## Board chooses Whritner to head school system

Dr. John Whritner, of East Lyme, Conn. schools, will be offered a three-year contract to head the Grosse Pointe Public School System.

The board of education Monday unanimously endorsed Whritner's appointment to the position, which pays \$60,000 a year with yet-to-be-negotiated fringe benefits.

Whritner, 49, is in his 13th year as superintendent of East Lyme schools, and said he is looking forward to coming to Grosse Pointe. He added he was "tremendously excited" about getting the job and was "impressed with the people I have met there, especially the members of the board of education... and I am also impressed with the work of Dr. Joseph Spagnoli... who will remain interim superintendent until Whritner arrives April 15.

Whritner said he was drafting his letter of resignation Tuesday for the East Lyme board. "I alerted my board last night — we

from Columbia University.

Whritner has been in charge of a district consisting of 3,000 students and five schools, with an annual operating budget of \$9.6 million. He earned \$52,000 a year in East Lyme.

Reading the search committee's recommendation of Whritner was trustee Dorothy Kennel, who with trustees Fred Adams and Catherine Brierly, visited the districts of two of the three finalists.

The third finalist asked that his district not be visited after learning about the system's fringe bene-

fit package. He also didn't want the news of his candidacy reaching his staff and community and so withdrew from consideration, Mrs. Kennel said.

The other candidate whose district was visited said he would be willing to come to Grosse Pointe for a public interview if he were the committee's first choice, Mrs. Kennel said. Since Whritner was the board's top candidate, the other finalist was also eliminated, leaving him the only choice for the board, she said.

Whritner was "so outstanding a

candidate," there was no point in returning to the fourth name on the final list of seven candidates, Mrs. Kennel said.

At a public interview last month, Whritner fielded a dozen or so questions that were submitted by the community to the board. Parents said they were impressed with him and gave him high marks for his comments at the time.

Board members said they were happy to have found a man of Whritner's qualifications for the position.

Adams said the "greatest re-

sponsibility of this board is the selection of the best superintendent available for the school system... (and) I think we have chosen the best candidate for the job."

Whritner's appointment ends seven months of work by the search committee, empowered to find a replacement for Dr. Kenneth Brummel, who left July 1 to become superintendent of a California school district.

The details of Whritner's contract are to be negotiated with him by board President Joan Hanpeter and the school board's attorney.

## DIO/Bon Secours tenants back out of deal

The \$5 million project planned by Bon Secours Hospital and the Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology

(DIO) in Grosse Pointe Park has collapsed. One of the major tenants of the 45,000-square-foot medical building to be built on the corner of

Nottingham and Jefferson has backed out of the deal.

"There was no specific reason given," said David Benfer, Bon Secours Hospital's chief executive officer. "We received a letter dated Nov. 26 which simply stated that Ophthalmic Surgeons, P.C., has made the determination to withdraw in the joint venture."

Philip C. Hessburg, M.D., president and medical director of the DIO, said that "without the keystone renting group, the joint venture is dead. The DIO would probably go forward with it if another group was found."

Acknowledging that as a partner in Ophthalmic Surgeons he wears two hats, Hessburg referred William McCauley, as the group's administrator, to speak on its behalf.

McCauley's only comment was to cite the increasing involvement of government, industry and third party payers in the delivery of medical care. He questioned the uncertainty of any long-term relationship with one large organization, such as Bon Secours, as serving their best interest.

While Benfer said the hospital is re-evaluating its position and plans to continue dialogue with the DIO in the hopes of putting the project back together, the actions of an attorney for the DIO indicated its plans don't include the hospital.

James Candler Jr., of Dickinson, Wright, Moon, Van Dusen and Freeman, met with John Crawford, the Park city manager on Dec. 7, according to Crawford. He said they're pursuing a plan which will keep the prior site plan approval for a three-story building and substitute a one-story office building.

"They want to retain the existing AAA building and have it completely renovated including an elevator for office use," he added. "They plan to come to city council with that proposal sometime in January."

The site of the proposed new building is owned by the DIO and they could follow through with plans independent of other backers.

The AAA building is co-owned by the DIO and Bon Secours and any changes there would have to be agreed upon by both parties.

Getting this joint venture in place caused a lot of controversy. A zoning variance was granted amid strong opposition from residents

## Local bank announces merger

A merger between Colonial Federal Savings & Loan, which has been serving the Grosse Pointe community for nearly 32 years, and Central State Savings & Loan of Mount Clemens, was announced last week.

With combined assets of more than \$300 million, the merger will result in a corporation that will be the 14th largest savings and loan association in Michigan, according to bank officials.

Colonial Federal, with headquarters in the Woods, has branch offices in the Farms, Detroit, East Detroit and St. Clair Shores. It has assets of \$211 million.

Central State, formed in 1980, is a subsidiary of Central Holding Co. It has two offices in Clinton Township

and assets of \$100 million.

The resulting institution, Colonial Central Savings Bank, FSB, will be a subsidiary of Central Holding Co. Other subsidiaries include Bankers Mortgage Corp., Bankers Home Loan Insurance Agency, Central Venture Corp., and the Keim Group, Ltd., parent company of Earl Keim Realty.

The transaction is expected to be completed in late spring 1985. As part of the agreement, Central stock will be available to Colonial Federal customers.

David Widlak, president of Central Holding Co., said, "Colonial has all of the things Central really needs at this time in its business life. Colonial has built an extremely sound foundation and has been accurate in predicting trends in the business. It's a solid organization

from top to bottom."

Robert E. Powers, president of Colonial Federal, said, "One of the objectives at Colonial Federal has been to go stock so we can enhance our capital base. With this merger, we are advancing the date for stock about two to three years.

"Central has been an innovative and aggressive organization and I think we complement each other nicely," he added. "Now we will be able to do some things we haven't been able to do because of our capital situation.

Services not currently available to Colonial customers that will be offered through the new institution include student loans, credit card application and automatic teller machines, according to Tom Bush, vice president of Colonial Federal.

"We're excited about this," he said. "We're the oldest corporation headquartered in Grosse Pointe Woods. Our home and our hearts are in Grosse Pointe and we appreciate our customers. We want to be the neighborhood bankers. This just gives us a bigger neighborhood."

The following changes in management are scheduled when the merger is completed: Powers, president of Colonial Federal, will become chairman of the board; Mudge, senior vice president and chief operating officer of Colonial Federal, will be president; J.P. Bedard, president of Central State, will become vice chairman of the board and executive vice president of Central Holding Co.; and Bush, vice president of Colonial Federal, will advance to senior vice president.

**Grosse Pointe War Memorial**  
... as John Lake remembered it

Shortly before his death in 1984, John Lake wrote of his years as executive director of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. For those who knew him, it tells the story in a neo-Victorian style they'll well remember - a little confusing at times, but still vintage John Lake. Others will find a nostalgic and useful contribution to the history of our community. These segments have been edited by Charles V. Hicks, but they retain Lake's original language, and they reflect the unique personality of the man who directed and developed the War Memorial Center in its first 30 years.

VII. Plays, Talks and Parties  
(Some social and cultural highlights of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, as John Lake recounted them.)

Fries is a two-floor edifice with a very beautiful Crystal Ballroom which can accommodate 400 seated for dinner. Downstairs is a step-floored auditorium seating 442 people. This makes a wonderful combination, for it means dinners can be given prior to functions held in the auditorium and seating in one compliments the other.

Fries Auditorium made it possible for the Grosse Pointe Theatre to make the War Memorial its permanent home. For their first production here in 1982, they opened with a perfectly magnificent full scale presentation of the musical "Kiss Me Kate," with costumes brought from New York. There were some 60 people on stage. Fries theater also made it possible for the War Memorial Children's Theatre to rehearse and perform their productions.

Early on, it was the center of the "Fries Forum." This series was under the direction of George McMullen, who had more energy and more ability to approach people than anyone I have ever known. The result was that we could get speakers like Arthur Schlessinger, Madame Chaing Kai Chek, General Maxwell Taylor and industrialists such as Henry Ford. The Fries Forum, it seems to me, was exactly what a community cultural center should offer to the people of Grosse Pointe.


For many, many years, thanks to the leadership of Donald M.D. Thurber, we had an opera supper the night before the opening of the Metropolitan Opera in Detroit. At this supper would appear the stars who were going to sing the following night. After dinner, which was always a very elegant affair, the stars would recount their various anecdotes; and they were sometimes very amusing, giving insight into the opera.

In addition to the gala opera dinners, we had a whole series called the "Lighter Side of Life." These were black-tie affairs, opening with cocktail parties in the most distinguished Grosse Pointe homes we could gain entrance to; and the guests would then come to the Center for dinner in the ballroom and down to the auditorium for the performance. We had, for instance, Hume Cronyn and Jessica Tandy, Meredith Wilson; and we had the road show "Stop the World, I Want to Get Off." We had Hildegard, the old war horse, who brought the house down. These were the things that made the War Memorial sing and gain public attention.



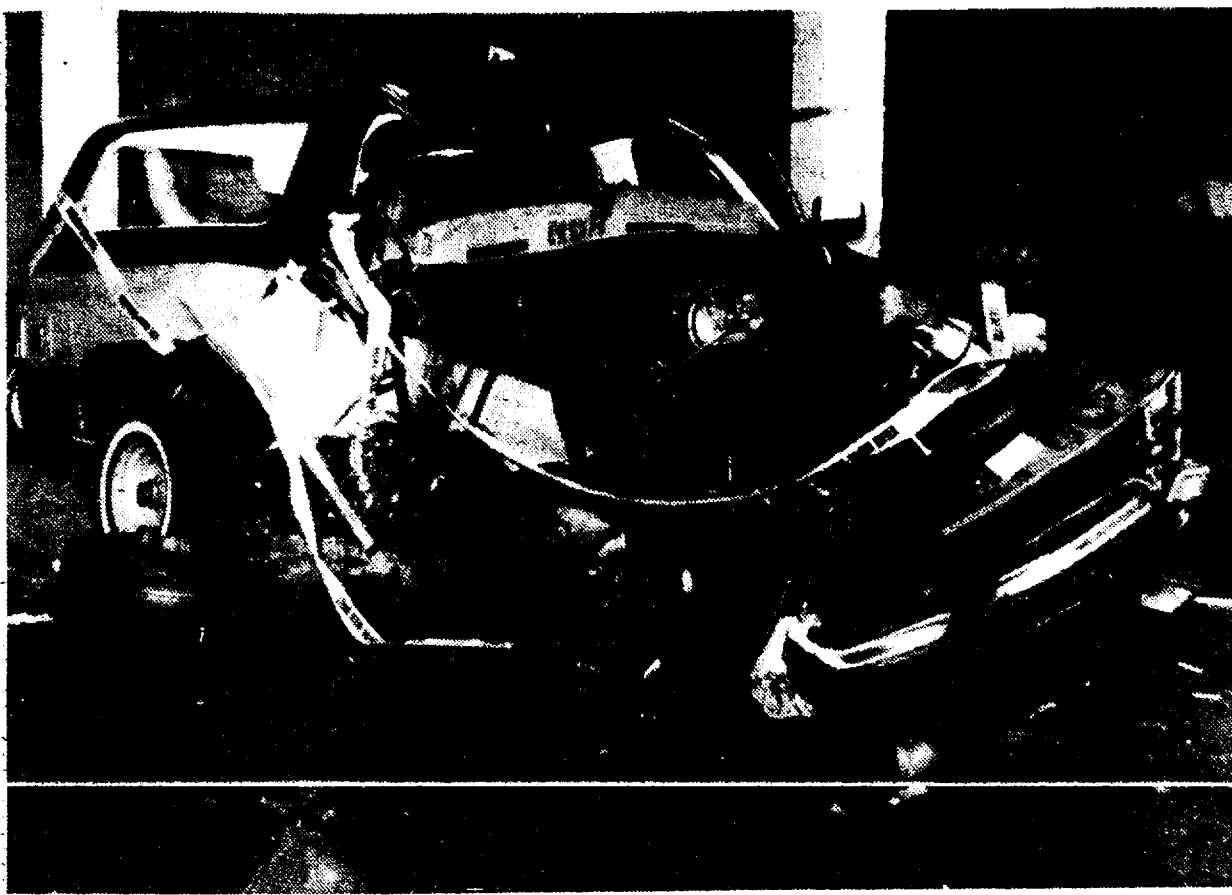

## Park burglar sentenced to jail

The man Grosse Pointe Park police believe to be the cat burglar responsible for robbing about 30 Pointe homes the past few months has been sentenced to jail.

