Thursday, August 2
THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES approved a bill that gives President Jimmy Carter the authority to order standby rationing if fuel allocation supplies fall 20 percent below the previous year. However, either house in Congress could stop Mr. Carter's rationing plan within 15 days after he orders it. Congressional leaders indicated that there is "little chance" of putting the bill into effect that would be acceptable to the President until September. Congressmen will take a month-long congressional recess beginning next week.

Friday, August 3
NEW YORK YANKEES' catcher Thurman Munson was killed after trying to land a private plane near Akron, O. Two other passengers survived the crash with only minor burns. Officials said the plane lost its wings and burst into flames upon impact. Mr. Munson, 32, had just purchased the twin-engine Cessna Citation jet and was practicing takeoffs and landings when the crash occurred. A native of Canton, O., he was named the American League's most valuable player in 1976. Billy Martin, Yankee manager, reportedly "cried like a baby" when he heard of Mr. Munson's death.

Saturday, August 4
THE UAW TOLD Chrysler President Lee Iacocca that it cannot "seriously accept" Chrysler's request of a two-year freeze on wages and benefit costs. Under the plan, Chrysler would only pay for rising health costs. UAW President Douglas Fraser said such a freeze would mean a 25 percent reduction in purchasing power for Chrysler workers in light of a 12 1/2 percent inflation rate.

Sunday, August 5
GOV. WILLIAM G. MILLIKEN'S veto of \$5.5 million in state funds to keep Wayne County Circuit and Common Pleas Courts operating until the end of the year brought angry responses from legislators. Some lawmakers said the veto will mean drastic cutbacks in services, while others accused the Governor of "holding Wayne County hostage." Chief Wayne County Circuit Judge Richard Dunn indicated half days and layoffs for employees would result from the veto.

Monday, August 6
A DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY report blames the U.S. government and not the oil firms for "spot shortages and long lines at service stations." The report attributed much of the problem to the government's method of keeping prices down, while trying to operate under the system with which gasoline is allocated to service stations. Earlier, there were charges that the oil companies were trying to hoard supplies in order to increase the price of gas at the pump. The department will, however, probe into possible anti-trust violations on the part of oil firms.

Tuesday, August 7
EGYPTIAN PRIME MINISTER Mustapha Khalil stunned Israel Monday by declaring Egypt would support a change in a key United Nations resolution giving the Palestinians the right to self-determination. Israel said such amendments would nullify its peace treaty with Egypt. Israeli sources said Israel viewed the statements by the Egyptian minister seriously, despite a later clarification in which Khalil, according to the Israelis, said he did not mean Egypt would support a unilateral change in the resolution, but would seek to amend it only after consultations with the Jewish state.

A final decision on what firm will operate the system will be made around September 14, and a specific War Memorial proposal will then be submitted to the city councils, said John Rickel, chairman of the Center's Cable TV committee, last week.

Park, Board Attorneys Enter Wayburn Battle

Birth of NEWS Includes Some 'Panic'

Amid the hustle and bustle of trying to publish the first issue, a hand-delivered letter was received by Mr. Edgar the day before publication, throwing personnel into "a state resembling panic."

The letter, from the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club commodore, requested Mr. Edgar to change the name of the newspaper from its previously intended "Grosse Pointer" as that was the name of a club publication, which had been used continuously since May 14, 1936.

Saying the name had been registered with the Library of Congress, copyright office of the United States of America, in Washington, he noted the proposed adoption of a similar name could raise the possibility of confusion.

As a result, he requested that Mr. Edgar desist from using the name "Grosse Pointer," to protect everyone from "needless embarrassment."

The letter from the commodore was published in the first edition along with Mr. Edgar's reply in which, despite sharing several concerns, he said, "We bow to the wishes of your club to keep the name of its publication undiluted. We have made the necessary changes, we hope, and trust there will be no more tramping of toes."

In his letter, Mr. Edgar reflected upon how the name was selected and the effect of the club's communication on his publication plans.

"The name for our weekly newspaper in the Grosse Pointes was selected by those of us who, some three weeks ago, at which time none of us had any knowledge that another publication with the same name was in existence," said Mr. Edgar.

"Since then we have brought out a dummy issue of 1,000 copies, which have been distributed freely in the Grosse Pointes and in the

City of Detroit. There has been considerable talk about the new publication throughout all the Pointes. An office has been rented, phone and light service installed, all under the name of The Grosse Pointer.

"Some 10 days ago the fact that the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club issued a small house organ to its members under this same name, was brought to our attention.

"As we were about to register this name, we consulted with our lawyers. We were told that in the first place, they could see no possibility of any conflict between the two publications (with which we agreed), and that if the club had not registered the name in the courthouse here, we were legally entitled to its use.

"There was no such registration and we thereupon had the name registered ourselves and went ahead with all plans for publication, with no intention, we assure you, of encroaching upon any rights or privileges of your club.

"We wish most earnestly that the club's objection, which we still don't understand, might have been lodged before we had a hand-drawn name and masthead executed, before we had set in type an entire paper of ads, news and editorial matter filled with the original name.

"We wish that we hadn't been forced to waste so much time and spend so much money just a few hours before going to press, frantically making changes to avoid bringing harm to your club. We wish most of all that our lawyers had properly covered all angles of the point in dispute."

