## Mich Con joins cable test

The corps of meter readers who tromp from door to door to check basement dials could be a thing of the past if tests scheduled to begin next month in Grosse Pointe City are a success.

Michigan Consolidated Gas Company said it's ready to begin testing a system that will let it read some Grosse Pointers gas meters at a remote location over cable TV lines. The tests are the first of their kind in Michigan, according to a gas company source. The system was developed by a local firm, Datavision, Inc., headed by developer Richard Crawford.

**THE GAS** company hopes the system can cut its costs and improve the accuracy of its monthly bills, according to Jeff McKeen, manager of System Engineering Planning at Michigan Consolidated.

"Now we try to read meters every month and our costs are about \$5 to \$7 a year, reading them manually," McKeen said. "But the problem is we lose hours when residents work. There would

be obvious benefits for our customers if we could get an accurate monthly reading."

The device to be tested is a small plastic computer plate that will replace the five-dial index on existing gas meters, McKeen said. It will allow a person at Datavision's Roseville office to call up a complete report of gas use through a computer. The information can be transmitted to other locations, such as Michigan Consolidated offices, through common computer hook-ups, according to McKeen.

The tests will run concurrent with those being conducted by Grosse Pointe City and Datavision in which water use at 150 homes is metered across the TV cables. Printouts are available at the offices of Datavision and Grosse Pointe City on Maumee.

Thomas Kressbach, city manager, said as far as he knows the tests are going well. "We haven't had any problems or complaints. But I haven't heard much from Datavision about their end," Kressbach said.

The gas company plans to hook

only 50 homes onto the system, McKeen said. It has been researching the project with Datavision for two years, he added.

Although McKeen said he thinks the system has "real potential," he warned there is much more work necessary before it can be put to general use. The tests scheduled to begin in December really amount to a feasibility study, he said.

"The (system) does have potential to cut our costs, particularly if we can share the costs with whoever reads the water meters and the electric company," McKeen said.

"A lot depends, also, on our ability to fit the device to other kinds of meters. We have hundreds of kinds of meters in the field."

**DATAVISION**, founded in 1978, is located in Roseville, but most of its officers are Grosse Pointe residents. Local developer Richard S. Crawford took over as president of the firm in August, succeeding Maurice B. Hogan, of the Farms, who was elected chairman of the board. Woods resident Carlo

Ugval is board vice-chairman and Grosse Pointe City Councilman Lorenzo Browning is vice-president.

In announcing Crawford's appointment last summer, Hogan said the firm was shifting concentration to marketing the firm's package of cable services which in addition to meter reading may include home security and energy management devices.

Crawford is a licensed builder, real estate broker and registered

securities representative, according to the firm, and has been involved in several subdivision developments in the Pointes including the recent Sycamores, on the former Seyburn Estate on Jefferson Avenue.

Datavision reported a net loss of \$1.16 million in the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1981. But company officials at its February annual meeting expressed optimism about the future profitability. The company's stock is traded over the counter.

## Housing slump

### Interest rates spur optimism

The dark clouds are beginning to lift over the real estate market in Grosse Pointe but don't expect local brokers to set record sales levels.

Member brokers of the Grosse Pointe Real Estate Exchange contacted this week say lower mortgage rates are reviving interest in real estate once again.

"It's usually the time of the year when things start to quiet down, but we're seeing a great number of people who have renewed interest in Grosse Pointe," said Thomas Youngblood, president-elect of the 22-member Exchange. "I'm hopeful the trend will continue."

**YOUNGBLOOD** said he foresees a very healthy market the next six to nine months if interest rates stay down. At his own realty office, Youngblood said he has seen activity pick up, particularly in the last eight to 10 weeks. "If my observations are accurate, this is happening all across the board."

According to statistics provided by the Exchange for October, member brokers closed 55 sales as compared to 45 sales in October, 1981. Dollar value last month was recorded as \$5,413,000, compared to a year ago volume of \$4,930,000. Month-end listings in Grosse Pointe were 448, compared to 335 in October, 1981.

Average sales price last month was \$98,000, down from \$101,000 a year ago in October. But the Exchange's Youngblood says those kinds of figures can be misleading, especially when the biggest segment of people in Grosse Pointe affected by the housing situation are those who own their own home and want to move on.

"We're talking about those who own homes in the \$100,000 to \$250,000 range who have to find a buyer before they can purchase a second home," Youngblood said.

The president-elect said he is still seeing a "great number" of land contracts financed at 11 percent, which he termed a "good investment" for sellers.

Member realtor Ann Goodman, of Goodman, Pierce & Boyer agrees sales are picking up at the time of the year when activity traditionally slows down. "We're doing better the last couple of months and we're ahead of last year. Our listings are going up terribly."

**MS. GOODMAN** attributes the renewed activity to people's frustration with the prolonged housing market and the relatively low interest rates, which have dropped to about 14 percent at some banks. "They are a little fearful, depressed and tired of the situation and just waiting for a change," she said.

There are many listings on the market now, but there used to be a time when that wasn't the case, according to Ms. Goodman. "We (brokers) never had enough houses to go around — we were always fighting over the listings to see who could get what." Ms. Goodman says land contracts are still coming across her desk. "Some people have the cash, but not too many."

According to Cathy Dillaman of William J. Champion Real Estate, local open houses are jammed.

"In the last two weeks, we definitely have seen a spring of action, both as far as the number of listings and the number of people signing on the dotted line."

The current lower mortgage rates are attracting the pent up housing demand of last spring, says Ms. Dillaman, adding some people are even re-financing now because they're afraid of what might happen next spring.

Creative financing is still predominate among buyers and sellers, Ms. Dillaman said.

Although the lower interest rates have not translated into record sales levels, John Moss of Tappan & Associates says at least they are getting people out and looking at housing.

"I think people tend to hope the interest rate will come down even further," he said, adding listings at Tappan are still at record numbers at a time when activity traditionally drops off.

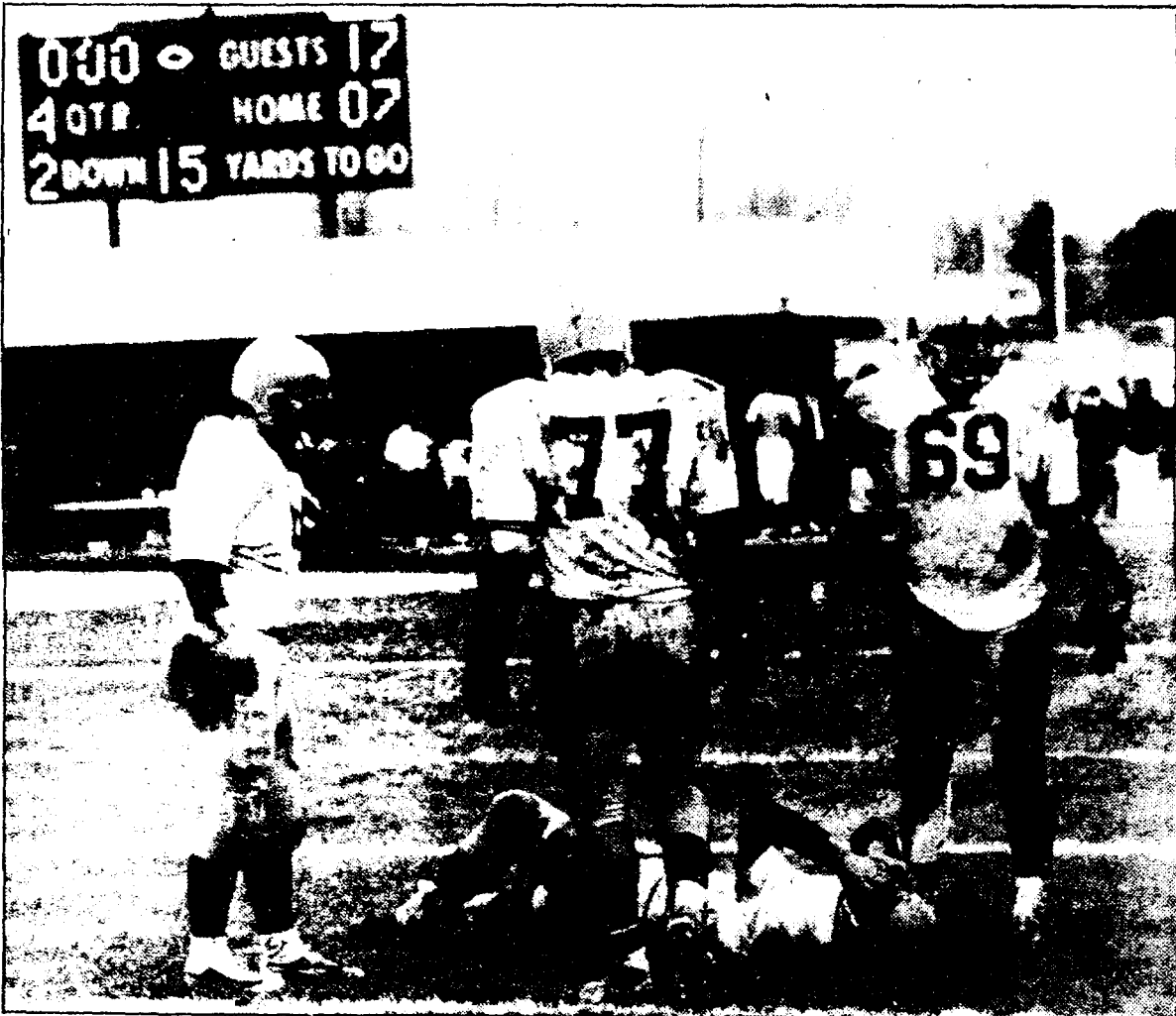

## Park cool to district court

Members of the Park city council, who were the only local leaders to embrace the concept of creating a district court here earlier this year, appear to be cooling to the idea.

The council last week tabled for the third time a resolution proposed by Councilman Anthony Spada that would endorse a district court in the Park effective in 1985.

Mayor Douglas Graham said he

is concerned about the power over staffing, salaries and facilities that would be placed in a judge's hands if a new court is created.

"The law is very clear," he said. "It leaves all those aspects of court operations completely up to the judge. Now we have a very frugal judge, but there's nothing to say she will be elected to the new position."

While state law does give district court judges control over how to spend the court budget, it

must be funded by the city council. City Attorney Herold "Mac" Deason pointed out. When a dispute does arise, the state Court Administrator's office tries to mediate and, if that fails, the issue ends up in circuit court, he said.

The Park city leaders in May were the only local council to endorse legislation creating a district court in the five Grosse

## From high school to the major league, all at 16

Most boys and men dream of one day playing baseball in the major leagues. Cass Michaels made that dream come true and lived it as a teenager.

As a sophomore playing for Detroit's St. Joseph High School, Mr. Michaels was named as an All-City basketball player. In his junior year, he advanced to the All-State squad.

However, he refrained from all sports in his senior year and with good reason. His newly signed contract as starting third baseman with the Chicago White Sox forbade it. He was only 16 years old. The year was 1944.

