Bon Secours will test Park's new zoning ordinance

Adding 10,000 square feet of space, 45 more parking spaces, a street closing and a formal request for a zoning variance in building height were the latest moves by Bon Secours Hospital and The Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology (DIO) for the proposed \$5 million outpatient medical building in Grosse Pointe Park. Council set a public hearing on the matter on July 9.

Bon Secours, represented by David Benfer, chief executive officer, and Philip C. Hessburg, M.D., president and medical director of DIO, introduced a model of the building that, if approved, will exceed the city's brand new zoning ordinance by 12 feet.

Theodore Sutherland, an architect from Smith, Hinchman and Grylls Associates, Inc., displayed the model which will house the DIO, Bon Secours Ambulatory Surgery Center, physician offices for Ophthalmic Surgeons, P.C., other private physician offices and a mechanical room at the top of the building.

He said the building would provide 45,000 square feet of space and would exceed the 30 foot zoning height limitation by about 12 feet.

He also said the group is asking for 155 parking spaces which would exceed anticipated needs instead of the 110 required by city code. "The buffer zone to the community will be the parking spaces," said Sutherland. "The visual effect of the variance from ground level will be minimal."

Plans call for Nottingham to be blocked off from Jefferson Avenue. Entry to parking lots will be from Jefferson Avenue and Somerset. Screen walls and large green areas will be installed around the parking lot to afford neighbors privacy and sound absorption.

When the plan was first presented to council and the community in January, it called for a 35,000 square foot building at the corner of Nottingham and Jefferson. At that time Benfer, of Bon Secours, declined to answer questions regarding height and style because

he said plans hadn't proceeded that far.

However, he assured everyone that his group wanted to work with the community and that the structure would comply with the community's zoning ordinance. Less than a month later, Mayor Palmer Heenan made the first reference to the possibility of a variance.

At that time he explained it may come down to a choice between having a building that falls within the 300 foot height limitation and has less parking versus a three story building and more parking.

Some residents questioned the mayor's commitment to keeping the city's residential look considering the fact that the zoning ordinance had just recently been passed. However, Heenan said he would hate to see Bon Secours build elsewhere for the sake of a small variance.

"This is a chance to change (that location) from semi-blight," said Heenan. "It would be a credit to our city and would encourage other developers to do something here."

At that time all of council voiced support for the venture even with the possible zoning variance.

Auto theft ring snags Park man

A Grosse Pointe Park resident caught in a car theft ring on June 15, after five investigations and local police investigations into two auto theft rings operating between Port Huron and Detroit.

Anthony Auk, 22, of 1386 Three Mile Drive, and Mark Auk, 25, of 8495 Meisner Road in Richmond, were among 11 people charged with various counts of receiving and concealing stolen property and falsifying applications for vehicle titles, according to Don McIntyre, criminal investigator for St. Clair County's Prosecutor's office.

McIntyre described the Richmond location, run by Anthony Auk, as "a major chop shop which over a six-month period paid some suppliers well over \$100,000 for vehicle parts."

He said the brothers primarily bought salvaged cars legally from auto pound auctions in Detroit and rebuilt them with parts, some of which were stolen. They often shipped the finished product to wholesale dealers in states where lax titling standards permitted a no-questions-asked transaction.

"In some instances, the parts put back on were the actual parts stolen off the cars in the first place," said McIntyre.

He said the brothers developed a process which enabled them to lift off the stamped "salvaged vehicle" title from cars they legally bought at police auctions, making them easier to sell on a no-questions-asked basis.

Cars that are stolen, stripped and located are sometimes classified as unprofitable to repair by insurance companies, according to Lt. Wesley Skowron of the Michigan State Police Auto Theft Unit.

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Liquor petitions are still 256 names short

Only 256 more signatures are needed by July 1, and Grosse Pointe City residents will get a chance to decide whether or not they want beer and wine, or liquor to flow by the glass in their community.

"We've received slightly over 700 valid signatures," said Thomas Kressbach, city manager, tabulating the number of registered voters who have already mailed signed petitions to put the question on the November election ballot.

Last September, a group of village merchants, represented by the City's former mayor John L. King and including the village's biggest commercial retailer, Jacobson's, Inc., asked for tavern licenses to sell beer and wine by the glass. Other applicants were Andrew Moquin, co-owner of the Merry Mouse's Cafe Le Chat and Vito DePalma, owner of the Clairmont Restaurant. Shortly thereafter, Steve Scandalis, of the Ram's Horn joined the trio.

Since then, council tentatively discussed the pros and cons of such a move and even held two study sessions before deciding to solve their problem by throwing it into seemingly unconcerned voters' laps.

The question of serving liquor by the glass goes back to 1933 when prohibition was repealed. Before that, the City had been dry along with the rest of the nation since Jan. 18, 1919, when the 18th Amendment to the Constitution went into effect. But in 1934 the city was voted dry by an almost two-thirds vote, according to Richard Hinks, city attorney. "The only way someone could get a Class C License to sell liquor is to go to the electorate again," said Hinks. "It can only be changed by another referendum by the people."

Council could have approved tavern licenses, which is what the businessmen wanted, but it hesitated to do so. It felt it would have just been a matter of time before one of the applicants wanted a Class C License, according to Hinks who said the Michigan State Liquor Control Commission informed him that the tavern licenses are almost non-existent these days.

"They get a tavern license and within a matter of weeks apply for a Class C," he said. There are now almost 7,000 Class C Licenses in Michigan and less than 200 Tavern Licenses."

Council didn't want to give its approval because of potential problems that can occur once licenses are issued. This includes losing some community control to the liquor commission which regulates business hours and license transfers.

"Once a license is issued, the holder has a vested interest in the community, has rights and answers to the commission, not the city," said Hinks.

Another question yet to be dealt with is who will get the four available licenses. Should a home-grown business, little as it may be, be given preference over a well-known outsider willing to get a piece of the anticipated action?

The vote in November will only be to decide if alcohol should be served, it will not determine which businesses will get any or all of the licenses.

Cable tv

This is the police!

This is 1984, after all.

While watching MTV one dark and stormy night, just as Cyndi Lauper is finishing "Girls Just Want to Have Fun," a voice comes over your television set and warns you of impending tornadoes in the area. Turning the selector, you find the same message on all the channels.

Sounds Big Brother-ish? Well, it's ComCast's way to help cities keep their residents on top of a variety of possible emergencies.

Police officials from Grosse Pointe Shores, St. Clair Shores and Fraser will soon be furnished with a code that, by dialing a telephone, will allow them to override all stations on the cable system and warn residents of impending emergencies, according to ComCast manager for governmental affairs Don Ivey.

ComCast already has the emergency override system in place in other of its franchise

cities, Ivey said. The override allows the chief of police or civil defense director to tell viewers about the emergency and ask them to tune to a local access channel. The override lasts for 30 seconds and can also include a typed message, he added.

The system can announce weather emergencies like tornadoes, severe thunderstorms as well as other situations that officials feel warrant the overriding message, Ivey told Shores trustees at their June 19 meeting.

The equipment for the system is being tested in the three cities and meetings are scheduled with police chiefs to show them how to operate the system, Ivey said. If all goes well, ComCast hopes to have the system operating by mid-July, he added.

ComCast, which purchased the Shores-Fraser franchise from Cox Cable, provides service to Warren, Sterling Heights, Mt. Clemens, Shelby Township, Clinton Township, Utica and Macomb Township.

Fireworks top holiday fare in Pointe

So what's there to do until the Fourth if you don't want to shop during Mack U.S.A. days, catch the fireworks and concert at Parcels, take part in the Park Civic Association Fourth of July parade or attend the International Freedom Festivities downtown?

The Mack Avenue Business and Professional Association's fireworks will cap a 10-day Mack U.S.A. promotion. Businesses along the five and a half miles of shopping center have been asked to decorate with banners, bunting and flags to celebrate the holiday. (Climaxing the promotion will

be the Sunday, July 1, fireworks at Parcels, preceded by a concert by the St. Clair Shores Symphony Orchestra. The orchestra should begin playing on the school grounds about 7:30 p.m. and continue until full dark. The 20 minute display will follow.

The first blasts over Lochmoor will end more than a year of committee planning, according to Kathy Forster. It will also be the first time in a number of years the display has taken place.

The idea was born at a Mack business association luncheon last June, Mrs. Forster said.

"People were talking about the downtown fireworks and how they didn't like going downtown because of the crowds," and I said, "it's too bad we didn't have the fireworks out here anymore," she said.

Should it rain Sunday, the fireworks will fly Tuesday, July 3, same time, same place.

The fireworks are far from becoming an annual event, however, Mrs. Forster noted. Funding for this year is still short of its goal, and some companies may have to swallow their bills, she said. "The

 "I would love to think it'll be an ongoing thing" but a project that loses money can't have a bright future, she said.

All five Grosse Pointes, service and community organizations donated cash to the event, the association said. The Woods has a \$3,900 appropriation in next year's budget, just in case the fireworks are on again.

One program that is and will continue to be an annual event is the Grosse Pointe Park Civic Association's Fourth of July parade from Pierce School to Patterson Park.

The parade, which begins at 2 p.m. Wednesday at Pierce, will have more floats than before to accompany the bands, antique cars, children's decorated bikes and decorated pets, according to parade chairman Al Thomas. Olympic contenders for the 1984 Games and World War II veterans will also march. There will be a

special car for a Park resident who will be named "Volunteer of the Year." A two-foot-long ceramic alligator will be awarded to the prize-winning float.

The Senior Citizen Band, "The Standard Five," will entertain at Patterson Park after the parade, where voters can meet political candidates. Color guards, helicopters and refreshments will also be available.

The parade will wind down Somerset and Westchester to Essex, where it will join with the Children's Parade for the final march to Patterson Park.

If you're looking for international flavor, you probably know the International Freedom Festival opened last Friday night. You may not know that a number of events continue right through to the Fourth.

One of those will be the Wheels of Freedom parade from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday from City Hall Square in Windsor to the G.M. and Fisher buildings in Detroit.

Among the 225 classic cars on display will be Woods resident Marty Bufalini's 1926 Dodge Broth-

ers, which he will pilot along the parade route from University Avenue in Windsor, across the Ambassador Bridge and to West Grand Boulevard.

Other events during the 26th annual fair, the largest in North America, are the fireworks on the waterfront downtown Monday night beginning at 10 p.m. The spectacle will be televised by WDIV — who with Hudson's, Strohs' and WMJC sponsored the event.

The Conklin Festival runs noon to midnight during the festival at Oulette and Riverside in Windsor's Dieppe Park. A Las Vegas Casino runs until the Fourth in Cleary Auditorium from 6 p.m. to 1 a.m. weekdays, 1 p.m. to 1 a.m. weekends and holidays.

Try Children's Day in the Cultural Center tomorrow beginning at 9:30 a.m., then head to Hart Plaza, where music plays "On the Stron Mainstage."

Over six days, five types of music will be featured, including Music and Dance of the 80's, A salute to Motown with the Spinners, the Gospel Fest, International Jazz Jam and All Amer-

ican Country. Music lovers can also cross to Windsor for live music in Dieppe Park each night at 7:30 during the festival.

Clowns, marching bands, mimes and dancers will keep Hart Plaza beating during the festival. The Canada Dry parade is July 1, beginning at 10 a.m. down Oulette Avenue. Also, more than 60 Eastern Market specialty shops plan "A Taste of Eastern Market" beginning the same time, same day.

Windsor events beginning tomorrow include the International Air Show, through Saturday, The Great Bed Race, Sunday; Water Polo Championship, Friday; International Track and Field Saturday; Novice Water Ski Tournament and Show Friday through Sunday; and a triathlon Sunday.

