Thursday, November 23
EGYPTIAN PRESIDENT
Anwar Sadat renewed demands that Israel include other Arab states in a peace treaty, instead of a separate peace with his country. The change in position came as Israel stated it was through negotiating a peace treaty, telling Cairo it could "take it or leave it." The U.S., meanwhile, issued a statement saying "more negotiations will be necessary." The treaty has reached an impasse over the Palestinian question.

Friday, November 24
THE BODY OF JIM JONES
was positively identified by the FBI, ending speculation the man found dead with 900 other Americans in a mass suicide-murder was a double of the religious cult's leader. Meanwhile, American Air Force personnel began the grisly task of bringing the bodies back to the U.S. Guyanese patrols continued to search through the jungle neighboring Jonestown, looking for hundreds believed to have fled the "Peoples Temple" encampment when Jones apparently ordered them to drink a poisonous brew on Saturday, November 18.

Saturday, November 25
PRESIDENT JIMMY CARTER'S anti-inflation program got two portions of good news as the nation's railroads cut back the size of a proposed freight rate increase and U.S. Steel Corp. announced a price increase within his program's guidelines. The railroads decided to roll back their proposed increases from 8.1 percent to 7 percent, while U.S. Steel, the nation's number one producer, held its price hike to 3.2 percent.

Sunday, November 26
THE DEATH TOLL in the Jonestown, Guyana, mass murder-suicide rose to 912 as U.S. Army burial teams loaded the last of the bodies on board helicopters for transport back to their home country. The count more than doubled from the original estimate of 405 when the workers realized that many bodies were stacked atop one another. It is now apparent that few members of the "Peoples Temple" religious cult escaped the suicide rite ordered by its leader, Jim Jones, after the airstrip ambush of a U.S. congressman and three newsmen over a week ago.

Monday, November 27
CLASHES BETWEEN Iranian government forces and Moslems left at least 13 dead after the Moslems became enraged at the desecration of the country's holiest shrine by military gunfire. A one day general strike called by Moslem leaders proved almost 100 percent effective in the capital city of Tehran, and more than a million people throughout the country marched in protest. The Shah's forces last Tuesday pushed demonstrators into the courtyard of a shrine and damaged it with gunfire.

Tuesday, November 28
SAN FRANCISCO MAYOR GEORGE MOSCONE and a member of the city's board of supervisors were shot and killed in city hall Monday, apparently by an unhappy ex-member of the supervisors who had resigned and later asked for his job back. The suspect, Dan White, a former city policeman and fireman, surrendered at a nearby police station 45 minutes after the shootings, police said. Mr. Moscone, 49, and Supervisor Harvey Milk, 48, were killed an hour before the mayor was to announce the appointment of another man to fill the seat vacated by the suspect on the board.

Files Suit Relating to Boy's Death

Woods Council Refers Trial Demand to City Attorney in Relation to Fatal Accident in May

A bill of complaint and demand for jury trial, stemming from the death of a 13-year-old Harper Woods boy on May 22 when his bicycle made contact with a Woods garbage truck at the Mack avenue-Vernier road intersection, was unanimously referred to City Attorney George Catlin and the city's insurance carrier for handling.

This action was taken by the council at its regular meeting Monday, November 20. The victim, Karl Schmitt of Hollywood avenue, was a seventh grader at Parcels School. Police said the boy was apparently on his way home from school when the accident occurred, and he was pronounced dead on arrival at Saint John Hospital.

Negligence Alleged
Anton Schmitt, administrator of the boy's estate, filed the complaint, dated Wednesday, November 8, in Wayne County Circuit Court against three defendants, The Woods Highway Department, Pietro Brancalone of St. Clair

Getting Ready for Fourth Annual Night of Awards Of Beautification Group

Event Scheduled for Wednesday, December 6, at Grosse Pointe Hunt Club; New Format Featured This Year Causes Some Differences of Opinion

Final preparations are being made for the fourth annual Awards Night, sponsored by the Woods Beautification Commission, which will be held on Wednesday, December 6, at the Grosse Pointe Hunt Club, 655 Cook road, from 8 to 10 p.m.
The council at its regular meeting Monday, November 20, gave the program its blessing by unanimously approving a commission recommendation authorizing expenditures of up to \$600 for the event.

Unlike the three prior Awards Nights when commission members submitted the names of businesses they felt worthy of being cited, a different approach was taken this year wherein individuals were requested to submit nominations in various categories.
On Shifting Gears
More trophies will be given this year as four traveling trophies will be presented to winners in the following categories: large, medium and small businesses, plus one viewing churches, schools and libraries. In addition, three plaques will be given as special awards, while others nominated are scheduled to receive certificates.
An estimated total of over 350 letters were sent to prospective individuals this year, requesting their participation in the new program by the September 1

deadline date. As it turned out, only 19 responses were received causing some differences of opinion on the approach amongst commission members.
Commission chairman Dr. Albert C. Howe felt the gears should have been shifted based on the response, noting, "It's our obligation to fill in the gap" in relation to submitting names, "but the majority of the commission was against it."
Saying he went along with the new approach until the deadline tally was received, Dr. Howe felt many individuals, who do not project themselves regarding the submission of nominations, really deserved a pat on the back for their beautification efforts.
"We are an arm of the city and we should sense the idea of being all inclusive," he said, while noting the new approach really didn't accomplish what he felt the commission was supposed to be doing.
Upgrade Program
"It's an elaborate thing for a limited effect," continued Dr. Howe, who also expressed some concern over the expenditure of \$600 in relation to the 19 responses.

GP Nursing Home Eyes Renovation

City Council Scheduled to Consider New Plans on Monday, December 18

The executive director of the Grosse Pointe Nursing Home announced this week he plans to reopen the facility late next spring after an extensive renovation that will bring it up to state and federal guidelines.
Executive director Joseph Mash said he has "no doubt" the City Council will approve a new, sealed-down set of plans for the renovation when the council meets on Monday, December 18, at 7:30 p.m.
Previous plans for upgrading the facility, at 315 Fisher road, were approved by the council in 1976, but were abandoned by nursing home officials as too costly and possibly dangerous to surrounding buildings, Mr. Mash said.

Will Be Private
The home has been empty since March 1978, except for two weeks during which it was leased to a group which supervised a fasting clinic for dieters, Mr. Mash said the group was asked to leave when it became apparent the home owners would have to get special permission from the City Council to continue the operation.
When the nursing home reopens, Mr. Mash said it will become a private facility and will no longer accept Medicare or welfare patients, as it has in the past.
"Medicare doesn't pay enough to cover expenses," Mr. Mash explained. "There's no profit in accepting welfare patients, so we're just going to stick with people who can pay their own way."
He said he has no idea what the new charges to enter the home will be after the renovation.

The new renovation plans call for reducing the home's capacity from 46 to 33 beds, according to Mr. Mash. Extensive interior changes will be necessary to bring the facility up to government residential care regulations, he added.
Won The Right
The home has not met those regulations for some time, but was operating under a continuance of certification granted by the

Low Morale Hits Park Policemen; Solution Sought

Officers Cite Poor Working Conditions, Lack of Communication with Chief Henry Coonce Among Reasons Why Many Members of Department Have Quit over the Years

Park police officers claim that a lack of communication with their chief, Henry O. Coonce, working conditions and other factors have created a serious morale problem within the department. As a result, they said, many good policemen resigned to transfer to other police departments or seek employment in private industries where wages, fringe benefits and pensions, plus chances for promotion, are better.
The subject of low morale came to light at the Park Council's regular session on Monday, November 27, and was initiated by the wives and members of the officers' families.
The policemen remained in the background until Mayor Matthew C. Patterson chided them for allowing the women to speak on their behalf, when actually the officers should speak for themselves.
Questions Raised
When the council clears items on the agenda, it is customary, but not required, for the mayor to ask if anyone in the audience has anything to say before adjournment. This triggered off several questions by the wives, including why have so many police officers resigned from the department in the past few years and why does The Park, with the highest crime rate of the five Pointes, have only two scout cars on the road at night?
One of the wives pointed out two cars were insufficient because The Park, which borders Detroit on two sides, has an influx of criminals coming in from that city, especially from Detroit's Fifth Precinct, Jefferson Station jurisdiction, which is one of the largest precincts with the greatest number of crimes.
The woman demanded to know from Chief Coonce, who was in the audience, why the department was understaffed. She also asked the chief if the reason for the two-car patrol is because there are not enough police officers on the force, or if it was because

Block Grant Survey Set In GP City

Officials Strive to Determine Need of Citizens, Preferences for Community Improvement