Floyd Harris Jr., 32, of Buffalo Street in Detroit, pleaded guilty to three counts of receiving and concealing property taken from Park homes, and on Dec. 6 was sentenced to serve from seven and one-half to 15 years in prison by Detroit Recorder's Court Judge Samuel C. Gardner, said Henry Coonce, Park police chief.

"Ironically, the early morning cat-type burglaries have stopped," he added.

Harris, tied to break-ins on Kensington, Yorkshire and Bedford,

was arrested Oct. 17 by Detroit police. The arrest was the result of outstanding cooperation between detectives from the 12th and 15th precincts, according to Coonce.

Sgt. Thomas Blackstone, of Detroit's 15th Precinct Detective Bureau, described Harris "as a very professional burglar," who never left any fingerprints in the ransacked homes.

But investigations identified him as the person who sold the stolen property in a gold shop the same day the homes were robbed.

"That was his downfall," Blackstone said. "To sell to any gold shop, you need to show a driver's license, leave a thumb print and other identification. We knew who was pawing the property and where he lived."

Some of the recovered property came from Farms homes, according to Farms Detective Mark Brecht, who felt Harris was involved in at least one night's crime spree that included seven homes or outbuildings that were broken in, items taken and stacked in bushes or in piles near the street, later to be carried away.

"Given his methods of operation, he's probably responsible for at least 12 robberies in the Farms," Brecht said. "He probably had help from others who either dropped him off at the houses or helped him get in there."

"Harris was an active burglar here during 1982 and he's been apprehended in almost the same fashion and property recovered in his home as before," said Coonce.

## Auto accident takes one life

An auto accident early Sunday morning, Dec. 9, killed a 19-year-old Farms man and injured a 19-year-old Shores resident, according to Grosse Pointe City police.

Daniel Joseph Brady, of McMillan, was pronounced dead on arrival at Bon Secours Hospital that morning after being extricated from the wreckage of the 1984 Chevrolet Blazer in which he was a passenger.

The driver, Matthew Cardello, of Hawthorne, was taken to Bon Secours Hospital and Bi-County Community Hospital in Warren. He was treated for a dislocated shoulder and multiple other injuries at Bon Secours, a hospital spokesman said.

The facts of the case have been turned over to the Wayne County Prosecutors Office, police said.

The accident was reported by phone to City police at 1:34 a.m. Sunday. Officers responded to the scene, at East Jefferson just west of Island Lane, and found the vehicle wrapped around a tree.

Cardello was found sitting behind the wheel of the vehicle, dazed, reports said. The front and back seats had jammed against the dashboard on the passenger side, where Brady had been sitting, according to reports.

The vehicle's doors would not open, so rescue units from the City and Park were called to the scene. The two were extricated from the vehicle and taken to the hospital.

The vehicle was believed to have left the roadway, traveled 114 feet on the grass between the curb and the sidewalk before striking the tree, about 12 feet south of the curb and 13 feet west of Island Lane, reports said.

The front and right sides of the vehicle were damaged. It was believed the vehicle struck the tree, which was more than five feet in circumference, with its right front, hooking a wheel well on the tree and wrapping the vehicle around it.

The hood of the vehicle was found 25 feet away from the impact, reports said.

A memorial Mass for Mr. Brady was held Wednesday, Dec. 12, at St. Paul's on the Lake Catholic Church.

Born in Detroit, Mr. Brady is survived by his parents, George and Rita; a brother Michael; sisters Meghan and Mary; and grandparents Rita and Alfred Finchman.

This is the second fatal accident in as many years on Jefferson in the City, police said. On Jan. 15, 1983, 21-year-old Todd Elvidge of the City was killed when the vehicle in which he was a passenger went out of control and overturned.

## Raymond Road request denied

A petition by 41 residents of Raymond Road to convert their street into a court or dead-end was denied by the Woods city council last week.

A study of the proposal submitted in August, was delayed due to a construction project on Moross which affected the traffic pattern in the area. The count, conducted Nov. 15 and 16, showed that few cars traveled the area. The Department of Public Safety also noted that there have been only three traffic accidents there since 1969.

Further, the department advised that since the street is narrow, an emergency vehicle, such as an ambulance or fire truck, would have a difficult time turning around the leave the scene. It was also noted that police scout cars that currently drive the length of the street would likely check from the corner only if the street were a dead-end.

The public safety department recommended, therefore, that Raymond Road remain as it is. The council unanimously approved a motion to deny the proposal.

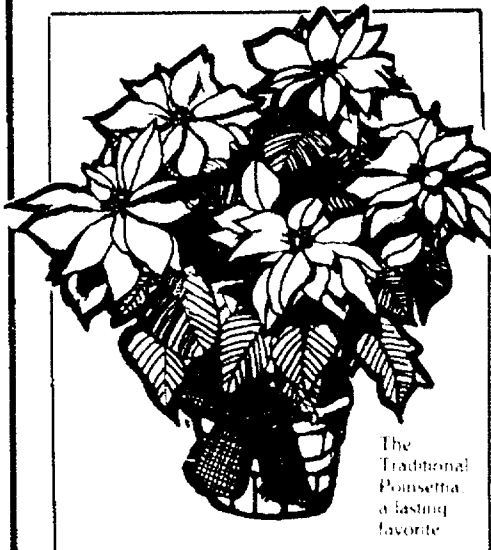

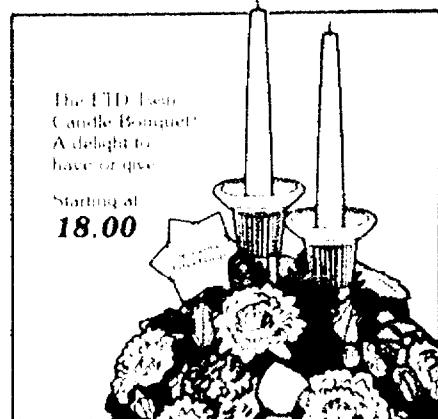

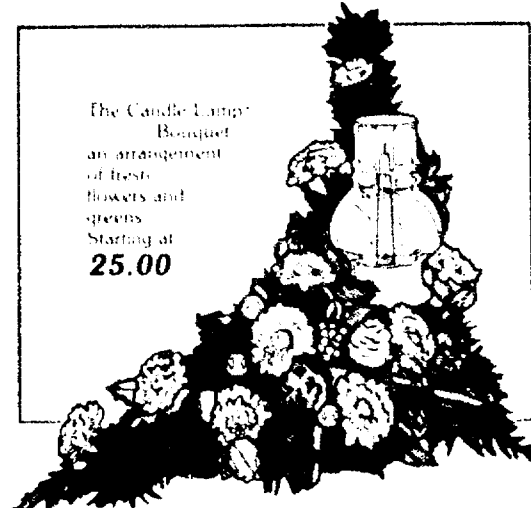

# Boards ask for study of vocational education

The Grosse Pointe Board of Education recently asked the school administration to build on its year-long vocational education study to include development of courses in electronics, robotics or data processing.

At the same time, the board accepted recommendations from a committee of administrators, instructors, employers and parents that studied the program since last November.

Among those recommendations were the adoption of a philosophy of vocational education, active counseling for students to guide them into the programs, strengthening of basic skills where necessary and clarification of the purpose of each vocational program.

Extending the study to include course recommendations will make sure the school district keeps up with current technologies and prepares its students for a job market that is being changed by those technologies, board members said.

Attending a seminar on vocational education at a recent Michigan Association of School Boards convention in Grand Rapids was board President Joan Hanpeter, who said one of the points mentioned was that 80 percent of current job opportunities require no education beyond high school.

That means high schools will have to consider changes in courses to face the realities of skills needed in the job market, she added.

"My concern was the study... a result of a lot of thinking and time... did not represent any changes in courses," Mrs. Hanpeter said, adding the administration should "look a little harder" at courses to address current market needs.

The committee decided against looking at additional courses, because it was unclear whether the board had asked the committee to do so, according to Joy Williams, a parent and member of the 13-person committee, which decided it was beyond its scope to talk about program improvements and the rest of the items addressed and complete the study in the allotted time.

Mrs. Williams said she agreed with the board's decision to continue the study, adding, "I would like to know if vocational education is fulfilling the needs of the kids or whether it's just providing part-time paid jobs for kids in school. I'm not sure of the answer to that,

even after looking at the program for a year."

As the parent of academically inclined students, she could offer the views of an "outsider" to the committee, Mrs. Williams said. She has also been active in other school matters, as an officer with the Pierce PTO and PTO council as well as an office volunteer at South High.

One of the concepts of the study she was pleased with was that college-bound students have the opportunity to get a job experience related to their career through the vocational program, Mrs. Williams said.

Besides preparing students for jobs, vocational education programs can teach students who intend to continue their education marketable skills that can be used to get a summer job, Mrs. Hanpeter added.

In order to consider its changes for the 1986-87 school year, the board will need the study by December 1985.

The continued study will help the district determine if it is teaching the right courses to prepare students for the year 2000, when the kindergarten class of 1986-87 will graduate from high school, according to trustee Catherine Brierly. Schools should do their best not to be left behind as technologies make some courses obsolete, she added.

Changing programs to keep up with technologies involves a number of problems, according to Robert Welch, director of secondary curriculum. First, the cost of expanding the current electronic programs into advanced electronics and robotics would be substantial, he said. Also, instructors qualified to teach advanced electronics and robotics would be in demand in private industry, which traditionally pays more than teaching.

The administration is looking at the possibility of expanded programs in electronics and data processing, Welch said. These courses may, by their nature, draw more academically inclined students into vocational education programs, he added.

Last school year, there were 480 students enrolled in vocational programs at the high schools, Welch said. Current enrollment data is unavailable, he added.

The school system has preparatory or cooperative courses termed vocational in business and office

administration, marketing and distributive education, commercial foods, vocational automotive, trade and industry, child care, dental and medical aides.

The offerings of the vocational education area are close to the needs of the job market, Welch said. One area mentioned in a state study of such programs listed agriculture as a possibility for cooperative work, but there aren't many farms in the area, he added.

Vocational education courses do draw students who aren't strong scholastically, Welch said. Recommendations in the just-completed study hope to correct the problem.

The seven-period day allows students planning to go to college to take vocational education courses to balance their schedules, Welch said. Students should take as rigorous a program of studies as their abilities allow.

Students who don't demonstrate success in academic classes in the first two years of high school might be advised to consider enrolling in a practical arts or vocational course, according to the study. Also, students in vocational courses who may be weak academically should be helped by their vocational education instructors to improve reading, writing and math skills.

Improving student information about vocational courses and making them aware of opportunities is also important to draw students into the program, Welch said. Vocational programs that require more academic skills, such as robotics, may also appeal to academically inclined students and draw them into the vocational programs, he added.

Students who may need to improve academically to enter more sophisticated vocational programs will also find courses available to help them improve math or science skills, he added.

Some of the district's recommendations were picked up by the state education department auditing the local district's compliance with federal handicapped and anti-discrimination legislation, Welch said.

The group was particularly impressed with the recommendation for cooperation between the academic and vocational faculties to assist students in improving basic skills, ideas that are just being talked about as the state level, he added.

would be to capture tax increases through the Tax Increment Financing Act (TIFA).

However, one of the stipulations for using TIFA is that any money "captured" must come from improvements made after the DDA was formed. And along Jefferson Avenue, the only new construction planned was this joint venture. It was essential for the DDA's success.

Taking into consideration a 50-percent per year, 12-year tax abatement the city would have given Bon Secours and the DIO as an enticement for building there, the yearly assessment could end up to be a tidy sum of \$30,000 to \$60,000, Crawford said.

Some of the improvements already proposed for the area were presented at a public hearing Dec.

4. The audience heard plans to create a boulevard on Jefferson Avenue from Wayburn to Somerset Road as well as from Barrington to Westchester Road, and to construct street improvement, off-street parking lots, green belt areas, modification of residential street openings at Jefferson Avenue and the acquisition of commercial properties to accomplish those objectives.

George Helm, chairman of the planning commission, said most businessmen weren't in favor of a boulevard at the cost of losing parking outside their doors.

"While it might be a good idea to boulevard or otherwise improve the area from city hall to the AAA building, no plan will be put in effect until another public hearing is held and all objections heard," he said.

