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BoE elects new officers, changes meeting dates

THE GROSSE POINTES — A new slate of officers was elected and the meeting schedule was changed at the Grosse Pointe Public School System Board of Education's organizational meeting Tuesday, Jan. 7.

Colleen Worden, who was elected to a second four-year term last November, will serve as president for 2025. In addition to herself, trustees Valarie St. John, Laura Hull, Tim Klepp and Clint Derringer voted for her.

Trustees Sean Cotton and Ginny Jeup voted no. "You've been very combative over the last two years and you are not the candidate who

will pull us together," Jeup said. "You don't bring any peace to this board or anything of sustained value."

The board voted 7-0 to appoint Hull, a teacher in Lakeview Public Schools, vice president.

"I love that she brings the experience of being a teacher to the board," Worden said in nominating Hull. "She's organized, smart and measured."

Klepp also received a unanimous vote in being named treasurer.

"He asks the right questions at the right time and with the right demeanor," Derringer said in nominating him.

St. John was appointed secretary on a 6-1 vote with Cotton, owner of the

Grosse Pointe Woods resident Sarah Yelencich is a lifelong, diehard Detroit Lions fan. She inherited her love of the Lions from her mother, Christine Lorenc, also a lifelong fan. She said passersby often slow down for a look or ask if they can take photos with the lion, to which the Yelencichs happily say yes.

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Gazebo worse than thought

GROSSE POINTE PARK — Trimming a thick mat of vigorous vines covering the gazebo at Patterson Park revealed the structure to be in worse shape than initially thought.

The discovery expanded the trimming project into cutting down the vines, a type of wisteria, to stumps.

"The vine retained moisture that accelerated deterioration of the wood roof," said Brian Colter, city forester for the Park, City and Farms. "Major action had to be taken. That was going to collapse."

Wisteria is a fast

Harper Woods cuts ties with GPAAS

HARPER WOODS — In an unexpected move, Harper Woods reportedly will not be moving forward with its partnership with the Grosse Pointe

Animal Adoption Society — the very city in which the nonprofit is headquartered.

The fallout comes as a result of GPAAS establishing its Barbara N. Weiss Animal Protection Facility late last year,

intending to continue its service to the five Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods. It at the same time requested of the cities an annual usage fee — based upon each city's history of use — to sustain its services as its pro-

jected overhead budget for the year is \$130,000, not including food, supplies, veterinary care and medications.

Each of the Pointes have approved the usage

License plate readers a go for the Pointes

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — As the final Pointe to do so, the City officially entered into an agreement with the Grosse Pointe Public Safety Foundation Monday night, allowing it to accept the donation of five license plate readers to be placed at strategic intersections.

The technology — in combination with the additional five LPRs being supplied to each of the other Pointes and Harper Woods — will aid law enforcement in locating suspects, as well as missing persons.

"The system is a nationwide system and we're buying into that system with this agreement," City Manager Joe Valentine said. "So if someone committed a crime in Grosse Pointe and they were in the system and they were caught in Ohio and it triggered there, then it would report that back."

The initial cost of the cameras and first year of service by supplier Motorola — \$56,590 — will be covered by the foundation.

Moving forward, the City will bear approximately \$8,000 of

annual service and maintenance costs for the equipment.

"I think this is awesome," Councilman Chris Walsh said, before making the motion to approve the agreement, which passed unanimously.

The foundation's total donation to the six cities for implementation of the LPR system totals approximately \$450,000.

Grosse Pointe News owner Sean Cotton is a member of the foundation.

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Woods approves field upgrades ahead of LL state tournament

GROSSE POINTE WOODS — City council at its meeting Monday, Jan. 6, approved spending almost \$200,000 on upgrades to the baseball diamonds at Ghesquiere Park as the Grosse Pointe Woods-Shores Little League will host the state tournament there in July.

Representatives from the group approached council last year about making the improvements, but the city decided to fast-track the project after the Woods-Shores Little League was named host in November.

“We originally had planned on phasing this in over two years, but felt it was necessary to push it up,” said Jim Kowalski, director of public works. “Our goal is to have everything done by the beginning of May.”

Little League typically kicks off each season with a parade and first games in late April or early May.

Derek Augustyn, president of GPWS Little League, said the group is appreciative of the city’s

efforts.

“They’re doing a lot more than what we thought was possible,” he said. “We’re excited about hosting. It’s been

18 years since we last hosted the state tournament.”

The bulk of the money, just over \$99,000, will be spent on new fencing.

All four diamonds will receive between 200 and 250 feet of black, vinyl-coated chainlink fencing at 4 feet high along the first and third base lines.

Diamond Nos. 1, 3 and 4 also will get between 300 and 360 feet of the same type of fencing at 6 feet high around the outfield.

Diamond Nos. 2 and 3 will get fencing at 8 feet high in front of the dugouts.

“We’re going to start on some of this during the winter, weather permitting,” Kowalski said. “We can’t interfere with their regular season.”

Other upgrades include:

- ◆ \$34,632 for six new bleachers,
- ◆ \$30,618 for concrete pads for bleachers and dugouts,
- ◆ \$21,450 for material for new bleachers and dugouts,
- ◆ \$8,750 for paint for backstops and
- ◆ \$5,000 for netting to protect spectators from foul balls.

Another \$13,450 will be spent on upgrades to the senior diamond, which used to be called the Babe Ruth diamond, that Kowalski said the Grosse Pointe North High School freshman baseball team uses.

“We’ll tear out the old fencing and build the bleachers and dugouts, so there’s some savings there,” Kowalski said. “Companies will install the new fencing and concrete pads.”

Kowalski said the new equipment should last at least 25 years.

The Woods-Shores Little League recently spent about \$150,000 to improve drainage on the diamonds and new sod for the infields.

Woods embezzlement case nearly settled

GROSSE POINTE WOODS — Most charges against a Grosse Pointe Woods man regarding embezzlement could be dropped if the Wayne County Circuit Court ac-

cepts his plea deal.

Ishpinder Sahni, 31, was charged with three counts of embezzlement over \$100,000; three counts of using a computer to commit a crime;

and three counts of failure to file taxes. The first six charges are all punishable by up to 20 years in prison, with the last three punishable by up to five years in prison.

Sahni worked as chief operating officer at Woods Wholesale Wine from 2021 to 2023, and allegedly embezzled more than \$350,000.

During what was to be

a probable cause hearing before Municipal Judge Theodore Metry Wednesday, Jan. 8, Assistant Attorney General Dan Grano said the state is willing to grant Sahni a conditional waiver if he agrees to plead guilty to one count

of embezzlement over \$100,000.

In exchange, sentencing will be delayed 12 months. During that time, Sahni must make restitution of \$300,000 to Woods Wholesale Wine.

grower, up to 10 feet per year, to the extent of being invasive, according to almost every thorough source on the subject.

“It should be trimmed at least every two years,” Colter said.

“While the trimming was taking place, the contractors noticed that a significant amount of

the wood in the roof needed to be replaced,” said Chad Craig, director of parks and recreation, in an email Monday, Jan. 13. “The wisteria had to be removed from the roof as you wouldn’t be able to make any repairs or replace any lumber if it was still covering the structure.”

He’s seeking cost estimates for repairs.

“The base of the wisteria was left and will

grow back over time,” Craig said.

“But, it had to be removed to make major repairs because it retains moisture and fibrous roots from the vine deteriorated the wood,” Colter said.

Removal of the vine added to a bucket list of gazebo fix-its for which members of the recreation commission have been pining.

Commissioners continue to find themselves administering the municipal department for which they are supposed to act as advisors.

Among their top concerns is moving forward with repairs to the gazebo.

The gazebo was on a list of projects to be considered or completed during 2025 that Craig prepared at commissioners’ request for discus-

sion during their Dec. 12 meeting, the final one of 2024.

“This is intended to be a big-picture list of projects you and your team are working on,” Chairman Mike Hindelang told Craig, recapping the assignment. “This isn’t a specific punch list of 2025 items, but rather a list of things to be in your sights.”

Items ranged from ongoing concerns about the heating and cooling units atop the Lavins Activity Center at Windmill Pointe Park, plus ongoing discussions about installing gutters at the center.

Matters consisted of continued consideration to remodel the Windmill concession stand, upgrade restrooms and replace the children’s pool fountain with some other type of water feature.

Many of the items have been discussed during commission meetings for at least a year, such as the public’s desire for more pickleball courts.

Commissioner Mike Bannon was concerned

about a seeming lack of progress on the gazebo. Pewabic tiles have fallen off parts of the structure. Concrete steps are chipped and cracked. The roof was overgrown with wisteria.

“There might be an opportunity to do volunteer work to keep the cost down,” Bannon told Craig during the meeting.

“It’s a matter of just pulling off old tiles and saving labor,” Commissioner Howard Bouton said.

“I’ve started gazebo conversations,” Craig said.

He talked about receiving leads on three tile installation companies recommended by Pewabic Pottery, maker of the tiles.

“Chad, is this a plan you hope to have for us (at our next meeting) in February?” Hindelang said.

“I would like to have that to you,” Craig said. “I’ve reached out to two or three of the companies that I’m hoping will be interested in doing that work.”

Although the cost of

replacement tiles is around \$1,500, he said one of the installation contractors is busy the next two to three months; the other two haven’t responded.

He had no cost estimates for labor.

“I encourage Chad to put some energy behind this,” said Councilman Tom Caulfield, liaison to the commission. “The funds are there. The vision is there. If we got our ducks in a row and pushed a little harder, it could be done quickly. Let’s get it done.”

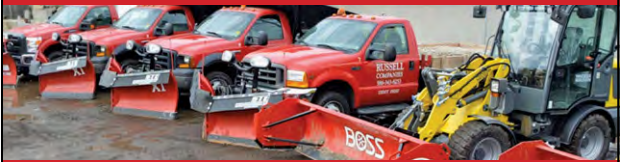
Bouton suggested Craig shift some of the work to one of the commission’s subcommittees.

“We’re happy to help,” Bouton said.

Caulfield also asked Craig to reformat the projects list into a spreadsheet. Doing so will allow easier monitoring of progress and associated costs.

“I am scheduled to meet with a concrete company today regarding the steps around the perimeter of the structure today,” Craig wrote in his email this week.

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Attorney bestowed with knighthood

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — “I remember when my dad was awarded the same medal when I was a kid,” said James Bellanca III, after he was bestowed with knighthood by the Consulate of Italy in Detroit in November.

The family legacy started three generations back when, in 1947, the Bellancas began representing the Detroit arm of the Italian consulate from Grosse Pointe.

In the decades since, Bellanca’s grandfather, father and two uncles each were knighted for their roles serving as trusted advisors and providing essential legal services to the consulate.

“I arrived in September of 2021, and (Bellanca and his father) were the second and third person I met in Michigan after the first person being my staff member who came to pick me up,” said Allegra Baistrocchi, consul of Italy in Detroit — though she covers Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky and Tennessee.

She presented Bellanca the title of Cavaliere dell’Ordine

della Stella d’Italia (Knight of the Order of the Star of Italy), which is awarded and personally signed by President of the Italian Republic Sergio Mattarella — “One of the highest recognitions that the president of the Republic of Italy can

grant to not only Italian citizens,” Baistrocchi said, “but also people that have done great services to the nation,” — in a surprise ceremony during a holiday dinner party filled with close friends and family.

“It was really one of

the greatest honors I’ve ever had and it made it more special that I followed in the footsteps of the people who I admired most,” Bellanca said. “We’ve always been very proud of our Italian heritage. My grandparents came here from Italy ... and when they came here, really they had nothing and

they worked hard and surrounded themselves with their family and their friends and became involved in the community here to embrace the American dream and worked hard to get an education.

“So to be able to be a lawyer and work for the consulate now gives me that great balance

where I’m able to continue the American dream, but also recognize our love for where we come from.”

