncheon meat is opened February 1, for example, and the recommended last date of sale is marked February 14, don't assume it will remain fresh until February 14."

It would be a tremendous waste of food and dollars to prohibit retailers from selling products after the recommended last day of sale, so retailers may sell the foods — as long as they are still wholesome and clearly identified by the retailer as products offered for sale after the recommended date has passed.

Consumers may be able to get price breaks when food stores offer special prices on products approaching or past the last date of sale. But before taking advantage of such specials, shoppers should first consider when they plan to use the products.

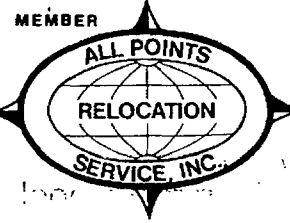