In Detroit, look for Cinema Canada Friday, the International Tugboat Race Saturday, the Comerica 10,000 Freedom Festival Race Saturday, Dance for Freedom Monday, Independence Eve Concert at Fort Wayne Tuesday and the New Citizen Swearing-In on the Fourth.

Closing festival ceremonies are Wednesday at 8 p.m. at Dieppe Park in Windsor.

When they are sold at auction, they have the "salvaged vehicle" stamp on them. When these cars are ready to be sold again, Michigan law requires that they be inspected by police and often receipts are needed as proof of repair.

"If you don't have receipts or if they're questionable, the car is often shipped to an area that doesn't require a double check," said Skowrum. "Generally, the Auks were rebuilding salvaged vehicles with alleged stolen parts and shipping a lot of cars to wholesalers in other states.

"Over \$150,000 worth of auto parts confiscated from their unlicensed operation April 6 have been identified as stolen," he added.

Anthony Auk was charged with three counts of conspiracy to receive and conceal stolen property, four counts of actual receiving and concealing stolen property over \$100, and three counts for falsifying applications for car titles, according to McIntyre.

Mark Auk has been charged with three counts of conspiracy to receive and conceal stolen property, four counts of receiving and concealing stolen property over \$100 and six counts of falsifying applications for car titles. Both are out

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Help at Northeast Drug abuse and seniors

"Some people think that alcohol and drug abuse exists only for pleasure. But abuse can be the result of unintentional misuse which is just as dangerous because it can be addicting," says Jonathon York, Ph.D., executive director of Northeast Guidance Center.

York says that the Center's Older Adult Services Program is available to the public and community groups who want to become more aware of the signs of substance and alcohol abuse among the elderly and learn what help is available.

People who could take advantage of this program might include the postman, bartender or neighborhood grocer — anyone who could see the older person

briefly, but on a somewhat regular basis.

Such a person would be in a position to notice a sudden shift in mood or loss of mental alertness, behavior that in the past had been chalked up to growing old.

York, who is also chairman of the Michigan Mental Health and Aging Advisory Group, says a random study done a few years ago by that organization found that a large percentage of adults 50 years of age or older were long-term users of Valium. They also tended to suffer high levels of emotional distress due to such losses as a spouse, income, friends and family. A great majority had chronic physical and basic health problems.

"If no other help were avail-

able for this group, then using drugs would be okay," says York. "But since they can be helped, long term use of drugs keeps them from dealing with their problems. While drugs are appropriate in the short run, studies have shown that when older people do seek professional help, such as counseling, they have a good success rate."

He says "most physicians haven't necessarily studied or learned about the specific drug prescribing pattern and that psychoactive drugs should be adjusted for the elderly because their physiology and metabolism absorb it differently.

"Some of the side effects include high blood pressure and dizziness which can make a person confused and look and act like they have Alzheimer's disease," says York.

Another part of the problem is that a lot of older adults go to several physicians for different ailments collecting diagnoses and prescriptions along the way.

"And if each doctor is prescribing medication, then that person is sitting on a time bomb," says York.

The fallacy that old age and depression go hand in hand helps to disguise drug and alcohol abuse, according to Carol Zielinski, supervisor of the substance abuse program at Northeast Guidance Center.

"The elderly tend to take more drugs such as sleeping pills and Valium, and they mix it with alcohol," she says. "Their bodies don't handle it as well as they did before and they suffer by having interrupted sleep patterns and depression."

Often, notes Ms. Zielinski, a person won't realize they have a drinking problem because they still begin to get the same effective jolt from only two drinks instead of the usual three. "Actually, they're getting the same amount due to the aging process. Also, those couple of drinks mom takes for 'medicinal' purposes are rarely prescribed by a physician.

Sherrard home may make national register

The first home ever designed by architect Albert Kahn may end up on the National Register of Historic Places, thanks to the Roseville investment company that purchased the house this month.

The Lakeshore home in the Farms was designed in 1893 by Albert Kahn, who was then working for Mason & Rice. Built for Charlotte Berry Sherrard, the home features oak paneling and interiors, Lake Superior stone foundations and bowed leaded glass windows. It was copied after a Britany farmhouse.

"They're doing a very good job (at the home)," Frankie Kerouac Parker, a relative of the Sherrard family said. "Whoever gets it will have a real nice home."

Bill Fox, of the Roseville-based S&G National Investment Co., said the goal is to restore the home to period style and sell it.

The company hopes to preserve and "bring the house back" by restoring it to look like it would in its heyday, he added.

Attorney Jon Gandelot, retained by S&G to draw up the application for the National Register for Historic Places, said there are three

criteria that can be used to call a place historic.

The place itself can be of significance for what occurred there, or for who lived there, Gandelot said. Or the architecture of the home can make it historic.

The Sherrard heirs sold the home and property with the provision that the home remain, Gandelot and Fox said.

In May, 1983, the home was listed with a local realtor for \$285,000. At the time, Mrs. Parker said the family was hoping to have a historic designation made for the home, but the complicated joint ownership didn't allow it.

The six-bedroom home could qualify as a historic site because of its being designed by Kahn, Gandelot said.

Kahn designed the home three years before he left Mason & Rice to found his own company that, by 1938, was designing 18 percent of all architect-designed buildings in the United States.

Among Kahn's local credits are the Vernier School and the Shores municipal building, the original Rose Terrace, razed in the 1920s at the death of Horace Dodge, as well as the now-demolished homes of Henry Joy, Philip McMillan and John Newberry.

'Intellectual exercise'

At 66, Boyce Tope, a transplanted Ohian, still manages to find life in Grosse Pointe Woods fulfilling.

And one of the best reasons for that is the association with the Detroit Executive Service Corps (DESC), an organization dedicated to helping Detroit area nonprofit groups to prosper.

Tope is one of about 50 former executives who have committed themselves to a simple proposition — helping government, churches, schools, social service agencies, etc., to find ways of doing their jobs more effectively and efficiently.

"It's nice intellectual exercise," said Tope who has been one of the DESC's more active participants.

Tope is well known for his relationship with the Detroit Automobile Dealers Association. He joined the DADA in December 1953, eventually became executive vice-president and general manager of the DADA's Auto Show, the second largest in the country.

He retired in 1977 and plunged in-

to an assortment of volunteer activities to which he added the DESC connection when that organization was developed in 1982.

Tope chuckled happily when he recalled one of his first assignments with the DESC.

"I walked into the agency's office and found myself face-to-face with an official with whom I had had some tough dealings while I was with the DADA," said Tope. "But it worked out beautifully."

Because it is the DESC's policy to keep all contacts confidential, Tope revealed no names. But he did explain how he spent many hours with that official and his colleagues in putting together a fund-raising campaign.

"We advise the counsel, but we do not in any way get involved in the ac-

tual fund-raising," said Tope. "Primarily, the DESC is interested in helping with other kind of management problems."

Tope is working with several other groups on a variety of organizational problems, but still manages to find time to travel and to remain involved with things hereditary and military. He is active with the National Defense Executive Reservists and the Michigan Society of Sons of the American Revolution, among others.

Tope, a Chicago native who grew up in Cleveland, came to Detroit after World War II to sell ads for Machinery magazine, an Ohio publication. He had enlisted in the Air Force after being graduated from Ohio State in 1940.

Foundation will start membership drive

The Grosse Pointe Shores Improvement Foundation, its board of trustees and officers in place, will begin asking residents for memberships and ideas when the non-profit corporation begins its solicitation at the end of the month.

The foundation, incorporated to help supplement municipal services through the tax-deductible donations of members and residents, met for the first time June 4 and elected officers from among charter trustees.

Kurt Tech, who headed the study committee that recommended the formation of the foundation, was elected president. Council president Gerald Schroeder was elected foundation first vice-president. George N. Bashara, Jr., who helped write the articles of incorporation, was elected secretary. William Dahling was elected second vice-president

and village trustee C. Bradford Lundy, Jr. was elected treasurer.

Other charter members of the board of trustees are Lynn S. Alandt, Peter Bogas, Thomas Candler, Peter Cracchiolo, Harold Cross, Edward Deeb, Marianne Endicott, Mrs. William Clay Ford, Mervyn Gaskin, William Genematas, Mrs. Donald Mandich, Paul Naz, Dr. John Nehra, Alexander Nick, Mrs. Joseph Vance and Ralph Wilson, Jr.

Tech said the foundation, similar to one established a couple years ago in the Farms, will promote resident participation to decide projects the foundation will undertake.

The foundation wasn't formed for a single project, he said, adding that although some suggestions for things like additions to the landscaping at the municipal building have been made, there are no com-

mitments of funds yet.

The foundation is "looking for participation in the development of the community," Tech said. "We feel, in the approach we've taken, we're not looking at this simply from a fund-raising point of view."

Based on initial reaction, Tech said he expects very good response to the \$30 foundation memberships. Representatives hope to contact each of the near-1,000 homes in the village by the end of the month, he added.

Projects can be recommended to the foundation board by residents and members and will be reviewed by the board which will make recommendations to the village council about projects to undertake. While the board is solely responsible for financing, the board and council will mutually decide on the schedule for completion.

Funding will be on a continuous basis, according to the foundation mission statement. From time to time, the foundation may hold special fund-raising drives for specific projects. The business and money of the foundation will be managed by a committee appointed by the foundation.

Projects that will be supported by the foundation board are ones that will improve the appearance of the village and its facilities provided for the enjoyment of residents.

Under its articles of incorporation, the foundation is "to be used to provide facilities and services primarily for the beautification... and upgrading of its public grounds and facilities... perpetuation of the memory of persons, preservation of objects of historical or natural interest and provide facilities and services to the village..."

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Cities ask block grants of \$321,000

Wayne County has decided there's no significant environmental impact to millions of dollars worth of projects funded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The 1985 block grant projects include \$321,000 to be completed by Grosse Pointe communities.

Grosse Pointe City has requested \$66,516 for street improvements and minor home repair projects. The resurfacing of Grosse Pointe Court from Charlevoix to Mack by September 1985, will receive \$20,000. Landscaping and street improvements including the design of a mall area on St. Clair from Kercheval to Mack is slated for \$37,616. Minor home repair services for 40 lower income residents will receive \$8,900, according to the county.

The Farms will use \$30,000 of its \$86,347 to demolish the Old Kerby School behind the city's fire station. The city will also provide 200 to 300 lower income residents with smoke alarms, make improvements in weatherization to 12 homes; and provide minor home repairs for 70 senior citizens cost-

ing \$26,347. The city is also requesting \$30,000 to use as commercial loans and grants to help from eight to 12 businesses in code enforcement, facade renovation and signage improvements.

The loans and grants, to be made by December, 1985, will go to businesses on Kercheval On-The-Hill and Mack from Fisher to Allard.

Grosse Pointe Park will receive \$86,347 from the county in grant money. The Park will use the bulk of the funding, almost \$78,000, for sidewalk construction, street furniture installation and landscaping, street lighting and the addition of planter boxes on Mack from Beaconsfield to Nottingham. The rest of the money, \$8,500, will go to minor home repair for 50 senior citizens.

Most of the Woods' \$82,247 will be used on Mack. The city has asked for \$16,200 to fund an interest subsidy commercial loan program for 15 businesses along Mack, as well as providing architectural fees for those businesses who intend to renovate their storefronts in line with

the city's master storefront guidelines.

Also, the city will replace 6,000 square feet of sidewalk with sod and 25 trees in the easements and medians of Mack between Kenmore and Oxford, Fleetwood and Beaufait, and Bournemouth and Newcastle for \$24,000. The city will add six combined off-and-on street parking spaces on Newcastle, Prestwick, Torrey, Vernier and Mack for \$27,047 by July, 1985.

The Woods will also use \$15,000 to provide minor home repairs to 300 senior citizen homeowners by the end of next year.