Though Bellanca — a local attorney specializing in corporate and real estate law and the father of five girls — stepped into the role as Lawyer of Reference for the consulate just a few years back, he’s served as an advocate for the Italian community more than two decades.

In addition to countless hours of pro bono legal assistance to Italian citizens and Italian-American organizations, he has served on the board of directors for the N.O.I. Foundation, the educational nonprofit of the consulate, and the Italian American Cultural Society (IACS), which promotes Italian language, culture and heritage.

“He’s done so much for our community,” Baistrocchi said. “I can’t even express the value that he has and that he transmits and the things that he’s done for the community. ... He’s helped thousands of Italians that had legal questions and is just a wonderful, wonderful man. I was so happy that we were able to bestow this to him.”

Brainstorming Charlevoix

GROSSE POINTE PARK — The first of three community engagement sessions about renovating the Charlevoix commercial streetscape concluded last week with consensus the district is ripe for renewal.

“A lot of folks were excited to see the city focus on Charlevoix,” City Manager Nick Sizeland said. “They felt that for years everyone only cared about Kercheval and Mack Avenue and it was nice to see effort put into Charlevoix.”

The Tax Increment Finance Authority is spearheading Charlevoix renovation. Construction is expected to start during summer 2026.

Public brainstorming sessions and design concepts date to at least August 2023.

Residents at that time endorsed a curbless, festive streetscape design, increased space for sidewalk dining, trees and landscaping, safer crosswalks, pocket parks, public art, bicycle lanes and

street furnishings.

Not much has changed in terms of overall ideas.

The idea of prioritizing the district “for people” mirrors in many ways what was done successfully 10 years ago in The Village downtown of the City of Grosse Pointe.

Wider sidewalks encourage increased pedestrian activity. Narrowing the roadway calms vehicular traffic. Benches, shaded areas, environmentally friendly runoff-capturing bioswales and water features provide a forward-thinking environment many residents and business owners value as conducive to modern lifestyles and community standards.

Around two dozen people attended the engagement session Wednesday evening, Jan. 8, at city hall.

Follow-up meetings are scheduled with dates to be determined in March and June. Then there are meetings of the TIFA board six times per year starting this year Jan. 15, after this week’s Grosse Pointe News deadline.

Also scheduled are regular meetings in March, June, September and November.

Charlevoix’s \$4 million streetscape re-do is taking precedence over TIFA’s similar plan for the Kercheval business district, which already has received a lot of attention.

Both zones are in the TIFA district — bordered by the city limits to the north and west, the northern boundary of the Grosse Pointe Park Downtown Development Authority near East Jefferson to the south and, to the east, the alley between Beaconsfield and Nottingham — from which property tax revenue is retained for improvements and commercial development.

Grants are funding about half the cost of the Charlevoix portion.

Board members put Charlevoix ahead of Kercheval due to the former being most in need of improvement.

“It’s going to be a shot in the arm for Charlevoix walkability and the entire neighborhood,” said Jim

Robson, a TIFA board member, last November.

“The overall consensus of people at the meeting (Jan. 9) was that they were appreciative and very happy to see something being done,” Sizeland said. “They are looking forward to the next steps.”

Representatives of the city’s engineering consultants, OHM Advisors, highlighted the overall idea of what a new Charlevoix streetscape could look like.

Wider sidewalks and a narrower, curbless roadway are intended to make the district attractive to and safer for pedestrians.

“There is truth that narrowing the road gives drivers a sense of presence that slows them down,” Sizeland said. “People appreciated knowing that, from a traffic safety standpoint.”

So-called road diets can produce the following safety benefits, according to “Traffic calming to slow vehicle speeds,” at the U.S. Department of

Grano said if that occurs, Sahni would be charged with attempted embezzlement of between \$20,000 and \$50,000. That is a felony punishable by up to 10 years in prison and/or a fine of up to \$15,000.

As part of his plea, Sahni also agreed to drop a civil suit he filed last March against Woods Wholesale Wine and its owner, William Matouk.

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Pointer continues family legacy of invention and innovation

While living in Los Angeles as a newlywed in 1986, Jana Kirlin Brownell got a harrowing call from her mother. Her father, third-generation CEO of Kirlin Lighting, was diagnosed with an inoperable brain tumor and they didn't know how long he had left.

"I said to my husband, 'I have to go back. I cannot let this company die on the vine out of respect for my dad,'" Brownell recalled. "I said, 'You know, it's risky. It's a small family business, but I'd like to give it a go.'"

She resigned from her job and aspirations to create a global women's healthcare delivery system, made plans to return to Grosse Pointe Farms and, three weeks later, received word of an inaccurate diagnosis — her father, in fact, had non-life-threatening Bell's Palsy, causing temporary paralysis of the face.

Still, a new path in life already had been set in motion and raising a family in Grosse Pointe was a far more appealing prospect than in LA with Hollywood's influence.

Brownell returned to work alongside her father for seven years and, in 1997, was named president and CEO of the family business headquartered on Jefferson Avenue, which this year turns 130 years old.

Kirlin Lighting, a designer and manufacturer of sophisticated lighting, was founded in St. Paul, Minn., by Brownell's great-grandfather, Otis Kirlin, in 1895 — a time when there were no utilities, power distribution didn't exist and the average American was still quite wary of the Thomas Edison lightbulb.

"The incandescent lightbulb was clear and the filament glowed like an ember glows," Brownell explained. "And it scared them because it was glowing the color of fire. Look at what's happening in LA now, but the biggest threat to anyone's livelihood back in the late 1800s was fire. It would wipe out your farm, wipe out your business, etc."

Otis Kirlin and his business partner, known to

history as Mr. Gray, initially were in the business of building power plants via hammers, nails and wood — trying to create distribution of electricity — when the Kirlin patriarch had the idea to beautify the lightbulb socket to create demand for electricity.

He started Kirlin Lighting and imported from France porcelain sockets, which weren't combustible like wood, were pastel-colored for aesthetics and were shaped like flower petals to help obscure the filament.

Throughout the rest of Otis Kirlin's stewardship, he conceptually moved the company into handcrafted artistic chandelier design and physically moved it to Detroit — the Silicon Valley of the era — in 1919, before his son, Ivan Kirlin took the reins.

Taking a page out of his friend Henry Ford's book, Brownell's grandfather revolutionized the company to highly-tooled, high-volume lighting fixture production — specifically, recessed lighting, which Ivan Kirlin invented and patented in 1941.

By moving the company from chandeliers to tucked-away lighting, "it illuminated what he said the focus should be," Brownell said, "and that would be your art, your furniture, your conversation. The focus shouldn't be looking up at a light."

During World War II, Kirlin Lighting was redirected by the U.S. government to pause lighting production and instead support the war effort by producing gears for the Rolls-Royce engine used in the P-51 Mustang fighter planes.

Among John Kirlin's innovations upon assuming leadership in the '60s, Brownell's father steered the business toward specialty areas such as healthcare — designing the first motorized, recessed patient exam light — and maximum security prisons.

Because inmates were known to hide shivs in the flange of light fixtures, he designed a fixture that appeared as though the flange was wide, but once an item was slid in, it would fall into a shiv trap.

"That was my dad," Brownell said, "It's like, how could he think like a criminal? Well, you do say put yourself in the customer's shoes, right?"

Hitting the ground running by graduating Harvard Business School in '83 at a time when only 17 percent of the class were women, Brownell's tenure of the family business — of which she was named chairman in 2023 — has been no less impressive than the legacy that came before her.

In November, she was named the 2024 inductee into the Michigan Lighting Hall of Fame.

"My grandfather, who patented recessed lighting, was inducted posthumously a few years back and I accepted the award on his behalf," she noted. "It was very, very moving."

Keen on developing the medical aspect of Kirlin Lighting, Brownell made it a personal goal to find what seemed like an impossible solution for birthing suites needing a greater angle of illumination to illuminate the birth canal.

Because recessed lighting is the industry standard in healthcare — keeping light fixtures out of the patient space is important for safety and cleanliness with dust collection, etc. — geometry and the ceiling tile prevents the angle of lighting from being anything more than 35 or 45 degrees. Doctors desired a 60-degree angle to best see within the body via the birth canal.

"I happened to be in Las Vegas at the OBGYN National Conference and I took some doctors out for a show," Brownell said. "I'm watching the show and I'm noticing the lighting and I'm thinking, how are they getting the light that's illuminating so low over there, up high over here? So I look around and I'm looking up at the lights and I see mirrors."

The figurative lightbulb went off and Brownell realized the light could be reflected off a mirror built into the recessed fix-

ture to get a 60-degree angle.

Thus was invented the INFRALED PRO 60 — part of the INFRALED PRO series, which in 2023 was recognized as "The Coolest Thing Made in Michigan."

"Having almost that childlike curiosity about things helps you to always find ways to improve," Brownell said.

Her son, Chris, was named CEO of Kirlin

Lighting last year, as the family business continues into its fifth generation. Her daughter, Lindsay, is a science writer with Wyss Institute at Harvard University.

"Christopher and his wife, Gloria, just had a second son they welcomed into the world on New Year's Eve," Brownell proudly added.

When Brownell isn't busy inventing, she's served on the boards of the Rivertown Business Association and Downtown Detroit Partnership; currently is on the board at The Helm at Boll Life Center in Grosse Pointe Farms; and, most recently, joined the Belle Isle Conservancy board.

Passionate about the earth and its environment, she's also co-chair of horticulture in the Garden Club of Michigan and enjoys beekeeping with hives in her sideyard.

"You never know exactly what your path will become," Brownell said. "I certainly had no idea what would happen, but I knew that I wanted to come back and try."

"That was the start and then it's an evolution. Everybody's path in life — just like every human being is unique — is a unique path and there's no bad route. So I just feel extremely fortunate that I've had the experiences that I've had and worked with the most amazing people and met the most amazing new friends."

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More water mains on tap in Park

GROSSE POINTE PARK — Expansion of a water main on upper Beaconsfield last year boosted water pressure beyond the work zone's boundaries, inspiring optimism for more of the same when larger pipes are in-

stalled this year in other parts of town.

Projects lined up this year include replacing a water main on a section of lower Beaconsfield, the middle section of Mack Avenue and the area of Patterson Park.

Citywide water and sewer system work is becoming routine due to

residents' passage of a 10-year infrastructure millage in 2023.

Work on Beaconsfield last year took place on a two-block stretch between Vernor and Mack. Improvements consisted of replacing a corroded, 6-inch cast iron pipe with

Transportation website, transportation.gov:

- ◆ decreased number of vehicle lanes pedestrians must cross,
- ◆ greater compliance with speed limits and

- ◆ reduced rear-end and sideswipe car crashes.

"Road diets are a useful tool in the traffic engineer's arsenal of making streets a more integral part of the community," according to a 2012 study by the Michigan State University Department of Civil and Environmental

Engineering titled, "Safety and Operational Analysis of 4-lane to 3-lane Conversions in Michigan." "They open traditional roads to greater use by pedestrians and, especially, bicyclists. In general, safety benefits can be expected but vary from site to site."

fee contract, but Harper Woods City Council was less than enthused when presented last Monday with an annual cost of \$79,300, being that its usage makes up 61 percent of the animals brought to the organization.

Council officially tabled the matter for its next meeting; however, GPAAS Executive Director Corinne Martin reported she received correspondence from Harper Woods interim City Manager John Szymanski Tuesday, Jan. 7, stating the city had decided not to pursue the contract.

“We calculated the amounts that we asked each municipality to pay based on the usage and Harper Woods — who is our biggest user and uses as much as all the Pointes put together — they felt it was unfair,” Martin said. “They felt that our methodology for calculating the cost was unfair to the city of Harper Woods, that it was done to make them pay more.”

Grosse Pointe Park, the second highest GPAAS user at 13 percent, agreed in December to a \$16,900 annual fee. The Woods, at 12 per-

cent, will pay \$15,600; the Farms, at 10 percent, \$13,000; the City, at 4 percent, \$5,200; and the Shores, at 1 percent, \$1,300.