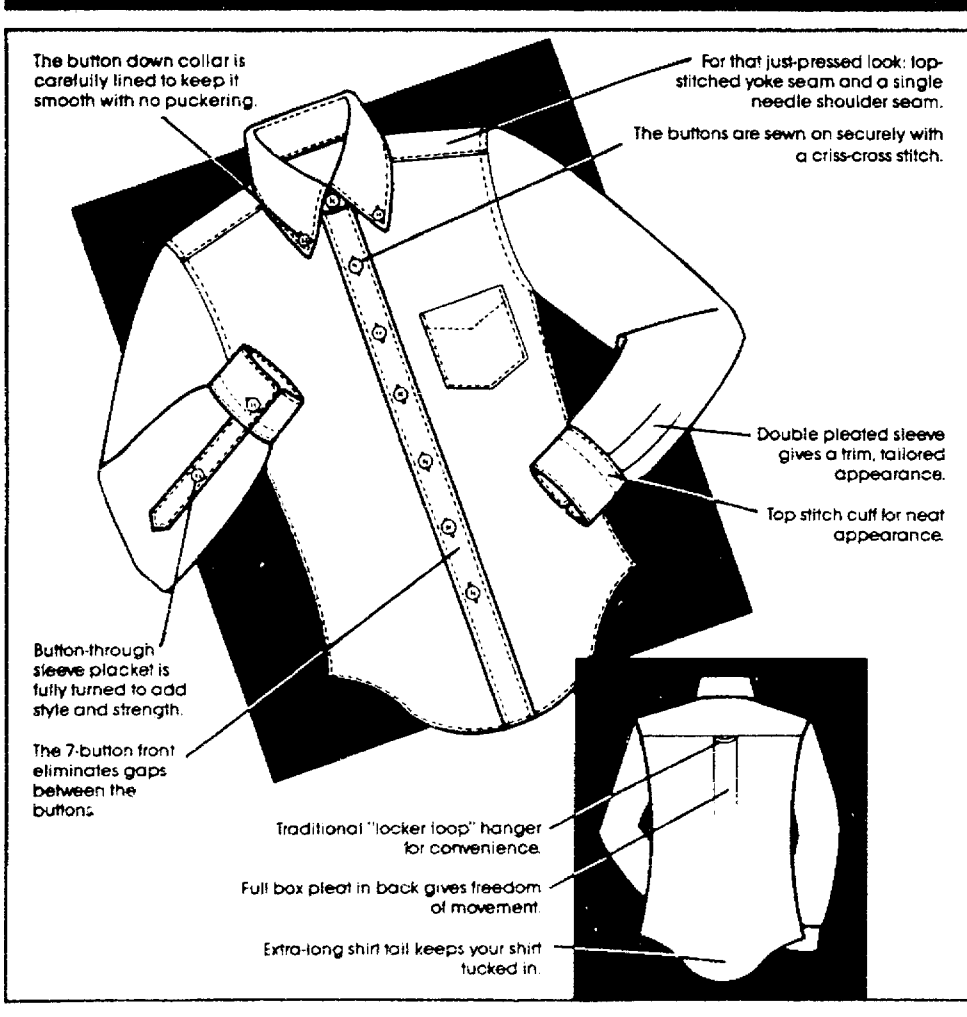

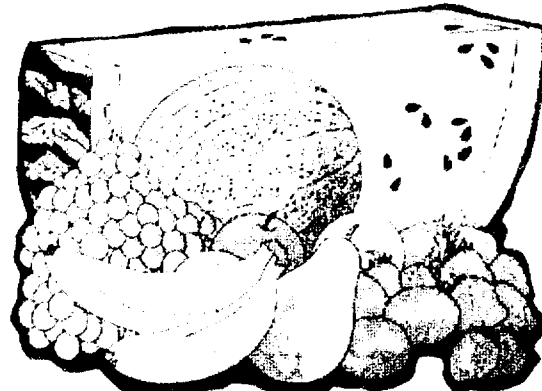

## A new superintendent

Grosse Pointe has a new superintendent of schools. That was the welcome news out of Monday night's meeting of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education which approved a three-year contract for Dr. John Whritner of East Lyme, Conn.

Dr. Whritner, who had emerged in recent weeks as the leading candidate for the post, is scheduled to assume his new duties here April 15 under a contract that will run until June 30, 1988. Contract details are to be worked out by board President Joan Hanpeter and the board's attorneys although the salary already has been set at \$60,000 a year.

From comments by board members and interested citizens after Dr. Whritner's recent interview with the board, it was clear that he was in line for the appointment unless some hitch developed. None did in the succeeding weeks and the board voted unanimously for Dr. Whritner Monday night.

On the basis of what this newspaper has heard and read about the new superintendent, he should be an excellent choice. His background and experience have prepared him well for his responsibilities and in his first public appearances here, he impressed those meeting him with his knowledge and his diplomatic comments.

In the discussion Monday night, it became clear that the board's search committee headed by Dorothy Kennel had narrowed the field of candidates from seven to just three. But in the end neither of the other two was seriously considered. One wanted to negotiate additional fringe benefits such as a car, a district-paid annuity and other specific extras while the other did not wish to permit any interviews in the district he currently serves unless he were the top candidate. Since Dr. Whritner was the favorite any-

way, the committee and the board did not feel it necessary to continue the selection process down to the No. 4 candidate on their list.

The fact that the board was able to make its choice promptly is commendable. Dr. Joseph Spagnoli, the capable interim superintendent, will serve until the arrival of Dr. Whritner, but neither the board nor the interim chief wants to tackle the most pressing problems until the new man is in office. The earlier Dr. Whritner can be on the job the better, and it now appears he'll be here by mid-April.

What are some of the problems facing the district?

They include the same old nagging issues such as the declining enrollment that might necessitate another review of possible school closings, the size of the school budget and the taxes required to meet it. But from the comments of parents, teachers and students it appears reviews may also be needed of such 1984 innovations as the seven-classes-a-day program and the shift of sixth-graders into the middle schools.

Perhaps the greatest challenge facing the school system is to maintain Grosse Pointe's tradition of excellence and build upon it. In these changing times, that will not be easy even though the standing of Grosse Pointe students in the recent Michigan Educational Assessment Program tests offered new proof of the continuing excellence of the school system.

It seems to us that the district has been fortunate in obtaining the services of a man with Dr. Whritner's abilities, but he also is fortunate in the caliber of the board members with whom he will serve. Working together, the new superintendent and the board ought to be equal to their heavy responsibilities.

## Tax bills should make us pause

To the Editor:

The arrival of the latest Grosse Pointe tax bills for property owners and the significant tax increase for 1984 should make us all pause and ask "What the heck is going on here?"

Despite the continued sharp decline in student enrollment and despite the closing of one elementary school (Barnes), the school system put in for, and got a hefty increase of almost 10 percent. Schools take about two-thirds of our tax dollars.

What's especially disturbing about this situation in Grosse Pointe is that, unless something is done about the inefficiencies in this system, the following trends are almost sure to continue:

1. The school enrollment will continue declining. The official census clearly shows and the school administration agrees largely that the present enrollment of 7,300 students will decline to about 5,400 in the next five years. Enrollment reached a peak of about 13,300 in the early 1970s.

2. The cost of educating each student for a year, which was around \$1,100 in the early 1970s, will continue soaring. It's over \$5,100 per student this year. There are many colleges around this country where the tuition, plus board and room, is below \$5,100.

3. For one reason and another, the population in the five Grosse Pointes will continue declining slowly. It has dropped around 11 percent since 1976. This is another reason why each remaining taxpayer will have to shoulder more and more school taxes, unless some efficient measures are introduced.

4. And the people who establish the school taxes each year will keep coming back every three years and insist that they absolutely must have the substantial increases in taxes, despite all of the above factors.

Personally, I did not vote for Pro-

position C in the last election. I felt it was too drastic. But that a majority of people in Grosse Pointe did vote for this proposition indicates to me that the citizens in these five cities clearly feel that recent events here call for such drastic action.

To illustrate, last year Grosse Pointe supported their school board by a 2-to-1 margin when it decided to close one school, thereby demonstrating an interest in efficient government.

But since then, the system has boosted taxes, increased high school teaching costs by over 16 percent by adding a class for every student, hired at least 32 additional teachers, closed the Barnes School but reportedly only saved \$115,000 (out of a \$36 million budget) and continues to operate with about 6,200 empty seats in the 14 schools. Yes, a number of administrators and teachers were retired early, but these incentives undoubtedly were quite costly.

The school census is another thing that needs looking into and probably represents more waste. The census reports on page one of the summary that last May there were 7,515 students enrolled in the system. However, on page seven of the same report, it's stated that

7,854 students were in the system. Other flaws have also been found in this census which is of the utmost importance for future planning — but only if it's accurate.

Last week Donald Szama wrote a critical letter and requested no response. But one comment, which reflects the view of some others, deserves a rejoinder.

He said, "Let's worry a little bit more about student excellence and morale. After all, isn't that the real issue?"

Certainly, student excellence and morale is important in Grosse Pointe. Our small family, for example, has quite a few college degrees. But education is not the only "real issue" in our community and in our society, although some educators seem to feel that way.

Let's keep in mind that the people using our public schools are a minority, not the majority in this community. And even among the people with children, fully a quarter of the families here send their children to private or parochial schools.

There are people of all ages, all income levels and all interests in the Grosse Pointes. Let's give some attention to their excellence and their morale, Mr. Szama.

## A vote to remember in 1986

The reluctance of the state House of Representatives to enact a mandatory seat belt law is deplorable in view of the evidence that supporters produce about the savings of lives, injuries and costs in jurisdictions that have adopted similar legislation.

Rep. David Hollister told the Detroit Free Press that his feeling is that the seat-belt proposal "touches a raw nerve," and that in effect the opposition reflects the anti-government attitudes expressed by people from President Reagan on down. Hollister, the chief advocate of the legislation, thinks the car is a symbol of freedom and that people are very uptight about having anybody tell them what to do.

There is no doubt something to what Hollister said. But we think there is another factor that is more germane in Michigan. That is the tax revolt that resulted in the recall of two senators earlier this year and gave the GOP control of the upper house when the recalled Democrats were replaced by Republicans. Those recalls and the recall threats against other elected officials have really frightened Michigan legislators. As a result, they are timid about voting on many issues, and especially on those which have become somewhat controversial.

It is true that for our elected representatives in the Legislature, as in Congress, the school board and the local city council, there often is a tough decision to make as to whether they should vote for what they think is the wish of their consti-

tuents or what they think is the best interest of the public. Unfortunately, a noisy minority often persuades our elected representatives that it reflects the voice of the people when it does not.

If there is any consolation in the defeat of the seat-belt proposal, it is that Grosse Pointe's William R. Bryant, Jr. and a majority of his Republican House colleagues voted for the legislation. Unfortunately, a majority of the Democratic members voted against the bill and, even worse, nine members either abstained or were absent. And so in its latest test, the bill was defeated, 52-49, falling four votes short of passage.

The lack of courage by legislators who voted against or abstained may mean a further increase in automobile costs in the future. The federal government has warned that it will require automatic occupant restraint systems in the future unless states with two-thirds of the U.S. population adopt mandatory seat belt laws by 1989. If such systems are required, costs of new cars will increase again.

Those who ducked on the mandatory seat belt issue may have done so to curry favor with their constituents, but they may have achieved the opposite result when their constituents discover what has happened to car prices. It is not the first time, of course, that short-term personal gain has taken precedence over long-term public gain, but we hope that voters remember the negative position of these legislators on seat belts and car prices in 1986.

## Repealing the New Deal

After half a century, is a repeal of the New Deal now essentially underway?

Perhaps so, if it is assumed that Congress will adopt most of President Reagan's proposals for further cuts in the budget through the elimination of some programs, curtailment of many others and a freeze on spending for most of the rest.

President Reagan purports to see in his one-sided November victory a mandate for the kinds of additional cuts he is now proposing. Yet his theme during the campaign was a pledge not to increase taxes and to continue to seek limits on government growth. So he may be going farther than the people indicated in their November vote. If so, Congress will no doubt get the message and drag its feet on some, if not all, of the Reagan proposals.

The idea that the president's proposed cutbacks constitute a repeal of the New Deal can be justified by a look at the kind of trimming he wants in federal spending. He would eliminate many programs to maintain the public's health, such as subsidies for child nutrition and health profession education, and cut back others, such as health block grants, funds for the National Institute of Health and other health research, and Medicare and Medicaid.

He would eliminate aid for urban mass transit, Amtrak and other rail subsidies, community development block grant loan guarantees and the Small Business Administration. He would throw out all general revenue sharing which provides \$4.6 billion a year to 39,000 counties, cities and towns across the country. He would eliminate library grants, agricultural conservation programs, the Job Corps, legal services and community services block grants.