Meanwhile, anxious to develop news sources, a short story located near the lead story in a one-column box contained the headline, "Ladies and Gentlemen: Do You Have Any News?"

Stressing the need to discover any news sources who may have been overlooked in the first issue, the story cites a key objective by saying, "We want to do the very best job we can toward printing all the news that occurs in the Grosse Pointes. We'd like the cooperation of everyone." What was said then, still holds true today.

In addition to his home in The Pointe, he also maintained a summer home in the Poconos on Lake Wallenpaupack, Pa.

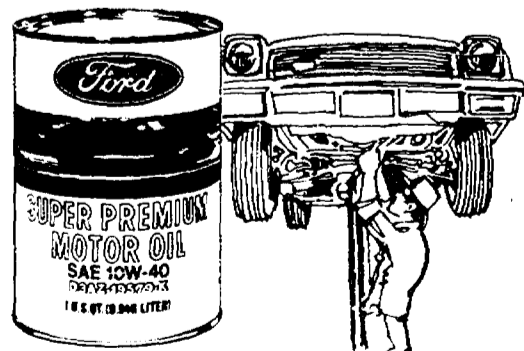

Advantages, Concerns Cited over Traffic Law

If you've been lucky enough to avoid getting a ticket since Wednesday, August 1, you probably haven't even noticed that a big change was made that day in the state traffic law — a change that makes the law more "sensible" in its dealings with drivers, according to local officials.

Police all over Michigan are now using new forms to cite bad drivers for minor traffic violations that have become civil — rather than misdemeanor — infractions under the new law.

While misdemeanors carry fines and possible jail sentences, the new civil law will only allow fines to be assessed. Motorists will be required to contact the court in person, by mail or telephone to enter one of three possible pleas after they've received a ticket.

Drivers can 1), admit responsibility, 2), admit responsibility with explanation or 3), deny responsibility and schedule either a formal or informal hearing before a judge.

The State Police Department says initial reaction from law enforcement officials has been supportive of the "decriminalization" of most traffic violations. The new law is expected to reduce the present backlog in the court system.

Local officials appear to share that opinion.

"The decriminalization is long overdue," said Farms Police Chief Robert Ferber.

"I don't think forgetting to put a penny in a parking meter is a 90-day offense. The new law recognizes that," he said.

City Public Safety Director Bruce Kennedy agreed. "I think the intent of the law is well founded. Someone who violates the speed limit really isn't a criminal and the law takes that stigma away."

But even the State Police acknowledge that the "full scope" of the new law is not yet known and, in the meantime, many of those "unknown" features are throwing the local court systems into confusion.

Chief Ferber says Grosse Pointe courts in particular will have trouble interpreting their new roles in traffic enforcement because they are some of the few municipal court systems left in the state. Most small courts have become district agencies.

"The entire decriminaliza-

tion procedure is geared toward a district court operation — a full-time court," Chief Ferber said. "In Grosse Pointe, we don't have judges around all day, every day so people can come in and make their pleas so the law's impact on us will be far greater."

City Municipal Judge Stan Kozlowski said the new system "is a headache" and noted "we're not really sure how to handle it." Woods Municipal Judge J. Patrick Denis speculated the new procedure could "double our paperwork," but said it might reduce the amount of time spent in court.

Farms Municipal Judge Robert Pytell wants to give the new law some "time and patience." He plans to call a meeting of all Pointe judges and police chiefs in about two months to discuss the procedure.

Much of the confusion centers around the hearing process itself. An informal hearing on any citation may be held before a judge with no attorneys present. The judge may determine what "sanction" or fine to levy at that time.

If the motorist requests, a formal hearing may follow under the same general rules. That is where local judges are confounded by the law.

In a district court, it would be simple for one judge to preside at the informal hearing and another to sit in at the formal hearing. But the Pointe's municipal courts are one-judge operations—and, obviously, one judge cannot preside at both hearings.

Judge Denis said he believes drivers will have to go to Wayne County Circuit Court for their second hearings—"just as they would for any appeal from my bench."

But the other judges appear to have a different answer, a kind of "rotation system" by which they would preside at each others' formal hearings.

The officials are in agreement on one thing, though. The new process will take more of their time. The judges will be responsible for reading and processing written and telephoned arguments about citations, as well as the hearings.

Not all traffic violations have been decriminalized under the law. Some, such as drunk driving, reckless driving and various operator license infractions, will continue to be misdemeanors.

Another big change brought by the law is that juveniles will be processed in district or municipal courts for civil violations, rather than Probate Court.

Drivers who fail to appear in court for their hearings can be found in default and face an assessment of penalty points under the law.

The law, Public Act 510, was approved in 1978 and amended this July.

Offers Booklet On Insulation

A free booklet on home insulation is being offered by the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulation.

The booklet, prepared by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, (CPSC), describes the hazards of different types of insulation, explains how to figure the amount you need to use, offers insulation and safety tips for the do-it-yourselfer and suggests precautions for people buying insulation.

William Ballenger, department director and Michigan coordinator for product safety information, arranged to have the booklets distributed free in Michigan because so many citizens are now considering insulating their homes to cut winter fuel costs and conserve energy resources.