In the first 10 months of 2024, GPAAS took in four animals from the Shores, 12 from the City, 25 from the Farms, 32 from the Woods, 34 from the Park and 165 from Harper Woods.

Unexpectedly losing the partnership with Harper Woods, Martin said, “really doesn’t mean anything for us, because we will continue to do what we arranged this facility for. We will continue to care for all of the strays and animals that come in from the Grosse Pointes. It’s just we won’t be serving the city of Harper Woods.”

There also is no concern regarding funding the new building despite losing the anticipated income from Harper Woods, she added.

“Although we’re going to have less money coming in from the municipalities, we also are cutting our number of animals that will come in,” she said.

Since 2012, GPAAS has served as the animal shelter for Harper Woods at no charge except for minimal boarding costs.

The memorandum to city council regarding the

proposed contract noted there are no similar services available in the area and painted a bleak picture for animal control in the city moving forward.

“Without this service (through GPAAS),” the memorandum reads, “our police officers would be forced to expire the stray animals by gunfire when responding to a call for vicious animals.

“As some on the city council can remember, back in the 1990s, our police officers were forced to expire a vicious dog on Beaconsfield that was biting kids who were walking home from school. The scene was horrific and caused quite a trauma for the school children walking home at 4 p.m. in the afternoon.”

An additional consequence of the broken partnership may be Harper Wood’s K-9 program, which GPAAS was responsible for establishing in 2016. The nonprofit since has raised funds to continue the program at no cost to the city.

“By terminating our agreement, that also puts them in a position of no longer having GPAAS raising funds for their K-9 program,” Martin noted, “which is, again, shocking.”

Szymanski did not respond to multiple interview requests.

Pointer-produced movie up for awards

THE GROSSE POINTES — A film produced by Sean Cotton, who owns the Grosse Pointe News, has been nominated for six NAACP Image Awards.

“Exhibiting Forgiveness” stars André Holland as Tarrell Rodin, an accomplished painter haunted by childhood trauma, whose life is upended by an unexpected reunion with his estranged father, a recovering addict seeking redemption.

The movie is a semi-autobiographical look at the life of Titus Kaphar, a renowned artist born in 1976 in Kalamazoo who wrote and directed. It also includes Kaphar’s artwork, which has been featured on the cover of TIME magazine and has appeared at the Detroit Institute of Arts and the

Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Holland has been nominated for Outstanding Actor in a Motion Picture. Other nominations include:

- ◆ Aunjanue Ellis-Taylor, Outstanding Supporting Actress in a Motion Picture,
- ◆ Outstanding Independent Motion Picture,
- ◆ Kaphar, Outstanding Breakthrough Creative in a Motion Picture,
- ◆ Lachlan Milne, Outstanding Cinematography in a Motion Picture and
- ◆ Kaphar, Outstanding Writing in a Motion Picture.

The movie has a 95 percent rating among film critics on Rotten Tomatoes. Kaphar won the Directors to Watch

category at both the Nashville and Palm Springs film festivals and the movie was named among the top 10 in the Best Picture category by the African-American Film Critics Association.

“The nominations are a testament to the profound message of the movie and the extraordinary vision of Titus Kaphar,” Cotton said. “His ability to intertwine the complexities of art, humanity and the journey toward forgiveness has created something truly transformative. I am honored to have played a part in bringing this deeply moving and essential story to life.”

In a post on Instagram, Kaphar said he was excited by the nominations.

“I just want to say thank you to the NAACP and

everyone who voted on this,” he said. “We appreciate you so much.”

Readers may recognize Kaphar’s name from last spring when one of his paintings — owned by Cotton — was showcased at Grosse Pointe North High School. It was removed after several complaints were lodged, but Kaphar came from his home in Connecticut to speak with students at North.

“Teachers told me it was one of the best presenta-

tions they’d ever heard,” Cotton said. “The students just kept asking him question after question.”

Cotton and Kaphar got to know each other after being introduced by a

mutual friend. Cotton eventually visited the incubator Kaphar runs, called NXTHVN, in New Haven, Conn.

recognizing.

Two of them came from Mr. Derringer. The first was when he inquired about the \$1 million surplus the district realized at the end of the 2023-24 fiscal year. He recognized the board’s effort in putting that budget together and asked to receive specific information about the process.

He also made it very clear he would recuse himself from any discussion or votes regarding additional pay for special education

teachers, as it would impact his wife’s salary.

Another bright spot was comments by Deputy Superintendent Roy Bishop, who noted the upcoming Martin Luther King Jr. Day and the civil rights leader’s visit to the Pointes just weeks before his assassination in 1968. Dr. Bishop said the day is “an opportunity to reflect on how to be more like Dr. King” and “what we can do as individuals to be more human.”

Overall, the meeting was concerning, but we hope the new board can focus on transparency, value the expertise of its administrators and do what is best for students.

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Roadwork plans line up in the Park

GROSSE POINTE PARK — A road resurfacing project scheduled this year is so big it’s being chopped into bite-sized pieces.

When the dust settles and blacktop dries, Charlevoix from Beaconsfield to Bedford will be the smoothest cruise in town.

Although the work zone is just over a half-mile long, it includes seven cross-street intersections.

“We have to break it into three sections because it’s just too long, but we need to get Charlevoix done,” said Tom Jenny, head of public works.

Work on Charlevoix stops at the border of the area’s commercial district, which is due for \$4 million worth of comprehensive streetscape improvements starting 2026.

Other roadwork planned tentatively for 2025 consists of spot-resurfacing locations torn up to repair broken water mains.

“One is on Trombley,” Jenny said. Another is on the upper part of Bedford.

“It’s really bad,” Jenny said. “Someone always calls about it.”

Two parking lots are due to resurfacing:

- ◆ in the business district south of Kercheval between Lakepointe and Beaconsfield, the location of the summertime farmers’ market; and
- ◆ the overflow lot at Windmill Pointe Park, used currently to store heavy-duty city vehicles and public works supplies and debris, such as topsoil and tree trimmings.

Using the lot for industrial vehicles and related operations increased wear and tear.

“It’s in horrible shape,” Jenny said.

“He brings in recent art school grads for a year and pays them while they work on their craft,” he said. “But he also teaches them the business side of art, which colleges don’t teach, how to deal with contracts and agents and such. I went out there to meet him and we became good friends.”

Cotton offered to produce the movie after Kaphar expressed frustration over the project in fall 2022.

“The problem, especially with first-time movie-makers, is that in order to get financing they want you to change the script or only cast certain actors,” he said. “We were able to push away all that pressure and completely preserve his vision.”

Filming was completed by July 2023 and it premiered at the Sundance Film Festival last February, where it received a standing ovation and was nominated for a grand jury prize.

New City ordinance will uniformly govern commissions

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — As it continues shoring up its code of ordinances, in December, administrators in the City of Grosse Pointe presented council with the creation of a new ordinance to uniformly govern its commissions.

The Commissions Ordinance, which passed unanimously and without much discussion, states each commission now will have seven members, who will serve three-year terms and can be reappointed indefinitely by council, if desired. A staff liaison also will be assigned to the commissions to aid in their efforts and each will be required to make an annual report to city

council on its activities.

“The attempt is to provide an ordinance that would standardize and uniform those commissions, so that it’s clear what their scope is, their membership is, outlining how they function in one simple area,” City Manager Joe Valentine said.

The city currently has three commissions in operation — the parks and harbor commission; the beautification commission, which was created by resolution in 1990 and later reestablished in 2003; and the urban forestry commission, which was established by resolution in 2016.

Prior to the new ordinance, the beautification commission could have a maximum of 12 citizen members — in addition to city council members and administrative staff — for two-year terms and the urban forestry commission was resolved to have five members serving indefinite terms.

Lawn extension, special events ordinances amended

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — In the interest of collaborating with its residents on beautification efforts and ease of infrastructure maintenance, city council amended the City’s lawn extension ordinance, which governs use of the city-owned property in front yards between the sidewalk and street.

“Effectively, we’ve had ... some standing practices that weren’t codified in there and need to be codified,” City Manager Joe Valentine said. “So we’ve basically taken our practices and put them in ordinance form, so we have something in writing to justify the practices we’ve been doing.”

“The attempt is trying to clarify these practices and trying to balance the intention of having members in the community enhance this public space that’s in front of their homes that obviously makes their property look better, while managing the city’s right to maintain that property, which is where a lot of our infrastructure is located.”

To date, the lawn extension ordinance touched only upon the allowance and protection for homeowners to plant flowers, trees and shrubbery on the public easement.

Several subsections added address the city’s responsibility and intent to replace landscaping should it be removed as part of a public improvement or repair; allow for installation of a concrete, brick or otherwise solid material walkway from the sidewalk to the street, after obtaining a right-of-way permit from the building department; and replace said walkways, in concrete only, should they be removed as part of road reconstruction or other public improvements.

In cases where homeowners have and wish to keep an enhanced walkway with materials more involved than concrete — such as bluestone, exposed aggregate or brick — the City will pay the homeowner the cost of what it would have spent on concrete replacement, to invest toward hiring a contractor for the specialty work of the decorative enhancement.

“I think this is a fair compromise,” Valentine said. “The cost that we would have already spent to do concrete, we provide as a credit for that further enhancement, which is going to be more than what we would have done.”

An additional amendment will require property owners to obtain a right-of-way permit from the building department before installing underground irrigation systems in the public easement.

“We don’t really know who has those until you go out to the site,” Valentine said, “so having records on these properties of what’s in the public right-of-way is certainly advantageous for us, as well as other utilities that might come in that space

and may cause damage that we could help avoid if we know that there’s amenities already in there.”

Though existing amenities will be grandfathered in, the ordinance amendments also are intended to address recently surfaced issues.

“I know one of the things that this will eliminate is situations where people have been putting things tall and high on the (public right-of-way) areas, so that people can’t open their car doors when they’re parked in front,” Mayor Shelia Tomkowiak noted. “I think it’s been happening in a couple of spots.”

Council passed the lawn extension ordinance amendments 6-0, with Councilman Seth Krupp absent, Monday, Nov. 18.

Special events

City administration also found it a fitting time to clarify expectations for event planning on public property and enhance the process for applications via amendments to its special events ordinance.

Though a provision already is in place requiring applications be submitted to the city manager’s office no later than 75 days prior to the date of the event, Valentine said there has been a lack of enforcement and last-minute applications come up “quite frequently.”

Administration still may waive the 75-day rule at its discretion, but looks to begin requiring it in most cases to allow sufficient time for review by the special event review committee.

“The 75-day rule is what’s on the books,” Valentine told council. “We just haven’t utilized it.”

“... For events that are coming in new or seeing modifications to those

events, it would be nice to have the additional time to actually review them,” he added, “because there may be a back and forth for sharing information and questions and having adequate time to do that before we have to present it to council allows us to do our due diligence.”

Newly added to the ordinance are clarifications that applications are for events on public property and must be complete to be accepted, as well as a provision giving city administration the ability to make any modifications the day of the event in the interest of public health, safety and welfare.

“Sometimes you see it on paper and it doesn’t register the same way when you see it in person,” Valentine said, “and we just want that ability to make those modifications as deemed appropriate.”

Also new is a provision

a smooth, 8-inch pipe made of plastic composite. Plastic doesn’t corrode.

The larger pipe handles up to 1,600 gallons per minute compared with 1,200 gallons per minute in the old pipe.

Water flowing through the old pipe was restricted due to decades of corrosion, called tuberculation, evidenced by buildup inside the pipe of small mounds of iron oxide. It is common for tuberculation in decades-old pipe to hinder flow by half to customers and fire hydrants.

“Just by adding Beaconsfield, it improved the system, which was great to see,” said Nick Sizeland, city manager.

“For this year, we’re looking for water mains on Beaconsfield from Jefferson to Essex,” said Tom Jenny, head of public works. “We’re also look-

ing at doing Mack Avenue from Berkshire to Buckingham and Three Mile Drive to Audubon to give us more loops on Mack.”