The county decided not to prepare an environmental impact statement on the projects because it feels the projects requests by county communities will not significantly affect the human environment, according to the county.

Persons who disagree with the county's decision on the filing of the environmental impact statement can file written comments with the county Community Development Office by Monday, July 9. The county will review all comments before taking action on the funding requests.

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An independent decision

The Michigan Supreme Court in the past has often been criticized for being too political. The criticism goes back to the way in which the members are nominated and elected. They are nominated in political party conventions and then run in nonpartisan elections, which means that the court members often are better known as politicians than as lawyers at the time they seek office.

Yet in striking down the 1983 legislative reapportionment plan the Michigan Supreme Court took an independent action. Gov. James Blanchard, who has appointed one justice and who signed the reapportionment bill into law, commented that the unanimous decision striking down the plan showed that the justices are "an apolitical and non-partisan court." That certainly seems to be the situation in this case.

THAT HAS NOT SPARED the court some strong criticism from other Democrats, who were the chief supporters of the reapportionment plan and apparently expected better treatment from the Democratic court majority. House Democratic Floor Leader Joe Forbes of Oak Park, even though he is not running for reelection, was especially critical.

"I am amazed and shocked that some of my Democratic colleagues on the Supreme Court did what they did," Forbes was quoted as saying. But it is politicians such as Forbes who contribute to the court's poor reputation. They want the justices to serve their respective political parties rather than all of the people of the state. Forbes also forgets that members of the court, while nominated by party conventions, do run as nonpartisan candidates, which means that after their election they ought not to be regarded as "colleagues" of either Democratic or Republican politicians.

It is true, of course, that the Democratic politicians are upset at the decision because they were responsible for putting the reapportionment plan through the Legislature. And now it appears likely the 1984 election will be based on the reapportionment plan in effect two years ago which was more favorable to Republican candidates for the Legislature. But the court's job is to interpret the Constitution, not to serve one political party or another, and that appears to be what it did in this case.

In fact, the court simply found that the reapportionment law violated a section of the 1963 Constitution which says, "No bill shall be altered or amended on its passage through either house so as to change its original purpose as determined by its total content." In effect, the court ruled that the Legislature was wrong to hang the reapportionment measure onto an obscure bill written with a different purpose in mind.

True, the case creates a lot of confusion for political parties, candidates and the general public with respect to the 1984 primary and general elections, cancels out one recent special election and even requires the rescheduling of a second special election. But if anyone is going to be blamed for the confusing outlook, it will have to be Democrats who controlled both houses of the Legislature when the reapportionment bill was rushed to passage last December.

FINLEY PETER DUNNE, the humorist, once wrote, "No matter whether the Constitution follows the flag or not, the Supreme Court follows election returns." That comment was directed at the Supreme Court of the United States but it often applies to the high courts of the states as well. Judges do not live in a political vacuum and they are often responsive to the same political winds that influence the electorate. So, indeed, they do sometimes reflect the election results.

But in Michigan the Supreme Court successfully resisted political pressure and took an independent rather than a partisan action. And even though its reapportionment decision was based on technical rather than substantive grounds, the court deserves a pat on the back from the general public rather than the hard knocks it has been getting from Democratic legislators.



When charity becomes a traffic hazard

To the Editor:

This morning I witnessed an accident at Vernier and Mack at about 7:30 a.m. This is the infamous intersection on which Grosse Pointe Woods spent a considerable amount of money after a child was killed in an accident there. Lanes were widened, curbs replaced, "no turn on red" signs installed and other improvements were implemented to make this busy intersection safe.

Why then does Grosse Pointe Woods continually allow different groups to solicit contributions in the busy traffic at this intersection? This policy is not consistent with the improvements and procedures enacted to make this intersection safe.

The solicitors' presence may not have been a direct cause of the accident I witnessed, but I believe it was a contributing factor.

I am sure that the various groups who use this area for solicitation have worthy causes. But if someone gets hurt at that intersection because of the soliciting, it will be very unfortunate because it can be prevented.

I favor a ban on any solicitation by any group which constitutes a traffic hazard to drivers, pedestrians or the solicitors.

Recall: Reality can be harsh

To the Editor:

Will wonders never cease! In just one week CARE was transformed from "the CARE BEARS with their No Smoking Signs" to a "slick political machine... with power and money." I thought the slick political machine was in Grosse Pointe Park and that it managed to get itself elected to municipal office by running on a school closing issue.

From the very beginning, the Recall organization asked for a referendum so it could show that it had a majority of the community behind it. It got just what it asked for and the result could not be more decisive. Despite the attempt to disqualify the absentee vote and despite the 8,700 signatures on the Recall petitions, the community, in the privacy of the voting booth, let its wishes be known.

This result can be viewed as another in a series of events. It began with a millage election that barely passed; a swimming pool vote that concluded attempts to build another pool; and an election that saw Vincent LoCicero and Dorothy Kennel in a field of seven take office after running on platforms that included a willingness to close schools. All this should give the opponents to retrenchment and fiscal responsibility pause.

If anyone is going to vote against the next millage it is more likely to be a concerned citizenry, regardless of age, and not the parents of elementary school children. The disappearance of volunteers is being felt at all levels of the school system — not because of a disenchantment with events or the system — but because 85 percent of all American families have two wage earners. No one is staying home and a tired mother and father simply don't have the time and energy to take on additional tasks after a hard day at the office.

Cries of disenfranchisement remind me of the new euphemism for the used car — "A previously owned vehicle". You did not get disenfranchised. You lost an election pure and simple. It isn't the end of the world, but it is the end of a time when you could have what you wanted when you wanted it without caring what anyone else thinks. There is a new reality. People are marrying later in life, if at all. Those that do marry are having fewer children, are having the children later than their parents and are electing to pursue careers as an alternative to someone staying home with the children. It is time to deal with these facts.

I doubt very much that a majority of the citizenry in Grosse Pointe wants to see half the schools closed or the neighborhood school concept discarded. On the other hand, I also doubt that the majority will be satisfied with one school closing and the transfer of the sixth grade to the middle school (absent a dramatic turn around in the enrollment).

The mayor of Grosse Pointe Park did not talk to the same people I did. A significant number of those opposed to the recall also said they felt the board should not have backed away from the first plan and the second plan so quickly.

I believe there is room for compromise at all levels. It is time for the shrill rhetoric to stop and the planning for the future to start. A new school census should be completed sometime this summer. The census, along with voluminous materials developed by the school study committees should suggest a course of action. It is one thing to decide not to close any more facilities for two years. It is another to let the subject sit for two years and then try to pick up the thread at that time. The two-year moratorium should be utilized to find a basis for future action that will at worst leave opposing factions equally dissatisfied and at best allow the community to face up to an unpleasant reality.

Hitched to the wrong star?

It is widely believed that Richard Headlee, the 1982 Republican nominee for governor, is trying to keep alive his hopes for a second run at the governorship in 1986 by serving as a spokesman for the Voter's Choice amendment which is expected to be on the November ballot. But in view of the mounting opposition to the proposed amendment Headlee may discover that his backing is counterproductive. He may be hitching his wagon to the wrong star.

There is new reason for making that conclusion after the announcement that a new group calling itself the Promote Michigan Committee will campaign against the Voter's Choice amendment on the grounds that its adoption would cripple Michigan's schools and other institutions and halt the state's economic recovery.

The committee claims representatives of more than 25 organizations, including the Michigan AFL-CIO, the Michigan Education Association, New Detroit Inc., Ford Motor Co., Michigan Council of Churches and the Michigan Retailers Association. While the AFL-CIO and the Michigan Education Association have been supporters of Democratic candidates and policies, such organizations as the Michigan Retailers Association, the Michigan Council of Churches and the Ford Motor Co. tend to take independent positions on state issues.

FOR EXAMPLE, LARRY MEYER of the Michigan Retailers Association said the Voter's Choice amendment would have devastating effects on the state's economy. "It offers a simplistic and deceptive message," he said. "But we feel that voters who understand the proposal and what it would do to this state will reject it."

Voter's Choice supporters are circulating petitions to force the amendment on the ballot in November. The proposal would return all local and state taxes to their levels of Dec. 31, 1981, and put a cap on one-half of 1 percent on nonresident city income taxes even though Detroit's current

nonresident rate is 1 1/2 percent. The amendment would prohibit increases in taxes without voter approval and bar increases in user fees, licenses and government permits without four-fifths approval by the appropriate government body or a popular vote.

THE EXTENT OF THE impact of the Voter's Choice amendment was recently spelled out in a report by the Citizens Research Council of Michigan. It said that, subject to restoration by voters, the proposal would reduce state tax revenues by more than \$1 billion a year, cut local income tax revenues by about \$40 million in Detroit and Highland Park and slice local property tax revenues in a number of other jurisdictions.

"The Voter's Choice proposal, if adopted, would greatly expand the amount of legislation subject to mandatory voter approval," the report said. "It would provide voters with a referendum not only on a particular tax but also, indirectly, on the size of government. It would, however, also require voter approval of a wide range of tax base changes, many of which would be very technical and of interest only to businesses."

It is clear that the Voter's Choice is an extreme proposal which would, as the Michigan Retailers Association spokesman said, have devastating effects on the state's economy. But it would tie the hands of legislators in dealing with state problems and leave the way open for special interest groups to lobby the public on behalf of tax legislation beneficial to their cause. In effect, it would give voters the power to write tax legislation which is a task they are not equipped to handle.

If voters dislike tax policies, they have every right to vote out of office the governor and legislators who are held responsible. But voters have that right now. And despite Headlee's support, this newspaper agrees with the Promote Michigan Committee that the proposed Voter's Choice amendment would be bad for Michigan and ought to be voted down if it appears on the ballot in November.

It is a month that revives the spirit and sparks resolutions to realign schedules to allow more time to enjoy the beauty and glory of nature at its best.

It is a time when teenagers are borne aloft with newly charged exuberance as they dash from tennis courts to swimming pools and evening gatherings that can be stretched by the long hours of June daylight.

It is a time when parents can breathe sighs of relief as car pools disband and all that pent-up energy engendered by the confinement of school and weather can be released playing outdoors and savoring the novelty of the first days of summer vacation.

June is all things to all people but most of all to older people who are more threatened and restricted by inclement weather.

June's weather and the opportunity for gardening, walking and driving without fear of slipping or skidding bring renewed vigor and reassurance. The languid gloom of winter's discontent is over and the life of the spirit is reborn as nature itself is renewed and freed from winter's severity.

All things are possible now. Invitations to happenings once gratefully received but regrettably refused because of difficulty in getting around, can now be happily accepted.

And how rewarding it is to be part of the world again! The aches and pains that nagged the body and occupied the mind during months of isolation are put aside as one meets and greets neighbors, friends and relatives.

And what memories these occasions bring back — happy memories that warm the heart and make one appreciate life in all its phases and passages.

You watch 420 graduates march into the high school auditorium to accept the plaudits and praise from those gathered there. You are proud that one of them is your grandson. You are happy to be

there to see them claim the diploma that signifies the successful completion of one phase of their young lives. You hope for all the best for them but most of all you pray that whatever comes they will be ready to meet it.

As you sit there, your mind drifts back to another commencement when the mothers and fathers of these young people graduated. The classes were smaller. The world they were to enter was more receptive. The post-war prosperity had not yet been depleted. The peace and security of life was not yet undermined by threats of nuclear annihilation, rampant crime and the prevalence of drugs. There were jobs to be had. It was a better, safer world.

Yet there was a feeling that the class of 1984 is ready to face the turbulent uncertainty of the 1984 world.

There was an aura of self-confidence about them that indicated a willingness to deal with problems rather than hiding behind a curtain of unrealistic illusions. They seemed prepared to face a world that was a different place than the one their parents had so confidently entered. They were fortified with new skills their parents had never considered: the technology born of advanced mathematics, science and social research.