"My father really put St. Josa-

phat's on the map," said Mr. Michael's youngest son, Thomas. "He was an all around athlete, not just in basketball. He set an American Legion batting record with a .608 average. He went right from American Legion ball to the majors. He never spent a day playing in the minor leagues."

As a player, Mr. Michaels achieved a .286 lifetime batting average and played on the 1949 and 1950 All-Star teams.

Switched to second base, he and shortstop teammate Luke Appling also set a one time major league record for the number of double plays turned over in one season.

Mr. Michael's career came to

Pointes. The legislation expired because the approval of all five units of government was needed. At that time, the council directed State Sen. John Kelly to introduce legislation creating a court in the Park only, which he did in SB 934. The Pointes and East Detroit are the only Michigan communities which still operate part-time municipal courts with limited jurisdiction over civil and criminal matters. Park Judge Beverly Grobbel has been operating her municipal court four or five times a week to keep up with the caseload. But she earlier warned the council that she cannot continue to do so on her \$6,000 annual salary.

State Court Administrator's Office Region One director Herb Levitt told the council last month that he found facilities and procedures currently being used in the Park adequate for a district court operation. But council members last week expressed doubt about that, too.

"I don't know if I agree with Mr. Levitt that our facilities are adequate for a district court," Councilwoman Carroll Evola said, adding the current municipal offices include no jury room or meeting place for attorneys. She proposed a citizens advisory committee be appointed to study the matter, but her motion received no support.

Spada, who has been studying the court conversion for the last two years, said he is convinced the conversion to a district court would increase the city's revenues from fines and fees as well as improve the level of service to plaintiffs.

"If we don't act on this in the near future, this opportunity for Grosse Pointe Park to control its own court will be gone. We would end up as part of the 36th district in Detroit," Spada said.

### South cellist wins Nester award

Grosse Pointe South senior Nada Raduovich, whose instrument is the cello, has been named the 1982 winner of the annual Thomas Nester Memorial Scholarship, sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Symphony Society to honor its late founder. Auditions were held on Nov. 1, at Grosse Pointe North High School. Seventeen-year-old Nada, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Radulovich of Rivard Boulevard, receives a \$400 cash award as well as the opportunity for a solo performance during a regular concert of the current symphony season.

She is scheduled to play the first movement of the Haydn Concerto in C for Cello, which was one of her scholarship audition selections, at the March 6, 1983, concert of the Symphony in Parcels Auditorium, Mack at Vernier, Grosse Pointe Woods.

Nada, who has been studying music privately for eight years and is beginning her third season as a member of the Grosse Pointe Symphony, also won the 1982 Congress of Strings Scholarship, sponsored by the American Federation of Musicians.

She played in the pit orchestras for the Fisher Theater's production of "Annie," Grosse Pointe Theater's "Sweet Charity" and for "Guys and Dolls" at the Alger. Her other playing experience has been with the Northwest Activity

Center Symphony, various chamber ensembles and with her high school orchestra, in which she holds first chair.

"I'd like to go to Smith and take a double major in science and music," says the ambitious Nada. Music isn't her only interest or area of accomplishment. Nada won a Varsity Letter in her freshman year as a member of South High's girls cross country team and has won several ribbons as an equestrian, according to her counselor at South, Gerald Morrison.

"She's the type of person who projects herself in a real nice fashion, with students and adults," Morrison said. "She's enthusiastic and sensitive and keeps things in perspective."

The Nester Scholarship judges, assembled by the project chairman Janet Young, were Felix Resnick, long-time director of the Grosse Pointe Symphony, Derek Francis, Ruth Kaiser and David Stall.

"Nada is an accomplished young woman," said Resnick. "She came to us through the Grosse Pointe public school system and I usually hear her in orchestra practice rather than solo work. It was a very pleasant surprise to hear her play the Haydn Concerto. I'm looking forward to her solo performance in March."

"We're very pleased that the Grosse Pointe Symphony gives gifted young people a chance to gain poise and experience in a concert setting," Resnick said.

an end in 1954 when he was struck behind the ear by a wild pitch thrown by Philadelphia Athletics pitcher Marion Fricano. The pitch fractured his skull.

Mr. Michaels began and ended his career with the White Sox. During his career he also played for the Washington Senators, St. Louis and Philadelphia.

"I only wish I'd had a chance to see my father play, said Thomas Michaels. "But his career ended before I had the chance. He left baseball about the time Al Kaline's career started."

"He really loved the game and said he would have played it for free. He had a hard time understanding today's players. Guys pulling down \$500,000 for hitting only .250. He said that in his day, a .250 hitter would have been sent

down to the minors and never seen again. I guess he was born to soon."

Mr. Michaels, 56, of Renaud Road, died Friday, Nov. 12, in Bon Secours Hospital.

Services were held Tuesday, Nov. 16, at the A. H. Peters Funeral Home.

A native Detroit, he worked as a manufacturers representative for various local companies after retiring from baseball. An avid bowler, Mr. Michaels once rolled a perfect 300 game.

Mr. Michaels is survived by his wife, Margaret; two daughters, Kathleen Hawkins and Susan; two sons, Cass Jr. and Thomas; one sister; one brother and a granddaughter.

Interment was in Mt. Olivet Cemetery.

## Get ready! Santa Claus arrives next week

Scouts, community groups, marching bands and floats will herald Santa Claus' annual visit to Grosse Pointe in the sixth annual parade sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Village Merchants Association on Friday, Nov. 26, at 10:30 a.m.

The parade will begin at South High School on Fisher Road and travel up Kercheval through the

Village. This year, there'll be more music than ever before with seven bands including the First Michigan Colonial Fife and Drum Corps, and high school marching bands from Stevenson, Henry Ford, Utica, Harrison, Farmington Township, Southlake and Allen Park, all lead by the Green and White from Grosse Pointe North High.

Grand Marshals, for the second year in a row, will be the fictional children's characters Smurf and Smurfette. A mysterious visitor from outer space, (probably looking for a telephone) will also make an appearance, as will clowns from the Village Association and other community organizations.

Among the brightest attractions

will be Grosse Pointe Theater's Bug, a 65-foot float with 12 people on board, Operation LINC's Tradition of Giving, Cindy Pangborn's Talent Machine including 19 kids, Tony Carr and his police car, the Second Regiment of Pennsylvania American Revolutionary Unit and an appearance by Mrs. Michigan, Nancy Hook of Lakeland Avenue.

Many community groups will also participate including boy scouts, girl scouts, Indian Princesses, Campfire girls, the Neighborhood Club and St. Michael's Episcopal Church Junior Choir.

The parade is under the direction of Mae Gallagher, Rik Selke of The Courtyard Salon and Beverly Leinweber. Floats honoring the Nativity, Santa and various Christmas and winter scenes also will travel down Kercheval.

Grosse Pointe City Mayor David Robb will present Santa with a key to the city. Parade marshals from Jaycees and Rotary Club will provide safety.

Many Village store employees have donated their spare time to build floats in a garage donated by Darrell and Liz Finken, owners of Sparky Herberts in the Park. Vehicles are provided by Pointe Dodge and Chrysler Engineering.

The parade will cost more than \$5,000, according to Mrs. Leinweber and funding is still incomplete.

"Somewhere we'll find the funds. The parade as a unifying community effort is too important to discontinue due to funding problems. We have faith in Grosse Pointe and that's what it's all about," she said.

So far, \$2,500 has been donated by the Village Association, \$50 by the Lions, and \$1,000 from Rotary. ## GP Cable takes 'pirate' to court

They've warned and warned and, for the first time, Grosse Pointe Cable took someone to court this month on charges of theft of service.

The cable company, which serves four Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods, won a \$386-plus judgment against a Grosse Pointe Park man who was found to be pirating cable television service. The verdict was handed down by Park Municipal Judge Beverly Grobbel on Nov. 3, as part of a civil action against a man who cable attorneys contended has signed up for the service, then disconnected it, but continued to receive the 30 channels.

The damages included \$240 for the cost of the converter that was not recovered by the cable company. When subscribers hook-up, they sign a contract that makes them liable for the cost of a converter, according to the cable firm's new General Manager Steven A. Davis.

Attorney representing Grosse Pointe Cable was John Rickel, who also is president and trea-

surer of the company.

Davis said the company has a unilateral policy of going after people who steal all or part of their service and "we are very pleased that the court saw fit to award us the damages we asked." The case marks the first time the company has taken a customer to court. "Normally, we are able to settle out of court when people are given the option of paying a minimum of \$240 for tampering with a converter," he said.

Davis said the company began its investigation of the Park man after it received a tip from an anonymous caller. The company took photographs outside the man's house to substantiate its case, he said.

Under a new state law, cable firms have added support for their fight against cable pirating. Michigan was one of the first states to enact such a statute. "The new law sets a maximum fine of \$500 or one year in jail, or both, for possessing, manufacturing or selling devices intended to fraudulently avoid cable television charges," Davis said.

"This pertains to people who alter their converters to receive additional pay T.V. services without charge. Our position has been strengthened by the new law," he said.

The local cable company plans to vigorously pursue and prosecute cable pirates, Davis said. "We know there are more cases out there. We check every converter as we go and if we find one that's tampered with, we're going to take them to court."

Davis said the company is doing a limited audit of converters now and if a large number appear to have been tampered with it will conduct a full, door-to-door audit of the system.

"People have to let us in during normal hours," Davis said.

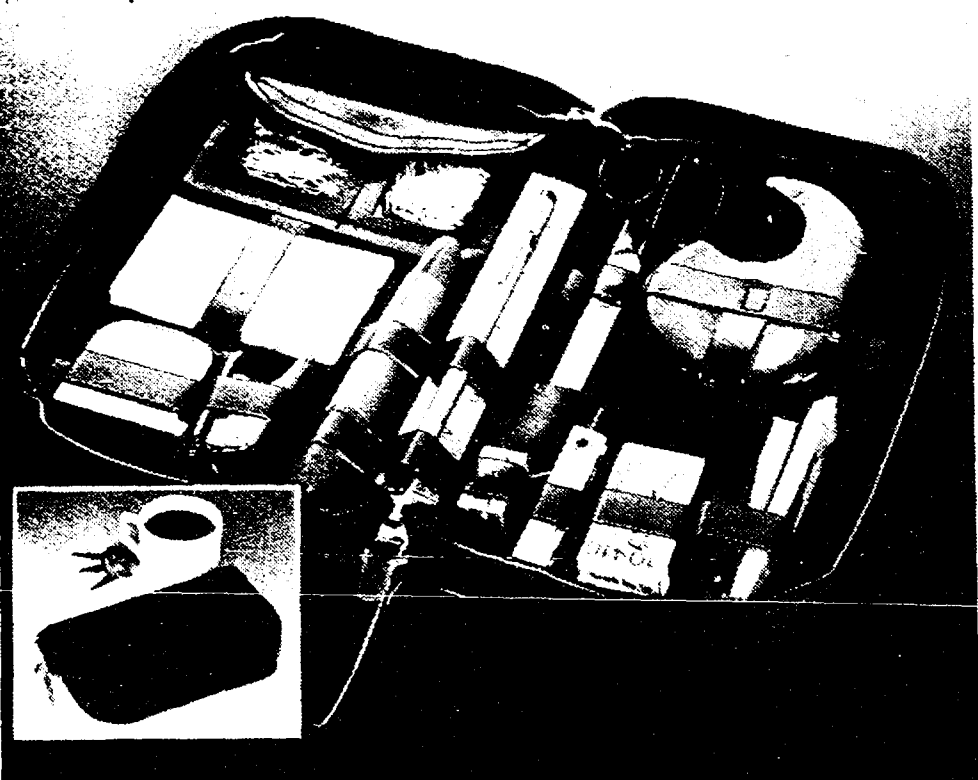

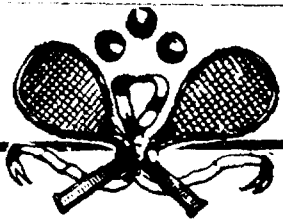

## Road funds drop

### State gasoline consumption is lowest in 13 years

Gasoline consumption in Michigan has hit its lowest rate in 13 years and falling right along with it is the revenue that state, county and local units of government received to work on roads and fund public transportation.