Looped mains eliminate dead ends, which are prone to lower pressure and relative stagnation.

“A water main that goes through Patterson Park is not in good shape,” Jenny said. “We want to deal with that while we have the opportunity to go from Bedford to Grand Marais and make that a loop so Grand Marais is not a dead end. There’s nothing wrong with water quality. It just helps the flow.”

If circumstances change, the Mack Avenue portions of the project will be cut.

“That’s still in good shape,” Jenny said.

Eight-inch water pipes were installed on Mack between Kensington and Cadieux in 2023, the first major main replacement project in a couple of

decades.

Results of a water reliability study, begun last fall and due for completion by spring, will compare the city’s current water capacity with anticipated future demand.

“That should be presented to city council in February or March,” Sizeland said. “The initial draft we received had welcome news.”

Another component of the study is cause and effect, such as a mathematical model showing the anticipated impact on neighborhood water pressure if a certain section of pipe were replaced.

“You can take a map of Grosse Pointe Park and look at all the water mains and pressure changes,” Sizeland said.

“It’s going to be a good tool that informs our decision making as well,” said Councilman Max Wiener, chairman of the infrastructure committee.

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Westrick sisters band together at U-M

Grosse Pointe North High School graduates Stephanie and Sarah Westrick are together once again as students at the University of Michigan and members of the Michigan Marching Band, or MMB.

Stephanie Westrick, who has played clarinet with the MMB for two years, is a junior at U-M and working on a double major in film and psychology. Sarah Westrick, a freshman studying art and design, is in her first year playing piccolo with the MMB.

Both sisters were in the marching band at North, where they held leadership positions as section leaders and later as drum majors. Stephanie Westrick was a drum major in 2021, while Sarah Westrick was in 2022 and 2023.

A fun fact Stephanie Westrick likes to share is that since the resurgence of the marching band at North in 2019, a drum major from each year has gone on to march with the MMB — she and her sister among them.

The sisters said it is no joke auditioning for the MMB.

“To get into the band, you have to submit a one-take video recording of yourself playing three to five minutes of solo music that showcases not only technique like rhythm, but also musicianship through dynamics and phrasing, in addition to a chromatic scale that showcases your full range,” Stephanie

Westrick said. “It’s a challenge to find that piece of music that is difficult enough to showcase your full talent, but not so difficult that it becomes detrimental.”

“There are always more people auditioning in each section than there are spots for, so it can be difficult to get in to the band,” Sarah Westrick added. “It’s exciting when you get that email saying you made it and are a part of the MMB.”

However, they said, the email is just the beginning. Once selected to be a member of the MMB, students must endure another audition during Band Week, using their musical selections to determine their musical rank/chair within their section.

The sister agreed being a part of the MMB involves intense work. Two weeks prior to the start of school, the band has extensive daily practices that last most of the day. Once school begins, practice is Monday through Friday for up to two hours.

The Friday night before a home game, the band practices three to four hours. Their call time is five hours before game time, so oftentimes, the band is back on the field at 7 a.m. Saturday, which can be awfully dark and cold in late October into November.

The MMB performs a new show every game, so each week its members memorize new music and a new show. The band

plays at every home football game and travels to bigger rivalry games, for example The Ohio State University or Michigan State University, as well as any postseason games.

For every game, band members challenge for a spot on the field. Members who are granted spots in the travel block are provided transportation with the band either through a charter bus or airplane, depending on the distance. If it is an overnight trip instead of a day trip, the band also provides hotel accommodations.

There are certain standards set for members of the MMB.

“In the band, we’re not allowed to participate in any student section’s cheers that may involve profanity or are otherwise unsportsmanlike,” Stephanie Westrick said. “Additionally, we are not allowed to rush the field with the students and fans after big wins, such as those against OSU that have taken place the last four years.”

Added Sarah Westrick, “One of the things you cannot do is eat while in uniform, other than the post-halftime apples given to the whole band. ... It is very important for everyone to look uniform. Hair or hair ribbons cannot touch the block ‘M’ on the uniforms so anyone with long hair has to put their hair up in single or double buns.”

All the hard work and rules are worth the effort, the sisters said.

“The most fun part are the people and community you gain from being a part of the band,” Sarah Westrick said.

Added Stephanie Westrick, “The most fun thing about being in the band are the friendships I’ve made through it. It provides you with a way to become incredibly close-knit with a wide variety of people and I’m almost always spending time with the friends I’ve made in band, even after the season ends.”

Grosse Pointe News, the only no vote.

“She knows the procedures we need to follow and corrects mistakes in the (meeting) minutes,” Worden said.

The board also voted 5-2, with Jeup and Cotton opposed, to move meetings to 7 p.m. the second and fourth Mondays of each month, with a few exceptions due to scheduling matters. Meetings historically were on Mondays until June 2023, when they were switched to Tuesdays. The reason given at the time was because four of the five Pointes — with the exception of the Shores — hold their city council meetings on Mondays.

Worden said the switch back to Mondays is because it is the least busy night districtwide for extracurricular activities. Jeup said administrators preferred Tuesdays as they did not have to take time away from family Sunday evenings preparing for a Monday night meeting.

Trustees also voted on what to do with their pay. Board members make such a declaration at the annual organizational meeting and can choose to receive the money, refuse it, direct it to a particular program in the district or donate it to the Grosse Pointe Foundation for Public Education. They receive \$30 for each regular and committee meeting, up to 52 meetings.

Klepp and Worden chose to give the money

to the Parcels Middle School PTO; Hull chose the Pierce Middle School band; Derringer directed his to the foundation and St. John chose the closed captioning efforts that accompany each televised board meeting. Cotton chose to forgo the money and Jeup said she would receive hers.

The board voted 6-1, with Jeup opposed, to create standing committees for facilities, policy and Freedom of Information Act appeals. Worden said she planned to only appoint board members to the committees. Previously, committees for finance and facilities, policy and contracts, curriculum and community engagement included community members who brought specific expertise in each of those areas.

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — Tea is said to have gotten its start in 2737 BC, when leaves blew into a cup of water being boiled for Chinese emperor and herbalist Shen Nung.

In The Village, it got its start in early October, when The Spice & Tea Exchange opened and added to the local market a plethora of traditional herbs, spices, aromatics and signature blends hand-mixed in-store.

Coinciding with National Tea Month, the shop — owned by Park resident Sara Biery — is celebrating its grand opening with events and specials throughout the month of January, culminating with a ribbon-cutting and grand-opening party at 4 p.m. Friday, Jan. 31.

In the meantime, patrons are invited to get 10 percent off all teas now through Saturday, Jan. 18; spend \$35 to get a free 16-ounce tea between Sunday, Jan. 19, and Saturday, Jan. 25; and buy any tea to get a coupon for a free tea at the tea bar on the next visit between Sunday, Jan. 26, and Saturday, Feb. 1.

The events kick off with a free Nutritional Psychology and Mental Health seminar at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 16.

Licensed functional psychologist Dr. Andrea

Andrzejczak will lead attendees through her research on how the gut microbiome correlates to mental health, including the benefits of tea on mood, stress levels and overall mental well-being.

“Then we’ll stay open afterwards for them to shop if they want to as well,” Biery said, “and they’ll receive a 10 percent discount on anything they buy just for attending.”

Next up will be a ticketed Mindfulness and

Tea Meditation class from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 22.

Jill Tamminen with Meditate Sisu will lead a 30-minute breathwork meditation with an emphasis on senses and exercises that can be done practically in the real world.

“A lot of her client base are people who aren’t necessarily yoga masters or do daily yoga or anything like that,” Biery said. “They’re people who every day are just looking for a way to calm

their minds down or re-focus, so she makes sure that she covers a lot of those practical applications. She’ll go through how to center your breath, the right posture and that type of thing. We’ll do some breathwork exercises focusing on the senses.”

The meditation will be followed by three rounds of tea tastings, incorporating meditation exercises and themed around calming teas, energizing teas and mood-enhancing teas.

“Guests who participate in that event are going to leave with a one-hour, one-on-one virtual meditation session with Jill,” Biery said, adding there is 10 percent off anything purchased during the event. “They’ll also leave with three teas — one from each of the different tastings that we did — and they’ll leave with a nice glass infuser, so they can steep it at home and put into practice (mindfulness exercises) like seeing the colors change, seeing the

tea leaves unfurl. It’s a nice glass infuser that enables that sensory experience.”

The Mindfulness and Tea Meditation class is \$89 per person and tickets may be purchased at tinyurl.com/4ty2uhrr.

In partnership with Fairfax Market and Village Wine, a ticketed cooking class on when to season meat will be held at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 30.

“It will be talking about when to season, which seasonings to use based on the meat,” Biery said. “And then in terms of when to season, it would be if you’re grilling, letting something marinate versus applying a finishing salt versus rubbing on right before cooking. So it’s more of what seasonings to use and when to apply them based on your cooking method.”

Tastings with wine pairings will be served as part of the class.

Tickets are \$35 and may be purchased at tinyurl.com/2f76jpsy.

The grand opening festivities wrap up the last day of the month with mocktails, tastings and 15 percent off anything bought during the grand-opening party.

The Spice & Tea Exchange is located at 17037 Kercheval. Its hours are 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday; 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday; and noon to 5 p.m. Sunday.

Ice fisherman seeks city endorsement

GROSSE POINTE PARK — Tim Kramer picked a good time last month to ask about ice fishing in the municipal marina.

The temperature was about 20 degrees, prime for a safe foundation of ice to form in the marina at Windmill Pointe Park.

“(Lake St. Clair) is a phenomenal fishing lake,” Kramer said, appealing to the Grosse Pointe Park Recreation Commission to officially sanction ice fishing in the marina, which has been a freelance activity. “All over the country it’s known as one of the best bass-fishing lakes.”

Commissioners and city administrators were receptive.

“I’ve been in talks with the city manager,” said Chad Craig, director of parks and recreation. “We’re going to talk with the (city attorney) as well. If there’s any possibility we can provide something like that, we’ll see what we can do.”

Ice fishing comes with obvious hazards. Someone falling through

the ice at a municipal facility could put taxpayer dollars at risk of liability.

“You’re doing it at your own risk, but there are always plaintiffs’ attorneys interested in making money,” Kramer said.

Ice formation in the marina varies due to built-in flow throughs intended to cut down on stagnant water.

“We have a current that comes through,” Kramer said. “That’s the last to freeze and first to thaw. People don’t know that.”

“We’re talking about signing a waiver holding us harmless,” said Tom Fraiser, Windmill’s harbor master. “You’d have to have a buddy system. You can’t come down by yourself. You’d have to have a friend with you. You have to have life jackets.”

Kramer said it would be a disappointment and a loss to the Park’s lakeside way of life if ice fishing at the city park were banned.

“I’ve enjoyed it for years,” he said. “There’s never been any trouble, as far as I know. It’s nice to put up a tent. A heater makes it a lot more comfortable.”

He also knows from experience how fleeting the ice fishing season can be.

“There were only two times with people out last year, two weeks where we had 13, 14 inches (of ice),” he told commissions. “In 10 minutes, it was gone. Whereas three to four years ago, I was out on the ice at the end of February and there was still 14 inches out there.”

It’s routine for residents to propose ideas to the recreation commission.

Ongoing restoration of the Patterson Park playscape, begun last year, began with the help and oversight of commissioners.

On the other hand, a request by residents last year to allow non-swimming toddlers access the municipal pool if wearing life jackets went nowhere.

The same with a couple of dog owners. They sought commission endorsement to walk their pets in the only part of the city where such activity is disallowed: the general grounds of Patterson Park, where there is a fenced-in dog park.

that sponsors of special events may be required to notice adjoining or affected properties, if

needed.

“If an event is happening in a certain area and it’s going to have a rather significant impact, then we feel it’s probably adequate to notice adjoining properties and let them

know that that event is going on so that they’re aware,” Valentine said.

