Thursday, November 9 REPUBLICANS MAD'E modest gains in the congressional elections held Tuesday, but the makeup of both houses remains overwhelmingly Democratic. Some 20 freshmen will join the Senate, while about 71 new members will serve in the House. In many cases, younger, more modern legislators will replace the old guard, particularly in the South. Specifically, Republicans picked up three seats in the Senate, 12 in the House and six in the governors' races.

The President apparently discussed with the leaders a new formula for the treaty which had been worked out earlier in the day with representatives of both countries and Secretary of State Cyrus Vance, Mr. Vance then presented his plan to Mr. Begin at a two-hour meeting in New York, following which the Israeli commented, "We held a very serious discus-

The often-delayed elementary school lunch program will finally begin in Pointe public schools on Monday, No-

serve the lunches was not delivered by vendors on schedule, according to Ben Zenn, director of support services.

All the necessary equipment is in, Mr. Zenn said, and the program should start off without a hitch next week.

To Mail Menus Meals for elementary students will alternate between hot and cold entrees and will cost 70 cents each.

To discourage cash sales which slow down serving lines, the schools will sell five-meal tickets for \$3.50.

The tickets may be used at any time during the semester and parents are under no obligation to notify the school of where their children will eat on a given day.

Lunch programs have been operating since September at middle and high school levels in The Pointe. All food services in the school system are now being handled by ARA Food Services, one of the largest firms of its kind, based in Philadelphia,

Absentee **Vote Count**

Tired Officials Review Results Wherein Each Community Reports over 60 Percent Total Response

Absentee voting has grown steadily since laws were liberalized several lot during the Tuesday, November 7, general elec-tion, it reached its peak in The Pointe.

An estimated one of three citizens who voted made their choice via the absentee ballot route, with all the municipalities reporting fine voter turnouts as no community was lower than 60 per-

cent. And, as in the past, The Pointe went heavily Republican with both re-elected Gov. William G. Milliken and defeated Sen. Robert Griffin, for instance, winning handily in each community.

Farms Leads Way The Farms led all the Pointes in total percentage of citizens voting. (71 percent), and those voting via absentee ballots, (40 per-

cent). City Clerk Richard G. Solak said the 2.385 absentee voters eclipsed the previous record of the 1976 election by about 50 percent. He noted this year's count represented about 40 percent of the total vote, or around 30 percent of all Farms registered voters.

Mr. Solak said the number of absentee ballots has been increasing steadily over the years because of relaxed state requirements, including age, which has gone from 72 to 60 years.

Extra manpower and the cost of postage for the ballots raised the price of the election, but officials say firm figures are not yet available.

"It's expensive, but it's a cost well spent if you can get people to vote," noted Mr. Kressbach, while Woods City Administrator Chester E. Petersen said, "The processing of absentee ballots cost us more than the rest of the election.'

For his part, Shores Village Superintendent Thomas K Jefferis said. "I've never had anything like it before" in reviewing the work involved for this election. He added Village personnel did nothing else except give out absentee ballots for three weeks prior to the election.

"It's an arduous, time-consuming job," he noted, obviously reflecting the feelings of his municipal colleagues.

The only local issues and/ or candidates were in The Woods and Grosse Pointe Township.

Voters barely approved a tax collection fee referendary question in The Woods by a 4,664 to 4,502 margin This amendment to the city charter provides an additional tax collection fee of one-half of one percent per month beginning October 1 of each year on delinquent

In Grosse Pointe Township, citizens considered an unopposed slate of candidates for various offices. Gerald C. Schroeder received 1,344 votes for supervisor. Mr. Jefferis, 1,358, for clerk, Walter R. Frizzell, 1,346, for

Democrat John Kelly, meanwhile, won election to the state senate in the First District, (Park, City, Farms and Shores), by an unofficial 25,593 to 17,238 margin over his Republican challenger, Joseph L. Posch Jr. However, in the four aforementioned municipalities, Mr.

Posch won The Pointe vote.

In the Second District senate race. Democrat John Hertel defeated Republican Donald LaRue, 48,285 to 9,524, in unofficial results. In the section of the district located in The Woods, Sen. Hertel garnered 1,026 votes to Mr. LaRue's 789.



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

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Woods Studies Adoption Of Two New Ordinances

Two proposed ordinances Day being observed on the were unanimously approved 20th. by the Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, November 6, for a first reading, with the date of Monday, November 20, being set for their second reading and possible final adoption.