The state Department of Transportation recently released figures for the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30 that show a 3.3 percent drop in revenue from gas and weight taxes. It was the third straight year of decline, which reflects consumers' switch to lighter, more fuel-efficient cars, according to the department. Gasoline sales have dropped from a 1978 peak of 4.6 million gallons to just 3.6 million gallons last year, the department said.

Total revenue from the gas and weight taxes was down about 3.3 percent for 1981-82 compared to the previous fiscal year. That drop was equally distributed to the three levels of government which receive funding from the tax. State-financed public transportation and rail programs collected about \$50 million. County road commissions received \$210 million and cities received \$116.5 million, according to the department.

Grosse Pointe communities use their share of the funds to maintain major streets and trim and protect trees located on the public right-of-way. The five cities were allocated \$927,186 from the 1981-82 collection, according to the department. In 1980-81 they received \$930,024 and in 1979-80 they received \$1.08 million.

The drop in revenues couldn't come at a worse time for Michigan. Studies completed last summer indicate one out of three state

bridges are deficient by federal standards and more than half of the major roadways are substandard.

A package of bills that would bolster highway revenues are currently in the state House and are expected to be discussed sometime before Christmas. The bills (HB 4937, 4938 and 4940) would increase the fuel tax rate, registration fees and change the way funds are distributed.

SEMTA (Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority) is also feeling the pinch. It is depending on the package to bail it out of a severe budget problem, according to the agency. SEMTA has announced it will cut services by 64 percent and increase fares effective Jan. 1 if the bills, or some other kind of relief, are not approved. The cutback would reduce the number of buses providing regular weekday services from 264 to 96, according to the agency.

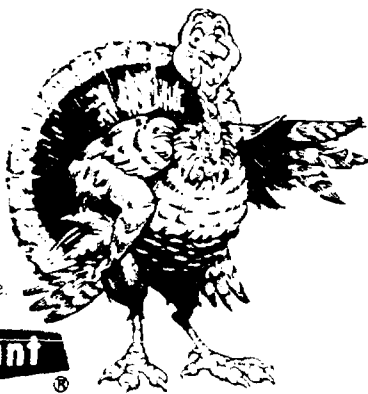

# Road union is headed for battle

After being unassailable in court battle for the last 11 months, the Wayne County Road Commission and its administrator's union may still lose the war when County Executive-Elect William Lucas takes power in January.

**THE ASSOCIATION** of Road Commission Administrators, representing 73 department heads and managerial staff of the Road Commission, won another court decision this month when a Macomb County Circuit judge denied a motion by the Wayne County Charter Commission to file an amended complaint in its legal battle against the union.

The amended complaint, according to attorney Milton Mack, was to make it clear the Charter Commission had been directly damaged by the formation of the union. The change, had it been accepted, would have helped the Commission in its standing fight that had led to two dismissals of the suit already, he said.

Charter Commission president George Ward, however, said the commission will not appeal the decision, adding that the election

of a county executive with reforming powers may have made the fight against the union moot.

"The lame duck road commissioners had no power to enter into the contract with the expressed purpose to circumvent the spirit of the charter," Ward said. "The county executive should issue an order of nullity to disallow and oust the lame duck road commissioners and appoint his own people."

The Charter Commission need no longer fight the court battle, Ward said, because dissolution of the union could come now from an executive order instead of a court order.

"I think the county executive has the power to issue such an order," Ward added. "Those who are ousted will probably have standing to sue, but at least the intent of the charter will be upheld."

The withdrawal of the Charter Commission from the legal fight against the union leaves one suit still pending before the Michigan Court of Appeals involving county commissioner-elect John Hertel and the state Senate. That case, Mack said, is important for

another reason other than the fight against the union.

"There are other issues involved," he said. "One is the right of public officials to sue to vindicate their vote on an issue." That right, conferred in the state constitution, makes public officials the trustees of power for voters, Mack said. That power should include the legal attempt to fight against the actions of non-elected officials which circumvent the spirit of legislative attempts, he added.

**A MOTION FOR** summary reversal and return for trial in Circuit Court has been filed with the Appeals Court, Mack said, so that a decision can be made before Lucas takes office Jan. 1.

"The lawsuit by the Wayne County Charter Commission will achieve its intended result sometime next year," Mack said, "and that's the irony of all this."

Mack said the union has lost the support of labor groups because of its "absolute protection" of administrators.

Road Commission administrators admitted the union was created to protect their positions, but they disagree that it is meant to circumvent the charter. The union protects its members from summary dismissal by the county executive who may try to form his own dynasty at the Road Commission, they said.

Dennis Nystrom, recently named to head Lucas' transition office staff, said the charter gives the county executive the power to appoint three directors of the road commission, whose duty will be to control the commission.

"We do not believe the union is a legitimate union," Nystrom said. "We expect the road commissioners to recognize it themselves. If not we will deal with in January."

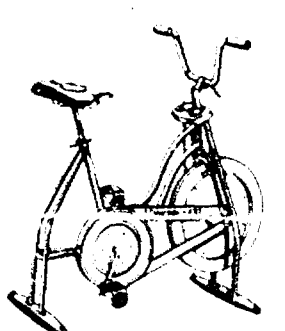
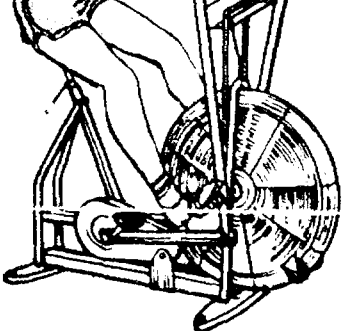
Asked how Lucas would deal with the union, Nystrom said, "We do not intend to recognize it."

The legal fight against the formation of the union began last January, when the road commission board of directors voted 2-1 to enter into the six-year agreement. Within the next two months, four suits contesting the formation were filed, with plaintiffs at various times including County Commissioner George Killeen, Hertel, the State Senate, the Charter Commission, Ward and Charter Commission Vice-President Justine Barnes.

To date, the Road Commission union has won all its court appearances, successfully arguing none of the plaintiffs in the case had standing to file the suit. This month's decision also blocked strengthening the Charter Commission's plea of legal standing to bring the suit.

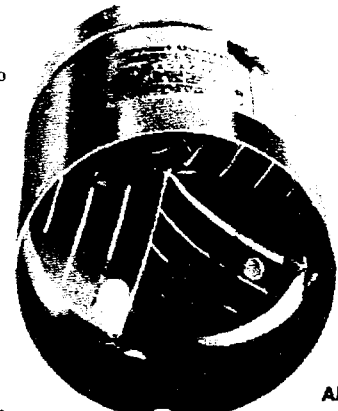

### Shores passes snow removal licensing rules

Under a new Grosse Pointe Shores ordinance, snow removal companies working in the village will have to be licensed with the village and post a bond in case damage is done during removal, Shores officials said.

The ordinance, which took effect this month, requires snow removal companies to acquire a yearly \$75 license. Public Safety Director Joseph Vitale said. Licensing each additional vehicle will cost \$15, he added. The company will also be required to post a \$5,000 bond with the city to cover any damages done during plowing.

"We want the residents of the village to know that if they have a company that removes snow, that company will have to be licensed with the village," Vitale said. "The council thought this was necessary and I think it's necessary. The village has to protect residents from damage."

Licensed operators will display a sticker in the windshield, he said. In addition, the vehicles will have to have some sort of rotating light that is visible 100 feet away, Vitale added.

Companies can't plow snow onto public property under the ordinance, Vitale said, nor can they plow it onto private property without the permission of the owner.

The ordinance is not aimed at limiting or hindering residents from getting snow removal service, Vitale said, but to protect them from damage that might be done by the plowing.

No curfew has been placed on plowing, Vitale said, adding, "our residents would like to wake up after a heavy snow with their driveways cleared."

## Internal Revenue cracks down on tax shelter promoters

The Internal Revenue Service today cautioned taxpayers about end-of-the-year investments marketed by unscrupulous promoters that lack sound business purposes and promise large tax savings.

IRS District Director Charles Parks said that in Michigan during the first 11 months of fiscal year 1982 local IRS agents examined 1,341 returns of investors in abusive tax shelters by IRS. Additional taxes and penalties of \$106 million have been determined to be due. Another 11,149 returns have been identified as probable abusive tax shelter returns and will be examined, Parks said. Additional taxes and penalties are expected to exceed \$100 million, he said.

Generally, says Parks, abusive tax shelters involve artificial transactions that lack economic

reality, inflated appraisals, unrealistic allocations, "wholesale" buying to reap charitable contributions deductions at retail, and package deals designed at the start to generate losses far in excess of present or future investment.

While the term "abusive" has been applied to tax shelter plans that are contrary to law, many shelters are characterized by outright fraud containing both shallow and complex aspects designed to carry out willful evasion. Earlier the plans were marketed to stretch the law and recently many are clear attempts to evade. Often the frauds involve backdated documents, fictitious notes, false affidavits and forged trading records.

Abusive shelters often involve nonrecourse loans for which the

taxpayer is not liable for payment and that inflate losses or other deductions. Frequently, the financing is packaged to give the appearance of personal obligation when it is in fact nonrecourse. Such financing has been used to inflate deductions and credits to make them larger than the cash investment. However, the law generally provides that the amount on which an investment tax credit is computed and the amount of deductions for losses is limited to amounts actually risked in the venture.

Some abusive tax shelters have been effectively dealt with by the IRS or Congress and have virtually disappeared from the market. For example, the commodity straddle, formerly a popular shelter, has been curtailed effectively by the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981. It has been replaced, however, by other shelter schemes ranging from growing jojoba beans to leasing and sub-leasing energy management devices.

Parks said abusive tax shelters are concocted daily by promoters so an all-inclusive list of factors in determining what is abusive is not possible. But potential investors would be wise to consider the following questions which might provide a clue to the abusive nature of the plan.

- Do the tax benefits far outweigh the economic benefits?
- Is this a transaction you would consider seriously apart from the tax benefits if you hoped to make a profit?
- Do the shelter's assets really

exist? Are they insured for less than their purchase price?