The City will follow in the steps of The Woods by conducting a special survey next month to determine citizens' needs and preferences for community improvement.
Letters will be mailed within two weeks to about 650 homes in The City's western census tract to explain the nature and purpose of the survey.
It will be conducted by telephone by Yee-Minard Associates and will include questions about parking, traffic, shopping and neighborhood beautification.
Anonymous Process
Surveyors also will ask for approximate figures on family size, income and age. The entire process will be anonymous, according to City Manager Thomas Kressbach.
The survey is not required, but "strongly recommended" by administrators of the federal Community Development Block Grant Program, which has supplied The City with more than \$275,000 in recent years for community improvement projects.
The block grants originate from the federal department of Housing and Urban Development, (HUD), and are administered in The Pointe by Wayne County.
The survey will cost under \$3,500 and will be paid via block grant funds, Mr. Kressbach said.
The Woods conducted a similar survey in September.
Best Meet Needs
The City's survey will encompass about 650 homes, (about 30 percent of the total), in the community's western census tract, east of Neff road and west of Cadieux, excluding Loraine

Police Pact Approved By Council

Mediation Helps Pave Way for Retroactive Two-Year Contract Between City, GPWPOA

Negotiations between Grosse Pointe Woods and the Grosse Pointe Woods Police Officers Ass'n., (GPWPOA), which began in early spring and ended up in mediation in October, reached a climax on Monday, November 20, when the Woods Council unanimously approved a two-year agreement with the association, retroactive to July 1, 1978.
After an impasse in bargaining occurred during late summer and early fall, a tentative pact was reached, thanks to a mediation session with representatives of both sides and mediator Richard Terepin of the Department of Labor, Employment Relations Commission.
Following the session, the association ratified the proposal with 25 men voting "yes" and one abstaining, and the document became a reality when the council gave its approval on the 20th.
Will Live With It
City Comptroller-Assessor Frederick G. Hornfisher, a member of the city's negotiating team, expressed pleasure over the conclusion of negotiations and the final pact.
"I think it was well handled through mediation and by both sides," he said, while noting that a settlement was reached a short time after the mediation session. He also stated that cooperation between both parties made efforts toward a settlement much easier.
While the agreement itself may not have been completely satisfying to all parties, it eliminated any potential threat of arbitration, which reared its head after an impasse was reached.
While expressing some satisfaction over the content, Officer Stephen Petrik, association president, said it's possible that all aspects of

Parking Cut In Moross Road

The Farms Council, acting on advice from the police department, decided to remove much of the parking presently allowed in Moross road.
This action was taken primarily in response to the large numbers of parked cars being struck over the years.
The new parking regulations will make parking illegal on both sides of the road from Mack to Williams. Parking will be permitted from Williams east to where the road begins to narrow, (just west of Ridge road), where it would again be prohibited on both sides as far as Kercheval.
From Kercheval to Lakeshore, parking will be allowed only on the west side between Kercheval and Grosse Pointe boulevard. All parking bans will now be made for all hours.
Councilman Jack Cudlip, who lives in Moross, voted against the new regulations at the council's Monday, November 20, meeting.
Police Chief Robert Ferber and Lt. Ignatius Backman recommended the changes to the council, adding it was a good time to make them because of the poor condition of the existing signs.
The chief said Moross has been shown to be the highest speed street in The Farms, and that traffic engineering studies show that if obstacles such as parked cars are removed, less accidents will result.
The new signs will be installed as soon as possible, but it may be spring before the work is completed

The agreement may not be what everyone wanted. For his part, he stated the association didn't receive pension changes it originally wanted but "we'll live with the contract for two years."

Officer Petrik indicated the GPWPOA may seek pension changes in the future depending upon the state of the economy, while adding, "The package is fair and equitable regarding cost of living but who knows what next year will bring."

Increases in Salary
In the first year of the pact, July 1, 1978, to June 30, 1979, all officers with 48 months seniority will receive \$20,277, while all corporals will get \$21,696. This compares to \$18,775 and \$19,725, respectively, during the year of July 1, 1977, to June 30, 1978.

During the second year, July 1, 1979, to June 30, 1980, all officers with 48 months seniority will earn \$22,000, while the corporals will receive \$23,540.

Each member of the bargaining unit received \$250 per year in clothing allowance with this amount being increased to \$325 during the first year of the agreement and \$400 during the second year.

A new schedule of life insurance goes into effect during the agreement's first year. Mr. Hornfisher said prior to the adjustment an officer received \$10,000 and a corporal, \$15,000.

Now, the city will provide life insurance with double indemnity, (accidental death and dismemberment), for all full-time members of the bargaining unit according to the following schedule:

- \$10,000 to \$15,000 annual base wage, \$10,000; \$15,001 to \$20,000 annual base wage, \$15,000; \$20,001 to \$25,000 annual base wage, \$20,000; and \$25,001 to \$30,000 annual base wage, \$25,000.

Language Changes
Several contract language changes are included in the pact's first year and these view special assignments, e.g., the detective bureau commander will be selected by the public safety director and such assignment may be rotated at his discretion, with

all supervisory officers being eligible to apply for this position, vacation leave and continuing education.

During the second year of the agreement, the city will maintain the following health care coverage for each member of the bargaining unit: Blue Cross-Blue Shield-MVF II, (Mr. Hornfisher noted prior to this MVF I was provided and now the men will have improved benefits), in the areas of semi-private room, major medical and prescription rider, plus Delta-Dental, a 75 percent-25 percent plan.

At the same time, there were some language changes during the second year regarding maintenance of conditions, separability and duration of the agreement.

Eying The Future
On the latter, the pact will be effective from and after July 1, 1978, and will remain

in force and effect up to and including 11:59 p.m. on June 30, 1980.

In relation to future negotiations, members of the bargaining unit will submit any new salary, fringe benefit and/or agreement amendments to the city on or before the February 1 preceding the termination date of the current pact and the city will respond within 30 days after the receipt of any such proposals.

In the event that negotiations extend beyond the pact's expiration date, the terms and provisions of the agreement will remain in full force and effect pending agreement upon a new contract, subject to termination by either party on 90 days written notice to the other.

Meanwhile, negotiations between the city and the sergeants and lieutenants continues.

In the past, he reflected, Awards Nights were held in the council chambers at no cost, with total expenditures per night coming in at around \$200 apiece.

While expressing some disappointment over the 19 responses, Peter Coutsos, committee chairman for the Awards Night, said the new format was an effort "to upgrade the beautification program and to get more people to participate. We'll stick to our game plan as much as possible."

Acknowledging Dr. Howe's concern over the response, he said, "We were given the charge to come up with a plan toward having better participation, including guidelines, with the commission supporting it unanimously."

At the same time, Mr. Coutsos stated, "In a way, I anticipated the low response because in the past number of years the Beautification Commission did it the other way."

While somewhat prepared for it, he stressed the objective of building up the new approach with citizens taking the initiative.

To Use Again
We were given the idea from a number of places which urged such participation and which grew as more and more businesses participated in the nomination process and, hence, the beautification process, noted Mr. Coutsos.

The prevailing feeling on the part of the majority of the commission is to build upon this new avenue. "We want to try to reemphasize a way to encourage people to participate in the types of things we want to try and get them to do," he said, while noting the Hunt Club location was part of the overall upgrading effort, along with an attempt to have the Awards Night in The Woods.

Feeling this wasn't out of line in relation to the total objective, Mr. Coutsos said, "We want to reward them

with this event, we want to upgrade the beautification program and we want to look at the people who have worked hard."

In relation to the \$600 figure, he stated the four travelling trophies and plaques cost an estimated \$320, while the cost of certificates was placed at between \$50 and \$60. The rest of the cost will go for food and other refreshments at the Hunt Club.

He wished to emphasize the total expense does include the costs of the trophies which will be used in future years, thereby reducing expenditures for other Awards Nights, while adding citizens are welcome to attend the ceremony.

The Only Way
While both Dr. Howe and Mr. Coutsos, despite their different views over the new format, expressed some disappointment over the responses from the community, Jean Rice, commission recording secretary, felt, for an initial thrust, the 19 responses was excellent.

Feeling the altered approach offered a viable road toward development, she said the commission wants to build upon it. "I sat through five years of Keep Michigan Beautiful and saw it, (the program), become bigger and bigger."

Mrs. Rice also noted that most of the successful beautification programs run in the country began in a similar fashion as the commission's approach this year.

"We want to try to make the awards meaningful and the only way to find out is by doing it."

GPW Eyes Valet Parking Proposal for Restaurants

A proposed ordinance requiring valet parking for restaurants with 150 or more seats, which originally was discussed in relation to Class C liquor license hearings, will be considered by the Woods Council for a first reading on Monday, December 4.

The proposal was first viewed in relation to the bid of Gabby's Restaurant, 19299 Mack Avenue, for an additional C license, with the solons ultimately signifying their approval of the business to the state Liquor Control Commission as the most preferred applicant for the document on Monday, November 20.

At the same time, the council once again discussed the proposal and there was some concern expressed in several areas including the constitutionality of this type of law and in singling out specific businesses on the compliance front.