New Info Cited in Helin Fire

New information has come forth concerning the fire which destroyed the late millionaire Charles Helin's mansion in Windmill Pointe drive and claimed the life of a City firefighter last March.

Investigators later found that the blaze was arson-related.

Sgt. Raymond Brotebeck of the State Police Fire Marshal Division said the East Detroit Fire Department received an anonymous phone call stating that a former employee of Mr. Helin might have been involved in the fire.

Information on the call was later forwarded to the Fair Police Department, which is conducting an investigation.

Det. Robert Saiford did not say why the caller telephoned the East Detroit Fire Department.

Over 50 firefighters battled the blaze which gutted the four-story lakefront home. City Fireman Richard Tucker was killed when a brick wall collapsed on him.

Park Fire Chief Phillip M. Costa said the fire was the worst in his 29 years with the department.

Mr. Helin was traveling in China at the time of the fire.

SOC Obtains \$3,000 Grant To Study Needs of Seniors

They are "the hidden people with the hidden problems" who often become a burden to their children and to the community, according to Elaine Reid, social worker at Cottage Hospital.

The hidden people are senior citizens, some of whom, she said, keep their problems and concerns to themselves and often refuse outside help.

One local group, Seniors Onward for Change, Inc. (SOC), has been endeavoring to solve those hidden problems and bring some real answers to seniors living in The Pointe and Harper Woods.

SOC was founded about two years ago through the Out-Wayne County Senior Citizens Nutrition Center, housed in the Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church, 19950 Mack avenue. It presently provides area seniors with a minor home repairs and chores program specializing in fixing leaky faucets, installing light fixtures and caulking windows among other tasks for a nominal fee.

SOC President Bert Francis said, however, that his organization recently received a \$3,000 grant from the Wayne County Area Agency on Aging to look at the feasibility of SOC cooperating with existing agencies that serve seniors.

The purpose of this would be to see if SOC could improve or build upon services it currently provides for seniors.

Ms. Reid was selected as program developer for SOC to give the group guidance and insight into discovering the needs of seniors so that SOC can be in better touch with the elderly, Mr. Francis said.

"What we have to do is ask ourselves what do we see the needs of the elderly to be?" Mrs. Reid explained.

She added that in the coming three months she will meet with those involved in other agencies to discover their thoughts and interpretations of seniors' needs.

Some areas that will be explored include library services, home care for the ill, housekeeping services, food preparation and educational, social and recreational needs.

Mr. Francis pointed out that SOC serves approximate-

ly 110 seniors a day on the phone and that neighbors are the ones who usually inform SOC of problems seniors are having.

Four new members also have been elected to the SOC board of directors. They are Marian Goodhand of The Woods, Susan Kinnaird of The Farms, Robert Matthew of Harper Woods and Terry Treiber of The City.

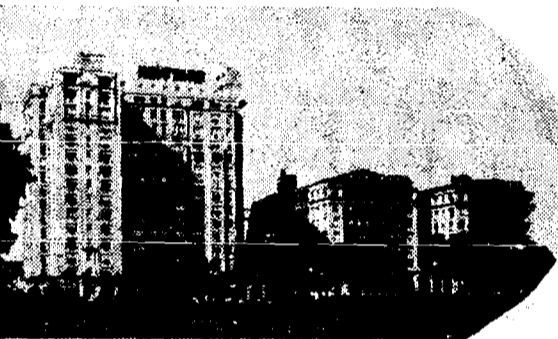

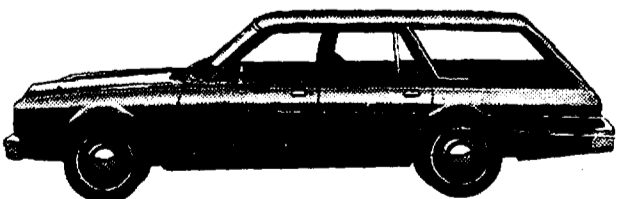

 tive bureau, plus the fact that each community has its own labor contracts with police and fire personnel.
 In a memo to Woods City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, YSD coordinator, Director Dankel cited several reasons the chiefs gave for supporting the programs, (although Shores Public Safety Director Joseph Vitale expressed reservations on some of the concepts).
 These include the following:

- Such a unified arrangement would be considerably more effective and efficient.
- Unification would allow for significant improvement in specialized services.
- There would be improved communication between the area departments.
- Makes Sense
- There would be considerably more flexibility in detective manpower allocation and utilization.
- Duplication of services would be eliminated.
- It appears that this area will inevitably have a district court system with a centralized court location. It makes sense to centralize these other functions, he concluded.

Director Dankel also pointed out, (concurring with by Director Vitale), that while The Shores public safety director supports the concept of unified services, it is his opinion that the nature of his operation would not permit direct participation.

For instance, their one detective also must function at times on the shifts, handling uniform functions, so he would be unable to be committed full time to a unified investigative unit.

While some of these concepts have been discussed before, e.g., centralized dispatching, a district court system for the Pointes looms as a great possibility and the idea of having a central records system and a central lock-up makes sense to the officials.

For the board of managers of the YSD, whose structure remains in existence, (with the division functioning on paper only), the information garnered from the meeting should be helpful when they meet to explore the report on Monday, August 20.