• Is there a non-tax justification for the way profits and losses are allocated to partners?

• Do the facts and supporting documents make economic sense? In that connection, are there sales and resales of the tax shelter property at ever increasing prices?

• Does the investment plan involve a gimmick, device, or sham to hide the economic reality of the transaction?

• Does the promoter offer to back-date documents after the close of the year and are you instructed to back-date checks covering your investment?

• Is your debt real or are you assured by the promoter that you will never have to pay it?

In recent years the government has obtained indictments and information on 88 promoters of abusive tax shelters, 45 of whom already have been convicted. So far this fiscal year, 30 convictions have been obtained and criminal prosecutions recommended against 81 promoters or brokers. More than 13,000 investors are involved in the 81 schemes with an estimated tax recovery of \$2.6 billion.

Nationally the IRS is examining more than 281,000 tax returns that appear to involve abusive tax shelter issues. Through the first 11 months of fiscal 1982 the completed examination of 61,772 returns in the abusive tax shelters program resulted in recommended tax deficiencies of \$824.3 million.

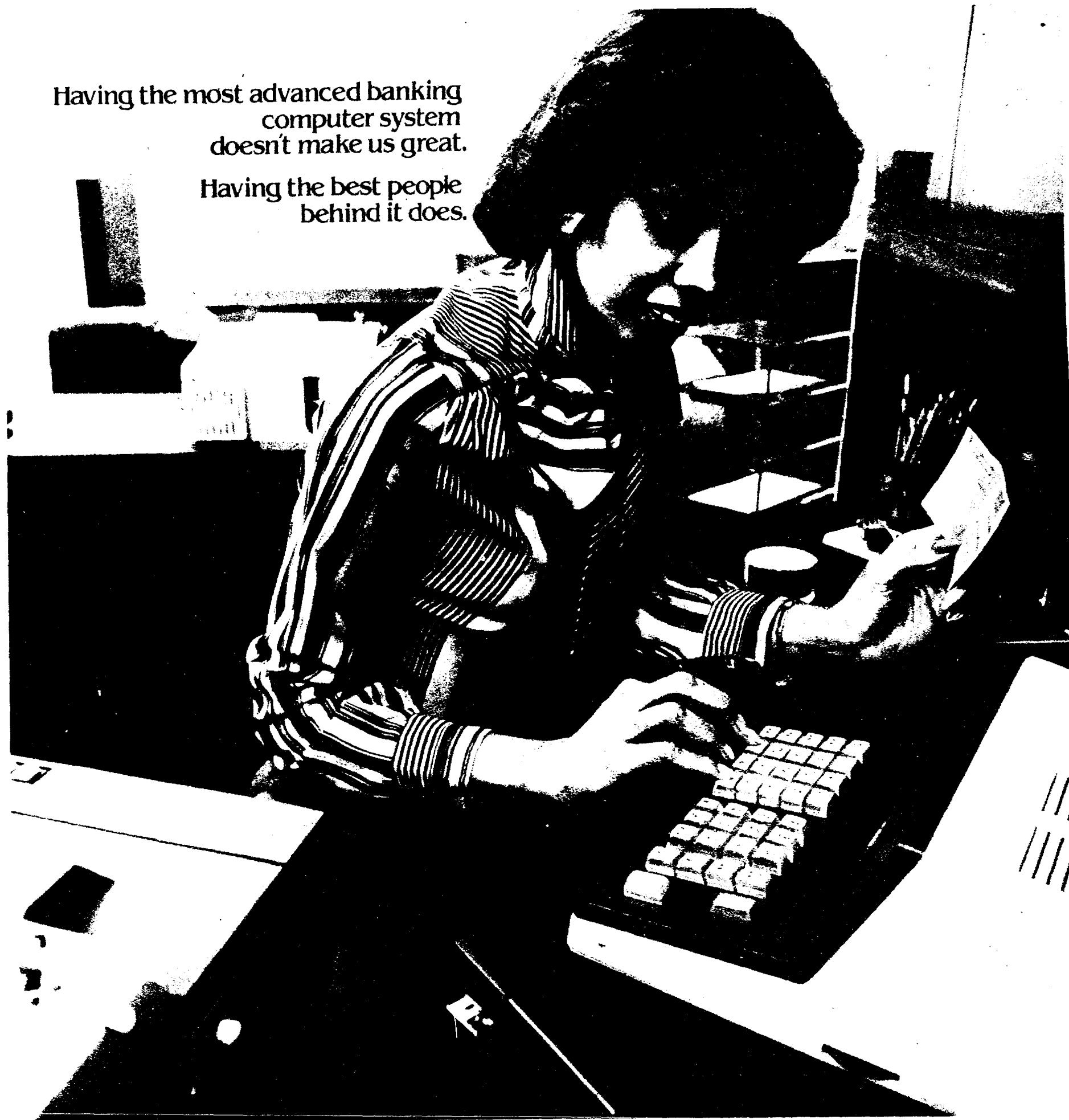

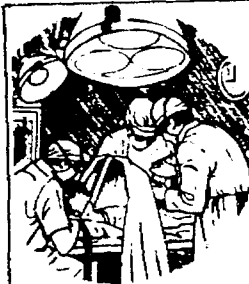

the church initially sponsored by the Cathedral of St. Paul.

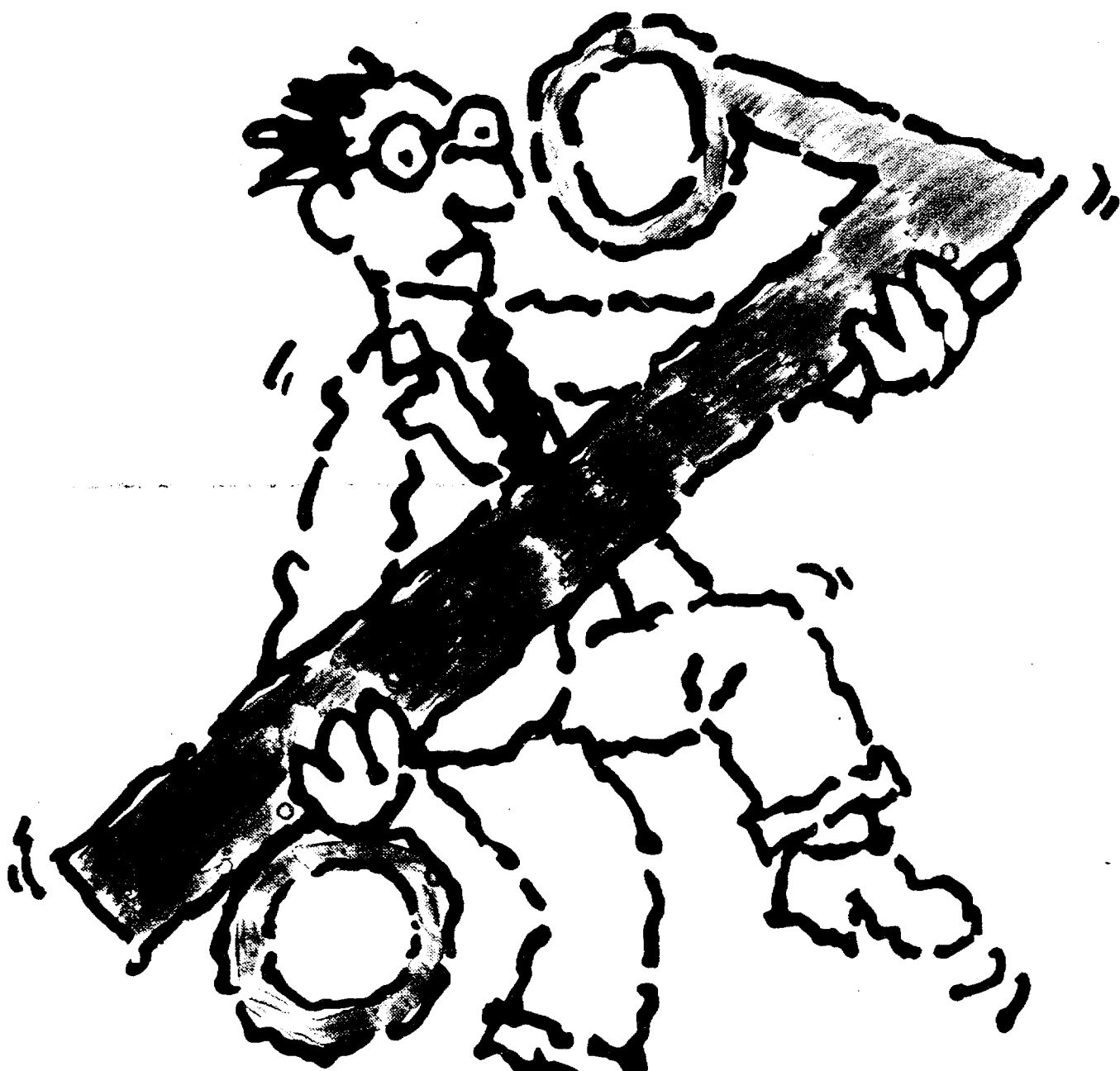

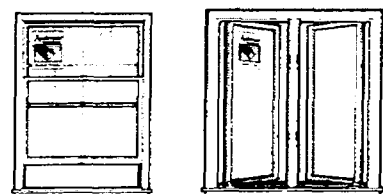

### Space camp opens in Alabama

Scientist Wernher von Braun once asked "Why can't we promote science the way football and tennis pros promote their sport? Why not come up with a program that would permit youngsters to become involved and excited over science?"

Grosse Pointe Academy 1982 graduate, Erik Hall, thinks he has found the answer at the Alabama Space and Rocket Center Camp. Erik was selected recently to be one of the participants in the first week of the camp.

The center is for youngsters 12 to 14 years old. They're divided into teams of eight campers named after the sun and all the planets from Mercury to Pluto.

"The high point of my week was the simulated Space Shuttle mission where four of us were in the shuttle and four at mission control," Erik said. "I was picked as payload specialist on the orbiter."

Erik's team, Pluto, was the only one to fail the shuttle mission in a theoretical emergency.

"A crucial decision was four seconds late with one person outside causing us to re-enter the earth's atmosphere upside down. Thank goodness it was only space camp and not the real thing," he said.

Erik said he also enjoyed the shuttle's mechanical arm, a replica of the real one on the space shuttle.

"My counselor told us the arm is used to train astronauts on the future shuttle missions. I was able to use it to move a pin from one hole to another. I was one of only two people who could do it."

The campers also experienced a moon walk exercise. "The multi-axis trainer where we trained for weightlessness and the observatory where I saw Saturn were extraordinary. My list goes on and on. All I can say is I'm ready for next year," the student said.