Council approved the special events ordinance amendments 6-0, with Councilman Seth Krupp absent, Monday, Nov. 18.

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True grit

Abandoned puppy earns Detroit Lions-inspired moniker

At first glance, Corinne Martin thought the puppy left on the doorstep of the Grosse Pointe Animal Adoption Society's Barbara N. Weiss Animal Protection Facility last week was dead.

"I came in on Jan. 6, and one of our volunteers said there's a blanket in the alcove at our intake building, which is not marked; it doesn't say it's ours," said Martin, founder and executive director of GPAAS. "I ran over there and, curled up in a blanket, was this puppy. I thought it was dead; it was not moving."



The intake center is located on Harper, near the I-94 service drive, the noise of which likely would frighten away any dog, but not this one.

"I touched the top of its head and it opened its eyes," Martin said.

She immediately pulled the blanket and puppy indoors.

"What I saw was this young dog, maybe 6 months old, covered in blood," she said. "It had three sweaters on and was wearing a harness and was wrapped in a blanket. I got it inside and it wagged its little tail."

Martin rushed the puppy to the Harper Woods Veterinary Hospital, which diagnosed it with a severe case of generalized demodectic mange.

"It had it so long that its skin had broken down," she said. "The skin was decomposed. If you touch it, it bleeds. To make matters worse, it was severely infected. Its legs

were so swollen and painful, it couldn't get up and move."

The veterinary staff immediately treated the puppy with antibiotics — the only way to initially treat such a severe case, Martin noted. By Friday, Jan. 10, they were able to give the puppy her first medicated bath.

"She must sense she has to keep her activity low," Martin said. "The whole week at the vet, she just laid there and chewed on bones or toys."

"Now she's in a foster home that can handle her, not because of her personality, but because of the physical care involved," she added. "... She's in good hands; the foster home is good with these types of cases."

But the puppy's story doesn't stop there.

With a strong social media presence, GPAAS posted about her and received overwhelming feedback from the community. The reaction was

so strong, the nonprofit decided to host a naming contest for the dog.

"People from all over the Grosse Pointes, Harper Woods, St. Clair Shores, Eastpointe and Detroit inundated us with thoughts of love and prayers for the well-being of this dog," stated a press release issued by GPAAS. "We made a decision to ask our loyal followers to help us with naming this puppy. ... We received about 1,000 suggestions for the new name for this pup."

One name quickly rose to the top: Gritty.

As Detroit Lions fever sweeps metro Detroit, "Grit" has become the unofficial slogan for the team. The supporter who suggested the name on Facebook admitted it's "not a very feminine name, but she certainly embodies the spirit of our Detroit Lions. ... Never give up!"

When asked by Sports Illustrated's Albert Breer

what the term means to him, Lions head coach Dan Campbell said, "Grit is, I think it's when you have the ability to overcome adversity in any situation. The ability to push through it, mentally, physically, to overcome. I think that's what grit is in a nutshell."

With a definition like that, and as the Lions head into the NFC Divisional Round against the Washington Commanders this Saturday night, "Gritty made the most sense," Martin said. "We loved it and went with it."

As for Gritty's prognosis, after just a week of treatments, she's able to stand up and walk.

"She's still very calm and laid back," Martin said, noting it's too soon to tell if that's her personality or if she's still hurting. "Every day is a little step forward."

"... She is a sweet girl," she added. "I'm sure she's going to find a wonderful home once she's able. Hopefully we'll know in a few weeks more about her, like if she gets along with other dogs."

While Gritty receives care from her foster family, Martin said she is hunting down a Detroit Lions shirt for the pup to wear, as she no doubt will live up to her name.

"It's a very severe case," Martin added.

"Sadly, this was completely treatable had the person just taken the dog to the veterinary hospital. As bad as her skin is, it will probably be a month before she stops bleeding at the touch."

"I've seen cases like this take a year before they're completely back to normal," she added. "I don't think it will take that long with her, but it will be several weeks before she can run and play."

Martin said she is concerned about GPAAS getting more cases like Gritty, since the city of Harper Woods terminated its service agreement with the rescue (see story, page 1A).

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Kevin’s Song presents 9th annual Conference on Suicide Jan. 23-25

The ninth annual Conference on Suicide: Creating & Supporting Lives Worth Living takes place Jan. 23 to 25, at St. John’s Resort in Plymouth. Presented by Kevin’s Song, the three-day, statewide conference was designed to raise awareness about suicide and its impact, as well as highlight the importance of preventive measures.

“It’s a focus on the positive, what to provide people as far as suicide prevention and risk mitigation goes,” Kevin’s Song Executive Director Jennifer Fair Margraf said. “Prevention is the focus this year.”

Educators, mental health professionals, students, business and community leaders, as well as members of the public, survivors of suicide and attempt survivors are invited to attend the event, which will ask:

- ◆ Are we purposely creating cultures that promote living?

- ◆ Are we actively trying to create lives filled with hope, connection, purpose and possibility?

- ◆ In essence, are we helping all of our community members to have lives worth living?

“Each day (of the conference) is different,” Margraf said. “The first day is the School Summit where we’ll be talking about dealing with youth. We’re seeing a need for it in elementary schools and are working with administrators in Grosse

Pointe schools because of an issue that already happened this year. It’s important we’re providing information to help build resilience in kids. ...

“It’s all about resilience and providing youth with strategies and resources,” she added. “It’s hard to get through youth typically, but then you add all the layers of what they’re going through now.”

Thursday’s School Summit includes presentations that will appeal to educators, mental health professionals and suicide prevention advocates who work with youth to build awareness and share prevention strategies tailored to a diverse young population.

Keynote speakers include Charisse Nixon, Ph.D., who will address “Building Resilience — Changing our Culture

One Person at a Time,” and Nicole Runyon, LMSW, who will present “Free to Fly: The Secret to Fostering Independence in the Next Generation,” among others. Eight breakout sessions are planned the first day, featuring 12 presenters. Among them is Sarah Emmerson, MA, LLP, who has presented at the Conference on Suicide the last few years.

“Typically, I do a breakout session during the School Summit that focuses on youth mental health, trauma, traumatic events and the impact they have on mental health,” she said. “This year the focus is more proactive — things to do early on to build resilience to adversity and challenges in life.”

Emmerson is sharing the dais with Runyon,

also a Grosse Pointer, to present “Building Confident and Resilient Kids with Bright Futures.”

“She and I are great colleagues, but we have different backgrounds,” Emmerson said. “We’ll be speaking together on the topic. I think it’s something not only parents will be interested in, but also educators. It’s geared to parents because we get a lot of questions from parents.”

Parenting styles, helping parents understand the developmental milestones of children, improving frustration and distress tolerance and helping kids manage challenges early on are all topics Emmerson plans to broach.

“Mental health for young people has become a focus of attention,” Emmerson said. “Young people suffer from depression more than ever before. ... As kids get older, we’re helping them to develop skills for their independence — what we can do during elementary and middle school to help them feel more confident.”

Also presenting during the School Summit is Grosse Pointe North High School psychologist Christine Kuhl, LLP. Though she’s been on the School Summit planning committee before, this will be her first time speaking. She’ll be part of a panel discussion titled, “Peer-to-Peer Mental Health Programs.”

“This will allow an opportunity for school

staff to come and hear about peer-to-peer support models at high schools and secondary schools,” she said.

Kuhl leads North’s Peer-to-Peer program, which is based on the University of Michigan Depression Center’s program. In its fifth year at North, Kuhl said she’s proud of the effort students put into it.

“It’s focused on training students to be mental health advocates at North,” she said. “They learn to connect to fellow classmates to help when needed. They create mental health awareness campaigns every year and if they see someone struggling, they can get them connected with help. ... It’s not staff members telling students what they want them to hear; it’s students creating what their peers need to hear.

“It’s been an amazing addition to North and a bright spot for me, personally and profession-

ally.”

The second day of the conference will explore the latest in research about suicide and risk assessment, as well as evidenced-based treatments and prevention strategies to better serve individuals and communities at risk.

Among the keynote speakers are Bart Andrews, Ph.D., who will present “Lives Worth Living: A New Approach to Suicide Prevention,” as well as Joyce Chu, Ph.D., who will present, “Changing the Culture of Suicide Prevention to Support Our Diverse Communities.” Another eight breakout sessions take place Friday as well.

Though a first-day presenter, Emmerson plans to be an attendee the second day.

“It’s always interesting topics,” she said. “There’s a variety of different speakers. As a professional, this is one of my

‘Every day’s a win’

Heroes’ Movement hosts inaugural gala

Making the transition to civilian life is a challenge for many who’ve served in the military. After enduring circumstances most civilians cannot comprehend, service men and women return home changed, some with physical injuries and others with invisible scars.

To combat the struggles faced by veterans returning to civilian life, Heroes’ Movement steps in to offer support. The 501(c)3 nonprofit formed nearly 10 years ago to help strengthen veterans’ physical and mental health through workouts and athletics.

“Veterans that want to take back control of their lives have the opportunity to do that,” Heroes’ Movement founder Mike McKay said.

The goals of Heroes’ Movement include bridging the gap between physical therapy and feeling strong again; creating a continued sense of community for veterans so they can reinforce their strengths together; reducing dependence on prescription drugs; and reducing suicide risk.

“There are a lot of medicated veterans out there, because it’s easier to take that route,” said McKay, a Wyandotte native, U.S. Navy veteran and strength coach with 20 years of experience. “I’ve heard multiple stories of veterans taking their lives back through physical fitness. They create a routine, create better life habits.”

Heroes’ Movement

accomplishes its goals by partnering with gyms nationwide to provide training free of charge to veterans. Gyms promote free training for veterans and, in return, the organization reimburses the gyms for the sessions.

One such gym is SBG Training, located at 15318 Mack, Grosse Pointe Park. Owner Samantha Bagnasco was quick to partner with McKay to offer the program.

“Mike and I used to work together at another gym,” Bagnasco said. “I’ve been doing my own thing for a while and have been at this location for two years. We’re a private strength-training gym; we do group and private sessions.

“When I opened my own gym, Mike was a natural partner,” she continued. “We have the same high standards. He’s picky about the gyms he partners with.”

Every partner gym follows post-traumatic stress and traumatic brain injury training guidelines to ensure veterans are taken care of.

“With veterans in gyms, it’s got to be structured,” McKay said. “That’s why there are post-traumatic stress and traumatic brain injury guidelines. Every day in the gym has to be a win. It’s a noncompetitive environment; they’re training against themselves.”

Each hour-long session includes ground-based stretching and a dynamic warmup, as well as power work, explosive work, strength blocks and post-workout breath-



work.

“A lot of people have preexisting injuries,” Bagnasco noted. “We take that seriously. Avoiding injury is our No. 1 priority.”

The program has proven to help veterans feel better and reduce pain.

“That alone is freeing,” McKay said. “It feels better not being in as much pain.”

In addition to physical activity, Heroes’ Movement also helps reintegrate veterans with civilians, noted Bagnasco, whose husband is a veteran.

“Still, years later, things are challenging for him,” she said. “He’s still a work in progress, but being in a group with civilians can be a good thing.”

Added McKay, “They feel like they belong again.”

Veterans are welcome to train at participating gyms up to three times a week, “indefinitely, until they’re good,” McKay added. “They don’t have to be injured to be in the

program. They can be any era, any branch, any age, injured or uninjured — we make sure every day’s a win.”

Participating gyms are listed on the Heroes’ Movement website. Veterans simply search for a program near them that provides training, Bagnasco said.

“All group training is provided at no cost to them,” she added. “And they build a good sense of community.”

That sense of community is partially what led McKay to found the organization. He wanted to provide veterans opportunities to network and learn from each other, as well as foster camaraderie while educating the community about the issues facing veterans.

“Once they’re locked in with us as a community, they’re held accountable,” McKay added. “This is where the magic is. They move more, feel good. And on the community side, it keeps them engaged so their mental health is better.”