Beyond this list, he also would eliminate NASA's civilian aeronautical research, and either freeze funds or make deeper cuts for the National Science Foundation, agricultural research and extension services, housing loans for the elderly and handicapped, and a variety of re-

search programs in the fields of energy and nuclear fission and fusion.

Such recommendations reflect the president's general view that the government is the enemy of the people. The New Deal essentially saw the government as a friend or even a protector of the people. The president does say that he fully supports a "safety net" for the needy and others at the low end of the income scale. But he obviously is seeking to shrink the government and to get it out of areas of support and service to the public in which it has been engaged for generations.

Nobody likes to pay taxes, but taxes produce the revenues that maintain public services. Few people will criticize the president and Congress for trying to slow the growth of government or even get it out of certain kinds of services which can be provided better by private enterprise or other levels of government. But overall support for health, education and research can be regarded as part of the federal government's responsibility to protect the nation's best resources — its people — and their opportunities in the future.

A 5 percent cut in the pay of federal employees probably would be popular with the public, but it could cost the government the services of many highly qualified employees. A 10 percent cut in the pay of the president and members of Congress would be even more popular as a symbol and would make the cuts for programs serving millions of people more palatable to the public.

There still are questions about whether Treasury Secretary Regan's tax simplification program can be adopted because it treads on the toes of so many special interests. Now there are new questions as to whether in his efforts to reduce the deficit President Reagan's proposed cuts in services that affect Americans in every walk of life can be or should be enacted. If they are adopted, then it can be fairly said that the repeal and dismantling of the New Deal are under way.

**School board accepts gifts**

The Grosse Pointe Board of Education Monday accepted gifts from the North Boosters Club, the Grosse Pointe Foundation for Academic Enrichment and the Neighborhood Club at its Dec. 10 board meeting.

The North Boosters Club donated \$1,737 for the purchase of an ice machine for the high school's athletic department. The ice will be used to treat injuries, according to board members.

The Foundation for Academic Enrichment donated \$1,547 to the schools for funding of three projects. Dr. Harry Begian, from the University of Illinois, will rehearse and conduct the South Symphonic Band and Symphony Orchestra, which have been selected to perform at the Midwestern Conference on School and Vocal Music to be held Jan. 19 at the University of Michigan. The bands will also perform Jan. 17 at Parcels Middle school.

Another project funded by the foundation was "Song of the Inland Sea," a musical panorama of the Great Lakes that will be presented to Parcels middle school students Feb. 17. The assembly will be presented by the Heritage Ensemble from the University of Wisconsin. Also included in the foundation's

donation was funding for "Living Science," a hands-on science program in which students can touch exotic animals, birds, reptiles and mammals. A science specialist will visit each elementary school classroom in the district in March.

The Neighborhood Club donated funds for the purchase of a traveling sprinkler system for the Brownell Middle School playground.

Another donation from the North Boosters Club was money for the purchase of a videotape camera and case. The camera will be used to tape contests of the various teams and used later by coaches for review, according to athletic director Thomas Gauerke.

Videotape is an "absolutely tremendous education tool," Gauerke said, adding that coaches find videotape invaluable in working with their teams. There is video equipment at the school that has been used in physical education classes at times to show students their form in performing tumbling maneuvers, he added.

Unlike filming with a movie camera, videotapes can be viewed and then recycled making them less expensive to use. Gauerke said.

laughter. Dr. Burns provides the prescription.

He begins with a question: "What is happiness?" He goes on to write, "You can't buy it on Rodeo Drive, but you can enjoy it and the one sure proof of enjoyment is laughter." In this how-to guide, Dr. Burns gives you every remedy he has acquired for tickling your funny bone.

In a fairly short book, he allows the reader to really absorb a healing dose for the blues in a single sitting. It is loosely written, providing an opportunity to dip into it at any place for a toning jolt of laughter.

It begins with a take-off on weightier, more pretentious books that philosophize on how to be happy. There is a foreword which he says is deliberately written badly because if it was good, it would make the rest of the book look bad.

There is a preface which he claims only differs from a foreword because it begins with a P instead of an F. An introduction follows in which he formulates some views on happiness, such as "Happiness is a state of mind. You can't be happy 24 hours a day. Twenty-three maybe. You deserve an hour for lunch."

George begins his prescription with an incisive discussion of what constitutes happiness and concludes with the observation that happiness is all-too-rare a condition of long or short duration, with wonderful symptoms and not one, but many causes.

He goes on to refute the objections of those who claim that happiness is "yesterday's mashed potatoes," citing crime, terrorism, laser weapons and even worse threats that dissipate hope that anyone can be happy under such conditions.

He tells us that there were always things to worry about. "Do you think the cavemen had it so good? Sometimes, we were miserable — starting fires with sticks, wall-to-wall dinosaurs — and no martinis. Believe me, when a dinosaur stares at you, you can use a martini."

Everyone talks about the good old days, but Dr. Burns, who is an expert on them ("I was there") and grew up in the Depression knows that every era has its pluses and minuses. He contends that 50 years from now, they'll be saying:

"Why can't we be happy like those lucky people in the good old 1980s?" "It's an interesting thought," he quips. "I wonder if they'll really be saying that. I can hardly wait to find out."

And so it goes throughout the book, pertinent observations on the human comedy mixed with sly humor.

In event that you need a daily dose of levity, Dr. Burns provides a prescription for each day of the week. It's over the counter and you don't need an appointment.

These are followed by chapters concerning such gems as nine definitions of happiness and other lists of nine such as the happiest men, happiest women, happiest animals, etc., each suggestion followed by a laugh-provoking comment.

Along the way, he discusses the folly of expecting to find happiness in excessive drinking or drugs; some aggravations that are common to all of us, and he advises his readers not to get hung up on sayings and expressions about happiness. Among many he advises ignoring is, "Let a smile be your umbrella." "I tried it once," he says. "I had pneumonia for six weeks and shrunk a \$450 suit."

Hobbies are important, according to Dr. George, but he warns "Don't go around collecting stuff that belongs to someone else or you will have 10 years to think about a new hobby."

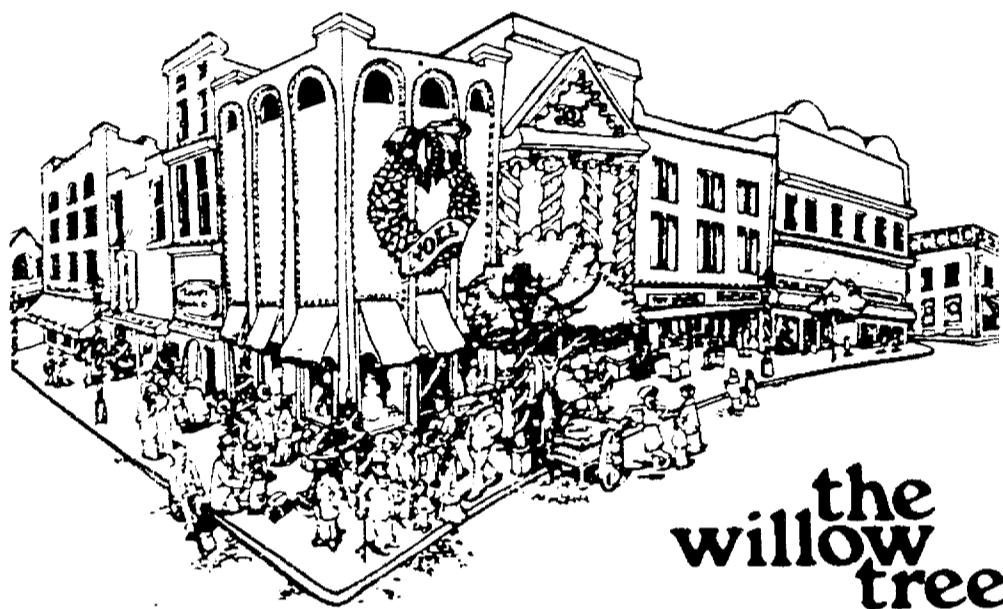
In a serious vein, Dr. Burns tells us one of the most important ingredients of happiness is to enjoy your work and in the process, to accept challenges. He gives an example of "The Sunshine Boys." George was afraid of being a dramatic star, or having to convey emotions. He solved that problem. "If the director wanted me to cry, I thought of my sex life."

One tag line demands to be quoted. "Not only am I making movies at 88, as a senior citizen I only pay half-price to see myself on the screen."

Interspersed with the wit and wisdom of the text are pictures of George with celebrities and also with comely models. It makes you wonder if Dr. Burns left something out of his book on the subject of happiness.

Whatever. For relaxation and fun, Dr. Burns is an excellent pick-up for times when you need an 'up-per.'

# Outlook for 1985 favorable, according to experts

The almost-here 1985 will be a good year — maybe — according to the experts, but something will have to be done about reducing the federal deficit.

That was the message given by speakers from the automotive, finance, retail, construction and academic fields to some 1,200 people who attended the annual economic outlook luncheon last week at Cobo Hall. It was the 19th annual event and was sponsored by the Economic Club of Detroit and Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Barbara B. Murray, professor of business, School of Management, University of Michigan, said, "There will have to be spending cuts, including defense spending, and an increase in taxes and this will have to be in 1985."

She said the tax increase would probably be in the form of a value added tax or sales tax, which is compatible with supply side economics, since it taxes consumption rather than income.

1984 was to be the year of high interest rates, high inflation and a decline in the dollar. It didn't happen, the professor said, among other things, because industry increased its productivity by updating facilities and equipment.

"These productivity increases have permitted growth without increasing inflation," she said.

Petroleum prices will not increase and there will be a decline in health care costs due to competition, Dr. Murray said. She predicted that auto sales will be down slightly from 1984.

Thomas F. Russell, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Federal-Mogul Corp., the largest supplier to the automotive industry agreed.

"The general expectation is that 1985 sales will fall below the previous two years."

He said, however, that auto sales in 1986 will be greater than the three previous years.

Russell said a tax increase "aimed at reducing our ballooning federal deficit" was possible. Such

an increase would slow the economy, particularly the sale of automobiles, he said, but continued deficit spending will result in higher interest rates and lower sales.

Dean E. Richardson, chairman of the board of Manufacturers National Bank, said, "Rather than seeing a recession ahead, I think the economy has paused."

He predicted that the economy will remain at its present level into the first quarter of 1985 and then rise steadily.

Next year will be profitable for the banking industry as well as the private sector, he said. But he cautioned that President Reagan will have to begin to reduce federal spending early in 1985 or resort to a tax increase.

William Fordon, president of the Fordon Co. and president of the Associated General Contractors of Detroit, said residential building is expected to drop slightly in 1985, due to higher interest rates. Commercial construction, however, is alive and well, he said, naming such projects as the People Mover,

Millender Center, the Stroh river-front project, the Burroughs headquarters, the new Ford Motor casting plant in Flat Rock and the Chrysler expansion in Sterling Heights. Major plants completed include General Motors Lake Orion and Poletown projects.

"Looking back, 1982 and 1983 were the most totally forgettable years the construction industry has ever had," Fordon said. "But 1984 was better. A foundation was laid, not just here in Michigan, where construction expenditures reached a record high \$209 billion. That is why we feel 1985 will be better to us than any year since 1980."

The outlook for retail sales calls for a 7.5 percent increase, according to Robert B. Carlson, president and chief executive officer of Crowley's, with the following projections: 9 percent for drug stores; 7.3 percent for furniture and home furnishings; 7 percent for department stores; 6.8 percent for discount department stores; 6.7 percent for apparel and accessories; and 5.5 percent increase for food.

## Summer student programs at Wellesley discussed

A special meeting for boys and girls, ages 12-14 and 15-17, from Grosse Pointe, and their parents and friends has been scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 15, from 2 to 3 p.m. at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial.

At the Senior Program, each participant attends two workshops of his or her choice. These are selected from a wide range of fields including law, architecture, film, drama, art, dance, psychology, mathematics, physics, philosophy, computers and many others. Among the more than 65 workshops

offered there is also SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) preparation.

Recreational schedules during the remainder of the day include mini-courses, field trips, guest lectures and sports, such as tennis, softball or soccer. There is swimming and boating on Lake Waban, located on the campus.

At the Intermediate Program, each participant also attends two workshops of his or her choice, planned in most cases to be hands on or participatory type workshops. Among the many offered this summer are photography, astronomy, drama, writing, computers, dance and business. The recreational portions of the day feature sports, mini-courses, field trips, swimming and boating.