For older people, this world of 1984 can be a frightening, intimidating, impersonal one. But for those who have spent the last four years in preparation, it is a familiar, promising one.

Their view is different from graduates of other years who were told and fully expected to enter a world that would be eager and ready to accept them, pay them well and insure them an acceptable life.

Not so today. While graduates today are ready and willing they know they will have to prove their worth.

We wish it were different. But there is comfort in the realization that they are coming into a less than perfect world armed with the knowledge, the strength, the fortitude and the optimism that will see them through.

The memory of another graduation drifts back — one when the future was rather bleak. The years leading up to graduation had been lean. They were depression years. Ten million Americans were out of work. The name of the game was survival. But then as now, graduates entered their uncertain future filled with conviction that they would somehow realize their dreams and ambitions.

And so it is with all of June's happenings. Each of them — births, graduations, weddings — trigger memories of other such celebrations. And as we go back in memory we are struck with the realization that no matter what economic or social conditions prevail, it is possible for young people to find and live the good life, because of their energy, optimism and determination.

It is a realization that is often forgotten as we grow older. We give up partly because our energy becomes depleted but also because we lose faith in ourselves and our ability to do the things we would like to do.

New Years is a day set aside for resolutions. But June is a more appropriate time to make adjustments in our attitudes and habits. The weather is more conducive to thinking positively and witnessing occasions that celebrate beginnings can be inspiring.

It's never too late for beginnings. We are living longer than any other generation. We don't want to sit around just waiting for the years to pass. They are bonus years. Enjoy them. Plan for them. Look forward to them. Take a tip from your grandchildren. Be optimistic and willing to try new things.



Take common sense along to fireworks

If you're going to the fireworks Sunday, July 1, at Parcels Middle School, the Woods Public Safety department asks that you bring a little common sense and good judgment along with your blanket and picnic lunch.

You should also leave the alcohol and fireworks behind, according to Grosse Pointe public schools and the police.

The Sunday fireworks are sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Business and Professional Association of Mack Avenue, Inc. and are the first to be held at Parcels in a number of years.

The Woods, which is donating fire, police and ambulance protection for the display, is unsure of the size of the crowd that will attend the fireworks. But if the past displays are any indication, those attending should get there early and leave themselves a good deal of time at the end of the display to leave, Public Safety Director Jack Patterson said.

Because of the amount of traffic expected, the Woods has a few suggestions for those attending the display, Patterson added.

Whenever possible, residents are asked to walk to the school instead of driving. Although it will be Sunday and no meter enforcement will take place, parking will be at a premium.

Those who do drive should find legal parking spaces, Patterson said. Avoid parking in fire routes, alleys and at yellow curbs, he said, adding that blocking intersections, hydrants and fire routes would make it difficult for city personnel to offer the protection for businesses and residents of the city. It's also illegal, he noted.

Parking in the two Parcels lots will be reserved for orchestra members and official vehicles, Patterson said. No other vehicles will be allowed to park there. Also, Sunningdale from Lochmoor to Vernier will be closed to traffic.

Also, sitting on the islands is not permitted, Patterson said. Officers should be on hand beginning about 7 p.m. to help attendees cross the streets at the intersections, rather than mid-block, he added.

Eating and drinking will be allowed at both the concert and the fireworks display, but it's best to leave the barbecue and beer at home, officials said. Alcohol is not to be consumed on the city right of way and the school has prohibitions against consumption on school grounds, officials said. Also, police ask that the trash cans be used, Patterson said.

The use of fireworks by members of the audience could also result in a shortened evening for the user as well as possible arrest, Patterson said. Because of the number of people who attend the event, unauthorized use of fireworks could cause injury, he added.

Officers will be patrolling and enforcing the fireworks prohibition, he added.

"We're talking about a family affair, where mom and dad bring the kids along," Patterson said. "We'd

like to think it will be treated in this manner."

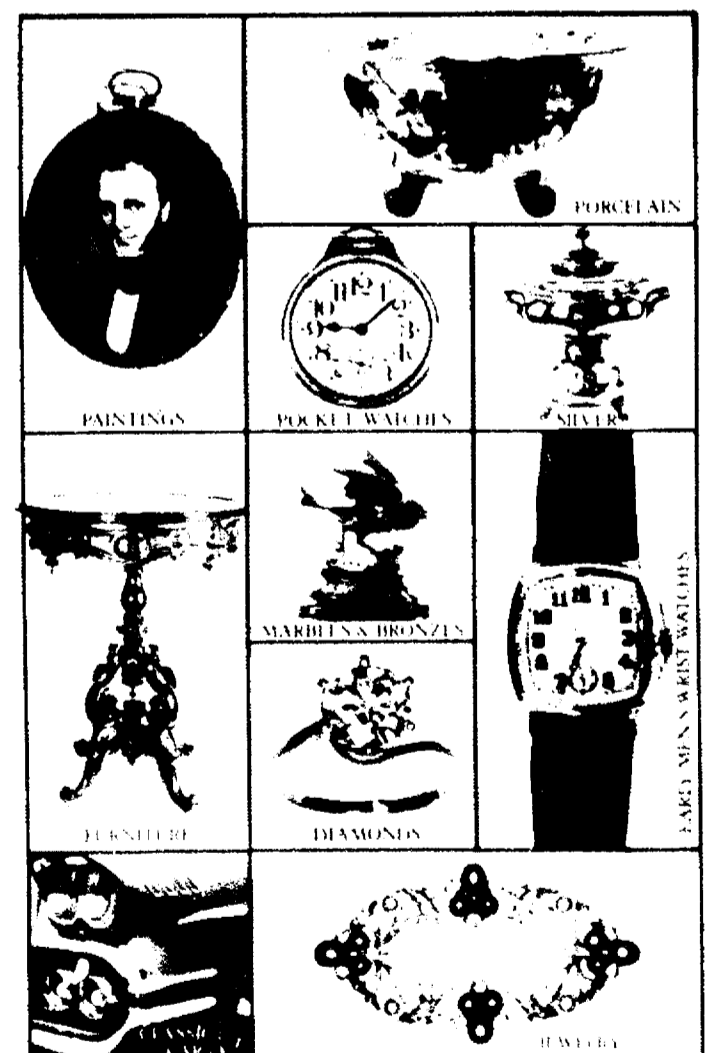
From past experience, police know Mack and Vernier will be congested before, during and after the display. Patterson urges finding an alternate route to Mack or Vernier that day, either using side streets or Harper or Jefferson to move between Moross and Vernier.

It will probably take an hour to clear the area after the display, which will begin at full dark and continue for about 20 minutes, according to police. The display will be preceded by a concert by the St. Clair Shores Symphony Orchestra, who will play from dusk until full dark.

A little common sense and cooperation can make the event not only successful but safe, Patterson said.

The association remains short of its fund-raising goal for the event, according to association member Kathy Forster. Although the event is in no danger of cancellation, the money for the advertising and promotion of Mack U.S.A. aren't there, she added.

Mack U.S.A. is a week-long promotion by Mack businesses that will run Monday, June 25, to Tuesday, July 3, the rain day for the fireworks, according to the association.

Public schools borrow at 6.35

The Board of Education sold \$15.5 million of tax anticipation notes to low bidder National Bank of Detroit earlier this month at an interest rate of 6.35 percent.

Sale of the notes each year allows the school district to borrow money against the property taxes it anticipates collecting by the end of the year. Since taxes aren't collected until December and school begins in September, the district generally borrows an amount equal to roughly half of its operating costs

each year. This year, the state's Municipal Finance Commission authorized the district to borrow \$15.5 million.

Bids on the tax anticipation notes ranged from a high of 6.85 percent interest to National Bank of Detroit's winning offer of 6.35 percent. The sale was supervised by George Stevenson, legal counsel for Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, who was present at the school board's June 12 meeting when the award was made.

Shores businessman claims school board discriminates

A local businessman is challenging the Detroit Board of Education's bidding policy for awarding service contracts because it discriminates against non-minority business, company attorneys said.

Al Provensano, Sr., Shores resident and president of Supreme Heating & Supply Co. of Detroit filed suit last month in U.S. District Court on behalf of his company. The suit challenges a policy the school board adopted in January that favors minority companies in the bidding for service contracts of \$250,000 or less, attorneys for the company said.

The school board bidding policies allow only minority companies, where 51 percent of ownership is by minorities, to bid for service contracts of less than \$250,000, according to Ellen Talerico, of the firm Frank and Stephani, representing Supreme in the matter.

A second tier of bidding is allowed if there are no qualified minority firms or if the bids are considered too high, she said. The bidding was closed before Supreme was allowed to submit its bid, Ms. Talerico said. Supreme held the contract the year before by being low bidder, she added.

No hearings have yet been scheduled in the case before the Hon. Anna Diggs Taylor, who last week refused to enjoin the school board from awarding any service contracts, Ms. Talerico said.

Judge Taylor decided that because summer was the busy time for maintenance and service work in Detroit schools, the system would be

harmful by not allowing contracts to be let, Supreme's attorney said.

Judge Taylor said she would expedite consideration of the constitutionality of the policy.

School board attorney Lynn Metty said the policy was approved by the board to help minority businesses win contracts from the school system. Ms. Metty didn't wish to comment further on the case while it was being tried.

Supreme Heating & Supply has been located in Detroit for 35 years and presently does work for the school board. In a press release from Frank and Stephani, Provensano said he is in favor of affirmative action but believes the board's policy of excluding all non-minority businesses from bidding on service contracts goes too far.

If allowed to stand, the policy may make businesses which are located in Detroit and pay taxes to the city rethink their commitment to the city, Provensano added.

Nursing home bought by Cottage Care

Roseville's only nursing home, the Rose Villa Nursing Center on Kelly Road, has been purchased by the Cottage Continuing Care Corp., according to corporation chairman Robert A. Waters.

The purchase was the firm's first in Macomb County will increase Cottage's ownership of nursing care beds to 275, including 172 at Cottage-Rose Villa and 103 at the Cottage-Belmont home in Harper Woods. Certain cost efficiencies are expected with the additional beds, according to a corporation spokesman.

Cottage-Rose Villa offers a full range of services including physical therapy, recreational events, a barber and beauty shop, lounges and chapel. Each two-bed room has its own climate control and individual telephones upon request.

Rose Villa's administrator, Lee Hastings, will continue in her position, according to the spokesman. She is a graduate of University of Alabama, past president of the Macomb County Healthcare Administrators and a fellow of the American College of Healthcare Administrators.

The nursing care centers are affiliated with Cottage Hospital in the Farms as part of Cottage Health Services Corp.

Becker elected board chairman

The board of directors of the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce recently elected Don C. Becker, president of the Detroit Free Press, as chairman of the board for the Chamber for the 1984-85 fiscal year.

Becker, of the Park, served during the last fiscal year as first vice-chairman of the Chamber. He has also been vice-chairman of the Economic Development Group and chairman of the chamber's Workers' Compensation/Unemployment Compensation committee. He was appointed to the board in 1980 and elected in 1981.

Also elected for a second year term as vice-chairman was W. George Kramer, of the Farms, partner in charge at Price Waterhouse, who will serve as chairman of the Association Services and Community Affairs Group. Frank Zinn, of the Park, continues as legal counsel and Frank E. Smith, of the Shores, will remain president.

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Red Cross needs blood for summer

With a projected shortage of more than 3,000 units of blood a month during July and August, the American Red Cross Blood Services, Southeastern Michigan Region, is appealing to business, industry and community leaders to sponsor blood drives this summer.

"We're looking for plant managers, corporate presidents, union and community leaders who will support the community's blood supply," said Gustave Rissman, director of Red Cross Donor Resources Development. "We would like them to come forward with plans to schedule blood drives that have the potential of 50 or more blood donations."

