of fake vaccine offers

THE GROSSE POINTES In today's rapidly evolving technology world, with every new situation come creative new scams. Nearly every week without fail there is at least one Grosse Pointer who files a police report as the victim of

unemployment fraud. The Federal Bureau of Investigation, Food and Drug Administration and Federal Trade Commission now are warning the COVID-19 vaccination process is at risk of exploitation, as reports of scammers attempting to steal personal information or asking for a fee through fake vaccine offers slowly are beginning to

With only four reports of scams offering the vaccine for a fee in Michigan as of last week, according to Michigan Attorney General's office, the focus currently is on proactive education to prevent a widespread issue.

"People should be extremely vigilant and wary of vaccination offers that don't come from trusted sources like their doctor, healthcare provider or local health department," said Bob Riney, president of healthcare operations and chief operating officer of Henry Ford Health