Makes Points
 With the exception of Director Vitale and Harper Woods Police Chief Nicholas Mayer, interest was expressed in having some type of area-wide juvenile investigative service, while all police officials in varying degrees felt the consolidation of other services should be explored.

Farms Police Chief Robert Ferber, a strong supporter of the YSD, said he made three points at the meeting.

One was that he wanted to see the YSD itself continue but this isn't apparently feasible. Another is a YSD-type concept juvenile investigative branch which would provide the community with a strong public information program, plus a counseling service. Yet another, which he said wasn't cost effective, was to hire an

additional man and assign him as youth officer.

Feeling that Wayne County Juvenile Court was "worthless" to his city, the chief said the gap left by the YSD program, including its counseling service, needs to be filled.
 Chief Ferber also indicated the idea of consolidated services was worthy of further discussions in relation to costs.

Would Be Help
 Meanwhile, City Public Safety Director Bruce Kennedy said he's always interested in improving services in relation to cost factors.

"We predicated most of the proposals on some type of federal or state funding," he pointed out, while noting The City could survive on its own in relation to handling juvenile cases.

However, he did express some interest in consolidated juvenile investigative services, depending on conditions of financing.

He felt a consolidated detective bureau would lend itself to a more efficient operation, e.g., more surveillance capabilities and more of a free flow of information. And with a district court system on the horizon, Director Kennedy indicated a central lock-up or dispatching system could be viable alternatives.

Park Police Chief Henry Counce stated he, too, is interested in consolidated juvenile investigative services, saying the YSD provided nine years of excellence in this area.

In the other areas of potential unified cooperation, the chief, in taking a broad view, said there's a duplication of services, while feeling there could be improvement in the free exchange of information between local detective bureaus.

He also indicated with a consolidation concept, improvements in equipment would follow.

On Saving Money
 Director Vitale said he wasn't interested in consolidated juvenile investigative services because his department can perform such duties itself.

"We have two excellent officers, Michael Kenyon and Gary Mitchell," he stated, while adding, "I can't see letting the good talent my men possess go unused."

On a proposal from Mr. Petersen, which The Woods would consider contracting on an individual basis with interested municipalities, (plus the school system), to provide juvenile services, Director Vitale said it would be a waste of money for The Shores to participate.

"My main concern is to save tax dollars. Efficiency and good law enforcement is the name of the game. Why should I buy a service I can do myself?" he said.

The director added he is keeping an open mind on a central lock-up concept, which could be a by-product of a transition to a district court system. As for a unified area-wide juvenile counseling program, he said he can understand a need for this, while feeling it might be eyed in conjunction with the Grosse Pointe Volunteer Probation Program.

In saying his department has its own juvenile program and youth officer, Chief Mayer felt the concept of consolidated facilities would be an asset to the communities.

Stressing that feasibility studies and monies available for any proposals must be considered, he indicated all the communities have different problems which must be viewed in relation to enforcement, e.g., Harper Woods with its Eastland Center facility.

TAX TIP IF YOU SELL FOR A PROFIT

Normally, taxpayers who sell their home for a substantial profit face a heavy tax load, but this burden can be avoided. If you buy another home that costs as much or more than the sales price of the old one, within a specified time, the profit from the sale is not included in your taxable income.

The second home must be bought and occupied within a period ending 18 months after the sale. A 2-year period is permitted when building a new home. This tax deferral applies only to the sale of a home which is the family's main residence.

When figuring the amount of gain for which tax may be postponed you may deduct for "fix-up" expenses if they were accomplished within 90 days prior to the sale, and paid for no later than 30 days after the sale. Check with your accountant or the IRS on details if this matter affects you. It could be well worth your while.

At age 55, you qualify for the big bonanza—a one-time \$100,000 exclusion of capital gain from the sale of your principal residence. This latest change is retroactive to July 26, 1978.

(Continued from Page 1) bunal with their complaint, but that agency ruled it did not have jurisdiction in the case because it was a boundary dispute.

The plaintiffs in the case are listed simply as "Residents on The West Side of Wayburn Street." They are represented by attorney Roger D. Young.

The Park Council and Board of Education decided to intervene in the case in June, at the request of Mr. Young. They submitted briefs on Thursday, July 26, Detroit's answer is due two weeks from that date. A ruling will be handed down by

Judge Ronald Olzark sometime after that.

The Park has asked that the boundary be moved 33 feet from where it is now to a line 200 feet east of the center of Alter road. That 33-foot change will put the homes, inside The Park.

In arguing the case, Park attorneys refer to the initial legislation that created the Village of Grosse Pointe Park in 1907, and other legal action taken over the years.

Carl Rashid Jr., attorney for Detroit, said he's not impressed with The Park's arguments.

"We've been working with the boundary the way it is for more than 50 years," Mr. Rashid said. "I'm surprised the City of Grosse Pointe Park will attack its own boundaries, described as such in its own charter."

If the west Wayburn residents should lose their case before Judge Olzark, the boundary will presumably remain the same as it has been.

That will mean that the homeowners there will continue to be able to send their children to schools in The Pointe and use Park recreation facilities.

(Continued from Page 1) (WCEDC), indicating its willingness to issue the necessary industrial revenue bonds for the project.