City Attorney George Callin felt the control of on-street and off-street parking in the business district was

within the police powers of a community.

Meanwhile, Councilman John Sabol, in viewing the singling out of restaurant businesses in the proposal, particularly those which serve liquor, questioned if other restaurants or businesses should be included or, if not, exclude all of them.

Councilman George S. Freeman then indicated that a few businesses in the city already do valet parking on their own and wondered if they should be included in the proposal as against singling out any one type of establishment.

For his part, Councilman George Custer felt some of the parking-oriented problems were already there regarding some businesses, which were permitted to build their establishments without adequate parking.

He felt the proposal does what it has to do toward encompassing other areas with the focus upon restaurants serving alcoholic beverages, and its effort toward making sure the establishments are properly run and in maintaining satisfactory traffic flow.

On the other hand, Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos stated the proposal shouldn't be pushed too hard; feeling it was wiser to consider it in depth while giving citizens an opportunity to share their feelings on it rather than adopt it on an emergency basis, as proposed.

At this stage, the proposal says that valet parking will be required to be furnished between 11 a.m. and 12 p.m. by any restaurant establishment having a seating capacity of 150 or more persons.

Any such establishment required to furnish such parking must submit 12 copies of a site plan of the proposed area to be utilized to the council for its approval. This plan also will be reviewed by the director of the Department of Public Safety.

Any restaurant establishment required to provide valet parking must have the site plan approved prior to the issuance of a license to conduct business within the city.

Finally, on-street parking is prohibited wherein a valet parking attendant might park a vehicle upon any on-street parking space. The car must be parked in the area designated and approved on the site plan.

PSOs in Shores Retain Officers

The Grosse Pointe Shores Public Safety Officers Ass'n. (GPSPSOA), at its annual meeting on Wednesday, November 8, in the municipal council room, re-elected its officers for a third term beginning January 1, reported PSO Gary Mitchell, president.

Members of the association not only voted to retain PSO Mitchell as president for another year, but also decided to keep PSO Archie Grieve as vice-president and PSO Daniel Healy as secretary-treasurer.

Members of each shift voted to retain the same union bargaining agents for their respective shifts. They are PSOs Harry Hamilton, Michael Kortas and Robert Bensinger.

Although each represents a shift, Officer Mitchell said, the representatives bargain together on contracts. In the handling of grievances, each will represent his own shift.

PSO Mitchell said that the GPSPSOA is preparing its demands for a new contract discussion with Village officials sometime early next year. He said that the present two-year contract will expire June 30, 1979.

Woods Orders Pair of Flags

A recommendation from the Beautification Commission met the unanimous approval of the Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, November 20.

The commission, which made its recommendation at its October meeting, requested that two nylon appliqued 4' by 6' flags, the result of the city flag contest, be ordered from Modern Emblem at a cost of \$117 each, with the total amount of \$234 taken from the commission's budget.

California Artist to Exhibit Works on Hill

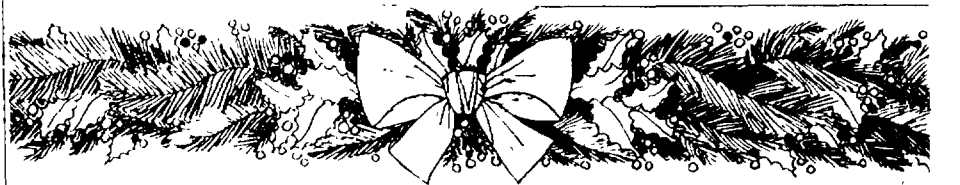
A collection of paintings and two series of drawings by Nicholas Nahoum will be publicly shown at 63 Kercheval on the Hill.

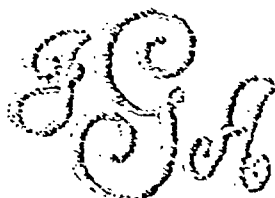

(Continued from Page 1) "tools"—shopping bags that are made to look full with cardboard taped inside and "booster bloomers"—short, extra large underpants with tight elastic leg bands and a loose waist. The latter garment can only be used with a dress that opens up the front, and is extremely difficult to detect.

Farms Det. Earl Field said he once interviewed a woman who was able, over a 10-year period, to average a \$15,000 yearly income from shoplifting.

The woman, who worked a 40-hour week, admitted to taking 1,900 men's suits a year working alone and in the company of another man. In one instance, in five minutes the pair made off with four mink coats valued at \$9,000 from a locked display.

When finally caught at her profession, the woman called most store owners stupid for making it so easy for her.

Det. Field says he has information there are a number of adult groups shoplifting for profit. Working out of the Southfield area, he claims they use rental cars, (which usually have out-of-state plates), to make tracing more difficult.

Now that the Christmas season is here, Det. Field wants store owners to be aware of the problem, since the incidence of theft rises with the number of people in the stores. Although the thievery will never be eliminated completely, there are ways to somewhat curtail it.

The most important advice to store owners or employees is to have an awareness of potential shoplifters. Even pros will often lose their composure if they know they're being watched.

Simple things can make a big difference. For instance, if every other hanger on a rack was turned around so

that the curve was different from one to the next, the man who stole the robes would have had a harder time getting the 12 or 14 he hid in one grab.

Store owners, however, are reluctant to do such a thing, as it results in "customer inconvenience," Det. Field said.

Stores should be laid out so that all areas are visible from the counter. Mirrors or other surveillance systems should be used at all blind spots.

Customers should be bothered by salespeople, Det. Field said, since the potential shoplifting can't occur while the person is being watched. Surveillance tactics such as peepholes and two-way mirrors are effective, though such means are currently under question by the courts, particularly their use in dressing rooms.

Various types of alarms are available to detect merchandise removed without payment, but some of the small store owners can't afford such expensive tools. For them, the best prevention is to make their personnel aware of the potential for thievery.

The experts advise that there are telltale signs most shoplifters present while "on the job." Customers who hang around the store without making any move to buy, customers who carry merchandise from one department to another, customers wearing loose clothing or unseasonable clothes and customers carrying just about anything are more suspect than the average.

In the event a store employee sees somebody lift some merchandise, he has to be quite careful in apprehending that individual, lest he ruin his chances of prosecuting in court. The employee must actually see the property being taken, and must see it be concealed on the shoplifter's person.

(Continued from Page 1) road and the block surrounding Bon Secours Hospital.

The area was described by City planning consultant Brandon Rogers at a recent council meeting as "the old village area."

"The homes there are generally older and so are the residents," Mr. Rogers said. He added that a large portion of the residents rent their homes and apartments. The purpose of the project is to determine what citizens in the area perceive to be its biggest problems so the federal funds can be applied to projects that will best meet residents' needs, according to Mr. Kressbach.

Allocated Total

Survey results may determine, to some extent, what future projects will be approved for block grant funding. Data on income and age of residents also may determine the level of funding under the program in future years.

In past years, The City has used block grant funds to resurface streets, improve lighting, plant trees and to install sloped curbs at intersections.

This year's allocated grant totalled \$119,471 and included Housing Rehabilitation, (\$36,000), Sidewalk Ramping, (\$30,000), Fire Pumper, (\$22,500), Minor Home Repair for Seniors, (\$9,471), Spot Demolition, (\$8,000), and the Survey, (\$4,500).

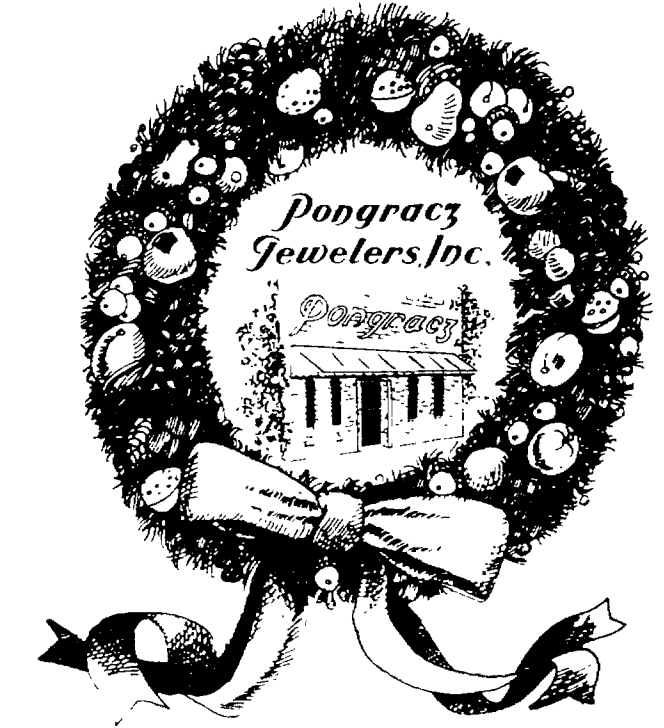
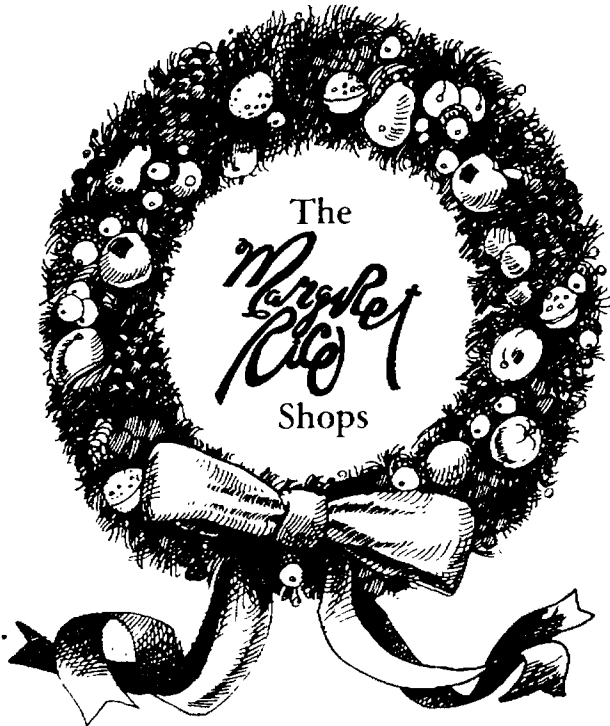