A student in either program may enroll as a commuting or residential participant for either or both of Exploration's three-week sessions. Admission is largely a self-selection process dependent on space being available in a workshop of the student's choice. Exploration attracts participants with a wide span of abilities ranging from average to advanced.

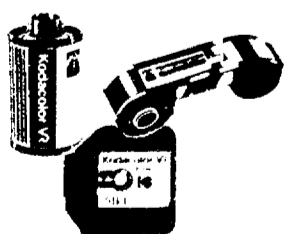



## Motorists cautioned

The Michigan Department of Transportation reports that motorists ran into snowplows operated by MDOT drivers 14 times last winter.

While it may not appear to be a major problem, the department's director, James P. Pitz, said MDOT maintains highways in 21 counties only, with the remaining 62 counties having their roads plowed by county road commissions.

Most of the collisions resulted from drivers striking snowplows in the back or side, indicating they were following too closely or passing improperly.

To help motorists avoid accidents involving snowplows, MDOT offers these tips:

— When following a snowplow truck, stay far enough behind it to avoid having snow from its plows reduce your vision to the point that you won't be able to see well and be able to stop in case of an emergency.

— When approaching a plow on a two-lane highway, allow extra room at the center line for the snowplow blade.

— When passing a snowplow

truck, proceed only when your vision ahead is clear. On two-lane highways, snowplows will periodically pull over to let traffic pass. When passing on divided highways, watch especially for snowplows operating in the left lane. They may be moving much slower than traffic and be obscured by blowing snow.

— Anytime you drive past a plow, be alert for wing plow blades which may be in operation on either side of the plow.

### Thief caught

A suspect, accused of mugging a 72-year-old Woods resident and stealing her purse, is in the Wayne County jail, due to information supplied by a witness and quick police action.

The woman was on her way from the Mack/Brys branch of Manufacturers National Bank to the parking lot last Tuesday morning. A man jumped out of a passing cab, struck her and grabbed her purse containing \$378. The incident was witnessed by a St. Clair Shores woman who supplied a description of the thief and part of the taxi's license number to police.

A Woods officer in a scout car saw the cab, pulled it over and found a woman's purse on the back floor. Both the driver and passenger were taken to the station.

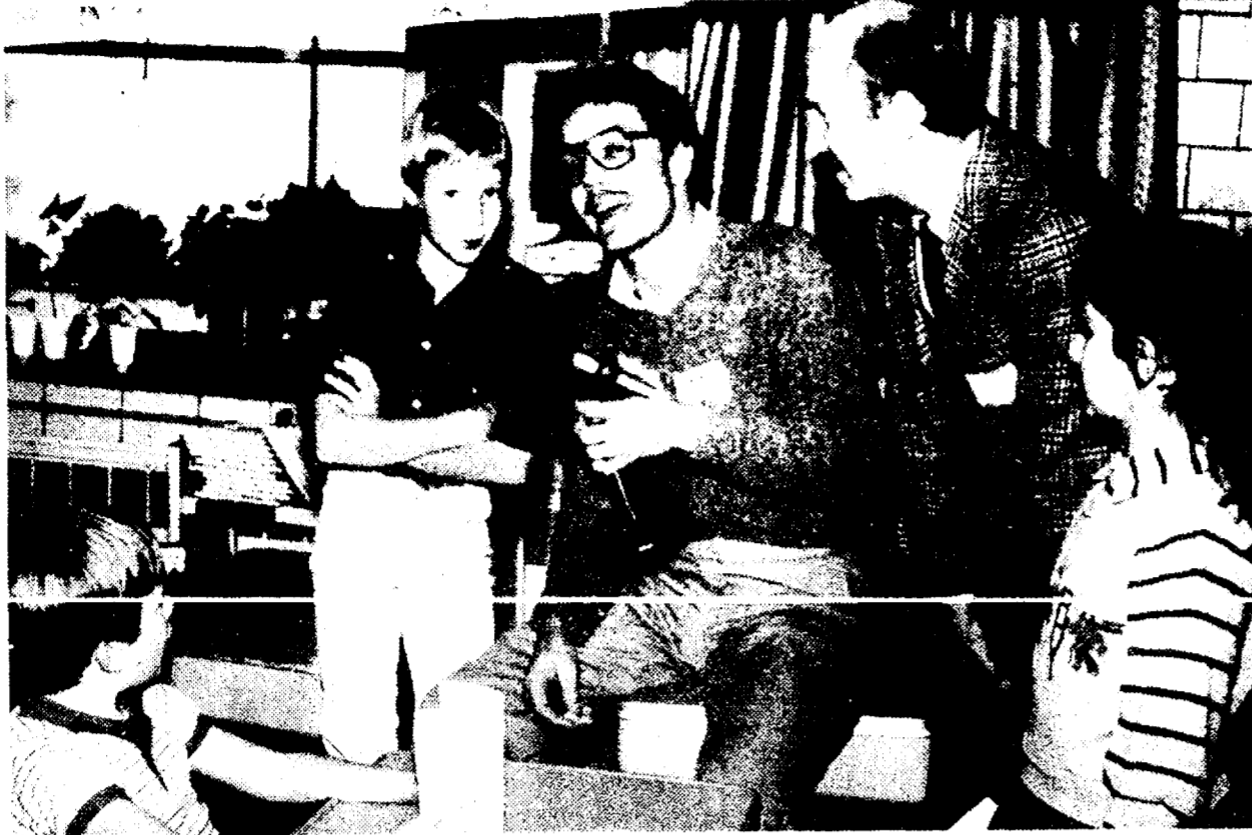

**Real Estate questions and answers**

The Macomb County Board of Realtors responds to questions about real estate.  
Q. We want to buy a house, but the range of prices is bewildering. How can we avoid overpaying? Is there a rule of thumb regarding how much less than the asking price would be acceptable?

A. There are no general rules governing what price may be acceptable. If the house is fairly priced, the owner may demand the full asking price. If it is overpriced, and the seller needs a quick turnaround, discounts of five to ten percent are possible.

If you've found a home that you're particularly interested in, you could contact a real estate appraiser to have it evaluated. Another option would be to check public records to learn the sales prices for homes recently sold in the immediate area similar to the one in question. You can estimate the value of the home you're interested in by adding or subtracting for specific features or problems.

Q. We're hoping to buy our first home, but can't afford a conventional house in a decent neighborhood. Condominium living doesn't appeal to us, nor would a trailer park. My father has offered to give us a lot in a nice area, but the cost of building even a small home is too much for us. However, a newspaper ad offers pre-fab homes in a price range that we could afford. Are manufactured homes a good investment?

This depends on a number of factors, one which seems to be your strong preference for a single-family home lifestyle. Fortunately, manufactured homes are quite luxurious. They are trucked to a lot and installed on a concrete foundation along with the stove, refrigerator and air conditioner.

One advantage of today's manufactured homes is that they are almost indistinguishable from site-built homes. Another is that you can add room mod-

ules as your family grows. As an investment, high-quality manufactured homes have not been on the market long enough to accumulate much data on re-

sale prices. It is safe that it would be better than the outlook for buying a mobile home or renting. A manufactured home could be a good move for you.

**Bakery robbed in Park**

A lone gunman, armed with a chrome plated revolver, robbed Verdonck's Bakery, located on Mack Avenue, on Nov. 26, according to Grosse Pointe Park police.

The clerk, who was alone at the time, told police the man demanded money and fled on foot with \$150. The woman was unhurt.

She described the thief as a 30-year-old black man, of medium build with a heavy mustache. He was wearing a dark jacket, green pants and a navy stocking cap.

Two days later a customer, about to enter that same bakery, was

robbed at 7:35 a.m., as he was putting money into the parking meter.

The 64-year-old man, who was unhurt, told police that three men surrounded and grabbed him by the throat. They went through his pockets taking \$100 and his wallet.

He described the first assailant as a slim-built, 6-foot-1-inch tall black man, between 18 and 25 years of age. He had a beard and was wearing a brown waist-length jacket with a belt.

The second man was about the same age with long hair and wearing a black jacket.

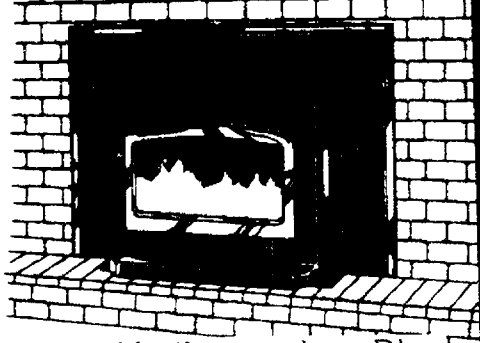

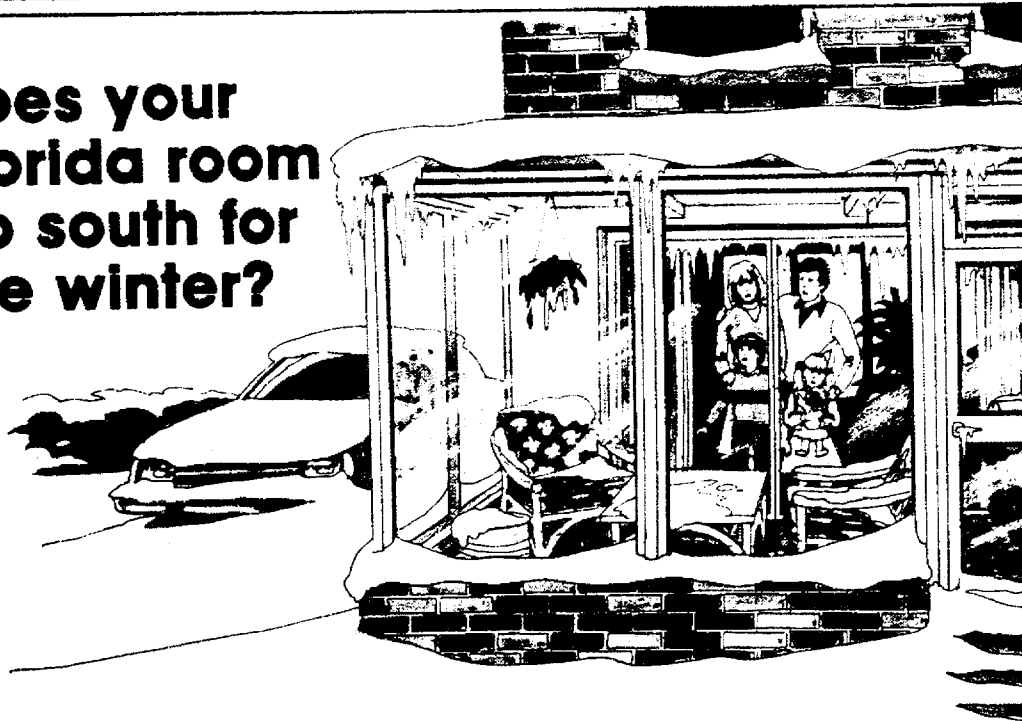

**Reye syndrome**

Reye syndrome is a rare but dangerous condition that can develop from the flu or chicken pox. It occurs mainly in children under 16, usually when they appear to be recovering.

Watch for these signs:  
• persistent vomiting  
• fatigue  
• confusion and belligerence

If your child displays any of these symptoms, consult a doctor immediately.

Some studies indicate that there may be an association between the use of aspirin for flu and chicken pox and the development of Reye syndrome. Further studies are being conducted on this possibility.

In the meantime, the U.S. Surgeon General suggests that you check with your doctor before using aspirin or any medication when your child has flu or chicken pox.

**Businessmen are working on next year's fireworks**

The Grosse Pointe Business and Professional Association of Mack Avenue hopes to have its approvals and endorsements from the five Pointes by the end of the month for its second annual Mack Avenue U.S.A. fireworks display next summer.

This year's display July 3 was the first in eight years in Grosse Pointe and drew an estimated 6,000 people to Parcels Middle School in the Woods. The 20-minute display was preceded by a performance by the St. Clair Shores Symphony Orchestra.

Next year's display, scheduled for June 30, will follow the same format, but the band and pyrotechnic company have not been chosen, according to Kathy Forster, one member of the planning committee. She and Robbie Currie, who is also on the committee, helped plan the July display.

The company chosen to fire the display from the Lochmoor Club next year will probably be asked for assistance in coordinating the timing of the fireworks with the end of the concert, Mrs. Forster said. The band will also be asked to provide its own sound technician, she added.

Last year's budget for the event was \$15,000, which was met with contributions from businesses, residents and community organizations. The association hopes to keep the budget the same next year, but will make some improvements in the program, Mrs. Forster said.