Although The Farms recently established an economic development corporation of its own, (chiefly to issue bonds for the proposed parking structure On-the-Hill), financing a cable system locally would necessitate the establishment of EDCs in all the communities, a long and tedious process.

Mr. Rickett said he doesn't foresee any problems with using the WCEDC, and, because it is hoped the system will be on line by next summer, the Wayne County corporation seemed the best way to go.

Shores Left out He said the committee appreciated the time and concern of the councilmen who are on the committee. (Each city council has appointed one of its members as a representative on the committee.)

The Shores will be left out of any War Memorial plan, since the Village has granted a franchise to Cox Cable Communications, Inc., one of the five largest cable TV firms in the country.

Cox also is one of the firms which has been approached by the Center to act as management for its system.

Others are McLean Hunter, Teleprompter, Metro Communications, United Video, Booth, Continental Cablevision and Detroit-based Mega Vision, Inc.

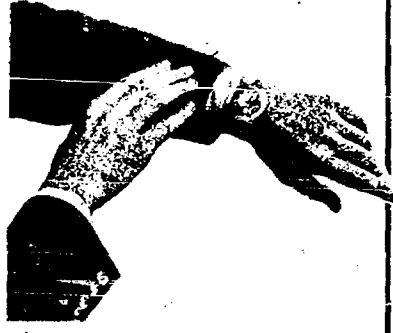

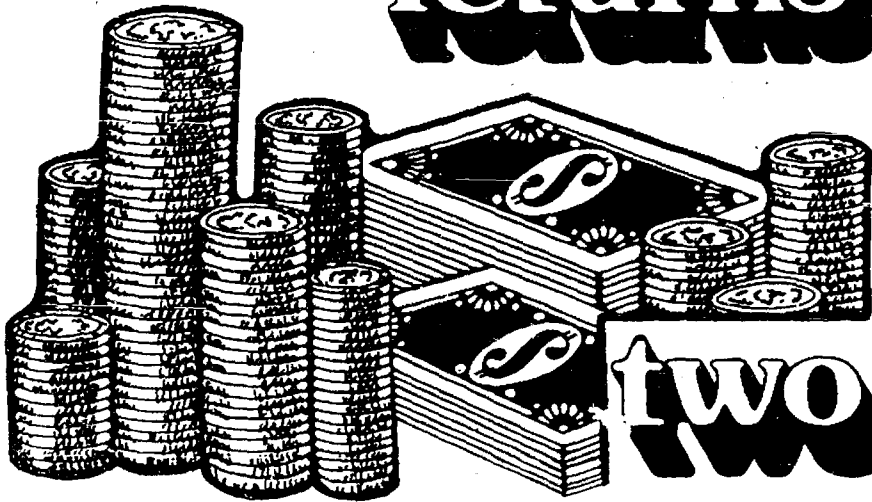

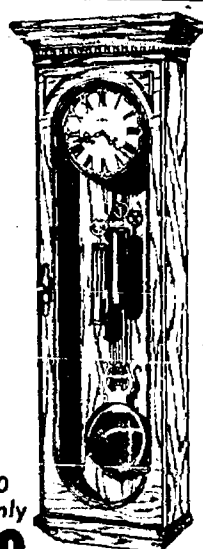

(Continued from Page 1) pleased that the Mack avenue blight study project was approved.

As for the timetable of the study, Mr. Luedtke had earlier said that the first phase, one of data gathering, should begin sometime this month and continue through the fall. Then, necessary "indoor work" will transpire over the winter and, by spring, he hopes the study will be completed.

On the project, City Administrator Chester E. Petersen called it "one of the greatest things ever to happen for Mack avenue."

Meanwhile, probation program officials requested the Woods to give favorable consideration to paying its share, based on population, of the program's anticipated 1979-80 fiscal year budget of \$34,861.65. The city's share would be \$12,985.96.

After being contacted by program officials, Mr. Pinkos called the Committee of the Whole meeting last month because probation personnel felt the city "let them down."

More Willing

Besides a majority of the council, Woods Municipal Judge J. Patrick Denis, City Attorney George Catlin and Mr. Petersen attended. While funding was the main topic, the council also explored further facts on probation service to the community and heard from Judge Denis on both the program's tangible and intangible benefits.

As a result, the council decided to have this subject placed on the council agenda. Funds for supporting the program weren't included in the city's 1979-80 fiscal year budget. Rather, \$3,000 was specified to go through Wayne County on a per case basis.

But after the meeting, with new information being presented and discussed, the council appeared more willing to consider the request.



"We need Salem Square. We have to walk to the store because we cannot drive. No body thinks about older people," she said.

At one point during the meeting, Mr. Dingeman recommended adopting a resolution that indicated council support for Salem Square, but Councilman W. James Mast pointed out that it was a bad idea, especially if Salem Square does not renew its lease.

"It would show that the council is biased to whoever does sign the lease," he said.

"Hill Will Crumble"

He added that the best interests of the council would be to pursue the Salem Square issue through the parking situation and possibly a zoning restriction on a 24-hour business, if that indeed is the case.

Residents, however, did not seem too pleased with the council's recommendation. But Mrs. Waugaman told residents that they should write Mr. Mannino and tell him of their support for Salem Square.

One Farms resident, Helen Howard, expressed her concern about what might happen to the Hill if a discount drug store appeared.