A critical blood shortage could result in the cancellation or postponement of elective surgery. The lack of blood could also have dire consequences in the event of a major disaster.

"If a company or group normally sponsors one or two drives per year, we would encourage an additional blood drive this summer in an effort to alleviate this potentially serious shortage," added Rissman.

"All the company or group has to do is call Red Cross at 833-4440 and ask for me. Our department will work with the coordinator to establish a date for the drive, and we'll assist the coordinator in scheduling donors during the drive."

Donating blood is safe, relatively painless and takes less than 45 minutes, according to a Red Cross spokesperson. Only sterile disposable equipment is used to collect blood so there is no need to fear contracting AIDS when donating blood. Nor can AIDS be transmitted via donor beds.

Blood can be donated by anyone in good general health who weighs a minimum of 110 pounds and is between the ages of 17 through 65 years old. The procedure takes less than 45 minutes from registration to post donation snack.

Last school day at Barnes

It had been the center of the most hard-fought political battle in recent memory in Grosse Pointe. But there were no banners or organized rallies around on June 14 when Barnes Elementary School finally closed its doors to students.

Instead, kids ran out the doors exhilarated by the start of summer vacation. Teachers packed up their belongings and looked forward to a summer off and new assignments next fall.

The 28-year-old elementary school on Morningside Drive in the Woods was the first victim of a decline in enrollment that has reduced the number of students in Grosse Pointe's public schools by almost half during the last decade. The Board of Education voted last fall to close Barnes and transfer students next year to nearby Monteith and Ferry Elementary Schools. Barnes enrollment, which peaked in the early 1970s at nearly 500, dropped to 191 last year. The school was designed to hold some 300 students by today's class-size standards.

Parents who organized to "save" Barnes brought recall proposals against three school board members but lost in the June 11 election. The school will be altered this summer to accommodate the system's maintenance, instructional materials and community education programs. Some work will begin next week, according to Ben Zenn, the schools' director of support services.

To commemorate the last day of school at Barnes, Principal Jack McMahon and the PTO printed 250 copies of a 215-page book, "The Best of Barnes," including contributions written and drawn by students in each of the eight classes. Each student walked across the stage and received a copy at an assembly in the morning.

Barnes opened in 1956 and was

named for a former superintendent of Grosse Pointe schools. It educated nearly 3,500 students.

In his final letter to parents, Principal McMahon commended the school board for its decision to reuse — not sell — the building or site.

"It is just too good a setting for other than educational purposes," McMahon wrote.

"Hopefully in future years Barnes will reopen its doors for its original intent of educating elementary school age children."

McMahon, who had been Barnes

principal for 16 years, will take over at Richard Elementary School next fall. Grade one teacher Norine Kettel will be transferred to Defer Elementary, grade two instructor Margot Kahl to Poupard, grade one-two teacher Darlene Cooper to Kerby, grade three teacher Julie Strayer to Poupard, grade four teacher Earlene Lopiccola to Parcels Middle School, grade five teacher Carolyn Smith to Richard, grade six teacher Theresa Schmidt to Parcels and secretary Tina Stronski to Richard.

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Here's help for disabled kids

Michigan's new program under Public Act 249 of 1983 to financially support families with severely handicapped children living at home begins July 1 with applications being accepted by the Detroit-Wayne County Community Mental Health (CMH) Board any time after that date, according to Pointer James P. Curran.

Applications and instructions for the Family Support Subsidy Program may be obtained from and submitted to the Detroit-Wayne County CMH Board, 10th floor, Book Building, downtown Detroit.

To be eligible families must have a child under 18, living at home, who has been certified by their local school district under one of three circumstances: severely mentally impaired, severely multiply impaired or autistic impaired.

The total family income cannot exceed \$60,000.

Paris M. Finner, Ph.D., coordinator of developmental disabilities, explained that each family is eligible for \$225 per month per handicapped child up to the age of 18 years.

She urged parents to contact the CMH Board with a written request for the application form and instructions or by phoning 224-5632. The forms will be available after Monday, July 2, and mailed upon request.

Coverage in the program will begin for the calendar month following the month of application.

Lutheran High East wins \$7,800 grant

recipient rights in the health care system.

Joint sponsorship for the session came from the Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital and the Detroit-Wayne County Mental Health Board. It was presented by Skills Sharing Committee of the Detroit-Wayne County Service Provider Directors Group and the Wayne County Ad Hoc Committee for the Prevention and Management of Tardive Dyskinesia Planning Committee. The conference was supported in part by a grant from the Squibb Company.

When practitioners were unable to help their son, the Swans took him to a hospital, but the child's illness was by then too advanced to be successfully treated.

The Swans later filed suit against the Church of Christ Scientist and against the practitioners who attempted to heal their son. The case has been taken to the Michigan Court of Appeals, but no hearing dates have been scheduled.

Moyers and a CBS camera crew flew to Detroit to interview the Swans and Ms. Lutz at her home. The Swans now live in Iowa.

Social Security

Project earnings with care

People getting Social Security benefits who work are required to estimate their projected earnings as accurately as possible and to report the amount to the Social Security Administration, said James Moslener, district manager of the office located at 17420 Mack Avenue.

Furthermore, people should revise these estimates, as necessary, during the course of the year.

"Excess earnings under the annual retirement test are the primary cause of overpayments," Moslener said. "More than one million people were overpaid in 1983 because of underestimation or failure to report their earnings, and total overpayments, as a re-

sult, amounted to more than \$1 billion.

"People must file an annual report of earnings at the end of the taxable year. At that time the amount of benefits due for the year is figured; if all the payments that were due had not been made, the person is paid the appropriate amount.

"On the other hand, if the person is found to have been overpaid, the amount of the overpayment will be withheld from future benefits or will have to be repaid."

ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE XI, SECTION 1110, SIGNS, OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK, TO PERMIT "OPEN HOUSE" SIGNS ON THE PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY ON SUNDAYS ONLY FROM 2:00 P.M. TO 5:00 P.M.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:

1. Subsection 7 of Section 1110, Signs, of Article XI of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Park is hereby amended to read as follows:

"(7) Special Regulation on For Sale or Lease Signs. For sale or rental of individual units, there shall be no more than one (1) such sign, except that on a corner lot two (2) signs, one facing each street, shall be permitted. No such sign shall exceed six (6) square feet in area, and no such sign shall be illuminated. All such signs shall be removed within two (2) weeks after a lease or sale contract has been signed. In addition, for sale of individual units, there shall be no more than two (2) 'Open House' signs permitted. No such sign shall exceed six (6) square feet in area and no such sign shall be illuminated. Such signs shall be displayed on Sundays only from 2:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. Such signs shall only be located in the public right-of-way adjacent to the traveled portion thereof and within 50 feet of the corner of the intersection. No such sign shall be placed at the corner of an intersection if four (4) 'Open House' signs have already been placed at that intersection. No such sign shall be placed on a corner of an intersection if another 'Open House' sign has already been placed at that corner."

2. This ordinance shall take effect upon July 1, 1984.

ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY FOR THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK PURSUANT TO PUBLIC ACT NO. 197, MICHIGAN PUBLIC ACTS OF 1975, AS AMENDED, TO BE KNOWN AS THE DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:

That the Grosse Pointe Park City Code is hereby amended by adding a new Appendix C, which appendix reads as follows:

1. A downtown development authority, pursuant to Public Act No. 197, Michigan Public Acts of 1975, as amended, is hereby established.

2. The authority shall be known as "The Downtown Development Authority of the City of Grosse Pointe Park."

3. The boundaries of the downtown district within which the authority shall exercise its powers are the business areas on East Jefferson Avenue from the westerly city limits to the easterly right-of-way of Balfour Road.

4. The City Council authorizes the City Clerk of the City of Grosse Pointe Park to file an executed original of this ordinance with the Michigan Secretary of State.

5. The City Council authorizes the City Clerk of the City of Grosse Pointe Park to cause a copy of this ordinance to be published once in The Grosse Pointe News.

6. The invalidity of any section, clause or provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any part of this ordinance which can be given effect without such invalid provision.

7. This ordinance shall take effect upon July 1, 1984.

CODE NO. 8-01 AMENDMENT TO WATER AND SEWAGE SYSTEMS ORDINANCE ORDINANCE NO. 271

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE WATER AND SEWAGE SYSTEMS ORDINANCE FOR THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS ORDAINS:

Section 1. The Water and Sewage Systems Ordinance, Ordinance No. 105, is hereby amended by amending Sections 3 and 6 to read in their entirety as follows:

Section 3.

The City shall have full control over all water and sewage systems maintained by it, and has established standards, specifications and other requirements for all connections with such systems, and all water and sewage pipes, mains, plumbing, fixtures, valves, controls and equipment on municipal or private property in the City which connect with the water or sewage systems or affect water or sewage passing through such systems. Copies of the Standards and Regulations for the Design and Construction of Sewers and the Discharge of Industrial or Commercial Waste into the Wastewater Treatment System of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms have been adopted by the City Council and are on file in the office of the City Clerk, available for inspection and distribution to the Public at all times. Meters for measurement of the use of water and sewage facilities may be required, at the expense of the owner or occupant of the property. The furnishing of water or sewage service to any property is conditioned upon compliance with the requirements of the City as to the matters described in this section and compliance with all Rules and Regulations adopted by the City. In the event of failure of any owner or occupant to comply with any requirement imposed hereunder the City may install, replace, repair or modify, water or sewage facilities or take other action to effect compliance herewith on the property involved, and the expense thereof may be charged against the owner or occupant of the property and may be added to and collected with the rates and charges for water and sewage service.

Section 6. Penalties.

(a) Any person who knowingly makes any false statement or representation in any application record, report, plan or other document filed or required to be maintained under this ordinance or any rule or regulation hereunder or who falsifies, tampers with or knowingly renders inaccurate any monitoring device or method required by regulation shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not more than \$500 or by imprisonment for not more than ninety days.

(b) Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance or any rule or regulation hereunder shall be liable to the City of Grosse Pointe Farms for any penalty, fine, expense, loss or damage incurred by the City as a result of such violation.

(c) Any person violating any provision of this ordinance or any rule or regulation hereunder shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$500 or imprisonment for not more than ninety days, or both, in the discretion of court. Each violation and every day upon which a violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 2. Except as amended herein, Ordinance No. 105, as heretofore amended, shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its enactment or upon publication whichever is later.

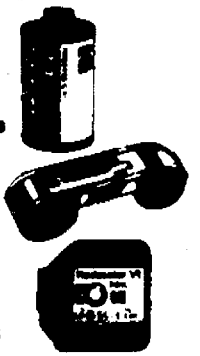

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Balloons, blessings mark St. Paul's 150th birthday

It was a beautiful day for a celebration. While thousands of persons crowded downtown Detroit to enjoy last Sunday's Grand Prix, hundreds of persons also gathered on the shores of Lake St. Clair to celebrate and commemorate the 150th anniversary of St. Paul's Parish.

The parking lot behind the church was filled to overflowing, and those who gathered inside the gothic styled edifice that faces the lake celebrated a Mass highlighted by the appearances of the Most Reverend Edmund C. Szoka, Archbishop of Detroit, John Cardinal Dearden, former Archbishop of Detroit, Rev. John C. Nienstedt, from the Vatican and a native of Grosse Pointe, and Monsignor Francis X. Canfield, Pastor of St. Paul's.

They also received a 27 page booklet which briefly outlined the history of St. Paul's. According to the booklet, written by Theodore H. Mecke, Jr., the first area Mass and Sacraments in the Grosse Pointes were offered in 1820 in the home of Pierre Provençal, on Lakeshore Road. Before then legend has it that the French settlers of that era would gather at a large crucifix, 20 feet high for Sunday prayers.