There currently are 50

gyms in the Heroes’ Movement network, including two in Alaska.

“We’re up and down both coasts — Southern California, Central New York and St. Paul are the biggest gyms,” McKay said. “There are 350 veterans who are active in the program and we just surpassed over 120,000 sessions that we’ve sponsored.

“But my favorite number is zero,” he continued. “Zero veterans have taken their lives in this program.”

McKay looks for gyms with a certified functional strength coach, or CFSC, or people “who are following this formula or are close to it,” he said.

“I’ve gotten a lot of help from Sam and we have a great team,” he noted. “We have a great board all over the country and great gym owners.”

Making the magic happen

With no government assistance, Heroes’ Movement relies entirely on donations to provide free training to veterans. Its first local gala takes place 7 to 10 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 25, at The War Memorial, 32 Lakeshore, Grosse Pointe Farms.

“The War Memorial is a fitting location because it’s patriotic,” McKay said, noting cocktails and hors d’oeuvres will be available. “Come fed and come thirsty — there’s an open bar.”

The event also includes 50/50 raffles and AFC/NFC championship squares. A live auction and live music from Category 5 round out the event, for which cocktail attire is required.

Live auction items include a roundtrip for two to Chicago for a Cubs

game with two nights at the Waldorf Astoria, as well as a Barry Sanders-signed Oklahoma State University jersey. A charity hockey game featuring members of the L.A. Kings — “We hope to be raffling spots to play in that game, so (the highest bidder) will be on the line or on defense with the pros,” McKay said — is in the works as well.

Lt. Col. Josh Wege, a U.S. Marine Corps veteran who lost both legs at age 19, just two weeks after arriving in Afghanistan, will give the keynote address.

“He’s been working out with us in Wisconsin,” McKay said. “He’ll talk about his experience, his life changes and how Heroes’ Movement has helped him out.”

All proceeds directly support veterans’ strength and conditioning programs.

Tickets for the gala are available on the Heroes’ Movement website and social media.

“To quote Joe Namath, we guarantee a good time at every party we have,” McKay said. “Every dollar raised at the gala goes to training sessions. We’re trying to get a good fundraising base in Michigan; that would be a dream come true.”

Since 2015, 92 percent or more of donations go directly into training sessions for veterans. Heroes’ Movement spent \$300,000 last year on training sessions, every penny of which was raised through donations.

“This is our lifeblood,” McKay said of the gala.

Added Bagnasco, “I’ve known Mike a long time. If anyone can do this, it’s him. He has the drive.”

Expert to address energy’s fundamental role in civilization

Dr. Chris J. Kobus, Oakland University’s director of engineering and energy education, will speak at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 21, to the Eastside Republican Club at The War Memorial, 32 Lakeshore, Grosse Pointe Farms.

Tuesday’s presentation will address what Kobus calls “energy’s fundamental role in civilization.”

“The Oakland University professor has been a favorite of ERC audiences since his first presentation to the club in 2016,” club chairman Mike Vethacke said in advance of the meeting. “Dr. Kobus offers a sensible, scientific outlook on conservation and clean energy.”

His specialties include clean energy and STEM education. Kobus started teaching in the clean energy field in 2005. That curriculum has expanded and now offers engineering students a concentration in alternative energy systems. In addition, the professor directs

an energy management program for business and engineering professionals.

Kobus was instrumental in establishing the university’s Clean Energy Research Center, which includes academics, research, campus facilities, local business incubation and K-12 outreach.

In addition to research, Kobus has taught 17 subjects, ranging from thermal and fluid sciences, solid mechanics and dynamics, alternative energy and nuclear systems.

As part of his research of the electrification value, he has personally owned an EV and used his own Rochester home as a test project to teach students the value of solar power.

Kobus also is a movie buff.

“Since a teenager I have been ripping on Hollywood movies for scientific inaccuracies and now use motion pictures in my courses to teach fundamental scientific principles and their applications,” he said.

The scholar is a husband and father of seven. His hobbies include writing, energy-efficient home projects and physical fitness.

Day of Hope and Advocacy planned Jan. 20

A casual conversation after Grosse Pointe Congregational Church’s Interfaith Thanksgiving service led to the development of “A Day of Hope and Advocacy: Fulfilling Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King’s Dream,” which takes place noon to 5 p.m. Monday, Jan. 20, in partnership with WE GP. The Rev. Richard Yeagher-Stiver said he and some members were discussing what they could do to honor King. The answer is in the church’s DNA, he added. “As part of our Grosse Pointe Congregational Church (United Church

of Christ) identity with a heart for social justice matters, we wanted a way to live our Christian identity while including all persons into a faithful and creative way to see each other,” he said. “Our historical roots come from our Congregational ancestors and forbearers, who forged the way for justice matters dating all the way back to the 1839 slave ship, La Amistad.” Citing the Steven Spielberg movie, “Amistad,” Yeagher-Stiver said there were details the famed director missed. “The men from Africa did not speak English, nor did they speak a shared language,” he

explained. “When members of the Congregational Church in New Haven (Conn.) paid to see the prisoners, the church members did not see ‘carnival creatures.’ Instead they saw human beings. The members raised their concerns with their pastor, who carried lots of weight back then, and ended the carnival-like situation. At the same time, the men sat in prison because back then, one had to speak the common language to provide a defense, so women from the church entered the prison and taught the men how to speak and read English.” Yeagher-Stiver called

the sequence of events the official birth of UCC Wider Church Missions, “and provided the denomination a taste for social justice,” he said. “And we the UCC have not stopped in our ministerial efforts to champion for human rights and justice.” He and church members decided Martin Luther King Day was the appropriate time to focus on hope and advocacy “to advance human rights and social justice through sacred conversations and creative art/music opportunities,” he added. The church and WE GP welcome the community to a day meant to honor King’s memory and message with a potluck lunch

and gathering. Free art-creating materials will be available from noon to 5 p.m. Yoga and meditation will be offered at 2 p.m. A free dance party takes place at 3 p.m. Food and snacks will be offered all day as well. “During the event, we will have an open microphone for poetry, singing, music, personal accounts and readings that focus on our ability to ‘see each other’ as the God-blessed individuals every person has received,” Yeagher-Stiver said. “Our hope is that persons will see the value every person holds as we are all created in the image of God and to share in God’s creativity with our creativity.”

Interested individuals may come and go as they please. “In other words, they don’t have to be present all five hours. Other than yoga, everything is free-form and offered throughout the day,” Yeagher-Stiver said. All ages are welcome and there is no fee. For more information, call (313) 884-3075. “It is a day of networking with persons who share a heart for social justice and believing that the dream Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King had for America’s future is still achievable and through our creativity we can fulfill his dream,” he added.

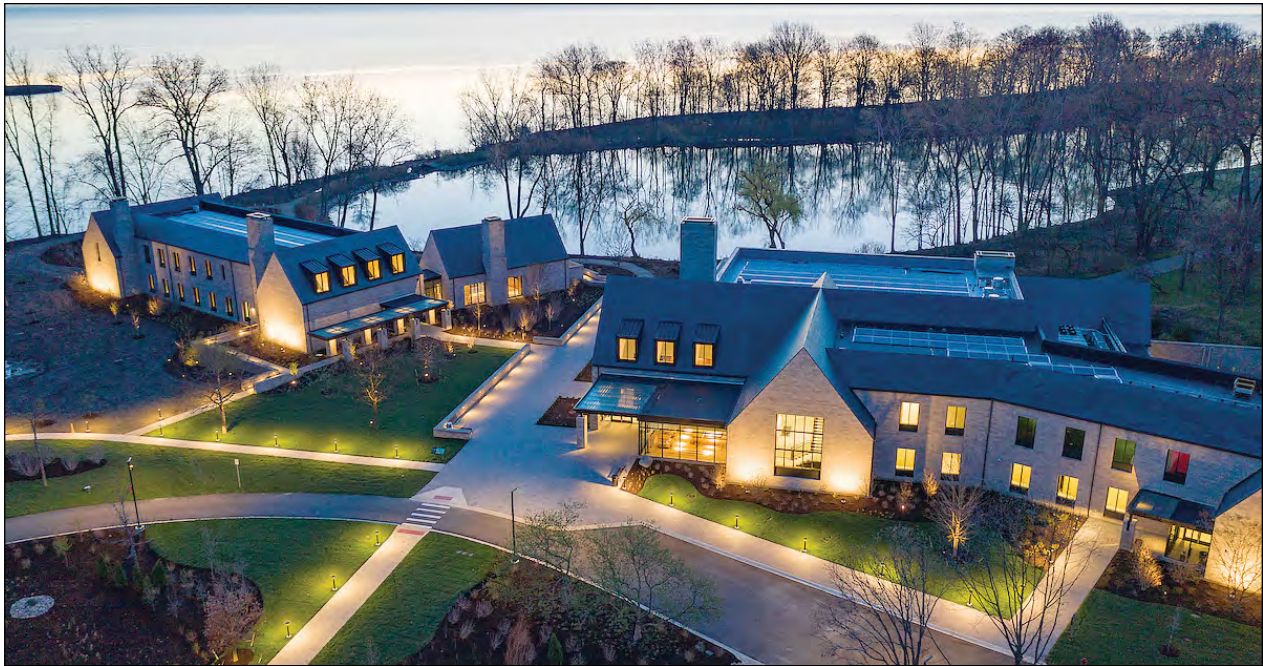

favorite conferences. It’s put on by loss survivors, so there’s a very personal feel to it.”

The final day of the conference focuses on survivors of suicide. The day includes stories from loss and attempt survivors, as well as addresses how to manage grief and loss following a death by suicide. Four keynote addresses are planned, including by Dennis Liegghio, founder and executive director of Know Resolve, who will present “Coping with Grief Through Expressive Art.” Facilitated breakout sessions include loss survivor and attempt survivor support groups, as well as a grief workshop.

In addition to three days of keynote speakers and breakout sessions, a pre-conference day of training is offered Wednesday, Jan. 22, for anyone interested, “from the layperson through those who are working clinically with youth and adults,” Margraf said. “It includes QPR training for laypeople to give them a better understanding of how to deal with a family member, friend or coworker (who may be suicidal) and how to pick up on clues. There’s also mental

health first-aid training focused on youth.”

Five training sessions are offered, each priced additionally to the conference.

Running concurrently to the conferences is a session for faith leaders, which takes place Friday.

“It’s a day-long training for faith leaders, so they’re able to deal with those who are seeking counsel for this, because they’re not trained to deal with suicidal ideology,” Margraf said.

Kuhl, who has experienced a student’s suicide and has “seen firsthand the impact it has on the community,” said the Kevin’s Song conference is one of the best she’s attended in her career.

“Suicide is a difficult topic to deal with, but when you take the cover off and look at it and study it, you feel more confident to deal with it,” she said. “I hope many in our community feel welcome and want to come out to the Kevin’s Song conference and see the amazing job this organization puts on. It doesn’t sound like something that would be a feel-good event, but it really is.”

For professionals who return to the Conference on Suicide year after year, it becomes a networking opportunity as well.

“It’s good to speak with others who have a passion for suicide prevention,” Emmerson said. “... And it’s great to support a local organization of families and professionals that has a unique approach to learning in terms of conferences.”

Margraf stressed that all are welcome to attend the conference.

“Unfortunately suicide doesn’t have any boundaries with race, creed or socioeconomic group,” she said, adding that a suicide prevention task force was formed in Michigan two years ago and recently completed its work. “Their takeaway was that the best way to combat this is to train every Michigander in QPR, so they learn to simply ask, ‘Are you thinking about suicide?’ It’s about breaking down the barrier, the stigma.”

Registration for the Kevin’s Song Conference on Suicide is available at kevinssong.org. Single-day, two-day and three-day tickets are available.

“There really is something for everyone, not just school administrators and teachers, not just doctors and nurses and social workers,” Margraf said. “We want to make sure everyone has at least one skill in their backpack to stop and prevent suicide.”