"It's not just Salem Square who's involved in this. It's all of us. If a drug store moves in, it will scare away the Hill's business. Pretty soon, the Hill will crumble."

Bon Secours Gets Okay To Build New Facility

 Bon Secours Hospital last month received permission from the state health director to build its second satellite facility, a family practice center and residency program in Eight Mile road near Eastland Shopping Center.
 The new facility will provide a central laboratory for all Bon Secours' centers as well as deliver primary care services and physical therapy. Hospital officials said they expect construction of the \$900,000 facility to be "well

underway" before this winter. Its opening is scheduled for mid-1980.
 It will be Bon Secours' third family practice center and its second satellite facility. Family practice centers are currently located in the main hospital, 468 Cadieux road, and at the St. Clair Shores satellite, 25901 Jefferson avenue.

The new facility will be located at 19101 East Eight Mile road. It will initially be staffed by three family staff physicians and six resident physicians, according to a release from the state Department of Public Health.
 The state health director's decision, announced Thursday, August 2, coincided with a recommendation from the Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Southeastern Michigan.

Bon Secours is bound by a 1971 Wayne County Circuit Court agreement not to expand on property adjacent and contiguous to its present location in The City until 1986.

The hospital's last building expansion cost \$25 million and increased its bed capacity to 320. It was completed last year.

Earlier this year, Bon Secours' board of trustees reportedly were considering the purchase of Grosse Pointe Public School System's Administration Building, 389 St. Clair avenue. In June, the Board voted against that purchase, saying it would violate the "spirit" if not the "letter" of its non-expansion agreement with The City.

The hospital purchased Lakeview Public School System's administration office in Jefferson avenue and converted it to a family practice satellite center in 1977.

Cottage Graduates 24 From Co-Op Program

Twenty-four students from South and North High Schools graduated recently from the Cottage Hospital Medical-Coop program.

The program, now in its 11th year, trains students to become nurses' aides and orderlies. It was developed in cooperation with the Grosse Pointe Public School System.

The 1979 graduating class, the largest in several years, had the highest class grade point average in recent memory. All students were offered part-time positions at the hospital as aides and orderlies.

The medical co-op program at Cottage requires students to complete 180 hours of classroom and clinical work within five weeks.

"Many of our former students are now engaged in health care of all types at Cottage Hospital and other area hospitals," said Cottage administrator Ralph Wilgarde. "This year, for example, Scott Spagnoli of The Shores, who received his orderly training at Cottage and participated in several other educational programs, graduated from medical school."

"We believe this program is invaluable in giving young people practical experience in hospital work," he added.

Parents and friends of the graduates, as well as counselors and officials from the school system gathered at graduation ceremonies and a reception.

This year, graduates chose to cap and gown themselves in hospital scrub uniforms and disposable head-gear for the ceremonies. Each graduate received a gold pin, a certificate and a mug commemorating the hospital's 60th anniversary.

ARK Offers Campers Hints

With the camping season well underway, ARK Humane Education Service, an animal welfare organization, has several suggestions for campers.

If you see a baby animal or bird in the woods, ARK says, leave it alone. Many young animals are mistaken as abandoned when the mother is unseen waiting for humans to leave. If you actually see the mother killed, contact the nearest conservation officer.

Never make a pet out of a wild animal. When they mature they do not make good pets.

Pick up all litter, even that which is not yours. Pop can tabs and ringed plastic six-pack holders can be very dangerous to wildlife if they get caught in them. In fact, cut through the rings of the plastic holders before you properly discard them.

Do not allow children to use birds and animals as targets for B-B guns, bows and arrows and rocks. Songbirds are protected by law and there are hunting laws designed to insure the propagation of species.

Never abandon a pet dog or cat in the woods or farmland. Most times they starve to death or die of disease. A few farm packs and harm wildlife.

Feral animals, family pets gone wild, do not know how to kill. Any wild creature they attack will suffer. Take unwanted pets to animal shelters.

Never tie a pet to a vehicle. Motorists have forgotten they did this and driven off dragging the pet behind. Always keep a pet on a leash when a car door is opened, especially at a rest stop along a highway.

Never leave a pet in a campsite unattended. Pets are stolen this way, or they may bite someone.

Know Your Schools

By Dr. William Coats, Superintendent of Schools

Recent newspaper reports have called attention to the problem of the rapidly rising costs of furnishing automobiles and fuel for driver education programs.

Since our system offers driver education classes and is affected by some of the problems detailed in these reports, I think it is timely to briefly summarize our program for readers of this column.

Driver education classes are taught throughout the school year, but the greatest number of our students enroll in classes conducted in the summer months.

For example, during two four-week sessions conducted at North High School this summer, 540 parochial, private and public high school students residing in the school district boundaries have modified their summer schedule of activities so that they can meet the requirements to obtain a driver education certificate of completion.

By state law, anyone under the age of 18 must receive this certificate from an approved institution utilizing trained instructors before making application for a driver's license.

In order to obtain certificates of completion, students must meet the provisions of the state law which specify participation in a minimum of 30 hours of classroom instruction and six hours of driving, and satisfactorily complete tests and written assignments. Our instructors' classroom time familiarizes students with the rules of the road and the proper operation of a car using textbooks and numerous pamphlets, audio-visual materials and psycho-physical testing devices.