By 1825, Father Francis Badin, an assistant of Father Gabriel Richard, erected the first St. Paul's on the Reno farm, on Lakeshore north of Vernier Road. Although a formal Mass was offered there only once a month, the few settlers in the area would gather there every Sunday to offer prayers. The roads at that time were so primitive and muddy that the farmers would walk to the

church barefoot, carrying their shoes for the journey.

Once they arrived, they would wash their feet in the lake, then put on their shoes to enter the church.

In 1834, the Reverend Ghislenus J. Boheme was appointed as the first permanent pastor of St. Paul's, which was still located on the Reno farm. Father Boheme lived in what is now St. Clair Shores and traveled back and forth between Grosse Pointe and Port Huron, serving the parishes of St. Joseph, St. Francis, St. Felicitas and St. Paul's.

Father Boheme left St. Paul's in 1842 to serve the Diocese of Natchez and during the Civil War was a chaplain with "Stonewall" Jackson's troops. He died in Ashland, Va., in June, 1862.

Although there was no assigned parish priest at St. Paul's from 1843-45, the church was under the care of the "clergy of Detroit." And it was in 1846 that a new parish directory was begun with the first entry the recording of the baptism on October 25, 1846 of Maria Theresa Jarret, infant daughter of Toussaint and Maria Jarret. The register has been maintained continuously ever since, with the earlier entries in Latin and French.

In 1846, Father Peter Kindenkens became the pastor and purchased the present site of the parish from Francis Frezard for the sum of \$200 for four acres. Two years later Father Kindenkens erected the first church on the site, a plain looking building made of local timber. Father Kindenkens was to write that it looked "very little like a church." In later years a square tower and cross were put in place

adding to its appearance.

The next step of any significance to St. Paul's was in 1857, when Father Francis T. Debroux became the first resident pastor for Grosse Pointe and completed the church with pews and altars, and a "winter chapel" behind the sanctuary.

In 1868, the cemetery property on Moross Road was purchased for \$425 from Magliore and Elizabeth Moross. Until then, parish members had been buried behind St. Paul's in a graveyard that took up about one-third of the present parking lot.

There wasn't much money coming into the parish in those days. The gross income of St. Paul's in 1873 was \$1,339.42, with expenses totaling \$1,405.15, for a deficit of \$65.73. Things were better the next year with a surplus of \$9.98.

Nine years later, Father Francis J. Van Antwerp became pastor of St. Paul's, which now numbered 150 families. Sermons then were preached in English and those buried behind the church were moved to the new cemetery.

In 1889, Father John Elsen became the pastor of St. Paul's. Born in Holland, his great achievement was the building of the present day church for costs of \$23,329.71. This included the heating and electrical installations as well as interest on the mortgages to finance the work. It was then that St. Paul's nearly underwent a name change and became St. Clair. The change was proposed by Father Elsen's assistant, Father Joseph Kraemer, who petitioned for the name change, which was never given.

Father Elsen died before work on

the church was finished at the turn of the year in 1899. His funeral on Jan. 7, 1899 was the first service to be held in the church that he built. On that day, the altar for his Mass consisted of a plank supported by two cider barrels, covered by cloth.

A bank of pine trees decorated the incomplete sanctuary. Father Elsen was buried in St. Paul's Cemetery, his grave marked with an ornate white fence and a wood cross. The structure was lost over the years, and with it, the exact location of his grave. Eighty five years later, St. Paul's marked his newly relocated grave with simple, dignified granite marker during special ceremonies this Memorial Day, May 28.

Father Elsen was replaced by Father Alonzo B. Nacy, who remained at St. Paul's for 30 years. A "lively communicator," Father Nacy used the church paper to remonstrate with the instigators of horse and buggy traffic jams in front of the church. Eighty years later, the protest would be the same, only against runners blocking the church during the Free Press Marathon down Lakeshore.

A new rectory was built in 1911 for \$18,000 and is still in use. In 1918, the old church, in use since 1899 as a parish hall, was demolished. The wood was bought for \$100 by the late George Trombley who used it to build four cottages on Notre Dame Avenue. Three of the cottages are still standing at Nos. 456, 462 and 468 opposite Bon Secours Hospital. It was also in 1918 that the church closed its doors voluntarily for the first time in its history because of the great influenza of that year.

Over the next 53 years, St. Paul's grew under the guidance of

a number of pastors, including Father's John F. Dowdle, Albert L. Melvin and Monsignor Frank J. McPhillips. They saw the church through the Depression, World Wars I and II, and Korea, adding new school buildings, additions to the church and a state basketball championship in 1961.

Monsignor Francis X. Canfield, St. Paul's present pastor, came to the church in 1971 with a well known reputation for his work in the field of literary criticism, librarianship and church history. Under his guidance, membership in the parish has grown from 1,500 households in 1971 to 2,100 today.

In March, 1976 for only the second time in its history, St. Paul's was forced to close its doors when a severe ice storm interrupted electrical power in Grosse Pointe, leaving the church without heat or light.

Two years later, on June 9, 1978, the interior of the church was ruin-

ed by a fire that began in the attic and spread throughout the building. Restoration was not completed until the following March at a cost of \$500,000, in contrast to the \$23,000 it originally took to build the church.

In the months restoration took place, daily and Sunday Masses were celebrated in the school gymnasium, Christ Church, Grosse Pointe Memorial Church and the Grosse Pointe Academy.

After Mass was completed last Sunday, hundreds of parishioners left the church and gathered around as Archbishop Szoka ceremonially blessed a young tree that had been planted to celebrate St. Paul's 150th anniversary.

Small and slender, the sapling was dwarfed by the mighty oaks and maples surrounding it — trees that have been rooted in the soil of St. Paul's for decades.

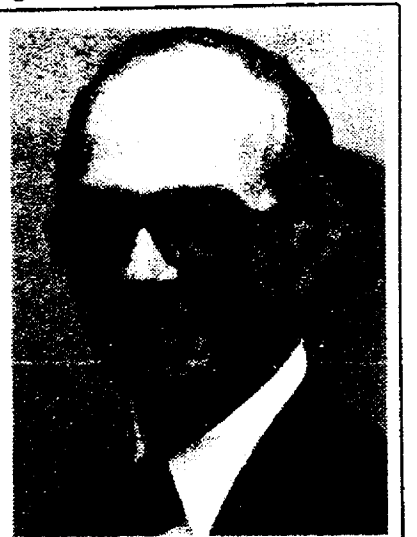
They, like the sapling and the church itself, still face years of growth in that hallowed and fertile ground.

Shores plans open house for building

Grosse Pointe Shores hopes to show off its municipal renovation to residents Sept. 9, according to village president Gerald Schroeder.

Speaking at the June 19 meeting of the village trustees, Schroeder said an open house is tentatively scheduled for Sept. 9 to give residents the opportunity to tour the recently renovated offices.

Shake-downs of the new interior continues. The \$1.3 million project was completed in mid-April. Delivery of some furniture, notably new chairs for the council audience, has yet to be made.

The eight-month project, with work by architect Robert Wakely and construction manager Charles Fromm and Assoc., gutted the inside of the 67-year-old Albert Kahn-designed municipal building to replace wiring, plumbing and insulation. Funding for the project was approved by voters last year when a \$1.3 million general obligation bond issue was approved.

Cable TV theft is the target

ComCast Cablevision announced last week it will launch an education program to inform its subscribers and residents in its system about the theft of cable programming.

The company will also institute an amnesty policy so that residents of the area who may be using cable service for which they aren't paying can come forward without fear of prosecution or required back payment of cable services, officials said.

Theft of cable programming is the taking without compensation of ComCast's services and, according to ComCast attorney Emil Cardamone, is a violation of state laws and local ordinances punishable by fines and jail sentences.

ComCast serves Grosse Pointe Shores and nine Macomb County cities.

ComCast pays a percentage of its revenues to the communities it serves under franchise agreements. As part of its program, ComCast will audit its system to enable the company to determine house-by-house if cable theft is taking place.

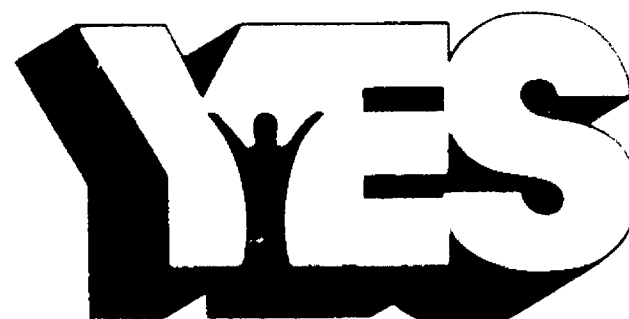

Mrs. Nils Johaneson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Alger, was one of three Alger children to grow up in the lakefront Renaissance mansion that is now the Grosse Pointe War Memorial's Alger House. Remembering the lake terrace as a particularly important part of her family life in 1910, she wrote:

"On Sundays, mother and father entertained their friends by bowling on the green. The men bowled, and the women watched from the lower terrace, in their pretty Sunday dresses with broad-brimmed hats.

"Tea was afterward served by the family butler and the second man. It might be interesting to add, at this point, that the family butler wore formal tails and his helper wore a Hunter Green uniform with a striped green-and-yellow waistcoat.

"During the summer days, the whole family, with children and friends, swam from the boat landing. There was a launch to ride in, and father's and Uncle Fred's larger yacht was anchored off the (Little) club dock. The early 1910s through 1914 were gay years in the summer colony in Grosse Pointe."

Grosse Pointe has long since ceased to be a summer colony of Detroit, but the graciousness of that earlier era lives on in Alger House where the Docents, an arm of the War Memorial's Service League, are offering admission-free guided tours from 1 to 4 p.m. on Thursdays beginning next week, July 5, through Aug. 9.

Docent volunteers, experts on the home's history, including its family, its architecture, its interior design and, later, its growth into the present community, civic and educational War Memorial Center, will be on hand in each room and garden to explain and answer questions, to assist visitors to visually recapture life in Grosse Pointe as Mrs. Johaneson once knew it.

Individuals who wish to take the tour need only show up at Alger House on Thursday afternoons. Larger groups are requested to call the center, 881-7511, for reservations.

Another Pointe Family Legacy

Alger House and its grounds are the Alger Family's gift to their community. Last Saturday, another Pointe family's community legacy was formally acknowledged when the Michigan Nature Association dedicated two nature preserves along the Manistique River in Schoolcraft County.