(Continued from Page 1) of the heavy turnover of personnel over the years.

Chief Coonce said that the number of policemen is adequate and that one man is presently undergoing basic police training which he will complete Friday, December 8. This will bring the department's full complement to 32, which is the official authorized strength. As for two cars on the road, this has been departmental policy for years.

He explained the reasons for the turnover of personnel by noting four have resigned within two years for reasons of health and better working conditions in other area departments, which means larger salaries and more fringe benefits. The Park Department salaries have been low in past years, but have since been adjusted.

Several officers charged that everyone of the policemen who left The Park Department have done so because they were disgusted by the manner in which the department has been operating and because many have tried to talk to Chief Coonce, who allegedly refused to meet with them.

The chief said he is willing to meet with the officers either through their union representatives, or with the department as a whole to discuss any matter they wish to bring up. When told that he refused to meet with the officers, he denied this and said his office is and always has been open to any officer wishing to discuss any problems with him.

Station Viewed

Mr. Patterson interrupted the women and asked them if they were speaking for their husbands, and, if so, why are the husbands sitting in the back and not saying anything? Why, he asked can't they speak for themselves?

One officer claimed that several attempts have been made to meet with the chief, but he refused to see those seeking an audience with him. This, again, was denied by Chief Coonce.

Mr. Patterson suggested that the chief meet with his men to discuss whatever problems exist and submit a

report to City Manager John Crawford to be presented to the council at the next regular meeting.

In an interview with police personnel, the officers charged that it is true that four men have resigned within the last two years, but, the number of resignations should be taken into account over the past five years, wherein, enough men have quit the department to equal at least the number in the present three platoons.

They said they were unhappy with the present police station, which one of the wives at Monday night's meeting called "the pits," feeling it should be remodeled into a station of which the officers and citizens of the community can be proud.

Mr. Patterson said there are no plans to remodel the present station, but plans are under discussion for the construction of a new building facility, separate from the municipal building which houses the police department.

Suspects Face Higher Bonds

Two suspects, arrested by Woods police on Monday, November 13, on charges of receiving and concealing stolen property over \$100 and possession of burglary tools, were released from the Wayne County Jail after posting bond set at their arraignment and were subsequently apprehended by Detroit police for allegedly unlawfully driving away an automobile, reported Woods Det. The youths, Earl Baker, 19, listed as living in Warwick, Detroit, and Forest Port Huron, and Otha Jordan Jr., 20, of Shaftsbury, Detroit, were arraigned on the 13th, with bond being set at \$1,000 cash, two sureties, or 10 percent.

After posting the bond and being released, they were apprehended by Detroit police on Wednesday, November 22, missing their scheduled examination date that same day in The Woods, Det. Hamel stated.

As a result, their bond was upped to \$5,000, two sureties, or 10 percent, and their examination date rescheduled for yesterday, November 29. They were again transported to the Wayne County Jail.

The suspects are allegedly involved in stealing a car from in front of the home of a Detroit Police Department sergeant. They were stopped by Woods Officers Robert Kwiatkowski and Thomas Morawski, who received a "be on lookout" report for an auto occupied by two males who were wanted for allegedly tampering with cars in the area of Allard avenue.

Found in the car were a hammer, pliers, screwdrivers and a lockout tool, which is used to enter autos.

In an interview with Chief Coonce, the chief said there have been meetings with members of his department, whether in groups or individually, in the past. He said he has never denied the men the right to discuss any problems with him, whether personal or otherwise.

"Following Monday night's council meeting," the chief said, "I had a small conversation with the officers who were at the session and I requested that they set up a date and time to discuss any problems they wish to bring up."

"As far as the four officers who resigned within the past two years, they never made any specific complaint to me regarding why they were quitting."

The officers who left are Michael Kortas, who resigned in May 1977 to work for the Shores Public Safety Department; Gary Reeves, who left last January to work for the Madison Heights Police Department, (he attended school and his family lives in Madison Heights); Cpl. Collin LaLonde, who left June 30 to move to Arizona, but has since returned to live in The Park; and Barry Oleksyk, who left to join the St. Clair Shores Police Department. He is a resident of St. Clair Shores.

Welcome to Attend
Chief Coonce said officers who join his department undergo police basic training, as required by state law, paid for by the city. After completing training, each officer is required to sign a contract to serve at least two years. If officers resign within the first six months of employment, they must reimburse the city the \$1,500 it cost to train them. If they leave six months before the two years expire, they pay back one fourth of the cost.

The chief added Mr. Patterson and Mr. Crawford will be invited to attend the meeting between himself and the members of his department if they wish to do so.