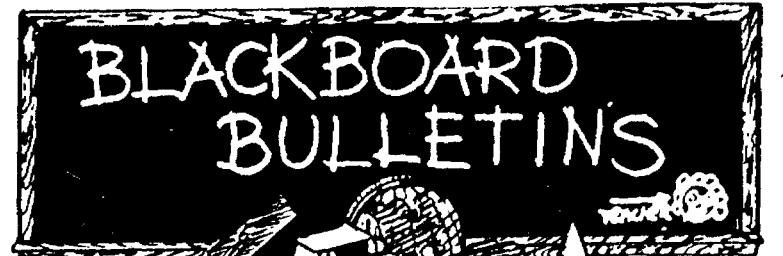
### Ghosts visit Neighborhood Club

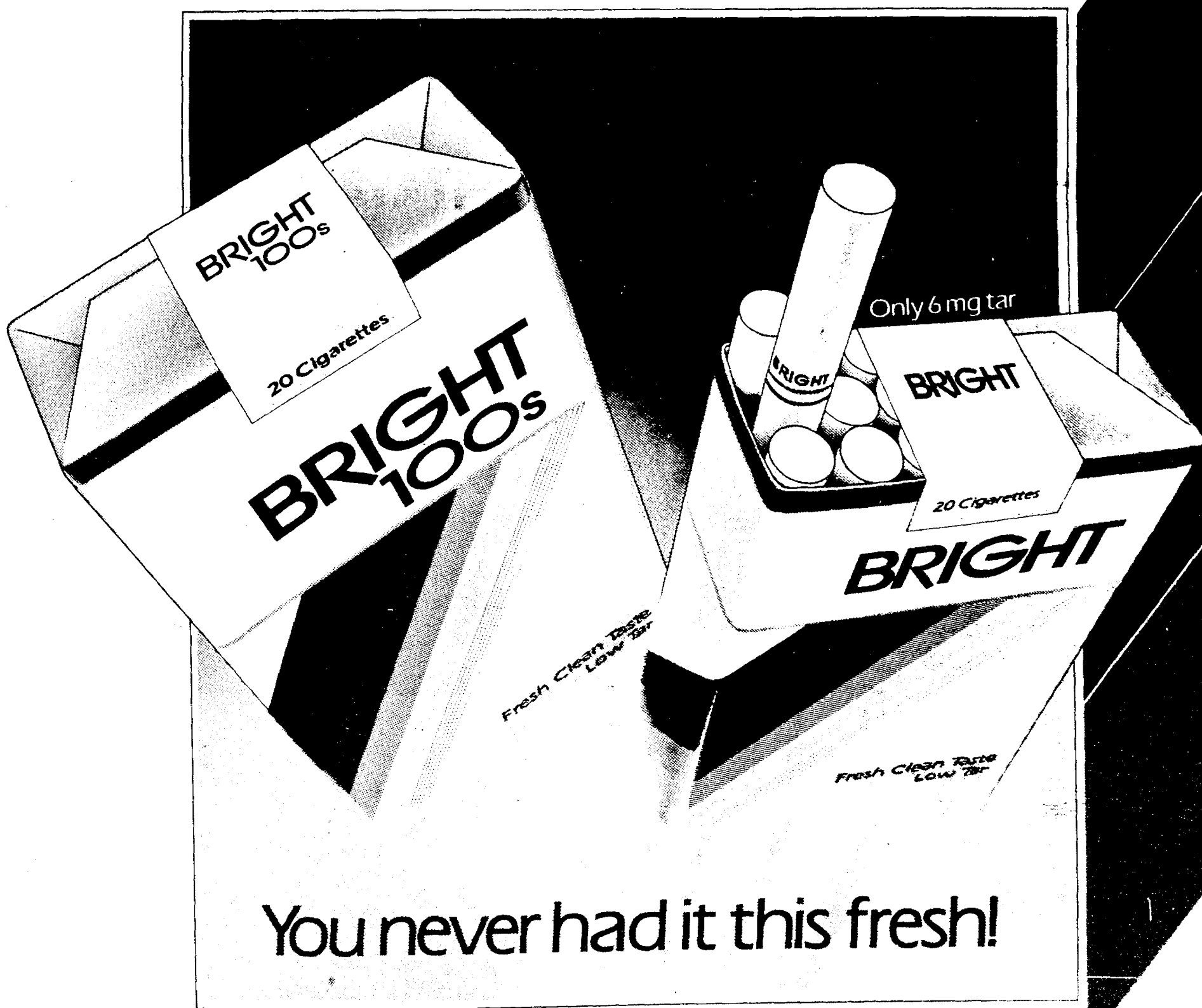

In addition to the Food for Seniors Program, current major projects include a supplemental food program for over 48,000 malnourished mothers.

## How to check drug packages

State Licensing Director Silverenia Q. Kanoyton recently released a series of tips to help consumers use the new protective drug packaging which will be appearing shortly.

"With new Federal regulations going into effect early next spring, everyone should know how to tell when the new packaging has been tampered with," Kanoyton said.

Some of the tips are:

- Look carefully at the medication when it is purchased. Does it seem "right"? Is there any protective packaging which appears to have been destroyed (a blister pack that's been slit, a foil cover on the bottle that doesn't stick, a seal around the cap that's been removed and replaced?)
- Is the bottle over-filled or under-filled? Does the cotton in it appear to have been removed and replaced?
- Does a liquid look and smell the way it did when you last bought it? Does it have any strange or pungent odor?
- Are tablets uniformly smooth, imprinted, evenly-colored and equal in size? Are they moist or spotty?
- Are tubes sealed, particularly at the crimped end?
- Are capsules uniform in appearance throughout the bottle? Are they uniform in size and color and equally filled? Is there any unusual odor?

Kanoyton reminded consumers that a change in the appearance of an over-the-counter product may simply be a manufacturer's change or a deterioration during shipping. The pharmacist is familiar with the usual appearance of the package and its contents, she said, and can determine if the matter should be reported to federal authorities. If the product was not purchased in a pharmacy, the tampering should be reported to the store's manager for possible action.

# Milliken in perspective

Whatever criticism may be made of Gov. William Milliken, and leaders of both political parties showered him with it during the election campaign, he was one Republican who knew how to win a statewide race in Michigan. After the recent debacle for the Republicans, there are few in the party who can make a similar claim.

Milliken's prescription for victory was a simple one. He believed in reaching out to people and attracting more voters into the Republican Party rather than trying to make it hospitable only for those with a narrow, ideological view of the issues. The result was that many independents and even some moderate Democrats were attracted to the Republican governor who showed his sensitivity to people's needs.

PERHAPS IT is unfair to recall some of the things said in the heat of the campaign but Thomas Brennan, the former chief justice of the Michigan Supreme Court who was the GOP nominee for lieutenant governor, made one of the nastiest cracks of the campaign against Milliken. His statement was that the Democrats chose James Blanchard because he was a "carbon copy" of Milliken, but then Brennan went on in this vein:

"They wanted a so-called nice guy who would not rock the boat, a candidate who looked like Milliken, who talked like Milliken, who thought like Milliken and who would be completely subservient to the same motley crew of union bosses, radical feminists and political hacks that (has) attached itself to the present executive office."

Since Milliken has served as governor for almost 14 years and was elected three times in his own right, such a statement could be regarded as a criticism of the voters as well as the governor. But there was a small grain of truth in Brennan's statement. It was that Blanchard did seek the middle way in Michigan, just as Milliken has done, and once again the electorate chose the center of the road and avoided the extremes of either the ultra liberal Democrats or the ultra conservative Republicans.

Richard Headlee, the defeated gubernatorial candidate, also had his say about Milliken's policies during the campaign, and against Mrs. Milliken because of her support for the equal rights amendment and feminists generally. That criticism also reflected more on Headlee than on Mrs. Milliken because it showed the GOP nominee's lack of sensitivity to women's issues.

Blanchard joined in the anvil chorus with a charge that the Milliken administration contributed to Michigan's financial crisis with "voo-

doo" bookkeeping and charged that Milliken's officials "have been manipulating their accounting since 1975." That charge also deserves some rebuttal.

MICHIGAN WAS not an island of depression surrounded by a sea of prosperity. The entire United States was affected by a worldwide recession and Michigan was hardest hit, not because Bill Milliken was governor, but because automobile manufacturing is a cyclical industry which responds more rapidly that does the national economy to the peaks and valleys of national purchasing power. It is also an industry that failed to adjust to changing market conditions, with the result it lost too many sales to Japanese competitors.

It is no doubt true that the Milliken administration failed to foresee the extent of the depression when it came into view in this state. But we all have 20-20 hindsight and few were predicting in the early days of the recession that it would be as long and deep as it has turned out to be. So estimates of state revenues turned out to be more optimistic than they should have been, with the result that sharp cutbacks in state spending and state services became necessary in order to balance the state budget. It is also true that Democratic control of the Legislature kept the level of state spending at a higher level than Milliken's own budgets.

Milliken gave only a token endorsement of Headlee but did not really criticize the GOP nominee until after the election. Then he called the GOP leader's campaign "negative" and "really appalling" and singled out Headlee's frequent slaps at the Equal Rights Amendment and at Detroit Mayor Coleman A. Young as examples of what he was talking about.

Unfortunately, Headlee indicated he had learned nothing from the campaign when he shot back at Milliken that he (Headlee) had been victimized by the "spoiled rich-kid syndrome where you take your ball and run." He added that his campaign "may have been a painful experience for some, so painful they just sat around and sucked their thumbs."

YET IT WILL be recalled that after Headlee's nomination, the governor made it clear the extent of his support would depend on the kind of a campaign Headlee waged. It was not the kind of a campaign Milliken would have waged, and so he didn't give it his wholehearted support. As they chew over the results, nurse their political injuries and think about the future, Michigan Republicans would do well to look at Milliken's prescription for GOP victory and rule in Michigan, before they reject his advice about how to win in this state.

# Lucas a pleasant surprise

In its waning days, Wayne County's old government continues to operate in the same old slipshod political way that has put the county deep in the red and earned it such a record for inefficiency that the voters finally rebelled and adopted a county charter which will become effective Jan. 1, 1983.

For example, the county's Civil Service Commission first approved — and then rescinded — a rule that would have allowed department heads to stay on the county payroll even if they had been fired from their current jobs under the county reorganization plan. Until rescinded, the rule would have permitted these officials to bump into other county positions if removed from their own and thus would have increased the difficulties of the new county executive, William Lucas, in putting any reorganization into effect.

IN A SECOND example, the Wayne County Board of Commissioners voted to discontinue cost-of-living payments for some 2,000 union employees in order to save \$9.2 million for the hard-pressed county budget. But when union leaders from the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees protested, the commissioners meekly bowed to the pressure and voted to pay COLA until Nov. 30. The action reduced the savings to \$6.5 million, assuming the board sticks with the new decision.

In a third example, the board also increased the spending per commissioner from the current \$74,074 to \$113,333 even though it did cut its overall spending by \$300,000. The increased spending per board member has been criticized by Lucas as well as by Richard Kelly, one of the county's three auditors.

However, Samuel Turner, board chairman, defended the appropriation on the grounds the budget still must finance the same number of staff members even though the number of commissioners has been reduced from 27 to 15. He insisted the board will need "the same support staff" and said all the county could save from the board's operations would be the salaries of the 12 departing commissioners.