Besides the \$500 contributions this year from the Woods and Farms, the Woods will also donate the time and expense of public safety officers and auxiliaries, fire protection and emergency medical service for the event. Within the next two weeks, the association will go before the City, Park and Shores councils for their endorsement and donations, she said.

Fundraising this year is going

well, Mrs. Forster said, adding "Some of the people who contributed last time felt so good about it, they increased their donation this year." Also, the association has committed the board of directors to help with details of the event, she said.

The groundwork laid in July makes it easier to plan next summer's display, Mrs. Forster said. There is a formula to be followed and time schedules to be met.

One thing the association would like next year is to broadcast the concert, Mrs. Forster said. The association will also change the way it spent some of the funds for the display as well as publicly thanking the contributors to the event, she added.

Part of the ease in raising money for next year's display was the success of July's fireworks, Mrs. Forster said. There were only minor incidents reported during the display, including youngsters using fireworks. And a woman who received minor injuries when a store window shattered and showered her with glass, according to police reports.

Residents on the streets adjoining the fireworks avoided the crowd around the middle school by holding parties and watching the display from their backyards, Mrs. Forster said. One enterprising group earned extra money by charging a nominal fee for parking during the display, she added.

"We even had people donate money after the fireworks because they enjoyed it so much," Mrs. Forster said. In addition, the Grosse Pointe Board of Education didn't charge the association for the use of the Parcels grounds as first was planned.

"As long as we have people in the community thinking like that, we'll do all right," Mrs. Forster said. "The fireworks are a small enough thing to give to our children."

The Council adopted a resolution to hold a Closed Session, immediately following temporary adjournment of the Regular Meeting, for the purpose of discussing personnel matters.

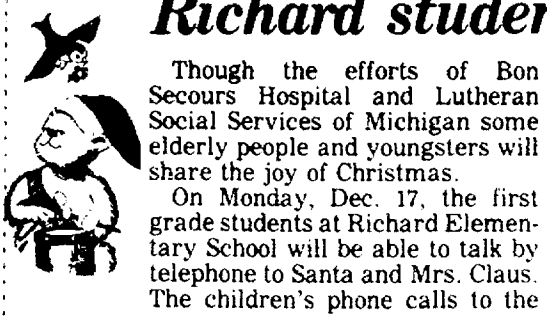
After reconvening, the Council approved the wage & benefit settlement for the City's Department Head and Supervisory Personnel.

North Pole will actually go to the Calvary Adult Day Care Center in Detroit. Clients at the Center who are elderly people in need of daily supervision but not nursing home care, will respond to the calls.

"We've worked with this first grade class throughout the year," said Cristie Hicks, occupational therapist at the Center. "It's valuable for our older folks to share the spontaneity and enthusiasm of the children. It's also a good opportunity for the children to get to know elderly people," she added.

# Search for Park police chief begins

An advisory committee will participate in the screening process to pick Grosse Pointe Park's new police chief, and City Manager John Crawford will select the top applicant from their list of finalists for council's confirmation.

Mayor Palmer Heenan received unanimous support from council at its meeting Monday night on a resolution that appoints himself, Mayor Pro Tem John Prost, councilman David Gaskin, citizens Frederick Olds and John Fildew, and attorney Steve Wasinger as chairman to the advisory committee.

"I'm pleased to see this committee assist in filling this critical position and working with me," said Crawford, who will act as an ex-officio member.

The resolution follows the city charter which states that "the city manager shall appoint the chief of police, subject to the confirmation by council and is his responsibility."

An attempt by Mayor Heenan at the last council meeting to have his own hand-picked citizens committee screen and appoint a replacement for retiring Police Chief Henry Counce failed.

At that time, he moved that a search committee consisting of himself, Mayor Pro Tem John Prost, attorneys Stephen Wasinger and Phillip Tannain, and citizen John Fildew be authorized to "judge, solicit and review resumes of prospective applicants, interview and recommend to the city manager a new police chief as well as all other things necessary or incidental to that process."

While Heenan got full support from his political running mate Vernon Asherman on this motion, the rest of council voiced concern against taking the responsibility for that selection away from the city manager. However, they weren't opposed to having a citizens committee contribute input to the selection process.

"The charter runs the city on a day-to-day basis and I'm not in favor of circumventing it or undermining its character," councilman Mark Valente III said. "The city manager is the chief executive officer and employees answer to him and it's terribly inappropriate for

someone to direct someone already empowered with the job."

Councilman Gaskin said he didn't like deferring total responsibility to a citizens committee, that all council members were elected and that he felt responsible for actions that might strip Crawford of his position.

Councilwomen Carrol Evola and Patricia Forster said they also were receptive to a citizens committee, but the real problem was not abiding by the charter.

Heenan finally withdrew his motion after council agreed to form a committee to study and recommend how to address the issue and develop standards to guide the city manager in his selection.

"The object is to decide how to get community input without circumventing the charter, and making recommendations to Crawford," Mayor Pro Tem Prost said.

The passed resolution includes Crawford's earlier suggestion to include a panel of police experts, selected by the committee, to interview applicants and make recommendations.

It also requires that any disagreement over the top three candidates between the police panel, advisory committee and city manager be ironed out before a request for council confirmation is submitted.

Wasinger is also chairman of Heenan's citizens committee studying public safety. He declined to comment on the findings of the year-long study and said it would be available in January.

However Valente and Prost said they understood the group had voted in favor of public safety which would combine police and fire departments into one department.

# Disbarred lawyer to go to jail

Disbarred attorney David W. Roth, of Balfour Road, will begin serving time in a Lexington, Ky., prison on Jan. 10 for retirement income security act fraud and mail fraud, according to F. William Soisson, assistant U.S. attorney.

Roth, who pleaded guilty to both charges on Aug. 10 was sentenced on Dec. 6 to two, two-year terms to run concurrently by U.S. District Judge Robert DeMascio.

"Justice has prevailed," said Park resident Ron Pair, from whose company Roth is charged with embezzling \$47,000. "It's the first good thing that happened in three years."

Pair said he was first introduced to Roth in 1972 by Roth's attorney James G. McMahon, who has an office in St. Clair Shores. It was on McMahon's recommendation that he hired Roth to help get Midwest International, a pollution control manufacturing company, back on its feet after the recession hit the Charlevoix-based firm.

In 1980, Pair put him on a \$3,000-monthly retainer to handle the pension fund and taxes. "He was brought in to resolve the termination of the pension fund plan which had only been in effect for two years," said Pair. "My intent was to turn the operations over to him so I could take it easy and continue the marketing and sales program."

"But Roth only had one thing on his mind, to extract as much money from the company as possible. We figure there was about \$250,000 worth of projects that never got completed," he added.

Pair said he didn't know where to look when the pension fund turned up missing until he discovered that Roth had recently been disbarred by the state Attorney Grievance Commission because of an alleged embezzlement.

Pursuing the matter and following the case from local police through labor department officials was a matter of principle, he said. "Roth stole from the company and paid for it. Now I'm going to concentrate on getting it back on its feet and out of Chapter 11."

Of the \$47,000 pension fund loss, \$15,000 has been recouped from donations from the client security fund of the State Bar of Michigan, money from attorney bar dues. Pair used his own funds to make up the balance.

The second charge the Roth pleaded guilty to was mail fraud involving about \$200,000 embezzled from the accounts of a divorced woman he was representing, according to Soisson. Roth's malpractice insurance paid \$175,000 of

that loss. It was the same charge he was disbarred for in April 1983.

However, this isn't the end of Roth's problems. Birmingham attorney Roy F. Moore, Esq., of the law firm of Wright and Goldstein, said he filed a civil lawsuit against Roth on behalf of Steven and Mary Himburg in February 1983.

"For breach of adjoining venture agreement in which he agreed to act as trustee," said Moore. "It also alleges he violated certain ethical rules in failing to properly account for funds he received and to pay the Himburgs the funds they are entitled to receive."

Steven Himburg was a former schoolteacher who became a paraplegic in 1976 as the result of a driving accident, according to Moore. Taking money received from a substantial settlement regarding the mishap, the Himburgs contacted Roth as an attorney and investment and tax consultant in May 1977 in hopes of adding to their financial security.

"Apparently Roth had bought stock in a Mississippi corporation, called Lexington Products in December 1976, and he convinced the Himburgs to invest \$27,000 to purchase stock," said Moore.

He said Roth told the Himburgs that, in his opinion, it was a worthwhile investment that would make them a good sum of money. So they gave him \$27,000, half to purchase their shares of stock and the rest as a loan to Roth so he could become a partner in that investment.

He signed a promissory note to pay his loan back by May 1979, with interest, and to act as trustee of the investment fund and stock, said Moore.

When the Himburgs opted for a better climate for the husband's physical condition and decided to move to California, they asked

Roth to sell their interest.

Roth agreed, but never gave them their share of the proceeds, said Moore. "The facts I uncovered were that the stock was sold in September 1980. The original purchase price was \$30,000 and the sales price was \$80,000."

"He received the money, kept \$15,000 for his own purposes, and used the remaining \$45,000 to pay off one of his personal loans. Not one penny went to the Himburgs," he added.

Roth's representation during a 1983 creditors exam that he was able to pay off the judgment hasn't materialized, according to Moore, and he's filed a motion to enforce it by adding Mrs. Roth's name as a defendant.

"Based on certain testimony Roth gave, he would give her about \$3,000 monthly after he sold the stock to do whatever she wished," said Moore. "She purchased oil royalties worth \$15,000 as well as other things."

"I will go to the court and ask that some of it be sold to satisfy the judgment," he added.

Moore's request to have Mrs. Roth disclose all of her personal and real properties, as well as the date they were acquired was granted by the judge Dec. 7, he said. However, he expects the Roths to contest the ruling before the final decision will be made and the case completed.

Moore also said he understood that Roth had agreed to consent to his 1983 disbarment with the provision he would not be charged with similar rule violations against other clients.

Roth has practiced law in the Detroit area for several years and most recently moved his offices to Fisher Road. Neither he nor his attorney, James G. McMahon, would return several phone calls.

## Get over that emotional hang-up on food

Sally Palaian wants people to stop trying to use food to nourish themselves emotionally.

Ms. Palaian will offer her eight-week Positive Self workshop beginning Saturday afternoon, Jan. 19, at The Healthy Outlook at 15839 Warren in Detroit.

Positive Self provides a support-group setting to help people control their weight by looking at body image and food attachments, looking directly at the relationship between a person's emotional hunger and eating habits, Ms. Palaian said.

In the two-hour meetings Satur-

day afternoons, participants spend the first 20 minutes or so discussing a variety of topics, Palaian said. The rest of the session includes exercises and support-group techniques for the compulsive eaters who take part in the workshop.

The series is in two parts. Ms. Palaian said. The first four weeks enable participants to overcome their fear of food and stop the bingeing as well as to help people acknowledge their food relationships, she said.

Then, personality changes are recommended to help people develop a good self-image and other ways to nourish their emotions.

"It's really a two-step process. First, there's letting go of food and them forming a new self-image," Ms. Palaian said.

She started Positive Self about a year-and-a-half ago. A friend of hers, Julia Dexel, was a nurse at William Beaumont Hospital, working with patients suffering from eating disorders. A nutritionist by training, Ms. Palaian decided to put her skills to work with her friend's and develop the Positive Self program. This is the group's first series on the east side.

Three-quarters of the people who take part in the program are compulsive eaters, Ms. Palaian said. Many are overweight, have just finished losing weight and fear gaining it back, in the process of losing weight or gained back what they've lost on a diet, she added.

A quarter of participants are eating-disorder sufferers, either bulimic, anorexic or bulimirexic, Ms. Palaian said. More people are becoming aware of the symptoms and availability of treatment for eating disorders, she added.

## Volunteers bring holiday cheer to lonely

The Holiday Project, a national non-profit volunteer organization, is asking individuals and groups to donate time or money to bring holiday cheer to those confined to nursing homes, hospitals, orphanages, psychiatric facilities or prisons.

The visit is more than singing a few carols with the people in the institution, Detroit committee chairman John Chisholm says. It means talking and listening and establishing relationships with the people, he adds.

"It's a way to participate," Chisholm, owner of O.G.A. International automobile and marine products, says. "We sit back and think we'd love to participate, but then feel we have nothing to offer. Here is a real opportunity to discover we all have something to contribute."

The Holiday Project is now in its 13th year of visiting institutions to spread holiday happiness. The organization was founded in 1971 in San Francisco when a small group of people delivered gifts to local

hospitals and then got together for Christmas dinner.