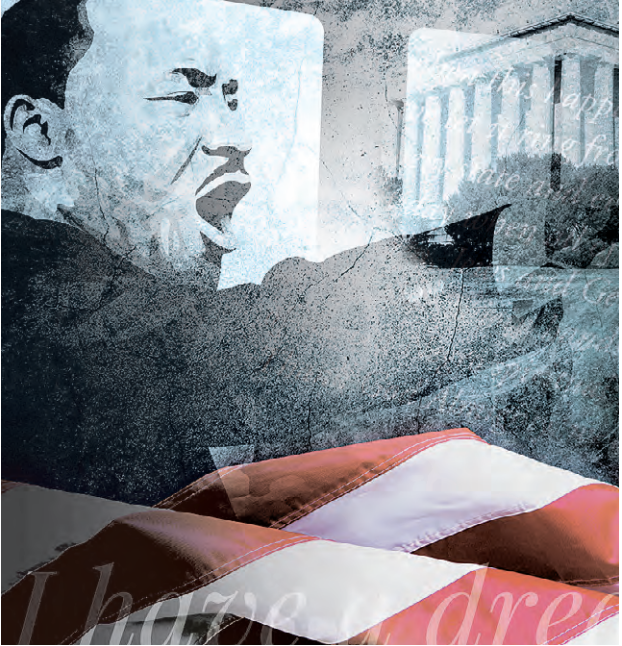

When we buy a bottle of a famed wine, we take it on faith that it’s genuine and not a fake.
In fact, fake wine is precisely why corks began to be branded with the name of a winery as well as the vintage date.
It is also why most reputable wineries still use branded corks. When you order a bottle of wine in a restaurant and the waiter hands you the cork, the main reason is so you can inspect it and see if the brand is the same as the one on the label.
If you order a bottle of Chateau Palmer and the cork is blank, for exam-

ple, that alone is sufficient grounds for rejecting the wine.
(Very inexpensive wines often are sold with blank corks that have no brands.)
Is wine fraud rampant here? No, it’s almost nonexistent. But it happens elsewhere, and often enough that it has spawned lots of discussion and several books. It often takes the form of poor-quality wine with a falsified label that indicates it’s a great wine.
And fraudulent wine practices have led to scandals (and, rarely, even deaths). Decades ago,

antifreeze was used in some Austrian wine. Another time, some wine in Italy was found to have been adulterated. In both cases, the wines were sold only locally and never made it to the United States.
One famed scandal in Burgundy involved a producer bottling wines of two different quality levels in identically labeled bottles. He was caught.
Wine scandals take many forms and have existed for hundreds of years. The assumption by most fraudsters is that only experts can tell a great wine from an impostor. And wine fraud flourishes to this day. There have been numerous books on the subject.
The first major book explaining wine fraud was “The Winemasters” by Nicholas Faith (1978), a terrific history of the French wine trade. That was followed by “Wine Scandal” by Fritz

Hallgarten (1986), “Wine Snobbery” by Andrew Barr (1988), and “Is This the Wine You Ordered, Sir?” by Christopher Fielden (1989).
What’s interesting is that all the writers above are European. There are few books on American wine fraud because so little of it exists — or has been uncovered.
An almost identical blend of Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot, rounded off with a touch of Petit Verdot, forge the Palmer style.
Over the decades, there have been only a handful of trivial “wine scandals” in this country.
Even author Ellen Hawkes, who wrote an unauthorized biography of

Ernest and Julio Gallo (“Blood and Wine,” 1993) never hinted at winemaking chicanery, even though her book did a lot of veneer-stripping.
There are many reasons the California wine industry is so free of taint. One that’s not well known is the cooperative relationship between wineries and the government agency that regulates them, the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau (TTB).
TTB gets a lot of barbs from winemakers, but most say they work closely with TTB inspectors and follow the rules. To do otherwise threatens their livelihoods. Licenses to operate are at stake.

Moreover, inspectors generally are fair-minded, not the ogres some make them out to be.
In Europe, most wine scandals are technical violations of complex regulations that mandate, among other things, how much fruit may grow in a plot of land or how long a bottle of wine must remain in the cellar before it can be sold.
Indeed, for the last several years many European wine regions have been rewriting their wine regulations to address grievances that producers or trade groups say are hamstringing them. Some of the violations are simply because producers misread the new regulations.

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A classic Italian soup

Minestrone is a thick vegetable soup that originated in ancient Rome. It’s traditionally filled with loads of vegetables, some kind of legume and sometimes pasta. It’s hearty, packed with nutrition and can satisfy the appetite of the hungriest of customers lurking about your kitchen.

As I write this, it’s snowing and I’m imagining myself sitting at a quiet corner of the Roma Cafe, now Amore da Roma in Detroit, enjoying a bowl of their minestrone soup and a glass of Chianti. If I can’t make it to the Roma today, I will try to recreate it at home.

I love making this soup because it’s a great way to use up any vegetables that are in the fridge. Plus, there is always a can of beans and diced tomatoes in the pantry.

You could also add spinach or any green at the end. I’ve even seen this soup made with orzo instead of the traditional ditalini. I chose zucchini and ditalini because that’s what I had.

The addition of a rind of parmesan is key here. Save them and put them in the freezer for later

use in any soup or even stew. It slowly and gently melts in and adds richness and depth of flavor.

I blend part of the soup to thicken it. The blended beans make it creamy without adding dairy. Either using an immersion blender or blending just about half of the soup gets the job done.

My absolute favorite way to finish the soup is spooning grated parmesan over top with extra fresh cracked pepper and a drizzle of good olive oil over top. It is just the way I would eat it at a quiet corner at Amore da Roma.

- Minestrone Soup
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 large onion, diced
- 2 large carrots, diced
- 3 celery stalks, diced
- 1 medium zucchini, diced
- 2 cups yellow potatoes, diced into 1-inch cubes
- 3 minced garlic cloves

- 2 tbsp tomato paste
- 1 14.5 oz can fire roasted, diced tomatoes
- 1 14.5 oz Great Northern or cannellini white beans
- 6 cups chicken broth
- 1 parmesan rind
- 1 cup dried ditalini pasta
- 2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp pepper
- 1 cup fresh basil leaves

In a large stock pot over medium heat, add in the olive oil. Once hot, add in the chopped onion, carrot, celery, zucchini, tomato paste, salt and pepper. Stir everything together and cook until the vegetables are soft, about five to seven minutes. Add in the garlic during the last minute of the vegetables cooking so it doesn’t burn.

Next, add in the potatoes, diced tomatoes and white beans. (Note: drain and rinse the beans, if you are looking to reduce the salt in your soup.) Stir to combine. Then

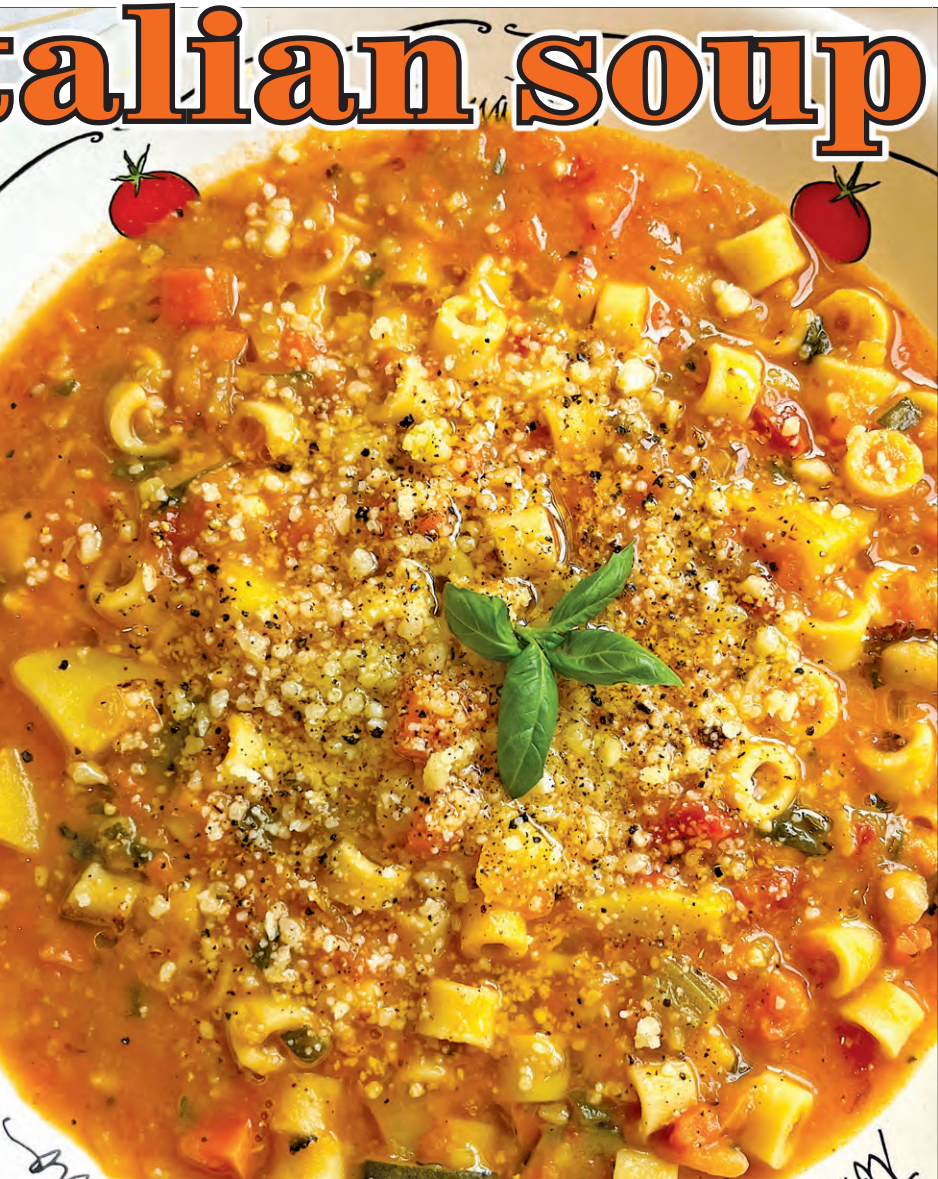

add the broth, basil and parmesan rind. Cover, bring to a boil, reduce to a simmer and let the soup cook until the potatoes are soft, about 15 minutes.

Turn the heat off and remove the lid. Use an immersion blender to blend the soup until

thick and chunky, not smooth. You’ll want to still see some of the vegetables.

If you don’t have an immersion blender, ladle into a blender, filling about one third to one half of the blender at a time. Be careful not to blend the parmesan rind. Do this two to

three times so you still have a chunky soup.

At this point, add in the pasta. Bring the soup back to a simmer and cook until the pasta is done. Remove the rind and serve piping hot. Garnish with a drizzle of olive oil and grated parmesan sprinkled on top.

Love of fire cookouts ignites Full Rack Barbeque

Wow, 2025 is here! It’s crazy to look back and realize five years ago was such a huge turning point for so many businesses, for so many reasons. With the support of Toni, who Bryon said “has been a hairdresser the entire time, as well as an amazing mom and a supportive, encouraging wife,” together they decided it was time to feed the people

— and this new “pit master” was fired up!

Food trucks really took off during COVID. While they were a thing before, they really became popular during the pandemic. Full Rack Barbecue officially launched in August 2020 as its own food truck, debuting at Baffin Brewery on the Nautical Mile in St. Clair Shores.

This barbecue beauty on wheels started serving up all the favorites: barbecue sandwiches, loaded mac and cheese, sides and other rotating items. They quickly jumped into the food truck rotations of the local breweries and social events around town, where food trucks are a part of farmers markets, food truck rallies and social districts. You can even reserve it for private parties and gatherings. It’s an excellent and easy idea for grad parties too.