There is a common thread running through these three examples. It is that under the present, discredited regime the protection of the

jobs of officials and employees has been given the highest priority. In fact, throughout Wayne County's government, the theme seems to have been that county offices exist to support the employees rather than to service the public.

Fortunately, there are signs that these attitudes will change after Jan. 1 when Sheriff Lucas takes over as county executive. It was in large part because of his criticisms that the Civil Service Commission reversed itself on the rule that would have protected the jobs of department heads. Lucas now says the way is clear for him to proceed with the countywide reorganization plan that will be one of his first responsibilities after taking office.

WHILE LUCAS is himself a late convert to county government reform, he has been doing and saying the right things since he started his campaign earlier this year. Yet it is already clear that he will have his problems in persuading county departments and even the new county commission that a new day has dawned in the county and that the old wasteful political operations no longer will be tolerated.

There already is a controversy as to which agency will set the salaries for the county's officials under the reorganization. Some people are even talking of paying the new county commission \$40,000 a year, as contrasted with the present \$25,000, to make its members comparable in pay to Detroit city council members. But under the reorganization the new commission is only a legislative body and is stripped of most of its administrative duties. So even if there are fewer commissioners and each represents a larger district, the duties of each member should not be greater that they are now.

Lucas already has started on the transition. He has put together a team of accountants and other staff members to review budgets and spending needs. He has appointed a commission to work on county reorganization. And he has begun to speak up for good government. So far he has given a pleasant surprise to those of us who feared that his own operation of the sheriff's office had made him part of the county's problem. We await the start of his official term with keen anticipation.

# 'Buckle-up' bill gaining

A bill to require Michigan motorists and their front-seat passengers to use safety belts for a three-year trial period has been getting surprisingly strong support in the Legislature. The support is surprising because no state has yet adopted such a law although similar provisions are in effect in 25 foreign countries and several Canadian provinces.

What has spurred support for the bill and its approval by a 12-3 vote of the House Insurance Committee have been efforts of a coalition of 82 Michigan groups. They include the Big Three automakers, the Automobile Club of Michigan, most major police, medical, legal and insurance lobbies and key officials in the Milliken administration. According to the state Office of Highway Safety Planning, more than 60 percent of adult Michigan residents support the bill and say they would be more likely to use seat belts if the proposal became law.

Michigan already is one of 17 states requiring

car safety seats for young children, and the contention is that the safety-belt requirement would serve the same purpose in saving lives. The safety-belt provisions would not apply to buses, trucks or other commercial vehicles and would exempt drivers of older cars lacking seat belts as well as motorists and passengers who cannot wear belts for physical or medical reasons.

CRITICS CENTER their fire on the restriction of civil liberties they see involved in the seat-belt legislation. Secretary of State Richard Austin, a strong supporter of the bill, offers a rebuttal. All traffic laws represent an infringement of personal freedom, he points out. But while stop signs and traffic lights tell us what to do, they also reduce the amount of highway carnage.

And that, of course, is the bottom line for supporters of this legislation. We think Michigan should give it a trial.



# School closings should be last resort

To the Editor:

As residents with children in the Grosse Pointe public school system, we were encouraged by the public meeting held at Parcels Middle School on Thursday, Nov. 4, by the citizens committee to study declining enrollment.

Two things were clear from this meeting. First, the committee reaffirmed that its primary objective is to develop recommendations de-

signed to maintain the highest quality education. Second, the consensus of those who spoke at the meeting — including a number of senior citizens — was that school closings should be the last alternative.

We urge that every conceivable alternative be fully explored before the recommendation is made to close any school.

## From Another Pointe Of View

Grosse Pointe United Methodist Church will host a very special pre-Christmas exhibition, The Madonna Festival, a religious art presentation juried by Dr. John Davenport, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Dec. 2, 3 and 4. Media will include oil, acrylics, sculpture, ceramics, fiber, textiles, drawings, prints, collage, glass, icons and photography. All artists with original work on the Madonna theme are invited to participate.

The show opens at the church on Moross Road on Thursday, Dec. 2, with a 6 to 8 p.m. reception and awards ceremony for the artists, and will run from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. the following Friday and Saturday. A cash award will be given for Best of Show, along with two cash awards for Special Recognition. aissance/Italian Mannerist style in this country.

The Bronzino Madonna is a 1982 bequest of the late Alvan Macauley Jr., of The Farms, a major benefactor of the museum, who served as president of the DIA's Founders Society from 1956 to 1960 and on the Advisory Committee of the City of Detroit Arts Commission from 1962 to 1977.

The subject of the oil — Madonna and Child with the infant Saint John — was a frequent theme of the Italian High Renaissance, explored by Leonardo da Vinci, Michelangelo and perhaps most often by Raphael. Stylistically, Bronzino's painting is closely related to Michelangelo's famous Doni Tondo, in Florence's Uffizi Gallery, which provided a model for the serpentine movement of Bronzino's Madonna and his color scheme.

At the close of the current exhibition, open to the public without charge during regular museum hours, the Macauley Bronzino will take its place in the DIA's Italian Wing near another Bronzino masterpiece, Eleanora of Toledo and her son Don Garcia (c.1555), a 1942 gift of Mrs. Ralph Harmon Booth, giving Detroit two major aspects of Bronzino's career: his activity as a painter of religious subjects and as a portraitist.

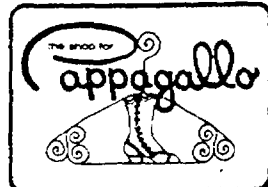

### It's turkey talking time as Thanksgiving ushers in the season of the big beautiful bird

Thanksgiving is the day Americans will gobble up approximately 30 million turkeys — or almost 20 percent of the 1982 national turkey crop.

This crop, estimated at 163.6 million turkeys nationally, is four percent smaller than the 1981 crop. The Michigan turkey crop of 1.4 million birds is also down slightly from a year ago.

Allan Rahn, Michigan State University poultry economist,

says individual turkeys are larger, however, because of lower feed costs and more heavy breed strains being raised this year.

These larger birds are a good deal for shoppers. Larger turkeys cost less per pound and yield a higher proportion of meat to bone than turkeys weighing 12 pounds, or less.

Most shoppers will choose frozen turkeys. Frozen stuffed turkeys and frozen turkey rolls go di-

rectly from the freezer to the oven; other turkeys require thawing, and proper thawing is necessary to avoid food poisoning. Keep the turkey solidly frozen until the thawing procedure begins.

To thaw, leave the turkey in its original wrapper and use one of the following methods:

• Place the turkey on a tray in the refrigerator and thaw. This will take three to four days, depending on the frozen temperature

of the turkey, the size of the bird and the temperature of the refrigerator.

• Put the frozen turkey on a tray, in a tightly closed brown grocery bag. Let it sit out at room temperature for the required amount of thawing time: about one hour per pound. The heavy bag keeps the outside of the turkey from getting too warm before the inside is thawed.

• The cold-water method is the

fastest but least desirable, because it results in a greater loss of moisture. This means the turkey will be less juicy, especially if it's roasted rather than steamed. To thaw a turkey in cold water, cover the plastic-wrapped bird with cold running water. Thawing takes about 1/2 hour per pound of turkey.

It is wise to check thawing progress by any of the three methods. Refrigerate or cook the turkey as

soon as it is thawed. Once thawed, the turkey should be refrigerated no longer than two days — and it should not be refrozen until it is cooked.

Don't stuff the turkey the night before, no matter how enticing this advance preparation may seem. Stuffing is a perfect culture for bacteria. Once stuffed, the bird should be cooked immediately.