A portion of the students' driving time is spent on a multi-car range. Undoubtedly many residents have gone past The Farms pier parking lot during the early evening hours when school is in session, and have seen students practicing various driving maneuvers on the range.

Our program provides four hours of this type of driving, which is done on the North

High School parking lot during the summer. The other two hours of driving time are spent "on-the-road" in specially equipped cars that have dual controls for the instructors. These cars are marked with roof-top signs.

There is no charge to students who participate in the state-mandated public school driver education program. The program is financed by the state partially reimbursing school districts for their per pupil instructional and operating costs, paying up to \$30 per student.

However, in very few school districts does that amount equal what is actually spent on instructors' salaries and automobile maintenance and fuel costs. As in other school districts, the non-reimbursable per pupil costs are taken out of our school system's general fund.

Training students to drive properly is a big job that is becoming more and more expensive. However, we think it is extremely important that driver education programs continue so that young men and women are able to confidently get behind the steering wheel and safely and responsibly handle their cars in today's complex traffic patterns.

Consequently, we are closely watching efforts at the state level to deal with these cost problems and are doing what we can locally to reduce expenses without adversely affecting the instructional quality of the program.

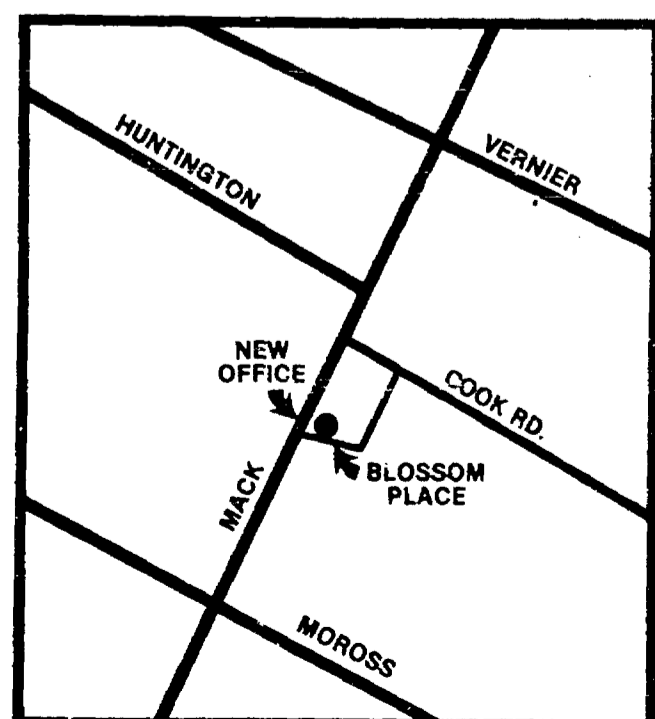

Many Famous Persons Have Roots in Michigan

Michigan has its share of famous persons whose historical impact extends beyond the state boundaries, reports Automobile Club of Michigan.

Starting in the 17th Century with Father Jacques Marquette to present-day celebrities such as singer-actress Diana Ross, Michigan has been the birthplace or home of many renowned individuals.

Marquette, the Jesuit missionary-explorer from St. Ignace, is one of three clergymen on Auto Club's list of famous persons. He, along with Louis Jolliet, explored the Mississippi River as far south as the Arkansas River during a 2,900-mile journey by canoe.

Another well-known Upper Peninsula priest was Frederic Baraga who was known in the copper country as the "Snowshoe Priest." Baraga was appointed the U. P.'s first Roman Catholic bishop in 1853. A 35-foot tall sculpture was erected in his honor in L'Anse.

The most controversial of the trio was the Rev. Charles Coughlin, the nationally famed "radio priest" of the 1930s. Father Coughlin was pastor of Royal Oak's Shrine of the Little Flower from 1926 to 1966.

Michigan also was home to four well-known writers.

Edna Ferber, who won the 1925 Pulitzer Prize for "So Big," was born in Kalamazoo in 1887 but moved to Wisconsin soon after.

Ring Lardner, one of America's foremost humorists, was born in Niles in 1895 and lived there until his high school graduation. Sports was his specialty and he traveled the country for many years as a baseball feature writer.

Ernest Hemingway, winner of the 1954 Nobel Prize for literature, spent his summers in the Petoskey area. His family's summer home on Walloon Lake is a national historical site.

Michigan's "pioneer poet," Will Carleton, was born in 1845 in a log cabin near Hudson which is now a landmark. The poet-lecturer is best remembered for his "Over the Hills to the Poorhouse."

Two world-famous inventors have Michigan roots. Thomas A. Edison moved with his family to Port Huron at the age of seven and spent his childhood there. Automotive pioneer Henry Ford was born in 1863 in what later became the City of Dearborn, world headquarters of the Ford Motor Co.

Mackinac Island played a part in the lives of some of Michigan's greats. John Jacob Astor made his fortune there by founding the American Fur Co. The Astor fur post, built about 1817, is now a museum.

In 1820, Dr. William Beaumont began a five-year stint as the post surgeon at Fort Mackinac. Beaumont is remembered for his significant experiments on the digestive system.