The Mowreys watched their business and their following grow. Two years later, after major renovations in the space that was previously Moy’s Chinese at 21425 Greater Mack, Full Rack Barbecue’s brick-and-mortar restaurant opened in July 2022. When asked why he chose this location, Bryon said, “The strong sense of community. We live in St. Clair Shores and operated the food truck in St. Clair

Shores and knew how awesome and loyal it is here. We’re very pleased to learn how awesome Grosse Pointe is as well.”

With meat as the star of the show and supplied from Grosse Pointe’s own Fairway Packing Co., the restaurant offers top-of-the-line pulled pork, pulled chicken, brisket, pork spare ribs, sausage, wings and multiple mouth-watering barbecue options.

“All our meat is dry rubbed with seasoning blends made in house,” Bryon said, adding that their smoked options are “oakwood smoked until tender.”

I can attest to these unbelievably tender and flavorful meats. If you follow along on Grosse Pointe Eats & Treats on Facebook, you will see that often we do “Meat Mondays” at work. I never thought I would be someone that eats a half pound of pulled pork or brisket for lunch, but here I am!

When I asked what the most popular items were, Bryon said their ribs and brisket. Just last week they ran a special that was heavily requested: American Wagyu beef ribs. They sold 112 orders in one day.

I can’t really end the meat portion of their story without mentioning burgers. Yep, they’re flipping and smashing those, too. Their smash burgers are delicious and filling and come in different options as well. Aside from the classic — grilled onions, Alabama white sauce, pickles, ketchup, mustard and American cheese — they kicked up the “J” in PB&J with peanut butter, bacon, jalapeño jam and Swiss cheese. There’s also the big guy, the xPitbeefx, featuring sliced brisket, cheddar, onion straws and barbecue sauce. It’s a mouthful!

“Our burgers are a brisket and chuck blend, ground in house fresh daily,” Byron said.

And there are four different “smashers” from which to choose, along with classic fried chicken sandwiches, quesadillas and handheld sandwiches, fully loaded mac and cheese and brisket fries, as well as all the sauces, what’s not to love about this place?

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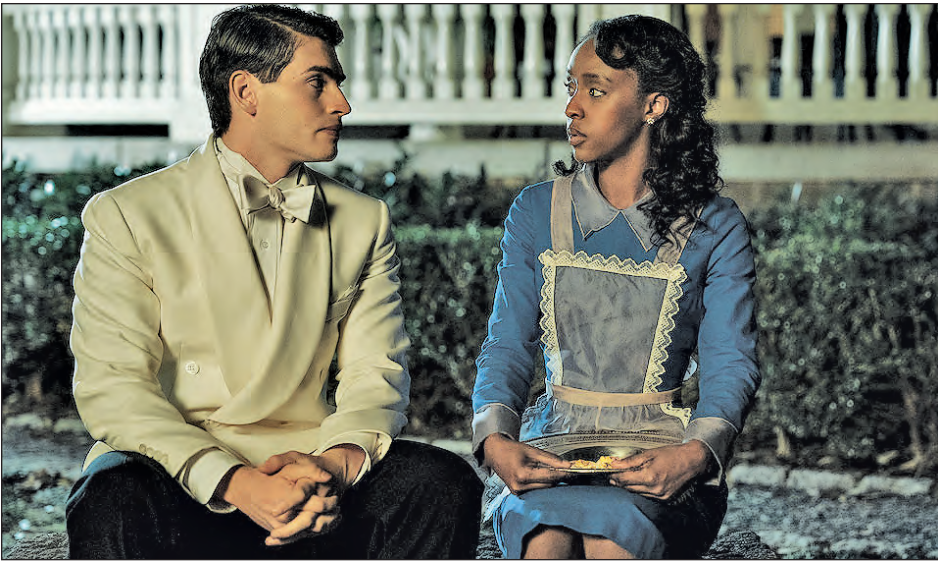

“The Six Triple Eight”

“The Six Triple Eight” is the latest offering from the talented writer/director Tyler Perry (“Diary of a Mad Black Woman,” “Gone Girl”). It’s an epic tale of heroism that took place during the later part of World War II. The events depicted in the movie transpired over 80 years ago, so why did it take so long for the story to get told? Sure, it’s a bit cheesy at times. Somewhat overly dramatic. The acting is a little weak in some spots, and there’s some corny romance thrown in. But ultimately, it’s a rousing, inspiring movie that simply needed to be made.

When we’re introduced to the lead character Lena Derriecott King (Ebony Obsidian), she’s being courted by Abram David (Gregg Sulkin). She’s a black girl from a working class household

and he’s a white Jewish boy from a very wealthy family. It’s set in the 1940s, so it’s not surprising their families don’t exactly encourage their budding relationship. Abram, like so many young men at the time, decides to do his duty for the country and enlists in the Army Air Corps. It’s not long after signing up that he’s shot down and killed. Needless to say, Lena is absolutely devastated. She decides she has nothing else to lose and enlists as well. Lena’s assigned to the 6888th Battalion of the Women’s Army Corps, which is under the lead of Maj. Charity Adams (Kerry Washington), a strict disciplinarian who will accept nothing less than the best from her troops. Ms. Washington really shines here and turns in one of her finest performances to date. She’s strong, resilient, and has no problem standing up to her racist, sexist superiors.

We then meet the

mother of two soldiers who’s distraught that she hasn’t heard from them in ages. She decides to take action and waits at the gate of the White House, hoping to meet with President Roosevelt. After two days, her vigil is brought to the attention of Eleanor (Susan Sarandon) and she’s brought in to meet with her and the president, played by Sam Waterston. They appoint Mary McLeod Bethune (Oprah Winfrey) to look into the matter. When it’s revealed that there are over 17 million undelivered letters in storage, and that they’ve been

Contract Bridge

A gambit, in chess, consists of deliberately sacrificing a piece in order to gain a long-term advantage. Bridge has its gambits also. Declarer sometimes deliberately sacrifices a trick in order to increase his chance of making the contract.

South neglected to meet that challenge in this deal. West led a spade against three notrump. Declarer played low from dummy and won East's king

with the ace, assuring a second spade trick for his side. When South next led a club, East took his ace and returned a spade. West very properly allowed dummy's ten of spades to win, after which declarer had to go down one. West scored three spade tricks, and East scored his two aces.

Declarer would have made the contract had he ducked East's king of spades at trick one and then played his jack, losing to the queen, on the spade continuation at trick two. This would have cost him a spade trick, but the trick he lost would have come back with interest since he would have lost only two spades and two aces, but no more.

Given the bidding and opening lead, declarer should conclude that East, for his opening bid, has the two missing aces, and also that West's spade lead is likely to have come from a five-card suit.

Once declarer reaches this conclusion, it follows that the opportunity to make two spade tricks ranks second in importance to the opportunity to make the contract. Refusing to take East's king of spades with the ace might seem self-injurious, but it is clearly the right play to make under the circumstances.

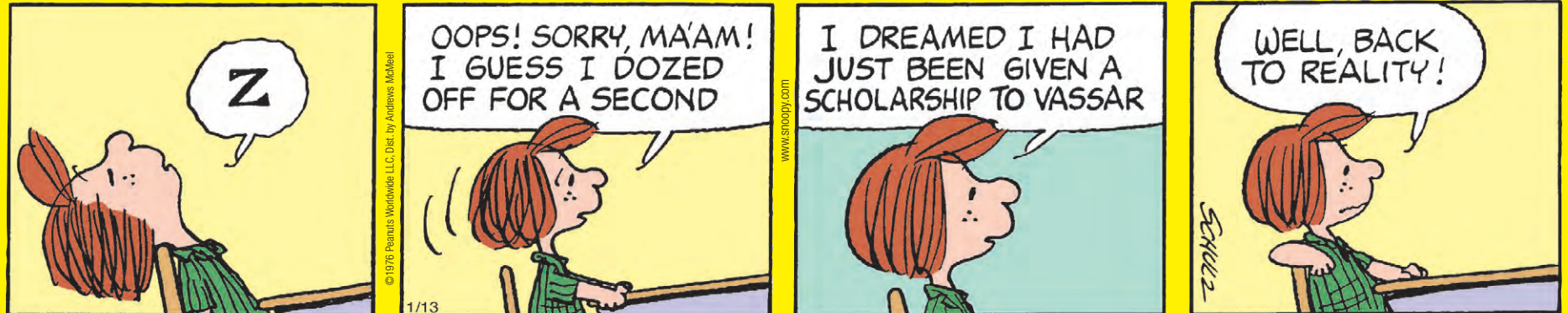

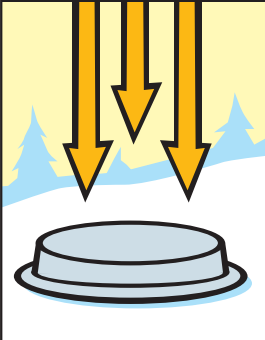

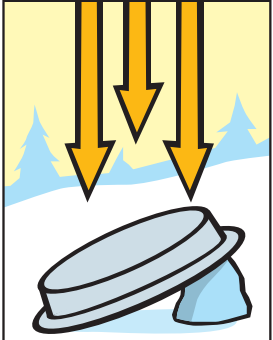

by Liggett's Justin Gibson tied the game at 71 apiece. season for Liggett with five goals and six assists through 12 games. While he can score, Stacy is focused on winning every individual battle he encounters on the ice and describes his approach to the game with a word that seems to be popular around Detroit these days.

“Gritty,” Stacy said. “... I’m not scared of anything. As a center, I’m down in the defensive zone getting into the corners and helping out the defense on the penalty kill. I’m never scared to block a shot. In the offensive zone, I always get in on the forecheck.”

Stacy’s senior season has come with an added dose of responsibility. He was made an assistant captain for the Knights at the beginning of the hockey season and is part of the core of senior leaders on the team.

With that responsibility, Stacy has decided to lead in the way he knows best. He may not be the type of player who is giving the team a pump-up speech in the locker room before every game. For Stacy, it is more about getting his teammates to adopt the same gritty attitude he exemplifies on the ice.

“I’m not a really vocal guy, but definitely lead by example,” he said. “I try to come in first in every drill. Doing conditioning drills in hockey is not very fun, but I give my full effort so other players can see

how important it is to always try your best.”

That type of mentality is what helped earn Stacy the honor of being a captain in the first place. It was his varsity boys hockey coach, Colin Smith, who helped build that attitude within him even before he got to high school. That longtime bond between player and coach has helped Stacy learn lessons that will stick with him well after his high school years are over.

“Coach Colin has been coaching me for most of my life since I was at St. Clair Shores,” he said. “I’ve been under his wing since I was 6 or 7. ... We’re hoping we can end on a high note together. He’s kind of like an uncle. ... We’re pretty close and the most important thing I’ve learned from him is that he always says, ‘No matter how you’re feeling, always give 100 percent of whatever you have.’ It’s important to dig deep and give whatever you have no matter what kind of day you’re having.”

Stacy’s effort and enthusiasm extend far beyond the ice. Having those traits helped him battle through his senior football season despite setbacks due to injury at the beginning of the fall. Stacy still finished his final football season

with 800 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns and eclipsed 2,000 total rushing yards in his career of just two seasons of varsity football.

“The biggest thing is having a positive mindset,” Stacy said. “I got hurt before the season even started. Getting to physical therapy and having the urge to get on the field and play was tough. I worked on different parts of my game and watched film

to help me out.”

There is no shortage of positivity for Stacy now during the hockey season. Stacy and the Knights are halfway through the season with a winning record and have eyes on winning a Catholic League championship and more.

“I’ve been playing hockey with some of these guys since I was really young, so we want to have fun,” he said. “Winning a state championship is a goal we talked about before the season started. We’ve got to focus on cleaning up the little things and I think we should be able to make a pretty good run toward the end of the season.”

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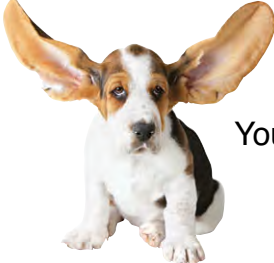