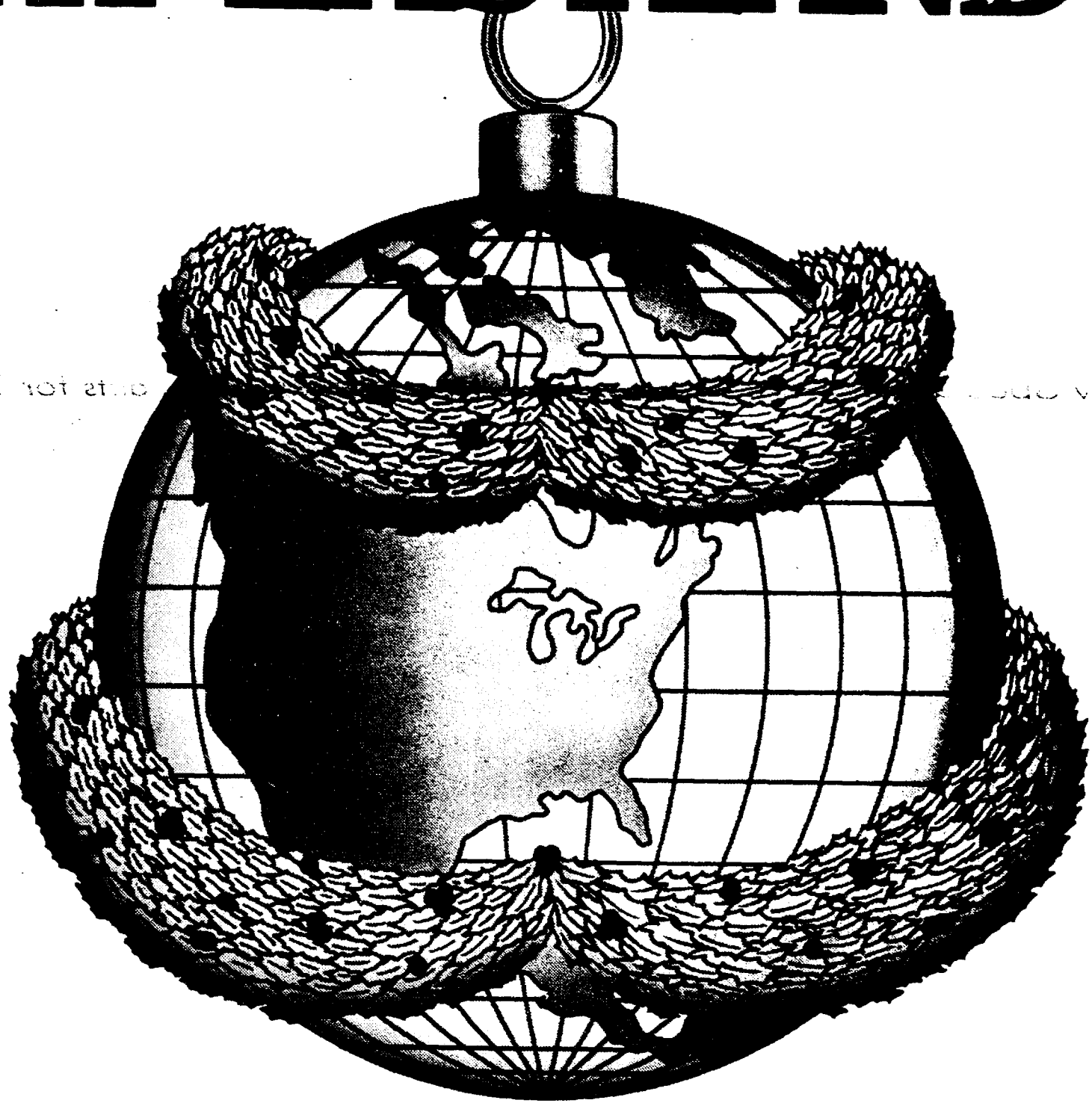

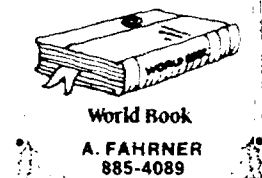

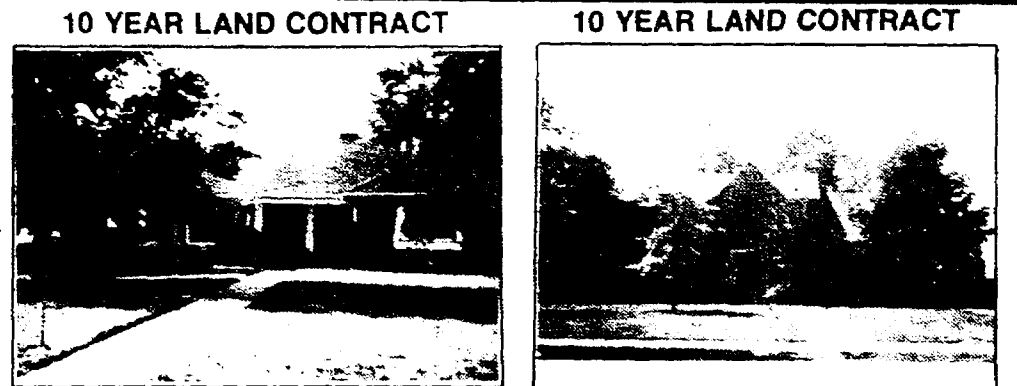

CITY OF **Grosse Pointe** MICHIGAN  
**ORDINANCE NO. 219**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 9.123 AND TO REPEAL SECTION 9.124 OF CHAPTER 115 OF TITLE IX OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE ORDAINS:

1. That Section 9.123 of Chapter 115 of Title IX of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe is hereby amended to read as follows: 9.123 Conducting or engaging in business or labor for profit or operating a place of business open to the public on Sunday.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, or anyone acting in behalf of any person, firm or corporation, whether owner, proprietor, agent or employee, in the City of Grosse Pointe, to conduct or engage in business or labor for profit or to operate a place of business open to the public except from the hours of 10:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., and with the further exception that Drug Stores, provided said stores have available for sale drugs, medical and surgical supplies available for purchase on the written prescription of a licensed medical doctor or doctor of dentistry, Restaurants, and Automobile Service Stations may operate from the hours of 7:00 A.M. to 12 midnight P.M., on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday; Provided, that the foregoing provisions shall not apply to works of necessity and charity; and Provided, further, that the provisions herein contained shall not be applicable to any persons who conscientiously believe that the seventh day of the week should be observed as the Sabbath and actually refrain from such secular business or labor on that day; Provided, further, that such conscientious believer shall post at least two adequate signs in conspicuous places in each place of business that he is closed on Saturday, such signs and the placing thereof to be approved by the City Clerk, or his duly authorized representative, and that such conscientious believer shall include in all of his advertisements and publicity, whether by printed matter, radio, television, or otherwise, a notice to the effect that he is closed on Saturday; and Provided, further, that such conscientious believer is not interested, directly or indirectly, in any similar business that is open on Saturday.

(b) Any person, firm or corporation, or anyone acting in behalf of any person, firm or corporation, violating any of the provisions of the ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to punishment in accordance with terms and provisions of Section 1.12 of Grosse Pointe City Code.

(c) Should any provision, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be held to be invalid for any reason, such holding shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part so declared invalid, it being the legislative intent that this ordinance shall stand notwithstanding such holding.

2. That Section 9.124 of Chapter 115 of Title IX of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe is hereby repealed.

3. The effective date of the within Ordinance No. 219 shall be ten (10) days after date of publication thereof.

## Pointer of Interest

There was a period in Lois Bryant's life which she describes as being "sort of traumatic." It would be difficult to come up with a more adequate description to fit the six weeks in 1967 when Lois, wife of 13th District State Representative William R. Bryant, Jr., got a new house, a new baby and a new life.

"It was right after Bill first went to Lansing. Whenever something would go wrong here, I'd call him right on the floor. After a while, I learned I couldn't rely on him like that, so I decided I'd be independent," Lois says.

Being independent is one thing . . . being rigid is quite another, as Lois discovered. "I came from a family where dinner was on the table every night at 5:20 p.m., and that's the way I was running things here. One day Bill came in and said, 'I have a feeling I'm messing up your schedule.' So I found out that approach wouldn't work. We've now become very flexible."

This incident is one of the many signposts in the life of Lois Bryant which she uses to mark where she's been, where she is and where she is going. Taking time to make such personal assessments is important to Lois, because she says she needs to know where she is before she can determine where she is going.

WHERE LOIS BRYANT has been is right here in Grosse Pointe. She's never moved more than five blocks in her life, save the period when she attended Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, graduating in 1963 with a degree in Business Administration. It was during that time at WMU that Lois experienced another of her signposts.

Majoring in business, Lois looked forward to a career in retailing. During college she worked part time in sales at Kay's Bridal Shoppe and J.R. Jones and Sons in Kalamazoo, and later, full time, as an executive trainee for the J.L. Hudson Company.

During one Thanksgiving break, one of Lois' employers took her aside and told her that yes, she was a fine worker, but being the extremely quiet person she was would get her absolutely nowhere in the retail world. The woman's ultimate advice was to seek out a new career.

"I was crushed . . . I cried almost the whole time I was home," Lois says. But she stopped crying long enough to take her father's advice: get out there and get involved.

"That was a turning point. I got involved in a sorority and in student government. I never was a leader . . . I ran for office once and lost. But I became very assertive. I kept going and became a buyer and a fairly decent one.

"BEING ASSERTIVE became part of my world. Sometimes it's a detriment . . . people say I'm too enthusiastic. But I give 110 percent in whatever I do."

Lois stayed with retailing through 1967. When daughter Jennifer, 15, and son Andrew, 12, came along, she put her career in buying aside, fully intending to resume her work after the kids were in school full time.

"I started out thinking that retailing was my only involvement, other than family. I'd always told myself I was going to open my own store after the kids were in school."

Which brings us to where Lois is now. She is, and has been, extensively involved in creative life planning and volunteerism, basi-

cally through the Junior League of Detroit, an organization whose purpose is to demonstrate the value of the voluntary sector through the use of trained volunteers.

The combination of creative life planning and volunteerism mirror perfectly Lois' personal philosophies. "That's my whole philosophy: to get involved in what I'm doing and to help effect change, to better the lives of others.

"I like change and I like to grow, to put ideas into use in different ways. Change is important . . . you can no longer remain static in today's world. There are too many things affecting us in this computer age."

Lois became involved in creative life planning through the Junior League. She now gives workshops in life planning. "It's really a personal assessment. We identify where we've been, where we are, our likes and dislikes, our skills. Then we break those skills down into clusters, like 'leadership,' 'management,' etc. Then we look at the skills and ask the clients if they like what they are doing with their skills, or if they would like help in making a conscious effort to find another area to use the skills they have acquired.

"It's a process anyone can use anytime. It helps you focus on where your life is going."

The process has certainly worked for Lois. She's more aware than ever of where her life is at this point — and where it is going.

"I'D LIKE TO GET into the human resource development field, helping people deal with their problems more effectively, networking and coming toward a consensus.

"We can't do it all ourselves. Most of the time we need help. The people who are going to be very much in demand are those who can bring problems to the forefront and help solve them."

Lois says she hopes to work for a non-profit organization as a volunteer, and at some point she'll look for a paying job in the human resource development field.

But first, her duty lies with volunteerism. "It's really given me an opportunity, so I can't turn my back on it."

## Elegant Eating

### TURKEY WITH MUSHROOMS AND SNOW PEAS

- 2 Tbsp. vegetable oil
- 1 medium onion cut into 8 wedges
- 1/2 lb. medium-sized mushrooms, quartered
- 1/2 cup sliced water chestnuts
- 1 tsp. salt
- Dash pepper
- 1/4 cup dry sherry
- 1/2 cup turkey broth or canned chicken broth
- 2 tsp. cornstarch
- 2 Tbsp. soy sauce
- 1/2 cups cooked turkey, cut into 2-inch strips
- 1 pkg. (6 oz.) frozen snow peas thawed and drained
- Hot cooked rice

Heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add onion; stir-fry about 2 minutes. Add mushrooms, water chestnuts, salt, pepper and sherry; stir-fry 1/2 minutes.

Pour broth over vegetables; bring to simmering. Combine cornstarch and soy sauce in small cup, stir into broth. Cook 30 seconds until sauce thickens and clears. Add turkey and snow peas. Stir gently 1 minute until heated through. Serve over hot cooked rice. Serves 4.

### TURKEY HAWAIIAN

- 1 cup onion, finely chopped
- 2 Tbsp. vegetable oil
- 1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen peas
- 1/2 cups celery, diagonally sliced
- 2 envelopes instant chicken broth or 2 chicken bouillon cubes
- 3/4 cup water
- 2 Tbsp. cornstarch
- 1 Tbsp. soy sauce
- 1 can (14 oz.) pineapple tidbits
- 1 can (4 oz.) sliced mushrooms
- 1 can (5 oz.) water chestnuts, drained and sliced
- 1/2 cup broken blanched almonds
- 3 cups julienne strips of cooked turkey breast
- Fluffy hot rice

Saute onion in 2 Tbsp. oil over medium heat in teflon-lined skillet, until soft and transparent. Stir in frozen peas, celery, chicken broth or bouillon cubes and water. Cover; heat to boiling; reduce heat and simmer 5 minutes.

Blend cornstarch and soy sauce in 2-cup measure. Drain and stir in syrup from pineapple and liquid from mushrooms. Slowly stir into vegetable mixture. Cook, stirring frequently, until sauce thickens and boils 3 minutes.

Stir in pineapple tidbits, mushrooms, sliced water chestnuts, almonds and 2 cups of the turkey which has been cubed. (Save remaining cup of turkey for top garnish.) Cover and slowly heat until almost boiling.

Spoon hot rice into a rice ring; then turn out onto a heated serving plate. Mound turkey in center of ring and garnish with turkey strips and sliced kumquats. Makes 6 servings.

But when Joey, whose football-playing ability was questionable at best, asked if I wouldn't mind holding the football so he could get some kicking practice in, a tiny alarm bell went off in my 11 year-old brain. "No, Joey," I said. "It's getting dark and . . . " "Don't worry Peg," Joey replied, "I'll kick it right."

The last conscious thought I had (while Joey lumbered down the alley toward me as I held the ball in preparation for his placekick and before I woke up with my shoulder in a sling) was: "It's Mom's fault. She should have told me never, never, never to play football with a 200-pound, CROSS-EYED, 10 year-old."