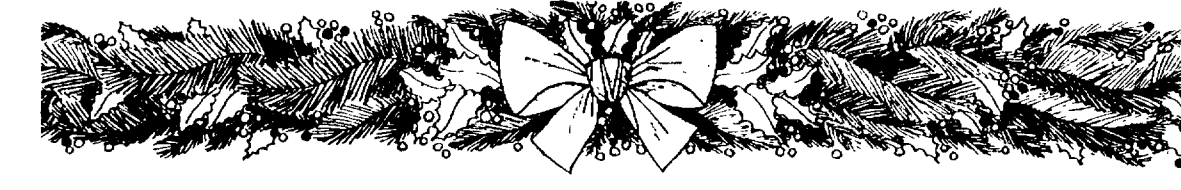

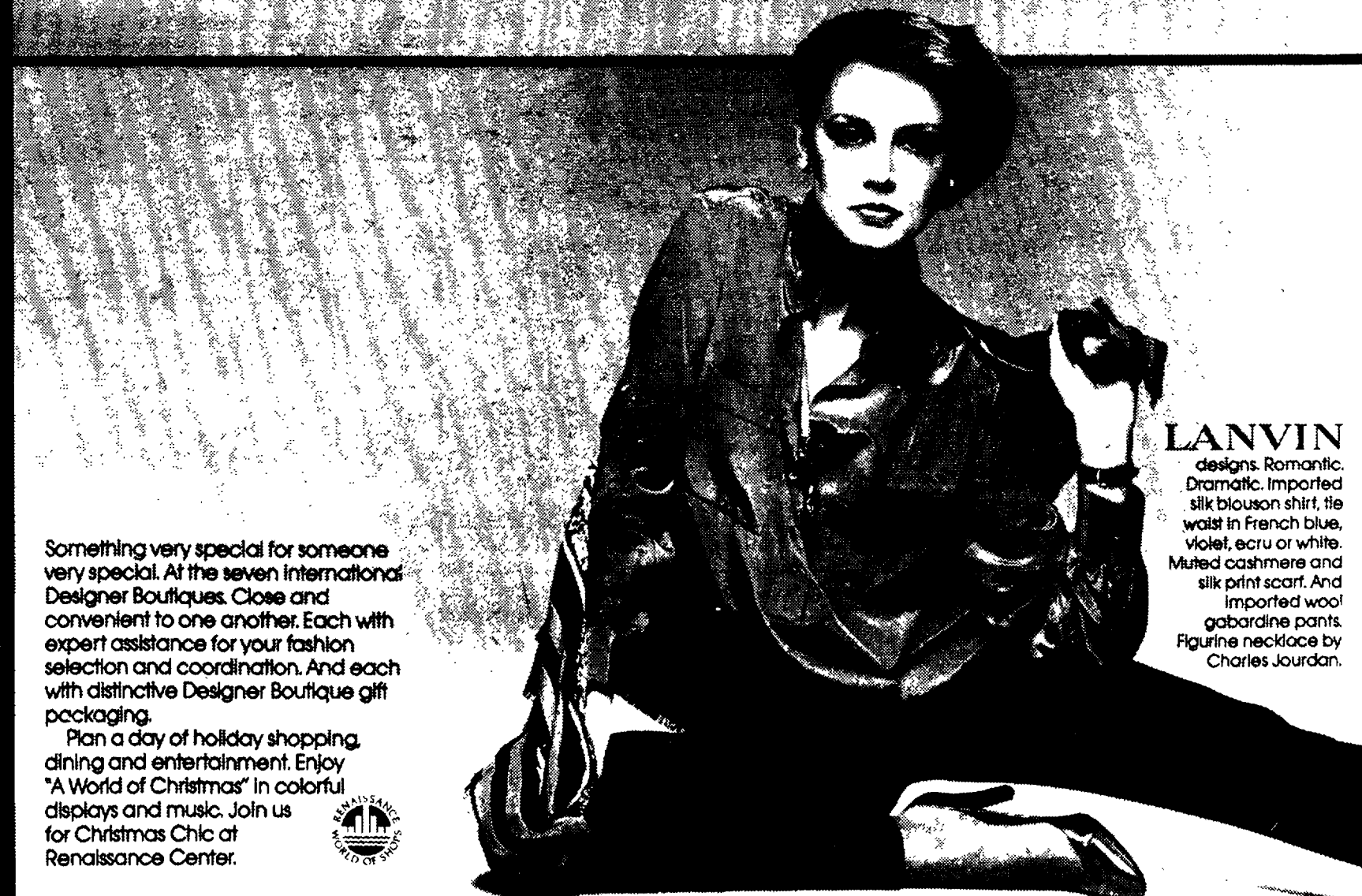

Files Suit in Accident

(Continued from Page 1) Shores, the driver of the garbage truck, and the Board of County Road Commissioners of Wayne County.

The complaint says the boy was lawfully crossing Vernier on a bicycle from the sidewalk on the southeast corner to the northeast corner of Mack.

It states The Woods Highway Department maintained Vernier and all appurtenances, while the Board of County Road Commissioners maintained Mack at the Vernier intersection and all appurtenances.

The complaint then says Mr. Brancalone was operating the truck within the scope of his employment with the city "when he ran over" the boy "while attempting to make a right turn from northbound Mack avenue to eastbound Vernier road."

Saying the defendants, jointly and severally, owed the boy the duty of "due care and compliance with the laws and statutes" of the state, the complaint lists several areas in which Mr. Brancalone, the city and the Board of County Road Commissioners were allegedly negligent.

It notes Mr. Brancalone and the city violated their duties and were negligent in

nine areas including failing to obey a traffic control device, failing to make proper observation of traffic conditions on a through street and to act thereon to avoid collision, failing to keep his vehicle under control and failing to approach and make a right turn as close as practicable to the right hand curb.

The complaint also alleges the failure to give the proper signal for turning, failure to yield the right-of-way to the boy, driving at an excessive rate of speed "under the circumstances" and the failure to install, maintain and use the adequate brakes or horn on the vehicle.

Failure to comply with Michigan Compiled Laws, Annotated, in 10 areas also is alleged.

The Woods Highway Department, besides the nine areas cited for alleged negligence "for each of the several acts of negligence on the part of its agents and employees," also, in its own alleged negligence, is cited for failing to have adequate traffic signals at the intersection and for maintaining an unguarded pedestrian crosswalk unreasonably close to a main thoroughfare.

Meanwhile, the Board of County Road Commissioners also is accused of negligence in the latter two areas.

The complaint then states that "each of the above-mentioned acts on behalf of the defendants and its agents and employees was a proximate cause of the death of Karl Schmitt."

Compensatory damages against the defendants "in an amount which is just and reasonable, plus interest, costs and attorneys' fees," is being sought.

Attorney Robert H. Darling, who's representing Mr. Schmitt, indicated he plans on contacting Mr. Catlin toward further exploring the complaint to see what might be done in lieu of a jury trial.

"It's always in everybody's interest to see certain positions and to obtain feelings on matters of this nature," he said, in relation to the tragedy.

If, in fact, this case does go to trial, it could be some three years before this transpires.

For his part, Mr. Catlin expressed a willingness to talk with Mr. Darling, while noting the insurance carrier will provide counsel in this case.

Big Party Gets Out of Hand

A broken jaw and a cut face that required 12 stitches to closeup were among the injuries reported after a party in Washington road, attended by at least 500 teenagers, got out of hand Wednesday, November 22.

City police broke up the party with help from officers from The Farms and Woods. They estimated there were between 500 and 1,000 high school and college age kids at the party, held in a vacant home at 621 Washington road.

Police said they were called to the home by complainants in Washington and Lincoln roads and Rivard boulevard at about 8:30 p.m. It was 12:30 a.m. on Thursday, November 23, before the situation was finally quieted, according to police.

The home at which the party was held had been vacated by a family earlier that day, but two brothers, 17- and 20-years-old, decided to return that evening for their well-publicized party.

A 17-year-old Woods youth told police he was attacked and his jaw was broken by several people as he was leaving the party.

Another 18-year-old youth from Renaud road told police he was pushing a car when a person he could not identify attacked him, pushing him to the ground and cutting his face. That youth received 12 stitches at Bon Secours hospital.

Police made no arrests, but are still investigating the incident. City Public Safety Director Bruce Kennedy commended his men for the fine job they did breaking up the party.

Park Police Chief Warns Of Property Destruction

Two 15-year-old boys were arrested by Park police on Friday, November 24, and charged with unlawful entry into a house under construction, while a third 15-year-old was arrested on Saturday, November 25, and charged with malicious destruction of property for allegedly using a B-B gun to shoot out a street light.

One of the first two taken into custody was found to have suspected marijuana in his pocket and may possibly face a charge of violating the controlled substances act, if an analysis proves positive. Police Chief Henry O. Coonce, excluding the possibility of the substance found in the one boy's pocket being marijuana, said the unlawful entry and the malicious destruction could very well be tied together.

In the first case, he pointed out, the two caught in the house might have caused some damage to the property, whereas, the young man with the B-B gun, actually did. Damage to the light will assessed and the bill sent to the parents.

"I would like to remind parents, guardians or any adults having legal custody of minors and juveniles, that under a Michigan statute, they are responsible for any damage done to public or private property that is less than \$100 is a misdemeanor, while any damage over \$100 constitutes a felony, both punishable offenses, whether done by young or old persons."

In the matter of the two juveniles taken into custody at the house, Chief Coonce continued, "Who knows what might have happened. The building, one of two under construction at Charlevoix and Audubon, could have been damaged intentionally or unintentionally by these youngsters.

"Even if it should be unintentional, parents are not exempt from paying for the damages.

"Another point for consideration" the chief said, "is that children playing in houses under construction could be hurt or possibly fatally injured by falling through holes, especially where stairways are to be built, or be injured by stepping on nails or by having building material falling on them.

"If the substance found in the boy's pocket proves to be marijuana," Chief Coonce said, "who knows if the boys were planning on smoking pot. If this was their plan, do we know whether or not, in the process they might not set the building on fire?"

And, while under the influence of the drug, do we know whether or not they might break something or fall through a hole in the floor to the basement, which could be flooded."

The chief said there are myriad things that could happen to children, or adults in houses under construction. Construction workers, even those who are most careful, are sometimes injured.

In reference to the youngster with the B-B gun, Chief Coonce said parents should exercise more control over their children and explain to them there is a city ordinance, (just about every community has one), which prohibits the firing of such guns within city limits, the same as with regular firearms.

"My advice to parents regarding B-B guns is to inform children that the firing of the guns is against the law," the chief said. "Parents should dismantle the guns, or leave them intact and locked in a safe place.

"There are locations where these types of guns can be safely used, but out in the open. Within city limits is not one of them. Pellets can hurt people, perhaps seriously, and, of course, fired pellets can cause damage to property."

Chief Coonce said within the past several months his department has received many reports of damaged houses and car windows throughout the city, with most of the windows shot out deliberately. He said reports are often received regarding vandals riding up and down city streets shooting out car and house windows for no reason other than the sheer desire to destroy property.

He stressed that anyone arrested for malicious destruction of property will be dealt with to the full extent of the law. "When the parents have to pay for their children's follies, perhaps they will think twice before they let them take the B-B guns out of the house," he concluded.

The culprit apparently had a key to the building, as

there were no signs of forced entry. He got into the building sometime late Monday night, November 20.

The band room and the gym of the school were entered, and obscenities were written throughout the music room, both in poster paints and chalk.

Police have no suspects in the case.