Within two years, 400 people were involved. By 1979, 76 cities across the nation were involved. The next year, it formally incorporated as a non-profit institution.

Nationally, 30,000 volunteers brought gifts and shared the holidays with 200,000 people in institutions last year. Corporate and individual donations totaled more than \$300,000.



Besides visiting or donating money, people may contribute to the organization by wrapping gifts, providing entertainment and by working on the managing committees for the local organization.

The group depends on volunteers, both individuals and groups, Chisholm said. "One of the things we're trying to create is to get people involved from different areas," he adds. The group doesn't limit itself to only Christmas visits. Members provide the same visits on Easter, Thanksgiving, Halloween, Valentine's Day and the Fourth of July, whenever confinement causes

loneliness during a holiday season, Chisholm adds.

This year, more than 600 people have made dozens of visits throughout the area, Chisholm says. Coordinating that many people in that number of places on that number of days is taxing the organization, he says, adding that groups with set structure and memberships are needed.

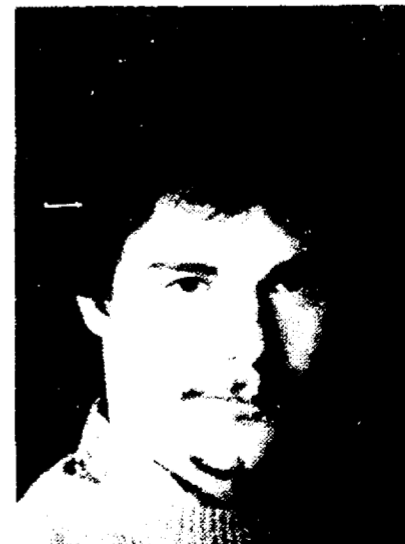
Local Holiday Project members will visit 25 institutions in Sterling Heights, Detroit, Allen Park, Ferndale, Royal Oak, Westland, Clinton Township, Hamtramck and other cities in December alone, according to the organization's newsletter.

A group can call the Holiday Project Hotline, 524-1770 and volunteer in a number of ways. A specific institution may be requested, and the organization will set up the details. A specific date may be requested and the organization will find an institution to be visited, Chisholm says. Holiday Project offers coordination and guidance for the visits, he adds.

"We want to allow people to create within the structure," Chisholm says, adding there's no structure to what a visit must include. It may be entertainment, followed by refreshments and conversations. It could be passing out gifts provided by the organization at hospitals and orphanages, he adds.

## No need to retire for Medicare

Persons approaching age 65 should know that they do not need to retire to get Medicare coverage. The law provides for separate applications for retirement and for Medicare, according to a spokesperson from the Social Security office located at 17420 Mack Ave., Detroit.

Medicare helps pay health care bills for people 65 and over or who have been entitled to disability benefits for 24 months. Also, insured workers and their dependents who

have permanent kidney failure have Medicare protection. Medicare hospital insurance is financed through the Social Security taxes people pay. ## From Another Pointe Of View

The Princeton Triangle Club's coming to town with its 95th annual production, "Revel Without A Pause," to be presented next Tuesday, Dec. 18, at 8:15 p.m. at Southfield Lathrup High on 12 Mile Road, between Southfield and Evergreen. Jeff Page, 965-9550, has ticket information and will handle reservations. Tickets will also be available at the door.

The show is a musical revue based on the efforts of two Russian spies to find the secret to American "humorability." It's sponsored here by the Princeton Club of Michigan, which numbers many Pointers among its members. One of them is Mark Beltaire, a Princeton classmate ('37) of the late Kirk Alexander, who died only a few weeks ago in New York.

Kirk, a Grosse Pointer who went to Princeton by way of Cranbrook, was involved in the 1935 production, "Stags at Bay." That Triangle Show contained such hits as "East of the Sun, West of the Moon" and "Love and a Dime." It led to Kirk's career as a television producer, and later as a silversmith.

Mark has vivid memories of Kirk and Frank Taplin, who just stepped down as chairman of the Metropolitan Opera, playing piano duets. They're part of the Triangle tradition, which is a long and distinguished one. Jimmy Stewart and Jose Ferrer were active in it. F. Scott Fitzgerald wrote for it. Those credits are hard to beat, but you can bet your bottom dollar the cast, crew and production staff of "Revel Without A Pause" will be doing their best to match if not top them.

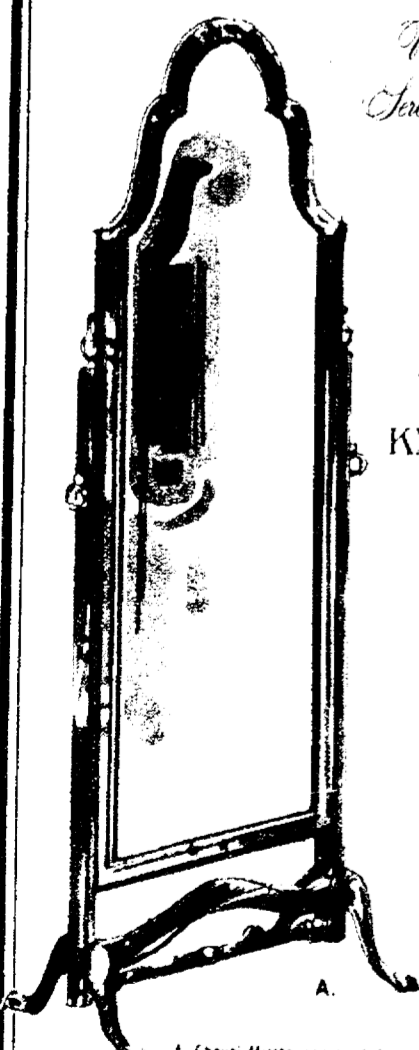

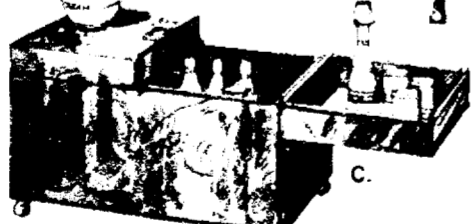

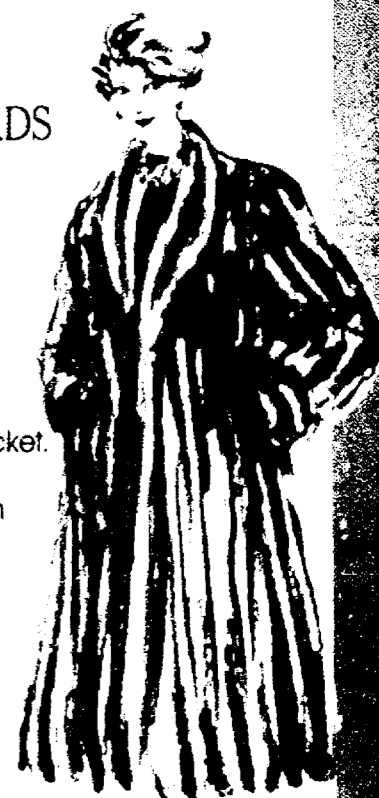

Among the selection of fashion accessories chosen by the show's curator, Artists Market Gallery Manager Mary Grimes, are macrame necklaces, antique buttons and beads and gold, silver, clay and glass jewelry, plus silk and wool clothing and clutch bags in brilliant colors.

Also available are Christmas ornaments of blown and slumped glass, leaded and acid-etched glass boxes, leaded glass windows, life-size papier-mache animals and "Ex-Detroit" and "Motor City" T-shirts and sweaters. The Artists Market, located on Randolph Street, is open from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

**Meats higher in December**

Turkey is featured in December, but not nearly as extensively as it was for the Thanksgiving holiday. Cranberries, sweet potatoes, grapes, nuts, raisins and Michigan apples are other foods prominent in the December food scene.

Most large supermarkets have a good selection of poultry products in addition to whole turkeys and a wide variety of convenience turkey products. Goose, duck, capon and roasting chicken may have more Old World tradition - but any of them will likely cost substantially more per serving than the most premiumly priced turkey.

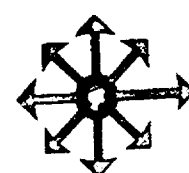
Beef prices have increased slightly in spite of more cattle on feed. Hog slaughter was running nine to 14 percent below year-earlier numbers for the first three weeks in November. Prices have advanced for pork producers as well as consumers. Look for these trends to continue into 1985.

Egg prices strengthened considerably in November but are still below last year's record-high prices.

The supply and price outlook for major fruit items during the winter is not as clear as it was a month ago. Navel oranges in California are not picking out as heavily as the most recent United States Department of Agriculture forecast. Storage holdings for apples are five percent above year-ago figures, but less of them are destined for the fresh market.

As of early November, total citrus supplies are predicted to be about 10 percent below last year's. Imports of frozen orange juice concentrate are up 300 percent over a year ago; prices are steady to lower than last year.

Lettuce supplies are more stable now that Arizona, California and Florida are all shipping. Prices have moved downward. Fall vegetables are doing well in the lower Rio Grande Valley in Texas. Large crops are responsible for lower price tags on cabbage, potatoes, sweet potatoes, almonds, pecans, peanuts and raisins. A good crop of soybeans may result in lower prices for margarine, salad dressings and cooking oil.

## American art in a baronial DIA display

One hundred and thirteen "American Masters: The Thyssen-Bornemisza Collection" are on display at the Detroit Institute of Arts through Sunday, Jan. 20. They come from the collection of Baron H.H. Thyssen-Bornemisza, the most extensive private art collection in the world, and comprehensively cover the major movements of some 200 years of American art.

The exhibit is divided into 14 key subject areas, including 18th century portraiture, the Hudson River School, luminism, impressionism, social realism, cubism, expressionism, pop art and photorealism. The 18th and 19th centuries are represented by masterworks such

as John Singleton Copley's "Portrait of Judge Martin Howard," Charles Willson Peale's "The Stewart Children," Frederic E. Church's "South American Landscape," Martin Johnson Heade's "Jersey Marshes," Frederic Remington's "The Parley (Questionable Companionship)," Winslow Homer's "The Signal of Distress," William Harnett's "Materials for a Leisure Hour," William Meritt Chase's "The Kimono" and Maurice Prendergast's "The Race Track." Highlights from the 20th century include Robert Henri's "Marjorie Reclining," Charles Demuth's "Church in Provincetown," Edward Hopper's "The Martha McKean of

Wellfleet," Hans Hoffman's "Blue Enchantment," Georgia O'Keeffe's "White Iris," Jackson Pollock's "Untitled," Richard Estes' "Hotel Lucerne" and Andrew Wyeth's "Afternoon Flight."

This is the third exhibition organized from the Baron's holdings to tour America nationally. It is open to the public without charge from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Tuesdays through Sundays, with the exceptions of Dec. 24 and 25 and New Year's Eve and Day, Dec. 31 and Jan. 1.

The present Baron's father (1875-1947) began collecting Old Master paintings in the late 1920s. His son, born in Holland in 1921, has extended the collection remarkably in size and subject, not only in Old Masters but also in impressionist and modern paintings, silver, furniture, carpets and other works of art.

The Baron heads a privately-owned international conglomerate. His principal residence and seat of his collection is the Villa Favorita in Lugano, Switzerland.

Free public tours conducted by museum docents depart from the exhibition entrance at 1 p.m. Tuesday through Sunday. Group tours are offered by advance reservation only; they may be arranged by calling 833-7884.

A fully illustrated catalog, written by John H. Bauer, director emeritus of the Whitney Museum of American Art, features color plates of each work in the exhibition. It is available at \$19 from the Museum Shop. The special exhibition poster reproducing Charles Demuth's "The Primrose" is \$5.

Partial support for the exhibit, organized by the International Exhibitions Foundation, Washington, D.C., is provided by grants from the Torino Tourist Office and the Lugano Tourist Office. ## Elegant Eating

A selection of recipes from the low-calorie, low-cholesterol — and penny-wise — collection of Thyra Grey Howard and Helena DeWitt Roth continuing, this week, a series of ITALIAN EGGPLANT SPECIALTY dishes.

### ITALIAN EGGPLANT AND ARTICHOKE PARMESAN

- 1 eggplant (about 1 lb.)
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. leaf basil, crumbled
- 1 tsp. paprika
- 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/4 cup corn oil
- 1 pkg. (9 oz.) frozen artichoke hearts
- 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce with tomato bits
- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) low-fat shredded pizza cheese
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Cut eggplant in 1-inch slices. Stack slices and cut into 1/2-inch strips. Combine flour, salt, pepper, basil, paprika, garlic powder and eggplant in mixing bowl. Toss to coat eggplant.