One is the Fred and Ethel Walker Memorial Plant Preserve in Manistique Township. The other, located three-

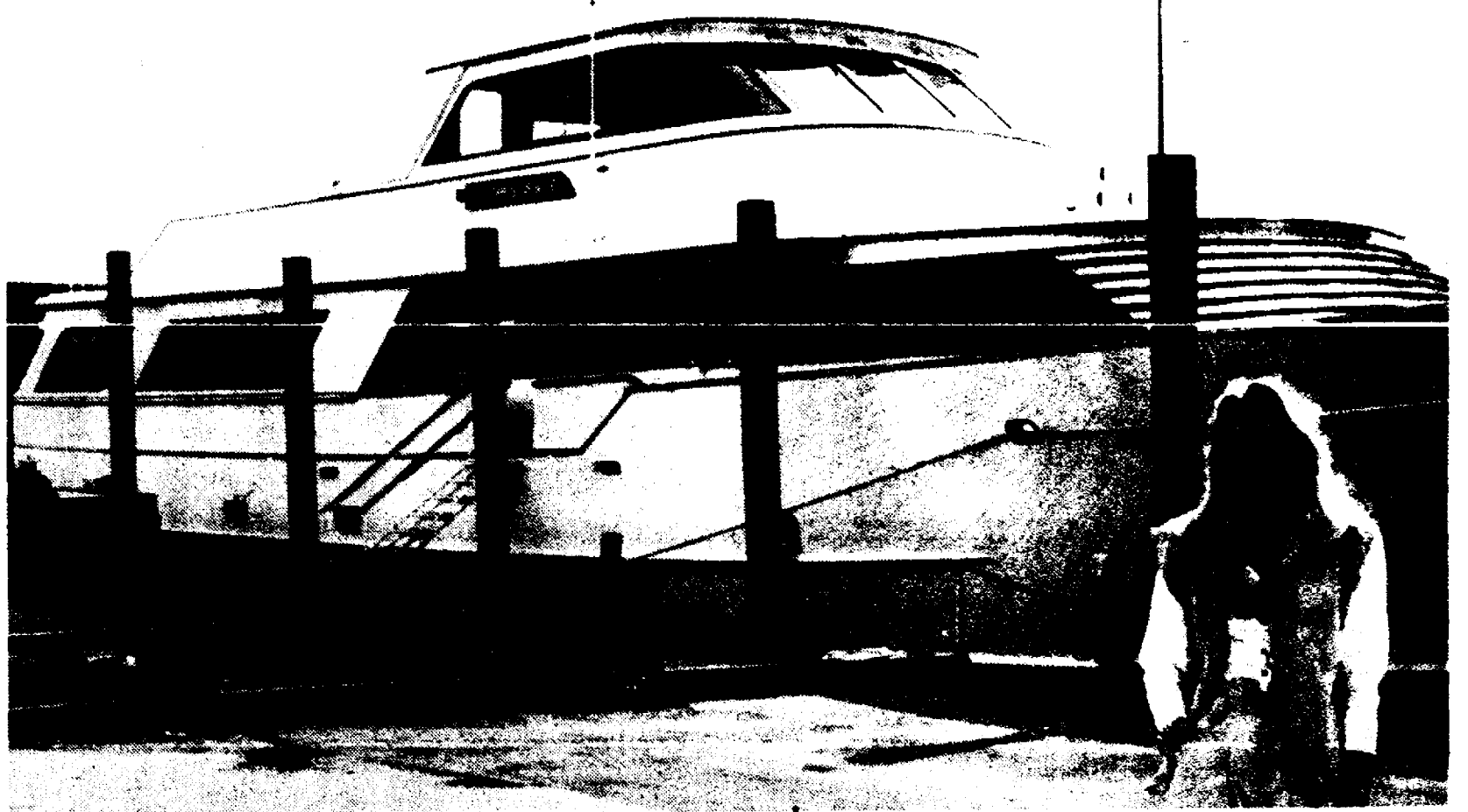

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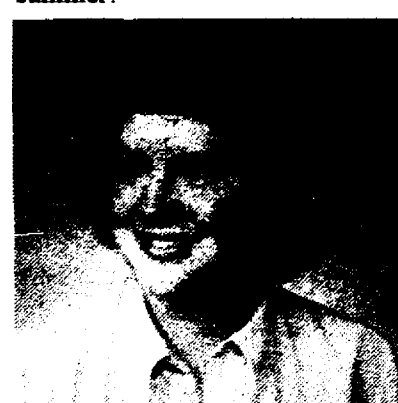

and-a-half miles from the Walker Memorial, is the Huntington Preserve in Doyle Township, established in 1969. Frances Huntington, of The Pointe, donated funds for the purchase of this natural area to honor her parents:

One corner of the small preserve touches the Manistique River. Other parts feature sand ridges, ground pines and moss and lichen-covered fallen logs. Special pleasures of the area are pink moccasin flowers and songs of northern warblers.

At the dedication, Mrs. Huntington talked about her father, George Danforth Huntington, an engineer — and an ornithologist and botanist by avocation. Three families of Huntington grandchildren (John T. Huntington Jr., William P. Huntington and Frances Huntington Ness), with nine great-grandchildren, continue to live in Grosse Pointe.

The Michigan Nature Association is a non-profit citizens' group dedicated to the preservation of the state's natural beauty. It currently owns 79 nature sanctuaries in 33 counties, comprising 4,000 acres of prime local Lower and Upper Peninsula wilderness.

MNA's selected natural areas now protect one-third of the state's rare, threatened and endangered species. MNA's 1,400 member volunteers share the goal of reaching 100 sanctuaries in the next four years.

All MNA lands are open to the public without charge, for study, photography and appreciation of nature. To find and explore them, the MNA Sanctuary Guidebook, containing 450 photos, histories, descriptions and maps, is extremely helpful.

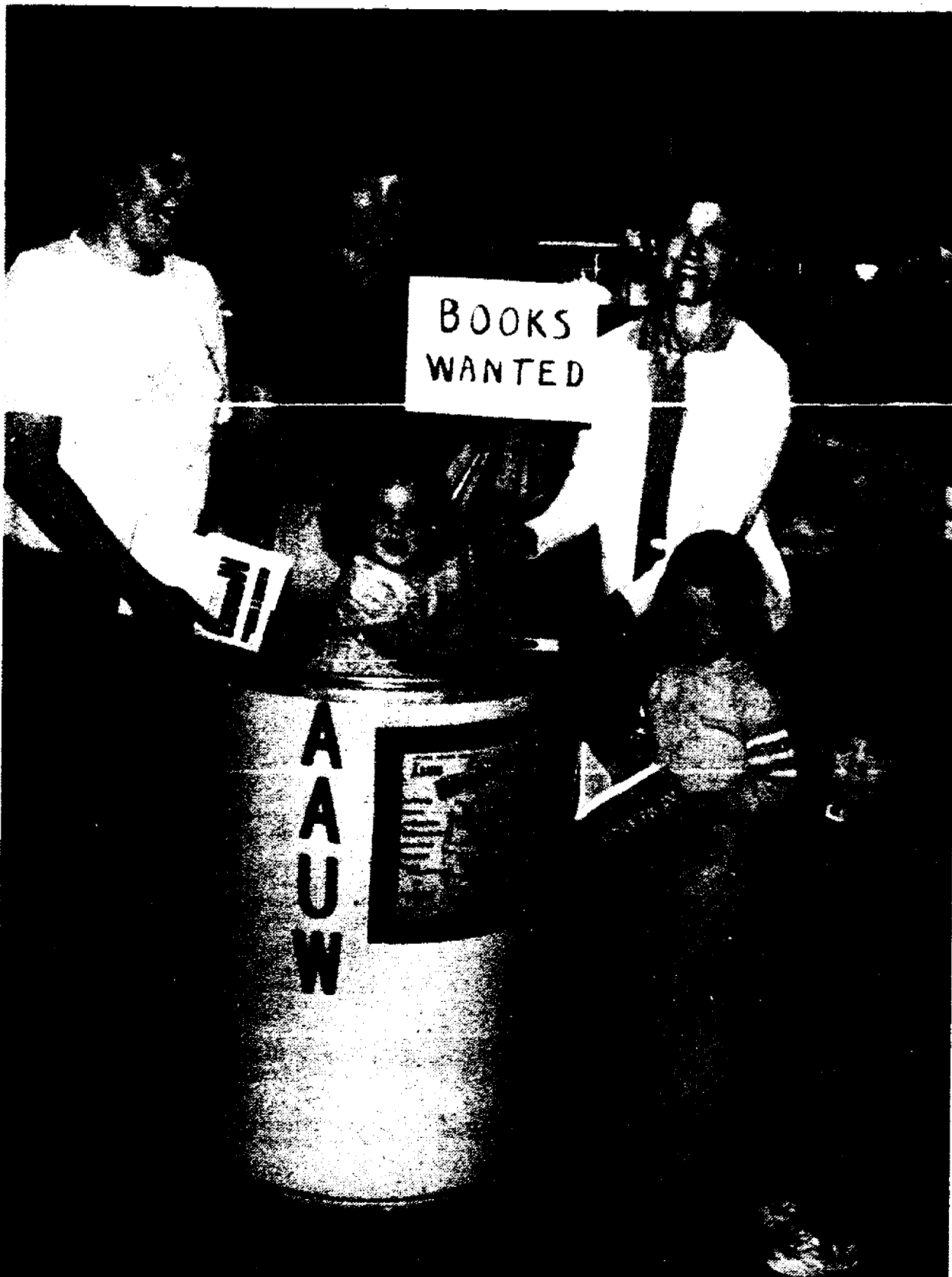

Elegant Eating

Stir-Fry is a wonderful method for preserving vital food nutrients, a plus for heart patients and a boon to the food budget. Thinly-sliced carrots will enhance almost any stir-fry recipe and supply Vitamin A — vital to growth and repair of body tissues and helpful in maintaining a soft, smooth, disease-free skin — in a complex carbohydrate source. To obtain carrots' full-bodied flavor, remember to saute them for a few minutes before adding the recipe's remaining vegetables.

SPICY SZECHUAN SHREDDED BEEF AND VEGETABLES

2 Tbsp. finely minced ginger root or 1 tsp. ground ginger
1 clove garlic, crushed
¼ tsp. cloves
¼ tsp. ground cinnamon
¼ tsp. fennel seeds, crushed
¼ tsp. crushed dried red chili peppers
3 Tbsp. soy sauce
3 Tbsp. dry sherry
3 Tbsp. vegetable oil
1 lb. lean sirloin tips
3 medium-sized carrots, very thinly sliced
3 medium celery ribs, thinly sliced
8 green onions, thinly sliced

Combine ginger, garlic, cloves, cinnamon, fennel, chili peppers, soy sauce, sherry and 1 Tbsp. oil in a jar with a screw-top lid. Shake marinade well to mix.

Cut beef in very thin strips (about the size of shoe string potatoes) with a sharp knife — to make slicing easier, put the beef in the freezer for 1 hour. Put beef strips into large bowl. Shake marinade vigorously; pour over beef; toss; let stand at room temperature for at least 1 hour, turning about 3 or 4 times.

Heat 2 Tbsp. oil in wok or large skillet until a shred of carrot will sizzle, then add the carrots, celery and green onions. Stir-fry about 3 minutes, or just until crisp-tender. Quickly add the beef and remaining marinade. Stir-fry 3 minutes longer, or until beef is no longer bright red. Serve to 6 with rice.

SHERRIED SHRIMP

4 Tbsp. margarine
6 to 8 cloves garlic, crushed
1-½ lbs. shrimps, shelled and deveined

¼ cup fresh lemon juice
Dash of pepper
1 cup cooking sherry
2 Tbsp. chopped parsley
2 Tbsp. chopped chives
Melt margarine in skillet over medium heat. Add garlic, shrimp, lemon juice and dash of pepper. Cook, stirring, until shrimp turns pink (about 5 minutes). Add sherry wine, parsley and chives. Bring to a boil. Serve immediately, garnished with lemon and parsley, over hot cooked rice. Makes 4 servings.

GRECIAN LAMB SKILLET

3 cups cubed eggplant
½ cup chopped green pepper
1 medium clove garlic, minced
1 cup finely chopped celery
½ tsp. (scant) thyme
2 Tbsp. margarine
1 can (10-¾ oz.) condensed tomato soup
1-½ lbs. lean lamb, cut into strips

1-½ cups quick-cooking rice, uncooked
Trim all fat from lamb pieces. Melt margarine in skillet and saute the lamb until well browned. Remove to a platter with slotted spoon.

Add eggplant, green pepper, garlic and celery to skillet and cook until eggplant is browned. Return lamb to skillet. Add thyme, tomato soup and water, cook for about thirty minutes or until lamb is almost tender. Add rice, cover; bring to a boil; reduce heat and cook for about 10 minutes, or until rice is done. Stir occasionally. Makes about 7 servings.

Sports Week

This is another in a continuing series of columns devoted to youth sports.