Okays Variance Despite Plan

City Council members threw their Comprehensive Development Plan out the window and ignored recommendations from their planning consultant Monday, November 20, when they granted approval to a zoning variance that will allow two new homes to be built in Notre Dame avenue.

A variance was required because the total size of each of the two lots is about 1,000 square feet under the minimum of 7,500 feet required in The City's R1B zone under the development plan.

Builder Nick Leto told the council he had formed the two lots in question by combining three lots on Notre Dame avenue and splitting the total in half. He said he plans to build Cape Cod and salt box type homes on the lots.

The neighborhood is considered a target area for revitalization in The City, according to planning consultant Brandon Rogers. Many of the lots are only 30 feet wide and do not include driveways or garages, which produces a parking problem in the area.

The homes are relatively small in size and Mr. Rogers said many of them show substantial deterioration.

Mr. Rogers recommended the council not allow the variance.

"Any development coming in, I hope, should meet our requirements so we can upgrade, rather than continue below grade in that area," he said.

Several neighbors who live near the two lots, which are now vacant, urged the council to approve the variance. They said the lots serve as a roadway for children on mini-bikes and create a nuisance in the neighborhood.

Mr. Leto told the council that to meet the 7,500 foot requirement in the area, at least four adjacent lots would have to be purchased before a new home is built.

"That's impractical," he said. "No one's going to buy and tear down four, \$40,000 homes to build one very large house in that neighborhood."

Councilwoman Jeanette Duffield argued, "We've

spent a great deal of time and money on our development plan. When are we going to start using it?" But she ultimately voted with the majority.

The final vote on the variance was 5-1 to approve, with Mayor John King casting the only "no" vote. George Henry was absent from the meeting.

Councilman Arthur Felters, who made the motion to okay the variance, suggested that the development plan may be "impractical" in this regard.

They are students who develop at a mental age of about 50 percent of their chronological age. Though they'll probably never be totally self sustaining, they may be able to hold a simple job that will allow them to feel more a part of the world in which they live.

Shift Strength Upped in Woods

Effective in December, the Woods Department of Public Safety will return to its old day shift minimum of seven officers on duty during weekdays and eight on weekends, with an attempt being made to sustain this minimum in future months, reported Public Safety Director John Dankel last week.

The seven on weekdays and eight on weekends number was altered between one to two years ago, he said, with the number being dropped to six and seven respectively, mainly because the department was under strength because of retirements and officers leaving.

Now, with the recent hiring of three new men, the department is up to a strong level, with the clerk-dispatcher being included in shift strength totals.

The day shift, (7 a.m. to 3 p.m.), during the week will have three men at the station and three single mar cars on patrol, while on weekends the additional mar will be out patrolling, i.e. four cars on the road.

On the afternoon shift, (2 to 11 p.m.), and midnight shift, (11 p.m. to 7 a.m.), no adjustments were made.

During afternoons, eight men will be on Mondays through Thursdays and nine will work Fridays through Sundays. In the former instance, four single man cars will be on the road and in the latter, five.

Meanwhile, on the midnight shift, eight men will be on every night of the week, he said, with two man cars on patrol.

In the event of an emergency, any officer can be called in, while auxiliary officers are available in support functions only.

Bankers Warn Against Many Yuletide Con Games

With the Christmas season upon us, everyone's preparing traditional Christmas lists. After all, it is the time of giving.

Con men also are preparing some special holiday lists because for them it is the time for taking.

Thus, with the advent of the Christmas season, flim flam artists attempt to convince people they are Santa's helpers in disguise in order to pull off some yule time con games and Christmas capers.

However, unlike the Grinch who stole Christmas, their aim is not only to remove the joy from your heart, but also the "jingle" from your pocket.

Although the following could be considered a typical shopping list drawn up by a "holiday-spirited" flim flam artist, in reality, it is a list of schemes and con games to be aware of during this most joyous of seasons, prepared by representatives of Detroitbank Corp., including Pointer William J. Kalmar.

• Furs for Eager Beavers

Each year, according to Federal Trade Commission estimates, more than \$50 million is swindled out of the "hides" of Americans who fall prey to "get-rich-quick" schemes, which involve raising chinchillas or investing in fur farms.

For the person who has overspent his Christmas budget or is interested in a do-it-yourself holiday project, raising chinchillas at home may seem like the perfect way to make off those debts or "grow" a fur coat for a wife or sweetheart.

Here's what happens: A salesman may knock at your door or you may read an advertisement which "talks" glowingly of the wonderful future in raising chinchillas at home.

What the salesman or the advertiser may not explain to you is that while chinchillas may be sturdy animals in their homeland—South America—when bred in damp basements, unheated garages or hot attics, their death rate is quite high.

Furthermore, sometimes they eat their own expensive fur, and sometimes the females kill the males.

Remember, before you decide on presenting your spouse or close acquaintance with a "do-it-yourself" chinchilla coat for Christmas or arrange to go into business raising chinchillas in order to pay off Christmas debts and perhaps earn some extra money at the same time, get all the facts.

However, if after careful consideration you still decide that there is money to be made from raising chinchillas, before you buy a pair for breeding, learn to distinguish the male of the species from the female.

Otherwise, you could get swindled in the same way as others have when they fell for the glib spiel of a fast-talking con artist who convinced them they could make a fortune raising chinchillas and then sold them two of the same sex.

• An Evening That Smells

This rip-off can turn into a "jewel of an experience" for

the unwary shopper who listens to the spiel of a con artist trying to make him believe that he has a "hot" diamond ring or bracelet for sale at bargain basement prices.

With the consummate skill of a veteran stage actor, the con artist often goes through a complex routine — which characteristically might include frequent, furtive glances over the shoulder, shifting of weight from one foot to the other or speaking in rapid, frightened and sometimes even whispered tones — designed to convince the mark that he is talking to an actual thief who has "hot" merchandise he wants to unload quickly.

Unfortunately, for those who succumb to this "academy-award" performance, the last act takes place in the pigeon's home when he discovers that this "hot" buy is actually a "cool" piece of worthless glass.

• An Evening That Smells

The fragrance of this great deal is quickly forgotten after the mark gets a real whiff of the rip-off that has just been pulled on him.

This "sting" normally takes place at factory gates or in shopping center parking lots or malls, and the victims, in this brief drama, are usually men who have been convinced by the con man that they are buying expensive, well-known perfumes for wives or sweethearts at prices far below retail rates.

After giving the mark a whiff from an actual bottle of expensive perfume, in order to further convince the victim that he is buying the real thing or a chemically-perfect copy, at greatly reduced prices, he sells him a bottle whose label is a carefully misspelled version of the actual product.

The purchaser, if he is very lucky, exchanges his money for an imitation or

Freeways Eyed In Snow Plan

In an attempt to reduce the number of vehicles and motorists stranded on Michigan freeways by winter snow storms, the State Police and Department of State Highways and Transportation have developed an emergency plan to close freeways in advance of heavy snow areas.

"Once or twice a winter in recent years, hundreds of motorists have been stranded for up to two or three days when heavy, drifting snow has stopped vehicles on freeways," noted State Highways and Transportation Director John P. Woodford in a news release.

"It not only is a danger to people to be stranded on an enclosed freeway, but the vehicles, often abandoned, sometimes make snow-clearing impossible.

"For these reasons, the Michigan State Police and the State Highways and Transportation Department will work closely together to determine when and where to set up roadblocks to close freeways whenever a storm makes driving extremely hazardous or impossible."

Col. Gerald L. Hough, director of State Police, emphasized that the assistance and cooperation of local police agencies in critical storm areas will be vital to the success of the emergency plan.

He explained when the decision has been made to close a freeway, the first roadblocks will be State Police cars, or vehicles from the closest local police agency.

"As soon as possible, State Police or local police vehicles will be replaced or supplemented by actual barricades brought to the point of closure by personnel of the State Highways and Transportation Department," Col. Hough said.

The emergency plan calls for roadblocks to be established at points determined to be outside the perimeters of the storm. Although vehicles in the storm area already will have been halted by snow, roadblocks will prevent additional vehicles from entering the critical area.

"In addition to the freeway closures, the plan calls for close and continual communications among state and local agencies to aid in res-

Once inside, they pilfer wallets, purses and other personal items from desks. Never leave an office unattended. Lock the door, even if you are going to be absent momentarily.

Another B-E Cleared in Case

Another burglary clearance, this time a business in St. Clair Shores, has been recorded by Woods police through the apprehension of five juveniles, ranging in age from 11 through 14, this month.

Five break-ins in The Woods have already been cleared through the arrest of three juveniles for the burglary of a Roslyn road home on Thursday, November 17.

At that time, a 14-year-old boy was nabbed by Officer Theodore Hinz. Through an ensuing investigation, which is still continuing, two other youths who allegedly entered the home were identified and then, through them, two more boys were pinpointed.