Heat oil in large skillet. Add eggplant mixture. Cook over medium heat, turning to brown on all sides. Add artichokes. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Add tomato sauce. Taste; add more basil, if desired.

Transfer vegetables to 1 1/2-quart baking dish. Top with pizza and Parmesan cheeses. Heat under broiler 2 to 3 minutes, until dish is bubbly and top is lightly browned. Makes 4 servings.

### RATATOUILLE

- 2 medium-size green peppers
- 2 medium zucchini
- 1 medium eggplant (about 1 lb.)
- 1/3 cup salad oil
- 1 cup thinly sliced onions
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 3 medium tomatoes, peeled, cut in wedges
- 2 Tbsp. chopped parsley

Wash peppers; halve; remove ribs and seeds. Cut lengthwise into 1/2-inch slices. Scrub zucchini; cut crosswise into 1/2-inch slices. Wash eggplant. Cut lengthwise into quarters, then into 1/4-inch slices.

In 1/2 cup hot oil, in large skillet, saute peppers, onion and garlic about 5 minutes. If mixture gets too dry, add 1 ounce dry Vermouth. With slotted spoon, remove to medium bowl.

Add 1 Tbsp. oil to skillet. Saute zucchini, turning frequently, until tender (about 10 minutes). Remove to medium bowl with slotted utensil.

Add remaining oil to skillet. Saute eggplant, turning occasionally, until tender (about 5 minutes). Remove eggplant from skillet; add zucchini; toss lightly.

Spoon half the pepper mixture into skillet. Sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper. Top with half of eggplant/zucchini mixture. Layer half of tomato wedges on top. Sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper and 1 Tbsp. parsley. Repeat with remaining pepper mixture, zucchini mixture, tomato wedges, salt and pepper and 1 Tbsp. parsley.

Simmer over low heat, covered, for 2 minutes, basting occasionally with pan juices. Remove cover. Cook 5 minutes, basting occasionally until liquid is absorbed. Serve hot or very well chilled to 8 or 10.

## Sports Week

### Priorities . . .

My telephone rang all day that Thursday.

One call was from someone who thought I'd written a misleading headline. She also told me she thought I was inaccurate, biased, unfair and prejudiced. A few hours later, someone else called, complaining about the same headline. She was a little more kind, saying only that I was a pretty poor headline writer.

Two more calls came from people who wanted me to know how biased they thought I was. One caller insisted that I must have gone to school at South High, since I was so prejudiced against North. Shortly after, another noted that I must "have a kid" at North, since I was always giving South the short end of the stick.

We get a lot of that sort of thing. We don't mind it usually, because it means that people are reading us. And that we like.

This day, though, the calls were a little disturbing. Didn't these people know I break my neck to be fair to each school in the system as well as the private and parochial schools? I thought. Don't they realize I have everything to lose and nothing to gain by being "biased" or "prejudiced?"

They probably don't know at all. And then I realized that it wasn't really important that they did. That's about the time I started thinking about Ben Wilson and Ricky Bell.

Bell was a star running back for UCLA in the mid-1970s and with the National Football League's Tampa Bay Buccaneers until 1982. Wilson was a Chicago high school basketball star with college scholarship offers from several of the country's finest schools. But athletes Bell and Wilson had something else in common: they died in the prime of their lives.

Wilson was killed in a street shooting, reportedly by assailants he didn't know. Bell was slain by an intruder with whom he'd become well acquainted in the past two years: a rare muscular and skin disease which contributed to his fatal heart attack two weeks ago.

My reaction to both tragedies was similar: why does someone so young and vital have to die? They had plans to make, dreams to realize, things to do.

Sure, I know, everyone does. Maybe that's why death comes as such a shock to so many. Maybe that's why it's easy for people to go along, oblivious to what's really important, making their plans and griping about their petty annoyances.

Is it really important whether North or South gets the most coverage in the newspaper? Is it essential that a story or a headline satisfy every reader? What does it matter if the paper prints two stories on one school and only one on another?

On that particular day, it didn't. Not when I sat back and thought about what I could be writing about. Like starving kids who will never get their names in the paper. Or talented and promising athletes like Bell and Wilson, who will never again be the subject of a story in a newspaper's sports section.

People get a little crazy when it comes to sports. Maybe that's what's so appealing about athletics, about following sports. You can let yourself go a little, get excited. I've seen it so many times: fans having fun which somehow escalates into chanting obscenities, throwing things or screaming at game officials. Parents who actually measure the inches of copy which appears in the paper on their school or team.

It doesn't happen all the time, just enough to leave a bad taste in my mouth when I think about stories like those of Bell and Wilson. Most of the time, I just forget about whining and complaining about those who whine and complain. This time, I just couldn't.

I think sometimes we ought to step back, take stock, think about what's really important. Sports and sports stories would be pretty far down on my list, and it's a living for me.

People are people, though. They'll keep calling. They have a perfect right to. And I'll just keep remembering that I do my best to be fair and unbiased, despite not graduating from South or having "a kid at North."

Oh, yes, I'll also remember to be grateful that I've never had to write a story about a Grosse Pointe athlete who was seriously injured or even killed. Or died before "his time." And I'll be hoping that I never will. That's called realizing what one's priorities are, I guess.

### One more time . . .

An item in the Sports Week column of Dec. 6 about Calvin College field hockey player Lisa Van Dellen should have said that Lisa was ranked ninth in the league in scoring, not second. Also, in naming Lisa's former University Liggett School teammates who have gone on to bigger things, the column should have included Michelle Stief, who now plays at Kalamazoo College.

As Lisa's dad, Kenneth Van Dellen (who submitted the information) noted, he's a proud dad, "but he doesn't want to exaggerate," about his daughter's field hockey success. (He's an honest dad, too).

and in the "We have a lot of common Department," is this one: Chris Nearhood, who regularly "boots" goals for the North High soccer team, has been very patient while I "boot" a couple of things myself. ## Tankers have tough act to follow

The boys' varsity swim teams at North and South have a tough act to follow: their female counterparts each won league titles and finished in the top 12 in the state. But both Les Roddis' North team and Fred Michalik's South High squad are laden with underclassmen who must face a highly competitive schedule on their way to duplicating the girls' successful season.

At South, 30 swimmers came out for the 1984-85 squad and the "numbers problem" has taken a new twist. The three seniors, 12 juniors, two sophomores and 13 freshman

have to jostle for practice time in the five-lane Brownell pool.

"We've got a fine dual meet team," coach Fred Michalik says. "I don't have any returning All-Staters or All-Americans." Michalik feels that Rick Leonard, Dickie Clarke and Matt Smith have good chances to earn either of those titles this year.

Michalik also picks North as one of his squad's toughest opponents.

The Blue Devils began the season Dec. 8 with a third place finish in the Rochester Relays, behind first place Andover and second place Seaholm. They open at home against DeLaSalle and East De-

troit on Dec. 20. Following are South's varsity swimmers and their events:

Senior Sean Hoye will swim the freestyle and fly events; David Bailey returns in the freestyle. Rick Soltis will compete in the 50 and 100 free and Ryan Hoch, in the breaststroke, individual medley and 500 free. Scott Frame swims the freestyle and the breaststroke, and Clarke competes in the fly, the 500 and the individual medley.

Swimming the 50, 100 and 200 freestyle events for Michalik's team is Jeffrey Centner. Jeff Clark is a freestyler and Geoff Brieden will swim the breaststroke and freestyle, as will All-State hopeful Leonard. Craig Bagno competes in the backstroke. Don McKnight and Bob Owens are freestylers. Jeff McKean and Chris Van Antwerp are breaststrokers, and Smith swims the fly and freestyle events. Tom Champion will compete in the freestyle and breaststroke and Bill Thompson, in the back and free.

## Party wines extend cheer for many holiday occasions

Wines are fast gaining as the drink of choice on many holiday occasions. Served in the more moderate portions now growing in popularity, imported table wines are often "lighter" and more economical, and their wide variety appeals to a broad range of tastes.

### Recipe ideas

Holiday get-togethers often take place around a punch bowl. Here are two punch recipes featuring wine which are sure to please a crowd:

### HOLIDAY WINE PUNCH

In a large pot, combine two 1.5-liter bottles of René Junot red wine, 8 ounces freshly squeezed orange juice, 8 ounces lemon juice, 8 ounces pineapple juice, four sliced oranges and ½-cup powdered sugar. Simmer ingredients for 1½ hours.

Let cool and transfer to a large serving bowl. Add ice cubes and one bottle of sparkling water. Garnish with cherries or lemon wheels.

Makes 24-32 servings.

### ORANGE WINE

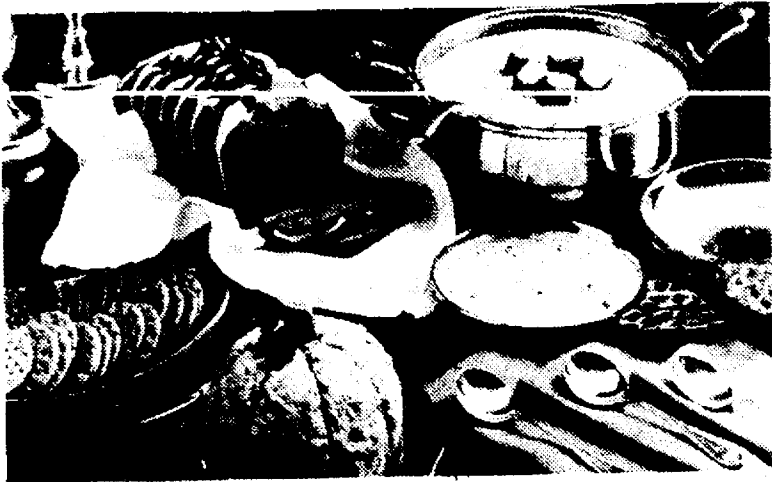
Delicious with holiday cookies or as a dessert punch, this zesty recipe should be prepared two weeks before serving.

**CAROL'S CRANBERRY NUT BREAD**

- 3 1/2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons grated orange peel
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened
- 2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 can (16 oz.) LIBBY'S Solid Pack Pumpkin
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 cup chopped cranberries

Preheat oven to 350°F. Combine dry ingredients; set aside. Cream butter and sugar.

- 2 cups sliced mushrooms
- 1/2 cup rice, uncooked
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon tarragon
- 1 can (16 oz.) LIBBY'S Solid Pack Pumpkin
- 2 cups half and half
- 1/4 cup dry sherry

In medium saucepan, sauté onion and celery in butter. Add broth, mushrooms, rice and seasonings.

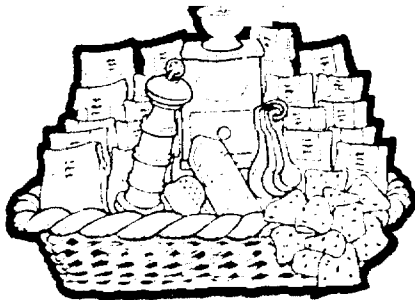

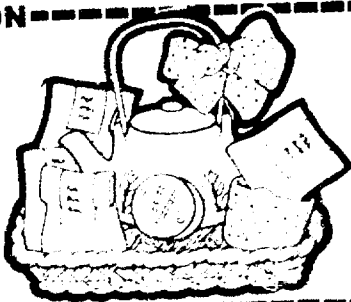

## Quick and easy ideas for parties include stirring up a dip for hungry holiday drop-ins

- 1 tablespoon flour
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups Ocean Spray CRANAPPLE cranberry apple drink
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

6 cups assorted seasoned fruits, cut in wedges

In a saucepan, combine sugar, flour, cornstarch, and salt. Gradually stir in cranberry apple drink and lemon juice. Add lemon rind and stir over medium heat until sauce bubbles and thickens.

Serve warm or cold with fruits for dipping.

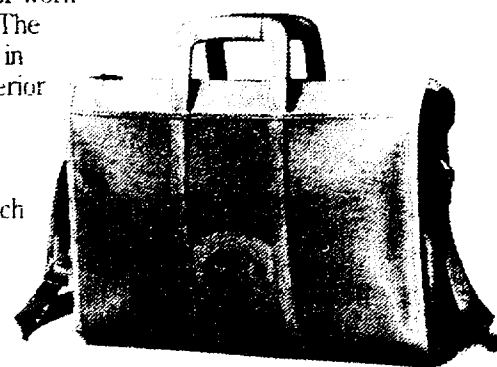