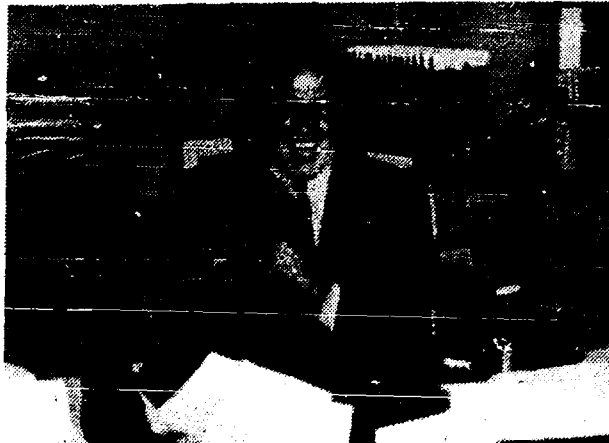
In the 1920s, a young Eagle Scout named Gerald E. Ford spent a summer on Mackinac Island. He later became the first U.S. President from Michigan. Although he was born in Omaha, Neb., his family moved to Grand Rapids when he was two.

Another prominent Republican, Thomas E. Dewey, was born in Owasco in 1902. He became governor of New York and was twice an unsuccessful presidential nominee.

Michigan residents have made their marks in the entertainment world, too.

Comedian Jack Paar moved to Detroit from Jackson at an early age and spent much of his childhood there. Actor Charlton Heston calls 1,400

He lived with, by and for nature revelling in the beauty of all seasons, but taking special joy in fall's foliage and the renaissance of spring. Beauty surrounded him taking many forms: the roses out his office window, flowers from his garden abounding, always, in his home.

To us he bequeathed a love of the English language, having taught us the difference between dangling participles and hanging prepositions, corrected our spelling and pronunciation, enhanced our vocabularies, exemplified the joys of reading and made us aware of the pride of authorship.

He listened always, lectured rarely. His words commanded respect and were inter-laced with love. Much of his best advice to us was shared, in part, with others. His words bespeak the man.

When we left for college he counselled, "These are the golden years and yours is the privilege to make them what you will. If we have helped you walk across the threshold with confidence, we are grateful. If we have failed you, forgive us . . ."

His philosophy, too, is a matter of record, as printed in editorials over the years: ". . . Never think of yourselves as something you have created single-handedly. Physically and emotionally you have reaped the harvest of the thought and ability of all who went before you. Set your sights high. Don't shoot at the nearest and easiest target. Select a goal that will test your capabilities, not one that will satisfy your immediate requirements. The rut is ever too close. Stagnation's beckoning is always within the limits of sight and sound.

"The acquisition of an understanding and tolerance for fellow human beings will stand you in good stead. Let us be grateful to them for giving us a lift to a higher plane of aspiration. Never be small. Reach high and, even if your grasp fails to clutch the highest star, you will be clothed in glorious dust, shaken from the garments of all who have gone before you striving for perfection."

His pride in the Grosse Pointe community was manifested for nearly 40 years in his weekly coverage and support of its residents, churches, school system, municipal governments and issues, library, War Memorial and lifestyle. Few have had the opportunity through the vehicle of a vocation to serve his community directly. Fewer, still, are personally responsive and accessible to all segments of that community.

Robert B. Edgar created this opportunity. Over the past 39 years he met his responsibilities to his fellow citizens. We, his children, will strive to be worthy of the legacy left to us.

Sojourner Truth, who escaped slavery, was a leader in the abolitionist movement and was an adviser to President Abraham Lincoln on newly freed slaves. She spent her last years in Battle Creek and was buried in that city's Oak Hill Cemetery following her death in 1883.

Young Fanny Hooe disappeared one spring day in 1848 when she went down to a lake in the Upper Peninsula to do her washing. A lake at Fort Wilkins State Park near Copper Harbor bears her name.

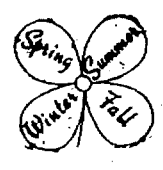

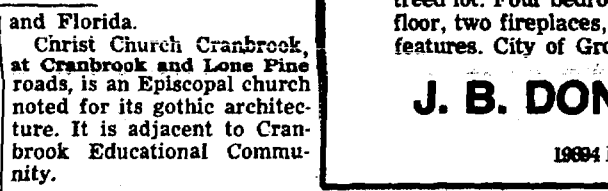
On the program will be a medley of French dances, carillon pieces by American composers and several hymn arrangements for carillon.

Mrs. Gattorn, much involved in fund-raising, also was the Michigan treasurer for a Michigan and New York fund-raising effort for Sister Arlene Schmeer, the Clam Sister, who is active in cancer research in Denver, Colo.

"Actually, she is a marine biologist. I enjoyed working for her through American Cancer Research at Denver."

Tennis and Crumpets, a fund-raiser for Children's Hospital of Detroit, and the League of Catholic Women also have been beneficiaries of Barbara's willingness to help, as treasurer and assistant treasurer, respectively.

Barbara, on the board of Christ Child Society for 15 years, is vice-president of Christ Child Society and chairman of Christ Child House, a home for abused and neglected children who are wards of the court.

"That home, which housed 50 children this year, is the first step toward their rehabilitation," notes Mrs. Gattorn. "We do our best to help them attain normal living conditions while they reside there for about six months."