Besides the Roslyn road break-in, three burglaries of Van Antwerp road homes were cleared, plus one in Vernier road.

At this point, Youth Service Division Det. John Albrecht is handling the case involving three 14-year-olds, one 12-year-old and one 11-year-old.

Know Your Schools
 By Dr. William Coats,
 Superintendent of Schools

In last week's column, I summarized a few of the activities designed to achieve the Board of Education goal to Improve the Quality of Supervision and Administration in All Areas.

Because the scope of that goal is so broad, this column and the next one also will explain additional plans related to it.

One item that will be receiving attention as a part of the goal is the equipment inventory of the school system. A recent appraisal placed the value of our buildings' contents at \$5,595,683.

That amount represents a very large quantity of equipment and indicates the need for our plans to establish and implement procedures to upgrade and equalize the inventories of each building.

Staff members from the Division of Instruction and the Departments of Business Affairs and Support Services will be developing equipment replacement schedules and will be involved in efforts to standardize the equipment used throughout the system.

Our accounting procedures also will be somewhat changed as the transition to an accrual system of accounting and reporting is completed. To improve internal operating procedures, semi-annual and third quarter financial reports will be prepared.

The information in these reports will be used to determine how we are doing on this year's budget and should prove helpful in preparing for next year's budget.

As we begin preparing the 1979-1980 budget, the concept of zero based budgeting will be implemented to an even greater extent than what it was this past year.

Our modified zero based budgeting process involves the use of two sets of documents, one for line items which will be maintained in the budget, allowing for inflationary costs, and another to be used to increase any line item beyond that allowed for inflation.

In the second set of documents, administrators will have to present a justification for any increases and receive approval before the increases will be incorporated into the budget.

Another part of this goal is the full implementation of the annual budget cycle from development to accountability in relation to each cost center. Within the next few weeks, budget documents will be provided for administrators and they will be asked to begin accumulating cost figures for next year's budget.

Budget development will be more structured than in the past, and as estimates for each cost center are obtained, the Department of Business Affairs staff will be reviewing those estimates, so that the preparation of the final document will be more efficient.

These projects relate to the business aspect of our efforts to improve the quality of administration. In the last column devoted to this goal, I will be relating specific plans to improve the quality of our instructional supervision.

What Goes On at Your Library

Place names and their derivations have been the subject of many fascinating books for as Francis Bacon wrote, "Name though it seem but a superficial and outward matter, yet it carrieth much impression and enchantment."

SCRATCH ANKLE, USA, (A. S. Barnes, 1969), by Myron Quimby, tells how hundreds of American cities, towns, villages and hamlets got their names.

Scratch Ankle is located in Monroe County, Ala. Its unusual name came about because of the large number of yellow flies that bit the people around their ankles.

Many places have Indian names. Shawmut, Ala., is reportedly a Creek Indian word for "Living Spring," probably for a large spring that fed the stream that once flowed through the present town of Shawmut.

Shakopee, Minn., was named after Chief Shakopee, head of the Little Six Tribe of the Sioux Nation. Wau-chula, Fla., is a Seminole Indian word meaning "sandhill crane."

Pocahontas, Miss., and Pocahontas, Va., both derived their names from the daughter of Powhatan, Virginia Indian Chief of the John Smith legend.

The Spanish influence on place names is especially apparent in the Southwest. Agua Dulce, Tex., has a Spanish name meaning "sweet water." Ajo, Ariz., translates in Spanish to "garlic." Alamogordo, N.M., derived its unusual name from the cottonwood trees which lined and overlapped the streets. The name Alamogordo is Spanish and means "fat cottonwood."

A case of poor handwriting resulted in a small village in South Carolina being named Antreville. The new postmaster submitted the name Centreville to the Post Office Department in Washington, but his C looked like an A to the clerk and the Post Office accepted the name as Antreville.

Arab, Ala., was another mistake. The postmaster suggested that the new village be named Arad after his son. No one complained when the Post Office declared the name to be Arab.

Valentine, Ariz., was not named for the saint, but for a commissioner of Indian affairs. Valentine, Tex., was named when a railroad building crew reached the site on St. Valentine's Day, 1882. Valentines, Va., was named after a local merchant, William H. Valentines.

Readers will find lots of humor in this charming book that stresses the unusual and unique in place names.

George R. Stewart, a noted historian and novelist, has single-handedly put together a reference work containing some 12,000 entry-headings, AMERICAN PLACE NAMES, (Oxford University Press, 1970).

His approach is much broader than Myron Quimby's and therefore the entries are often only a line or two long. A long and excellent bibliography is contained in the first part of the book.

The arrangement is alphabetical going from AB Mountain, Ark., so called because the snow on the face of the mountain in the process of melting displays a rough outline of the two letters, to Zybra, Okla., whose name is from a colloquial word meaning a man who moved from one settlement to another.

A book by the late Walter Romig, of Grosse Pointe Park, giving the history of the founding and the naming of more than 5,000 past and present communities is MICHIGAN PLACE NAMES, (Walter Romig, no date).

The scope is comprehensive rather than selective. No Michigan community, past or present, has been intentionally omitted. In many instances the community is simply listed as to location without an explanation of how the community was named, but there are some interesting accounts of name origins.

For example, Christmas, Alger County, was given its name because a factory built there to make articles with the holiday trade in mind. Today its post office, (the community consists of one store, a post office and one house), thrives once a year at Christmas time.

Topinabee, Cheboygan County, was named for a Potawatomi chief while Rattle Run in St. Clair County was named after the creek just east of it which was so named because on quiet nights the water running over its pebbly bed made a rattling sound.

If you are curious and like the stories behind the names of our country's cities, towns and hamlets, the library has just the book for you.

One View from the Capitol

The next few weeks of session of the Michigan Legislature presents some dangers for our Grosse Pointe communities.

Because of passage of the Headlee Tax Limitation Amendment on November 7, including language prohibiting the state from imposing new or added burden on local units, there may be attempts to add such burdens before the December 22 date Headlee takes effect.

Chief among the threatened measures is one to reduce the standard work week for firefighters from 56 hours to 54 hours.

While there are some valid reasons for such a reduction, primarily to try to clear up confusion between state and federal law, there would be appreciable costs to local units because of required payment of additional "overtime."

My attempt on this and similar measures will be to delay action until after December 22 or to require that the state pick up the added costs.

Our communities, local governments, provide the most basic and essential government services. Especially since most are at maximum millage already, with little or no space left for expansion to provide any growth in their tax base, it is necessary that the state stop forcing added expenditures on our local units.

I suggest you may want to write your state senators to voice your opinion on this issue. The last few weeks of any legislative session are dangerous because pressures of special interests and of time combine to make hasty and ill-conceived decisions in a rush to adjournment.

Don't pin your faith on first guesses until you have given your decision a second thought.

Air Beethoven DSO Festival

For the first time in television history all nine Beethoven symphonies—complete with interpretive commentary by conductor Antal Dorati and hosted by E. G. Marshall—will come to one public TV series.

Produced by Detroit's WTVS/56, A Beethoven Festival with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra premieres the week of January 6 on PBS.

A Beethoven Festival marks the first time the entire symphonic repertoire of a major composer has been contained in one TV series.

Performances of the symphonies by the DSO were videotaped during the two-week Beethoven Festival in November, 1977, commemorating the 150th anniversary of the composer's death.

Each festival program will open with Marshall and Dorati at appropriate locations in the Detroit area, discussing the content of each symphony before its performance.

For instance, before the Sixth Symphony which Dorati calls a symphony of nature, the setting is pastoral, on the grounds of Cranbrook Institute. For the Ninth Symphony, which conjures up images of odes and church hymns, the filming was done at Old Mariner's Church.

During these discussions many interesting facts about Beethoven, the man, come to light. Dorati says that as well as being a relatively unattractive man Beethoven was rough and ill-mannered.

Dorati also mentions how Beethoven's advancing deafness may have been to his, and our, advantage. "He (Beethoven) listened with his soul," says Dorati. "His struggles, his problems, his tragedy actually became our blessings."

The rich and fascinating masterworks of Beethoven have always excited and uplifted both musical connoisseurs and casual listeners in the audience, however Dorati advises that Beethoven's symphonies are not to be taken lightly.

(Continued from Page 24) didate for the presidency of the national Gerontological Society, gave the Haak-Lilliefors Memorial Lecture, a tribute to early proponents of community planning and programs for an aging population.

"There are more old people in America today," Brody noted. "The proportion of older people to care-giving relatives is greater."

"Older people are older. So, instead of family members accommodating a 50 to 60-year-old grandmother, they are actually serving people in the 75 to 95-year bracket."

"This comes when the adult children, themselves, are older. They are middle aged or aging and this limits their capacity to engage in care-giving activities."

"Today, the American couple whose children are grown often find the 'empty nest' refilled by very old people in need of care."