### But that's the way Pete Rose does it, Dad!

At the age of 11, I had to contend with two things: puberty and a heavy crush on then Cincinnati Reds' star Pete Rose. The puberty part wasn't so bad. And I was able to deal with my crush on "Charlie Hustle" by carrying a picture of him in my pocket and pretending to "be" Rose whenever I got together with the neighborhood kids for a game of pickup baseball. My first experience as a hockey player came at the age of seven, on a homemade ice rink in my backyard. My older brother and his friends, at age 11 seasoned veterans of the ice, enlisted my services as a goaltender when the regular goalie, fifth grader "Jake the Snake," couldn't make it.

The only problem, my brother said, was that Jake had all the goalie equipment — so I'd have to play with no skates, no protective pads and no goalie stick. Even at the tender age of seven, I was no dummy.

We improvised, tying five or six LOOK magazines around my arms and legs. Unable to locate a goalie stick, my brother handed me the next best thing: a rake.

The ghost of goalies past must have been with me that afternoon — I looked like a hall of famer in that net, turning away shot after shot, never allowing a puck to get past me, and to my delight, totally frustrating my brother and his five little hockey friends.

A great moment in hockey took place that day. I assured myself. And while Jake the Snake returned to his rightful spot in the nets the very next afternoon, the exploits of "Shutout O'Connor" will never be forgotten — not as long as I'm around, that is.

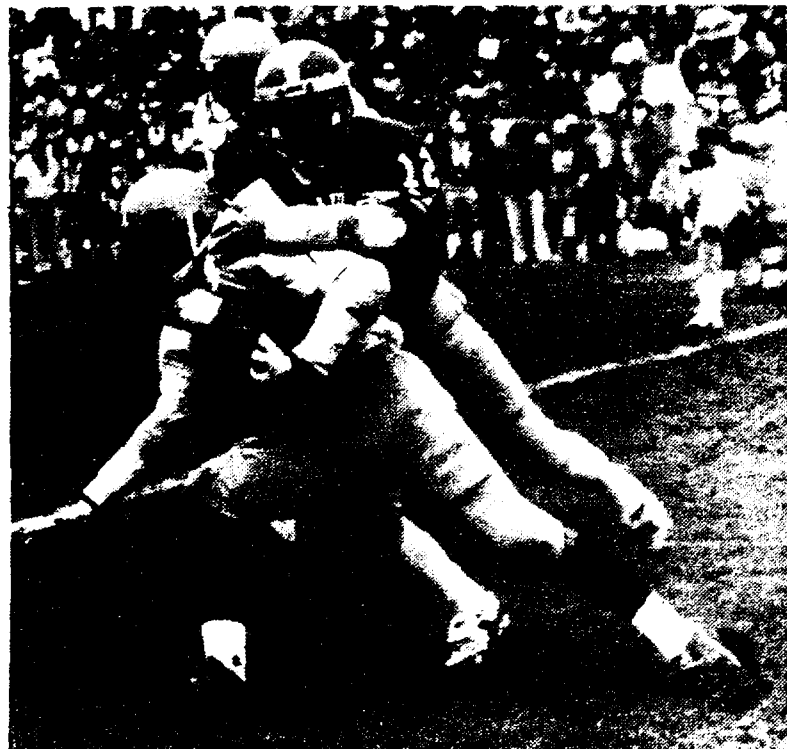
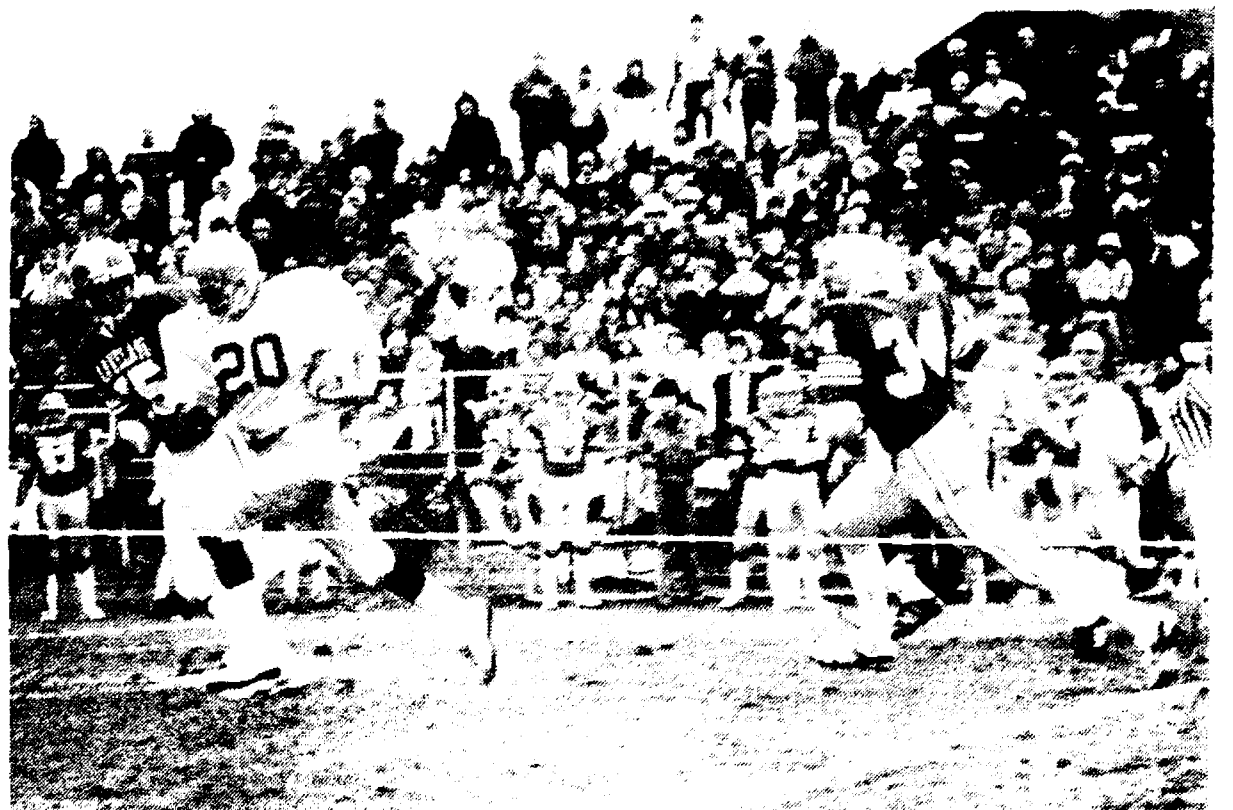

## South's title dream ends in 17-7 loss

South High head coach Russ Hepner called it "a classical football game between two very good Class A football teams." But in the state Class A football regionals on a muddy Southfield Lathrup High field last weekend, South's opponent, Milford Lakeland, was a little bit better.

Lakeland relied on a tenacious defense, a strong passing game and two broken plays to end South's first undefeated season since 1954 and crush the Blue Devils' dream of a Class A state championship, 17-7.

The much bigger Lakeland squad took the opening kickoff to midfield and marched deep into South's territory in three plays. But South's fired up defense held on a third down and nine play and Lakeland had to settle for a 27-yard field goal.

South threatened to turn the game into a high-scoring affair when Rick Waugaman picked up the ensuing kickoff and dashed 80 yards for a touchdown. Dale Graham added the extra point and South had a 7-3 lead with just 3:24 gone in the first quarter.

On the first play of the second quarter, Lakeland's star back Darrin Campbell ran the ball to South's 24-yard-line and set up what seemed like an easy score. Except with a first and 10 on South's 24-yard-line, Lakeland almost fumbled away any chance for a touchdown.

Lakeland quarterback Jim St. John fumbled the ball at the snap, but before the South defense could pick it up, St. John found a receiver in the endzone and Lakeland had taken a 10-7 lead.

South controlled the play for the remainder of the half, twice converting third down plays to keep drives going. The Blue Devils had a chance to score when Brian Rathsburg intercepted a Lakeland pass with four seconds left, but South quarterback Bill Crow's

pass to end Jim Arnold fell incomplete.

The Blue Devils' had an excellent chance to score in the early moments of the second half. After Rathsburg ran the kickoff to his own 38-yard line, Crow connected on a first down pass to Kurt Allen. Crow's next pass fell incomplete — as intended receiver Paul Hawk had already been flattened by the Lakeland defense. South's protests that pass interference should have been called were ignored by the referees.

South threatened a number of times in the second half, but the Crow-Allen and Crow-Arnold connections were just not working as a number of Crow's passes were incomplete.

Meanwhile, South's defense held Lakeland off the board as Ken Fromm and company had the Eagles backed up to second down and 33 at one point.

Lakeland's St. John sent the Eagles fans into a "we're No. 1" chant when he wiggled away from a potential sack and turned a third down play into a first down on the South 17-yard line. South's defense held for two plays but, again, St. John scrambled out of trouble and hit Campbell for the touchdown to put Lakeland on top for good, 17-7.

The play was typical of Lakeland's fortunes all day, and plays like that were crucial to the Eagles' win. "They were able to execute a couple of broken plays. On that fumble, we relaxed and they were able to pick it up and throw over us," Hepner said.

South, which depends heavily upon the run, was unable to really get anything going as fullback Hawk was stopped several times. "This is not an excuse, but we're a small, quick football team and that was taken away from us by the condition of the field. Our first nine games were won by quickness and that was shut down," Hepner added.

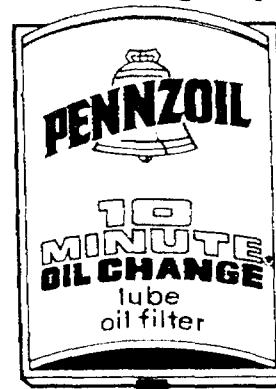

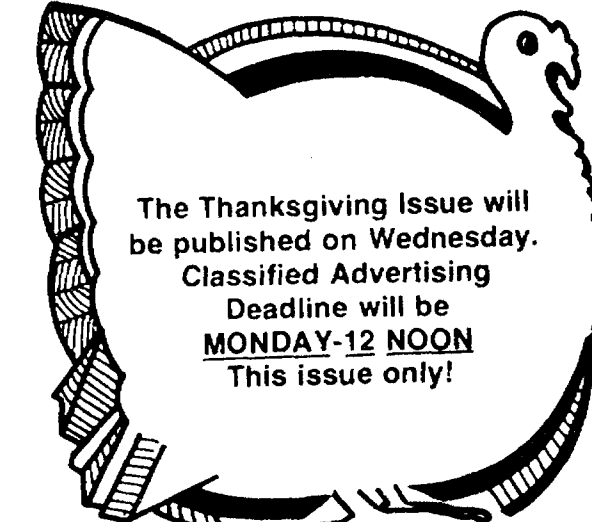

games around Grosse Pointe this fall.

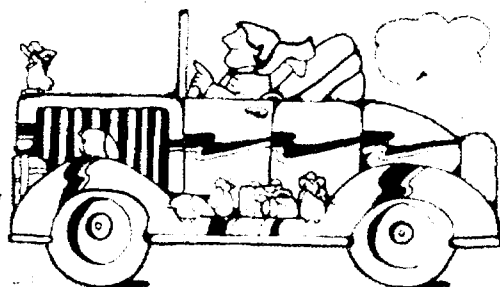