Stephanie is 5. She's well-coordinated, athletic and loves to play outside. She likes to participate in games and races, but when it comes to "performing" in front of an audience... well, the quickest way to bring tears to her eyes and send her running to mom for consolation is for folks to make a big deal out of one of Stephanie's athletic accomplishments in front of a crowd.

Her cousin Briana is nearly 6. Briana also loves to participate in games and contests, but she thrives on the attention showered on her during events like her first T-ball game. The smile practically never left her face as she enjoyed the day in front of aunts and parents bearing cameras.

Explaining what makes one child so different from another is best left to experts. But because children are all different, parents, coaches and organizers of youth sports have to (or should) anticipate those differences when constructing an adequate sports program. And I think that should include the program's approach to competition.

Since Stephanie and Briana are my nieces, I have the opportunity to observe them and their reactions to athletic competition — and their parent's reaction to those reactions. And that got me wondering: is competition good for children?

According to a survey taken by the Lansing-based Youth Sports Institute, more than 25 million American youth aged 5 to 17 participate in sports. That's a lot of kids... many of whom have the potential to be adversely affected by a competitive system that sometimes goes too far.

The "winning is everything" philosophy which has pervaded the American sports scene for so long has the ability to turn what could be a positive learning tool into a negative, even harmful, experience for young athletes.

In a July 11, 1983 cover story by Marilyn Elias in USA Today, a social psychologist described the characteristics of "chronically anxious" children — those who had been adversely affected by the win-lose competitive syndrome.

The characteristics include: worry about criticism from parents and coaches if the child fails; a tendency to rate their own athletic ability low and have poor self-esteem in non-athletic settings; and, feeling threatened by all kinds of competitive situations, not just the playing field.

Who would want that to happen to their kid?

I wouldn't and that's why I am encouraged by the signs of a lessening of that win-at-all-costs attitude here in Grosse Pointe.

The Neighborhood Club, for many years, has approached the problem and addressed it by providing a non-competitive program for children in the lower levels of its programs. Scores are not kept, goals and points are not tallied and the emphasis is on the learning process and on having fun.

Area coach Al Devine sends his players home with copies of "The 10 Commandments of Youth Sports," which stress fair play, sportsmanship and requires parents to approach their children's sports experience with understanding and no pressure.

Parents and coaches who submit stories to this newspaper's sports section are concerned — and I believe genuinely so — only that the kids' names get into the paper.

Moms and dads who are content to let coaches guide their kids in T-ball games and youth soccer, and spend their Saturdays and Sundays cheering kids on. I think these are all positive signs that not everyone is interested merely in how many goals a kid can score or whether he or she was on the winning team.

I even find myself editing Little League copy and deleting

High school hockey returns in 1984-85

Following last season's successful debut, varsity hockey has been held over for a second year in Grosse Pointe.

The Grosse Pointe Board of Education has approved its 1984-85 budget which includes between \$30,000 and \$34,000 for the varsity ice hockey programs at North and South high schools. That figure is a decrease from the nearly \$50,000 provided to start the program in the 1984-85 school year.

The schools approved those start up funds on condition that the program be "strictly a one year commitment" and subject to review following the season.

The ice hockey program was a resounding success in both schools, athletic administrators say. "Most of the board members were aware of our success, they kept track of how the program went. And the program went well," said Thomas Gauerke, athletic director at North High. There appeared to be little opposition to the board's renewing the funds for this season, school officials said.

North High's Norsemen, under coach Mike Manzella, and South's Blue Devils, coached by Tim Zimmerman, each reached the state playoffs last year. North finished the season with a 12-7-3 record. South compiled a 16-7-2 mark and won a regional championship before being eliminated in the quarterfinal round. Zimmerman and Manzella

will return to their coaching positions this winter.

The teams drew an estimated 1,000 fans to each of the games they played against each other. Most home games were well attended, officials reported, and there were no major negative incidents either on the ice or in the crowds.

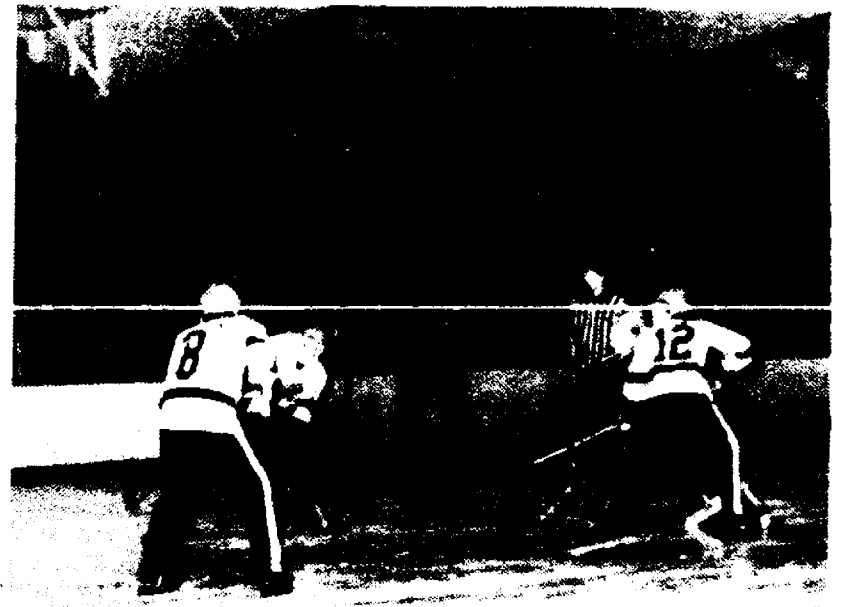
"The parent cooperation was outstanding; it helped the program a great deal. And I think the students really grasped on to this as a fun event," Gauerke said.

Hollosy agreed. "We felt it was a very good program. The cooperation of the hockey parents was tremendous and to me, indispensable. I hope they'll keep it going and judging from past experience, I think they will," he said.

The hockey program was also a revenue-producer, with North High alone collecting over \$5,000 in gate receipts. "I think our board is conscious of a sport that produces revenue... sure, I think that had a bearing on the board's decision," Gauerke said.

Current South For 'Em Club president Mike Kramer said he was pleased with the board's decision. "I think it's an excellent program and I know the prospects are good for this coming year," Kramer said. The booster club group lobbied for renewal of hockey funds at this spring's board meetings.

Kramer said that his group was able to show the board that efforts

would be made to provide a healthy intermural program in conjunction with the varsity plan, in response to the board's major concern about the varsity program. And he said that the parent group would be just as active in South's hockey program as it had been last year.

"The For 'Em Club is a very active, established group at South. We'll be around and supporting hockey as long as there is hockey at South," Kramer said.

The budgeted funds for 1984-85 will go to cover the major expenses of paying the salaries of coaches and officials and buying ice time. The remainder will cover miscellaneous supplies like pucks.

Both North and South conducted tryout camps for the 1984-85 season last week.

Babe Ruth Second half leaders set

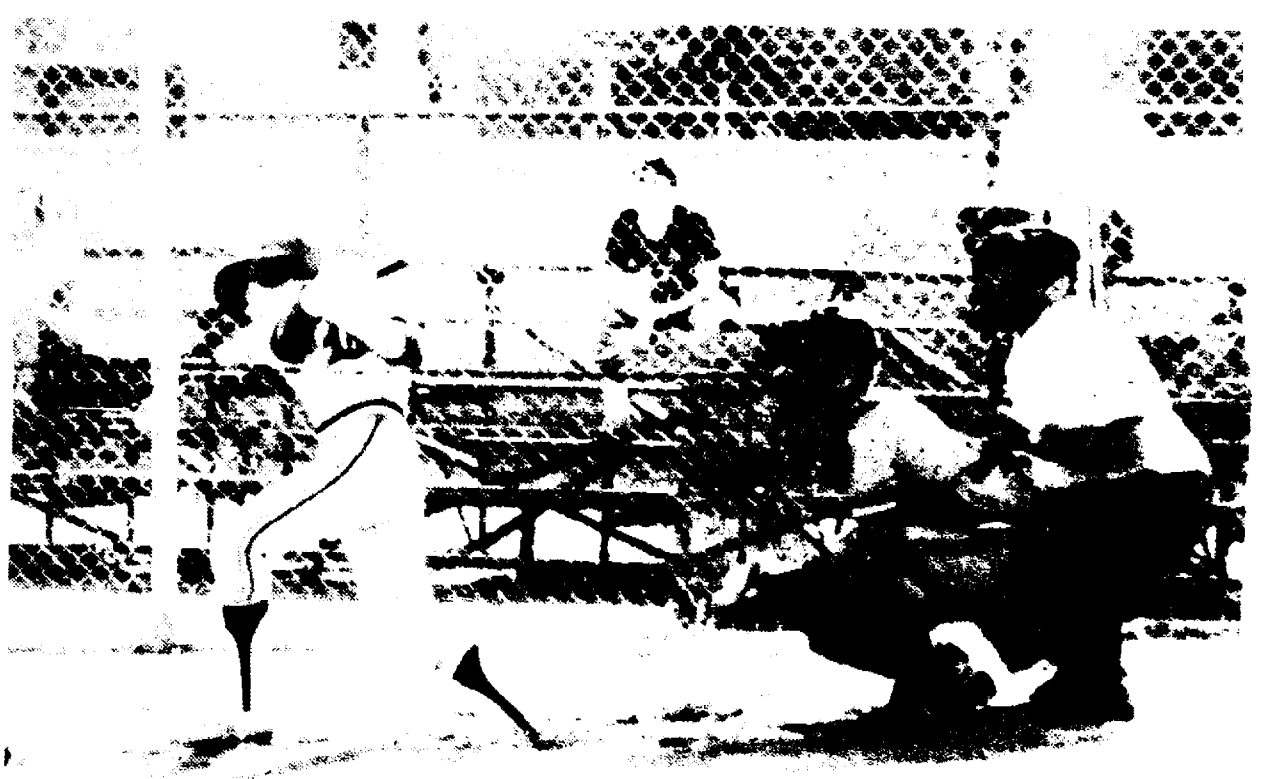
The Dodgers ended a three-game losing streak, won three straight, and are back on top in the Park Babe Ruth Major League's second half.

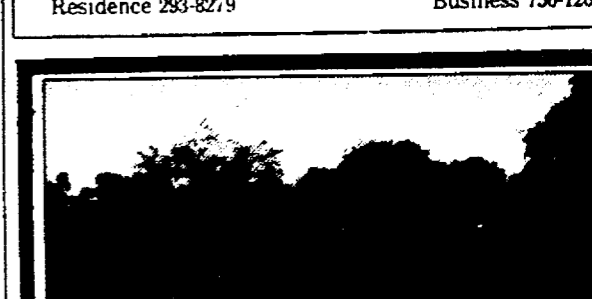

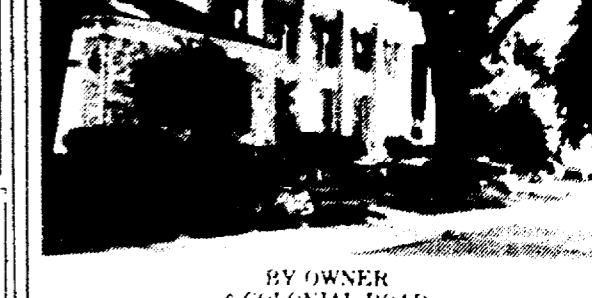

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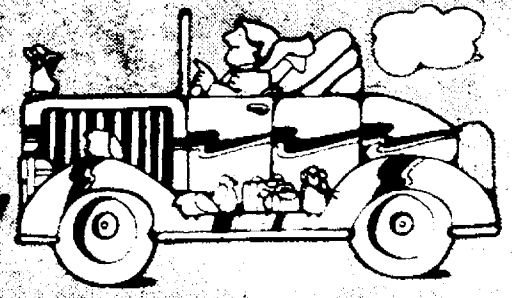