The Haak-Lilliefors Memorial Lecture which honors the late Leo A. Haak and Manfred Lilliefors, both of whom had been members of the Michigan State University faculty, was founded by the Institute for Community Development of MSU's Lifelong Education Programs and the Edgewood United Church.

In addition to presenting an annual public lecture by an authority in the aging field, it provides for the speaker's expert consultation with area agencies and groups involved in caring and planning for the aged. It is supported by public contributions.

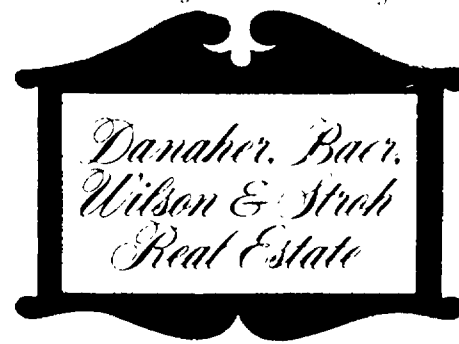

Five Municipalities' Share Of Highway Fund Drops

The five Pointes will share a total of \$184,532 from the gas and weight tax revenue for the three months of the 1977-78 fiscal year ending September 30, as compared to a total of \$189,859 for the third quarter of the 1976-77 fiscal year, it was reported by the State Highway Commission. This marks a drop of \$5,327.

The commission noted that the growth rate in state gas and weight tax revenue continued to decline during the fiscal year.

New highs in auto registration and highway travel pushed income from the nine-cent-a-gallon gas tax to a record \$413.7 million, up from \$402.6 million in the 1976-77 fiscal year. However, the 27 percent increase was down from the 437 percent rise between 1976 and 1977.

A 7.2 percent increase in diesel fuel sale boosted revenues from that source to \$24.5 million, producing a 2.9 percent gain in revenue for all motor fuels, or a total of \$438.49 million, (including \$274,000 from sales of liquified petroleum gas).

Weight tax income from license plate sales climbed by \$6.35 million to \$173.4 million, also a record. The 3.8 percent jump compared with a 5.7 percent increase in the previous year.

Highway department officials attributed the slowdown to increased number of lighter weight automobiles.

A breakdown of the five Pointes in the 1977 third quarter are as follows: The Woods, \$67,991; The Park, \$48,901; The Farms, \$39,861; The City, \$22,067; and The Shores, \$11,039.

For the same period this year, the Pointes will receive the following amounts: The Woods, \$66,087; The Park, \$47,533; The Farms, \$38,738; The City, \$21,448; and The Shores, \$10,726.

Income from all highway user taxes, which make up

the State Motor Vehicle Highway Fund, totaled \$629.34 million, up by 3.4 percent. However, income deducted for various grants and administrative costs tallied a record \$66.77 million, up by \$11.79 million, or 21.5 percent from the previous year.

A large share of the increase was the cost of manufacturing 1979 license plates, the first in Michigan in three years.

Money remaining for construction and maintenance on the 116,000 miles of state highways, county roads and municipal streets tallied \$562.27 million.

"That is an increase of only 1.6 percent, while costs are mounting by about 10 percent a year," said former Commission Chairman Peter B. Fletcher of Ypsilanti.

"It is this continuing decline in revenue growth and increase in costs that caused the legislature to enact a transportation package that provides \$111 million more for our roads and highways. This added income will enable us to keep up with inflation for a few years, nothing more."

In the July-September quarter this year, revenue from motor fuel taxes tallied \$118.78 million, an increase of \$6 million, or five percent. Weight tax revenue declined from \$8.31 million to \$7.95 million, or 4.4 percent, during the same period.

Grants and administrative costs, including manufacturing of new 1979 license plates, came to \$21.47 million, up by 109 percent.

The amount remaining from the distribution to the Department of State Highways and Transportation, the 83 county road commissions and the 531 incorporated cities and villages tallied \$110.93 million, down \$3.56 million, or 3.1 percent, from the July-September quarter last year.

The state's share comes to \$49,087,888, or 44.5 percent; the counties, \$39,651,501, or 35.7 percent; and the municipalities, \$22,188,494, or 19.8 percent.

As its share of the highway fund for the 1977 quarter, Wayne County received \$6,355,964, as compared to \$5,992,523, for the same third quarter this year, a decrease of \$363,441.

Police Accuse Errant Driver

Michael Joseph O'Hara of St. Clair Shores was arrested by Shores public safety officers on Friday, November 24, and charged with reckless driving. He is scheduled for an appearance in the Shores Municipal Court on January 10.

According to an official report submitted by PSO Michael Kortas and Daniel Healy, while patrolling south on Lakeshore road at 12:02 a.m., the officers observed a vehicle traveling north on the road at an extremely excessive speed.

They focused the scout car's MR9 radar unit on the approaching auto and locked in the speed at 61 mph. Lakeshore is zoned for 35 mph.

PSO's Kortas and Healy said they locked in the speed as the car neared Lochmoor boulevard and turned at the crossover, and they gave chase. They said they saw the driver come to a stop at a red traffic signal at the Vernier road intersection and as they neared the auto, the light changed and the driver took off at a high speed. The scout car flashers were activated as the chase continued.

From Roslyn road to Fairlake lane, the officers stated the radar unit showed that the driver, later identified as O'Hara, was travelling at 75 mph. From a distance, PSO's Kortas and Healy said they observed the vehicle straddling the lane and then change lanes several times, slow to 60 mph and then accelerated to 80 mph from the north Village limits to Doremus and Jefferson. St. Clair Shores.

At Doremus, it was said, O'Hara abruptly put on the brakes and tried to make a quick left turn onto Doremus, at which point his car spun out and wound up facing eastward.

The chase and the spinning auto was witnessed by a St. Clair Shores scout car crew, who arrived to render assistance if it was needed.

PSO's Kortas and Healy got out of their scout car and ordered O'Hara out, informing him he was under arrest for reckless driving. O'Hara was taken to The Shores station where he was formally charged and required to post a bond of \$75, pending a court appearance, and he was then released.

Patient Recovery Subject Of Bon Secours Confab

Bon Secours Hospital's Pastoral Care Conference, held Friday, November 10, drew almost 100 local church representatives to explore ways that local churches can support patients during and after a hospital experience.

The program was titled, "Pastoral Care in The Hospital—and Beyond."

Conferees, both clergy and laity, met with hospital staff to consider ways in which faith or values influence the healing process. Ways to help patients who have returned home or been admitted to a nursing home or a hospice were also discussed.

Hospices are organizations specially designed to meet the needs of terminal patients and their families. This relatively new concept was presented by the Rev. Peter Keese, president of the Hospice of North Carolina and the chaplain-supervisor at Duke University Medical Center.

"The hospice concept is not about death with dignity," said Rev. Keese, "it is about living life fully until life ends."

Rev. Keese outlined the primary characteristics of the successful hospice organization, stressing the importance of enabling patients to make significant decisions about their lives.

Participants also heard from Patricia Sikora, director of Bon Secours department of social work, who discussed the factors involved when an individual is admitted to a nursing home.

"Very often, a family will turn to their clergyman for guidance and support," she said, "and the church can be

a valuable resource to patients and families facing difficult decisions."

Miss Sikora stressed the importance of cooperation between local churches and health care professionals in assisting patients and families.

The significance of a patient's faith, from the viewpoint of the physician and surgeon, was discussed by Donald N. Sweeney Jr., MD, president of Bon Secours Hospital's medical staff, who encouraged the role of the clergy in caring for a patient's total well-being.

Bon Secours pastoral care department plans to offer future programs on topics related to community parishes and the vital link they provide for patients and families facing a hospital experience.

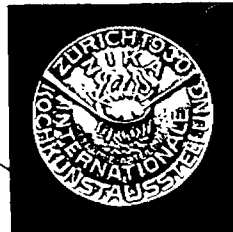

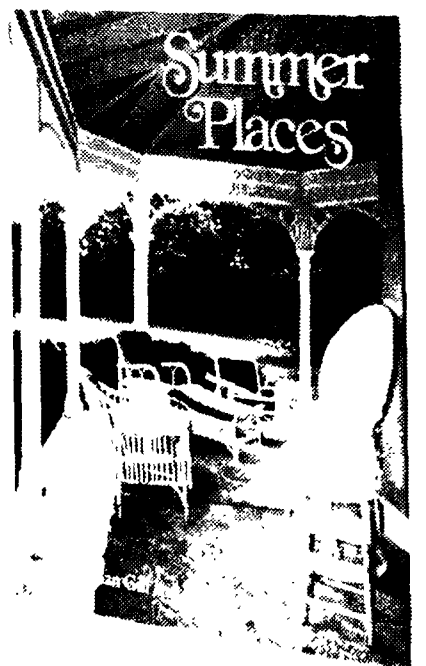