One proposal provides for the creation of a community tree commission, while the other controls the placement of driveway approaches and provides for an appeal pro-

cedure. The tree commission proif adopted, would amend the city's tree ordinance and provide for the creation of a community tree commission consisting of five persons who must be city

As proposed, commission members will be appointed by the mayor from the membership of the Beautification Commission with their terms of appointment being concurrent with their service on the Beautification Commis-

A tree commission chairman will be elected, with the commission meeting once per month, or more often as required. The group will formulate and develop recommendations to assist the city in its efforts to maintain and further develop an 'active Community Forestry Pro-

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen further explored this proposal in a memo to the council in relation to a "Tree City" des-

Saying he has been in contact with the State Department of Natural Resources, (DNR), since February regarding an upcoming proposed urban forestry grant, Mr. Petersen stated that the municipality "is far ahead of most cities in the care and conservation of our tree inventory and that our record of achievements in the area of urban forestry will help us qualify for future DNR

In the near future, he said the city expects to be notified of another opportunity to participate in a DNR grant program. "It is the opin-ion of this office that our chances of obtaining funds will be increased if we subscribe to the DNR's sponsored 'Tree City' program."

To meet such a designation, several standards must be met including the following: .::

• Have a legally constituted tree body, charged by or-dinance with the responsibility for developing and administering a comprehensive city tree program.

• Have an ordinance regulating tree planting and maintenance, and dead tree removal on publicly owned property, in accordance with

accepted forestry principles.

• Have an active, comprehensive community forestry program, supported by minimum of \$1 per capita public funds, (exclusive of donation of labor and mon-

• Have a formal proclamation by the mayor designating Arbor Day, and a public commemorative tree planting in observance of Arbor Day each year.
At this time, Mr. Petersen

noted, the city lacks only a "tree body" and an Arbor Day program.

He recommended that the council enact the proposed ordinance and that Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos proclaim an Arbor Day in the city. The council then authorized the latter with Arbor

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Petersen added, "It members of the Beautification Commission have indicated a desire to serve on a 'tree body.' Further, the city is expecting delivery of approximately 35 trees for November planting and Arbor Day could be coordinated with the planting of these trees.

"But, of most importance, in my opinion, is that the city will be viewed more favorably when we apply for a DNR forestry grant if we are a 'tree city'

Meanwhile, the proposal eying driveway approaches, previously recommended for adoption by the Planning Commission via a 6-3 vote late last month, says that all driveways constructed or reconstructed upon dedicated street right-of-ways must be located so as not to encroach upon the street right-of-way of any adjoining or adjacent lot, unless the owners consent to such in writing.

In the event consent cannot be obtained, the proposal provides for an appeal procedure before the council.

This matter is an outgrowth of events which transpired at a September council meeting when a citizen expressed concern over a long-standing city policy regarding the flaring of driveways on so-called city property, (i.e., between the sidewalk and the curb), about one foot into the lot line of an adjoining property own-

Scientists have known for some time that road salts dissolved in melting snow can enter the soil and stunt or kill plants, but Dr. Davidson and his colleagues have shown that airborne salt aerosols can damage evergreen needles and kill overwintering buds on deciduous



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

Many properties at that time were a browned-off disgrace.

Another subject you might want to assay in a similar Grosse Poinnte News message:

Look down almost any Grosse Pointe street and what do vou see? Well cared-for homes with neat lawns and landscaping arranged along tidy, tree-lined streets? Well, yes but to see these pleasant vistas, you'd have to ignore the automobiles stored in the streets and even worse, in the driveways between the sidewalk and the building line.

I daresay most of us are so used to looking at these eyesore parked cars that we don't even notice them. But with a little imagination, we could appreciate how much nicer our streets and our cities would look without them.

True, we are a suburb of the Motor City, where the car is king. But I submit that an automobile is a thing of beauty only on the dealer's show-room floor. After that, it is a cumbersome monstrosity, actually of no practical value, except when it is in motion, in use. When not in use, like any tool or piece of equipment, it should bestored out of sight.

Our occupancy codes, I believe, require garages. Perhaps the code should be revised to require that those garages be used for their intended purpose, to store automobiles.

Let's get cars off Grosse Pointe streets and especially out of Grosse Pointe driveways. I say that automobile clutter is one of the first signs of a deteriorating neighborhood.
